REPORT.

To the Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

Pursuant to paragraph 51 of the act concerning the military and naval forces of this State, approved March 23, 1900, I have the honor to submit my annual report of the operations of the Quartermaster-General's Department for the fiscal year ended October 31st, 1902.

The Quartermaster-General of this State is also Commissary-General, Paymaster-General, Chief of Ordnance, Chief Medical Purveyor, and Medical Storekeeper. As Quartermaster-General he is required to provide the National Guard or uniformed militia with clothing, camp and garrison equipage, quarters, transportation and miscellaneous supplies classed as Quartermaster's stores; as Commissary-General, all supplies of subsistence in kind or cooked; as Paymaster-General, payment of troops and disbursement of the appropriations for the maintenance, heating and lighting of armories, and to draw and pay over to the heads of departments and the commanding officers of the several regiments and other organizations, the annual appropriations made for the purpose of procuring drill rooms, and other expenses incident to the existence of such organizations; and as Chief Medical Purveyor and Storekeeper, he purchases and issues all medical supplies of kinds selected and approved by the Surgeon-General.

ARMS.

The annual returns received from the several organizations of the National Guard show the arms and equipments, the property of the State, in their possession to be generally in condition for immediate service. Such as are reported defective or unserviceable will be ordered returned to the State Arsenal for the necessary repairs. The State continues to use the Springfield Rifle, calibre .45 as the service arm. Those now in use are the models 1879 and 1884, in-

cluding a few of the model 1873 issued to the state by the National Government in 1874 and 1876. This speaks well for the long wearing qualities and strength of this fine old weapon.

The United States Government is still experimenting with the magazine rifle, and the Chief of Ordnance says in his report for the present year that "the improved musket which was referred to in the last report of the Chief of Ordnance as being under construction has been completed and tried with very satisfactory results. The principal points of its difference from the present service musket are the two lugs instead of one for holding the bolt against the rearward pressure of the powder, with resulting increase of strength sufficient to enable a velocity of 2,300 feet per second to be obtained; the housing of the magazine in the stock directly below the chamber instead of having it project to one side. In addition to these there are various changes of details which both improve the rifle and cheapen and accelerate its production. The arm is supplied with a cleaning rod which can be partially pulled from its place below the barrel and held with a catch so as to form a bayonet. The "rod bayonet," as it is called, has been considered before but has never received a thorough trial in the service. Its great advantage is that it lightens the weight made up of the gun, bayonet and bayonet scabbard, and by dispensing with the latter two as separate articles to be carried, permits the soldier to carry with him an entrenching tool of sufficient size to be serviceable. There are differences of opinion as to the value of the rod bayonet; although less effective as a bayonet alone than the one now in use in the service, it is undoubtedly of some value in converting the musket into a pike, and in view of the increasing prominence of the entrenching tool and the decreasing occasion for the use of the bayonet, its experimental substitution is in line with apparent progress in subordinating the latter to the former."

A table showing the principal elements of the new piece in comparison with those of the present service calibre .30 rifle is also published by the Chief of Ordnance and is appended herewith, and will be interesting to officers and enlisted men of the National Guard in connection with the foregoing extract:

The act of Congress of 1900, amending section 1,661, Revised Statutes, makes an annual appropriation of \$1,000,000 for arms and equipments for the uniformed militia of the several States and territories. New Jersey's annual quota under this act is \$21,241.82.

The United States service magazine rifle, calibre .30, now in use in the army, can be drawn under this act on requisition of the Governor to be charged up to the quota as above, but the amount standing to the credit of the State at this time on the books of the War Department is inadequate to cover the cost of rifles and equipments sufficient for the armament of the entire Guard.

There was a measure to promote the efficiency of the militia known as the "Dick" bill introduced at the late session of Congress which contained a provision authorizing an issue to the States and territories of a supply of the United States standard magazine arms, equipments and ammunition, without cost to said States or territories, but taking in exchange therefor such rifles, carbines, accoutrements, ammunition, etc., as had been issued to them from time to time under the law for arming and equipping the militia. This bill failed to become a law, but it is to be hoped that Congress will at its coming session take such action as will result in the speedy re-armament of the National Guard of the States and territories with arms and equipments of the latest improved models adopted by the United States Army, thereby securing for the organized militia of the United States a uniformity in armament and equipment with

the regular army that will tend to make the National Guard a valuable auxiliary to aid the National Government in case of war.

Such a bill should carry with it a provision for the exchange of the howitzers and galling guns of obsolete patterns, which now constitute the somewhat nondescript armament of our field batteries, for modern 3-inch rifled guns of a pattern approved by the Ordnance Department as suitable for State service.

I most earnestly recommend that the attention of our Senators and Representatives in Congress be officially called to this most important matter with a view to the early introduction and passage of the necessary legislation for the objects above set forth.

UNIFORMS.

The contract for making uniforms for the National Guard for the year 1902-3 was awarded to the William H. Hortsmann Company of Philadelphia. The bids received were as follows:

The material used is of the Oakes manufacture, made at Bloomfield, New Jersey, purchased by the State and turned over to the contractor to be used in the fabrication of the garments, thus securing cloth uniform in color and quality.

