# REPORT

*To the Legislature of the State of New Jersey:*

GENTLEMEN—We respectfully present herewith the Twenty-second Annual Report of the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles of the State of New Jersey, which report chronicles the activities of the Department for the calendar year ending December 31, 1927, and is submitted in accordance with the provisions of Section 4, subdivision 1, of the Motor Vehicle Act.

## FINANCIAL STATEMENT

Deputy Commissioner, Hon. Arthur W. Magee, is in absolute charge of the supervision of the Department Agents and Auditors, and his report follows:

DEAR COMMISSIONER—I am submitting herewith my report of supervising the Department Agents and Auditors for the year 1927.

By checking back the financial statements above, with the Reports of the Auditors and Chief Accountant, and Chief Clerk, I have determined that all accounts are in strict balance and that all moneys that have been received have been accounted for and paid into the Treasury of the State of New Jersey.

The statements shown above, in my opinion, correctly reflect the financial results of the Department Agents and Auditor's work for the year 1927.

All unused registration plates have been returned to the State Prison and due credit given, as shown by the voucher from the Department of Institutions and Agencies, forming a part of this report. The same procedure has been taken with respect to the Registration Certificates and Drivers' Licenses which were obtained from the Purchasing Department.

The Registration Certificates and Drivers' Licenses that were not used have been returned to the State Purchasing Department, and after being counted by that Department credit given as per voucher forming a part of this report.

Statements are appended obtained from William J. Dearden, Chief Clerk of the Auditing Department, whose assistants are Nelson P. Howell, Auditor; George Suozzi, Assistant Auditor; Charles J. Irwin and William J. Brennan, General Bookkeepers; Joseph Martin and James Henehan, Assistant Ledger Bookkeepers; John Schwartzwalder, Cash Bookkeeper; George Balderston, Statistical Bookkeeper; Elwood Padderatz and Frank Schnorbus, Assistant

Journal Bookkeepers, and George Schwoebel, who receives all fines and is in charge of the fine ledgers.

Statements are also appended from William J. Dearden, Chief Clerk; Bernard O'Keefe and Joseph McLaughlin, showing the work of the Gasoline and Excise Tax Divisions.

The work of the Auditing Department for the first six months of the year 1927 was audited by Messrs. Joseph McLaughlin and Bernard O'Keefe, named by the State Comptroller for that purpose, and the State Comptroller has been requested to audit this work for the last six months of the year 1927.

With this report and the close of my second year as Deputy Commissioner approaching, may I not express how instructive and pleasant it has been to be associated with you.

DEAR COMMISSIONER—I hereby wish to report that during the year 1927 I have personally visited and audited every agency issuing registrations and licenses for this Department. All have been audited twice and in some instances three or four times. My audits of these accounts reveal the fact that our records are very well kept and all items issued by the agencies accounted for. In all cases where any items were not entered on their reports they have been charged to the agent's account. Wherever any question has arisen as to the proper fee to be charged same has been adjusted in the favor of the State. Small differences in accounts have occurred, but such differences have been immediately adjusted as soon as the agent was advised of the mistakes. Final audit of each account has been made for the year ending December 31, 1927, and the accounts balanced.

Attached hereto you will find statements from the Auditor, Assistant Auditor, Ledger Bookkeeper, Assistant Ledger Bookkeeper, Cash Bookkeeper, Journal Bookkeeper, Assistant Journal Bookkeeper, and Statistical Bookkeeper, certifying that all reports and deposits have been properly entered and balances checked with statements from the banks in which the Agents deposit.

AUDITING OF MAGISTRATES' DOCKETS BY MOTOR VEHICLE  
INSPECTORS.

During the months of October and November, 1927, when the Inspectors were not engaged on examination work and road patrol, they were detailed to audit the dockets of the various Magistrates throughout the State before whom cases had been heard during the year dealing with violations of the Motor Vehicle and Traffic Acts. As the result of such audits the sum of \$24,624.50 was collected from Magistrates who had failed to make their returns as required by law.

