

# REPORT.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,

TRENTON, October 31st, 1873. }

*To his Excellency Joel Parker, Governor of New Jersey :*

In pursuance of an act entitled "an act for the organization of the National Guard of the State of New Jersey," approved March 9th, 1869, I have the honor to submit to your Excellency the following report.

The duties of the Quartermaster General have been increased during the year by the activity and efficiency of the National Guard, in the inspection of regimental organizations, the yearly Brigade parades, and the encampment of the Second Brigade at Cape May.

The operations of the past year have consisted in issuing arms and accoutrements to newly organized companies of the National Guard, issuing the new accoutrements adopted and prescribed by the military board in February 1873, furnishing transportation at various times as required, providing subsistence, quartermaster stores and camp and garrison contingents to the encampment at Cape May, cleaning arms at the State Arsenal, and the regular routine business of the department.

The furnishing of supplies, and the preparations for the encampment occasioned many laborious details, extending through a period of about two months.

The State is well supplied with camp and garrison equipage and ordnance and ordnance stores of the old model, calibre of fifty-eight hundredths (.58) for active service in any emergency, a detailed exhibit of which will be found in statement A, herewith annexed.

Recent events have proved to the satisfaction of military men the great superiority of the breech loading muskets over those now in use. The United States Government has recently completed a series of experiments to test the different models of breech loaders, and a great variety of plans for altering Springfield rifled muskets into breech loaders have been presented and examined, and it has decided as the best and most economical to discard all alterations and adopt a model for an entirely new musket of a calibre of forty-four hundredths (.44), breech loader, and of less weight than the old model musket, which

is simple, efficient and durable, at a comparatively small cost over the expense of alteration. The Government is now engaged in preparing machinery and tools for manufacturing the new Springfield musket, so that in a very short time all her troops will be supplied with this improved arm. This model requires a fixed metallic cartridge, and combines all the advantages of the celebrated Prussian needle gun in accuracy, range and rapidity in fire, and is regarded in all respects as a superior arm. It is important that the State arms shall conform as near as practicable to those in use by the troops of the United States, that in the event of our militia troops being called into the service of the United States, that one and the same manual and ammunition will answer for both classes of troops. We are promised by the United States ordnance officer that the State shall be furnished with her full quota of arms in the new model breech loader during the next year.

The Constitution of the United States provides for "organizing, arming and disciplining the militia and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States, reserving to the States, respectively, the appointment of the officers, and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline provided by Congress." Congress by an act passed April 23, 1808, appropriated annually, the sum of two hundred thousand dollars, (\$200,000), for the purposes above specified. The annual quota due the State from the United States on the present basis of representation in Congress is four thousand three hundred and eighteen dollars and six cents (\$4,318.06), payable in arms and accoutrements. There is due to the State of New Jersey on account of quota accumulated since the first day of January 1864, the sum of fifty-three thousand nine hundred and fifty-seven dollars and sixty cents (\$53,957.60). This sum will give to the State two thousand six hundred and ninety-eight (2,698) arms on an estimated cost of twenty dollars per musket, which together with the amount in the State Treasury realized from the sale of condemned and unserviceable ordnance stores will be amply sufficient to re-arm the National Guard with the improved arm. In Appendix 1, will be found extracts from the annual reports of the Chief of Ordnance for 1871 and 1873, bearing upon this subject and of interest to this State, also a copy of a bill which that department has presented to Congress proposing to increase the annual appropriation from two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), to one million dollars (\$1,000,000), together with a statement showing the apportionment to the several States and Territories. The State's quota on this increased amount will give the sum of twenty-one thousand five hundred and ninety dollars and thirty cents (\$21,590.30), equivalent to about 1000 stand of muskets. It is desirable that this increase in the appropriation should be made, for under the annual quota the State will receive only about two hundred (200) stand of muskets or their equivalent.

The National Guard will require annually on a basis of seventy

(70) companies more than the entire quota. The arming of the militia would therefore be a direct charge upon the treasury of this State.

