19:45-1.12 Personnel assigned to the operation and conduct of gaming

(a) Each casino licensee shall be required to employ the personnel herein described in the operation of its casino and casino simulcasting facility, regardless of the position titles assigned to such personnel by the casino licensee in its approved jobs compendium. Functions described in this section shall be performed only by persons holding the appropriate license required by the casino licensee's approved jobs compendium to perform such functions, or by persons holding the appropriate license required by the casino licensee's approved jobs compendium to supervise persons performing such functions, subject to the limitations imposed by N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.11(a).

1. Each casino licensee shall at all times maintain a level of staffing that ensures the proper operation and effective supervision of all authorized games and simulcast wagering in the casino and casino simulcasting facility.

2. Each casino licensee shall be required to employ a person referred to herein as a casino manager. The casino manager shall be the executive assigned the responsibility and authority for the supervision and management of the overall operation of a casino licensee's casino games department including, without limitation, the hiring and terminating of all casino personnel and the creation of high employee morale and good customer relations, all in accordance with the policies and practices established by the casino licensee's board of directors or non-corporate equivalent.

i. In the absence of the casino manager and the assistant casino manager, should the establishment have

an assistant casino manager, a table games shift manager, slot shift manager or keno shift supervisor, as applicable, who is employed within the casino games department shall be designated by the casino licensee as the person responsible for the overall operation of the casino games department and such person shall have the authority of a casino manager.

ii. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if a casino licensee chooses, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.11(b)4, to establish an independent slot department or an independent keno department, the independent slot department shall be supervised and managed by a slot department manager in accordance with (h)5 below, and the independent keno department shall be supervised and managed by a keno manager in accordance with (k)3 below.

(b) The following personnel shall be used to operate the table games in an establishment:

1. Casino clerk shall be the person located at a desk in the pit to prepare documentation required for the operation of table games including, without limitation, Requests for Fills, Requests for Credits, Counter Checks and documents that evidence the exchange of gaming chips or plaques as part of credit or debit card chip transactions.

2. Dealers shall be the persons assigned to each craps, mini-craps, mini-dice, baccarat, blackjack, spanish 21, roulette, minibaccarat, red dog, sic bo, big six, casino war, pai gow, pai gow poker, caribbean stud poker, let it ride poker, three card poker, fast action hold 'em, colorado hold 'em poker and poker table to directly operate and conduct the game.

3. Stickperson shall be the dealer assigned to each craps table to control the dice and may be responsible for the proposition wagers made at the craps table. At the casino licensee's option, a stickperson may also be assigned to a mini-craps table, in addition to the required dealer, to control the dice and may be responsible for the proposition wagers made at the mini-craps table.

4. Boxperson shall be the first level supervisor assigned the responsibility of directly participating in and supervising the operation and conduct of the craps game.

5. Floorperson shall be the second level supervisor assigned the responsibility for directly supervising the operation and conduct of a craps game, and the first level supervisor assigned the responsibility for directly supervising the operation and conduct of a baccarat, blackjack, spanish 21, roulette, mini-craps, mini-dice, sic bo, mini-baccarat, red dog, casino war, pai gow, pai gow poker, big six, caribbean stud poker, let it ride poker, three card poker, fast action hold 'em, colorado hold 'em poker or poker game.

6. Pit boss shall be the third level supervisor assigned the responsibility for the overall supervision of the opera-

tion and conduct of a craps game and the second level supervisor assigned the responsibility for the overall supervision of the operation and conduct of a blackjack, spanish 21, roulette, mini-craps, mini-dice, minibaccarat, big six, sic bo, red dog, casino war, pai gow, pai gow poker, caribbean stud poker, let it ride poker, three card poker, fast action hold 'em, colorado hold 'em poker or baccarat game.

7. Poker shift supervisor shall be licensed as a casino key employee and shall be the supervisor assigned and present during a shift with the responsibility for directly supervising all activities related to the operation and conduct of poker. A poker shift supervisor may also supervise table games other than poker in lieu of a pit boss in accordance with the provisions of this section.

8. Table games shift manager shall be the supervisor assigned to each shift with the responsibility for the supervision of table games conducted in the casino and casino simulcasting facility. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if a casino licensee chooses, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.11(b)4, to establish an independent slot department, a casino manager may personally perform the required duties of a table games shift manager when the casino manager is present in the casino.

(c) Each casino licensee shall maintain the following minimum levels of staffing:

1. One casino clerk shall be assigned to the entire casino facility;

2. One dealer shall be assigned to each blackjack, spanish 21, roulette, minibaccarat, sic bo, red dog, pai gow, pai gow poker, big six, mini-craps, mini-dice, casino war, caribbean stud poker, let it ride poker, three card poker, fast action hold 'em, colorado hold 'em poker and poker table;

3. Three dealers shall be assigned to each craps and baccarat table;

4. One boxperson shall be assigned to each craps game;

5. One floorperson shall supervise:

i. Not more than four blackjack, spanish 21, roulette, pai gow poker, minibaccarat (using only the dealing procedures in N.J.A.C. 19:47-7.7(c)1 or 2), mini-dice, sic bo, red dog, casino war, caribbean stud poker, let it ride poker, three card poker, fast action hold 'em, colorado hold 'em poker or big six tables, or any combination thereof; or

ii. Not more than two minibaccarat tables if either table uses the dealing procedure in N.J.A.C. 19:47-7.7(c)3; or

iii. Not more than one blackjack, roulette, pai gow poker, mini-dice, sic bo, red dog, casino war, caribbean stud poker, let it ride poker, three card poker, fast action hold'em or big six table, and one minibaccarat table which uses the optional dealing procedure in N.J.A.C. 19:47-7.7(c)3;

iv. Not more than two craps tables; or

v. Not more than one craps table and one blackjack, spanish 21, roulette, minibaccarat (using only the dealing procedures in N.J.A.C. 19:47-7.7(c)1 or 2), mini-dice, sic bo, red dog or big six table; or

vi. Not more than one mini-craps table; or

vii. Not more than one baccarat or pai gow table; or

viii. As to the game of poker:

(1) If the poker shift supervisor is supervising only poker tables, not more than eight poker tables; or

(2) If the poker shift supervisor is supervising only poker tables and no floorperson assigned to poker by a casino licensee has any responsibilities for seating players, not more than 10 poker tables; or

(3) If the poker shift supervisor is supervising both poker tables and table games other than poker, not more than four poker tables;

6. One pit boss shall supervise not more than 20 gaming tables; and

7. One poker shift supervisor shall supervise all open poker tables; provided, however, that the poker shift supervisor may supervise a total of not more than 16 poker tables and table games other than poker (in lieu of a pit boss) if fewer than 16 poker tables are open.

(d) Notwithstanding the provisions of (c)5 above:

1. If a casino licensee has six or fewer poker tables open for gaming activity, no poker floorperson shall be required and the poker tables may be supervised by the poker shift supervisor, provided that the poker shift supervisor is not supervising any other table games; and

2. If a casino licensee has at least one but fewer than four poker tables open for gaming activity, the poker shift supervisor may supervise any combination of not more than four poker tables and table games other than poker (in lieu of a pit boss) and no floorperson shall be required to supervise the poker tables provided that the floorperson supervision requirements for games other than poker are satisfied.

(e) Notwithstanding the provisions of (c) above, a casino licensee may implement a plan for revised supervision by floorpersons, poker shift supervisors, pit bosses, or slot shift supervisors. In any plan for revised supervision:

1. One floorperson may supervise not more than six blackjack (none of which shall offer the streak wager permitted under N.J.A.C. 19:47-2.22), spanish 21, roulette, minibaccarat (using only the dealing procedures in N.J.A.C. 19:47-7.7(c)1 or 2), mini-dice, sic bo, red dog or big six tables, or any combination thereof;

2. One pit boss may supervise not more than 24 gaming tables;

3. One poker shift supervisor may supervise a total of not more than 24 poker tables and gaming tables other than poker (in lieu of a pit boss), provided that:

i. The poker shift supervisor is supervising all poker tables which are open to the public; and

ii. One floorperson may supervise not more than six poker tables;

4. One floorperson may supervise two craps tables and one additional blackjack, spanish 21, roulette, minibaccarat (using only the dealing procedures in N.J.A.C. 19:47-7.7(c)1 or 2), mini-dice, sic bo, red dog or big six table;

5. One floorperson may supervise one craps table and two additional blackjack, spanish 21, roulette, minibaccarat, (using only the dealing procedures in N.J.A.C. 19:47-7.7(c)1 or 2), mini-dice, sic bo, red dog or big six tables, or any combination thereof;

6. One floorperson assigned to poker may supervise not more than 10 poker tables if the poker shift supervisor is supervising only poker tables;

7. One floorperson assigned to poker may supervise not more than 12 poker tables if the poker shift supervisor is supervising only poker tables and no floorperson assigned to poker has any responsibilities for seating players; and

8. If a casino licensee chooses to establish slot and keno operations in the same department, as permitted under N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.11(b), a slot shift supervisor may simultaneously assume the responsibility of the keno shift supervisor.

