# REPORT.

# To the Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

I have the honor to report the administration of the duties of this department for the fiscal year ended, October 31, 1900.

Serious physical indisposition compelled my absence from the office and State in March and April last, during which period the charge of the office, by your orders, devolved upon the Adjutant-General, General William S. Stryker. In the death, almost at the very close of the fiscal year, of this accomplished officer and estimable gentleman, the State has sustained a severe loss. To me his death comes in the nature of a personal bereavement and I shall long miss his companionship and suggestions, so modestly offered, when I have sought his counsel on matters pertaining to our varied military duties. I can say nothing else of General Stryker that can add to the deserved tribute paid to his personal worth and memory in your official announcement of his death in general orders.

Three infantry companies of the Second Regiment, D, at Keyport; K, at Montclair, and L, at Newton, and the Hospital and Ambulance Corps, at Jersey City, have been disbanded by orders. The work of gathering the property of these disbanded organizations is progressing favorably.

Two new companies of the Second Regiment have been organized—D, at Trenton, and L, at Princeton. These companies have been fully uniformed, armed and equipped.

Gatling Gun Companies A and B, after reorganization, have been respectively designated in general orders as Batteries A and B, Field Artillery. In addition to the gatling guns, the armament of each battery has been increased by the issue of two breechloading howitzers.

The national government will not be prepared to issue the

magazine rifle, calibre .30, to the militia of the several States and Territories for some time yet, nor does it seem probable that the Springfield rifles, calibre .45, can be exchanged for arms of like kind, but of a later model.

In order to afford our State troops a practical opportunity to obtain some instruction in the use of the magazine rifle, calibre .30, one hundred of these arms were purchased from the government and used on the range at Sea Girt, in addition to the regular practice with the Springfield rifle, calibre .45.

#### SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR CLAIMS.

Since the date of my last report, cash allowances aggregating \$120,018.23 have been made by the Auditor for the War Department on account of the several installments of claims, leaving the net amount of unsettled claims at \$148,125.92. Such items of this balance (amounting to \$28,063.23), upon which the Auditor has merely suspended action, can be taken up by him for final settlement when further evidence in support thereof shall have been submitted for his consideration. Items (amounting to \$77,736.22), disallowed by the Auditor, can be taken up by him at the expiration of a year from date of acceptance by the State of the last payment in partial settlement, and upon additional satisfactory evidence, certified for payment or be recommended to Congress for equitable reimbursement as representing expenditures of a kind, the necessity for which would otherwise have fallen upon the general government, in raising and equipping the troops from New Jersey for the war with Spain. This leaves items aggregating \$42,326.47, the settlement of which will have to be presented by the State to the Congressional Claims Commission, as the Auditor does not consider them as proper charges against the United States; but, as they represent largely the expenditures that also would have fallen upon the government, the equity of the charges can be made apparent to Congress and their reimbursement insisted upon.

There was an Act passed at the close of the recent session of Congress, in which it is provided

"That on application of the Governor of any State or Territory, the Secretary of War is authorized to replace the Quartermaster's supplies, which the volunteers from said State or Territory carried into the service of the United States army during the recent war with Spain, and which have been retained by the United States, exclusive of such supplies as have been allowed for in the office of the Auditor for the War Department and such award accepted by a State."

#### STATE CAMP GROUNDS.

The State made no appropriation for any of the improvements at the Camp Grounds suggested by me in my report of last year. I have called the attention of the Inspector-General to the subject of these improvements and he will probably say something in reference thereto in his report.

There was a regimental camp of the Second Brigade, consisting of the Second and Third Regiments, Infantry, Second Troop, Cavalry and Battery B, Field Artillery, at Sea Girt, from July 7 to July 21. With your approval, the First Troop, Cavalry, made a practice march to Sea Girt and remained in camp from July 9 to July 14.

#### PAYMASTER-GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT.

Sections 127 and 128 of the Act concerning the Military and Naval forces (Revision of 1900), approved March 23, 1900, provides that there shall be paid on the first Monday in April of each year, for the purpose of procuring drill-rooms or armories, for the purchase of uniforms and to defray other expenses incident to the existence of each regiment, or companies attached thereto, or other organizations, the following sums respectively: To the Surgeon-General, one thousand dollars, for the use of the Medical Department and the Hospital and Ambulance Corps; to the Commanding Officer of the Signal and Telegraph Corps, one thousand dollars, for the use of said corps; to each Regimental Commander, a sum equal to five hundred dollars, for each company in his regiment; to the Commanding Officer of each battery, seven hundred and fifty dollars, and to the Commanding Officer of each troop of cavalry, one thousand dollars, to be expended by the Board of Officers of the respective commands, subject to the approval of the Commanding Officer. In lieu of company allowances, each battalion of the Naval Reserve shall receive annually the sum of fifteen hundred dollars, to be paid at the same time and in the same manner as the allowance for military companies in the National Guard.

