The 2010 Census form is one of the shortest in Census history. It takes only 10 minutes for an individual to answer its 10 questions. While more detailed socioeconomic information will be asked of a small percentage of the population through the American Community survey, every household was sent a questionnaire by U.S. mail or hand delivery. Some remote areas will be counted in person.

The Census is important not only because it determines the number of seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives, but also because it specifies federal funding to states and local areas. See: <u>50 Ways Census Data are used</u> and Government Accountability Report.

On its 2010 web site, the <u>U.S. Census Bureau</u> provides information about Census 2010 activities including:

- ➤ <u>Census jobs:</u> Temporary, part-time census takers are needed.
- ➤ Census in schools: A resource for educators providing free access to lesson plans and other instructional materials to help teachers and students learn about the importance of the Census.
- > The <u>Take 10 Interactive Map</u>: Learn what percentage of your area returned completed Census forms by entering your zip code, city or state.

#### CCH/INTELLICONNECT IS NOW AVAILABLE AT THE STATE LIBRARY

Visit the State Library to use the CCH Intelliconnect database, which provides online access to Commerce Clearing House publications, such as CCH Standard Federal Income Tax Reporter, CCH Federal Tax Weekly, the U.S. Master Estate and Gift Tax Guide and State Tax Reporter: New Jersey. Contents include tax statutes, regulations, cases and administrative rulings, both federal and New Jersey, with CCH editorial comment.

CCH IntelliConnect allows you to choose browsing or searching of each publication individually or over multiple publications simultaneously. The results are delivered in organized lists. You can even search the entire database to make sure you haven't missed anything. Your results can then be emailed or saved as text or in PDF format.

Today social networking icons are commonplace.

**W**eb 2.0 is everywhere. CNN reports on top stories by using YouTube, Facebook and Twitter. Businesses, organizations and government agencies now ask you to "friend" or follow them. Maybe your friends or family members talk about their social networks and you are thinking about joining, but aren't sure what these sites do. Here's a quick overview:

<u>Facebook:</u> A tool for keeping in touch with friends. It allows you to share pictures, videos, links and more. Be careful with privacy settings to make sure you aren't revealing too much to too many.

<u>Twitter:</u> Using 140-character messages (tweets) the basic question, "What are you doing?" is answered. New tools allow you to share pictures and links.

**Flickr:** This photo-sharing web site is great for picture and video storage. You can also find interesting pictures. Copyright restrictions may apply so check before you download.

**YouTube:** A video-sharing web site where you can find college lectures, school projects, music videos, comedy pieces and more. Some questionable content is included, so be careful.

<u>Delicious:</u> This link sharing web site makes your "favorites" accessible from any computer with an Internet connection. Links to your favorite web sites can be organized using tags and folders.

Enjoy being a social networker but remember to play it safe if you use any of these sites. Create hack proof passwords mixing letters and numbers and be aware of who may view your personal or private information so it is not shared with unintended audiences.
