Opening Session of the 201st New Jersey Legislature—Senate Session, Tuesday, January 10, 1984.

The Senate Session was called to order, by the Senate Secretary, Robert E. Gladden.

Mr. Gladden read the Certificate of Election.

The Administration of the Oath of Office to the Senators Elect was administered by the Honorable Nicholas Scalera, Judge of the Superior Court.

Invocation was delivered by Msgr. John J. Petillo, P.H.D., Chancellor, Seton Hall University.

Salute to the Flag.

National Anthem was sung by Michael McNiell.

Upon the Calling of the Roll the following Senators answered the call and the Secretary declared a quorum present.

Hearing no other nominations, nominations were closed. Mr. Gladden declared Senator DiFrancesco, temporary President. Senator Caufield and Senator Dorsey escorted Senator DiFrancesco to the Rostrum.

Senator DiFrancesco recognized Senator Russo of Ocean County.

Senator Russo moved to proceed to the election of a temporary Secretary.

Mr. Zane offered in nomination of temporary Secretary Robert E. Gladden.

Senator McManimon seconded the nomination.

Senator DiFrancesco hearing no other nominations declared Robert E. Gladden elected to the office of temporary Secretary by unanimous vote.

Senator Orechio introduced his family and then delivered an address to the Senate.

Senator Orechio recognized Senator Russo.

Senator Russo moved they proceed to the election of a permanent Secretary.

Senator Orechio recognized Senator Rand of Camden County.

Senator Rand offered in nomination for the office of permanent Secretary of the Senate, Mr. Robert E. Gladden.

Senator Laskin seconded the nomination.

Senate Orechio called for other nominations hearing none, proceeded with the vote for the permanent Secretary of the Senate.

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey (The General Assembly concurring):

That at 2 p.m. both Houses of the Legislature meet in joint session for the purpose of receiving the Annual Message of His Excellency, Thomas H. Kean, Governor of the State of New Jersey, which will be delivered in person.

That the printer be directed to furnish, as soon as printed and without waiting for the regular distribution, the number of copies of each bill and resolution introduced in the Senate and General Assembly, and such other prints and reprints as are provided for in the Rules of both Houses to the following:

The Governor—21.

The Secretary of State—40.

The Attorney General—4.

Office of Legislative Services—15.

State Library Reference Bureau, for use of said Bureau and for exchange with other states—200.

That the printer likewise furnish to the State Library Legislative Reference Bureau, 20 copies of each weekly installment of the Senate Journal and Minutes of the General Assembly.

The Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the General Assembly be designated request officers for the Legislature as required by law.

The legislative printer shall print and make distribution of bills, resolutions, installments of the Senate Journal and Minutes of the General Assembly as heretofore and in accordance with the legislative printing contract.

The Legislative Index and the New Jersey Legislative News for 1984 be subscribed to for the use of members of the Legislature, and for such officers of the Senate and General Assembly and other persons designated by the President of the Senate and Speaker of the General Assembly, in accordance with rules to be promulgated by the President and the Speaker.

Such copies of each bill and resolution, and each official copy reprint as shall be directed by the Senate and General Assembly be printed for use of the Senate and General Assembly.

The Legislative Code of Ethics as set forth in 1980 Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 88 be adopted temporarily as the Legislative Code of Ethics pending adoption by concurrent resolution of a Legislative Code of Ethics for the 1982-83 Legislature.

Mr. Russo offered the following resolution which was read and adopted.

Resolved that:

1. For the 1984 Session there be employed for each Senator, Legislative Aides, to be designated by him at an aggregate salary payable in the same manner as all other Senate employees for the legislative year.

2. The 1984 Legislative Manual be distributed to the Senate on the same basis as for the 1983 session.

3. Resolved that the Rules of the 1983 Senate be adopted temporarily as the Rules for the 1984 Senate.

4. That the "Manual for Use in Drafting Legislation for Introduction in the New Jersey Legislature," dated October 1979, prepared and published by the Division of Legal Services, Office of Legislative Services be adopted as the official manual of practice and procedure of the Senate governing the form of bills to be introduced in the Senate and governing the conduct of the preliminary examination of bills proposed for introduction in the Senate required by the Rules of the Senate; and

In order to carry out the aforementioned practice and procedure, Albert Porroni, Legislative Counsel and Mary Joan Dickson, Walter R. Kennedy, Maurice E. Gold, Leonard J. Lawson, Victoria P. Lawler, Marci L. Hochman, James A. Harkness, E. Joan Oliver, Thomas P. Musiek and Marvin Jiggetts of the Division of Legal Services be designated as counsel to conduct said preliminary examination of bills proposed for introduction and amendments adopted in the Senate under the general supervision of the chairman of the Legislative Counsel.

5. The appointment of officers and employees of the Senate by the President and the payroll for such officers and employees of the Senate be adopted and the Secretary be authorized to authenticate the same as approval officer.

6. All statements of expenses of the Senate or of the Legislature on account of the Senate be referred for approval and forwarded for payment from the State Treasury as heretofore.

7. The Committee on Ways and Means be authorized to procure the necessary stationary and supplies for the use of members of the Senate.

8. Unless otherwise ordered, the daily sessions of the Senate shall begin on Mondays at 2 p.m. and on Thursdays at 11 a.m.

9. The Secretary of the Senate be directed to inform the General Assembly that the Senate has organized and elected the Honorable Carmen A. Orechio, of the County of Essex, President and Robert E. Gladden, of the County of Camden, Secretary and has proceeded to business.

10. His Excellency the Governor be informed that the Senate has organized for 1984 by the election of the Honorable Carmen A. Orechio, of Essex County, as President, and Robert E. Gladden, of Camden County, as Secretary, and is now ready to proceed to business and to receive any communications he may forward.

11. That the President appoint Senators DiFrancesco, Dumont, Feldman and Lynch to wait on the Governor.

Mr. Codey offered the following amendments to Senate No. 811 pursuant to the recommendations of the Governor, which amendments were adopted.

SENATE BILL No. 811 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 1, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate No. 811 (OCR) with my recommendations for reconsideration.

This bill concerns the distribution and disposition of the pari-mutuel pool at harness and thoroughbred racetracks. Its provisions do not apply to the N. J. Sports and Exposition Authority or the

Garden State Racetrack. Specifically, this bill reduces the State tax on pari-mutuel pools to one half of one percent, and provides that the racetracks may retain and use breakage monies for supplementing purses.

I am concerned that while this bill will further reduce State pari-mutuel tax revenues, historical statistics indicate that it may not provide a corresponding increase in racetrack pari-mutuel pool, purse and patron attendance levels. Since 1978, the State has invested almost \$22,000,000.00 in the Thoroughbred and Harness Racing Industry through reduced pari-mutuel taxes, but these reductions do not appear to have favorably affected yearly racetrack pari-mutuel pool, purse and attendance totals. Rather, during the last six years there has been a further decline in these statistics.

Despite my above mentioned concerns, in 1983 I signed two pieces of legislation which further reduced the State's pari-mutuel tax. The first law provided that the reduced tax structure for distribution and disposition of the pari-mutuel pools at racetracks operating prior to June 1, 1982 was made applicable to such race meetings conducted prior to June 1, 1983; the second law reduced the State tax by one quarter of one percent, on a permanent basis. I signed this legislation because of my strong commitment to providing as much State help, as is responsible in the public interest, for assuring the financial health of the racetracks and stability of the economies in the counties where the tracks are located.

Although at present I cannot support the substantial and permanent tax reductions this bill proposes, I am willing to approve this tax structure for a two year test period. This test will provide both the Legislature and I with two racing seasons to evaluate how the reduced tax will affect State revenues and the financial health of the racetracks, with specific regard to pari-mutuel pools, purses and patron attendance.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate No. 811 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Title, Lines 2-4: After "meetings" omit "and amending P. L. 1940, c. 17"

Pages 3-5, Section 1, Lines 1-67: Omit

Pages 5-12, Section 2, Lines 1-319: Omit

Page 12, Section 2, After Line 319: Insert new sections as follows:

"1. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 44 of P. L. 1940, c. 17 (C. 5:5-64) to the contrary, each holder of a permit shall distribute all sums deposited in any pool where the patron is required to select one horse to the winners thereof, less an amount which in harness races shall not exceed 17% of the total deposits plus the breaks and which in other races shall not exceed 17% of the total deposits plus the breaks. In every pool where the patron is required to select two horses, the holder of each permit for either harness or running track shall distribute all sums deposited in each pool to the

winners thereof, less an amount which shall not exceed 19% of the total deposits plus the breaks. In every pool where the patron is required to select three or more horses, every holder of a permit shall distribute all sums deposited in each pool to the winners thereof, less an amount which shall not exceed 25% of the total deposits, plus the breaks. Every permitholder shall distribute to the persons holding winning tickets in any of the aforementioned pools, as a minimum, a sum not exceeding \$0.10, calculated on the basis of each dollar deposited in any pool after the deduction of the said 17%, 19% or 25%, as the case may be. Should the amount remaining in the pool be insufficient to pay the winners the minimum, the breakage accruing in that race, or any necessary portion thereof, shall be applied toward making up any such deficiency. The breaks are hereby defined as the odd cents over any multiple of \$0.10, calculated on the basis of \$1.00 otherwise payable to a patron. Every permitholder engaged in the business of conducting running race meetings under this act, except the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority established pursuant to P. L. 1971, c. 137 (C. 5:10-1 et seq.), shall distribute as purse money the breaks as herein defined, except as the same shall have been applied toward making up a deficiency in a pool as herein provided. Every permitholder engaged in the business of conducting harness race meetings under this act, except the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority, shall retain for his own uses and purposes 50% of the breaks as herein defined, except as the same shall have been applied toward making up a deficiency in a pool as herein provided, and shall distribute as purse money the remaining 50%. The New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority shall retain all breaks commencing on May 10, 1971 as revenue to the authority, except as the same shall have been applied toward making up a deficiency in a pool as herein provided. Every permitholder shall submit to the commission every seventh day of any and every race meeting a report under oath showing the daily and total amount of such breaks together with such other information as the commission may require. All sums held by any permitholder for payment of outstanding pari-mutuel tickets not claimed by the person or persons entitled thereto within six months from the time such tickets are issued shall be paid to the commission upon the expiration of such six-month holding period.

Where it is shown to the satisfaction of the commission that the reason for the pari-mutuel tickets being outstanding and unclaimed is the loss, misplacement or theft of said tickets within the confines and control of the pari-mutuel department of any permitholder, and it is further shown to the satisfaction of the commission that said pari-mutuel tickets have been cashed by such pari-mutuel department, the commission may adjust and credit the permitholder's account accordingly and the permitholder shall reimburse any

employee who has been held personally accountable and paid for such lost, stolen or misplaced tickets.

All outstanding pari-mutuel ticket money shall be deposited in an account separate and apart from the track's mutuel or general treasury account. The outstanding pari-mutuel ticket account shall be subject to the rules and regulations prescribed by the Division of New Jersey Racing Commission.

2. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 46 of P. L. 1940, c. 17 (C. 5:5-66) to the contrary, every permitholder engaged in the business of conducting horse race meetings under this act, except the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority established pursuant to P. L. 1971, c. 137 (C. 5:10-1 et seq.), shall make disposition of the deposits remaining undistributed pursuant to section 44 as follows:

a. In the case of harness races:

(1) Pay to the commission 50% of 1% of so much of the total contributions to all pari-mutuel pools conducted or made during such calendar year on any and every horse race track granted a permit under this act.

Payment on account of such sums to be paid to the commission shall be made every seventh day of any and every race meeting in the amount then due as determined in the manner provided above, and shall be accompanied by a report under oath showing the total of all such contributions, together with such other information as the commission may require. Except as otherwise provided by law, no admission or amusement tax, excise tax, license or horse racing fee of any kind shall be assessed or collected from any permitholder by the State of New Jersey, or by any county or municipality, or by any other body having power to assess or collect license fees or taxes.

(2) Hold and set aside in an account designated as a special trust account 1.15% of such total contributions in all pools to be used and distributed as hereinafter provided and as provided in section 5 of P. L. 1967, c. 40, for the following purposes and no other:

(a) 37% thereof to increase purses and grant awards for starting horses as provided or as may be provided by rules of the New Jersey Racing Commission with payment to be made in the same manner as payment of other purses and awards;

(b) 55% thereof for the establishment of a Sire Stakes Program for standardbred horses with payment to be made to the Department of Agriculture for administration as hereinbefore provided;

(c) 5% thereof for contributions and awards designed to improve and promote the standardbred breeding industry in New Jersey through payment of awards to owners and breeders of New Jersey bred horses which are registered with the Standardbred Breeders' and Owners' Association of New Jersey and which earn portions of purses in open events on New Jersey tracks, and to owners of stallions posted on the official stallions roster of the Standardbred

Breeders' and Owners' Association of New Jersey which sire such registered New Jersey bred money earners:

(d) 3% thereof for other New Jersey horse breeding and promotion conducted by the New Jersey Department of Agriculture.

(3) Retain 7.70% of so much of such total contributions for his own uses and purposes. Notwithstanding the foregoing, for pools where the patron is required to select two horses, the permitholder shall retain 8.70% of the total contributions and for pools where the patron is required to select three or more horses, the permitholder shall retain 11.70% of the total contributions. Each permitholder shall contribute out of its 11.70% share of pools, where the patron is required to select three or more horses, a sum deemed necessary by the Racing Commission, to finance a prerace blood testing program, and such other testing programs which the commission shall deem proper and necessary and which shall be subject to the regulation and control of said commission.

(4) Distribute as purse money and for programs designed to aid the horsemen and the Standardbred Breeders' and Owners' Association of New Jersey 7.65% of such total contributions. Expenditures for programs designed to aid the horsemen and the Standardbred Breeders' and Owners' Association of New Jersey shall not exceed 3.2% of the sum available for distribution as purse money. The formula for distribution of the purse money as either overnight purses or special stakes shall be determined by an agreement between the Standardbred Breeders' and Owners' Association of New Jersey and the tracks. Notwithstanding the foregoing, for pools where the patron is required to select two or more horses, the permitholder shall distribute as purse money 8.65% of the total contributions and for pools where the patron is required to select three or more horses, the permitholder shall distribute as purse money 11.65% of the total contributions. Notwithstanding the foregoing, for pools where a patron is required to select three or more horses, each permitholder shall retain out of the 11.65% to be distributed as purse money, a sum deemed necessary by the racing commission, for use by the commission to finance a prerace blood testing program, and such other testing programs which the commission shall deem proper and necessary and which shall be subject to the regulation and control of said commission.

b. In the case of running races:

(1) Where the amount derived from the pari-mutuel handle does not exceed \$1 million per day based on such contributions accumulated an average during the calendar year, the permitholder shall:

(a)) Pay to the commission 30% of 1% of so much of the total contributions to all pari-mutuel pools conducted or made during such calendar year; but notwithstanding the foregoing, for pools where the patron is required to select three or more horses, the

permitholder shall pay to the commission 1.30% of the total contributions.

Payment on account of such sums to be paid to the commission shall be made every seventh day of any and every race meeting in the amount then due as determined in the manner provided above, and shall be accompanied by a report under oath showing the total of all such contributions, together with such other information as the commission may require. Except as otherwise provided by law, no admission or amusement tax, excise tax, license or horse racing fee of any kind shall be assessed or collected from any permitholder by the State of New Jersey, or by any county or municipality, or by any other body having power to assess or collect license fees or taxes.

(b) Hold and set aside in an account designated as a special trust account 23% of 1% of such total contributions to be used and distributed as hereinafter provided and as provided in section 5 of P. L. 1967, c. 40, for the following purposes and no other:

(i) 18% of 1% thereof for contributions and awards designed to improve and promote the thoroughbred breeding industry in New Jersey through payments of awards to owners and breeders of registered New Jersey bred horses which earn portions of purses in open events on New Jersey tracks, and to owners of stallions posted on the official stallion rosters of the Thoroughbred Breeders' Association of New Jersey which sire such registered New Jersey bred money winners;

(ii) 5% of 1% thereof for State horse breeding and development programs, research, fairs, horse shows, youth activities, promotion and administration.

(c) Retain 9.73% of such total contributions for his own uses and purposes. For pools where the patron is required to select two horses, the permitholder shall retain 10.80% of the total contributions and for pools where the patron is required to select three or more horses, the permitholder shall retain 13.21% of the total contributions. Each permitholder shall contribute out of its 13.21% share of pools, where the patron is required to select three or more horses, a sum deemed necessary by the racing commission, to finance a prerace blood testing program, and such other testing programs which the commission shall deem proper and necessary and which shall be subject to the regulation and control of said commission.

(d) Distribute as purse money and for programs designed to aid the horsemen and the New Jersey Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association 6.00% of such contributions. Notwithstanding the foregoing, for pools where the patron is required to select two horses, the permitholder shall distribute as purse money 6.93% of such contribution and for pools where the patron is required to select three or more horses, the permitholder shall distribute as purse money 9.02% of the total contributions. Expenditures for programs designed to aid the horsemen and the New Jersey Horsemen's Benev-

olent and Protective Association shall not exceed 2.5% of the sum available for distribution as purse money from all pari-mutuel pools. The formula for distribution of the purse money as either overnight purses or special stakes shall be determined by an agreement between the New Jersey Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association and the permitholder. Notwithstanding the foregoing, for pools where a patron is required to select three or more horses, each permitholder shall retain out of the 9.02% to be distributed as purse money, a sum deemed necessary by the racing commission, for use by the commission to finance a prerace blood testing program, and such other testing programs which the commission shall deem proper and necessary and which shall be subject to the regulation and control of said commission.

(c) (i) 62% of 1% of all pools shall be deducted and set aside in a special trust account for the establishment and support by the commission of the thoroughbred breeding industry in New Jersey; to improve purses for closed races; to provide awards for owners and breeders of registered New Jersey bred horses who earn portions of purses in closed races at New Jersey racetracks and to owners of stallions posted on the official stallion rosters of the Thoroughbred Breeders' Association of New Jersey which sire such New Jersey bred money earners and awards to the New Jersey Thoroughbred Breeders' Association for programs beneficial to thoroughbred breeding in this State. The New Jersey thoroughbred award program shall be administered and disbursed by the commission while the thoroughbred open breeder awards shall be administered and disbursed by the New Jersey Department of Agriculture. The special trust account to be established pursuant to this paragraph shall be separate and apart from the special trust account established and maintained pursuant to subparagraph (b) of this paragraph.

(ii) 12% of 1% shall be deducted and set aside in a special trust account for the purpose of stabilizing the Thoroughbred Breeding Award Program. These funds shall be used by New Jersey Racing Commission to supplement both the open and closed award programs. When necessary, the Racing Commission shall forward a portion of the funds to the Department of Agriculture for distribution to New Jersey bred horses that successfully compete in open races. Any sums not used shall revert to the State General Treasury.

(f) Notwithstanding the foregoing, for pools where a patron is required to select three or more horses, 50% of 1% of the total contributions shall be held and set aside in the special trust account referred to in subparagraph (c) (i) of this paragraph.

(2) Where the amount derived from the pari-mutuel handle exceeds \$1 million per day based on such contributions accumulated and averaged during the calendar year, the permitholder shall:

(a) Pay to the commission 50% of 1% of so much of the total contributions to all pari-mutuel pools conducted or made during such calendar year.

Payment on account of such sums to be paid to the commission shall be made every seventh day of any and every race meeting in the amount then due as determined in the manner provided above, and shall be accompanied by a report under oath showing the total of all such contributions, together with such other information as the commission may require. Except as otherwise provided by law, no admission or amusement tax, excise tax, license or horseracing fee of any kind shall be assessed or collected from any permitholder by the State of New Jersey, or by any county or municipality, or by any other body having power to assess or collect license fees or taxes.

(b) Hold and set aside in an account designated as a special trust account 23% of 1% of such total contributions to be used and distributed as hereinafter provided and as provided in section 5 of P. L. 1967, c. 40, for the following purposes and no other:

(i) 18% of 1% thereof for contributions and awards designed to improve and promote the thoroughbred breeding industry in New Jersey through payments of awards to owners and breeders of registered New Jersey bred horses which earn portions of purses in open events on New Jersey tracks, and to owners of stallions posted on the official stallion rosters of the Thoroughbred Breeders' Association of New Jersey which sire such registered New Jersey bred money winners;

(ii) 5% of 1% thereof for State horse breeding and development programs, research, fairs, horseshows, youth activities, promotion and administration.

(c) Retain 8.79% of such total contributions for his own uses and purposes. For pools where the patron is required to select two horses, the permitholder shall retain 9.86% of the total contribution and for pools where the patron is required to select three or more horses, the permitholder shall retain 13.03% of the total contributions. Each permitholder shall contribute out of its 13.03% share of pools, where the patron is required to select three or more horses, a sum deemed necessary by the racing commission, to finance a prerace blood testing program, and such other testing programs which the commission shall deem proper and necessary and which shall be subject to the regulation and control of said commission.

(d) Distribute as purse money and for programs designed to aid the horsemen and the New Jersey Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association 6.58% of such contributions. Notwithstanding the foregoing, for pools where the patron is required to select two horses, the permitholder shall distribute as purse money 7.51% of such contributions and for pools where the patron is required to select three or more horses, the permitholder shall distribute as purse

money 9.85% of the total contributions. Expenditures for programs designed to aid the horsemen and the New Jersey Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association shall not exceed 2.5% of the sum available for distribution as purse money from all pari-mutuel pools. The formula for distribution of the purse money as either overnight purses or special stakes shall be determined by an agreement between the New Jersey Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association and the permitholder. Notwithstanding the foregoing, for pools where a patron is required to select three or more horses, each permitholder shall retain out of the 9.85% to be distributed as purse money, a sum deemed necessary by the racing commission, for use by the commission to finance a prerace blood testing program, and such other testing programs which the commission shall be subject to the regulation and control of said commission.

