TO THE GOVERNOR AND LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY:

Ever since its inception and at frequent intervals the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control has issued official bulletins which contain complete and detailed reports of the rulings, decisions and activities of the Department and no useful purpose would be served by restating or summarizing their contents here. However, brief comments with respect to several significant trends in administration may not be amiss.

I

When Repeal first became effective, the belief was prevalent that the liquor industry afforded opportunity for quick and easy profits. This resulted in the early establishment of many wholesalers and a very large number of retailers. The aggregate of wholesalers has since been materially reduced. The total of retailers has remained substantially constant. Both of them have suffered from the economic ravages of indiscriminate, short-sighted price cutting. True, the selfish interest of the consumer is gratified when these "price wars" intermittently occur, but it is to the public interest that disturbing elements and resulting temptations should be eliminated and the industry stabilized rather than ruptured. The tie-up between price disruptions on the one hand, and practices unduly designed to increase the consumption of alcoholic beverages on the other hand, is sensed and probably exists, although not legally demonstrable.

Consideration, therefore, might well be given to the thought of implementing the experimental Fair Trade laws, now in the studio stage. Control of prices, as such, are not within the purview of the Control Act and hence not within the jurisdiction of this Department. A new provision, however, to the effect that a conviction for violation of the Fair Trade Act shall be cause for the State Commissioner to revoke or suspend the liquor license would afford, I believe, a wholesome measure of much needed economic relief.

Such a measure would affect, of course, only particular brands which come under the Fair Trade laws, but, generally speaking, it is those items, widely if not nationally advertised, which are usually utilized as loss leaders to draw the crowds. This would still allow wide latitude and a fair field for healthy competition. The administration of the Fair Trade Act would remain where it is now lodged but certifications of adjudicated violations would result in the institution of disciplinary proceedings by the very Department which is specifically charged with the control of liquor licensees. Revocation or suspension of the license would hit offenders in the most vulnerable spot, and bring home to them the realization that the continuance of their privilege depends upon obedience, not only to the alcoholic beverage law as such, but also to every other law which affects their conduct as licensees.

II

The Control Act authorizes appeals to the State Department by persons who consider themselves aggrieved by determinations of municipal officials in their administration of the Act.

Such appeals have been taken with consistent frequency - 708 in all having been filed through the close of the fiscal year ended last June. There has, however, been a decreasing proportion of reversals and during the past fiscal year there were only 50 unconditional reversals out of a total of 185 appeals filed. Legitimate local sentiment always receives respect. Prohibition effectively taught us the pitfalls of a contrary position. Municipal determinations are never upset unless arbitrary, discriminatory or unreasonable.

### III

There has been a gratifying tendency by local license issuing authorities to cooperate with the State Department in the administration of discipline to offending licensees. Evidence of a violation by a retail licensee is, in general, transmitted by the Department to the respective municipal authorities for local disposition and, on determination of guilt, for the imposition of appropriate punishment. During the past fiscal year 345 cases were so certified. This has been done in the belief that discipline should be administered by the same body which was responsible for the issuance of the license.

The results, on the whole, are increasingly satisfactory. See Schedule G infra. The principle is working out. Licensees in most municipalities realize that the authorities mean business. Vague dismissals "for lack of evidence" and other devices of ancient vintage for letting off favored offenders are passing out, some by example set, some by dint of exhortation. So, severity of penalties has increased to the point that in most cases they now amount to a real deterrent. In a few cases it has become necessary for the Department itself to handle these disciplinary matters for a while because of the failure of local issuing authorities to discharge their full duty. It has been necessary to give warnings to some municipalities. In several, the admonition has borne fruit. In many cases where supine penalties had been criticized, the issuing authority has risen to the occasion, turned over-sentimentality about face and thereafter coordinated in such manner as to command respect.

### IV

Substantial steps have been taken to bring all persons connected with the liquor industry, as well as the licensees themselves, within the direct supervision of the State Department. Thus, all solicitors employed by State licensees have been required to obtain individual permits. In conjunction with their applications, their fingerprints have been taken and through the resulting information many disqualified persons have been barred or disassociated from the industry. It is anticipated that as soon as facilities permit, all other employees of State licensees will likewise be fingerprinted, and it is encouraging to note that there has been some municipal action to the same end. The public interest demands that every precaution be taken to insure proper personnel in the liquor industry and the increasing use of fingerprinting and other accompanying precautions constitutes a step in the right direction.

### V

Considering the tremendous number of decisions which have been made concerning most every phase, as it would seem, of matters directly involved or indirectly associated with liquor control and affecting substantial interests, there have been but few applications to the Courts for review. Although there were a

greater number of such applications since the expiration of the fiscal year expiring June 30, 1936 than during any corresponding earlier period, there has been no departure from the general disinclination of the Courts to interfere with the administration of matters pertaining to liquor control. Each of the applications which were made to review appellate determinations by the State Department was unsuccessful. In one (Conover v. Burnett et al., 118 N. J. L. 483 (Sup. Ct. 1937)), the Supreme Court expressly sustained the legislative grant to the State Commissioner of plenary appellate powers. Three applications were made to the Court of Chancery to restrain the enforcement of provisions of the Act or rules promulgated pursuant thereto. Two of these were dismissed for lack of jurisdiction and decision in the third is being awaited on the State Commissioner's motion to dismiss.

## VI

Ever since the creation of the State Department, it has been recognized that its primary function is police in nature -- enforcement of the Act and the rules to eliminate the speakeasy and the racketeer and bootlegger on one hand and to insure that licensed activity on the other hand is confined within proper bounds. The results in this regard have been marked. Unlicensed alcoholic beverage activity has decreased perceptibly. Unlike the early days following Repeal, such illicit stills as are seized nowadays are of small capacity and do not represent the enormous outputs of an earlier period. The steady increase in the tax derived from alcoholic beverages is attributable in the main to a diversion of the demand into chartered tax channels rather than to an aggregate increase in consumption.

The effective cramping of unlawful activities by non-licensees has enabled the Department to devote more attention to operations by licensees. During the past fiscal year over 22,000 inspections of licensed premises were made; almost 120,000 bottles of alcoholic beverages were tested at licensed premises; and over 2200 complete analyses were made by our graduate chemist. Notwithstanding the large increase in the number of inspections made there has been a substantial decrease in the number of violations found. It indicates increased respect for and compliance with the law. Much remains to be accomplished particularly as regards decency and sobriety. The better elements in the industry desire just that. Continued strict State supervision will force it upon all.