(f) The casino manager or table games shift manager shall notify the Commission and the Division no later than 24 hours in advance of implementing or changing any plan for revised supervision for table games, and the slot shift supervisor or keno shift supervisor shall provide such notification for keno, provided, however, that notice may be provided less than 24 hours in advance in circumstances which are emergent or may otherwise not reasonably be anticipated.

1. Any notice for a plan for revised supervision of table games shall include, without limitation, the following information:

i. The pit number and configuration of any pit affected;

ii. The type, location and table number of any table affected;

iii. The standard staffing level required for the gaming table or tables and the proposed variance therefrom;

iv. The start date and time, and the duration, of the revised supervision; and

v. The basis for the decision to revise the number of supervisory personnel, which shall include any relevant factors which demonstrate that proper operation and effective supervision of the affected gaming tables will be maintained, including, as applicable, a showing:

(1) That the revised supervision is justified by a reduced volume of play at the specified times and gaming tables in the casino or casino simulcasting facility;

(2) That the particular dealers or supervisors assigned to the affected tables possess a degree of skill and experience indicative of sufficient ability to operate the affected tables with revised supervision, in which case a record of the personnel assigned to such tables during the period or revised supervision shall be maintained;

(3) That a reduced number of gaming tables will be operating in the affected pits, which are in a configuration to ensure proper supervision and operation; or

(4) Any other facts or circumstances which establish that a revision in the number of supervisory personnel is appropriate.

2. Any notice for a plan for revised supervision for keno operations shall include, without limitation, the following information:

i. The start date and time, and the duration, of the revised supervision; and

ii. The basis for the decision to consolidate the supervisory responsibilities in one employee, which shall include any relevant factors which demonstrate that effective supervision of keno operations will be maintained, including a showing that the revised supervision is justified by a reduced level of keno wagering or keno staffing.

(g) The Commission may, at any time upon 12 hours notice, direct that the plan for revised supervision shall be terminated and that the licensee shall maintain standard staffing levels as defined in (c) above.

(h) The following personnel shall be used to maintain and operate the slot machines and bill changers in an establishment:

1. Slot mechanics shall be the persons assigned the responsibility for repairing and maintaining slot machines and bill changers in proper operating condition and participating in the filling of payout reserve containers.

2. Slot attendants shall be the persons assigned the responsibility for the operation of slot machines and bill changers, including, but not limited to, participating in manual jackpot payouts and filling payout reserve containers. At the discretion of the casino licensee, slot attendants may, using currency obtained from an imprest fund issued by the cashiers' cage, the master coin bank or a slot booth in accordance with internal control procedures approved by the Commission, pay slot jackpots of less than \$1,200 pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:40-1.40E, and accept currency and coupons from patrons in exchange for currency.

3. Slot supervisors shall be the first level supervisors assigned the responsibility for directly supervising the operation of slot machines and bill changers.

4. Slot shift manager shall be the second level supervisor with the responsibility for the overall supervision of the slot machine and bill changer operation for each shift.

5. If a casino licensee chooses to establish an independent slot department pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.11(b)4, the slot department manager shall be the executive assigned the responsibility and authority for the supervision and management of the overall operation of the casino licensee's slot machines and bill changers including, without limitation, the hiring and terminating of all slot department personnel and the creation of high employee morale and good customer relations, all in accordance with the policies and practices established by the casino licensee's board of directors or non-corporate equivalent. In the absence of the slot department manager, the slot shift manager shall have the authority of the slot department manager.

(i) The following personnel shall, at a minimum, be used to operate a simulcast counter in a casino simulcasting facility:

1. Casino pari-mutuel cashiers shall be assigned the responsibility of generating, and issuing to patrons, pari-mutuel tickets and credit vouchers, conducting credit card and debit card cash transactions, making simulcast payouts to patrons, and redeeming credit vouchers for patrons. At the discretion of a casino licensee, a casino pari-mutuel cashier ("vault cashier") may, alternatively, be assigned the responsibility to control the currency and coin in the simulcast vault, as provided in N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.14A and 1.15A. A vault cashier on a shift shall not perform any other functions of a casino pari-mutuel cashier on the same shift; and

2. Simulcast counter shift supervisor shall be the first level supervisor assigned the responsibility for directly supervising the operation and conduct of the simulcast counter; provided, however, that the simulcast counter shift supervisor may simultaneously assume the responsibilities of the keno shift supervisor if a casino licensee chooses to establish keno and simulcasting operations in the same department, as permitted by N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.11(b)4.

(j) The following personnel, at a minimum, shall be used at keno:

1. Keno writer shall be the person assigned the responsibility to generate keno tickets, redeem coupons, conduct credit card and debit card cash transactions, accept wagers and issue keno payouts at a keno booth, roving keno work station or satellite keno booth.

2. Keno shift supervisor shall be the supervisor assigned to each shift with the responsibility for directly supervising all activities at a keno booth, roving keno work stations and satellite keno booths; provided, however, that the keno shift supervisor may simultaneously assume the responsibilities of the simulcast counter shift supervisor if a casino licensee chooses to establish keno and simulcasting operations in the same department, as permitted by N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.11(b)4.

3. If a casino licensee chooses to establish an independent keno department pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.11(b)4, the keno manager shall be the executive assigned the responsibility and authority for the supervision and management of the overall operation of the game of keno by the casino licensee, including, without limitation, the hiring and terminating of all keno personnel in accordance with the policies and practices established by the casino licensee.

(k) Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit a casino licensee from utilizing personnel in addition to those described herein nor shall anything in this section be construed to limit the discretion of the Commission to order the utilization of additional personnel by the casino licensee necessary for the proper conduct and effective supervision of gaming in an establishment.

19:45-1.12A Internal control procedures for access badge system and issuance of temporary license credentials

Each casino licensee shall establish procedures and a control plan for readily identifying each employee of a casino licensee who is permitted, during the normal course of performing his or her duties or during emergencies, to have access to one or more restricted areas, and for issuing temporary license credentials and access badges. These procedures and control plan shall be submitted, reviewed and modified in conformance with the provisions of N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.3.

19:45-1.25A Procedure for exchange of slot counter checks by slot patrons

(a) A casino licensee may offer credit to slot patrons pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.27. Slot Counter Checks may be prepared by slot cashiers at slot booths and coin redemption locations and by general cashiers at the cashiers' cage in exchange for which patrons may receive any combination of

coin, currency or slot tokens. For casino licensees which issue credit to slot players, the following procedures and requirements over Slot Counter Checks shall be observed:

1. Slot Counter Checks shall be serially prenumbered forms. Each series of Slot Counter Checks shall be used in sequential order; however, nothing in this subsection shall preclude a casino licensee from issuing Slot Counter Checks from the same numbering sequence used for the issuance of Counter Checks pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.25. The series numbers of all Slot Counter Checks shall be accounted for by employees with no incompatible functions.

i. The original and all copies of voided Slot Counter Checks shall be marked "VOID" and shall require the signature of the preparer.

2. For establishments in which Slot Counter Checks are manually prepared:

i. Each series of Slot Counter Checks shall be a five-part form, at a minimum, which consists of an original, a redemption copy, an accounting copy, an issuance copy and acknowledgment copy and shall be attached in a book that will permit an individual slip in the series and its copies to be written upon simultaneously, while still contained in the book, and that will allow the removal of the original and all duplicate copies.

ii. Access to the Slot Counter Checks shall be maintained and controlled at all times by the general cashier or slot cashier responsible for control of and accounting for the unused supply of Slot Counter Checks, and the preparation of Slot Counter Checks for a patron's signature.