(c)(i) 60% of 1% of all pools shall be deducted and set aside in a special trust account for the establishment and support by the commission of the thoroughbred breeding industry in New Jersey; to improve purses for closed races; to provide awards for owners and breeders of registered New Jersey bred horses who earn portions of purses in closed races at New Jersey racetracks and to owners of stallions posted on the official stallion rosters of the Thoroughbred Breeders' Association of New Jersey which sire such New Jersey bred money earners and awards to New Jersey thoroughbred breeders associations for programs beneficial to thoroughbred breeding in this State. The New Jersey thoroughbred award program shall be administered and disbursed by the commission while the thoroughbred open breeder awards shall be administered and disbursed by the New Jersey Department of Agriculture. The special trust account to be established pursuant to this paragraph shall be separate and apart from the special trust account established and maintained pursuant to subparagraph (b) of this paragraph.

(ii) 30% of 1% shall be deducted and set aside in a special trust account for the purpose of stabilizing the Thoroughbred Breeding Award Program. These funds shall be used by the New Jersey Racing Commission to supplement both the open and closed award programs. When necessary, the Racing Commission shall forward a portion of the funds to the Department of Agriculture for distribution to New Jersey bred horses that successfully compete in open races. Any sums not used shall revert to the State General Treasury.

(f) Notwithstanding the foregoing, for pools where a patron is required to select three or more horses, 49% of 1% of the total contributions shall be held and set aside in the special trust account referred to in subparagraph (c)(i) of this paragraph."

Mr. Codey moved that Senate Bill No. 811 as amended pursuant to the recommendations of the Governor, be given second reading without reference, for the purpose of reenactment, which motion was adopted.

Mr. President:

I am directed by the General Assembly to forward herewith to the Senate the enclosed 40 copies of Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 87 entitled "A Concurrent Resolution proposing to amend Article IV, Section VII, paragraph 2 of the Constitution," with the request that they be placed upon the desks of the members of the Senate in open meeting forthwith.

Resolved: 1. That printed copies of Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 87 entitled "A Concurrent Resolution proposing to amend Article IV, Section VII, paragraph 2 of the Constitution," be placed upon the desks of the members of the Senate forthwith; and

2. A record of the placing thereof be made in the Senate Journal and the Secretary certify such placing and the date thereof to the Clerk of the General Assembly.

The Secretary then caused to be placed upon the desks of each member a copy of Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 87 and the placing thereof is hereby noted in the Journal.

The Secretary read a communication from the Governor who has conditionally vetoed Senate No. 1149, which communication was given first reading.

Mr. Russo offered the following amendment to Senate Bill No. 1149 pursuant to the recommendations of the Governor, which amendments were adopted.

SENATE BILL No. 1149

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 1, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate No. 1149 with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill would re-establish the State Expenditures Limitations Act, a version of which expired June 30, 1983. I strongly applaud the intent of maintaining a State cap law, but have certain technical problems with the legislation as written, and find its being delivered to my desk in an unacceptable form for the fourth time to be nothing more than partisan political posturing. I therefore return it with my recommendations at this time for essentially the same

reasons that I returned the sponsor's three previous State cap bills, Senate Nos. 2035, and 3499, and 3635, with my recommendations, on March 30, 1983, August 29, 1983 and January 9, 1984, respectively.

It is disappointing that the Legislature has now four times passed its version of a "State Expenditures Limitation Act," while continually failing to act in a responsible manner with regard to State expenditures and formula spending, including the Legislature's repeated failure to concur in my recommendations for the establishment of a responsible "Spending & Revenue Control Commission." I have now vetoed over \$200 million in proposed spending increases passed by the Legislature, each one of which, if allowed to become law, would of course have shattered the expenditure "cap" which the Legislature now so irresponsibly and demagogically seeks to impose through this legislation and have in fact signed legislation including the FY 83 and FY 84 budgets and supplemental appropriations thereto each unanimously passed by the Legislature which would have violated any such "cap" legislation they have passed. The Legislature cannot continue to apply this double standard.

While the standards set forth in Senate No. 1149 are similar to the State cap law as originally passed in 1976, these standards are not consistent with the most recently existing State law on State caps or expenditure limitations, as that law has been amended in each year from Fiscal Year 1981 through Fiscal Year 1984. For example, Senate No. 1600 of 1983 and Senate No. 3500 of 1984, each of which the bill sponsor voted for, amended the cap to exclude capital construction and federal program assumptions. I cannot understand why, despite voting for those exemptions at least two times over the past two years, the sponsor now fails to include them in his own bill.

Although we have long sought, and in fact successfully gained, more control over New Jersey's future through the Federalism changes coming out of Washington, this version of the cap law as proposed in Senate No. 1149 would not account for the State assumption of new federal programs, such as the State assumption of increased social security costs, etc.

Mr. Russo moved that Senate Bill No. 1149 as amended pursuant to the recommendations of the Governor, be given second reading without reference, for the purpose of reenactment which motion was adopted.

By not allowing consideration for capital increases, the State cap law version proposed by the Legislature would hinder our efforts to make those kind of almost universally applauded pay-as-you-go capital expenditures necessary to keep debt service under control and protect our jealously guarded triple-A credit rating for which a real and reasonable State expenditure limitation law is also necessary. Senate No. 1149 would also hinder the State's efforts to establish a comprehensive transportation financing fund or to make the maximum use of federal match highway funds for our deteriorat-

ing transportataion infrastructure on highways, bridges, and mass transit facilities. Everyone will agree that it is more responsible for the State to proceed wth a pay-as-you-go capital plan rather than continually imposing more debt service on future generations through floating more bond issues, but Senate No. 1149 would provide a disincentive to pay-as-you-go capital financing.

Therefore, I recommend the following amendments for concurrent by the Legislature:

Page 1, Title: After "the State and" delete in entirety, insert "amending and supplementing, Title 52 of the Revised Statutes"

Page 1, Section 2, Line 10: After "instrumentalities;" omit "and exclusive"

Page 1, Section 2, Line 11: Omit ", and" insert ";

Page 1, Section 2, Line 14: After "election" insert "of money appropriated and paid or to be paid by the State as capital construction appropriations; of money appropriated and paid or to be paid by the State on all lease or lease purchase agreements; of money appropriated and paid as grants-in-aid; and of money appropriated for fringe benefits for State employees."

Page 1, Section 3, Lines 4-6: Delete in entirety, insert:

$$"(1 + P(T_i) \times b. exp. = \text{Maximum expenditures})"$$

Page 2, Section 3, Line 8: After "means" insert "the average annual percentage increase in"; omit "in the year" insert "over the four years"

Page 2, Section 3, Line 11: After "for the" insert "second"

Page 2, Section 3, Lines 11-12: Omit "preceding the commencement of the base year" insert "in each of the prior years"

Page 2, Section 3, Line 13: Omit "in the" insert "for each prior"

Page 2, Section 3, Line 13: Omit "that" insert "the second"

Page 2, Section 3, Line 14: After "department;" insert "and by then taking the average of the percentage changes between each of the prior years;
and"

Page 2, Section 3, Lines 15-21: Omit

Page 2, Section 3, Line 22: Omit "c." insert "b."

Page 2, Section 3, After Line 23: Insert new sections as follows:

"4. The "maximum expenditure" prescribed in section 3 of this act may be increased in any fiscal year by (1) any unexpected decrease from the "base year" in the estimate of non-state revenue such as Federal program revenue; and (2) any estimated increases from the "base year" in program costs imposed on the State by the Federal Government, such as employer contributions to Social Security.

5. If in any fiscal year any function or service performed by the Federal Government is transferred to, or its costs of operation or performance are assumed by the State, such transfer or assumption

shall, for the purposes of the formula prescribed in section 3 of this act, be deemed to have occurred in the base year and, therefore, the "b. exp." component of the formula shall be adjusted accordingly to reflect any increase or decrease in expenditures as a result of such transfer or assumption by the State."

SENATE BILL No. 1352

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1352 without my signature.

This bill would amend P. L. 1983, c. 7, the Acupuncture Practice Act, to remove the newly-created Acupuncture Examining Board from the jurisdiction of the State Board of Medical Examiners. Pursuant to last year's Act, all regulations adopted, amended or repealed by the Acupuncture Examining Board were subject to the review and approval of the State Board of Medical Examiners. The State Board of Medical Examiners was made responsible for the establishing of standards of acupuncture, with the Acupuncture Examining Board serving as an advisory board. Senate No. 1352 would make the Acupuncture Examining Board completely independent of the State Board of Medical Examiners. The acupuncture board would be given sole unsupervised authority for promulgating regulations and establishing professional standards.

Acupuncture is a newly recognized treatment in this country. While its use in the western world is growing in acceptance, it is still a novel field of medical practice. I feel that the practice of

acupuncture should continue to be supervised by the State Board of Medical Examiners. Acupuncture is a health care treatment which should be regulated by the state board responsible for the practice of medicine.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1352 without my signature.

SENATE BILL No. 1477

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 1, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1477 without my signature.

This bill increases the general formula aid, bilingual education aid, and compensatory education aid categories by an amount equal to \$18,295,000.00. Specifically, general formula aid is increased by \$5,379,000.00, bilingual aid is increased by \$1,894,000.00 and compensatory education aid is increased by \$11,022,000.00.

My primary objection to this bill is that it appropriates over \$18 million dollars without the Joint Appropriations Committee examining that outlay of dollars within the context of the entire State budget and all the various needs. Currently, the Joint Appropriations Committee is reviewing the FY 85 budget and this task will not be completed until June of this year. The Joint Appropriations Committee is charged with the responsibility of putting together the Annual Appropriations Act. It performs this function after numerous hours of deliberations and hearings, with testimony from affected Departments, associations, individuals, and interest groups from throughout the State of New Jersey. In that forum, various demands on the Treasury are evaluated not only individually, but also in the context of how they interrelate and the State's priorities in light of the amount of revenue available.

An important part of those deliberations focuses on the recommendations of the Revenue Subcommittee which periodically revises the surplus figures after examining tax collections in the State so that informed judgments can be made by the Joint Appropriations Committee. The Revenue Subcommittee is due to report again, in the next month or two. Signing a bill of this magnitude would not only set a bad precedent but would usurp the power of the Joint Appropriations Committee by precluding their review of these programs. It would also be a great disservice to all the other associations, groups and individuals laying a claim to State dollars who would effectively be foreclosed from any or part of these funds irrespective of need.

I recently signed a large appropriation for pupil transportation because it was my understanding that in level funding transporta-

tion aid in my FY 85 budget, districts would generally not lose money over their last year's appropriation. After my budget was introduced, it came to my attention that this was not true and, in fact, almost half the school districts in our State lost money in the transportation aid area. This was not my intent and it was of the highest priority for me to make this adjustment in the FY 85 budget and to bring the transportation aid account up to last year's percentage of funding. For that reason only, I signed the \$13.5 million supplemental appropriation for transportation aid.

As to the merits of this bill, in the area of compensatory education, in spite of enrollment declines of five percent from last year to this year, it seemed appropriate and fair to increase this aid account by approximately 10 percent in FY 85. In the bilingual area, my recommendations for higher standards were adopted by the State Board *after* the introduction of my budget, and if the Joint Appropriations Committee decides that more State aid is, in fact, needed pursuant to those higher standards, I will most carefully review that action by the Joint Appropriations Committee. I have been assured, however, that the \$1.89 million in additional bilingual money appropriated in this bill is not enough to assist students in meeting those higher standards. Finally, I recommend \$108 million in additional funds for equalization aid which are the most funds ever appropriated under Chapter 212.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1477 without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 1635 (2 OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1635 (2 OCR) with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill appropriates \$10,390,000 from the "Shore Protection Fund" created pursuant to the "Shore Protection Bond Act of 1983" to the Department of Environmental Protection for allocation to beach restoration, maintenance and protection projects by State and local governments. Such allocations will be in the form of State matching grants to counties and municipalities. Also, this bill will facilitate the granting of State loans to counties and municipalities to research, plan, acquire, develop, construct and maintain county and municipal shore protection projects.