On March 1, 1927, the Department for the first time made a part of its examination curriculum a standard visual acuity and color perception test. Prior to this time many conferences were held, with a Committee representing the New Jersey State Optometry Society, and a Committee of Physicians, and to these gentlemen the sincere thanks of the Department are due for their unselfish aid thus rendered.

Until December 1st the examination of applicants' eyes was under the direction of an Optometrist detailed by the Optometrical Society. After that time, however, the work was taken over by the Inspection force and has since been carried on in a highly efficient manner. The results have been surprising to say the least, for 2,938 applicants were rejected because of defective vision.

A further analysis of the examination work discloses the following interesting statistics:

#### INSPECTION FORCE.

The Paid Inspection Force of the Department consists of one Chief Inspector, six Deputy Chief Inspectors, and fifty-six First Grade Inspectors.

When not engaged in examining applicants for drivers' licenses the inspectors covered 511,517 miles on road patrol work with a total gas consumption of 36,498 gallons. Twenty-four thousand nine hundred sixty-six violations were adjusted by them as follows:

## REPORT OF CHIEF INSPECTOR.

Trenton, N. J.  
December 31st, 1927.

Hon. William L. Dill, Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, Trenton, N. J.:

SIR—Today marks the passing of another milestone in the annals of our Department and so it is fitting that your Chief Inspector should report briefly at least on the activities and accomplishments of the Inspection Force.

Some of the accomplishments for the past calendar year are as follows:

The examination of 145,494 applicants for drivers' licenses.

The patrol of 511,517 miles of our roads—policing the same and in hundreds of accident cases rendering first aid since we are equipped to do so.

The investigation of the many thousand cases that yearly are referred to you by our citizenry. These investigations run the whole gamut from trying by means of our drivers' file, to perhaps locate a wife deserter from another state to apprehending hit-and-run drivers wanted for manslaughter.

The auditing of the docket of every magistrate and justice of the peace in the State was done as usual by personal visits by the Inspectors to these officials and by a minute checking of their books.

The usual checking for violators of the reciprocity section by detailing Inspectors to cover every ferry, bridge, tunnel, and main route affording an egress to our State. With the advent of the Camden Bridge and Holland Tunnels, this work has become more complex since, unlike the ferries and toll bridges, the volume of traffic at these points is concentrated and fast moving affording little chance to work.

A new activity has been furnished by Chapter 334, P. L. 1927—the Gas Tax Act. After its passage the Inspection Force made a census of every gasoline pump in the State and, as soon as the gasoline license plates were furnished to us, we personally visited some thousand gas stations located on highways and byways from Sussex to Cape May and issued license plates and collected the fee as provided by the above act.

Various members of the Force have made notable recoveries of stolen cars and have gone far to break up the "mobs" that essay to ply their nefarious trade in our State.

Almost daily, Inspectors have been detailed to strategic points to stop cars and examine same as to credentials of the driver and the equipment of the car such as horns, proper and non-glaring lights, brakes and display of markers. This has been done both day and night.

Good use has been made of our own scales and we have pressed into use many private scales to the end that we have apprehended and cited into Court many drivers of trucks which were grossly overloaded.

The writer's efforts to carry on have been ably supplemented by the most excellent work of Deputy Chief Inspectors Brettell, Fitzpatrick, Parker, Shinn, Snyder and Wyckoff in their respective districts.

The Department discipline and efficiency of the Inspection Force has been uniformly good. The work is highly dangerous from several angles. The Inspectors working on the road test take a chance with every new applicant

and only studied alertness prevents many jams. Pursuit of violators on our crowded highways calls for a high degree of driving skill and a level head and one never knows when he may meet up with some desperado or wanton drug-addict who might be abroad on our roads.

Our little State is forty-fifth in area and eleventh in number of cars registered and, in addition to our own cars, we are the mecca for many months of each year for hundreds of thousands of our welcome neighbors. To cope with this situation the Inspection Force are on duty practically all their waking hours with only two days a month off. Despite the arduous and dangerous character of the work, the last year has seen but the usual small percentage of changes in the personnel of the 63 men comprising the force. This bespeaks a wonderful "*esprit de corps*" and I would be remiss indeed if I did not here record that this excellent morale is due entirely to the inspiring leadership of yourself and Deputy Commissioner Magee.

