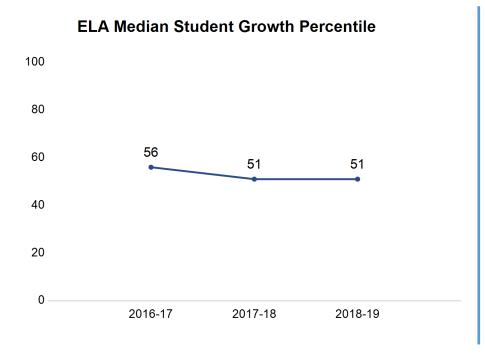

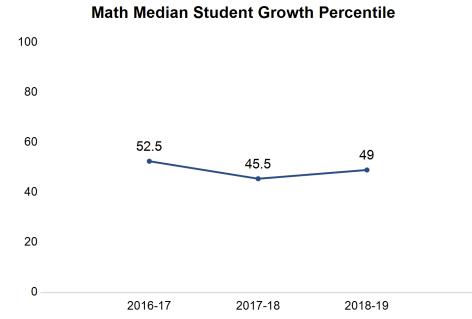

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Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. Each student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7 that explains their progress compared to students who had the same test scores in previous years.

A student's SGP falls between 1 and 99 and can be grouped into three levels: Low Growth: Less than 35 Typical Growth: Between 35 and 65 High Growth: Greater than 65

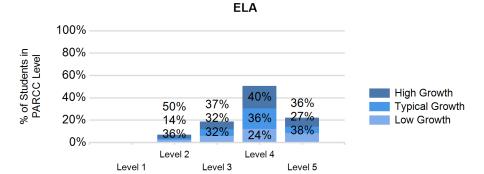

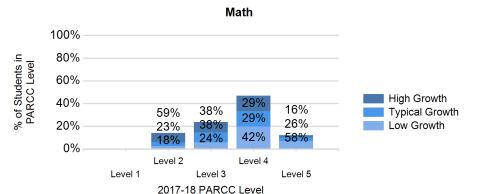
Student Growth by Performance Level

performance level that fall into each of the three levels of growth based on their 2018-19 statewide assessment growth.

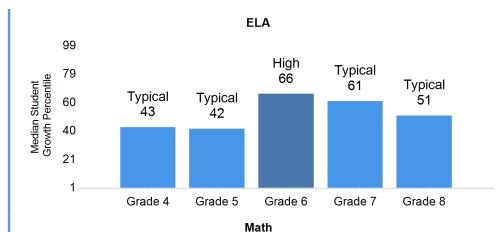


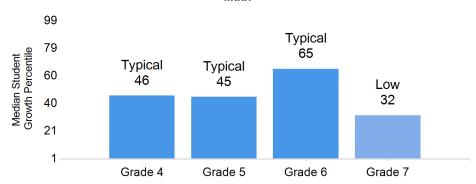
2017-18 PARCC Level

These graphs show the median Student Growth Percentile for students in each grade.







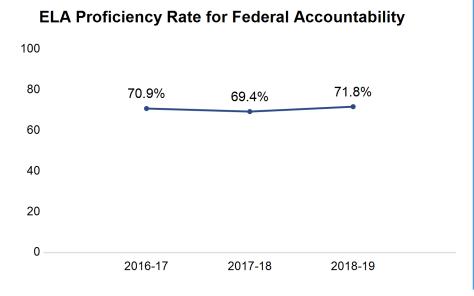
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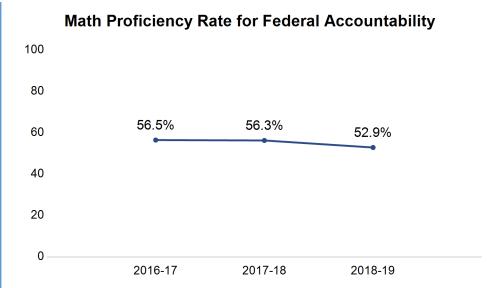
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English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the statewide assessment (NJSLA for 2018-19 and PARCC for 2016-17 and 2017-18) and the DLM alternate assessment. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students that met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA/PARCC or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. NJSLA/PARCC results include only students in grades 3 through 10. Students that were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. The table below provides participation rates, proficiency rates, annual targets and status in meeting the targets, and statewide proficiency rates.

