


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English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the statewide assessment (NJSLA for 2018-19 and PARCC for 2016-17 and 2017-18) and the DLM alternate assessment. 









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








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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade








Student Growth by Performance Level


These graphs show the percentage of students by 2017-18 statewide assessment performance level that fall into each of the three levels of growth based on their 2018-19


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







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
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




Students enrolled in one or more visual and performing arts classes

The New Jersey Department of Education used input from New Jersey communities to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.




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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

Mission, Vision, Theme:	Our team approach joins about 125 students on one of seven teams to share a math, English, science, social studies and special education teachers. Ram PRIDE (Personal Responsibility in Daily Effort) is developed through a growth mindset initiative which encourages each student to reach his or her potential. Socially and emotionally, a growth mindset culture facilitates the development of grit, willingness to take learning risks, and perseverance.
Awards, Recognition, Accomplishments:	SRMS students have consistently received recognition and awards for their achievements from Ocean County Math League, the Stafford Township Arbor Day Contest, South Jersey Junior Band, String Ensemble, and Jazz Band, the Thinking Cap Quiz Bowl and nationally and statewide in FCCLA competitions, among many others. In the building, Students of the Month, Students of the Quarter, Perfect Attendance and PROPEL winners are also recognized.



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In addition to the core subjects, students have opportunities to explore consumer and family science, research technology, Spanish, applied and design technologies, coding, drama, chorus, strings, band, and a gifted and talented component of the electives. Support services are readily available: Homework Habitat, Study Island, Discovery Education, Google Classroom, and on-line texts. Mrs. Wordsworth, a root-word vocabulary initiative, and a sustained silent reading program further support academic classes.


