Trenton, Tuesday, October 24, 1786.

The EING the Time and Place appointed by Law for the first Meeting of the General Assembly, chosen at the late annual Election, several Persons returned as Members attended, to wit, David Board, Daniel Marsh; Jonathan Dayton, James Bonney, James Douglass, Elisha Walton, Joseph Stillwell, Peter Schenck, David Kelly, Robert Blair, Franklin Davenport, Ephraim Loyd, Edmund Wetherby, Samuel Sharp, Benjamin Van-Cleve, John Anderson, Joab Houghton, Ellis Cook, John Starke, Aaron Kitchel, John Sheppard, Ephraim Harris and Aaron Hankinson; and, being a Quorum, they produced the respective Certificates of their Election, which were read, approved, and ordered to be filed; whereupon Benjamin Van-Cleve, Esquire, was appointed agreeably to the Constitution to qualify Ephraim Harris, Esquire, who, being duly sworn, took his Seat; and the remaining Persons returned as Members, being also qualified by the said Ephraim Harris, took their Seats in the House.

The House proceeded to the Election of a Speaker, when the Honourable Benjamin Van-Cleve, Esquire, was chosen, and placed in the Chair.

The House proceeded to the Election of a Clerk, when Maskell Ewing was unanimously chosen.

Maskell Ewing attended; and, being duly sworn, took his Seat as Clerk in the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Board do wait on the Council, and acquaint them that the House of Assembly have this Day proceeded to Business, and have chosen the Honourable Benjamin Van-Cleve, Esquire, their Speaker.

Refolved, That Daniel Bellerjeau be Doorkeeper to the House during the present Sitting.

Ordered, That Messrs. Marsh, Cook and Clark, be a Committee to examine the Minutes of the last Sitting, and report such Business as was referred from, or stood unfinished at, the last Sitting.

Ordered, That Messes. Blair, Dayton, Kitchel, Anderson and Schenck, or any three of them, be a Committee to join a Committee of the Council on such publick Accounts as may be referred to them during the Sitting of the Legislature; and that the said Committee settle and report all Accounts for the Payment of which, when settled, Provision is already made by Law; and that they deliver all others to such Committee of this House as may be hereafter appointed to bring in a Bill for defraying incidental Charges.

Ordered, That Mr. Marsh do wait on the Council, and desire them to appoint a Committee to join the Committee of this House for the above Purpose.

Ordered, That Messrs. Sheppard, Cook, Dayton, Wetherby and Davenport, or any two of them, be a Committee to join a Committee of the Council to settle the Accounts of the Treasurer, and that Mr. Marsh do wait on the Council, and request them to appoint a Committee to join a Committee of this House for the above Purpose.

Ordered, That Meffrs. Clark and Marsh be a Committee to prepare and prefent a Bill for defraying incidental Charges.

Sundry Petitions from the County of Monmouth was presented, praying that a Law may be passed to authorize the Appointment of Loan-Officers in those Counties in this State in which the Appointment of them agreeably to, or within the Time pointed out by Law has been omitted; which being read, were committed to Messrs. Walton, Baker and Sharp, to bring in a Bill for that Purpose.

Ordered, That Messrs. Harris and Davenport be a Committee to examine the Laws, and report to the House such as have expired or are near expiring.

Sundry Petitions from the County of Essex were read, praying, for Reafons therein contained, that the late annual Election held in the said County may be set aside, and that a new Election may be ordered in the said County;

That your Committee, influenced by this Conviction, and fensible of the Propriety of adopting Requisitions made under such Sanction, cannot but regret that the Injustice of some of the Sister States in withholding from us, and appropriating to themselves, the Prosits and Advantages accruing from the Sales of those Lands which our Arms have equally contributed to conquer; and in refusing to Congress the Exercise of the Fruits of a general Impost, which, in the same Proportion as they are burdensome, should be profitable to all, renders a Compliance with them on the Part of this State extremely difficult.

Thus fituated, your Committee feel themselves greatly at a Loss what Meafures they ought in Preference to recommend. They are notwithstanding, after taking every Circumstance into Consideration, constrained to give it as their Opinion, that the Sums demanded by Congress, as the Quota of this State, be raised as far as possible by Impost and Excise, and the Residue by Taxes in the ordinary Way. In the mean Time they are of Opinion, that the Representatives of this State in Congress should be instructed to represent to that Honourable Body, in the fullest and strongest Terms, the burdened Condition and exhausted Situation of the State, and to request their longest possible

Your Committee, having thus recommended the Mode which they conceived the most expedient and proper for making Provision for the Payment of the Quota of the foreign Debt, would have discharged their Duty but in Part, had they been silent or neglected to communicate to the House their Opinion with Respect to that Part of the Debt which is domestic, or confined to the Citizens of these States. This your Committee thinks cannot better be provided for than by increasing by Tax the Revenue Money to the Sum demanded, as our Quota of the Interest of the domestic Debt, to be appropriated solely to this Purpose; as it must be very unimportant to Congress if the publick Creditors are fatisfied, and they exonerated, in what Manner it be done. Your Committee are clearly of Opinion, that the Plan above suggested will be most beneficial to the Citizens of this State, and equally answer the Purposes of the Requisitions.