While protection and maintenance of our shore areas has been a priority of this Administration and while I am in complete agreement with the appropriation of these monies for such purpose. I would submit that this bill, in its present form, would hinder, and not help, effective implementation of such efforts.

First, as it is currently written, this bill would bind the Department of Environmental Protection as to the amount of money it may spend on a given project. This means that the Department could not award a bid that is in excess of the amount listed in the bill. Unfortunately, the amounts stated in the bill are based on preliminary engineering data that the Department of Environmental Protection provided. Actual expenditures could quite easily be greater or lesser in amount than the stated figure and there is no feature in the bill which gives the Department of Environmental Protection discretion to apply funds earmarked for one project to

another project in need of such funds. Such a measure might effectively result in an added expense to shore protection project bidders, which they would then recoup by raising their overhead in future bids. In addition, prior notice of the availability of a specific amount of monies for a particular project could result in submission of inflated estimates by project bidders.

It is my understanding that there have been no allegations, at any time in the past, of any abuse of discretion on the part of the Department of Environmental Protection with respect to allocations of bond monies. In fact, whenever the Department has been requested by the Legislature to render an accounting of its expenditures, it has done so in an expeditious and forthcoming manner. Thus, in view of the difficulties presented by specifying project amounts in a piece of legislation and in view of the fact that practical and equitable considerations render the ability to transfer funds crucial to receive optimum results, it is submitted that inclusion of such specified amounts serves no purpose but to present an obstacle to the business at hand.

Further, I would like to impress upon the Legislature my strong disfavor with inclusion of project lists in appropriation bills. The existence of such lists divests administrative agencies, which possess the technical expertise to evaluate projects and their relative merit, of the ability to make such evaluations, and places such power in the hands of those with particular interests who may lack the far reaching vision crucial to insuring that bond monies are appropriated in a just manner and according to need.

For instance, this bill precludes the Department of Environmental Protection from spending funds for any projects not specifically listed in the bill. If a storm were to strike, as just experienced by our shore residents, or if a bulkhead was to simply give way because of age, the Department would be precluded from undertaking any necessary repairs until the Legislature came back into session and authorized the expenditure. It would seem to me that such an approach runs counter to public policy and I will not agree to such a procedure in the future.

At the present time, for the sole reason that citizens of our shore areas are in need of immediate assistance and to eliminate the severe difficulties presented by inclusion of specific project amounts in this legislation, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1635 (2 OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1049 with my recommendations for reconsideration.

Senate Bill No. 1049 permits the sheriff of any county to appoint a director of the bureau of narcotics to serve for a term of one year. I certainly applaud the intent of the bill which is to create a position to oversee narcotics investigation and control activities on a county level. Currently, only Essex County has a county Bureau of Narcotics. However, other counties may decide at some future time that a county-level bureau would aid in the war against the distributors of controlled dangerous substances in their area.

Senate Bill No. 1049 establishes a rather arbitrary job qualification standard of 20 years or more as a law enforcement official with no assurance of past expertise in narcotics control. I propose to amend the bill to establish a prerequisite of 10 years' experience as a law enforcement official, three years of which shall have been in a supervisory function that included responsibilities for narcotics investigation or control activities. It is felt that this revision would allow for more flexibility in choosing an individual for the position while ensuring that the person would have some supervisory experience including responsibility for narcotics law enforcement.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1049 and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, line 2: After "for" insert "10"

Page 1, Section 1, line 3: After "official" insert ", 3 years of which shall have been in a supervisory position that included responsibilities for narcotics investigation or control activities,"

SENATE BILL No. 1926 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14, of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1926 (OCR) with my recommendations for reconsideration.

This legislation creates a 16 member Task Force on Equitable Compensation to reevaluate the State's title evaluation and wage setting process. This Task Force, which would be required to submit interim reports of its findings at specified intervals, would be charged with recommending changes in the current salary range determination mechanisms and revisions in the compensation range as required to achieve an equitable pay structure.

An understanding of the chronology of events leading up to the introduction of Senate Bill No. 1926 is helpful. On October 25, 1982, Senate Bill No. 1883 was introduced for the purpose of providing for an analysis of job and salary classifications in State government as recommended by the Commission on Sex Discrimination. However, this bill was never listed for a floor vote in the Senate and consequently expired at the end of the 1982-83 legislative session. During the summer of 1983, my office began extensive research on the issue of equitable compensation. On December 6, 1983 I issued Executive Order No. 53, which created a Task Force on State Compensation Equity to review the State Compensation Plan and recommend any changes in the current salary range determination mechanisms necessary to ensure pay equity for all State employees.

On April 30, 1984, the Legislature passed Senate Bill No. 1144, which was the successor to Senate Bill No. 1883. I conditionally vetoed Senate Bill No. 1144 on June 18, 1984, enumerating my objections to the bill and expressing my belief that the Executive Order was more flexible than the legislation and would accomplish the desired changes more quickly. In my conditional veto message to Senate Bill No. 1144, I emphasized my commitment to ensuring a fair, non-biased wage structure for the employees of this State and explained in detail the progressive nature of New Jersey's job content evaluation system.

Senate Bill No. 1926 (OCR) was introduced on June 18, 1984, and was passed by both Houses of the Legislature on the following June 28th. Although this legislation addresses some of the concerns

I cited in my conditional veto message to Senate Bill No. 1144, there were still a number of provisions in the bill which concerned we when it reached my desk. Throughout the summer, my office has worked with the sponsor and other interested parties on these outstanding issues. The following recommendations, which have been concurred in by the sponsor, represent the conclusions of these discussions. I especially commend the sponsor, Senator Lipman, and Assemblyman Bennett for their time and effort on this important issue.

As I indicated in my conditional veto message to Senate Bill No. 1144, New Jersey's job content evaluation system is a sophisticated and nationally recognized one which has been thoroughly re-evaluated since its inception in 1969. For this reason, the Task Force on Equitable Compensation should strive to eliminate any salary inequities by modifying the current system rather than by establishing a new and unproven system. Accordingly, I have recommended several revisions which direct the Task Force to review the existing job content evaluation system and recommend any necessary modifications to it.

In order to ensure close cooperation of the Task Force, the Civil Service Commission, and the Legislature, I have recommended changes to clarify the processing of the interim reports to be submitted by the Task Force. Senate Bill No. 1926 (OCR) currently requires that the Task Force shall submit interim reports of its findings, the first of which shall be no later than 6 months from the effective date of this act. I have proposed language requiring that the Civil Service Commission shall take appropriate action on the recommendations contained in the interim report by filing a report with fiscal recommendations to the Governor and to the Legislature within 30 days of receipt thereof. Once this report is filed, the Legislature shall have the responsibility of acting upon the reports filed by the Task Force and the Civil Service Commission. If after 5 months from the filing of the interim report the Legislature has not taken the appropriate action on an interim report, the Task Force shall suspend its work until the Legislature acts. If 12 more months pass and no action has still been taken, the Task Force shall disband. This process provides for a more orderly consideration of the Task Force's recommendations and will ensure increased cooperation between the affected entities.

I have also recommended further changes in the composition of the Task Force. As I am now acceding to a union representation on the Task Force, I believe that the Commissioner of the Department of Labor and Director of the Office of Employer/Employee Relations should also be represented. I am also recommending that the number of public members be raised from 5 to 8 in order to permit further diversity.

In order to facilitate the administration of the Task Force, I have further recommended that reviewable titles shall be limited to those having 15 or more incumbents. This change was made in

order to ensure that the Task Force consider a realistic number of titles and focuses their attention on areas in which the broadest belief can be conferred.

In addition, I have added a provision requiring that no interim report shall be released without the affirmative vote of a majority of the total members of the Task Force.

Finally, I have recommended that the appropriation contained in this bill be raised from \$150,000 to \$300,000 in order to make certain that the Task Force is adequately funded and is able to conduct the comprehensive study I desire to be done. I have also recommended that the effective date be changed from the 90th day to the 45th day following enactment, as I feel that the existence of this Task Force is long overdue and that it should be instituted as soon as possible. In order to encourage the Task Force to address its charge in a responsible manner, I have suggested that the Task Force expire 3 years from the effective date of this act. In the event that the Task Force has not completed its study by the expiration date, the Legislature has the discretion to extend the life of the Task Force through separate legislation.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1926 (OCR) with the following recommendations:

Any fiscal recommendations contained in the interim report of the Task Force and the corresponding reports of the Civil Service Commission shall be acted upon by the Legislature within 60 days of the receipt of the Civil Service Commission's report; provided, however, that if the Civil Service Commission fails to act within the prescribed 30 day period, the Legislature shall act upon the Task Force's report as if the Civil Service Commission's report was filed on the 30th day following receipt of the interim report. The Task Force shall continue working after the submission of an interim report but shall not file any further interim reports until the most recently filed one has been acted upon by the Legislature as herein set forth.

The Task Force shall cease to function if appropriate legislative action has not been taken within five months of the submission of the interim report. The Task Force shall resume operations once appropriate legislative action has been taken; provided, however, that if appropriate legislative action has not been taken within twelve months after the expiration of the five month period referred to above, the Task Force shall terminate."

SENATE BILL No. 949 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 949 (OCR), with my objections, for reconsideration.

I am in agreement with the purpose of this bill to make revisions in the law governing municipal industrial commissions.

I note, however, that in the original version of the bill members of an industrial commission were to be appointed by the municipal governing body, as were vacancies in commission membership. This was the recommendation of the State Commission of Investigation, whose recommendations formed the basis of this legislation.

The Senate County and Municipal Government Committee amended the bill so that industrial commission members would be appointed by the mayor with the advice and consent of the council of the municipality. Not all municipalities in this State operate under a mayor and council form of government, and therefore, such language would not be complete. I favor the recommendation of the State Commission of Investigation and the original version of the bill on this matter.

The bill requires a second review of a contract for the sale, lease, option to purchase or lease or other transfer of real property of an industrial commission by its municipal governing body. In place of this provision, I recommend granting the mayor a 10-day veto period of such action based upon specified guidelines. This will permit a review of what the industrial commission does without creating a climate in which private developers would be unwilling to enter into agreements for the purchase of property because of the fear that undue time would elapse before such agreements could be made final.

I am also deleting from the bill the requirement that real property not used in accordance with the restrictions or conditions placed on private developers by the municipal industrial commission revert to the commission by operation of law. I am advised that such a reversion in the statute would make it difficult for developers to borrow money from banks, and I note that the SCI report made no recommendation in this area.

