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# REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE.

TREASURER'S OFFICE, TRENTON, N. J., December 6th, 1866.

To the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

The Joint Committee of the Legislature on Treasurer's Accounts having met at the Office of the Treasurer respectfully report: That they have examined the accounts of Howard Ivins, State Treasurer, compared them with the vouchers relating thereto and find them in all respects correct.

Upon an examination of the books in which is included the transactions of the past fiscal year as well as balances resulting from the transactions of former years, your Committee have found the condition of the Finances of the State, in all the departments entrusted to the Treasurer, to be as set forth in the balance sheet and statements of accounts hereto annexed.

The Committee feel that great credit is due the State Treasurer for the correct and systematic manner in which his accounts are kept and believe that the business of the important department entrusted

to his care has been conducted in a satisfactory manner.

They would also report that the Treasurer (as directed by a concurrent resolution of the Legislature) destroyed in the presence of the Committee the impressions of notes of banks that have gone into liquidation, or that have ceased to exist as corporations, and yet remain uncalled for in the vaults of the Treasury, after having given the notice directed by the resolution, in the papers published and circulating in the localities where the different corporations formerly existed.

The plates from which the impressions were taken are still in existence; whether any action had better be taken in regard to them we submit to the judgment of the Legislature to determine.

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#### REPORT.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
TREASURER'S OFFICE,
TRENTON, N. J., December 11th, 1866.

To his Excellency Marcus L. Ward, Governor of the State of New Jersey, &c.:

SIR:—In accordance with the provisions of an act entitled "an act to change the termination of the fiscal year of the several Officers and Institutions, and to regulate the making of their reports," approved March 24th, 1863: I have the honor to transmit herewith, statements (in which are included the receipts and disbursements by David Naar, Treasurer to the 7th day of March, 1866). Showing the financial transactions of the Treasury department during the fiscal year ending November 30th, 1866—divided under the following general heads, viz:

Statement A, State Fund,

- do B, War Fund,
- do C, School Fund,
- do D. Agricultural College Fund,
- do E, Bank Note Redemption Fund.

Also lists of securities belonging to the State School and Agricultural Funds. The receipts of the State Fund during the past, fall short of those of the previous year, by about \$60,000. The greater part of which is accounted for by the amount of tax on the capital stock of railroad companies, (due January 1, 1866, and properly the income of this year) having been received and used before the close of the last fiscal year.

An extra dividend of 262 shares (being 10 per cent. on 2625 shares less ½ share sold at 16 per cent. premium) of stock of Joint Companies, was received in February last, is included in the receipts and also in the disbursements as so much invested, making the total amount of said stock now held by the State 2887 shares, par value

\$288.700.

The amount, (\$114-725) charged on the books in this office to the American Dock and Improvement Company, for lands under water, was paid, (including the interest on the same) on the first day of November last.

A resolution was passed by the Joint Board of Directors of the Delaware and Raritan Canal and Camden and Amboy Railroad and Transportation Companies in July last, (a copy of which was furnished me by the Treasurer of said companies), the substance of which is as follows: That in issuing the new stock of said companies the original stockholders be given the preference to subscribe at par for an amount equal to 25 per cent. of the stock held by each, limiting the privilege thus given to include the first of September 1866, except that of the State which was extended to the first of February 1867, in order that the matter might be brought before Legislature for its action.

The indebtedness of the War Fund (other than the amount of bonds issued up to December 1, 1865), being special loans \$247,000, and the amount (\$123,319 33) transferred from sundry creditors on the books, making a total of \$370,319 33, has been paid by issue of other bonds as follows, viz: Exempt from taxation \$128,000 (being the balance of the loan authorized by the act approved May 10th, 1861, and the supplement thereto approved march 24th, 1863), sold at par, and "taxable" \$593,400 disposed of at the following rates, viz:

Which, in consequence of the vast amount of other stocks in the market that were paying higher rates of interest, was the highest market price for securities of like character.

The bonds were issued as the funds were needed, in order to meet

promptly the demands of the treasury.

Of the above issue of bonds, \$33,700, "exempt from taxation" and \$100,000 "taxable," were sold by my predecessor, the former at par the latter at 95 cents.

The State Tax, amounting to \$280,000, also accrued interest on bonds sold, was collected and paid over to the Commissioners of the

Sinking Fund.

In January last a temporary loan of \$80,000 was made of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by my predecessor, and in April a loan of \$50,000 was made of Trenton Banking Company for three months, both of which have been paid with interest.

Therefore, the War Fund is indebted only on account of bonds un-

There has been paid on U. S. War Account \$2,456.47, making the total amount now due \$777516.76.

The securities belonging to the School Fund amount to \$557,115.39,

being an increase of \$25,550 during the last year.

Upon assuming the duties of this office I found that the interest falling due on bonds secured by mortgages had not been promptly paid, there being at that time about \$11,000 due and over due, varying from one to six years. I have been unable to collect all the above amount, but after having given the parties due notice, as directed by the Trustees, the bonds and mortgages (amounting to \$41,-207.89 of those who were still delinquent) were sent to the Attorney General for foreclosure.

Stipulations to pay 7 per cent. interest have been filed in all cases

when the bonds were due with the exception of two (2).

The conditions of the loan of \$100,000 to the New Jersey Railroad and Transportation Company is such that one year's notice has to be given before any change can be made in the rate of interest (6 per cent.) now paid. The income of the School Fund, after considering the additional one per cent. on bonds subject to such increase will be insufficient to meet an appropriation equal to the one made the past year, and unless other means are devised the balance will have to be made up out of the State Fund.
