To His Excellency George C. Ludlow, Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

I have the honor to transmit herewith my report, agreeably to the provisions of an act entitled "An act for the organization of the National Guard of New Jersey," containing a return of the number and condition of the arms and equipments belonging to the State, the number loaned out, in whose hands, and whether they remain under proper responsibilities: including in said return all camp equipage in my charge. The subjects are referred to under appropriate headings. The daily routine business of the office, during the year, has been transacted as promptly, considering the nature of the business, as possible.

GENERAL FACTS.

Number of men uniformed in the National Guard, two thousand seven hundred and forty-five (2,745).

Number of new uniforms furnished during the year, one hundred and sixty-one (161).

Number of great coats loaned to the National Guard during the year, two thousand one hundred and seven (2,107).

Number of blankets loaned to the National Guard during the year, three hundred and sixty (360).

Number of great coats in the Arsenal, seven hundred and ninety (790).

Number of blankets in the Arsenal, three thousand three hundred and fifteen (3,315).

Number of cannons serviceable belonging to the State, including Gatling guns, howitzers and Billingham and Requa batteries, fifty-eight (58). Also, the following unserviceable: Five (5) bronze guns, 3½ inch: two (2) bronze guns, French, six-pounders; two (2) bronze guns, English, four-pounders; and five (5) iron guns, six-pounders.

Number of arms in hands of National Guard, two thousand seven hundred and sixty-five (2,765).

Number of arms in Arsenal, fourteen thousand nine hundred and eighty-three (14,983).

General condition of arms and equipments in hands of National Guard, good.

Number of rounds of ammunition issued for rifle practice, seventy thousand seven hundred and forty (70,740).

Number of rounds expended, fifty-three thousand seven hundred and one (53,701).

Cost of rifle practice, seven thousand seven hundred and seventy-nine dollars and seventy-eight cents (\$7,779.78), exclusive of cost of ammunition fabricated at the State Arsenal.

Cost of rifle practice during the year 1881, seven thousand two hundred and fifty-eight dollars and fifty-nine cents (\$7,258.59).

Expenses of National Guard during the year 1882, seventy thousand six hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$70,692.22), less a credit of one thousand four hundred and thirty-nine dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$1,439.39), proceeds of sales of stores, &c., deposited with the State Treasurer, making the actual expense to the State sixty-nine thousand two hundred and fifty-two dollars and eighty-three cents (\$69,252.83).

Expenses of National Guard during the year 1881, seventy-three thousand five hundred and fifteen dollars and twenty-two cents (\$73,515.22).

Cost of uniforms during the year 1882, three hundred and sixteen dollars and ten cents (\$316.10).

Cost of uniforms during the year 1881, seventeen thousand three hundred and seventy-seven dollars and six cents (\$17,377.06).

Number of marksmen's badges furnished during the year, three hundred and sixty (360).

RECEIPTS FROM UNITED STATES.

The property received from the Ordnance Department of the United States, charged to the quota of this State under the law of 1808, for arming and equipping the militia of the several States, consists of the following:

These issues leave eight thousand three hundred and thirty-four

dollars and seventeen cents (\$8,334.17), subject to the requisition of the State.

THE NATIONAL GUARD.

The National Guard continues to receive the fostering care of the State. Its efficiency is a powerful motor in the hands of the civil authorities for the preservation of peace and good order, and for the suppression of all riots and turbulence of whatever character. Its good conduct and appointments are evinced in every duty it is called to perform. At the close of the last year there had been recruited, armed and equipped, under authority of the acts of the Legislature for the organization of the National Guard, and the supplements thereto, forty-nine (49) companies of infantry, organized into seven (7) regiments and two (2) battalions, and one (1) battery of artillery and two (2) Gatling gun companies. During the year just passed two (2) of these companies and the battery of artillery have been disbanded, for the reason that they had become inefficient, and their organization was "detrimental to the best interests of the National Guard." An additional company of infantry has been organized, armed and equipped. At this date the State troops are composed of forty-eight (48) companies of infantry and two (2) Gatling gun companies, all officered by men of intelligence, integrity and good moral character. Its power is not in numbers, but in its strict discipline and *esprit du corps*. All are armed with the Springfield rifle, breech-loader, calibre .45, the best and most improved arm known to the service, and equipped with the new regulation accoutrements, with the exception of two (2) companies which will be supplied during the coming month. The entire division, with the exception of two (2) regiments, has been furnished with the new regulation service uniforms, under the act of March 10th, 1880. The expenses of the National Guard have been somewhat increased in the previous two years by the furnishing of uniforms and accoutrements. It is estimated that the expense will be considerably reduced in the future by reason of their having been furnished. The expenses this year are less than those of the year 1881.

