# JOURNAL OF THE SENATE

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STATE OF NEW JERSEY,  
SENATE CHAMBER.

TUESDAY, January 10, 1978.

At 12:00 o'clock noon, this being the time and place appointed by the Constitution for the assembling of the Legislature, the Senate was called to order by Robert E. Gladden, Secretary of the Senate.

The session was opened with prayer by Reverend Joseph C. Shenrock, Blessed Sacrament Church, Trenton.

Mr. J. Russo and Mr. Hagedorn escorted the newly-elected President to the Chair where the oath of office was administered by Hon. George H. Barlow.

President Merlino introduced his family and delivered the following address:

It is not a long walk from Hudson Street, in the Chambersburg section of Trenton, to this podium. But it has been a long leap for me to go from those streets to become President of the New Jersey Senate.

It's a great honor for me, and it's a source of pride to our many people who came up as I did.

If there is one direction in which I personally want to see this Legislature go during these next few years, it is towards guaranteeing to every other city kid a similar opportunity to work his way up to becoming a leader in society. There are lots of kids still out on those streets the way I was—maybe even other kids who've been D students through high school.

But more and more of them seem to be getting lost. The cities are becoming increasingly isolated from the mainstream of society. Jobs, especially for youths, become

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scarcer and scarcer in our urban communities. And that means that many of those kids are being left behind.

This Legislature must do what it can to reverse that trend. All of our investment in staff, all of our talk about "legislative independence" is wasted if we don't address the real needs that face our people. We no longer lack to the tools. We must show the will.

Membership in the Legislature used to be a casual, part-time job that carried more honor than responsibility. That's not true anymore.

The Legislature used to rely on the bureaucracy and on special interest lobbyists for guidance in writing law. That's not true anymore either.

With better staffing over the past six years the Legislature has sharply reduced the influence of the lobbyists. And it has begun to exercise oversight over the bureaucracy.

Part of that resulted in better preparation on the part of individual members, thanks to better staff allotments. I have submitted a budget for the Senate for this year and next year that will allow every member who employs a full-time legislative assistant a \$20,000 allotment. I regard this as further progress toward legislative professionalization.

The proper functioning of our committees is also essential. By proper functioning I mean full attendance by members at their stated starting time. I mean real research into the effects of every provision of every bill, with thorough staff reports before committee action. I mean full-day committee meetings at least one a month on non-session days. I mean standing up to the special interest lobbyists and voting on a bill, not deferring it to avoid taking heat. All the detail work on legislation must be done in committee.

In humbly accepting my responsibilities as President of the Senate, I will not hesitate to remove any chairman or committee member who fails to fulfill his committee responsibilities.

Finally, I intend to restore order and decorum to this House. I insist that our sergeant-at-arms be vigilant in keeping lobbyists off the floor and out of the back corridors.

Persons from the Executive Branch or other government units will not be permitted on the floor except by consent from the Chair. Only Senators and legislative aides with proper credentials will be allowed on the floor. Special guests will be admitted only with permission.

The Senate has already served notice that it will zealously guard its constitutional powers. It is our responsibility to make the laws—and to oversee Executive employees in carrying them out properly. It is our responsibility to appropriate money—and to determine how that money shall, and shall not, be spent.

We have become the independent and coequal body that was envisioned by the constitution. We must curb the excesses and abuses of authority by other branches of government power—just as they at times must curb our own abuses and neglect.

We should not, however, get carried away with distorted notions of legislative independence. It does not mean obstruction. The Governor is not a foe to be thwarted. Indeed, Governor Byrne in particular is a Chief Executive who deserves our strong support.

In a few minutes Governor Byrne will review for us the conditions facing New Jersey this year, and he will outline a program for action. His recommendations will become a major part of our agenda for 1978.

There are also issues that the Senate leadership is submitting to you as other high-priority items on our agenda. They will not all be popular with everyone. But at times we must make tough decisions. And the make-up of the new Senate—to say nothing of the re-election of Governor Byrne—is proof that making tough decisions doesn't have to lose you an election.

First, we must toughen our standards of legislative ethics. In two years we will receive a much-deserved pay increase. In return we must show the voters we are above reproach. I will ask the new Senate Committee on Ethical Standards to make recommendations directly to this body by April 1st on changes in our conflict-of-interest laws.

Second, the leadership will seek amendments to the election law to guarantee to every citizen his constitutional right to vote on election day. The countless registration

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rules set up in Title 19 seem to assume that the average citizen has the same year-round preoccupation with election law that county election workers do. And many citizens wind up frustrated on election day as a result.