3. For establishment in which Slot Counter Checks are computer prepared, each series of Slot Counter Checks shall be a four-part form, at a minimum, which consists of an original, a redemption copy, an issuance copy and accounting copy and shall be inserted in a printer that will: simultaneously print an original and duplicates; store, in machine readable form, all information printed on the original and duplicates; and discharge the original and duplicates. The stored data shall not be susceptible to change or removal by any personnel after preparation of a Slot Counter Check.

(b) For each Slot Counter Check exchanged, in accordance with (a) above, the general cashier or slot cashier shall:

1. Verify the patron's identity by either:

i. Obtaining, at a minimum, the amount of the requested Slot Counter Check and the patron's signature on a form, which signature shall be compared to the signature contained within a patron signature file. The general cashier or slot cashier shall sign the form indicating that the signature of the patron on the form appears to agree with the signature in the patron signature file. Such form shall be attached to the accounting copy of the Slot Counter Check exchanged by the patron and deposited into a locked accounting box for forwarding to the accounting department in conformity with (h) below.

(1) After the patron's identity has been verified by the general cashier or slot cashier as required above, the requirements for subsequent verification of the patron's identity may be satisfied by that general cashier or slot cashier signing a form attesting to the patron's identity before each subsequent Slot Counter Check is exchanged. The form shall include the patron's name and the serial number of the initial Slot Counter Check exchanged by the patron. Such form shall be attached to the accounting copy of the

Slot Counter Check and deposited into a locked accounting box for forwarding to the accounting department in conformity with (h) below; or

ii. Obtaining the attestation of a slot supervisor as to the identity of the patron. The slot supervisor shall sign a form attesting to the patron's identity and shall record his or her license number thereon and the amount requested by the patron. Such form shall be attached to the accounting copy of the Slot Counter Check exchanged by the patron and deposited into a locked accounting box for forwarding to the accounting department in conformity with (h) below;

2. Determine the patron's remaining credit limit either from a check bank cashier or from a computer terminal located in an area as approved by the Commission;

3. Prepare the Slot Counter Check for the patron's signature by recording, at a minimum, on the face of the original and all duplicates of the Slot Counter Check, with the exception of the acknowledgment copy which shall only have recorded on it the location of preparation, or in stored data, the following information:

i. The name of the patron exchanging the Slot Counter Check;

ii. The name of the patron's bank (required on the original copy only);

iii. The current date and time;

iv. The amount of the Slot Counter Check expressed in numerals;

v. The location of preparation of the Slot Counter Check;

vi. The signature of the cage supervisor or slot supervisor verifying that the Slot Counter Check was prepared for the correct amount and for the correct individual per the information recorded on the form referenced in (b)1 above; and

vii. The signature of the preparer or, if computer prepared, the identification code of the preparer;

4. Place an impression on the back of the original Slot Counter Check a restrictive endorsement "for deposit only" to the casino licensee's bank account;

5. Present the original and all duplicate copies of Slot Counter Check to the patron for signature;

6. Receive the signed original and all duplicate copies of the Slot Counter Check directly from the patron. The general cashier or slot cashier shall, if verification occurs in accordance with (b)1i above, compare the patron's signature on the signed Slot Counter Check to the form referenced in (b)1 above and sign the form referenced in (b)1 above if the signatures appear to agree. In no instance shall currency, coin or slot tokens be given to the patron prior to the receipt of the signed copy of the Slot Counter Check by the general cashier or slot cashier. Distribution of the Slot Counter Check copies shall be as follows:

i. The issuance copy of the Slot Counter Check, which shall serve as documentation of the exchange of currency, coin or slot tokens for the Slot Counter Check and shall be maintained by the general cashier or slot cashier in his or her imprest fund immediately after the issuance of currency, coin or slot tokens to the patron.

ii. The original, redemption, and acknowledgment copies of the Slot Counter Check, if not issued by the general cashier, shall be expeditiously transported to the cashiers' cage by a security department member or via a pneumatic tube system where the original and redemption copies shall be maintained and controlled by the check bank cashier. If the Slot Counter Check was issued by a general cashier, the general cashier shall expeditiously transport the original, redemption and acknowledgment copies of the Slot Counter Check to the check bank cashier where the original and redemption copies shall be maintained. The acknowledgment copy shall be returned to the general cashier or slot cashier in accordance with either (d) or (e) below; and

iii. The accounting copy of the Slot Counter Check shall be attached to the form referenced in (b)1 above by the general cashier or slot cashier and deposited into a locked accounting box for forwarding to the accounting department in conformity with (h) below.

(c) Nothing in this section shall preclude a casino licensee from issuing a Slot Counter Check to a patron directly at a slot machine, provided the casino licensee follows the procedures and requirements established below:

1. A slot supervisor shall obtain, at a minimum, the amount of the requested Slot Counter Check and the patron's signature, on a two-part form ("Request"), and transport both copies of the Request directly to the general cashier or slot cashier. The general cashier or slot cashier shall compare the patron's signature pursuant to (b)1i above.

2. Once the patron's signature has been verified in accordance with (b)1 above, the general cashier or slot cashier shall prepare the Slot Counter Check in accordance with (b)2, (b)3i through v and (b)4 above.

3. The general cashier or slot cashier shall obtain the signature of the slot supervisor responsible for obtaining the information on the Request referenced in (c)1 above on the Slot Counter Check. The general cashier or slot cashier shall sign the Slot Counter Check as the preparer of the Slot Counter Check, and present the original and all duplicate copies of the Slot Counter Check and the original and duplicate copy of the Request, and the currency, coin, and/or slot tokens in the amount of the Slot Counter Check to an accounting or casino security department representative.

4. The accounting or casino security department representative shall verify the currency, coin and/or slot tokens against the amount recorded on the Slot Counter Check and the Request. If in agreement, the accounting or casino security department representative shall sign the original and duplicate copy of the Request and return the duplicate copy of the Request to the general cashier or slot cashier.

5. The general cashier or slot cashier shall retain the duplicate copy of the Request as evidence of the funds and Slot Counter Check being received by the accounting or casino security department representative.

6. Once the currency, coin and/or slot tokens has been verified in accordance with (c)4 above, the funds shall be transported, along with the original and all copies of the Slot Counter Check and the original Request, to the patron by the accounting or casino security department representative in the presence of the slot supervisor referenced in (c)1 above.

7. The accounting or casino security department representative shall present the original and all duplicate copies of the Slot Counter Check to the patron for signature.

8. Upon receiving the signed original and all duplicate copies of the Slot Counter Check directly from the patron, the accounting or casino security department representative shall verify the patron's signature on the original Slot Counter Check against the patron's signature on the original Request. If in agreement, the funds shall be immediately given to the patron. In no instance shall the funds be given to the patron prior to the receipt of the signed Slot Counter Check from the patron.

9. Once the patron has received the funds, the slot supervisor referenced in (c)1 above shall sign the back of the accounting copy of the Slot Counter Check as a witness to the transfer of funds to the patron in exchange for the signed Slot Counter Check from the patron. The slot supervisor shall immediately deposit the accounting copy of the Slot Counter Check with the original Request in a locked accounting box for forwarding to the accounting department in conformity with (h) below.

10. The accounting or casino security department representative shall immediately return the original, redemption, acknowledgment (manual mode only) and issuance copies of the Slot Counter Check to the general cashier or slot cashier who issued the funds. The general cashier or slot cashier shall attach the duplicate of the Request to the issuance copy of the Slot Counter Check and shall maintain them in his or her imprest fund for forwarding to the main bank or master coin bank at the end of his or her shift.

i. The original, redemption and acknowledgment (manual mode only) copies of the Slot Counter Check, if not issued by the general cashier, shall be expeditiously transported to the cashiers' cage by a security department member or via a pneumatic tube system where the original and redemption copies shall be maintained and controlled by the check bank cashier. If the Slot Counter Check was issued by a general cashier, the general cashier shall expeditiously transport the original, redemption and acknowledgment copies of the Slot Counter Check to the check bank cashier where the original and redemption copies shall be maintained and controlled by the check bank cashier. The acknowledgment copy shall be returned to the general cashier or slot cashier in accordance with either (d) or (e) below.