You will observe that the expenses of the year are four thousand two hundred and sixty-two dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$4,262.39) less than the previous year.

At the date of my last annual report this department was engaged in receiving stores from the special battalion on duty at the celebration at Yorktown, Virginia. These stores were ordered returned by Paragraph V., General Orders No. 15, Headquarters National Guard, November 1st, 1881, which reads as follows: "The overcoats, blankets, helmets, knapsacks, haversacks, canteens and other stores issued from the Quartermaster General's Department, in connection with the equipping of the battalion, will be returned to the State Arsenal, at Trenton, without delay." The prosecution of this work has necessi-

tated the writing of a large number of letters by the clerks in this office. The stores came in slowly. The property lost during the service consists of the following :

Annual returns have been received from all the companies, reporting generally the good condition of the arms and equipments. All the companies were requested early in August to make the returns on the first of October, in order that the condition of the arms and accoutrements in their possession could be stated in my report, which is required to be in your hands on the fifteenth of November. The companies did not respond as promptly as was desired. An abstract of these returns will be found in the appendix.

There will also be found a statement, in detail, of the number and kind of ordnance and ordnance stores, furnished by the State to each regiment, battalion and company of the National Guard, remaining charged against those organizations.

DISBANDED ORGANIZATIONS.

The order of the Division Commander, disbanding Battery A, Company B, Third Regiment, and Company A, Ninth Regiment, directed that "the Quartermaster's Department will immediately take charge of all property belonging to the State, now in possession of the above-named companies." In accordance with this order, the bonded officers were required to forward all stores in their possession to the Arsenal at once, and the Military Storekeeper was directed to proceed to the company headquarters and have the property returned. A considerable portion of it could not be recovered and is lost to the State. The officers had become careless and indifferent, and the men were not held under proper control. The officers and securities on the bonds have been notified of the deficiencies in the respective returns, and demands have been made upon them for a settlement thereof. These organizations were uniformed and quartered from money furnished by the State, disbursed by the Brigade and Regimental Paymasters. In the case of Company B, Third Regiment, the uniforms were furnished by the State, under the act of March 10th, 1880. All of them that could be found were returned and put in good order and subsequently re-issued to the new Company E, Third Regiment.

Amongst the property in the possession of the battery was found an armory in the town of Union, erected and paid for from funds furnished by the State. Under the construction of the law, as given by the Attorney General, August 25th, 1875, it became my duty to

take possession of the building. It was advertised and sold at public sale on the 15th of March by James G. Morgan, auctioneer, at fair consideration, and the net proceeds, amounting to two hundred and twenty dollars and twenty-five cents (\$220.25), have been deposited with the State Treasurer. The expenses of the sale were forty-four dollars and seventy-five cents (\$44.75), as follows:

making the total amount of the sale two hundred and sixty-five dollars (\$265.00).

There was sufficient funds in the treasury of the brigade, which belonged to the battery, to liquidate the outstanding debts incurred mainly for uniforms. It is believed that all the just debts, after being audited and approved by me, were paid from this money by the Brigade Paymaster. The bills were for the new uniforms of the battery, which were furnished by a firm in New York, under orders by the commandant and other officers, in October and November last, just previous to the disbandment, and are now in the Arsenal.

EXPENSES OF THE NATIONAL GUARD.