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English Language Arts Assessment - Participation and Performance

A student is considered to have met or exceeded expectations if he/she scores at Level 4 or 5 on the NJSLA assessment or at Level 3 or 4 on the DLM assessment.

This table shows both the percentage of students that met or exceeded expectations and a proficiency rate used for federal accountability. The proficiency rate for federal accountability will be lower if the participation rate is below 95%. This table also shows progress towards meeting the state's long term goal of 80% proficiency by 2030. Annual targets are specific to each subgroup, school, and district and represent the expected proficiency needed to stay on track to meet the state's long term goal. 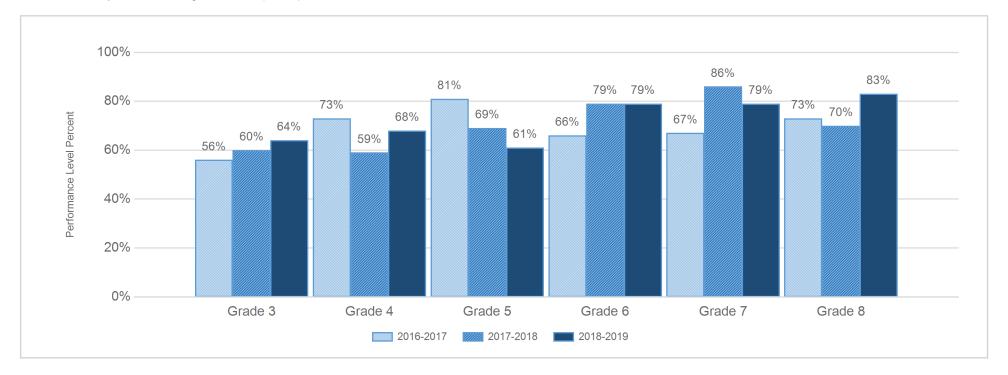