With the fervent hope that we may always have the same type to point us the way, I am,

#### GASOLINE TAX DIVISION.

Chapter 334, Laws of 1927, directs the Department of Motor Vehicles to collect a tax of two cents per gallon on gasoline consumed by motor vehicles while operated over the public highways of New Jersey, and upon boats plying upon inland waters within the State; exempting only Federal, State, County and Municipal owned vehicles, and omnibuses that now pay a franchise tax and are engaged in the hauling of passengers intra-state.

The law became operative July 1, 1927, and New Jersey was the forty-fifth State in the Union to pass such a law. Mr. Joseph L. McLaughlin, who had previously been in the employ of the State Comptroller in the auditing of the Department accounts, was placed in charge of the Gasoline Tax Division, after the same had been organized, following a close examination of the various systems in vogue in other States.

Mr. McLaughlin's report shows the sum of \$4,097,985.38, collected from July 1, 1927, to December 31, 1927, at a cost of \$10,944.68, of which sum more than two-thirds covers expenditures for office equipment, postage, blanks and stationery.

We are especially gratified for the operation of the gasoline tax law during the first six months of its existence, and take a rea-

sonable pride in the very small expenditure made necessary under New Jersey's system to carry out in every detail the provisions of the Act.

In other words, the Standard Oil Company, purchasing in excess of two hundred sets of dealer's gasoline license plates, would pay but \$2.00, the initial cost of the first plate, the remaining one hundred and ninety-nine being supplied gratuitously under the provisions of the Gasoline Tax Act.

#### EXCISE TAX DIVISION.

Chapter 184, Laws of 1927, was enacted for the purpose of laying an excise tax on the use of the highways of this State by motor vehicles operated for the purpose of carrying passengers or property for hire in inter-state commerce. The law went into effect on July 1, 1927, and the Excise Tax Division was placed in charge of Mr. Bernard O'Keefe, an auditor formerly in the employ of the State Comptroller's office.

Collections from July 1 to December 31, 1927, amounted to \$122,945.95. Much confusion resulted from the passage of the Excise Tax Law, because of the difficulty encountered in determining the question of carrying property for hire in inter-state commerce, and the question of this determination was finally submitted to the Attorney-General, who, in an opinion to the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, on May 2, 1927, held as follows:

"1. I am of the opinion that the word 'property' as used in the title of the act and in the first section thereof applies to all goods, merchandise, freight, etc., that is being transported between fixed termini or over a regular route from a place or places outside the State to a place or places outside of the State, or from a place or places outside of the State, to a place or places within the State, or from a place or places within the State to a place or places outside of the State.

2. In answer to your third inquiry, I am of the opinion that all commercial motor vehicles engaged in the hauling of merchandise, etc., as provided in the first section of the act, would be subject to the payment of the tax provided in the act where such hauling is done either upon the basis of so much per day for the service of a truck or so much per ton per load carried or so much per mile of mileage traversed.

3. In answer to your second inquiry, permit me to say that, as you perhaps know, the Chief Justice has said in the case of Lang v. Bayonne that every Act of the Legislature must be deemed to be constitutional until it is judicially declared to be otherwise. Therefore, I have not the authority, officially, to pass upon the constitutionality of an act of the Legislature, nor to advise State departments to act otherwise than in accordance with its mandate."

Pursuant to the Attorney-General's opinion, there was but one course open and the Department on and after July 1 proceeded to collect an Excise Tax of one and one-half cent. per mile for every mile traveled within the State of New Jersey, on the part of busses and commercial vehicles engaged in the carrying of passengers or property for hire inter-state.