By the following statement you will observe the total expenditures on militia account for the year are sixty-nine thousand two hundred and fifty-two dollars and eighty-three cents (\$69,252.83), of which nineteen thousand six hundred and thirty-three dollars and ninety-three cents (\$19,633.93) is chargeable to the purchase of great coats, blankets, helmets, camp cots, stools, flags, drums, &c., now in stock for use of the National Guard. Twenty-seven thousand three hundred and sixty-four dollars and twenty-five cents (\$27,364.25) is for appropriation in lieu of armory rent by act of the Legislature, paid by the Comptroller; three hundred and sixteen dollars and ten cents (\$316.10) paid for new uniforms; one thousand five hundred and fifty-eight dollars and forty-one cents (\$1,558.41) for repairs of Arsenal; five thousand two hundred and ninety-one dollars and thirty-two cents (\$5,291.32) for rent of rifle ranges, and the balance, fourteen thousand seven hundred and forty-nine dollars and forty-four cents (\$14,749.44) is for current expenses of the National Guard, including rifle practice. The total expenses of the year are less than those of the year 1881, four thousand two hundred and sixty-two dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$4,262.39).

WINNERS OF TROPHIES IN 1880.

In June, 1880, the then General Inspector of Rifle Practice issued a circular order offering certain prizes in military matches. No action was taken in the matter of awarding and furnishing the trophies until January of the present year, when the State Military Board addressed your Excellency a communication, of which the following is a copy :

JANUARY 24TH, 1882.

GOVERNOR—The application of Major Isaac R. Denman and others for the awards won by them under circular orders of the General Inspector of Rifle Practice, June, 1880, having been referred to the State Military Board, they do hereby recommend, in consideration of the fact that the contestants paid their entrance fees and contested the matches in good faith, that the awards be made in pursuance of said order, and that the Quartermaster General be authorized to procure the trophies of the values designated in said circular, and present the same in the name of the Governor of this State without unnecessary delay.

RENT OF RIFLE RANGES.

The amount paid during the year on account of rent of rifle ranges is five thousand two hundred and ninety-one dollars and thirty-two cents (\$5,291.32). Of this amount three thousand dollars (\$3,000) was paid to the New Jersey State Rifle Association for rent of Brinton Range, and two thousand two hundred and ninety-one dollars and thirty-two cents (\$2,291.32) was a balance due the Stockton Rifle Range Association for the year 1881.

REPORTS OF SURGEONS.

The following abstract of the reports of Surgeons of the National Guard, as to the condition of surgical instruments in their possession, is submitted:

Col. Edward L. Welling, Surgeon-in-Chief. "In good order, and ready at any time for use when required."

Lieut. Col. George W. Terriberry, Surgeon First Brigade. "All in good condition. The needles were lost at the operation of Private Disbrow, Yorktown. Thread (silk) and wire for sutures were all used up in the operation. The case needs thread, both wires (silver)

and silk, also needles. The case contains all the instruments, which are in excellent condition."

Lieut. Col. Franklin Gauntt, Surgeon Second Brigade. "Every instrument, box and case is in good condition and ready for use."

Major Aaron K. Baldwin, Surgeon First Regiment. "The instruments are in perfect order. The following were used up or lost in the service: one pair scissors, two silver probes, wire, needles, ligature silk."

Third Regiment. None on hand.

Fourth Regiment. One (1) medicine chest.

Major Herman C. Bleyle, Surgeon Fifth Regiment. Condition—"good."

Sixth Regiment. Medicine chest returned and instruments paid for upon resignation of Surgeon.

Major George H. Larison, Surgeon Seventh Regiment. No report. Resignation of Surgeon received October 17th, 1882, and stores ordered returned.

Ninth Regiment and First Battalion. None on hand.

Second Battalion, Major Melancthon S. Ayers, Surgeon. "Each surgical instrument is in good condition, except the small razor, which is slightly nicked. Only one instrument lost, viz., silver probe."

