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

in the Militia, liable however to be taxed as other Exempts.

6th, 'The first Number of the said Gazette to be put to the Press immediately, if the Legislature so direct.'

HEREAS there is immediate Necessity of a Quantity of Blankets, Waistcoats, Breeches, Stockings and Shoes, for the Troops of this state in the Continental Army, and a Law for the Purpose of procuring such supply as can be had in the State is now under Consideration, but cannot be expedited as soon as the Urgency of the Case requires; therefore, as a temporary Expedient till such Law is enacted and put in Force.

'That John Holme, of the County of Salem, Thomas Denny of Gloucester, 'Anthony Taylor of Burlington, Jared Sexton of Hunterdon, Robert Maxwell of 'Sussex, John Vanderweer of Monmouth, Hugh Gaston of Somerset, Stephen Conck-'lin of Morris, and Samuel Pennington, of the County of Essex, be respectively

appointed to purchase all such of the Articles above-mentioned as they can possibly procure, and put them into the Hands of Alexander Chambers of Trenton,

to be forwarded to the Army; and that they be respectively empowered to

- ' draw from the Treasury any Sum not exceeding Two Hundred and Fifty
- ' Pounds for this Service; and that His Excellency the Governor be requested 6 to write to the respective Commissioners stimulating them to use their utmost 6 Endeavours in this Behalf, and to give them such further and particular Instruc-
- tions as he may think necessary till a Law is provided, affuring them all neces-

To the UNITED STATES in CONGRESS ASSEMBLED;

The REPRESENTATION of the LEGISLATIVE-COUNCIL and GENERAL ASSEMBLY of the State of New-Jersey:

Respectfully sherveth,

THAT at the Time the Establishment of the Army was formed, this State had the fairest Prospect of recruitive the first Prospect of the Prospec State had the fairest Prospect of recruiting the four Regiments assigned, as the Proportion thereof to their full Complement, before the Opening of the then next Campaign.

That this Prospect was in a very great Degree disappointed, by the Irruption of the Enemy in the Month of November 1776, who possessed themselves of a very large Extent of the most populous and best cultivated Parts of the State, which they held for a confiderable Time, and from which they were not intirely

expelled till the June following,

That, during fuch their Incursion, they greatly desolated and destroyed all the Country in their Power, captivated many of the active well-affected Inhabitants, Numbers of whom died in Confinement, under the Rigour of their fusserings, recruited many of their standing Regiments from our British, Irish and other foreign Settlers, and raised six new Corps from the Natives, besides carrying off occasionally before and also at the Time of evacuating the State, many Drivers and Attendants; the unpromising Aspect of our Assairs in the Fall and Winter of the Year 1776, giving them too much Advantage in effecting their Purpofes.

That the Whole, or at least a very considerable Part, of the Army of the United States having continued long in this State, and particularly during the recruiting Season, many of the Inhabitants enlisted into the cstablished Regiments of other States, and a still greater Number into what are commonly called the Sixteen Additional, two of which, especially, were almost intirely levied as Substitutes or otherwise in New-Jersey, and others, to a considerable Amount, engaged in the Service of the Continent as Deputies or Assistants in several of

the public Departments, or as Artificers, Drivers and Attendants.

That throughout a large Proportion of the State, the Quartering of the Ar-

my, the holding of numerous Posts, and the marching the Troops during the Course of the last Year, have greatly endamaged the Inclosures and Habitations of the Husbandmen and others, a Disaster inseparable from the Scene of War, which Circumstances, as may easily be conceived to be the Case in a State substituting principally by Agriculture, created a Call for an extraordinary Number of Hands.

That even where the Enemy have not penetrated, nor the Army of the United States quartered, an unufual Proportion of Labour is requifite; large Supplies for the Troops having been drawn from hence, and still larger, as we are in-

formed, expected.

That this State, from its Situation, is reluctantly obliged to exempt no small Number of musterable Militia, for the purpose of carrying on Manufactures of various Kinds, essentially necessary to the Army and the State, as well as to some of the neighbouring States, and which cannot at present be provided by any other Means.