Therefore, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 949 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Lines 3 and 3A: Delete "mayor with the advice and consent of the council"; insert "governing body"

Page 1, Section 1, Line 13: Delete "mayor with the advice and consent of the council"; insert "governing body"

Page 5, Section 4, Lines 1-9: After "(New section)" delete these lines in entirety; insert as follows:

"Notice of any contract for the sale, lease, option to purchase or lease or other transfer of real property or any interest therein proposed by the commission shall be submitted to the mayor of the municipality whereupon such proposed commission action shall be subject to the mayor's veto. The mayor shall exercise the veto power over this proposed action by a written veto to the commission. The mayor shall have 10 days, Saturdays, Sundays and holidays excepted, after receiving notice of the action to exercise the veto power. The mayor's veto power shall be exercised in accordance with the following guidelines: a. the action conforms to the master plan of the community; b. the action is environmentally compatible with the community; c. the action complies with the zoning of the industrial area; and d. the project complies with the policies and procedures established by the governing body in cooperation with the commission. If a mayoral veto is exercised during the specified time period, the action of the commission shall be considered null and void. If no veto is exercised during the specified time period, the action of the commission shall be considered valid. The mayor, upon receiving notice of the action, may in writing notify the commission of the approval of the action before the expiration of the 10-day period."

Page 5, Section 5, Lines 10 through 13: Omit "If the real property is not used in" on line 10; omit lines 11 through 13

SENATE BILL No. 44 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 44 (OCR) with my objections, for reconsideration.

The intent of this bill is to provide a process for expediting the installation of traffic control devices and signs at intersections located within 300 feet of public or private schools. While I support the intent of this bill, I believe that its mechanism for review of municipal ordinances in this area can be improved.

It is important to provide an outside review to ensure that the proposed solutions to problems that exist regarding traffic near

schools are sound and reasonable. Moreover, experience has shown that proposals for traffic signals that at first seem to be in the public interest often may be ineffective or even detrimental to pedestrian and motorist safety when they are examined in detail by professional traffic engineers.

Accordingly, I am recommending that the Commissioner of Transportation review municipal ordinances adopted under the provisions of this bill. In order to ensure that this review is timely and thorough, I am recommending that the Commissioner be required to disapprove any ordinance he finds to be improper or deficient within 90 days and that he provide the municipality with written reasons for his disapproval. This review mechanism would render the municipal engineer's certification unnecessary, and I am recommending that this provision be deleted from the bill.

I am also proposing technical amendments to conform the language of the bill to these recommendations.

Therefore, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 44 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Lines 6-7: Delete "specifications of chapter 4 of Title 39 of the Revised Statutes" insert "current standards prescribed by the Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways as adopted by the Commissioner of Transportation"

Page 1, Section 1, Line 8: Delete ",", insert "."

Pages 1-2, Section 1, Lines 9-25: Delete entirely. Insert "Before an ordinance shall take effect, however, the governing body shall submit a copy of the ordinance to the Commissioner of Transportation for his review and approval together with detailed information as to the location of streets, intersections and signs affected by any installation, traffic count, accident and speed sampling data when appropriate and any other information as the commissioner may require. If the commissioner disapproves the ordinance, he shall file his disapproval, in writing, with a statement of the reasons for his disapproval, with the governing body within 90 days following the receipt of the ordinance. If the commissioner approves the ordinance or fails to file his disapproval within the 90-day review period, the ordinance shall take effect immediately."

SENATE BILL No. 571

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 571 with my objections and recommendations for amendment.

Senate Bill No. 571 amends the law pertaining to the Alternate Benefit Program (ABP) to provide that the employer contribution for each member of the ABP shall be at a rate equal to the normal contribution made by the employer on behalf of nonveteran members of the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) or eight percent (8%) of the ABP member's base salary, whichever is greater. Current law provides that the employer contribution obligation for each member of the ABP shall be equal to the employer contribution obligation for nonveteran members of the PERS. The effect of Senate Bill No. 571 is to require the employer to make a minimum contribution of 8% of base salary for each ABP member.

As a general rule, I do not support the concept of a fixed employer contribution obligation to our State administered pension systems. I believe that the current method of computing employer contribution rates for our State administered pension systems, via an annual computation by the actuary for a system, is the most equitable and prudent method. However, in the instant case, the concept of a fixed employer contribution obligation is justified.

This concept is justified for the Alternate Benefit Program because of the unique nature of this State administered pension system. Unlike the other State administered pension systems, the ABP is a strict annuity program. As such, a member's retirement allowance will consist only of the member's contribution, the employer's contribution on behalf of the member, and interest. Current law provides that the employer contribution rate for each ABP member shall equal the employer contribution rate for each PERS nonveteran member. As indicated, this contribution rate can fluctuate as it is determined annually by the actuary for the system. Since the ABP is a strict annuity program, a decline in the employer PERS nonveteran contribution rate will directly affect the size of the ABP member's retirement allowance. This is not the case for the members of our other State administered pension systems as their retirement allowances are computed pursuant to a statutory formula. Additionally, the fluctuation in the employer contribution rate make it impossible for an ABP member to compute the amount of his/her retirement allowance and therefore, plan for his/her retirement.

While I support the concept of a fixed employer contribution rate for the members of the ABP, the fixed contribution rate set forth within Senate Bill No. 571 is not the correct solution to the problem.

Senate Bill No. 571 provides that the employer contribution to the ABP shall be 8% of base salary or the employer contribution rate for nonveteran members of the PERS, whichever is greater. This provision would allow ABP members to take advantage of the PERS nonveteran contribution rate when that rate is above 8% of base salary, but allows ABP members to depart from the PERS rate when that rate falls below 8% of base salary. This is an inequitable result. If ABP members wish to sever their connection with the PERS, this severance must be complete; not partial. For this reason, I recommend that Senate Bill No. 571 be amended to set the employer contribution rate for ABP members at 8% of base salary.

An employer contribution rate of 8% of base salary will provide ABP members with the security that they deserve. A contribution rate of 8% of base salary is appropriate for two reasons: First, 8% of base salary was the employer contribution rate from the inception of the ABP in 1969 through Fiscal Year 1976. Secondly, since Fiscal Year 1981, the employer contribution rate for ABP members has been approximately 8% of base salary.

Accordingly, for the aforementioned reason, I return Senate Bill No. 571 to you and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 2, Section 1, Lines 26-28: DELETE "the normal contribution made by the State on behalf of nonveteran members of the Public Employees' Retirement System or"

Page 2, Section 1, Line 29: DELETE "whichever is greater,"

Page 2, Section 1, Lines 35-37: DELETE "the normal contribution made by the State on behalf of nonveteran members of the Public Employees' Retirement System or"

Page 2, Section 1, Line 38: DELETE "whichever is greater,"

Page 2, Section 1, Lines 43-44: DELETE "or continue membership in that State program, as the case may be"; INSERT "and does so, the State shall pay the employer contribution to the alternate benefit program at a rate equal to 8% of the member's base salary. If the member continues membership in the Public Employees' Retirement System"

SENATE BILL NO. 215 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 215 (OCR) with my objections and recommendations for amendment.

This bill amends the law pertaining to the Sheriff's Employees Retirement System (SERS) for counties of the first and second class to give a member with at least ten years of creditable service who then discontinues service the option of receiving his/her accumulated deductions plus interest at a rate of two percent per annum or of deferring receipt of his/her retirement allowance until age 60. Current law does not allow a SERS member the option of deferring his/her retirement allowance upon discontinuing service. Senate Bill No. 215 (OCR) also amends and supplements current law to ensure that widowers shall receive death or survivor benefits in the same amount as are currently being received by widows.

I support the concepts expressed within Senate Bill No. 215 (OCR). I believe that a SERS member who becomes separated from service before reaching age 60 should have the option of deferring his/her retirement allowance until age 60. Additionally, I believe that widowers are entitled to death or survivor benefits in the same amount as are currently being received by widows.

While I support the concepts expressed within Senate Bill No. 215 (OCR), I must return this bill to you so that the language setting forth the deferred retirement allowance formula may be clarified. Section 1b provides that a SERS member who become separated from service may elect to receive a deferred retirement allowance beginning at age 60:

"in . . . an amount which bears the same proportion to the amount of the pension for which he would have qualified if he had continued in service until he attained the age of 60 years as the number of his years of service credited in the fund bear to the total number of years of service he would have achieved had he continued to age 60 and qualified for the pension of one-half of the annual salary he was receiving at the time he . . . became separated from such service."

This formula is difficult to understand and will be more difficult to administer. I am concerned that this formula will be administered incorrectly so that a SERS member will receive an inequitable deferred retirement allowance at age 60. For this reason, I recommend that the above language be deleted from Senate Bill No. 215 (OCR) in favor of the deferred retirement allowance formula set forth within the law pertaining to the Public Employees' Retirement System. This formula is less complicated, has been effectively administered, and will ensure that a SERS member will receive a deferred retirement allowance that equitably reflects his/her years of creditable service.

Accordingly, I return Senate Bill No. 215 (OCR) to you and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Lines 13-21: After "60" omit rest of line 13; omit lines 14 through 21; insert "which shall be made up of an

annuity derived from the accumulated deductions standing to the credit of the individual member's account in the annuity savings fund at the time of his severance from service together with regular interest and a pension which when added to the annuity will produce a total retirement allowance of 1/60th of the annual salary the member was receiving at the time he became separated from service for each year of creditable service"

SENATE BILL No. 1223 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR) with my objections and recommendations for amendment.

This bill, entitled "The Credit Union Act of 1984," revises the law pertaining to the incorporation and regulation of State chartered credit unions. Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR) also repeals current law, P. L. 1938, c. 293 (C. 17:13-26 through 17:13-71). The primary purpose of this act is to modernize the law pertaining to State chartered credit unions to incorporate important innovative changes that currently exist within the federal law governing federally chartered credit unions.

I support the general purpose of Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR). Modernizing the law governing State chartered credit unions will encourage groups having reasonable common bonds to form credit unions and will create an incentive for federally chartered credit unions doing business in this State to become State chartered credit unions. Although I support the concepts expressed within Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR), there exist a few problems with this bill that require that I return Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR) to you with my recommendations for amendment.

Section 14b of Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR) must be amended to clarify the scope of credit union membership. Section 14b provides that credit union membership may include, but is not necessarily limited to, groups having a common bond of similar occupation, association or interest, members of the immediate family of those persons, or otherwise, as approved by the Commissioner.

I am concerned that Section 14b, by not limiting credit union membership to groups having the common bonds that are enumerated within the subsection, could prompt the formation of credit unions having unreasonable common bonds of membership. For

this reason, I recommend that Section 14b be amended to delete the language "but is not necessarily limited to" from the section.

In addition, Section 14b is also deficient in that it neglects to include one group for which credit unions are very important; that is the group having a common bond of a well-defined neighborhood, community or rural district. For many of these individuals, a credit union represents the only avenue by which they may take advantage of savings and investment vehicles with which to build a better life. Accordingly, I recommend that Section 14b also be amended to include, as an eligible group, persons having a common bond of a well-defined neighborhood, community or rural district.

By amending Section 14b in the manner that I have outlined above, the scope of credit union membership will be clarified. Additionally, as amended, Section 14b will coincide with the pertinent provision within federal law, 12 U. S. C. sec. 1759.