The present mode of furnishing uniforms to the National Guard should be readjusted. As it is, certified bills for the purchase of uniforms are paid by the Treasurer upon the warrant of the Comptroller, and it is the duty of the Quartermaster-General to notify the Comptroller on or before the first Monday in April of each year of the sum charged against each organization for uniforms furnished during the year ending on that day, and one-fourth of the amount so reported shall be deducted from each of the two next succeeding appropriations for each organization so furnished.

It is recommended that this complicated and, to me, unjust system of compelling military organizations to bear half the cost of uniforms only worn by them in State service be abolished, and that the National Guard be *uniformed*, as it is armed and equipped, entirely

at the expense of the State, leaving an annual appropriation to the National Guard unimpaired for the many other expenses incident to the existence of its several organizations which are paid therefrom. If the uniforms are furnished solely at the expenses of the State, thus remaining the property of the State, company commandants or regimental quartermaster as the case may be, could be held to a more strict accountability for the proper care of uniforms issued to them, and the cost of uniforms or parts thereof injured, destroyed through carelessness or wilful neglect should be paid for by a deduction from their annual appropriation.

NEW ORGANIZATIONS.

The new regiment known as the Fifth Regiment, National Guard, organized by order of the Commander-in-Chief (General Orders Nos. 3 and 4 C. S., Office of the Adjutant-General) by the assignment of four companies from the First Regiment and two companies from the Fourth Regiment, and the formation of six new companies, has been uniformed, armed and equipped to the extent of approved requisitions received at this office, as directed in said orders.

The new companies organized in the First and Fourth Regiments to take the place of those assigned to the Fifth Regiment have also been uniformed, armed and equipped as directed in special orders issued from the office of the Adjutant-General.

SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR CLAIMS.

An allowance of \$47,593.69 has been made on these claims since the date of my last report, since which there has been no National Legislation or ruling of the Comptroller of the Treasury under which the Auditor for the War Department can make any further allowances. The disallowed items aggregate \$90,704.43. This amount can be divided as follows :

I am advised that the Court of Claims has no jurisdiction over

these claims, and that further relief can be obtained only through Congress.

ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT.

The Second Brigade, Brigadier-General Quincy O'M. Gillmore commanding, consisting of the Second and Third Regiments Infantry, Battery "B" Field Artillery and Second Troop Cavalry, encamped at Sea Girt on the date assigned to them, respectively from July 12th to 26th, 1902. I made several recommendations in my report of 1899 for improvements at the Camp Grounds, which have never been carried out as the Committee on Appropriations has not seen fit to make provision for the cost of such improvements. The principal recommendations at that time were the reclaiming of the low or meadow ground bordering Stockton Lake on the south of the Camp Grounds, which should be filled in, graded and planted in shade trees. The soil necessary to fill in could be taken from the lake bottom. A system of jetties for the protection of the ground near the shore from the ravages of the ocean should be built. The widening of the main road from the railroad, past the cottage to the ocean would be a great improvement. The Sea Girt Land and Improvement Company proposed at that time to join in the expense if the State would dedicate to the purpose a strip fifteen feet wide along the entire north side, the Improvemnt Company contributing a strip of the same width on the other side for the purpose of widening the road to the ocean; sidewalks to be curbed, forming a splendid boulevard.

An adequate supply of clear and wholesome water has been assured from the new artesian well now rapidly approaching completion. This well has a capacity of two hundred and twenty gallons per minute, which will meet all requirements of the camp grounds.

The 200, 300 and 500 yard butts and pits on the rifle range have been rendered impregnable to decay from effects of the weather, and use, by rebuilding them with walls and floors of the best cement and concrete, strengthened with iron rods and bolts, and braced with heavy timber. The 600 and 1,000 yard ranges have also been rebuilt with timber in the same manner as before and will be serviceable for six or seven years.

The necessity for a new headquarters' house for the accommodation of the Governor and staff, is urgently recommended. The structure in use at the present time as the Governor's headquarters should be removed to another location on the grounds for the uninterrupted use of the superintendent of the grounds and his family. The new building should be provided with sufficient bed rooms, etc., for the Governor and staff. The present dining room is inadequate. There should also be a large room suitable for the meetings of such State boards as are frequently convened at Sea Girt during the summer. I earnestly recommend that the Legislative Committee on Appropriations be requested to make provision for this purpose.

PAYMASTER-GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT.

Pursuant to section 129 of the act concerning the military and naval forces, sums aggregating \$39,502.88 for expenses incident to division, brigade and regimental headquarters of the naval battalions, signal and telegraph corps, troops, batteries and infantry companies of the National Guard were paid by the Comptroller of the Treasury to the Paymaster-General, and by him paid over to the commanding officers of the following named organizations upon the proper vouchers of receipt:

There was also turned over to this account by Brigadier-General Q. O'M. Gillmore the sum of \$461.00 to be applied to the liquidation of the financial accounts of Captain U. G. Lee, late commanding Battery "B" Field Artillery. This sum will be paid to the commanding officer of said battery when elected, to be by him expended as provided by law.