To the Honourable Lambert Cadwalader, Abraham Chark and James Schuurman, Esquires, Delegates representing the State of New-Jersey in

Congress,

GENTLEMEN,

E, the Representatives of the State of New-Jersey in Council and Assembly met, although fully convinced of your Abilities and Zeal to promote the Interest of this State and of the Union, cannot refrain from communicating to you our Sentiments and Instructions upon certain Subjects of the first political Importance.

For the Sake of avoiding unnecessary Repetitions, we think it proper and sufficient in the first Place, to refer you to the Instructions given the former Representatives by the last Legislature, dated the first of March 1786, which one of you is officially possessed of, and the others may find recorded in the

Minutes of the House of Assembly of the same Date.

The Difadvantages under which we then laboured, the Impolitions that were at that Time practifed upon us by the nearest States, and the Injustice that we conceived was done us by others still exist, and even operate with additional Force. These Instructions you will consider as the Rule and Direction of your Conduct while in Congress, and invariably adhere to them in every Matter to

which they bear Relation.

As it may be necessary for you to be made acquainted with our Determination and Opinion upon the various Requisitions of Congress, we refer you for full Information on this Head to the Report of the Committee appointed for that Purpose, which has received the Approbation of that Branch of the Legislature from which they were appointed. We have directed that a Copy of this Report be enclosed to you, and you will regard it as expressive of our Wishes and Resolutions on this Subject. You will discover upon Reading it, that it is expected you will spare no Exertions in endeavouring to paint, to that Honourable Body with whom you have a Seat, the Unhappiness of our Situation, in its most striking and truest Colours. While you assure them of our Inclination to satisfy their rederal and just Demands, so long as that Justice which we have long and loudly called for is denied us, and those unsisterly Oppressions against which we have hitherto unavailingly complained and remonstrated, are continued and increased.

The Welfare of the Union is the first Object of our Wishes and nearest to

our Hearts. It is your Duty to promote it in every Situation, and under every Circumstance. Should any Misfortune, which Heaven avert, hereafter happen to it, those States, and those alone, must be responsible, whose illiberal and selfish Policy will have occasioned it, and on them must fall the whole Weight of the Evils which cannot fail to accompany such an Event. Be it then your Care, while you are afferting the Rights of the State you represent, to guard with a watchful Eye the Interests of the Whole. Let your Conduct be such, as will furnish no Room for the Reproach that New-Jersey has been among the last, or in the least Degree remiss in supporting the Confederation.

The Cession for a Term of Years of the entire Navigation of the River Misfissippi to the Spanish Court, has, we are informed, been proposed and agitated We cannot avoid expressing our Disapprobation of the Measure; in Congress. and it is our Wish that you should give it your Opposition whenever it is again brought forward for Discussion or Decision. Were it evident, that the Execution of this Business would be attended with no ill Consequences or Inconveniencies, yet, in our Opinion, the Confideration offered for it is Nothing to this State, and little or trifling to the Union. But we View it in a far different Light. We believe that the Value of the western Country, on the Sales of which we rely for the Discharge of our numerous Debts, is in some Degree dependant upon the free Navigation of this important River. The Cession of a disputed Right, when once made, is not easily reclaimed. And whether the Court of Madrid asks or intends it for the Benefit of its own Subjects, or to barter with Britain, the Step will be equally imprudent, and the Inconvenience equally great.

and of the 2d of August 1786, reported as follows:

THAT, in the Opinion of your Committee, those Requisitions were made by Congress in Virtue of Powers vested in them by the Confederation: That your Committee, influenced by this Conviction, and fensible of the Propriety of adopting Requisitions made under such Sanction, cannot but regret that the Injustice of some of the Sister States in withholding from us, and appropriating to themselves, the Profits and Advantages accruing from the Sales of those Lands which our Arms have equally contributed to conquer; and in refusing to Congress the Exercise of the Fruits of a general Impost, which, in the fame Proportion as they are burdensome, should be profitable to all, renders a Compliance with them on the Part of this State extremely difficult.

Thus fituated, your Committee feel themselves greatly at a Loss what Meafures they ought in Preference to recommend. They are notwithstanding, after taking every Circumstance into Consideration, constrained to give it as their Opinion, that the Sums demanded by Congress, as the Quota of this State, be raifed as far as possible by Impost and Excise, and the Residue by Taxes in the ordinary Way. In the mean Time they are of Opinion, that the Representatives of this State in Congress should be instructed to represent to that Honourable Body, in the fullest and strongest Terms, the burdened Condition and exhausted Situation of the State, and to request their longest possible Forbearance.

