All students receive daily instruction in Language Arts, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies. Sixth, seventh and eighth grade students have the choice of French or Spanish as a World Language. Each grade level rotates through cycle classes on a six to eight week schedule. Cycle classes include: Art, STEAM (Science Technology Engineering Art and Math), Health, Music, 21st Century Communications, and Geography. High achieving students have the option of Horizon level courses in specific academic areas. Core academic courses have in-class support and OCR (Out-OfClass Replacement) sections to meet the least restrictive needs of special education students. Our school also offers a STAR Program (Skills, Technology, Academics and Readiness) that provides an integrated life-skills based curriculum. The Star Program is uniquely designed for the individualized needs of specific special education students. The staff of Central Middle School presents a series of excellent educational experiences throughout the year to enhance student learning. Our 6th grade participates in a medieval day as a culmination to the study of the Middle Ages. Grade 7 hosts a Victorian Tea to celebrate the conclusion of the Victorian Unit of study. Our 8th grade travels to Washington D.C. in late spring to explore our nation's capital. All students have the opportunity to take part in our Geography and Spelling Bees. We also have a rich choral, band, and Honors Jazz programs. The school counselor at CMS has developed a peer mentoring program where 8th grade students serve as mentor's for their peers. Central Middle School's Band and Choir teachers annually have their string and choir students in grades 5-8 participate in the Morris Union Jointure Commission Consortium.

Students have the opportunity to participate in programs that enrich and extend learning beyond the classroom. Through interdisciplinary units, the students make connections between curriculum areas. Each unit has a culminating activity, a trip or a special day, in which students participate with hands-on learning activities. Second grade students participate in Environmental Day. They learn how to protect the environment in their own community. Third grade students participate in International Day. Parent volunteers set up booths based on ten different countries for the students to visit. A science fair culminates the fourth grade year. Students work in small groups, learning about the scientific process and then conducting experiments. The experiments are showcased in the All Purpose Room at the end of the year for students and parents to see. The year ends with a special event for our fifth grade students. They participate in Colonial Day learning about the crafts, skills, games, and lifestyle of the early colonists.