Section 129 provides that the money appropriated as above shall be paid by the Comptroller to the Paymaster-General, and by him paid to the heads of the departments and the Commanding Officers of the several regiments and other organizations entitled thereto.

No. 3.

Commandants of divisions, brigades, regiments, troops, batteries and the naval reserve will submit to the Paymaster-General, semi-annually, on the first day of January and July, respectively, itemized statements of the expenditures made for their respective headquarters and organizations of the annual appropriations, including balances turned over by retiring paymasters, or in their hands prior to the payment of the annual appropriation.

The Paymaster-General will deduct from the annual appropriation paid to the National Guard under sections 126, 127, 128 and 129 of the Act concerning the military and naval forces, approved March 23, 1900, the amount of any bill or account for any deficiency standing on the books of the Quartermaster-General's department against any officer of the military and naval forces, to whom transportation or public stores have been issued without security of bond, or for any amount due and owing by any organization of the military and naval forces for rental of armories or drill-rooms, or for any expenses incurred, for which claims for payment have been previously filed in the office of the Paymaster-General.

Discharges, with claims for pay for volunteers who served in the regiments and Naval Reserve from this State during the Spanish-American war, come in slowly. The total amount paid out to date, including pay of rejected recruits, is \$158,520.05.

Previous to his resignation, Major Kenneth J. Duncan, late Paymaster of the Second Brigade, requested an examination of his accounts. Captain Samuel S. Armstrong, Paymaster of this department, was directed to make the examination. The accounts, covering a period of nearly twenty years, were found to have been carefully kept and all expenditures supported by duly certified vouchers. The result was as follows:

Captain Compton gave his check for the above balance and, after the adjustment of a pending claim, the money will be divided between the Second and Third Regiments.

#### SPANISH WAR MEDALS.

In addition to the medal awarded by the Legislature to officers and men serving with New Jersey organizations during the Spanish-American war, the Legislature, at its last session, passed the following resolution, which was approved by you March 23, 1900:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

I. The Governor be and he is hereby authorized to issue and present a medal of the same kind and description as was prepared and presented to each of the honorably discharged officers and men of the New Jersey volunteers in the Spanish-American war, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, to each of the officers and men at that time residents of this State, who served in the land or naval forces of the United States in said war, to commemorate their services to their country during this eventful period, the cost not to exceed fifteen hundred dollars; *provided*, that this resolution shall not apply to officers and men of the New Jersey volunteers who have received or are entitled to receive such medals under the terms of a joint resolution entitled "Joint resolution in relation to medals for the New Jersey volunteers during the Spanish-American war, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight," approved March twenty-second, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine.

Approved March 23, 1900.

Over two hundred applications have been received and granted for medals under the above named resolution. A transcript is made of the discharge of each applicant in a book kept for the purpose. When completed, the book will be turned over to the Adjutant-General to place with the records of his office.

Receipts from the United States, under the Act of Congress, for arming and equipping the militia of the several States and Territories:—

The following amendment to the above Act was passed by Congress and approved June 6, 1900:

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that section one of the act of Congress approved February twelfth, eighteen hundred and eighty-seven, entitled 'An Act to amend section sixteen hundred and sixty-one of the Revised

Statutes, making an annual appropriation to provide arms and equipments for the militia,' be, and the same hereby is amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows: That the sum of one million dollars is hereby annually appropriated, to be paid out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the purpose of providing arms, ordnance stores, quartermaster stores, and camp equipage for issue to the militia."

New Jersey's preliminary allotment under the above amendment for the national fiscal year, ending June 30, 1901, is \$17,252.24. Stores, to the value of \$6,909.33, have been drawn from the Government during the year, leaving a balance of \$14,807.30 to the credit of the State on the books of the War Department. The balance standing to the credit of the naval militia of this State on the books of the Navy Department is \$11,298.46.