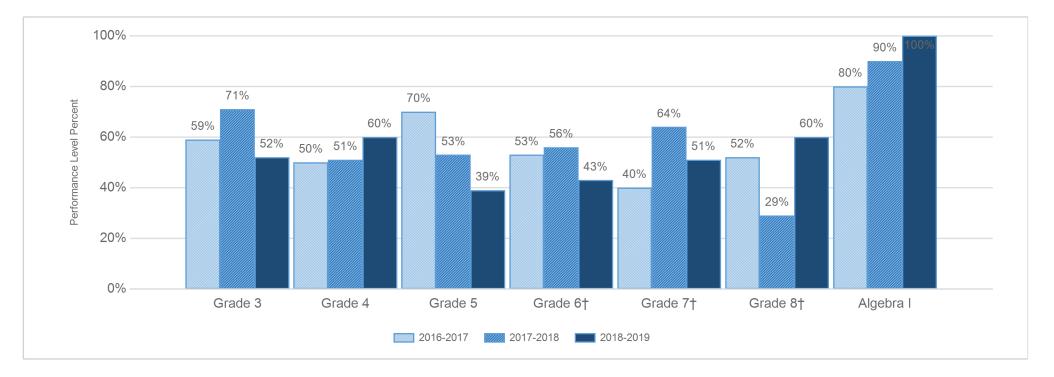

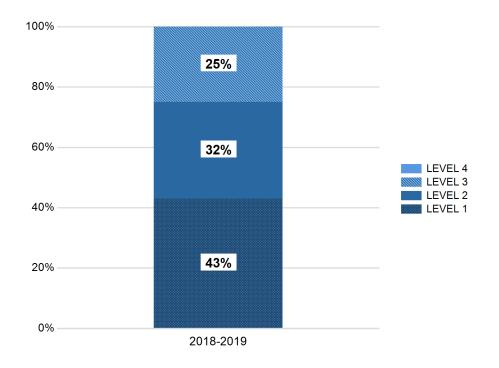

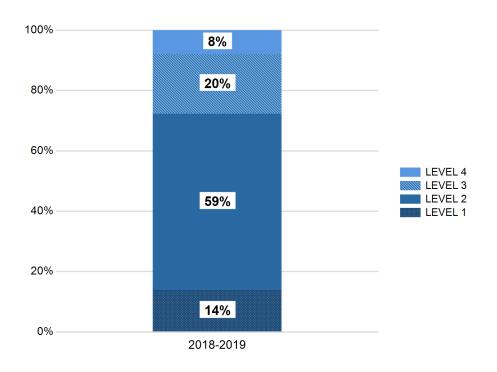

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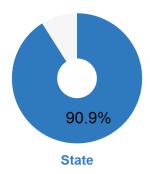

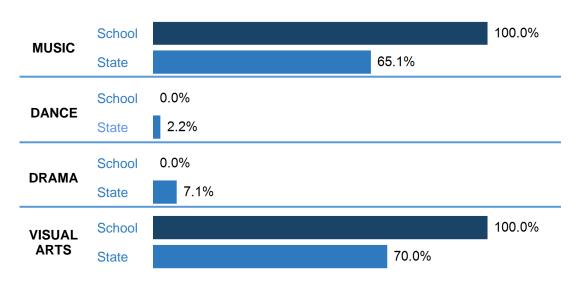


Students enrolled in one or more visual and performing arts classes

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Student absences provide important information about a school's culture and climate. Research shows that absences impact a student's ability to succeed in school. The New Jersey Department of Education used input from New Jersey communities to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.

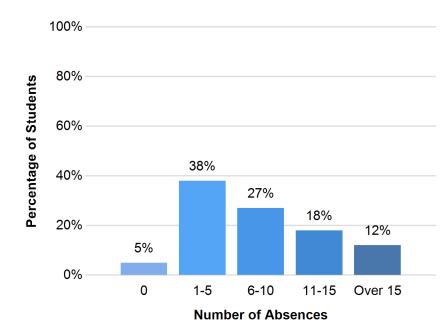

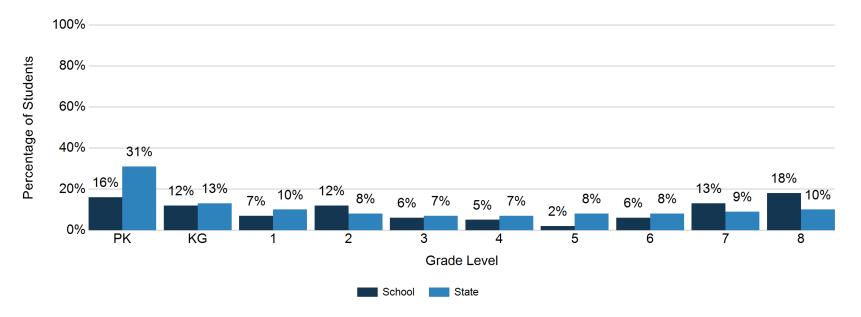
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