(d) For establishments in which the chip bank cashier receives the original, redemption and acknowledgment copies of the Slot Counter Check, the chip bank cashier shall sign and time stamp the acknowledgment copy of the Slot Counter Check and expeditiously return it to the general cashier or slot cashier via a security department member or pneumatic tube system and shall transfer the original and redemption copies of the Slot Counter Check to the check bank cashier in return for properly signed documentation.

(e) For establishments in which the check bank cashier receives the original, redemption and acknowledgment copies of the Slot Counter Check directly from the general cashier or slot cashier, whether directly through the use of the pneumatic tube system or transported by a security department member, the check bank cashier shall:

1. Sign and time stamp the acknowledgment copy and shall transmit it to the general cashier directly or to the slot cashier via a security department member or pneumatic tube system, and shall maintain the original and redemption copies of the Slot Counter Check.

(f) If there is no acknowledgment copy, the check bank cashier shall be responsible for consummating the transaction in the computer upon receipt of the original and redemption copies of the Slot Counter Check.

(g) Once the acknowledgment copy of the Slot Counter Check has been returned to the general cashier or slot cashier, it shall be attached to the issuance copy of the Slot Counter Check and forwarded to the main bank or master coin bank at the end of the cashier's shift.

(h) At the end of the gaming activity each day, at a minimum, the following procedures and requirements shall be observed:

1. The original and all copies of voided Slot Counter Checks and the accounting copy of the Slot Counter Check shall be picked up by a representative of the accounting department with no incompatible functions and returned to the accounting department for agree-

ment, on a daily basis, with the issuance and acknowledgment copies of the Slot Counter Check received from the general cashiers or slot cashiers.

2. The redemption copy of a Slot Counter Check maintained and controlled in conformity with (b)6ii and (c)10i above shall be forwarded to the accounting department subsequent to the redemption, consolidation or deposit of the original Slot Counter Check for agreement with the accounting and issuance copies of the Slot Counter Check or stored data.

19:45-1.26 Substitution, redemption and consolidation of patron checks at the cashiers' cage; initiation of transactions by mail

(a) The drawer of an undeposited Counter Check or Slot Counter Check may use a personal check to substitute for or partially redeem such Counter Check or Slot Counter Check or to consolidate two or more undeposited Counter Checks or Slot Counter Checks if the personal check is drawn on an account which has been verified pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.27, complies with the requirements of N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.25(b) and (c), and is deposited or redeemed in accordance with the requirements of N.J.S.A. 5:12-101 and this chapter.

1. For purposes of this chapter, a personal check which is used by a drawer in a substitution, partial redemption or consolidation transaction shall be referred to as a "replacement check."

2. The drawer of an undeposited replacement check may use another replacement check in a substitution, consolidation or partial redemption transaction involving the original replacement check.

(b) The drawer of an undeposited patron check may redeem it:

1. In its entirety by exchanging cash, cash equivalents, complimentary cash gifts, casino checks, casino affiliate checks, annuity jackpot trust checks, slot tokens, gaming chips or gaming plaques in an amount equal to the amount of the patron check being redeemed; or

2. In part by exchanging:

- i. Another patron check in a lesser amount; and
- ii. Cash, cash equivalents, complimentary cash gifts, casino checks, casino affiliate checks, annuity jackpot trust checks, slot tokens, gaming chips or gaming plaques in an amount which equals the difference between the amount of the check exchanged in (b)2i above and the amount of the patron check being partially redeemed.

(c) If a drawer has more than one undeposited patron check outstanding, such checks shall be redeemed in reverse chronological order (the most recently dated patron check shall always be redeemed first).

1. If more than one patron check bears the same date, the drawer may choose the order in which to redeem the identically dated checks.

2. If, pursuant to its internal controls, a casino licensee does not require a patron check used in a substitution, consolidation or partial redemption transaction to be dated with the date of the initial patron check being substituted, consolidated or partially redeemed, then the date of the initial patron check, and not the date of the replacement, consolidation or partial redemption check, shall be used to determine the order in which outstanding patron checks shall be redeemed.

(d) The drawer of a patron check may consolidate some or all undeposited patron checks by exchanging another patron check in an amount equal to the total amount of the outstanding patron checks being consolidated.

(e) Except as otherwise provided in this section, N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.26A, 19:46-1.5(g) and 1.35(d), all consolidations, total or partial redemptions or substitutions of patron checks shall be initiated by the drawer of the patron check and processed by a general cashier at a cashiers' cage or a satellite cage. Consolidation, redemption or substitution of personal checks exchanged for nongaming purposes pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.25(d) shall not be allowed.

(f) Notwithstanding (e) above, the drawer of one or more outstanding patron checks may initiate a redemption, substitution or consolidation transaction by mailing an authorized instrument to the casino licensee, provided that the casino licensee complies with all relevant provisions of this section, N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.25, 1.26A, 1.27, 1.28 and its approved internal controls, which internal controls shall, at a minimum, include:

1. Procedures requiring that any authorized instrument received by the casino licensee through the mail be forwarded directly to the casino accounting department, which department shall maintain oversight of the transaction at all times and shall record the receipt of the authorized instrument, including, without limitation:

i. The date that the authorized instrument is received;

ii. The name of the drawer;

iii. The amount and type of any payment received and, if applicable, the check number of any replacement check received; and

iv. The signature of the casino accounting department employee who receives the authorized instrument;

2. The notation of the transaction in the patron's credit file including, without limitation, the specific terms of any oral instructions or a copy of any written instructions from the patron concerning the intended use of the authorized instrument;

3. Procedures governing the verification and processing of the authorized instrument including, where appropriate, its transfer to the check bank;

4. A method of documenting and processing the receipt of payments toward the total or partial redemption of a patron check in accordance with N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.26A, if the authorized instrument received is insufficient to effectuate a requested redemption; and

5. Procedures for the return of the original patron check to the drawer in accordance with (i) below if the transaction results in a substitution, consolidation or redemption.

(g) No casino licensee or any other person licensed under the Act, or any other person acting on behalf of or under any arrangement with a casino licensee or other person licensed under the Act, shall accept any patron check in redemption, consolidation or substitution of any patron check for the purpose of avoiding or delaying the deposit of a patron check in a bank for collection or payment within the time periods specified in N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.28.

(h) Upon completion of a redemption, consolidation or substitution transaction pursuant to this section, the general cashier shall return any original patron check being redeemed, consolidated or substituted to the drawer in accordance with the requirements in (i) below. If the redemption, consolidation or substitution of a patron check is accomplished by the acceptance of another patron check, the general cashier accepting the new patron check shall date and time stamp the new check, place his or her initials on the new check, and record on the new check the serial number of any Counter Check, Slot Counter Check or replacement check being redeemed, consolidated or substituted. The new patron check shall be dated with the date of the initial patron check being redeemed, consolidated or substituted unless the internal controls of the casino licensee include an independent procedure to ensure that the date of the initial patron check shall be used to determine the date by which the new patron check shall be redeemed or deposited pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.28.

19:45-1.40 Jackpot payouts that are not paid directly from the slot machine

(a) Whenever a patron wins a jackpot that is not totally and automatically paid directly from the slot machine in coins, slot tokens, or a gaming voucher, a Request for Jackpot Payout Slip ("Request") shall be prepared after the preparer observes the combinations on the slot machine and determines the appropriate amount of the payout, based on the winning combinations. If the manual jackpot is less than \$10,000, the preparer of the Request shall be a slot attendant or a slot attendant supervisor. If the manual jackpot is \$10,000 or more, the preparer of the Request shall be a slot attendant supervisor. The Request shall be, at a minimum, a one-part form or the information required on it maintained in stored data, access to which, prior to use or input, shall be restricted to slot attendants and slot attendant supervisors.

1. Notwithstanding the foregoing or any other provision of this section, a slot attendant may complete a Pouch Payout Slip instead of a Request and pay the winning patron the manual jackpot from imprest funds in a pouch or wallet in accordance with the procedures set forth in N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.40E, if the total amount of the slot machine jackpot is less than \$1,200 and the slot machine is connected to an approved computerized slot monitoring system.

2. Any casino licensee that chooses to use the pouch payout procedures authorized by N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.40E may request the approval of the Commission to use a combined Request/Pouch Payout Slip that satisfies the requirements of (b) below and N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.40E(b)2.