Third, we must act on revisions to the 1976 tax program. The report of the Leone Commission on Government Costs and Tax Policy provides us with an excellent starting point for discussion. During the Appropriations Committee's Budget hearings a joint Senate-Assembly subcommittee will put together a comprehensive package of revisions. Those revisions must not cost more State funds, nor must they put loopholes in our no-loophole gross income tax. But they should correct the flaws in the tax program.

This Legislature must also take action to shield the needy in our State from sharp increases in utility costs. The leadership will submit a comprehensive legislative program this month that does not rely simply on shifting the cost from low-use to high-use electric and gas customers.

The Legislature must act on jobs measures, some of which will be suggested by Governor Byrne. But it must not be bamboozled by corporate lobbyists into granting special tax breaks. Any proposed tax "incentive" must be *proved* by hard economic evidence to produce new jobs. We cannot afford many tax breaks—especially if we get nothing from them in the way of jobs.

We must act to reduce hospital costs by comprehensive state review of rates. And as money becomes available we will seek to meet health needs first—for indigent care, and for pharmaceutical aid for needy persons like the disabled.

Finally, the leadership will seek action on modifications to current housing and zoning policy. The County and Municipal Government Committee has put together a very moderate program to determine housing needs, which Senator Greenberg has introduced. The leadership will seek action on the measure this spring. Similarly, there are specially sensitive areas of the State, like the Pinelands and like our highway zones, where a State interest should be represented in land use decisions. These issues too must be addressed.

This can be an exciting, productive session. True, we don't have money to spend. Budgets are tight.



But the income tax is behind us. The tax critics have vanished from the galleries. Comfortable Democratic majorities in both the Senate and the Assembly will work with Governor Byrne on a progressive program of reform. The Republican minority can become a constructive opposition and together we will earn the respect of the citizens who have elected us.

The Secretary reported receipt of a message from the Clerk of the General Assembly that the General Assembly has passed the following resolution, in which the concurrence of the Senate is requested:

*Be It Resolved by the General Assembly (the Senate concurring):*

That at 2 p.m. both Houses of the Legislature meet in joint session for the purpose of receiving the Annual Message of His Excellency, Brendan T. Byrne, Governor of the State of New Jersey, which will be delivered in person.

Mr. J. Russo offered the following resolution, which was read and adopted:

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*Resolved*, That the President of the Senate appoint Senators Matthew Feldman, John Russo, Garrett Hagedorn and James Cafiero to wait upon the Governor.

The President announced receipt of and directed the Secretary to read 2 letters from the Governor, nominating for appointment, with the advice and consent of the Senate, to the offices indicated, the following:

To be Secretary of State, Donald Lan, of Springfield, to succeed himself, for the term prescribed by law.

To be State Attorney General, John J. Degnan, of West Orange, to succeed William F. Hyland, for the term prescribed by law.

The above nominations were referred to the Judiciary Committee.

*Be It Resolved* by the Senate of the State of New Jersey (the General Assembly concurring):

1. The Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the General Assembly be designated request officers for the Legislature as required by law.

2. The legislative printer shall print and make distribution of bills, resolutions, installments of the Senate Journal and Minutes of the General Assembly as heretofore and in accordance with the legislative printing contract.

3. The Legislative Index and the New Jersey Legislative News for 1976 be subscribed to for the use of members of the Legislature and for such officers of the Senate and

General Assembly and other persons designated by the President of the Senate and Speaker of the General Assembly, respectively as heretofore, at the following subscription rate: Legislative Index, \$60.00 for each subscription for a period not to exceed 10 weeks, and \$6.00 per copy furnished thereafter; New Jersey Legislative News, \$50.00 for each subscription.

4. 1,000 copies of each bill, joint resolution and concurrent resolution and each official copy reprint be printed for the use of the Senate.

The following communication was received from the Governor:

*To the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:*

I hereby submit to you a plan of reorganization for the Urban Loan Authority and Area Redevelopment Authority pursuant to the Executive Reorganization Act, Chapter 203, Laws of 1969. This reorganization plan abolishes both the Urban Loan Authority in the Department of Community Affairs and the Area Redevelopment Authority in the Department of Labor and Industry and transfers their respective functions, powers and duties to the Economic Development Authority in, but not of, the Department of Labor and Industry.