That the Militia are conftantly obliged to keep the Field, in very confiderable Numbers, to the great Neglect of their domestic Business, which has introduced the Practice of giving such high Premiums to Substitutes, that recruiting is become almost impracticable in the State, and must so continue as long as the Enemy maintain their present Posts, and our Militia constitute our Defence.

That having been called upon from Time to Time by the Honourable the Congress, to compleat our Regiments to their full Establishment, we have adopted and practised every Mode by them recommended for that End, but from the Causes above-mentioned without the desired, though not without some Success.

That the Refolution of Congress of the 26th of February last, to recruit the Regiments up to the compleat Numbers by Detachments from the Militia, has reduced us to extreme Difficulty, being ever desirous to pay the strictest Regard to the Recommendations pointed to us, and yet, pressed on every Side, we are unable to provide even for our own Preservation.

That the Situation of this State, exposed as it is to the Enemy, is particularly distressing, on either Hand a formidable hostile Force, three-fourths of our Boundary a Frontier, daily open to Invasions, and frequently invaded, no Regular Troops stationed for the Defence of any Part of it, and the Militia greatly diminished by long and severe Service, and by the several Means above noted,

at present inadequate to the Purpose.

That under such Circumstances, we think it our Duty to represent our Case to Congress, and to assure them, that nothing is surther from our Inclination than to withdraw in the least Tittle, from a Share of the publick Exertions proportioned to our Strength; but at the same Time, we are unwilling that Expectations should be formed of us, which we are not able, in the present Condition of the State, to answer.

We therefore pray,

That Congress, in Consideration of the Premises, will accept of such Reinforcement to our Regiments as can at present be made, consistent with the Sasety and Protection of the Frontiers.

That they will direct fuch Defence to be thrown into our Aid, as will avail in fome Measure to the Relief of the Militia, when we shall have an Opportunity of prosecuting the Completion of our Regiments with some Advantage for Success, as well as be allowed some Respite for Application to Agriculture, without which the State itself must be reduced to Extremity, and the Army, as far as it has any Dependance on it for Supplies, be left to suffer.

That should a Reduction of the Sixteen additional Regiments take Place, Congress will incorporate those raised in this State, into the established Regiments thereof, or in such other Way place them to the Credit of our Quota, as they in

their Wisdom shall think meet.

To the UNITED STATES in CONGRESS ASSEMBLED.

The REPRESENTATION of the LEGISLATIVE-COUNCIL and GENERAL ASSEMBLY of the State of New-Jersey,

Sheaneth

HAT the Articles of Confederation and perpetual Union, between the States of New-Hampshire, Massachusetts-Bay, Rhode-Island and Providence Plantations, Connecticut, New-York, New-Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North-Carolina, South-Carolina, and Georgia, proposed by the Honourable the Congress, to the said States severally, for their Consistantion, have been by us fully and attentively considered, upon which we beg Leave to

make the following Remarks:

If the fifth Article, where, among other Things, the Qualifications of the Delegates from the feveral States are described, there is no Mention of any Oath, Test, or Declaration to be taken or made by them, previous to their Admission to Seats in Congress.—It is indeed to be presumed, the respective States will be careful that the Delegates they send to assist in managing the general Interest of the Union, take the Oaths to the Government from which they derive their Authority; but as the United States collectively considered, have Interests as well as each particular State, we are of Opinion, that some Test or Obligation binding each Delegate while he continues in the Trust, to consult and pursue the former as well as the latter, and particularly to assent to no Vote or Proceeding which may violate the general Consederation, is necessary. The Laws and Usages of all civilized Nations evince the Propriety of an Oath on such Occasions; and the more solemn and important the Deposite, the more strong and explicit ought the Obligation to be.

ftrong and explicit ought the Obligation to be.