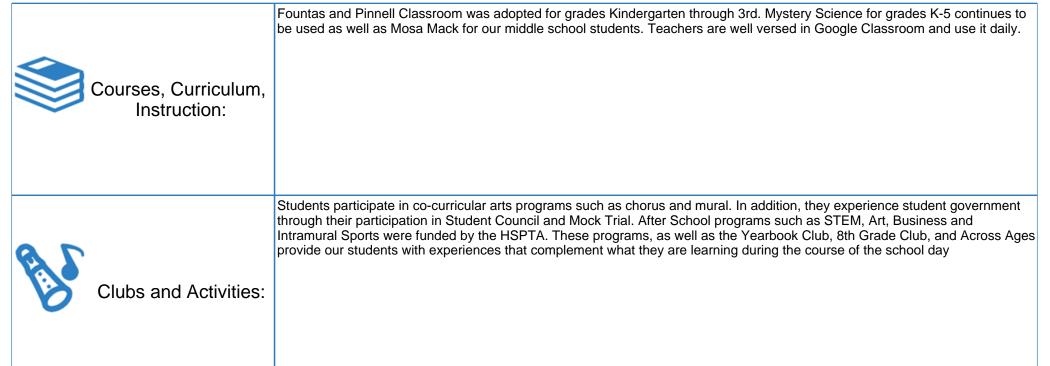

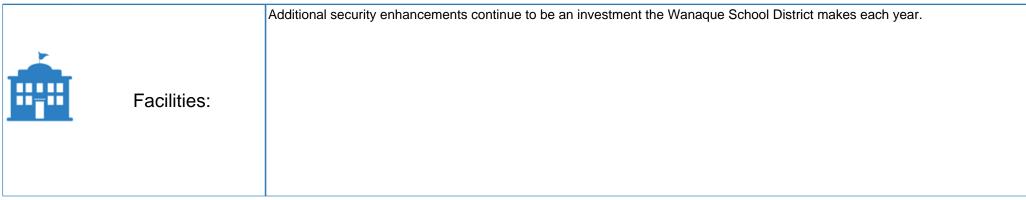
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Technology and STEM:

Continuing to meet the Next Generation Science Standards, we use an online platform called Mystery Science. It embraces the mission of helping our children stay curious. Students investigate questions instead of simply memorizing science terms and facts. They are given the opportunity to explore the questions that bring the facts to life. Every lesson begins with a mystery, a question that captures the students' interests, and offers a hands-on activity to help students explore and understand the facts behind the answer. Teachers can decide to take it a step further and have students participate in an engineering or STEM piece, which consists of students working together to solve a real-world problem, based on the question. 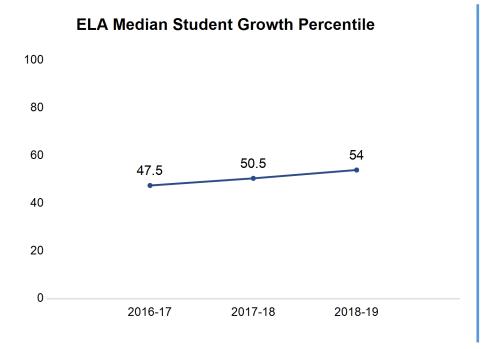