(b) The following information, at a minimum, shall be on the Request or maintained in stored data:

1. The date and time of the jackpot;
2. The asset number of the slot machine on which the jackpot was registered;
3. The winning combination of characters constituting the jackpot;
4. The amount of the jackpot payout awarded pursuant to (b)3 above that was not paid to the winning patron directly by the slot machine;
5. The method of payment requested by the patron (cash, slot tokens, casino check or, if available, gaming chips);
6. The signature or identification code of the preparer; and
7. The following additional signatures or identification codes shall be required if the slot machine or the progressive meter is reset prior to the patron being paid or if payment is made directly to the patron by a slot cashier, master coin bank cashier or general cashier:

i. The signature or identification code of the casino security department member attesting to the characters constituting the jackpot and the amount of the jackpot payout that was not paid to the winning patron directly by the slot machine; and

ii. The signature or identification code of the slot shift manager attesting to the characters constituting the jackpot and the amount of the jackpot payout that was not paid to the winning patron directly by the slot machine when the jackpot amount is \$25,000 or more.

(c) Following preparation, the Request shall be immediately transported by the preparer or the information maintained in stored data shall be available to a slot booth, the master coin bank or the cashiers' cage where it will serve to authorize the preparation of a Jackpot Payout Slip ("Payout") by a slot cashier, master coin bank cashier or general cashier.

(d) If the winning patron will not be paid before the slot machine or progressive meter is reset, the preparer of the Request required by (a) above shall also prepare a Jackpot Payout Receipt ("Receipt"). The Receipt shall be, at a minimum, a two-part form, and shall contain the following information:

1. The date and time of the jackpot;
2. The asset number of the slot machine on which the jackpot was registered;
3. The winning combination of characters constituting the jackpot;
4. The amount of the jackpot payout that was not paid to the winning patron directly by the slot machine or, if the jackpot is an annuity jackpot with a cash payout option offered pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.40B, the face amount of the jackpot displayed on the slot machine or progressive meter or provided by the slot system operator pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.40C, stated in numbers and in words;
5. The signature of the winning patron on the original form only; and
6. The signature of the preparer indicating that the information on the Receipt is correct and agrees with the information on the Request or as maintained in the stored data required by (a) above.

(e) Upon preparation, the Receipt shall be distributed as follows:

1. The original shall be immediately delivered to the slot cashier, master coin bank cashier or general cashier by the preparer or a casino security department member along with the Request if manually generated in accordance with (c) above; and
2. The duplicate shall be immediately presented to the winning patron who shall be required to present the

duplicate Receipt before being paid the jackpot in accordance with the procedures set forth in this section.

(f) Payouts shall be serially prenumbered forms, each series of which shall be used in sequential order, and the series of numbers of all Payouts received by a casino shall be accounted for by employees independent of the cashiers' cage and the slot department. All original and duplicate void Payouts shall be marked "VOID" and shall require the signature of the preparer. Notwithstanding the above, a serially prenumbered combined jackpot payout hopper fill form may be utilized in conjunction with N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.41(b), as approved by the Commission, provided that the combined form shall be used in a manner which otherwise complies with the procedures and requirements established by this section.

(g) For establishments in which Payouts are manually prepared, the following procedures and requirements shall be observed:

1. Each series of Payouts shall be a three-part form, at a minimum, and shall be inserted in a locked dispenser that will permit an individual slip in the series and its copies to be written upon simultaneously while still locked in the dispenser, and that will discharge the original and duplicate while the triplicate remains in a continuous, unbroken form in the dispenser; and

2. Access to the triplicates shall be maintained and controlled at all times by employees responsible for controlling and accounting for the unused supply of Payouts, placing Payouts in the dispensers, and removing from the dispensers each day the triplicates remaining therein. These employees shall have no incompatible functions.

(h) For establishments in which Payouts are computer prepared, each series of Payouts shall be a two-part form, at a minimum, and shall be inserted in a printer that will: simultaneously print an original and a duplicate and store, in a machine-readable form, all information printed on the original and duplicate, other than the serial number of any casino check issued to the patron who won the jackpot for which the slip was prepared; and discharge the original and duplicate. The stored data shall not be susceptible to change or removal by any personnel after preparation of a Payout.

(i) On Payout originals, duplicates, triplicates, or in stored data, the preparer shall record, or if computerized, the printer shall print, at a minimum, the following information:

1. The asset number of the slot machine on which the jackpot was registered;
2. The winning combination of characters constituting the jackpot;
3. The date on which the jackpot occurred;

4. The amount indicated on the Request pursuant to (b)4 above that is to be paid from cashiers' cage, master coin bank or slot booth funds, provided, however, that this amount may, in the casino licensee's discretion, be rounded up to the nearest denomination of coin or token or to the nearest whole dollar as long as any funds paid in excess of the actual amount recorded pursuant to (b)4 above are not deducted from gross revenue and are reported and adjusted by the casino licensee once each month, at a minimum, in a manner approved by the Commission;

5. The method of payment (cash, slot tokens, casino check or gaming chips);

6. The location from which the amount is to be paid; and

7. The signature or, if computer prepared, identification code of the preparer.

(j) The time of preparation of the payment and the serial number of any casino check issued incident to the jackpot payment shall be recorded, at a minimum, on the original and duplicate upon preparation of the Payout.

(k) All cash or slot tokens paid, any casino check issued, or any gaming chips paid in accordance with (q) below to a patron as a result of winning a jackpot shall be:

1. Distributed by the slot cashier, general cashier or master coin bank cashier directly to the patron in accordance with the procedures in (l) below; or

2. Disbursed by a slot cashier, general cashier or master coin bank cashier to:

- i. A slot attendant or slot attendant supervisor, if the manual jackpot is less than \$10,000 or to a slot attendant supervisor if the manual jackpot is \$10,000 or more who shall transport the cash, slot tokens, gaming chips or casino check directly to the patron in accordance with (m) below; or

- ii. A casino security department member who shall transport the cash, slot tokens, gaming chips or casino check to a slot attendant or slot attendant supervisor if the manual jackpot is less than \$10,000 or to a slot attendant supervisor if the manual jackpot is \$10,000 or more for payment to the patron in accordance with (m) below.

(l) Whenever the winning patron is paid directly by the slot cashier, general cashier or master coin bank cashier, the following procedures shall be followed:

1. The cashier shall prepare or generate a Payout in accordance with (i) and (j) above;

2. If a casino security department member has not signed the Request, the cashier shall summon a casino security department member and provide him or her with the Request. The casino security department member shall proceed to the slot machine identified on the Request and shall verify that the winning characters on the slot machine and the amount to be paid match those which appear on the Request and sign the Request. If the jackpot amount is \$25,000 or more, a slot shift manager shall similarly verify that the winning characters of the slot machine and the amount to be paid match those which appear on the Request and sign the Request. The Request shall then be immediately returned to the cashier by the casino security department member;

3. After the cashier determines that all required signatures verifying the characters of the slot machine and the amount to be paid have been placed on the Request, if the amount being paid is less than \$10,000, the cashier shall pay the winning patron in the presence of the casino security department member and the slot attendant or slot attendant supervisor who signed the Request in accordance with this section, or if the amount being paid is \$10,000 or more but less than \$25,000, the cashier shall pay the winning patron in the presence of the casino security department member and the slot attendant supervisor who signed the Request in accordance with this section. If the amount being paid by the cashier is \$25,000 or more, the cashier shall pay the winning patron in the presence of the casino security department member, the slot attendant supervisor, and the slot shift manager who signed the Request in accordance with this section. All casino personnel required by this section to witness the payment shall sign the duplicate Payout attesting to the accuracy of the information on the Payout and the disbursement of the payment to the patron;

4. If a Receipt was issued and all the required verifications of the characters were completed in accordance with (b) above, the cashier shall summon a casino security department member and a slot attendant or slot attendant supervisor if the manual jackpot is less than \$10,000, a casino security department member and slot attendant supervisor if the manual jackpot is \$10,000 or more and if the jackpot is \$25,000 or more, a slot shift manager shall also be summoned. The patron shall be required to present the duplicate Receipt to the cashier and sign it in his or her presence in order to receive payment. The cashier shall compare the duplicate Receipt to the original Receipt and, if in agreement, make the payment to the winning patron. All casino personnel required by this section to witness the payment shall sign the duplicate Payout attesting to the accuracy of the information on the Payout and the disbursement of the payment to the patron;

5. Once payment has been made and all required signatures obtained, the cashier shall give the duplicate Payout to the casino security department member, who shall as expeditiously as possible deposit it into a locked

accounting box at the casino security podium or other location as approved by the Commission; and

6. The cashier shall attach the Request, if applicable, and the original and duplicate Receipt, if applicable, to the original Payout. If the disbursement is made from a slot booth all forms shall be forwarded by the end of the gaming day to the master coin bank for reimbursement. If the disbursement is made from the cashiers' cage, all forms shall be forwarded by the end of the gaming day to the main bank for reimbursement.