2d. By the fixth and ninth Articles, the Regulation of Trade feems to be committed to the feveral States within their feparate Jurisdictions, in such a Degree as may involve many Difficulties and Embarrassiments, and be attended with Injustice to some States in the Union:—We are of Opinion, that the sole and exclusive Power of regulating the Trade of the United States with foreign Nations, ought to be clearly vested in the Congress, and that the Revenue arising from all Duties and Customs imposed thereon, ought to be appropriated to the building, equipping and manning of a Navy, for the Protection of the Trade, and Defence of the Coasts, and to such other publick and general Purposes, as to the Congress shall seem proper, and for the common Benefit of the States. This Principle appears to us to be just, and it may be added, that great Security will by this Means be derived to the Union from the Establishment of a

common and mutual Interest.

3d. It is wifely provided in the fixth Article, that no Body of Forces shall be kept up by any State in Time of Peace, except such Number only as, in the Judgment of the United States in Congress assembled, shall be deemed requisite to garrison the Forts necessary for the Desence of such State: We think it ought also to be provided, and clearly expressed, that no Body of Troops be kept up

by the United States, in Time of Peace, except such Number only as shall be allowed by the Assent of nine States. A standing Army, a Military Establishment and every Appendage thereof in Time of Peace, is totally abhorrent from the Ideas and Principles of this State.—In the memorable Act of Congress, declaring the United Colonies free and independent States, it is emphatically mentioned, as one of the Causes of Separation from Great-Britain, that the Sovereign thereof had kept up among us in Time of Peace, standing Armies without the Consent of the Legislatures—It is to be wished the Liberties and Happiness of the People may, by the Consederation, be carefully and explicitly guarded in this Respect.

4th. On the eighth Article we observe, that as frequent Settlements of the Quotas for Supplies and Aids to be furnished by the several States, in Support of the general Treasury, will be requisite, so they ought to be secured. It cannot be thought improper or unnecessary to have them struck once at least in every five Years, and oftener if Circumstances will allow; the Quantity or Value of Real Property in some States may increase much more rapidly than in others, and therefore the Quota which is at one Time just, will at another be dispro-

portionate.

5th. The Boundaries and Limits of each State ought to be fully and finally fixed and made known; this we apprehend would be attended with very falutary Effects, by preventing Jealoufies as well as Controversies, and promoting Harmony and Confidence among the States: If the Circumstances of the Times would not admit of this, previous to the Proposal of the Confederation to the several States, the Establishment of the Principles upon which, and the Rule and Mode by which the Determination may be conducted, at a Time more convenient and savourable, and a Provision for dispatching the same at an early Period, not exceeding five Years from the final Ratification of the Confederation, would

be fatisfactory.

6th. The ninth Article provides, that no State shall be deprived of Territory for the Benefit of the United States: - Whether we are to understand that by Territory, is intended any Lands, the Property of which was heretofore vested in the Crown of Great-Britain; or that no Mention of such Lands is made in the Confederation; we are constrained to observe, that the present War, as we always apprehended, was undertaken for the general Defence and Interest of the confederating Colonies, now the United States. It was ever the confident Expectation of this State, that the Benefits derived from a fuccessful Contest were to be general and proportionate, and that the Property of the common Enemy, falling in Consequence of a prosperous Issue of the War, would belong to the United States, and be appropriated to their Use: We are therefore greatly difappointed in finding no Provision made in the Confederation for empowering the Congress to dispose of such Property, but especially the vacant and unpatented Lands, commonly called the Crown Lands, for defraying the Expences of the War, and for other fuch publick and general Purpofes.—The Jurisdiction ought in every Instance to belong to the respective States within the Charter or determined Limits of which such Lands may be feated; but Reason and Justice must decide, that the Property which existed in the Crown of Great-Britain, previous to the present Revolution, ought now to belong to the Congress, in Trust for the Use and Benefit of the United States: They have fought and bled for it in Proportion to their respective Abilities, and therefore the Reward ought not to be predilectionally distributed. Shall such States as are shut out by Situation from availing themselves of the least Advantage from this Quarter, be left to fink under an enormous Debt, whilst others are enabled in a short Period to replace all their Expenditures from the hard Earnings of the whole Confederacy? 7th. The ninth Article also provides, that the Requisitions for Land-Forces to