I would respectfully suggest to your Excellency that the attention of the Legislature be called to this fact, in order that it may take such action in the matter as would relieve the treasury of this State from the burden of arming the militia.

There have been armed and equipped during the present year, ten (10) companies of the National Guard and two (2) troops of cavalry.

The balance still claimed against the United States amounts to thirty-two thousand eight hundred and sixty-four dollars and ninety-three cents, (\$32,864.93,) the settlement of which is still being prosecuted with vigor, and I can confidently assert that the greater part of it will be allowed and paid. I would suggest that John Trimble, Jr., be appointed assistant military agent at Washington, for collection of claims against the United States. He has been very efficient, and his services have been of great benefit in prosecuting the claim. It cannot be settled without a person being present to make the required explanations.

An encampment of the Second Brigade, National Guard, was held at Cape May for six days, commencing on the 18th of August, in pursuance of General Orders, No. 9. The encampment consisted of twenty-three companies of infantry, one troop of cavalry, and one battery of artillery, numbering about fifteen hundred and seventy-seven men, under command of Brevet Major General William J. Sewell. The encampment was a success. The order was responded to with great promptness and unanimity. It passed off without a single accident, and there was not a case of serious illness. A detailed statement of the issues and returns of stores at the encampment, will be found in Tabular Statement B.

The expenses of the last fiscal year for the State militia amounted to sixty-six thousand one hundred and seventy-one dollars and twenty-three cents (\$66,171.23), a detailed statement of which will be found in Appendix 2.

Subjoined herewith will be found statements as follows, to which you are referred for special information as to the transactions of this department during the past year:

Statement A contains an account of clothing, camp and garrison equipage, baggage train and ordnance and ordnance stores, serviceable and unserviceable, remaining on hand at the State Arsenal, on the 31st of October, 1873.

Statement B, the number of arms, &c., cleaned and repaired at the State Arsenal, during the year ending October 31st, 1873.

Statement C, ordnance and ordnance stores turned into the State Arsenal by disbanded and other military companies, camp and garrison equipage, and quartermaster stores, turned in by the National Guard and Rifle Corps, and ordnance and ordnance stores turned

into the State Arsenal by sundry persons during the year ending October 31st, 1873.

Statement D, camp and garrison equipts and quartermaster stores, issued to the National Guard and sundry persons, during the year ending October 31st, 1873.

Statement E, ordnance and military stores issued from the State Arsenal to the National Guard on requisition, according to law, and to sundry persons, during the year ending October 31st, 1873.

Statement F, stores issued to and returned by the Second Brigade, National Guard, at Camp Monmouth, Cape May, from August 18th to 23d, 1873.

Statement G, ammunition expended in firing salutes during the year ending October 31st, 1873.

Tabular statement A, the number of arms and accoutrements in possession of the National Guard, State of New Jersey, on the 31st of October 1873.

Tabular statement B, stores issued to and returned by Second Brigade, National Guard, at Camp Monmouth, Cape May, August 1873.