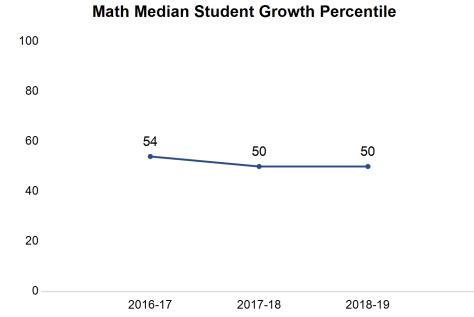

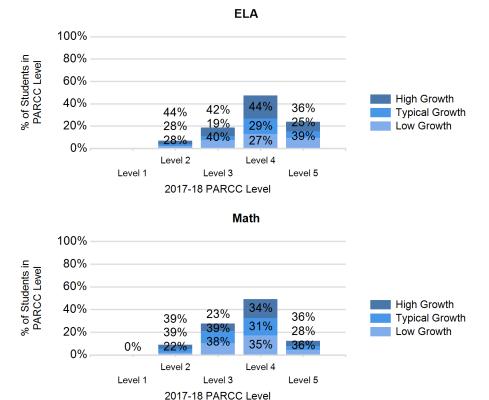

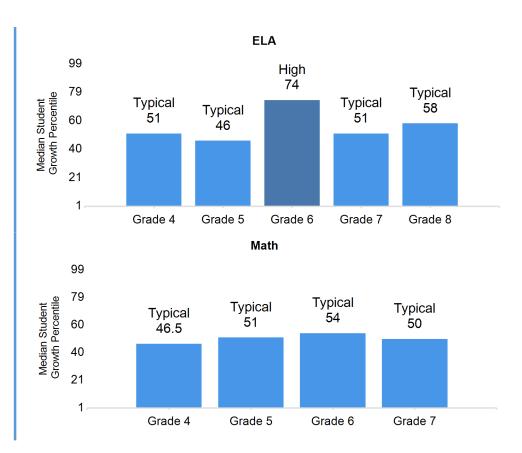
These graphs show the percentage of students by 2017-18 statewide assessment performance level that fall into each of the three levels of growth based on their 2018-19

These graphs show the median Student Growth Percentile for students in each grade.







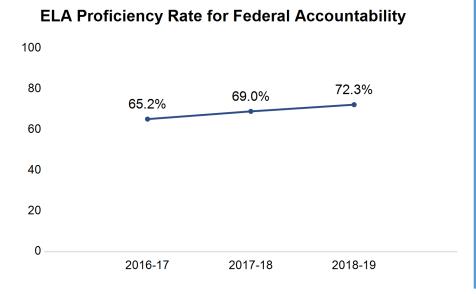
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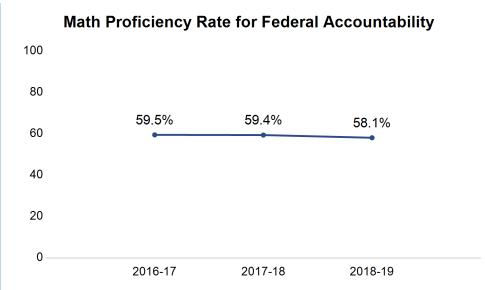