(m) Except for a pouch payout made by a slot attendant in accordance with the procedures set forth in N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.40E, whenever a winning patron will be paid by a slot attendant or slot attendant supervisor, the following procedures shall be followed:

1. The slot cashier, general cashier or master coin bank cashier shall prepare or generate a Payout in accordance with (i) or (j) above;

2. The cashier shall disburse the cash, slot tokens, gaming chips or casino check to the slot attendant or slot attendant supervisor. The casino employee receiving the payment shall verify the amount to be paid to the patron and sign the original and duplicate Payout attesting to the accuracy of the information on the Payout and the receipt of the payment from the cashier. The cashier shall retain the original Payout and the duplicate Payout shall be transported with the payment by the casino employee;

3. If a casino security department member has not signed the Request, the slot attendant or slot attendant supervisor shall provide the duplicate Payout to the casino security department member who shall verify that the winning characters of the slot machine and the amount to be paid match those which appear on the duplicate Payout. If the jackpot amount is \$25,000 or more and the slot shift manager has not signed the Request, the slot shift manager shall similarly verify that the winning characters of the slot machine and the amount to be paid match those which appear on the duplicate Payout;

4. Once the verifications required by (m)3 above have been completed, if the payment is less than \$10,000, the slot attendant or slot attendant supervisor shall pay the winning patron in the presence of the casino security department member who verified the winning characters and the amount to be paid, if the payment is \$10,000 or more but less than \$25,000, the payment shall be made by a slot attendant supervisor in the presence of the casino security department member who verified the winning characters and the amount to be paid, and if the payment is \$25,000 or more, the payment shall be made in the presence of the casino security department member and the slot shift manager who verified the winning characters and the amount to be paid. Once the patron has been paid, all casino personnel required by this section to witness the payment shall sign the duplicate Payout attesting to the verification of the characters, the accuracy of

the information on the Payout and the disbursement of the payment to the winning patron;

5. If a Receipt was issued and all the required verifications of the characters were completed in accordance with (b) above, the cashier shall give the slot attendant or slot attendant supervisor the original Receipt along with the duplicate Payout in accordance with (m)2 above to be transported with the payment. The patron shall be required to present the duplicate Receipt to the slot attendant or slot attendant supervisor and sign it in his or her presence in order to receive the payment. The slot attendant or slot attendant supervisor shall compare the duplicate Receipt to the original Receipt and if in agreement make the payment to the winning patron;

6. Once the patron has been paid and all necessary signatures have been obtained on the duplicate Payout in accordance with (m)4 above, a casino security department member shall as expeditiously as possible deposit the duplicate Payout into a locked accounting box at the security podium or other location as approved by the Commission;

7. The slot attendant or slot attendant supervisor shall immediately return the original and duplicate Receipt, if applicable, to the slot booth, cashiers' cage or master coin bank; and

8. The cashier shall attach the Request, if applicable, and the original and duplicate Receipt, if applicable, to the original Payout. If the disbursement is made from a slot booth all forms shall be forwarded by the end of the gaming day to the master coin bank for reimbursement. If the disbursement is made from the cashiers' cage, all forms shall be forwarded by the end of the gaming day to the main bank for reimbursement.

(n) Nothing in this section shall preclude the use of a computerized data storage system, as approved by the Commission, that electronically records the information required on a Request.

(o) At the end of each gaming day, at a minimum, all forms required by this section shall be forwarded as follows:

1. The original Payout with the attached Request, if applicable, and the original and duplicate Receipt, if applicable, shall be forwarded to the accounting department, which, as reasonably practicable after receipt, shall confirm that the information required to appear thereon pursuant to (b), (d) and (i) above agrees with the information required to appear on the triplicate Payout or in stored data pursuant to (i) above; and

2. The duplicate Payout shall be collected from the locked accounting boxes located at the security podium or other approved location by an accounting department employee and returned to the accounting department, which, as reasonably practicable after receipt, shall record the information therefrom on the Slot Win Sheet and shall confirm that the information required to appear on the duplicate Payout pursuant to (i) above agrees with:

i. The meter reading recorded on the Slot Meter Sheet; and

ii. The information required to appear on the triplicate Payout or in stored data pursuant to (i) above.

(p) At the end of each gaming day, at a minimum, all forms generated by the gaming voucher system in accordance with a casino licensee's approved internal controls that support a jackpot payout shall be forwarded to the casino accounting department, which, as reasonably practicable after receipt, shall confirm that the information contained thereon agrees with the information required to appear on the Payout or in stored data in accordance with (i)1, 3 and 4 above.

(q) All gaming chips paid to a patron as a result of winning a jackpot shall be:

1. Distributed or disbursed by a general cashier or slot cashier in accordance with the applicable procedures in (k) above, provided that the cashier shall only use gaming chips that were obtained from patrons in previous exchanges authorized by the rules of the Commission; or

2. Distributed or disbursed by a master coin bank cashier in accordance with the applicable procedures in (k) above, provided that the master coin bank cashier shall only use gaming chips that were received from slot cashiers in previous exchanges authorized by the rules of the Commission.

19:45-1.40A **Jackpot payouts of merchandise or other things of value; cash jackpot payouts offered together with or as an alternative to jackpot payouts of merchandise or other things of value**

(a) This section shall apply to all jackpot payouts of merchandise or other things of value, including all annuity jackpots offered pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.40B, except where such annuity jackpots are specifically exempted herein. If, pursuant to (m) below, a slot machine jackpot offers a winning patron both a cash payout and a payout of merchandise or other thing of value or the option to choose between a cash payout and a payout of merchandise or other thing of value, any cash payout shall be made in accordance with the provisions of N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.40 and any payout of merchandise or other thing of value shall be made in accordance with this section; provided, however, that an annuity jackpot with a cash payout option shall also be subject to the requirements of N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.40B.

(b) Whenever a casino licensee offers any merchandise or thing of value as part of a slot machine payout, such merchandise or thing of value shall not be included in the total of all sums paid out as winnings to patrons for

purposes of determining gross revenue or be included in determining the payout percentage of any slot machine. The cash equivalent value of such merchandise or thing of value shall be determined in accordance with the following requirements:

1. Any merchandise or thing of value of a type sold directly to the public in the normal course of a casino licensee's business shall be recorded at an amount based upon the full retail price normally charged for such item;

2. Any merchandise or thing of value which is of a type not offered for sale to the public in the normal course of a casino licensee's business but which is provided directly to the patron by the casino licensee shall be recorded at an amount based upon the actual cost to the casino licensee of providing such item;

3. Any merchandise or thing of value provided directly or indirectly to the patron on behalf of a casino licensee by a third party not affiliated with the casino licensee shall be recorded at an amount based upon the actual cost to the casino licensee of having the third party provide such item;

4. Any merchandise or thing of value provided directly or indirectly to the patron on behalf of a casino licensee by a third party who is affiliated with the casino licensee shall be recorded by the casino licensee in accordance with the provisions of this section as if the affiliated party were the licensee.

(c) The casino licensee shall retain and make available to the Commission and Division upon request supporting documentation relating to the acquisition and valuation of any merchandise or thing of value to be offered as a payout and shall accumulate the total cash equivalent value and number of such payouts. The supporting documentation shall include a detailed description of the merchandise or thing of value and shall specifically identify which slot machines offer which merchandise or things of value as payouts. If the payout is in the form of an annuity jackpot, the documentation shall include all annuity contracts or treasury instruments purchased pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.40B.