For maintaining, heating and lighting armories there was received from the Comptroller of the Treasury the sum of \$8,227.79. This amount has been partially disbursed on certified vouchers for expenses incurred as follows:

There was expended during the year under the act of 1899, providing additional compensation for volunteers from this State in the Spanish-American War the sum of \$410.69, making a total of \$162,309.44 paid out since the approval of the above mentioned act, including pay to the rejected recruits.

FUNERAL ESCORTS AND PARADES.

This department furnished transportation, ammunition, subsistence and pay to the organizations of the National Guard respectively detailed as funeral escorts on the occasion of the obsequies of Major-General William J. Sewell, December 31, 1901, Brigadier-General William H. Cooper, February 20, 1902, and Brigadier-General Alexander C. Oliphant, late Adjutant-General, September 18th, 1902.

Transportation, ammunition, quarters and subsistence were also furnished to the organizations participating in the celebration of the 125th anniversary of the Battle of Trenton, December 26th, 1901.

There being no account in the regular appropriations made for the support of the National Guard to which the above expenses could be certified to the Comptroller for payment, they were approved for payment by the Governor from the "Emergency" fund. I would respectfully recommend that the item of the appropriation bill for "transportation for battalion drills, inspections and parades, etc.," be so worded and increased sufficiently as to provide for such occasions without recourse to the "Emergency" fund.

Under General Orders No. 1, Headquarters N. G. N. J., dated at Camden, January 7, 1902, the entire organization of the National Guard paraded at Trenton on the occasion of the inauguration of Hon. Franklin Murphy as Governor of New Jersey.

Transportation and subsistence were furnished as directed by paragraph 5 of said Order, and all arrangements with the several transportation companies and caterers were completed and carried out in a satisfactory manner.

The bills incurred by this department for transportation, horses, subsistence, etc., were paid by the Comptroller upon the approval of the Legislative Committee on Inauguration, from the appropriation made for inaugural expenses.

ACTUAL SERVICE.

The Paterson and Passaic companies of the Fifth Regiment were ordered out under arms for duty in connection with the disastrous fire at Paterson in February last, and during the period from June 19th to July 2nd, 1902, the First Regiment Infantry, First Troop Cavalry, and Companies "C" and "D" of the

Fifth Regiment were called out under orders from the Commander-in-Chief to suppress riot and bloodshed on the occasion of the strike made by the operatives of the Paterson silk mills. The necessary transportation, subsistence, pay, etc., were furnished as directed by the Governor. Bills incurred on account of Paterson fire were paid from the "Emergency" fund. Those incurred on account of Paterson riots aggregate \$18,340.57, and will have to be provided for by legislative enactment. The items are as follows :

MEDALS.

During the year 272 medals, provided by legislative enactment of 1899 and 1900, were issued to residents of New Jersey who served in the Army and Navy during the Spanish-American War. The total number issued to date is 5,328. Applications are still being received for the medals, principally from men who continued in the service after the war and have since been out of the service.

Medals provided by the act approved March 23, 1901, for survivors of the four regiments of the New Jersey Brigade Militia, which responded to President Lincoln's first call for volunteers in 1861, for service in the Civil War, have been issued to 553 veterans. The applications coming from all parts of the United States.

The supply of medals of both kinds is nearly exhausted, but probably will be sufficient to meet the demands.

RECEIPTS FROM THE UNITED STATES.

Stores to the value of \$12,667.80 have been drawn from the Quartermaster's and Ordnance Departments of the United States Army during the year upon requisitions of the Governor under the act of Congress for Arming and Equipping the Militia. The balance standing to the credit of the State on the books of the War Department is \$41,628.24.

The balance standing to the credit of the State for armament and equipment of the Naval Militia on the books of the Navy Department is \$12,585.95. The only charges made during the year against this appropriation being for stores to the value of \$7.75.

CHANGES.

Death has made some changes in this department during the year. On the 17th of February Captain Charles F. Snowden, military-storekeeper, died suddenly at the State Arsenal. Captain Snowden served in this department from the outbreak of the Civil War to the day of his death, and acted as Post-Quartermaster at several of the Camps of New Jersey Volunteers. He was well qualified by long experience for the position he held at the Arsenal, and was a valuable and reliable officer. He was succeeded by Mr. John H. Crissey, of Newark, who was commissioned as Captain and Military-Storekeeper June 30th, 1902.

Colonel George G. Felton, Deputy Quartermaster-General, died at Camden on the 7th day of July, 1902. He was appointed Deputy-Quartermaster-General in 1890. As the office of Deputy Quartermaster-General ceases with the death or resignation of the incumbents, no successor to Colonel Felton has been appointed.

The staff of this department is now composed of two Deputy Quartermaster-Generals, with the rank of Colonel, one assistant to the Paymaster-General, and one military-storekeeper each with the rank of Captain.
