REPORT

To the Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit my report of the principal operations of this Department for the fiscal year ended October 31, 1908, together with certain suggestions as to the needs and necessities.

SMALL ARMS.

The infantry, cavalry and signal corps organizations of the National Guard are now armed with the United States Magazine Rifle, model of 1903. This is the new musket with knife bayonet and model of 1905 rear sight, being the same arm in all respects as that issued to the U. S. Army. This rifle is chambered for model of 1906 ammunition, a supply of which, together with the necessary equipments, were received during the year from the National Government under section 13 of the Act of January 21, 1903.

FIELD ARTILLERY.

The two batteries constituting the artillery arm of the State service are both equipped with modern 3-inch guns.

Battery A, Field Artillery, Captain Oscar H. Condit, commanding, received its equipment in 1906 of four guns of the model of 1904, and at the beginning of the present year Battery B, Field Artillery, Captain Samuel G. Barnard, commanding, received from the Government four guns of the model of 1905. The batteries are but poorly provided for the storage of these splendid guns with their costly outfit, and the Government is urging that it is incumbent, in fact obligatory, upon the State if it desires to retain possession of this valuable property to provide suitable facilities for its care, handling and proper instruction of the men in its use. The places of storage in use by both batteries are severely criticised by the U. S. inspecting officers as inadequate for the purpose. Each battery should have a competent caretaker provided by the State, city where battery is located, or by the organization, whose duty it would be

to devote his entire time to the care of the guns and equipment. As it is, it is left to the occasional or desultory care of the members of the organizations under the supervision of their officers.

SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR CLAIMS.

But few of the officers and enlisted men of the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th Regiments, National Guard Volunteer Infantry, have presented claims during the year for the State pay due them from date of arrival at Camp Voorhees, Sea Girt, until muster into the service in 1898. The account is as follows:

STATE CAMP GROUNDS AND ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT.

The several organizations of the National Guard, with the exception of the First Regiment Infantry and the First Troop Cavalry, which were excused from State camp duty in order to participate with the U. S. troops in the Army Maneuvers at Pine Plains, New York, encamped at Sea Girt from July 11th to August 8th in the following order:

Third Regiment Infantry and Second Troop Cavalry, July 13th to 18th.

Second Regiment Infantry and Battery B, Field Artillery, July 20th to 25th.

Fifth Regiment Infantry and Battery A, Field Artillery, July 27th to August 1st.

Fourth Regiment Infantry, August 3rd to August 8th.

As usual the organizations entered camp on the Saturday previous to the actual dates assigned to them respectively, and the camp continued without intermission from Saturday, July 11th, until Saturday, August 8th.

The First Regiment and First Troop were encamped at Pine Camp, New York, ten days, from June 26th until July 6th, including dates of departure from, and arrival at home stations. All equipage for their use was supplied by this department. In addition to the pay received from the government, the enlisted men of these organizations were allowed State pay in an amount

to equal the pay that would have been paid from State funds for six days service at Sea Girt. Transportation, subsistence, and pay at U. S. rates were paid by the War Department under section 15 of the Act of January 21, 1903.

It is to be regretted that the State still adheres to the system of employing civilian cooks, procured through this department for the company messes, and in consequence the regimental commissary officers and enlisted men learn nothing by experience of the important details of the commissary department to be of service if called upon to care for themselves when ordered out to attend maneuvers at U. S. Army camps or for actual service.

The wasteful habits of some of the cooks, together with the lack of experience of regimental commissary officers, make it difficult for them to handle the ration intelligently.

I am unable to report any substantial progress in the matter of providing for the cost of disposing of the sewage from the camp grounds. An ample sum for this purpose, based on an estimate made for the State Sewerage Commission, was placed in the budget for the supplemental appropriation bill of 1908, and submitted with all correspondence on the subject to the legislative appropriation committee, but that body for reasons unknown to this department, failed to make the necessary provision.

Under date of June 10, 1908, this department was notified that the further pollution of the Manasquan River and its tributaries must cease within one month from date of notice. As this was impossible because of the failure to make the necessary appropriation, an extension was asked and granted, until July 10th.

1909. Another effort will be made to obtain the favorable action of the Appropriation Committee at the session of the Legislature of January, 1909.