The reorganization plan is designed to improve governmental productivity, streamline governmental procedures, and expand employment and economic growth, especially in urban areas. In its brief period of existence, the New Jersey Economic Development Authority has become the dominant and most successful State agency for providing financial assistance to business. The consolidation of governmental activities proposed by this reorganization plan will achieve a more coordinated and coherent formulation and administration of financial assistance programs available to New Jersey businesses. State efforts to expand employment, promote economic growth, and revitalize urban economies will benefit from better planning and more efficient administration. Also, businesses seeking financial assistance would no longer deal with more than one State financial assistance agency; "one-stop shopping" will be available. This proposed consolidation of financial assistance programs also is desirable because of the Economic Development Authority's expanded efforts to promote economic growth in our cities.

This plan will substantially improve the ability of the State to meet the economic and employment needs of New Jersey and its cities.



## REORGANIZATION PLAN FOR THE URBAN LOAN AUTHORITY AND AREA REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

The Urban Loan Authority in the Department of Community Affairs is hereby abolished and all functions, powers and duties of said authority are hereby transferred to the New Jersey Economic Development Authority in, but not of, the Department of Labor and Industry. The Area Redevelopment Authority in the Department of Labor and Industry is hereby abolished and all functions, powers and duties of said authority are hereby transferred to the New Jersey Economic Development Authority in, but not of, the Department of Labor and Industry.

The Urban Loan Authority, established pursuant to the Business Incentive Loan Act, P. L. 1969, c. 202, as amended (C. 52:27D-71 et seq.) provides loans, loan guarantees and technical assistance to businesses which are unable to obtain necessary financing on reasonable terms and are located in areas of high unemployment. The Area Redevelopment Authority, established pursuant to the New Jersey State Redevelopment Assistance Act, P. L. 1962, c. 204, as amended and supplemented, provides financial assistance to local area redevelopment agencies for projects which will expand employment opportunities and improve economic conditions in local redevelopment areas.

The Economic Development Authority, which was created in 1974, has facilitated tax exempt financing and, in some cases, provided loan guarantees for commercial and industrial development and capital facility improvements. The Economic Development Authority activities have substantially expanded employment opportunities and economic growth, with many benefits accruing to urban areas of high unemployment. During the few years of its existence, the Economic Development Authority has become by far the most successful, expert, and dominant financial assistance agency in State government. By abolishing the smaller Urban Loan Authority and Area Redevelopment Authority, and transferring their respective functions, powers and duties to the Economic Development Authority, the State can more effectively support employment growth and urban economic revitalization. Also the expanded urban economic development role which has been assumed by the Economic Development Authority should incorporate the parallel

activities of the Urban Loan Authority and Area Redevelopment Authority.

This reorganization plan concentrates economic development financial assistance functions in a single, effective agency; it eliminates duplication of effort by cabinet officers and staffs serving on the different authorities; and it streamlines financial assistance procedures by eliminating multiple applications for financial assistance and multiple loan reviews by the different staffs.

In accordance with the provisions of the Executive Reorganization Act of 1969, P. L. 1969, c. 203 (C. 52:14c-2), I find and declare that these abolitions, transfers and reorganization are necessary:

- 1) To promote the more effective management of the Executive Branch;
- 2) To reduce expenditures and promote economy to the fullest extent practicable;
- 3) To increase the efficiency of the operations of the Executive Branch to the fullest extent practicable;
- 4) To group, coordinate, and consolidate agencies and functions of the Executive Branch, as nearly as practicable, according to major purposes;
- 5) To reduce the number of agencies by consolidating those having similar functions under a single head, and to abolish such agencies as may not be necessary for the efficient conduct of the Executive Branch; and
- 6) To eliminate overlapping and duplication of effort.

All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with any of the provisions of this reorganization plan are superseded to the extent of such inconsistencies. All transfers directed by this reorganization plan shall be effected pursuant to the "State Agency Transfer Act," P. L. 1971, c. 375 (C. 52:14D-1 et seq.).

WHEREAS, Recognizing its responsibility to protect and advance the economic well-being of citizens in every county of this State, it is altogether fitting and proper for this House to request the United States Department of Commerce to delay and reconsider any plan which would terminate Middlesex County's status as an independent SMSA; now, therefore,

*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I return Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 880 (OCR), without my approval.

This bill seeks to amend the New Jersey Penal Code to reinstate the death penalty. The bill is a response to a legitimate demand for a tough, determined stand against violent crime, and raises the issue whether the State should take the lives of some in order to secure the lives and safety of others.

Much of my life has been dedicated to striking the proper balance of the critical considerations raised by the bill. I have spent nearly twenty years as a prosecutor, Superior Court judge and Governor preserving the lives of the citizens of New Jersey and keeping them free from harm.