The above articles expended in the service, as well as the articles unavoidably lost and properly accounted for, will be replaced upon requisition in the usual form, and articles not serviceable will be ordered returned to this office without delay and put in serviceable condition.

CONDEMNED STORES.

There remains on hand at the Arsenal a large quantity of ordnance and ordnance stores and clothing, camp and garrison equipage and Quartermaster stores, unserviceable, that should be condemned by a Board and sold in the usual way.

ACCOUNTS OF OFFICERS SETTLED BY AFFIDAVITS.

Considerable attention has been given to this matter during the year, and a large number of affidavits have been received from former

officers of disbanded as well as existing companies. The correspondence on the subject has been large and voluminous. Before the affidavits are accepted and the property charged off, they must be submitted to your Excellency for consideration and approval. The accounts of officers of the Eighth Regiment (colored), disbanded in 1877, were in a bad condition; but generally, satisfactory affidavits have been received from a majority of the companies. These have been procured only by continuous reminders and constant urging.

SPECIAL ISSUES TO NATIONAL GUARD.

The following issues have been made to the National Guard during the year, upon loans for temporary purposes :

November 23d, 1881. To Col. Elihu H. Ropes, Third Regiment, three hundred and fifty (350) cavalry great coats, for parade on Thanksgiving Day.

January 26th, 1882. To Capt. William H. Stansbury, Company B, Sixth Regiment, seventy-five (75) cavalry great coats, for funeral of Col. Angeroth.

February 17th and 20th. To Capt. John H. Platt, Gatling Gun Company B, and Capt. George B. Fielder, Company D, Fourth Regiment, one hundred and ten (110) cavalry great coats, for parade on Washington's Birthday. This company of the Fourth Regiment, together with Company B, Seventh Regiment, made a short parade in Trenton, in the afternoon of February 22d.

May 17th and 19th. To Major Joseph W. Congdon, First Battalion, one hundred and thirty-five (135) helmets and one hundred and twenty (120) knapsacks, for parade in New York on Decoration Day.

June 13th. To organizations of the First Brigade, nine hundred (900) canvas haversacks, for field day at Santiago Park.

July 19th. To Capt. Frederick A. Apelles, Company A, Fourth Regiment, sixty (60) knapsacks, sixty (60) pairs red blankets, sixty (60) great coats, sixty (60) helmets, seventy-five (75) camp cots, forty-one (41) tents, thirty-eight (38) washbasins, etc., for an Encampment at Asbury Park.

August 11th. To Capt. Charles B. Champlin, Company E, First Regiment, forty (40) knapsacks, seventy (70) pairs red blankets, thirty-seven (37) tents, etc., for an encampment at Asbury Park.

September 6th. To Capt. George W. Smith, Company H, Sixth Regiment, fifty (50) helmets, fifty (50) great coats, fifty (50) pairs red blankets, fifty (50) knapsacks and fifty (50) haversacks, for trip to Baltimore Oriole.

October 16th. To Capt. Addison Thomas, Company B, Second Battalion, forty (40) cavalry great coats, for rifle practice at Brinton Range.

October 18th, 20th, 21st, 23d, 24th, 25th and 26th. To organizations of Second Brigade, one thousand four hundred and twenty-one (1,421) great coats, for Bi-Centennial parade in Philadelphia.

A statement of the issues of clothing, camp and garrison equipage and Quartermaster stores, will be found in Exhibit I. of the appendix.

ENCAMPMENTS.

Special encampments, without expense to the State, have taken place during the year as follows: Company A, Fourth Regiment, at Asbury Park, from July 22d to 29th, inclusive, under command of Captain Frederick A. Apelles, and Company E, First Regiment, under

command of Captain Charles B. Champlin, at Asbury Park, from August 14th to 18th. The necessary clothing and camp and garrison equipage was furnished these encampments by your order, and promptly returned in fair condition. No encampment of the Guard has been held during the year.

BRIGADE PARADES.