Section 34, pertaining to credit union examinations, must be amended to clarify the language within the section. Section 34 currently provides that an examination by the Commissioner of Banking shall not be necessary if a certified public accountant makes an examination and then files an opinion with the Commissioner. This language could be interpreted as still giving the Commissioner the privilege of performing an examination. However, the above language could also be interpreted as foreclosing the Commissioner from making an examination if the certified public accountant files an opinion. Accordingly, I recommend that Section 34 be amended to ensure that the Commissioner of Banking may have the choice either of examining a credit union or of accepting the opinion of a certified public accountant.

I am also concerned with Section 45 pertaining to out-of-state credit unions. Section 45 provides that a credit union organized under the laws of another state may do business as a credit union of this State if it satisfies certain enumerated conditions. This provision is in opposition to our current State policy regarding interstate banking operations. Our current policy mandates that financial institutions in our State may not operate interstate. Section 45, although pertaining to out-of-state credit unions, is contrary to current State policy as it would allow these entities to conduct business interstate. As such, I recommend that Section 45 be deleted from this act until such time as our State policy regarding interstate banking operations changes.

In conclusion, I believe that Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR) is necessary legislation that will encourage groups having reasonable common bonds to form credit unions and will create an incentive for federally chartered credit unions doing business in this State to become State chartered credit unions. However, for the aforementioned reasons, I return Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Line 1: Delete "47" insert "46"

Page 1, Section 2, Line 6: Delete "121E" insert "1216"

Page 6, Section 14, Lines 8-9: Delete ", but is not necessarily limited to,"

Page 6, Section 14, Line 10: After "interest," insert "or groups who reside within a well-defined neighborhood, community or rural district, and"

Page 6, Section 14, Line 11: Delete ", or otherwise as approved by the Commissioner"

Page 15, Section 34, Lines 2-4: Delete ", except that no" on line 2; delete line 3; delete "are examined by a certified public accountant" on line 4; insert ". Currently, construction and subcode officials appointed between January 1, 1977 and January 1, 1981 are grandfathered into the classified service without examination. This bill would extend the latter date until July 1, 1982, thus extending the reach of the grandfather provision to additional officials.

It has long been the policy of this State to require public officials who seek Civil Service status to sit for a competitive examination. As Governor, I intend to continue to support that policy. I cannot, in all good conscience, enact legislation that would allow individuals to avoid legitimate Civil Service requirements.

While some individuals affected by this bill may be excellent candidates for permanent appointment to the construction code and subcode positions, it would be unfair to those other qualified individuals who may be interested in and eligible for these positions to grandfather in individuals appointed between January 1, 1981 and July 1, 1982, without requiring them to take a competitive examination. Under the circumstances presented by this legislation, I cannot sanction the supplanting of our Civil Service laws which are designed to ensure that appointments and promotions in Civil Service jurisdictions are made according to merit and fitness, ascertained where practicable by competitive examinations.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 779 without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 1171

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 1, paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1171 without my signature.

This bill would allow Frederick S. Lum to obtain permanent Civil Service status without taking a competitive Civil Service examination by permanently appointing Mr. Lum to the police department of the borough of Keyport. It has long been the policy of this State to require public officials who seek Civil Service status to sit for a competitive examination. As Governor, I intend to continue and support that policy. I cannot, in all good conscience, enact legislation that would allow an individual to avoid legitimate Civil Service requirements.

While I am certain Mr. Lum would be an excellent candidate for a position on the police force based upon his experience and educational background, it would be unfair to those other qualified individuals who may be interested in and eligible for the position to appoint Mr. Lum to the police department of the borough of Keyport without requiring him to take a competitive examination. Under the circumstances presented by this legislation, I cannot sanction the supplanting of our Civil Service laws which are designed to ensure that appointments and promotions in Civil Service jurisdictions are made according to merit and fitness ascertained where practicable, by competitive examinations. While Attorney General Kimmelman has recently ruled that the 35 year old age

limit for the hiring of policemen violates the Age Discrimination in Employment Act, that ruling does not relieve candidates for these positions who are over the invalid age limit from having to sit for a competitive examination.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1171 without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 1228

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1228 with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill would establish a commission to study State and local finances in the State of New Jersey, and to make recommendations with regard to funding resources and related financial elements. I strongly applaud the sponsor's intent behind this legislation, and especially appreciate his willingness to have taken the time to review the various proposals and to exchange ideas on how best to establish such a commission. We all share in the goal of enabling the State of New Jersey to conduct a fair and unbiased study through the establishment of a comprehensive commission which will concentrate closely on the policy questions and interrelationships of the State tax structure, State expenditures, and mandated spending formulas as well.

Accordingly, to provide for our State to accomplish the long standing goal of creating a comprehensive, balanced spending and revenue study commission, I am today recommending amendments, which I have developed in working closely with the sponsor and regarding which we look forward to prompt approval by the Legislature.

Therefore, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1228 and recommend that it be amended as follows:

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR) with my objections and recommendations for amendment.

This bill, entitled "The Credit Union Act of 1984," revises the law pertaining to the incorporation and regulation of State chartered credit unions. Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR) also repeals cur-

rent law, P. L. 1938, c. 293 (C. 17:13-26 through 17:13-71). The primary purpose of this act is to modernize the law pertaining to State chartered credit unions to incorporate important innovative changes that currently exist within the federal law governing federally chartered credit unions.

I support the general purpose of Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR). Modernizing the law governing State chartered credit unions will encourage groups having reasonable common bonds to form credit unions and will create an incentive for federally chartered credit unions doing business in this State to become State chartered credit unions. Although I support the concepts expressed within Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR), there exist a few problems with this bill that require that I return Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR) to you with my recommendations for amendment.

Section 14b of Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR) must be amended to clarify the scope of credit union membership. Section 14b provides that credit union membership may include, but is not necessarily limited to, groups having a common bond of similar occupation, association or interest, members of the immediate family of those persons, or otherwise, as approved by the Commissioner.

I am concerned that Section 14b, by not limiting credit union membership to groups having the common bonds that are enumerated within the subsection, could prompt the formation of credit unions having unreasonable common bonds of membership. For this reason, I recommend that Section 14b be amended to delete the language "but is not necessarily limited to" from the section.

In addition, Section 14b is also deficient in that it neglects to include one group for which credit unions are very important; that is the group having a common bond of a well-defined neighborhood, community or rural district. For many of these individuals, a credit union represents the only avenue by which they may take advantage of savings and investment vehicles with which to build a better life. Accordingly, I recommend that Section 14b also be amended to include, as an eligible group, persons having a common bond of a well-defined neighborhood, community or rural district.

By amending Section 14b in the manner that I have outlined above, the scope of credit union membership will be clarified. Additionally, as amended, Section 14b will coincide with the pertinent provision within federal law, 12 U.S.C. sec. 1759.

Section 34, pertaining to credit union examinations, must be amended to clarify the language within the section. Section 34 currently provides that an examination by the Commissioner of Banking shall not be necessary if a certified public accountant makes an examination and then files an opinion with the Commissioner. This language could be interpreted as still giving the Commissioner the privilege of performing an examination. However, the above language could also be interpreted as foreclosing the Commissioner from making an examination if the certified public accountant files

an opinion. Accordingly, I recommend that Section 34 be amended to ensure that the Commissioner of Banking may have the choice either of examining a credit union or of accepting the opinion of a certified public accountant.

I am also concerned with Section 45 pertaining to out-of-state credit unions. Section 45 provides that a credit union organized under the laws of another state may do business as a credit union of this State if it satisfies certain enumerated conditions. This provision is in opposition to our current State policy regarding interstate banking operations. Our current policy mandates that financial institutions in our State may not operate interstate. Section 45, although pertaining to out-of-state credit unions, is contrary to current State policy as it would allow these entities to conduct business interstate. As such, I recommend that Section 45 be deleted from this act until such time as our State policy regarding interstate banking operations changes.

In conclusion, I believe that Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR) is necessary legislation that will encourage groups having reasonable common bonds to form credit unions and will create an incentive for federally chartered credit unions doing business in this State to become State chartered credit unions. However, for the aforementioned reasons, I return Senate Bill No. 1223 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 215 (OCR) with my objections and recommendations for amendment.

This bill amends the law pertaining to the Sheriff's Employees Retirement System (SERS) for counties of the first and second class to give a member with at least ten years of creditable service who then discontinues service the option of receiving his/her accumulated deductions plus interest at a rate of two percent per annum or of deferring receipt of his/her retirement allowance until age 60. Current law does not allow a SERS member the option of deferring his/her retirement allowance upon discontinuing service. Senate Bill No. 215 (OCR) also amends and supplements current law to ensure that widowers shall receive death or survivor benefits in the same amount as are currently being received by widows.

I support the concepts expressed within Senate Bill No. 215 (OCR). I believe that a SERS member who becomes separated from service before reaching age 60 should have the option of deferring his/her retirement allowance until age 60. Additionally, I believe that widowers are entitled to death or survivor benefits in the same amount as are currently being received by widows.

While I support the concepts expressed within Senate Bill No. 215 (OCR), I must return this bill to you so that the language setting forth the deferred retirement allowance formula may be clarified. Section 1b provides that a SERS member who becomes separated from service may elect to receive a deferred retirement allowance beginning at age 60:

"in . . . an amount which bears the same proportion to the amount of the pension for which he would have qualified if he had continued in service until he attained the age of 60 years as the number of his years of service credited in the fund bear

to the total number of years of service he . . . would have achieved had he continued to age 60 and qualified for the pension of one-half of the annual salary he was receiving at the time he . . . became separated from such service."

This formula is difficult to understand and will be more difficult to administer. I am concerned that this formula will be administered incorrectly so that a SERS member will receive an inequitable deferred retirement allowance at age 60. For this reason, I recommend that the above language be deleted from Senate Bill No. 215 (OCR) in favor of the deferred retirement allowance formula set forth within the law pertaining to the Public Employees' Retirement System. This formula is less complicated, has been effectively administered, and will ensure that a SERS member will receive a deferred retirement allowance that equitably reflects his/her years of creditable service.

Accordingly, I return Senate Bill No. 215 (OCR) to you and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Lines 13-21: After "60" omit rest of line 13; omit lines 14 through 21; insert "which shall be made up of an annuity derived from the accumulated deductions standing to the credit of the individual member's account in the annuity savings fund at the time of his severance from service together with regular interest and a pension which when added to the annuity will produce a total retirement allowance of 1/60th of the annual salary the member was receiving at the time he became separated from service for each year of creditable service".

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 44 (OCR) with my objections, for reconsideration.

The intent of this bill is to provide a process for expediting the installation of traffic control devices and signs at intersections located within 300 feet of public or private schools. While I support the intent of this bill, I believe that its mechanism for review of municipal ordinances in this area can be improved.

It is important to provide an outside review to ensure that the proposed solutions to problems that exist regarding traffic near schools are sound and reasonable. Moreover, experience has shown that proposals for traffic signals that at first seem to be in the public interest often may be ineffective or even detrimental to pedestrian and motorist safety when they are examined in detail by professional traffic engineers.

Accordingly, I am recommending that the Commissioner of Transportation review municipal ordinances adopted under the provisions of this bill. In order to ensure that this review is timely and thorough, I am recommending that the Commissioner be required to disapprove any ordinance he finds to be improper or deficient within 90 days and that he provide the municipality with written reasons for his disapproval. This review mechanism would render the municipal engineer's certification unnecessary, and I am recommending that this provision be deleted from the bill.