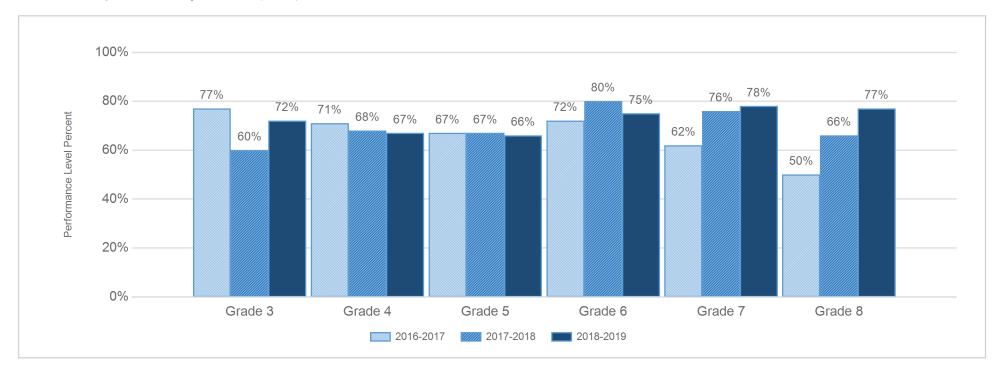

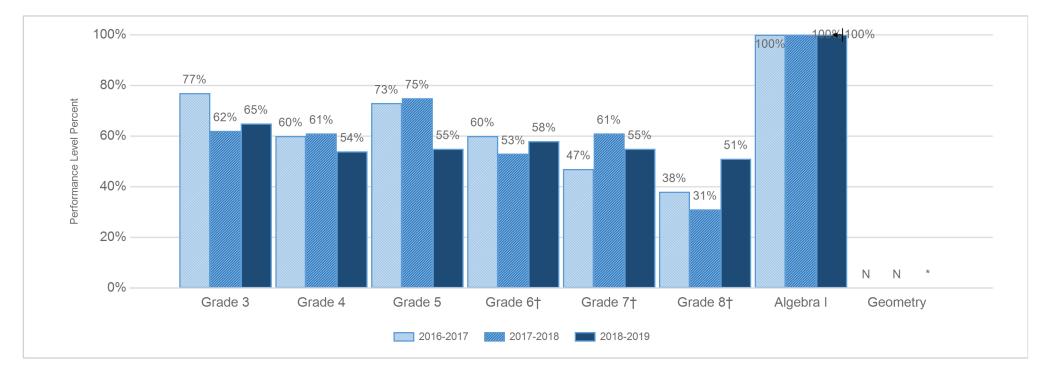

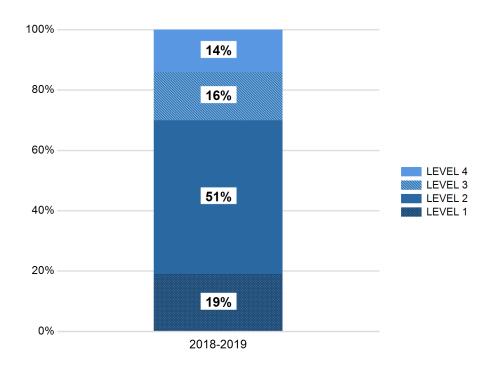

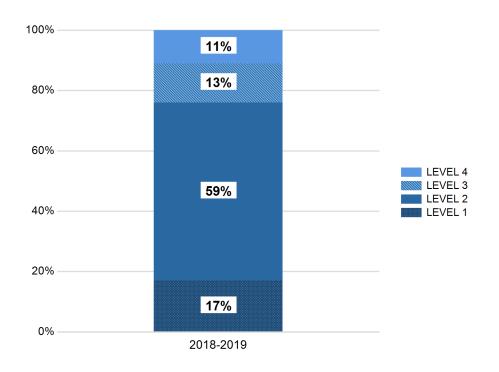

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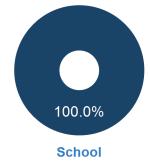
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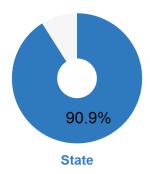