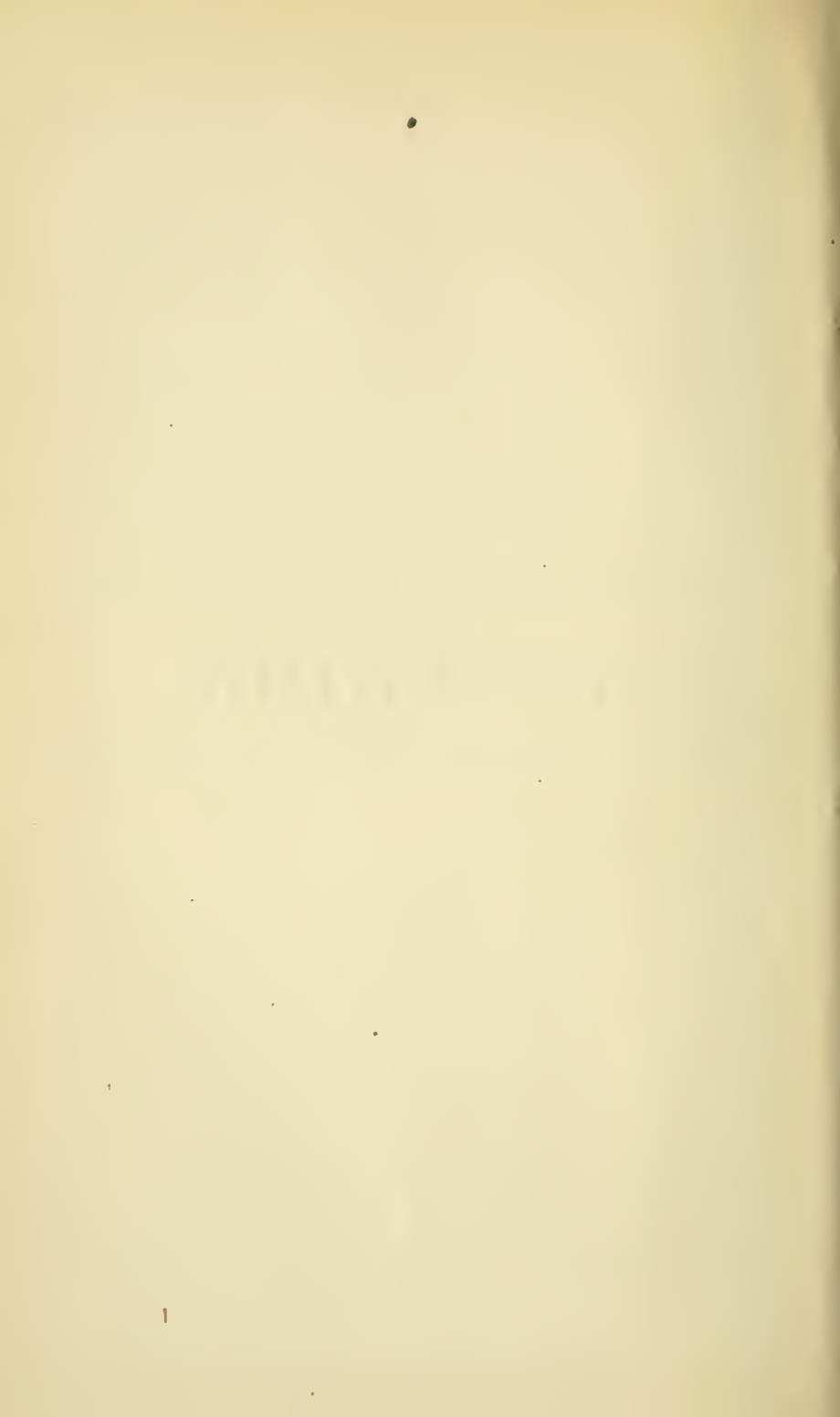

## APPENDIX I.

[*Extract from the Annual Report of the Chief of Ordnance to the Secretary of War, 1871.*]

---

Congress evidently intended in 1808, when it made the permanent annual appropriation of \$200,000 for arming and equipping the militia of the United States, that they should be armed and equipped by the Government, and it is important and proper that they should be, and that States should be encouraged to depend upon the General Government for these supplies. If in 1808, when the population of the United States did not exceed eight millions, the sum of \$200,000 per annum for arming and equipping the militia of the United States seemed necessary, it can hardly be thought that this sum is sufficient now, when the population has increased nearly five-fold; and the States are more desirous of obtaining arms for their militia for drill and instructions than they were in 1808.