A large number of injunctions were sued out, both in the Federal Court and the Chancery Court, to determine the constitutionality of the Act, and to stay the collection of the tax by the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles during the pendency of these suits. As this report goes to press, the outcome of the suits are being eagerly awaited. Meanwhile the money collected from those who did not enjoin the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles is being held in escrow by the Comptroller of the State of New Jersey, to be refunded to the payee in the event of the act being declared unconstitutional. The report of Mr. O'Keefe follows:

That two hundred and eighty-three children under the age of fifteen years should have been killed in New Jersey last year by automobiles would seem inconceivable, and yet such is the fact. The alarming increase in fatal accidents surely must arouse our citizenry, if nothing else will, to a stricter observance of the law and its courageous enforcement. More regard for the Golden Rule, embracing as it does the rights of others, the importance of more play grounds, properly monitored, and the necessity of the parent exercising a closer vigilance over the children are factors that will surely contribute to the lessening of automobile killings.

## INTOXICATED DRIVING.

During the year 1,636 licenses were revoked for intoxicated driving. We reprint the tables of revocations for this cause from our 1926 Annual Report in order that the public may again visualize how astounding has been the growth of this great evil:

The New Jersey law, which prescribes a minimum penalty of \$200, or thirty days in jail, or both, for a first offense, and the revocation of the license for a period of two years, despite its discretionary provisions, has resulted in more jail sentences than under the old law when a jail sentence was mandatory, and the question, therefore, arises as to why the great increase in the number of drunken automobile operators. The answer is found not because of the failure of the motor vehicle law to meet the situation, but first in the disregard which our people have for Prohibition, and, secondly, the apparent inability to successfully enforce the provisions of the Federal Prohibition Act.

The direct effects of intoxicated driving which occurred on our highways during the past year and which resulted in fatal accidents are briefly referred to.

The case of William Clinton Evans, of Bloomfield, N. J.—On July 31, 1927, Clinton Evans, son-in-law of Mr. Henry B. Fort, was driving Mr. Fort's car, and while "dozing at the wheel" as the result of having taken too much intoxicating liquor, did not realize that the car was off the road until it crashed into a tree between Mount Holly and Columbus. Mr. Fort was killed instantly. According to the police, Evans admitted that he had been drinking and said that he had gone for a ride to sober up and that while driving he dozed off. Awakened by a jolt he found the automobile running smoothly along the road. When he turned to his companion, however, he found him with his head almost off. He covered the body with a blanket and drove to Burlington in search of the police.

Another example is the case of Clark E. Boerstten, of Nazareth, Penna. The car driven by this man struck a car driven by Fred J. Matthews, of Lambertville. Mr. Matthews had pulled partly

off the road with the intention to stop when the Boerstten car came along at a high rate of speed and struck the left rear fender of the Matthews car with the right front fender of his car and then went about 150 feet into a stone fence, killing Mr. Boerstten and injuring a man with him, who was sent to the hospital and who died one-half hour afterward. The evidence showed that Mr. Boerstten had been drinking, and Mr. Matthews was exonerated as there was no occasion for Mr. Boerstten's car colliding with the car of Mr. Matthews.

The records further show that one Robert McGrath, of Wharton, N. J., convicted of manslaughter, was sentenced to three years in the State prison, his car having killed Miss Sarah Willis and Hazel May Anson, on October 2, 1926. The jury found that he was under the influence of liquor.

An intoxicated driver, John Cowley, of 6 Milford avenue, Millville, veered his large Studebaker sedan to the left of the State road, five miles from Bridgeton, on April 24, 1927, and collided head on with a smaller car, killing one and seriously injuring two of its four occupants. The doctor who examined Cowley found him to have been under the influence of liquor.

The report of Mitchell Dawes, Jr., Justice of the Peace of Pompton Lakes, N. J., shows that on November 17, 1927, James Hayes, of Bloomingdale, formerly of Paterson, while intoxicated struck a pedestrian, Andrew Wetzel, with his motor vehicle, causing injuries which resulted in his death. Hayes was examined by Dr. Hutchinson, who pronounced him intoxicated.

Another case is that of Joseph Coy, colored, of 64 First street, South Orange, N. J. Coy was found guilty before Judge Daniel Brennan of responsibility for the death on May 21, 1927, of Mrs. Mary Connors, of Scranton, Penna. Mrs. Connors, with her sister, was on her way to the home of a third sister when struck down by the car which Coy was driving. She died in the Orange Memorial Hospital. Coy continued without stopping along Central avenue until halted by a crash with another automobile. He was arrested, pronounced drunk and sentenced to serve ninety days by Judge Davis, of Orange. Upon his release he was brought before the Essex Tribunal and was sentenced to serve seven years in the State prison on the charge of manslaughter.