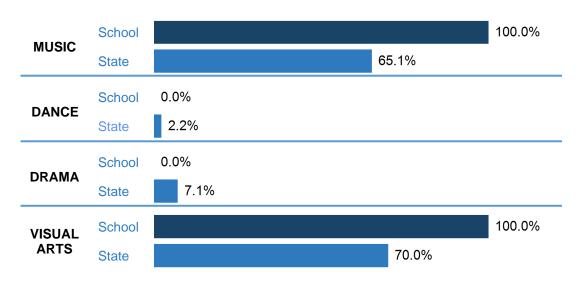


Students enrolled in one or more visual and performing arts classes

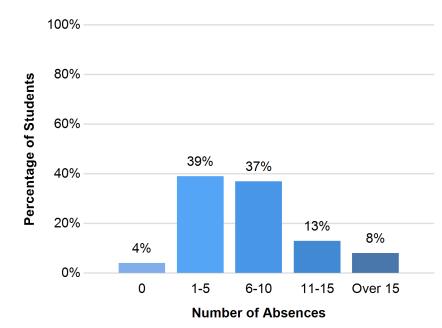

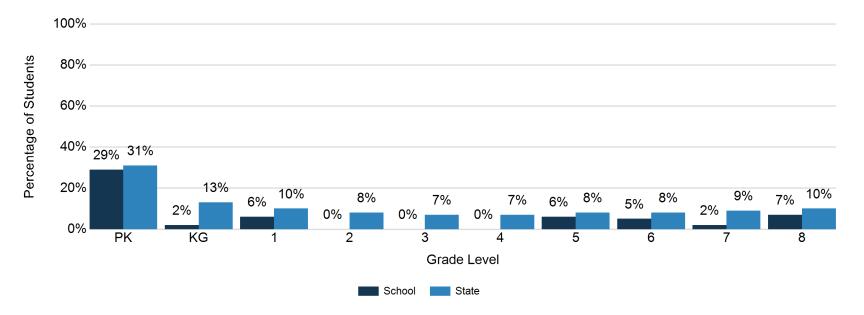

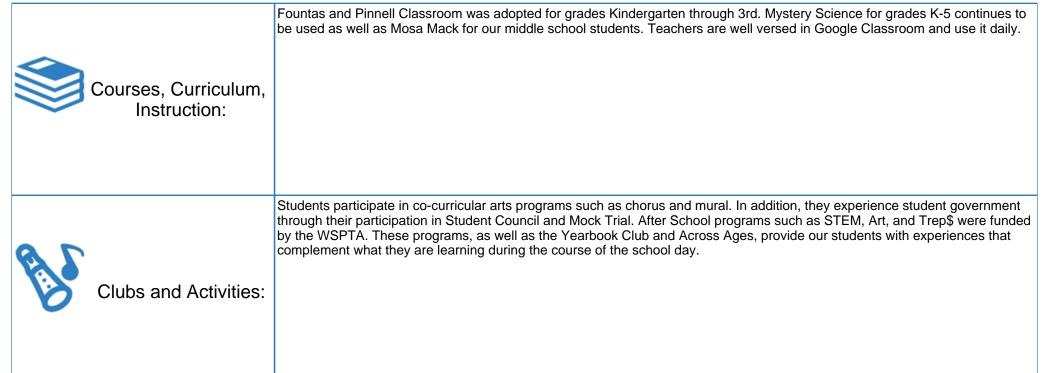

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Before and After School Programs:

Academic Support is available to students in grades four through eight. Homework Assistance is available to students in grades two through eight on an as-needed basis. Additionally, parents have the opportunity to utilize the Boys and Girls Club Before and After School Program and give their children the opportunity to grow and develop in a fun and educational setting. A breakfast program is also available for all of the students beginning at 8:30 a.m. If time is an issue for students we allow them to utilize the Grab & Go option and eat breakfast in their homerooms.



Staff and Professional Learning:

Ongoing training for Ready and iReady takes place throughout the school year. Our Director of Curriculum has begun training all staff utilizing Fountas and Pinnell Classroom. Our Professional Development Academy, which offers an array of courses for all staff members, provides learning opportunities on varied topics. These topics are taught by our staff and administrative team. In accordance with the Department of Education rulings, training was provided to staff members on mandated topics throughout the year.



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Our BSI and Reading Recovery program continues to provide intervention strategies for our learners. Our special services program offers students a full range of programs and placements, which include: instruction in our general curriculum. Through these interventions, our students are provided the opportunity to achieve his/her fullest potential in the least restricted environment as per state mandate.



Student Health and Wellness:

During the month of February, the building conducted a Wellness Week. This week consisted of a variety of physical activities and the opportunity to learn more about mental health. In conjunction with the Pomptonian food services, students had the opportunity to try a variety of different fruits and vegetables.



Parent and Community Involvement:

The Wanaque PTA is active in providing our building with special materials and offers enrichment courses after school. During the 2018-19 school year, the PTA purchased a new water fountain as well as paid for school assemblies, the school Play, Award Assemblies, the Talent Show, and various other community functions. 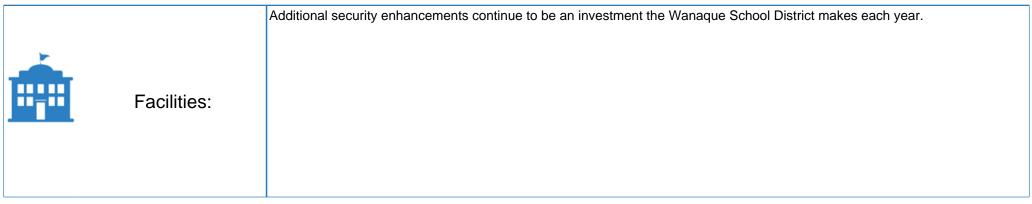