The annual field-day of the First Brigade took place June 15th, at West Rutherford, on the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad, about ten miles from New York City. The place selected for the maneuvers was Santiago Park, a large tract lying west of the railroad, and bordered on the north by the Passaic river. The brigade consists of the First Regiment (Newark), Colonel Edward A. Campbell; Fourth Regiment (Jersey City and Passaic), Colonel Dudley S. Steele; Fifth Regiment (Newark), Colonel Levi R. Barnard; Ninth Regiment (Hoboken), Colonel B. F. Hart; First Battalion (Paterson), Major Joseph W. Congdon, and Second Battalion (Bergen county), Major J. V. Moore. For the purpose of a sham battle the troops were divided into two bodies. The troops presented a creditable appearance and were well handled. The only casualty was to Private William E. Meller, of Paterson, a member of Company B, First Battalion, who was shot in the leg by the careless discharge of a comrade's gun, the blank cartridge making a painful wound, from the effects of which he died, June 27th, 1882. Haversacks, transportation and thirty-two thousand (32,000) rounds of blank ammunition were furnished by this department for the field-day.

October 27th was the last day of the exercises of the Bi-Centennial Anniversary of the landing of William Penn at Philadelphia. The military and veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic made up a body of men said to be fifteen thousand strong. The parade was participated in by the Second Brigade of this State. The brigade consists of the Third Regiment, Colonel Elihu H. Ropes; Sixth Regiment, Colonel William H. Cooper; Seventh Regiment, Colonel Richard A. Donnelly, and Gatling Gun Company B, Captain John H. Platt. Gatling Gun Company A, under the command of Brevet Brigadier General J. Madison Drake, was temporarily attached to the brigade for the purpose of joining in the parade. The marching generally was excellent, and the New Jersey troops, particularly, were greeted with merited applause. The troops were promptly on hand at their various stations for transportation, but, owing to an accident on the Pennsylvania Railroad, they did not arrive in Camden as pre-arranged. The Third and Seventh Regiment were forwarded to Kensington instead of Camden. The Sixth being at Camden, considerable time was lost in order to bring the different parts of the brigade together to enable them to join in the parade. The delay in consequence of the accident was unavoidable, deranged the whole plan and produced great

confusion. They were unable to join in the parade until after eleven (11) A. M., at Market street, after the procession had taken up the line of march, thereby throwing the New Jersey troops in the rear.

The officers and men of the brigade know that promptness is one of the duties of a soldier, which has generally been observed whenever the brigade has been called upon for the performance of duty. Great coats and transportation were furnished by this department for the parade. The total issue of great coats for this service numbered one thousand four hundred and twenty-one (1,421), all of which are being returned as rapidly as possible to the State Arsenal. This issue will account for the small number on hand, as reported in the appendix. It is expected that all will be returned previous to the first of December.

SALES AND AMOUNTS RECEIVED FOR LOSSES AND DAMAGES.

The amount in my hands on this account at the date of my last annual report was five hundred and seventeen dollars and fifteen cents (\$517.15). The amount received during the year was nine hundred and twenty-four dollars and nineteen cents (\$924.19), making a total of one thousand four hundred and forty-one dollars and thirty-four cents (\$1,441.34). This amount has been deposited with the State Treasurer, less the sum of one dollar and ninety-five cents (\$1.95) deducted for shells returned and paid for.

UNIFORMS.

The uniforms issued during the year to the Second Battalion were made and paid for in the year 1881. The amount paid this year on account of uniforms was for a small balance due and the purchase of chevrons. In making the stoppages against the annual appropriations the question arose, in the case of the First Battalion, whether an organization mustered into the service of the State subsequent to the approval of the act authorizing the furnishing of uniforms at one-half the cost price, the State paying the full contract price and deducting one-half from the appropriation, was entitled to benefits and privileges of that act? This question was submitted to the Attorney General in August, who gave an opinion as follows:

The number of uniforms issued to the Second Battalion during the year was one hundred and sixty-one (161).

GREAT COATS.