be furnished by the several States, shall be proportioned to the Number of white Inhabitants in each.—In the Act of Independence we find the following Declaration: 'We hold these Truths to be fels-evident, that all Men are created 'equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, 'among which are Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness;' of this Doctrine it is not a very remote Consequence that all the Inhabitants of every Society, be the Colour of their Complexion what it may, are bound to promote

the

the Interest thereof, according to their respective Abilities: They ought therefore to be brought into the Account on this Occasion. But admitting Necessity or Expediency to justify the Refusal of Liberty in certain Circumstances, to Perfons of a particular Colour; we think it unequal to reckon Nothing upon such in this Case.—If the whole Number of Inhabitants in a State, whose Inhabitants are all Whites, both those who are called into the Field, and those who remain to till the Ground, and labour in Mechanick Arts and otherwise, are reckoned in the Estimate for striking the Proportion of Forces to be surnished by that State, ought even a Part of the latter Description to be left out in another? Should it be improper for special local Reasons to admit them in Arms, for the Desence of the Nation, yet we conceive that the Proportion of Forces to be embodied, ought to be fixed according to the whole Number of Inhabitants in the State, from whatever Class they may be raised. As it is of indispensible Necessity in every War, that a Part of the Inhabitants be employed for the Uses of Husbandry and otherwise at Home, while others are called into the Field, there must be the same Propriety that Persons of a different Colour who are employed for this Purpose in one State, while Whites are employed for the fame Purpose in another, be reckoned in the Amount of the Inhabitants in the present Instance.

To the UNITED STATES in CONGRESS Assembled.

The REPRESENTATION of the LEGISLATIVE-COUNCIL and GENERAL ASSEMBLY of the State of New-Jersey,

HAT the Articles of Confederation and perpetual Union, between the States of New-Hampshire, Massachusetts-Bay, Rhode-Island and Providence Plantations, Connecticut, New-York, New-Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North-Carolina, South-Carolina, and Georgia, proposed by Congress, to the said States severally, for their Confirmation, have been by us fully and attentively considered, upon which we beg Leave to make the sol-

lowing Remarks:

Ift. In the fifth Article, where, among other Things, the Qualifications of the Delegates from the feveral States are described, there is no Mention of any Oath, Test, or Declaration to be taken or made by them, previous to their Admission to Scats in Congress.—It is indeed to be presumed, the respective States will be careful that the Delegates they send to affist in managing the general Interests of the Union, take the Oaths to the Government from which they derive their Authority; but as the United States collectively considered, have Interests as well as each particular State, we are of Opinion, that some Test or Obligation binding each Delegate while he continues in the Trust, to consult and pursue the former as well as the latter, and particularly to assent to no Vote or Proceeding which may violate the general Consederation, is necessary. The Laws and Usages of all civilized Nations evince the Propriety of an Oath on such Occasions; and the more solemn and important the Deposite, the more strong and explicit ought the Obligation to be.

2d. By the fixth and ninth Articles, the Regulation of Trade feems to be committed to the feveral States within their feparate Jurisdictions, in such a Degree as may involve many Difficulties and Embarrassments, and be attended with Injustice to some States in the Union:—We are of Opinion, that the sole and exclusive Power of regulating the Trade of the United States with foreign Nations, ought to be clearly vested in the Congress, and the Revenue arising from all Duties and Customs imposed thereon, ought to be appropriated to the building, equipping and manning a Navy, for the Protection of the Trade, and Defence of the Coasts, and to such other suitable and general Purposes, as to the Congress shall seem proper, and for the common Benefit of the States. This Principle appears to us to be just, and it may be added, that a great Security will by this Means be derived to the Union from the Establishment of a

common and mutual Interest.