I am also proposing technical amendments to conform the language of the bill to these recommendations.

Therefore, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 44 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Lines 6-7: Delete "specifications of chapter 4 of Title 39 of the Revised Statutes" insert "current standards prescribed by the Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways as adopted by the Commissioner of Transportation"

Page 1, Section 1, Line 8: Delete "," insert "."

Pages 1-2, Section 1, Lines 9-25: Delete entirely. Insert "Before an ordinance shall take effect, however, the governing body shall submit a copy of the ordinance to the Commissioner of Transportation for his review and approval together with detailed information as to the location of streets, intersections and signs affected by any installation, traffic count, accident and speed sampling data when appropriate and any other information as the commissioner may require. If the commissioner disapproves the ordinance, he shall file

his disapproval, in writing, with a statement of the reasons for his disapproval, with the governing body within 90 days following the receipt of the ordinance. If the commissioner approves the ordinance or fails to file his disapproval within the 90-day review period, the ordinance shall take effect immediately."

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitu-
tion, I am returning Senate Bill No. 949 (OCR), with my objections,
for reconsideration.

I am in agreement with the purpose of this bill to make revisions
in the law governing municipal industrial commissions.

I note, however, that in the original version of the bill members
of an industrial commission were to be appointed by the municipal
governing body, as were vacancies in commission membership. This
was the recommendation of the State Commission of Investigation,
whose recommendations formed the basis of this legislation.

The Senate County and municipal Government Committee
amended the bill so that industrial commission members would be
appointed by the mayor with the advice and consent of the council
of the municipality. Not all municipalities in this State operate
under a mayor and council form of government, and therefore, such
language would not be complete. I favor the recommendation of the

State Commission of Investigation and the original version of the bill on this matter.

The bill requires a second review of a contract for the sale, lease, option to purchase or lease or other transfer of real property of an industrial commission by its municipal governing body. In place of this provision, I recommend granting the mayor a 10-day veto period of such action based upon specified guidelines. This will permit a review of what the industrial commission does without creating a climate in which private developers would be unwilling to enter into agreements for the purchase of property because of the fear that undue time would elapse before such agreements could be made final.

I am also deleting from the bill the requirement that real property not used in accordance with the restrictions or conditions placed on private developers by the municipal industrial commission revert to the commission by operation of law. I am advised that such a reversion in the statute would make it difficult for developers to borrow money from banks, and I note that the SCI report made no recommendation in this area.

Therefore, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 949 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Lines 3 and 3a: Delete "mayor with the advice and consent of the council"; insert "governing body"

Page 1, Section 1, Line 13: Delete "mayor with the advice and consent of the council"; insert "governing body"

Page 5, Section 4, Lines 1-9: After "(New section)" delete these lines in entirety; insert as follows:

"Notice of any contract for the sale, lease, option to purchase or lease or other transfer of real property or any interest therein proposed by the commission shall be submitted to the mayor of the municipality whereupon such proposed commission action shall be subject to the mayor's veto. The mayor shall exercise the veto power over this proposed action by a written veto to the commission. The mayor shall have 10 days, Saturdays, Sundays and holidays excepted, after receiving notice of the action to exercise the veto power. The mayor's veto power shall be exercised in accordance with the following guidelines: a. the action conforms to the master plan of the community; b. the action is environmentally compatible with the community; c. the action complies with the zoning of the industrial area; and d. the project complies with the policies and procedures established by the governing body in cooperation with the commission. If a mayoral veto is exercised during the specified time period, the action of the commission shall be considered null and void. If no veto is exercised during the specified time period, the action of the commission shall be considered valid. The mayor, upon receiving notice of the action, may in writing notify the commission of the approval of the action before the expiration of the 10-day period."

SENATE BILL NO. 540 (2ND OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 1, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 540 (2nd OCR) with my recommendations for amendment.

This bill would allow military service and civilian absentee voters, including those currently residing overseas, to register to vote, apply for an absentee ballot, or both, by sending a federal postcard application form to the county clerk. It also provides that only one federal postcard application is necessary to vote in all elections during the calendar year.

While I support efforts to facilitate overseas civilian absentee voters to apply for an absentee ballot, I do not believe that civilian absentee voters currently residing in the United States or military service voters are currently hampered from obtaining absentee ballots. Civilian absentee voters residing in the United States do

not need to use a federal postcard application form to obtain a ballot or register to vote because they can secure an absentee ballot by contacting their county clerk by letter or phone. These voters would also find it difficult to obtain a federal postcard application form because they are only available at United States Embassies overseas or at military bases. Accordingly, I recommend deleting all reference to civilian absentee voters who are not overseas.

Similarly, this bill purports to afford military service voters the right to use a federal postcard application form to register to vote, apply for an absentee ballot, or both. However, all military service voters, whether overseas or not, are currently afforded the right to vote in local, State and federal elections by using an absentee ballot pursuant to N. J. S. A. 19:57-3 and the Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief Act. In addition to the federal postcard application, requests for such a ballot may be made by military service voters or friends and relatives thereof through a military service ballot application. I propose amending the notice section of this bill to clarify that military service voters are specifically authorized to use the federal postcard application to register to vote or apply for an absentee ballot.

I do believe that all overseas civilians should have the right, as well as the ability, to vote in any federal, State, county or local election whether a primary, general or special election. In order to facilitate this process, Senate Bill No. 540 (2nd OCR) provides that these civilians use a federal postcard application form to register to vote, apply for a ballot, or both and states that only one federal postcard application is necessary to vote in all elections held during the calendar year. I support these provisions in Senate Bill No. 540 (2nd OCR), however, I believe that this bill incorrectly amends the public notice sections of the election laws, rather than the substantive sections of the election laws which set forth the overseas absentee voting provisions. As such, I recommend amending these provisions of the election laws to allow overseas civilian absentee voters to use a federal postcard application form to register to vote or apply for an absentee ballot, and vote. By amending these provisions of the election laws in this manner, overseas civilian voters will have the same right as the military voters to claim a residence in New Jersey as their last address in the United States and be able to vote in any election held in New Jersey. Further, I believe that only one federal postcard application form is necessary to vote in all primary, general, municipal or special elections held in New Jersey during the calendar year.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 540 (2nd OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Title, Lines 1-3: DELETE entirely and INSERT

"An Act concerning absentee voting, amending the title of "An Act concerning elections, providing for voting by absentee ballot by citizens residing abroad formerly domiciled in New Jersey for candidates for federal office, and supplementing the "Absentee Voting

Law (1953)," approved May 7, 1976 (P. L. 1976, c. 23) so that the same shall read "An Act concerning elections, providing for voting by absentee ballot by citizens residing abroad formerly domiciled in New Jersey, and supplementing the "Absentee Voting Law (1953)," amending the body of said act, P. L. 1974, c. 30, P. L. 1953, c. 211 and R. S. 19:31-5.

Page 1, After Enactment Clause, after Line 2: INSERT

"1. R. S. 19:31-5 is amended to read as follows:

Each person, who at the time he applies for registration resides in the district in which he expects to vote, who will be of the age of 18 years or more at the next ensuing general election, who is a citizen of the United States, and who, if he continues to reside in the district until the next general election, will at the time have fulfilled all the requirements as to length of residence to qualify him as a legal voter, shall, unless otherwise disqualified, be entitled to be registered in such district; and when once registered shall not be required to register again in such district as long as he resides therein, except when required to do so by the commissioner, because of the loss of or some defect in his registration record.

Any registrant who moves his residence from the district to an overseas location may continue to vote in the district unless or until the registrant establishes a new domicile in any other district in the State or in any other district in any other state of the United States or the District of Columbia, Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, Guam, or the Virgin Islands, and otherwise complies with the requirements of being an overseas voter as defined in section 2 of P. L. 1976, c. 23 (C. 19:59-2).

The registrant, when registered as provided in this Title, shall be eligible to vote at any election to be held subsequent to such registration, if he shall be a citizen of the United States of the age of 18 years and shall have been a resident of the State for at least 30 days and of the county at least 30 days, when the same is held, or be an overseas voter, subject to any change in his qualifications which may later disqualify him; but if such registrant does not vote at any election during 4 consecutive years his original and duplicate permanent registration and record of voting forms shall be removed to the inactive file and he shall be required to reregister before being allowed to vote at any subsequent election.

2. Section 15 of P. L. 1974, c. 30 (C. 19:31-6.3) is amended to read as follows:

15. Any person entitled to register to vote may register as a voter in the election district in which he resides at any time prior to the twenty-ninth day preceding any primary or general election by completing a registration form described in section 16 of this act, having his signature or mark witnessed by a person registered to vote in New Jersey and submitting the form to the [commissioner of registration] county clerk of the county wherein he resides. Any registration form shall be mailed to the commissioner to which it is

addressed or delivered to such office. A registration form postmarked on the [twenty-ninth] *thirtieth* day preceding any primary or general election shall be deemed timely.

In addition to the foregoing procedure, any military service voter as defined in section 2 of P. L. 1953, c. 211 (C. 19:57-2) and any overseas civilian voter as defined in section 2 of P. L. 1976, c. 23 (C. 19:59-2) may register as a voter in the election district in which he resided prior to his departure from the State at any time prior to the twenty-ninth day preceding any primary or general election by completing a federal post card registration and absentee ballot request form, subscribing and swearing under oath before an appropriate United States official qualified to administer oaths. Any such federal postcard shall be mailed or delivered to the county clerk of the appropriate county in this State. A federal post card registration and absentee ballot request form postmarked on the thirtieth day preceding any primary or general election shall be deemed timely.

3. Section 4 of P. L. 1953, e. 211 (C. 19:57-4) is amended to read as follows:

4. At any time not less than 7 days prior to an election in which he desires to vote by mail, a civilian absentee voter may apply to the person designated in section 6 of this act, for a civilian absentee ballot. Such application or request shall be made in writing, shall be signed by the applicant and shall state his or her place of voting residence and the address to which said ballot shall be sent, and the reason for which the ballot is requested.

Any military service voter desiring to vote in any election or any relative or friend of a military service voter who believes that such voter will desire to vote in any election, may apply to the person designated in section 6 of this act for a military service ballot to be sent to such voter. If a military service voter requests a military service ballot by using a federal postcard application form, the military service voter may elect to request a military service ballot for all elections held during the calendar year and only one federal postcard application form shall be necessary to vote in all elections held during the calendar year.

Any civilian absentee voter who fails to apply within the 7-day time prescribed above may apply in person to the county clerk for an absentee ballot on any day up to 3 p.m. of the day before the election.

In the event of sickness or confinement, the qualified voter may apply in writing for and obtain an absentee ballot by authorized messenger, who shall be so designated over the signature of the voter and whose printed name and address shall appear on the application in the space provided. The authorized messenger shall be a family member or a registered voter of the county in which the application is made and shall place his signature on the application in the space so provided in the presence of the county clerk or his designee. The

county clerk or his designee shall authenticate the signature of the authorized messenger, in the event such a messenger is other than a family member, by comparing it with the signature of the said person appearing on a State of New Jersey driver's license, or other identification issued or recognized as official by the federal government, the State, or any of its political subdivisions, which identification carries the full address and signature of said person. After the signature of the application and, when appropriate, authentication, the county clerk or his designee is authorized to deliver to the authorized messenger a ballot to be delivered to the qualified voter. The Secretary of State shall cause to be prepared a standard authorized messenger application form, which may be included with the standard civilian absentee ballot application forms.