A contract was made early in the year with Mr. William D. Cowan, of Newark, for an additional supply of great coats. Under this contract he furnished six hundred and eighty-three (683), which, with those furnished in the year 1881, makes a total of one thousand three hundred and ninety-nine (1,399).

ARMS LOANED TO SCHOOLS AND ACADEMIES.

The total number of arms in possession of schools and academies, issued under the law and by authority of the Commander-in-Chief, is three hundred and sixty (360). Two issues have been made this year. The institutions of learning against which these arms are charged, and the number in each are as follows:

SALUTES.

The usual amount of ammunition has been supplied to the Washington Headquarters Association, at Morristown, for firing salutes during the year. The salutes fired at Trenton during the year have been: February 22d, at the State House grounds by authority of the following resolution of the House of Assembly, adopted February 2d: "*Resolved*, That the Quartermaster General be directed to fire a salute of thirty-eight guns upon the grounds of the State Capitol, at the hour of twelve o'clock, noon;" July 4th, a morning and evening gun and national salute.

WASHINGTON CONTINENTAL GUARDS OF PRINCETON.

The arms of this independent organization, issued by authority of a concurrent resolution of the Legislature, passed in 1876, were ordered returned early in the year, the commandant refusing to give the bond required by a resolution passed in 1881. No attention being paid to the demands of this office, it became necessary to send the Military Storekeeper of the Arsenal to Princeton to collect the property and return it. A considerable portion of the stores were received at the Arsenal November 29th, 1881, and February 13th, 1882. The value of the articles not returned amounts to seventy-four dollars and fifteen cents (\$74.15), to which should be added seven dollars (\$7), for the services and expenses of the Storekeeper and assistant, making a total charge against the organization of eighty-one dollars and fifteen cents (\$81.15). The officers of the company have submitted an affidavit as to the loss of these stores, in which they ask to be relieved of charges for the articles lost in the service mentioned therein. There is no authority by law or resolution which allows this department to grant the relief asked for, and the subject is one in which legislative action is required.

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC AND VETERAN ASSOCIATIONS.

The issues to Posts of the Grand Army of the Republic and Veteran Associations, under the act concerning veteran associations, approved February 27th, 1879, during the year has been as follows:

Major Anderson Post, No. 54, forty (40) muskets and accoutrements.

Dahlgren Post, No. 25, one (1) gun and implements.

T. M. K. Lee, Jr., Post, No. 5, twenty (20) muskets and accoutrements.

C. K. Hall Post, No. 4, seventy-five (75) tents and camp equipage, for an encampment. The stores issued to this Post were promptly returned and all losses and damages made good.

Jefferson Light Guards, Perth Amboy, two issues, seventy-five (75) muskets and accoutrements, and fifty (50) muskets and accoutrements. This property has been returned to the Arsenal, and the loss paid for.

LOAN OF BATTLE FLAGS.

By virtue of the concurrent resolution of the Legislature of 1880, colors were loaned for the following stated occasions:

Colors of the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Tenth and Fifteenth Regiments, Infantry, and Battery A, Artillery, on the occasion of the Reunion of the First New Jersey Brigade, First Division, Sixth Corps, at Camden, June 28th, 1882.

Colors of the Fifteenth Regiment, Infantry, on the occasion of the Annual Reunion of the Association of that regiment, at Morristown, August 17th, 1882.

Colors of the First and Second Cavalry, on the occasion of the Annual Reunion of those regiments, at Princeton, September 7th, 1882.

Colors of the Fourteenth Regiment, Infantry, on the occasion of the Annual Reunion of that regiment, at Jamesburg, September 19th, 1882.

STATE WAR CLAIMS.

The claims of the State against the United States for expenses incurred on account of her troops mustered into the service of the United States, remain in the same condition as at the date of my last annual report. An accurate account of the entire expenditure on war account has been kept by the assistants in this office, and also a credit and debit account with the United States Government, for all bills presented and paid.

STATE ARSENAL.