Your Committee, having thus recommended the Mode which they conceived the most expedient and proper for making Provision for the Payment of the Quota of the foreign Debt, would have discharged their Duty but in Part, had they been filent or neglected to communicate to the House their Opinion with Respect to that Part of the Debt which is domestic, or confined to the Citizens of these States. This your Committee thinks cannot better be provided for than by increasing by Tax the Revenue Money to the Sum demanded, as our Quota of the Interest of the domestic Debt, to be appropriated solely to this Purpose; as it must be very unimportant to Congress if the publick Creditors are fatisfied, and they exonerated, in what Manner it be done. Your Committee are clearly of Opinion, that the Plan above suggested will be most beneficial to the Citizens of this State, and equally answer the Purposes of the Requisitions.

To the Honourable LAMBERT CADWALADER, ABRAHAM CLARK and JAMES Schuurman, Esquires, Delegates representing the State of New-Jersey in

Congress,

GENTLEMEN,

TE, the Representatives of the State of New-Jersey in Council and Assembly met, although fully convinced of your Abilities and Zeal to promote the Interest of this State and of the Union, cannot refrain from communicating to you our Sentiments and Instructions upon certain Subjects of the first political Importance.

For the Sake of avoiding unnecessary Repetitions, we think it proper and fufficient in the first Place, to refer you to the Instructions given the former Representatives by the last Legislature, dated the first of March 1786, which one of you is officially possessed of, and the others may find recorded in the Minutes of the House of Assembly of the same Date.

The Difadvantages under which we then laboured, the Impositions that were at that Time practifed upon us by the nearest States, and the Injustice that we conceived was done us by others still exist, and even operate with additional These Instructions you will consider as the Rule and Direction of your Conduct while in Congress, and invariably adhere to them in every Matter to

which they bear Relation.

As it may be necessary for you to be made acquainted with our Determination and Opinion upon the various Requisitions of Congress, we refer you for full Information on this Head to the Report of the Committee appointed for that Purpose, which has received the Approbation of that Branch of the Legislature from which they were appointed. We have directed that a Copy of this Report be enclosed to you, and you will regard it as expressive of our Wishes and Resolutions on this Subject. You will discover upon Reading it, that it is expected you will spare no Exertions in endeavouring to paint, to that Honourable Body with whom you have a Seat, the Unhappiness of our Situation in its most striking and truest Colours. While you assure them of our Inclination to latisfy their federal and just Demands, so long as that Justice which we have long and loudly called for is denied us, and those unfifterly Oppres. fions against which we have hitherto unavailingly complained and remonstrated, are continued and increased.

The Welfare of the Union is the first Object of our Wishes and nearest to

our Hearts. It is your Duty to promote it in every Situation, and under every Circumstance. Should any Misfortune, which Heaven avert, hereafter happen to it, those States, and those alone, must be responsible, whose illiberal and felfish Policy will have occasioned it, and on them must fall the whole Weight of the Evils which cannot fail to accompany fuch an Event. your Care, while you are afferting the Rights of the State you represent, to guard with a watchful Eye the Interests of the Whole. Let your Conduct be fuch, as will furnish no Room for the Reproach that New-Jersey has been among the last, or in the least Degree remiss in supporting the Confederation.

The Cession for a Term of Years of the entire Navigation of the River Misfiffippi to the Spanish Court, has, we are informed, been proposed and agitated in Congress. We cannot avoid expressing our Disapprobation of the Measure; and it is our Wish that you should give it your Opposition whenever it is again brought forward for Discussion or Decision. Were it evident, that the Execution of this Business would be attended with no ill Consequences or Inconveniencies, yet, in our Opinion, the Confideration offered for it is Nothing to this State, and little or trifling to the Union. But we View it in a far different We believe that the Value of the western Country, on the Sales of which we rely for the Discharge of our numerous Debts, is in some Degree dependant upon the free Navigation of this important River. The Cession of a disputed Right, when once made, is not easily reclaimed. And whether the Court of Madrid asks or intends it for the Benefit of its own Subjects, or to barter with Britain, the Step will be equally imprudent, and the Inconvenience equally great.

Which Instructions being read, were agreed to.



4. That the Securities to be funded be the Loan-Office Certificates, Certificates figured by Benjamin Thompson, Commissioner, Notes figured by John Pierce, Commissioner, and delivered to the Officers and Soldiers of the Army

for the Arrears of their Pay, Certificates figned by Jonathan Burrell, Joseph Nourse and Edward Fox, or either of them, as Commissioners (Commutation Notes excepted) and given to any Person or Persons, Inhabitant or Inhabitants of this State: To be done under such Regulations, Conditions and Restrictions as to the Legislature may seem proper.