Large sums of money were charged against some of the States for arms, &c., furnished by this department during the war, and other States, equally populous, had no charges made against them during the same period; and it seems to me highly probable that errors occurred in keeping the account with the States, which do great injustice to some of them, but which this bureau has no authority to correct. The principal, if not all, of the issues which were made to the States during the war, were made to them for the maintenance of the Government and the preservation of the Union, and should have been charged, as arms and other stores issued to volunteers, to the United States, and not to the States. If the errors can be corrected they should be. In my opinion it would be fairer and juster to the States to credit them with all issues made to them during the war, and charged on their quotas for arming and equipping the militia, than to let the accounts stand as they now are on the books of this office. Some of the States are now charged with a greater sum than their annual quotas will amount to in half a century; and, under a

proper decision of the War Department, no issues can be made to States which are charged with arms and other stores in excess of their quotas. I respectfully suggest that it may be proper to invite legislation on this subject.

[*Extract from the Annual Report of the Chief of Ordnance to the Secretary of War, 1873.*]

#### ARMING AND EQUIPPING THE MILITIA.

In this connection, as bearing most vitally on the effectiveness of the armed force of the nation in time of war, the wants of the whole body of the militia require the attention of legislative action. The annual appropriation of \$200,000, assigned for arming the militia, fixed by the act of April 23, 1808, is manifestly inadequate at the present time, with a population increased from nearly to more than forty millions. As a consequence, some of the States of the Union have had to make a pro-rata contribution to provide the arms, &c., necessary to surmount this deficiency, although the intention of Congress, as expressed in the law of 1808, was that the money so appropriated should supply the "whole body of the militia." If \$200,000 was not deemed too much in 1808, when arms, &c., were cheap, as compared with the improved and costly mechanism now admitted to be a necessity, surely an increase of the appropriation to \$1,000,000 annually is the least that is required to fully meet the wants of the "whole body of the militia," and carry out the expressed wishes of Congress.

A bill making provisions for arming and equipping the whole body of the militia of the United States, and for other purposes.

1. BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the annual sum of \_\_\_\_\_ \* be, and the same is hereby, appropriated for the purpose of providing arms and other ordnance stores for the whole body of the militia of the United States, either by purchase or manufacture, by and on account of the United States, and the arms and

\* The sum now appropriated annually, to be apportioned among the several States according to the number of Senators and Representatives in Congress, is \$200,000.

other ordnance stores shall be issued to the States and Territories as is now done under existing laws and regulations.

2. That the Secretary of War is hereby authorized and directed to receive from each State and Territory, at the United States arsenals, without cost to the United States for delivery, such arms and other ordnance stores by him deemed to be of serviceable but obsolete patterns, as may have been issued to them by the Ordnance Department since April ninth, eighteen hundred and sixty-five, and to place to their credit, on the books of the Ordnance Department, the money value thereof which was charged to them when the issues were made.

3. That all issues of arms and other ordnance stores which were made by the War Department to the States and Territories between the first day of January, eighteen hundred and sixty-one, and the ninth day of April, eighteen hundred and sixty-five, under the act of April twenty-third, eighteen hundred and eight, and charged to the States and Territories, having been made for the maintenance and preservation of the Union, are properly chargeable to the United States, and the Secretary of War is hereby authorized to credit the several States and Territories with the sums charged to them respectively for arms and other ordnance stores which were issued to them between the aforementioned dates, and charged against their quotas under the law for arming and equipping the militia; *provided*, that each State and Territory, before receiving credit for the issues charged to them, shall return the property to the Ordnance Department free of charge to the United States, or give satisfactory evidence to the Secretary of War that it was expended or otherwise disposed of in the public service during the rebellion.

4. That all arms issued to the States and Territories shall be of the same patterns as are adopted for the United States army; and all laws and parts of laws in conflict with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

*Statement showing the apportionment to the several States and Territories of the appropriation of \$200,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1874, under the law of 1808, as amended by the Seventh Section of the act of Congress approved March 3, 1855, and the President's Regulation of April 30, 1855; and also the apportionment for a fiscal year should the appropriation be increased to \$1,000,000.*