(d) Whenever a patron wins a jackpot which includes any merchandise or thing of value, an accounting representative, with no incompatible functions, shall prepare a Payout Slip ("Slip"). Such Slips shall be serially prenumbered forms, each series of Slips shall be used in sequential order, and the series of numbers of all Slips received by a casino shall be accounted for by employees independent of the cashiers' cage and the slot department. All original and duplicate void Slips shall be marked "Void" and shall require the signature of the preparer.

(e) For establishments in which Slips are manually prepared, the following procedures and requirements shall be observed:

1. Each series of Slips shall be a three-part form, at a minimum, and shall be inserted in a locked dispenser that will permit an individual Slip in the series and its copies to be written upon simultaneously while still locked in the dispenser, and that will discharge the original Slip and a duplicate copy while the triplicate copy remains in a continuous, unbroken form in the dispenser; and

2. Access to the triplicate copy shall be maintained and controlled at all times by employees responsible for controlling and accounting for the unused supply of Slips, placing Slips in the dispensers, and removing from the dispensers each day the triplicate copy remaining therein. These employees shall have no incompatible functions.

(f) For establishments in which Slips are computer prepared, each series of Slips shall be a two-part form, at a minimum, and shall be inserted in a printer that will: simultaneously print an original Slip and duplicate copy; store, in machine readable form, all information printed on those copies; and discharge the original Slip and duplicate copy. The stored data shall not be susceptible to change or removal by any personnel after preparation of a Slip.

(g) On the original and all copies of the Slip, or in stored data, the preparer shall record, at a minimum, the following information:

1. The asset number of the slot machine on which the jackpot was registered;

2. The winning combination of characters constituting the jackpot;

3. The date, shift and time when the jackpot occurred;

4. A description of the merchandise or thing of value won and, unless the jackpot is an annuity jackpot, its cash equivalent value;

5. If the jackpot gives the patron the option to choose between a cash payout and a payout of merchandise or other thing of value pursuant to (m) below, the jackpot selected by the patron and the signature of the patron attesting to his or her selection; provided, however, that for annuity jackpots with a cash payout option, "annuity/cash option" shall be recorded and the additional procedures set forth in N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.40B shall be followed;

6. The time of the Slip's preparation; and

7. The signature or, if computer prepared, identification code of the preparer.

19:45-1.46B Procedures and requirements for a bill changer which can accept coupons

(a) Each bill changer which can accept coupons shall be able to establish the dollar value and validity of each coupon inserted therein by interpreting the coded information which must be contained on the coupon pursuant to (b) below.

(b) In addition to complying with the requirements of N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.46, each coupon which can be accepted by a bill changer shall contain encoded data that identifies the dollar value of the coupon and such other information as the Commission may require. Each coupon shall also contain a unique code or other security measure, which can be interpreted only by the bill changer, to ensure that the coupon is valid.

(c) The methods by which a bill changer and each coupon which can be accepted therein will comply with the requirements of (a) and (b) above shall be submitted to and approved by the Commission before any such bill changer or coupon may be used by a casino licensee.

(d) Unless the slot machine to which the bill changer is attached contains the coupon meters identified in N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.37(e)3 and 19:46-1.26(d), a bill changer which can accept coupons shall be equipped with mechanical, electrical or electronic devices as follows:

1. A "numerical coupon meter" that continuously, automatically and separately counts the total number of all coupons accepted by the bill changer; and
2. A "value coupon meter" that continuously, automatically and separately counts the total dollar value of all coupons accepted by the bill changer.

(e) Each coupon accepted by a bill changer shall be deposited and stored in the bill changer's slot cash storage box. Each such coupon shall be counted as part of the slot cash storage box drop in accordance with the count procedures in N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.33.

(f) Each coupon accepted by a bill changer shall be cancelled in a manner approved by the Commission which shall prevent the acceptance of the cancelled coupon by any bill changer, any automated coupon redemption machine or any other form of authorized redemption. The coupon shall be cancelled by the bill changer immediately upon accep-

tance or, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.33(h), in the count room prior to the conclusion of the count.

19:45-1.47 Keno booths; satellite keno booths; keno lockers; roving keno work stations

(a) Keno gaming operations shall only be conducted in a separate and distinct area approved by the Commission, although a casino licensee may conduct the same keno game or different keno games in separate approved areas. Any area designated for keno gaming activity shall be located:

1. On the casino floor;
2. In a casino simulcasting facility; or
3. In a public keno area in accordance with the provisions of N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.47B.

(b) Any area designated for keno may contain a physical structure known as a keno booth to house the keno writers and to serve as the central location for the following:

1. The custody of the keno booth inventory, including currency, coin, coupons, gaming chips, slot tokens, and forms and documents normally associated with the operation of a keno booth;
2. The exchange by patrons of coupons for currency, coin or keno tickets in conformity with N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.46(j);
3. The receipt of currency, coin, gaming chips, coupons and slot tokens for wagering at the game of keno;
4. The issuance of cash to patrons upon the presentation of a recognized credit or debit card in accordance with N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.25(i);
5. The payment of winning wagers at the game of keno; and
6. Such other functions normally associated with the operation of a keno booth.

(c) The keno booth shall be designed and constructed to provide maximum security for the materials housed therein and the activities performed therein, and shall include the following:

1. Separate work stations which shall include:

i. Manually triggered silent alarm systems connected directly to the monitoring rooms of the closed circuit television system, the security department office and the on-site office of the Division;

ii. A computer terminal which shall be used to issue keno tickets and calculate payouts for winning keno tickets; and

iii. An area for the storage of a keno drawer.

2. A segregated area for the storage of the keno computer equipment. The location and security of the keno computer equipment shall be approved by the Commission. Nothing herein shall preclude a casino licensee from storing its keno computer equipment in another segregated and secure area of the casino hotel facility, provided that the location of and the security measures for such area have been approved by the Commission.

(d) In addition to the requirements in (c) above, a keno booth may contain the following:

1. A segregated and secure area for the storage of locked keno drawers pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.48; and

2. A segregated and secure area, maintained on an imprest basis by the keno supervisor, which may be used to establish opening keno inventories and complete keno fills and keno credits pursuant to the requirements of this chapter.

i. The casino licensee shall submit for review and approval procedures governing how this area will be maintained on an imprest basis. In addition, each keno supervisor shall prepare a count sheet to record the opening and closing balance for their shift which shall be signed by both the incoming and outgoing keno supervisor.

(e) If a keno booth is designed so as to be immediately adjacent to the cashiers' cage or a satellite cage and access to the keno booth is through the cashiers' cage or satellite cage, the casino security department escort otherwise required by N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.48, 1.49 and 1.50 for the transportation of keno drawers and keno fills and credits shall not be required.

(f) A casino licensee may, in its discretion, operate one or more satellite keno booths. All the provisions of this subchapter governing the operation of a keno booth shall apply to a satellite keno booth with the exception of the following:

1. The keno games for which wagers are accepted at a satellite keno booth must be the same keno games for which wagers are accepted at the keno booth;

2. The only keno computer equipment which may be located at a satellite keno booth shall be the computer terminals used by the keno writers to issue keno tickets and calculate payouts of winning keno tickets;

3. A satellite keno booth may not contain a separate area for the storage of currency and coin pursuant to (d) above; and

4. A satellite keno booth may operate without the presence of a keno supervisor; however, a keno writer at a satellite keno booth may not redeem a winning keno ticket for \$1,500 or more unless a keno supervisor is present pursuant to N.J.A.C. 19:47-15.6(b).

(g) A casino licensee may, in its discretion, permit a keno runner to generate and redeem keno tickets from a keno locker located on the casino floor or in the casino simulcasting facility. Each keno locker shall be a fully enclosed structure and shall contain one keno work station. A keno locker shall be closed and locked whenever it is unattended by a keno runner. A keno work station in a keno locker shall include:

1. A manually triggered silent alarm system connected directly to the monitoring rooms of the closed circuit television system, the casino security department office and the on-site office of the Division;

2. A computer terminal which shall be used to issue keno tickets and calculate payouts for winning keno tickets;

3. An area for the storage of one or more keno drawers, which area shall only be used by a keno runner selling or redeeming keno tickets from that keno locker; and

4. A light that is located above the work station and is visible from outside the keno locker, which light shall automatically illuminate whenever the door to the keno locker is open.

