### CURRENT PROGRAM STATISTICS SEPTEMBER 1994

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### Highlights of Current Program Statistics

AFDC (Tables 1 and 5, Graphs 1 and 4)

123,000 eligible families in New Jersey were receiving AFDC as of the end of September 1994.

About 110,800 were single head of household families (Regular AFDC, C segment).

Among two-parent families, Unemployed Parents (F Segment) accounted for 4000, and State AFDC (N Segment) for 3400. There were 4900 Medicaid Only families.

By County, the largest numbers were in Essex with more than 31,000 families, Hudson with more than 19,000, and Camden County with about 14,000. They accounted for more than 52 percent of all AFDC families.

The other counties ranged from 247 families in Hunterdon to 8,000 in Passaic County.

Since January 1993 eligible families in New Jersey increased steadily from about 122,000 to about 124,600 in May and June of 1994 (2 percent), then declined by more than 1500 from July through September.

Regular AFDC (C segment) peaked at nearly 111,800 in June 1994 then declined by about 1,000 through September.

The number of F segment families peaked in both May 1993 and May 1994. It declined from more than 4500 in May 1994 to about 4000 by September.

State AFDC (N segment) grew from less than 2600 families in January 1993 to nearly 3500 by May 1994 (almost 37 percent). It has since declined slightly to less than 3400 in September.

The Medicaid Only group has remained stable at close to 5000 for the entire period.

#### FOOD STAMP PROGRAM (Tables 2 and 6, Graphs 2, 5, and 6)

At the end of September 1994 about 220,000 households were participating in the Food Stamp Program.

About 114,000 were AFDC households and 106,000 were Other Low Income households.

About half of all Food Stamp Households are in Essex (55,317), Hudson (29,905) and Camden (21,889) Counties.

These households included about 522,000 persons, 245,000 adults and 279,000 children.

In seven counties (Bergen, Hunterdon, Monmouth, Morris, Somerset, Sussex, and Warren) the number of adults exceeds the number of children in Food Stamp households.

Food Stamp households in New Jersey increased from less than 208,000 in January 1993, to about 222,000 in March through June of 1994, and dropped below 221,000 during July through September of 1994.

AFDC(FS) households increased from less than 112,000 in January 1993 to almost 116,000 in March through June of 1994, then began to decline slightly, down to 114,000 in September. Other Low Income households increased by more than 10,000 to over 106,000, by March 1994 and remained near that level since.

The number of recipients grew from 504,000 in January 1993 to a more than 530,000 in March through May 1994, then declined by almost 9000 by September.

Adult recipients increased more than 16,000 since January 1993 to over 248,000 in March through June 1994, then declined to less than 245,000 by September. Children in participating households increased by about 10,000 from January 1993 to a high of almost 283,000 in March 1994, then declined to 277,000 by September.

#### EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE (Tables 3 and 7, Graphs 3 and 7)

At the end of September 1994 a total of 7385 eligible AFDC families were receiving Emergency Assistance in New Jersey.

3919 families were receiving Temporary Rental Assistance.

There were 685 were motel placements and 478 emergency shelter placements.

All other AFDC-EA assistance accounted for 2303 families, including either one-time benefits such as back rent, back utilities, security deposits, furnishings, and clothing and food allowance, or shared or transitional housing.

2785 families in Essex County received Emergency Assistance, with 2140 provided Temporary Rental Assistance. Mercer, Middlesex and Passaic each had more than 500 EA recipient families. All other counties had between 20 and 463 with seven under 100.

After reaching almost 8500 in May 1993, total AFDC families receiving Emergency Assistance dropped below 7000 by December 1993, and ranged between 7000 and 7700 in 1994.

Families receiving Temporary Rental Assistance declined from almost 4900 in May 1993 to less than 4000 in December 1993, and remained slightly above 4000 during 1994, dropping to about 3900 in September.

Motel placements declined from close to 800 in January 1993 to less than 600 a year later, but increased from January 1994 to 750 in August, and declined again in September to 685.

Emergency shelter placements peaked at 573 in October 1993, and have fluctuated between 395 and 478 in 1994, increasing slightly each month since June.

All other AFDC Emergency Assistance has fluctuated between 1800 and 2500 in 1993 and 1994.

### JOBS/FDP PARTICIPATION RATES (Table 8, Graph 8)

Statewide participation in the JOBS/FDP Program decreased from May 1993 to August 1993 (16.6 percent to 12.5 percent), then turned upward in September 1993 (to 15.1 percent. Similarly, from a peak of 20.1 percent in May 1994 the participation rate declined to 16.3 in August 1994, and up to 19.1 percent in September 1994.