Clearly the preservation of human life and protection of the safety of our citizens are among the highest goals of State government. But, is the taking of human life by the State an effective and moral method of saving other human lives? For reasons that I will subsequently explain, I cannot accept this bill as an effective or moral answer.

The proponents of the death penalty argue that it would: (1) result in a financial savings to the criminal justice system; (2) satisfy the desire for revenge; (3) demonstrate a commitment to tough law enforcement; (4) provide a method of punishing persons serving life sentences who commit murder; and (5) act as a deterrent, thereby saving the lives of other innocent persons.

I have given careful consideration to those arguments and find them deficient for reasons set forth in the balance of this message.

First, I am not persuaded that a judicial and corrections system which includes the death penalty would be less expensive to the State and to local governments. In fact, it appears that the present system of life sentences is more economical. This bill calls for two trials in capital cases: the first to decide guilt or innocence and the second, where required, to decide the penalty. The requirement of two trials would require additional judges and staff, more jury time and increased expenses for the provision for counsel for the indigent. In many cases the second trial would not result in the death penalty.

Furthermore, our statutes require the segregation of death-row inmates, who must remain isolated at greater cost to the prison system. Appeals from their convictions sometimes extend more than ten years. In any event, I could not condone the taking of human life solely on a cost-benefit analysis.

Second, while revenge has been considered by some as a legitimate ground for imposing the death penalty, others view it with disfavor. In this regard the New Jersey Supreme Court stated in *State v. Ivan*, 33 N.J. 197, 199

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(1960): “\*\*\*Today retribution is not a favored thesis, although some still claim a need to satisfy a public demand for vengeance. Perhaps it persists as an unarticulated premise in individual sentences. Present day thinking emphasizes deterrence and rehabilitation\*\*\*”.

Much of the mail that I have received urging the reinstatement of the death penalty is based on an understandable demand for revenge for such crimes as mugging and rape. However, those crimes are not covered by the bill before me. To that extent, the bill would not cure an evil that should be remedied.

I believe that the public's legitimate demand that violent criminals be punished is better satisfied by certain and severe punishment for all violent offenders, even those who do not commit capital offenses. The tough sentencing provisions of the new Penal Code which I have sponsored and signed into law provides a better answer than the official taking of human life.

Third, a serious commitment to vigorous law enforcement is better demonstrated by the speedy apprehension, conviction and sentencing of a criminal than by the occasional uneven imposition of the death penalty. My experience has shown that juries, when faced with the actual life or death decision for a particular individual, are reluctant to impose the death penalty. Moreover, history has shown that the death penalty tends to be unfairly imposed in a discriminatory manner upon the poor and minorities.

Fourth, the commission of murder by prisoners serving life sentences is a rare event. The Department of Corrections has advised me that in the last ten years no prisoner serving a life sentence has been convicted of murder for an offense committed in prison. I could not justify the reinstatement of the death penalty for an event that rarely occurs, especially if there are other ways to isolate that problem.

Fifth, the most frequently asserted argument for the death penalty is its supposed deterrent effect. However, the United States Supreme Court in *Gregg v. Georgia*, 428 U.S. 153 (1976) recognized the inconclusiveness of studies designed to measure the deterrent effects of capital punishment. Indeed, many psychologists argue that the presence of the death penalty may lead to the commission of murder by those who themselves want to die or want the publicity

attendant upon the imposition of the death penalty. In its unforgiving finality, the death penalty contains no guarantee of success as a deterrent and allows no margin for error.

For all these reasons, I am not persuaded that the death penalty is an effective response to violent crime. In fact, some people contend that the official taking of human life may ultimately breed disrespect for the legitimacy of government. Many religious leaders have expressed their opposition to the death penalty, urging that we should not magnify one atrocity by committing another. They assert that we should avoid any action which gives official sanction to an act which, even by implication, diminishes the value of human life.

As Geroqe Bernard Shaw has written:

“It is the deed that teaches, not the name we give it. Murder and capital punishment are not opposites that cancel one another, but similars that breed their kind.”

I appreciate the good faith of those legislators who disagree with my view but ask the opportunity to employ our State's excellent judicial and law enforcement system. With the enactment of the new Penal Code, we have a firm foundation to fight against violent crime. There is every reason for public confidence in our criminal justice system without the restoration of a penalty of doubtful effectiveness and morality. In the final analysis, neither the proponents nor the opponents of the death penalty can prove the correctness of their contentions. Thus viewed I would not be justified in signing this bill.

of my life behind me because I would never dishonor the Senate by giving less than the job demands.

I have written to my Republican colleagues and ask that you advise my Democratic colleagues of this decision. I look forward to seeing all of you soon and I wish you well.