Fred Knott, of 218 Ellis avenue, a former policeman of Trenton, N. J., and John Galczik, of 619 Cherry street, Trenton, were found guilty of manslaughter in connection with the death, in December, 1927, of Frank A. McNamee, at Plainsboro; were each sentenced to serve three years in the State prison when they were arraigned before Middlesex County Judge John B. Kirkpatrick in New Brunswick. Conviction of the men followed one of the most unusual criminal trials ever held in this State. Both were in the front seat of an automobile which struck and killed McNamee, and each maintained that the other was driving. Both were under the influence of liquor. The jury, after finding that Knott actually drove the car at the time of the tragedy, likewise convicted Galczik on the theory that the owner of a car who permits a drunken person to operate it is equally guilty.

#### INSURANCE ON TAXICABS AND U-DRIVE CARS.

During the legislative session of 1927 two laws were enacted which amended Chapters 231 and 249 of the Laws of 1926. These laws had provided that all taxicab owners and owners of U-drive vehicles should file their insurance policies with the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles. The amendment provided that the policies should be filed with the various Municipal Clerks of the towns in which owners resided or operated.

We had on hand in this office over four thousand policies. These policies were kept on file until they expired, or until they were canceled. We have now returned nearly all of the policies that had been filed with us under the original law, but will be unable to return them all until April 1, 1928, as the law which provided for the filing of the policies with the Municipal Clerks went into effect on March 28, 1927.

The Municipal Clerks issue duplicate certificates when the policies are filed, and these duplicate certificates are sent to the office of the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles. The certificates are then carded and placed in numerical folders and the cards are alphabetically arranged. In this way all inquiries as to whether or not insurance policies are held by taxicab owners will be answered by referring to our index of these certificates.

The number of municipal certificates which have been filed with this office is 2,958. There are still remaining on file at this office 98 active policies, filed in accordance with the provisions of the original Act of 1926.

The difference in the figures showing the number of municipal certificates on file in 1927 and the number of policies filed in 1926 is accounted for by the fact that it was necessary to file duplicate policies in 1926 to replace a number of policies that had been filed and afterwards recalled at the request of the Banking and Insurance Department, owing to the financial failure of two insurance companies writing these policies.

## NOTICES TO CHIEFS OF POLICE.

It is our practice before the renewal season commences to keep the chiefs of police advised of the proper methods to pursue to enforce our license laws. Particular reference is made to the laws of other States of the Union, and we endeavor to compile such information which will guide the chiefs of police in their duties. On December 10, 1927, a communication similar to the one that appeared in our 1926 Report, amended to meet existing conditions as of January 1, 1928, was sent to all chiefs of police.

## BILL OF SALE LAW.

The New Jersey Bill of Sale Law is proving its efficiency by the fact that while there was submitted to the Department in 1926, 7,712 defective bills of sale, only 2,793 defective bills of sale were apprehended during the year 1927.

It recently became necessary to issue an edict prohibiting our registration agents from approving bills of sale covering title to a car which had been repossessed, seized under garage lien, etc., by requiring such bills of sale be submitted to the Trenton office in order that history of the car might be authenticated. So many fraudulent bills of sale were being issued by constables that this precaution became absolutely necessary, and it is estimated as the result of this order 6,000 bills of sale, with proof of publication attached, will be submitted during the next year for the purpose of being vised.

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Through an arrangement, made with the State Highway Commission, these cars were placed in storage on November 19, 1927, for the winter, at no cost to the State. These cars, while in storage at the Fernwood Garage, with the exception of the cars to be exchanged for new equipment, will be completely

reconditioned by their mechanics, at a minimum cost to the State, causing a material saving, both in storage cost and repairs. All of the cars, with the exception of one Cadillac Coupe, four Chrysler Roadsters, one Chevrolet Coupe, one Buick coupe, and two Lincoln roadsters, were stored for the winter.