Most counties have shown a similar pattern, with a decline in June, July and August 1993, and a rebound through October 1993. Several experienced declines in the Winter months and then continued upward again beginning in March 1994. Most counties declined from May through August 1994, then turned upward again in September 1994 when only Burlington, Cape May, and Mercer declined slightly.

Essex county's rate has consistently remained under 10 percent, as has Cape May except for two months. Most counties were between 10 and 30 percent. Atlantic, Cumberland, Salem, Somerset, and Sussex generally exceeded 30 percent. Warren exceeded 60 percent in June and July 1994, and exceeded 70 percent in August and September, the highest levels of all counties in the period.

#### GENERAL ASSISTANCE (Table 9, Graph 9)

For the period January 1993 through May 1994 (the latest available information), the number of GA recipients reached a high over 38,000 in March 1994, then declined by about 1000 in April, and grew by 400 in May.

During the same period, the number of employable recipients fluctuated between 23,000 and 26,000. There were peaks in March 1993 (25,900) and March 1994 (26,400) and declines of more than 1000 by May each year.

The number of Unemployable GA recipients remained almost unchanged in the period, staying between 11,000 and 11,700. Then in May, Unemployables grew by almost 600 to 12,200, the highest level in 1993-94.

#### CHILD SUPPORT AND PATERNITY (Table 10)

Total collections of the Child Support and Paternity Program grew from about \$438 million to more than \$510 million from FY1993 to FY1994, an increase of 16.6 percent. Total collections for AFDC and Foster Care remained almost unchanged at around \$92 million. Non-AFDC collections grew from less than \$346 million to almost \$418 million, or 21 percent.

For AFDC and Foster Care, the decline in Unemployment Benefits collections offset increases in Federal Tax Collections and Income Withholding.

For Non-AFDC, substantial increases in collections of State tax, Income Withholding, and Other/Own Behalf far outweighed declines in collections from Federal taxes, Unemployment Insurance Benefits, and For Other states.












# Food Stamp Households

January 1993 through September 1994




# Food Stamp Recipients







### **Explanatory Notes**

The Department of Human Services Division of Family Development provides basic income and an opportunity to achieve self-sufficiency for individuals and families served by the Division's programs. The Division provides leadership, direction and supervision to those public agencies responsible for administering those programs and plans for and develops policies to promote self-sufficiency.

AID TO FAMILIES WITH DEPENDENT CHILDREN (AFDC) - Financial assistance for dependent children and their natural or adoptive parents, or certain other relatives recognized as taking the place of a parent.

Regular AFDC (C Segment) - assistance when only one parent is in the home due to death or absence, or both parents are in the home but at least one is incapacitated.

Unemployed Parents (F Segment) - assistance when both parents are in the home, neither is incapacitated and the primary wage earner meets the federally defined criteria for unemployment.

State AFDC (N Segment) - assistance when both parents are in the home, neither is incapacitated, and the primary wage earner does not meet the federal definition of unemployment.

Medicaid Only - families no longer receiving AFDC financial assistance but remaining eligible for Medicaid under applicable provisions which extend coverage beyond period of AFDC assistance.

FOOD STAMP PROGRAM (FS) - Authorized by Congress as a nutritional supplement program to provide low income households with more food of greater variety and better nutrition. Program eligibility is based on household income, resources, and expenses for medical, shelter, and dependent care. CWA staff refer certain recipients to the New Jersey Department of Labor for participation in the Food Stamp Employment and Training Program.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE (EA) - Payments to those eligible for AFDC (also for General Assistance or Supplemental Security Income, not included here), authorized during the 30 consecutive days immediately following the emergency (defined as a substantial loss of shelter, food, clothing, or household furnishings by fire, flood or other similar disaster) or if the eligible individual or family is in an imminent or actual state of homelessness.

#### JOBS/FDP

JOB OPPORTUNITY AND BASIC SKILLS PROGRAM (JOBS) - Federally mandated work/training program for recipients of AFDC established by the Family Support Act of 1988 under Part F of Title IV of the Social Security Act.

FAMILY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM (FDP) - Reform legislation enacted by the State Legislature in January 1992 to: build, strengthen, and support the family unit; encourage family formation; reduce the long-term aspects of welfare dependency; look to the needs of the family unit as a whole; emphasize education and training for all family members; maximize use of educational, training and employment resources; and develop genuine private sector job opportunities.

County - Counties currently participating in the Family Development Program are indicated by an "\*".