(h) A casino licensee may, in its discretion, operate roving keno work stations which contain a keno terminal and a keno drawer. The roving keno work station shall be:

1. Operated by a keno writer in accordance with the rules of this Chapter and N.J.A.C. 19:47; and

2. Operated on the casino floor, in the casino simulcasting facility or in a public keno area in accordance with the provisions of N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.47B; provided, however, if a roving keno work station shall be operated in a public keno area, the keno writer shall receive and return his or her imprest funds and perform all fills and credits in a restricted casino area approved by the Commission for such activity.

19:45-1.47A Keno runners

(a) A casino licensee may employ one or more "keno runners" to assist in the conduct of keno. A keno runner may act as an intermediary between a patron and a keno writer in order to facilitate the placement or redemption of a keno wager. A keno runner may also accept and redeem keno wagers at a keno booth, satellite keno booth or keno locker without the assistance of a keno writer provided that:

1. The keno runner operates out of his or her own keno drawer; and

2. The casino licensee's approved keno system can generate the reports necessary for the accounting and reconciliation of the assets and documents contained in the keno drawer of each keno runner.

(b) A keno runner may, in accordance with internal controls approved by the Commission, carry an imprest fund of currency for the purpose of giving change to patrons who make keno wagers. Such funds may be issued from the keno vault, the main bank or the master coin bank, but shall not be issued by a keno writer.

(c) If a patron wishes to use a keno runner to place a keno wager, the keno runner shall:

1. Require the patron to complete a two-part keno runner request and to present currency, coin, gaming chips, slot tokens or coupons in an amount sufficient to fund the request;

2. Provide a part of the keno runner request to the patron that will identify the patron to the keno wager;

3. Take the part of the keno runner request with the information regarding the wager together with the currency, coin, gaming chips, slot tokens or coupons to a keno writer at a keno work station or to a keno booth, satellite keno booth or keno locker where the keno runner has a keno drawer;

4. Receive the keno ticket or tickets and any change from the keno writer or generate them directly at his or her work station in a keno booth, satellite keno booth or keno locker; and

5. Deliver the keno ticket or tickets to the patron in exchange for the identifying part of the keno runner request, provided that, prior to the exchange, the keno runner shall compare the two parts of the keno runner request to ensure that the ticket is being delivered to the correct patron.

(d) If a patron wishes to use a keno runner to redeem a winning keno ticket, a keno runner shall:

1. Agree to assist the patron only if the winning keno ticket has a value that does not exceed \$500.00;

2. Accept the ticket from the patron in exchange for a one-part keno ticket receipt;

3. Take the winning ticket to a keno writer at a keno work station or to a work station in a keno booth, satellite keno booth or keno locker where the keno runner has a keno drawer; and

4. Receive the proceeds of the ticket from the keno writer or take them from the keno runner's drawer in the keno booth, satellite keno booth or keno locker and deliver them to the patron in exchange for the keno ticket receipt.

(e) Each keno runner shall, in accordance with a casino licensee's approved internal controls, "sign in" prior to the start of each keno game for which the keno runner was authorized to accept keno wagers. This act shall constitute a representation by the keno runner that all wagers accepted for that game have been placed and that corresponding keno tickets have been issued, or that no wagers were accepted for that game. After "signing in," a keno runner shall not accept additional wagers for the game, but may deliver keno tickets to patrons for wagers that were placed prior to the keno runner "signing in."

(f) No keno game for which a keno runner has been authorized to accept wagers shall close until all keno runners assigned to that game have "signed in" in accordance with (e) above.

19:45-1.47B Public keno areas

(a) In addition to conducting keno operations on the casino floor or in a casino simulcasting facility in accordance with the provisions of N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.47, a casino licensee may conduct keno operations in other public areas of the casino hotel ("public keno areas") in accordance with the provisions of this section. Public keno areas shall be approved by the Commission and may include, without limitation, restaurants, lounges and bars, but shall not include qualifying sleeping units or other hotel rooms used for the lodging of guests. An area of the casino hotel that is leased to an on-premise shopkeeper may be a public keno area provided that the lessee holds a casino service industry license.

(b) Keno tickets shall only be issued and redeemed in public keno areas by a keno writer or keno runner operating in accordance with the provisions of N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.47 or 1.47A.

(c) An application to conduct keno operations in a public keno area pursuant to this section shall be made in accor-

dance with the provisions of N.J.A.C. 19:43-7.6. Any such application shall, at a minimum, describe:

1. The public areas where keno tickets shall be sold and redeemed;
2. The method or methods that shall be used to sell and redeem keno tickets; and
3. If keno runners shall be used, the location of the keno work stations from which the keno runners shall purchase and redeem keno tickets and the routes that shall be used to get to and from such keno work stations in the public keno area or to and from the perimeter of the casino floor or casino simulcasting facility.

19:45-1.48 Accounting controls for the operation of keno booths, keno lockers and keno work stations

(a) Whenever a keno work station is opened for gaming, the keno work station shall commence operation with an amount of currency and coin known as the "keno inventory." The amount of the keno inventory shall be determined by the casino licensee, except that the keno inventory shall not exceed \$1,500 for a keno writer working from a roving keno work station, a keno runner working from a keno locker, and a keno writer or keno runner working from a satellite keno booth located in a public keno area. No casino licensee shall cause or permit currency, coin or gaming chips to be added to, or removed from, the keno inventory during the gaming day except:

1. In exchange for a keno ticket purchased by a patron;
2. In order to make change for a patron buying a keno ticket;
3. In receipt of a coupon from a patron in exchange for currency, coin or a keno ticket in conformity with N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.46(j);
4. In payment of a winning or voided keno ticket in conformity with the provisions of N.J.A.C. 19:47-15.6; or
5. In conformity with the keno fill and keno credit procedures described in N.J.A.C. 19:45-1.49 and 1.50.

(b) Whenever a keno work station is opened for gaming activity, the keno inventory shall be stored in a lockable container known as a "keno drawer." For a given shift, each keno writer and each keno runner authorized to accept and redeem keno wagers shall have his or her own keno drawer and no other person shall operate out of the drawer of that keno writer or keno runner. Nothing herein shall preclude a keno writer or keno runner from working at multiple keno work stations throughout the gaming day provided the keno writer or keno runner appropriately logs on and off each computer terminal and continues to operate from his or her assigned keno drawer.

(c) Keno drawers shall be prepared by a main bank cashier, master coin bank cashier, cage supervisor or keno supervisor.

(d) The keys to the keno drawers containing the keno inventories shall be maintained and controlled in a secure place approved by the Commission. Each key shall be signed-in and signed-out in accordance with procedures approved by the Commission.

(e) Immediately prior to opening a keno work station for gaming, each keno writer or keno runner assigned to a work station shall, if the drawer is not already located at that keno work station, transport the keno drawer, in the presence of a casino security department member, to the appropriate keno work station where the drawer shall be counted in accordance with the requirements of (h) below. If the keno writer or keno runner is assigned to a keno work station in a keno booth or satellite keno booth where his or her drawer is already located, the keno writer or keno runner shall count his or her drawer at the keno work station in accordance with the requirements of (h) below. Each keno runner assigned to work from a keno locker shall, prior to opening his or her work station for gaming, count his or her drawer in accordance with the requirements of (h) below at the keno booth, cashier's cage or other restricted casino area approved by the Commission.

(f) Nothing in this section shall preclude a casino licensee from developing approved internal control procedures pursuant to which the keno drawers for a shift are delivered to the keno booth by a member of the casino security department, provided the casino security department does not have access to the keys to the keno drawers.

(g) Each keno drawer which is prepared shall contain a form in addition to the currency and coin. The form shall be, at a minimum, a two-part form with the preparer of the drawer maintaining the duplicate as a balancing item and the original being sent with the currency and coin. The preparer shall record, at a minimum, the following information on the original and duplicate form:

1. The date and time of preparation of the keno drawer;
2. The keno work station location number;
3. The total amount of each denomination of currency and coin to be distributed;
4. The total amount of all denominations of currency and coin to be distributed; and
5. The signature of the preparer.

(h) The keno writer or keno runner shall count the contents of the drawer in the presence of a keno supervisor or a supervisor thereof and shall assure the accurate comparison of the count to the figures recorded on the form referenced in (g) above.