## NEW LEGISLATION.

We most respectfully recommend for the consideration of the 1928 Legislature the following new legislation:

Increasing the Reciprocity Privilege of non-residents in the State of New Jersey from fifteen days to ninety days in any one year.

The enactment of a law providing for the creation of Traffic Courts throughout the entire State of New Jersey.

A law to compel automobile owners to file a policy of insurance as a prerequisite for obtaining registration plates, or in lieu thereof to submit their evidence of financial responsibility to meet any judgment that may be returned against them.

Compulsory insurance has operated successfully in the States of Massachusetts and Connecticut during the past twelve months,

although New Jersey long before the two States mentioned passed a Compulsory Insurance Law, was advocating the adoption of such a measure in this State. Less than 20 per cent. of the car owners in New Jersey carry liability insurance. Those who do not surround themselves with every protection should be prohibited from using our highways.

We urge an amendment to the law enacted last year whereby the right of way that is now given to auto busses will be speedily repealed. There seems no valid reason why an auto bus should have the right of way over a passenger vehicle, and we cannot too quickly return to the normalcy which existed under the provisions of the Traffic Act prior to 1927.

It is imperative that Section 7 of the Motor Vehicle Act, in so far as it relates to automobile brakes, should be amended so as to legalize the registrations of cars now equipped with four-wheel brakes, and to permit of the recognition of brakes of various types for registration purposes that may be developed from time to time by inventive genius.

Last year a law was passed permitting contractors to haul their contract machinery and equipment over the highways of this State, regardless of the weight of the same, and the law was so framed that where the dimensions of the vehicle engaged in such hauling, and the load placed upon the same, were in excess of the dimensions and weights allowed by law, that such movements could be made without the payment of a registration fee whatsoever, and so we believe that aside from a fee of \$150 for each such registration, there should be vested in the County Board of Freeholders having control of the roads and bridges the power to designate the routes over which such heavy haulage shall be made, and to exact a bond to indemnify the county against any damage that may result.

Fines now remitted to the Department of Motor Vehicles by local magistrates, which subsequently are returned to the County Collector of the respective counties of the State, should be paid directly to the County Treasurer by the magistrate, and we ask, therefore, that a law to provide for this practice be enacted.

We strongly urge a supplement to the Gasoline Tax Law that will give to the Department of Motor Vehicles the power to

designate the form of sign to be displayed by retail gasoline dealers so that the present misleading signs can be ordered down and the retail dealers required to post a sign that will set forth in conspicuous manner the price of gasoline per gallon, plus the tax.

There should be a law to prevent motorists from following fire apparatus. This practice is growing to be more common daily, with the result that the progress of fire companies in answering an alarm is very often impeded, while the firemen find it at times almost impossible to make the necessary hose connections.

There will be submitted to the Legislature the report of the Commission on Uniformity of Lights and Signals. This Commission has done a splendid work and the people of the State are awaiting with interest the result of their deliberations and the bill embodying their findings which is to accompany their report. It is very urgent that a uniform light and signal law be enacted in this State. Such an enactment will enable the State to boast as the first Commonwealth that has adopted a law regulating in a uniform manner uniform lights and signals for highway users including pedestrians.

#### CONCLUSION.

We extend to the 1927 Legislature our profound thanks for their splendid co-operation and painstaking consideration of the desires of this Department in the matter of improving our laws so that human life may be more amply protected. It is obvious naturally that with the great increase in cars and drivers from year to year changes in our laws frequently become necessary in order to keep pace.

Deputy Commissioner Arthur W. Magee has been a most valuable assistant. His willingness to serve and his zealous overseeing of the finances of the Department stamp him as a public official second to none in our State.

Again, I pay tribute to the Press of New Jersey. Unselfishly have they given of their space to chronicle our doings and the representatives of the Press with whom we come in contact have, without exception, been faithful to their trust and have correctly

recorded the many acts of the Department deemed worthy of publication.

To our Inspectors, Agents and corps of clerks engaged in the Trenton office, to the many commendations heretofore directed their way, may I not add an additional word of praise by saying that no Department of our State government can boast of better service than that rendered by the various men and women with whom we are associated.