The expenses of the State Arsenal during the year have been one thousand five hundred and fifty-eight dollars and forty-one cents (\$1,558.41), an increase over the year 1881 of five hundred and eighty-one dollars and sixty-three cents (\$581.63). The principal portions of these expenditures are embraced in the contract for building a new cannon shed, six hundred and fifty-four dollars and ninety cents (\$654.90), which was rendered necessary by the removal of ordnance stores from the Soldiers' Children's Home; and paints and materials and painting roof and buildings, four hundred and one dollar and seventy-six cents (\$401.76).

In each successive year the expenses of the repairs at the State Arsenal continue to increase by reason of the natural decay and dilapidation of the buildings.

Some of the buildings were constructed over a hundred years ago, and occupied for a State Prison until 1837, when, upon the completion of the new prison and the removal of the prisoners thereto, they were assigned, by an act of the Legislature, for the purposes of a State Arsenal. They will require, during the coming year, considerable repairs.

I beg to call your attention to what I said in my annual report of 1880, as to the dilapidated condition of the present Arsenal, and the necessity of the building of a new one, designed and constructed with the essential requirements of an arsenal.

It is believed that it would be economy, instead of attempting to repair and remodel the present buildings, to erect a new arsenal upon some suitable location with more ground, where it could be perma-

ment and not likely to be encroached upon by any improvement or enlargement of the State Prison, which seems likely in the near future, utilizing the old materials of the present buildings so far as they might be found fit or useful for the purpose.

It would be a useless expense and a waste of money to attempt to remodel the present buildings in any way, so as to make them convenient or safe for an arsenal, with a view to permanent improvement. At best it could only be repaired to meet present demands, and would last but a few years.

The buildings are no longer fit for occupancy, and are positively dangerous, and there is great need of immediate repairs.

I have obtained from a practical builder an estimate of the expenses, for repairs and alterations, of the different buildings necessary to place them in good condition, which includes only such as are absolutely necessary for present purposes, leaving out any expenditure for alterations for mere convenience or ornamentation, and are, in detail, as follows:

The machine shop requires new roof, box cornice and window-frames, sash and doors, and new floors, for first and second stories, and ceilings. Estimated cost, one thousand one hundred and forty-six dollars (\$1,146).

The brick building will require new roof, gutters and cornice, and ceilings for first, second and third stories; girders strengthened and cased; side walls furred and plastered; all doors and windows to be repaired, and new elevator; new work painted. Estimated cost, four thousand six hundred and eighty dollars (\$4,680).

Stone building, part of which is in three stories and the balance in two, will require new joist and floors throughout, making three stories on the same level; new window-frames, sash and doors; new roof and cornice. Estimated cost, four thousand dollars (\$4,000).

The dwelling-house and offices will require new ceilings and side walls plastered, and new work painted throughout. Five hundred dollars (\$500).

The exterior walls repaired and pointed and coping reset, and new entrance gates. Estimated cost, three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350).

Total estimated expenditure necessary for the purpose amounts to eleven thousand and seventy-six dollars (\$11,076).

SOLDIERS' CHILDREN'S HOME

The expenditures on account of this building are less than those of 1881, one thousand four hundred and fifty-five dollars and twenty-five cents (\$1,455.25), the amount paid in the year 1882 being nine hundred and twenty-six dollars and thirty-two cents (\$926.32). Of this amount the sum of three hundred and thirty-nine dollars and eighty-one cents (\$339.81) was expended for fuel and gas. Two

hundred dollars (§200) was paid for re-insuring the building, the policies having expired in March. At the last session of the Legislature an act was passed appointing commissioners to convert the building into an institution for the deaf and dumb. The property was turned over to them in April, and this department relieved from the further care of the premises.

ACTING PAYMASTER GENERAL'S ACCOUNT.

The state of this fund is the same as at the date of my last report, namely, a balance of one hundred and fourteen dollars (§114). Eighteen men remain unpaid, the amount due them being one hundred and eighty-nine dollars (§189). These men have never made claim for the amount due them, and they cannot be reached by this department, as their residences are unknown.