3d. It is wisely provided in the fixth Article, that no Body of Forces shall be kept up by any State in Time of Peace, except such Number only as, in the Judgment of the United States in Congress assembled, shall be deemed requisite to garrison the Forts necessary for the Defence of such State: We think it ought also to be provided, and clearly expressed, that no Body of Troops be kept up by the United States, in Time of Peace, except such Number only as shall be allowed by the Assent of nine States. A standing Army, a Military Establishment and every Appendage thereof in Time of Peace, is totally abhorrent from the Ideas and Principles of this State.—In the memorable Act of Congress, declaring the United Colonies free and independent States, it is emphatically mentioned, as one of the Causes of Separation from Great-Britain, that the Sovereign thereof had kept up among us in Time of Peace, standing Armies without the Consent of the Legislatures—It is to be wished the Liberties and Happiness of the People may, by the Confederation, be carefully and explicitly guarded in this Respect.

4th. On the eighth Article we observe, that as frequent Settlements of the Quotas for Supplies and Aids to be furnished by the several States, in Support of the general Treasury, will be requisite, so they ought to be secured. It cannot be thought improper or unnecessary to have them struck once at least in every five Years, and oftener if Circumstances will allow; the Quantity or Value of Real Property in some States may increase much more rapidly than in others, and therefore the Quota which is at one Time just, will at another be dispro-

portionate.

5th. The Boundaries and Limits of each State ought to be fully and finally fixed and made known; this we apprehend would be attended with very falutary Effects, by preventing Jealoufies as well as Controversies, and promoting Harmony and Confidence among the States: If the Circumstances of the Times would not admit of this, previous to the Proposal of the Confederation to the feveral States, the Establishment of the Principles upon which, and the Rule and

Mode

Mode by which the Determination may be conducted, at a Time more convenient and favourable, and a Provision for dispatching the same at an early Period, not exceeding five Years from the sinal Ratification of the Confederation, would

be satisfactory.

6th. The ninth Article provides, that no State shall be deprived of Territory for the Benefit of the United States: - Whether we are to understand that by Territory, is intended any Lands, the Property of which was heretofore vested in the Crown of Great-Britain; or that no Mention of fuch Lands is made in the Confederation; we are constrained to observe, that the present War, as we always apprehended, was undertaken for the general Defence and Interest of the confederating Colonies, now the United States. It was ever the confident Expectation of this State, that the Benefits derived from a fuecessful Contest were to be general and proportionate, and that the Property of the common Enemy, falling in Consequence of a prosperous Issue of the War, would belong to the United States, and be appropriated to their Use: We are therefore greatly difappointed in finding no Provision made in the Confederation for empowering the Congress to dispose of such Property, but especially the vacant and unpatented Lands, commonly called the Crown Lands, for defraying the Expences of the War, and for other such publick and general Purposes.—The Jurisdiction ought in every Instance to belong to the respective States within the Charter or determined Limits of which fuch Lands may be seated; but Reason and Justice must decide, that the Property which existed in the Crown of Great-Britain, previous to the present Revolution, ought now to belong to the Congress, in Trust for the Use and Benefit of the United States: They have fought and bled for it in Proportion to their respective Abilities, and therefore the Reward ought not to be predilectionally distributed. Shall such States as are shut out by Situation from availing themselves of the least Advantage from this Quarter, be left to fink under an enormous Debt, whilst others are enabled in a short Period to replace all their Expenditures from the hard Earnings of the whole Confederacy?

7th. The ninth Article also provides, that the Requisitions for Land-Forces to be furnished by the several States, shall be proportioned to the Number of white Inhabitants in each.—In the Act of Independence we find the following Declaration: 'We hold these Truths to be felf-evident, that all Men are created ' equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights among which are Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness;' of this Doctrine it is not a very remote Consequence that all the Inhabitants of every Society, be the Colour of their Complexion what it may, are bound to promote the Interest thereof, according to their respective Abilities: They ought therefore to be brought into the Account on this Occasion. But admitting the Necessity or Expediency to justify the Refusal of Liberty in certain Circumstances, to Perfons of a particular Colour; we think it unequal to reckon Nothing upon fuch in this Case.—If the whole Number of Inhabitants in a State, whose Inhabitants are all Whites, both those who are called into the Field, and those who remain to till the Ground, and labour in Mechanick Arts and otherwise, are reckoned in the Estimate for striking the Proportion of Forces to be furnished by that State, ought even a Part of the latter Description to be left out in another?
