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Commissioners' Report.

To His Excellency, John Franklin Fort, Governor of the State of New Jersey and Chairman of the Board of Riparian Commissioners of the State of New Jersey:

Str.—As required by law, we, the undersigned Riparian Commissioners of the State of New Jersey, herewith submit the annual report of the Commission for the year ending October 31st, 1909.

A detailed statement of the receipts of the Board from all sources will be found in the report of the Secretary and Engineer. They aggregate \$198,796.17, derived from the following sources:

The revenue from business done by the Commission during the past year is nearly as large as that of the preceding year, notwithstanding the fact that prices have been increased in every case, and a number of applications have been presented and passed on, in which the Commission has fixed prices greatly in advance of those formerly asked. In a number of these cases the applicants have not as yet accepted the rates fixed by the Board.

The Commission has continued the work of foreclosing and recovering the title to lands leased by the State, which have become forfeited for non-payment of rentals, under the provisions of the act therefor provided. Details of these cases will be found in the report of the Secretary and Engineer.

The Commission has, as stated, advanced the prices over those formerly asked, partly in accordance with the increase in value of the State's water front and partly with the end in view of se-

curing to the State the reasonably anticipated increase in value that must accrue in the near future.

The Commission, in the administration of its duties, is confronted with a situation not understood by the public at large, or, indeed, by the owners of shore front property desiring to secure the riparian rights of the State in front of the same.

The Constitution has set apart the proceeds of the sale of riparian lands of the State for the support of free public schools, and to that extent has restricted the administration of this interest.

The plea is made by those interesed in the ownership and development of the shore front lands of the State that the Commission should take into account the advantages to accrue to the locality and the State at large from the establishment of commercial enterprises, and reduce the charge or price to be paid by them to the State for these riparian lands on that account.

A concrete case of this kind will illustrate:

An applicant owning water front land and having acquired, some years ago, the riparian rights in front of the same, desiring to organize a company for the commercial development of these lands, and in the prosecution of the same, finding it necessary to add to the lands already in possession, applied to the Riparian Commission for the additional rights necessary to the development and carrying out of the enterprise. It was frankly and openly stated by the applicant that the purpose of the enterprise was to develop the lands, with the hope and expectation of reaping in the future the proper rewards for the same in the advanced price to be obtained for the lands so developed, and on the strength of this presentation this Commission was asked to fix a price for the riparian lands that would enable the projectors to carry out the plan of development.

The difficulty here presented is that if the riparian lands in question are now sold at a price that would make them attractive as a speculative proposition to carry out this development, the only additional return the school fund can look for in the future is what comes into it indirectly through the medium of the taxes on this property by reason of its increased value when so developed, but the Commission has absolutely refused to consider parting with the State's title to any lands for speculative purposes.

And so, in a number of cases, the Commission has been unable, in administering this trust within the limitations placed on it by the constitution, to fix such prices as these applicants, under their plans of development, have been able to pay.

This has aroused some criticism from sources that heretofore criticised the Commission for not charging enough for the State's lands.

Another difficulty that confronts the Commission is that while the State is the absolute owner of the lands under water and may dispose of them to any applicant, after giving the riparian owner six months' time within which to apply for the same, the fact remains that the riparian owner is practically the only person who can utilize these lands under water advantageously, for the very obvious reason that he controls the connection between the water and the land.

Notwithstanding these difficulties, the Commission has endeavored to take the facts into consideration and, in fixing prices, to secure to the school fund full recognition of the value of the lands under water. The policy of the Board during the past year has been to deal as liberally as possible with bona fide enterprises where it has been assured of the establishment of the same, and the Commission believes that the prices charged have not discouraged actual present development. Where prices have been fixed that have not been accepted, the matter is still open for argument and consideration.

The Commission has carried out its former practice in making personal examinations of localities where applications have been made, and has held a number of hearings at which counsel and experts interested for the applicants have been heard.

The Commission wishes to acknowledge the helpful services of the Attorney-General and Assistant Attorney-General in the many cases coming before it, for their consideration and advice.

12 REPORT OF RIPARIAN COMMISSIONERS.

Under the provisions of chapter 83 of the laws of 1906, the following leases have been forfeited for non-payment of rentals and the lands recovered and now the property of the State:

The work of the Commission has largely increased by reason of the greatly advanced prices charged, and the number of applications where the purpose of the applicant is avowedly that of the future development of extensive areas, making necessary the hearing of expert witnesses as to values of lands and cost of development of the same.

On April 20th, 1909, Honorable Robert Williams, Vice Chairman of the board, having been appointed by his Excellency, Governor John Franklin Fort, to the State Railroad Commission, tendered his resignation as Vice Chairman of the Commission, whereupon the Board passed resolutions expressing the esteem and respect of the Commission for Senator Williams and its recognition of his valuable services to the State.

On May 4th, 1909, Mr. J. Ward Richardson, of Bridgeton, New Jersey, was appointed by his Excellency as a member of the Commission, to take the place of Senator Williams, resigned.

Mr. M. F. McLaughlin, who has been a member of the Commission for the past six years, was elected Vice Chairman of the Board.

Appendix.

DIRECTIONS FOR APPLICANTS TO THE RIPARIAN COMMISSION OF THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY FOR LANDS UNDER WATER.

Applicants for lands of the State under tidewater will observe the following directions:

First. Furnish a description by metes and bounds of the lands owned by the applicant in front of which the lands applied for lie, accompanied by a map and survey of the same, made by a competent surveyor; showing the exact frontage of said lands on the shore at mean high-water mark and the names of the owners of the adjacent lands.

Second. State whether the lands under water applied for are now or are hereafter to be used for commercial or other purposes, and if so, what; whether they have been improved in whole or in part, or are authorized to be improved under any grant or license protected by the provisions of the supplement of the Riparian Act of March 31st, 1869; also, if any oyster land, fishery or privilege therefor is embraced within the limits of the lands under water applied for.

Third. State whether a grant in fee-simple, or a lease in perpetuity, with privilege to convert the same into a fee is desired.

(Note.—For a grant in fee-simple, the principal sum is required to be paid. For a lease, a rental at the rate of seven per cent. per annum on the principal sum is payable semi-annually in advance to the State Treasurer.)

Fourth. An abstract of title to the land owned by the applicant, prepared by a practitioner of the law of this State, or by the clerk of the county in which the land is situated, must be furnished with the applications before the same will be considered by the Commissioners.

Blank forms for application and all further information required will be furnished by John C. Payne, Secretary of the Commission. Office, Commercial Trust Building, Jersey City, N. J.