A voter who is permanently and totally disabled, and who states the reason for such disability in a request for an absentee ballot, shall be furnished an application for an absentee ballot by the county clerk for all future elections in which the voter shall be eligible to vote, without further request on the part of the voter."

5. a. An application for an overseas [federal election voter] ballot shall be in substantially the following form:

As to each voter whose application is approved the county clerk shall deliver to the county board of elections the completed application form for retention by the board for signature

14. Section 9 of P. L. 1976, e. 23 (C. 19:59-9) is amended to read as follows:

9. Upon the margin of the flap of the inner envelope to be sent to an overseas [federal election] voter shall be printed a certificate substantially as follows:

15. Section 11 of P. L. 1976, c. 23 (C. 19:59-11) is amended to read as follows:

Ballots shall be approved, disapproved, processed, counted and disputes in connection therewith shall be handled in the same manner as is applicable to other absentee ballots. No ballot received after the time designated for the closing of the polls shall be counted.

Pursuant to Article 5, Section 1, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 812 with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill would make various amendments to the "Motor Fuels Use Tax Act" of 1963 by making technical changes in the language of the Act, add language dealing with bulk fuel, increase certain penalties and fees, and extend the period of time for filing certain reports required under the Act. I strongly applaud the sponsor's intention behind his legislation to clarify to those businesses who use our highways the extent of their financial obligation for the use of the highways. I also appreciate his willingness to have taken the time to review certain changes which I feel will more fully address the deficiencies in the manner in which the Act is carried out.

Therefore, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 812 and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 2(a), Line 6: After "which", delete "consumes", insert "operates"; after "be", delete "consumed motor fuels for the pro-", insert "operated any"

Page 1, Section 2(a), Line 7: Delete "pulsion of"; after "motor", omit "vehicles owned or controlled by him"; insert "vehiele"

Page 1, Section 2(a), Line 8: After "State", delete "["; delete "lessor when said lessor"; after "a", insert "rental company in the case of a rental vehiele."

Page 1, Section 2(a), Line 9: Before "provides", insert "[".

Page 2, Section 2(d), Line 43: Omit in entirety

Page 2, Section 2(d), Line 45: After "compensation", insert "and whether owned by, contracted for use by, or leased by the user who operates or causes them to be operated,"

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 1, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 134 (OCR) with my recommendations for reconsideration.

This legislation provides that if any child adjudged a juvenile in need of supervision or the subject of a juvenile-family crisis has been referred to a community center in a county of the second class offering an educational program, State funds will be provided to pay tuition at that center in an amount equal to the State average net current expense budget per pupil for the prebudget year. The educational program would have to be approved by the State Board of Education and would consist of a regular high school program or an alternative school offering high school equivalency diplomas, counseling, and vocational training. An eligible center would be required to submit an annual report describing the effectiveness of its program, along with an audited budget, to the Governor and to the Legislature.

Currently, a community center must absorb the educational costs of a juvenile referred there by the courts. This results in a situation in which judges are sometimes reluctant to send juveniles to such centers, even though they believe that a community center would be best suited to serve the interests of the child. The proponents of this bill have also indicated that judicial discretion to send the child to a community center may provide a desirable alternative to sending the individual to a more restrictive State institution.

Furthermore, they argue that the State would save a significant amount of money by paying the tuition at a community center rather than paying the much higher cost for confinement to a residential State facility.

Although this notion is a commendable one, this bill as drafted does not accomplish this legislative intent.

In Section 2 (b), this legislation provides that those eligible under this program shall include juveniles in need of supervision and subjects of a juvenile-family crisis. Under the recently implemented New Jersey Code of Juvenile Justice, the terminology "juvenile in need of supervision" is no longer applicable, having been replaced by "subject of a juvenile-family crisis". Furthermore, a subject of a juvenile-family crisis would not come under the jurisdiction of the Department of Corrections and could not be sent

to a State facility. Additionally, the statutory citations contained in this section are inaccurate.

In order to correct this deficiency and properly reflect the intent of the sponsor, I have recommended language which would clarify that only those juveniles eligible for referral to State facilities would be included under this program.

I also have more serious concerns regarding the ramifications of this legislation, which is precedent setting in that it represents the first time State aid is provided to a private facility for the education of non-handicapped students. Although there are many fine community centers in this State, this bill does not contain sufficient accountability criteria to a qualified community center regarding its use of State monies appropriated under this act. In order to ensure that any State funds appropriated under this bill are spent prudently, I am recommending language requiring that the reports required to be filed by eligible community centers must be reviewed and approved by both the Senate and Assembly Education Committees before further State aid could be appropriated.

In addition, I would like some assurance that this is truly a pilot program and not a permanent one, as the issue of alternative education for adjudicated children is a long-term policy problem more properly dealt with by the State Youth Services Commission. I have rectified this concern by adding language providing that this act shall terminate on June 30, 1985. As the first reports required to be filed under this act are not due until September 1, 1985, the Legislature will not have the benefit of such information before determining whether to continue this program in Fiscal Year 1986. The inclusion of a termination date in the legislation not only provides the framework for a pilot program but ensures that any qualifying community centers would have to justify their use of State funds and their need for future appropriations. Additionally, I am adding language providing that any community center failing to file required reports shall be ineligible for further funding under this program.

I am also deleting the appropriation contained in this bill, as I have approved an identical appropriation for this purpose in Senate Bill No. 2000, which I signed on September 8, 1984.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 134 (OCR) with the following recommendations:

L. 1982, c. 77 (C. 2A:4A-23)".

Page 2, Section 5, line 10: After "center." add "Any report received under this section shall be reviewed and approved by both the Senate and Assembly Education Committees before any further appropriations may be made under the provisions of this act. The

failure of an eligible community center to present this report shall prohibit such center from receiving further appropriations."

Page 2, Section 7, lines 1 to 3: Delete in entirety.

Page 2, Section 8, line 1: Delete "*8.*" and insert "7."; after "immediately" insert "and shall terminate on July 1, 1985."

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 270 with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill increases from \$4,500 to \$7,500 the advertised bidding threshold on all public contracts entered into by the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission.

I support the increase, as the current threshold for the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission has not been proportionately adjusted to reflect current economic factors since 1980. The higher threshold will give the Commission greater operational flexibility by decreasing bid processing time, expediting procurement of lower cost commodities and services, and substantially limiting unnecessary administrative paper work and expense.

For these same reasons, I have also supported increases to \$7,500 in the advertised bidding thresholds for several other governmental agencies. On August 9, 1984 I signed Assembly Bill No. 2096 which provides for an increase in the advertised bidding threshold for five State agencies including the New Jersey Sports & Exposition Authority, the New Jersey Highway Authority, the New Jersey Expressway Authority, the New Jersey Turnpike Authority and the Haekensack Meadowlands Development Commission. In addition, I support Assembly Bill No. 1322, introduced by Assemblyman Gallo on February 23, 1984 and currently pending in the As-

sembly, which raises the bidding threshold for 17 State agencies, some of which were addressed in Assembly Bill No. 2096 and including the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission.

In addition to the threshold increase, however, Assembly Bill No. 2096 and Assembly Bill No. 1322 both contain a clause providing that the bidding thresholds may later be raised to an adjusted amount calculated by the Governor, in consultation with the Department of the Treasury. This provision obviates the periodic need to amend bidding threshold statutes in response to changing economic factors. I recommend that Senate Bill No. 270 be amended to include a threshold escalation provision identical to that contained in Assembly Bill No. 2096.

Accordingly, I hereby return Senate Bill No. 270 and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Line 2: After "58:14-22" INSERT "a."

Page 1, Section 1, Line 4: After "\$7,500.00", INSERT "or, after June 30, 1985, the amount determined pursuant to subsection b. of this section"

Page 1, Section 1, Line 17: INSERT subsection as follows:

"b. Commencing January 1, 1985, the Governor, in consultation with the Department of Treasury, shall, no later than March 1 of each odd numbered year, adjust the threshold amount set forth in subsection a. of this section, or subsequent to 1985 the threshold amount resulting from any adjustment under this subsection, in direct proportion to the rise or fall of the consumer price index for all urban consumers in the New York City and Philadelphia areas as reported by the United States Department of Labor. The Governor shall, no later than June 1 of each odd numbered year, notify the commissioners about the adjustment. The adjustment shall become effective on July 1 of each odd numbered year."

SENATE BILL No. 1425 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1425 (OCR) with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill prohibits the siting of a sanitary landfill facility on the property of State-funded institutions of higher learning and would void any approvals for such existing sites on the effective date of the act. This bill also requires that the Department of Environmental Protection reimburse landfill operators who hold current approvals which are so voided for their expenses directly related to the maintenance of their certificate of approved registration statement and engineering design and its rescission. The bill also requires that interest be provided to the landfill operators and sets forth an appeals procedure in the event that the approved reimbursement amount is disputed.

The policy which forms the basis of this bill is a sound one insofar as it embodies a recognition that institutions of higher learning may, in certain instances, be inappropriate sites for the location of sanitary landfill facilities. For this reason, I strongly urge this Legislature to concur with my recommendations set forth below since they are wholly consistent with the intent of the bill and will improve the overall efficiency of the reimbursement procedure set forth within its terms.

First, the bill, as currently written, would void only the certificate of approved registration statement and engineering design possessed by the landfill operator and leave intact any contract rights or responsibilities of the landfill operator associated with the operation of the sanitary landfill. It is suggested that without amendatory language indicating that this bill would void the underlying contract as well, a landfill operator would remain vulnerable to suit by third parties with which he or she may have contracted to receive waste or for other related purposes. It appears that such a situation would be contrary to the Legislature's intent in passing Senate Bill No. 1425 (OCR). That is, Senate Bill No. 1425 (OCR)

evidences a clear attempt by the Legislature to insure that sanitary landfill operators affected by its terms are, to the extent possible, protected from financial dislocation. Also, it should be expressly stated in the bill that no obligation to reimburse an operator of a sanitary landfill facility exists where contract rights or regulatory approvals associated with the operation of that facility have been terminated in accordance with the law.

Second, it is suggested that the State Treasurer and not the Commissioner of the Department of Environmental Protection possesses the necessary expertise for making determinations as to the reasonableness, in both subject and amount, of expenditures submitted by a landfill operator for reimbursement. Technical expertise relevant to such a determination should, of course, be provided to the Treasurer by the Department of Environmental Protection and the Board of Public Utilities and the need for such consultation should be expressly set forth in the bill. Further, the Treasurer should be authorized to require that a landfill operator provide all records and documents the Treasurer deems necessary for making a sound, well reasoned and just determination.

While the bill, as currently written, would seem to require that the Department of Environmental Protection must provide the necessary funds for reimbursing the affected landfill operator from within its budget, it is submitted that since the affected institution of higher learning is a party to the contract with the landfill operator, it would be that institution which should properly reimburse the landfill operator upon voidance of the contract and related regulatory approvals. Though the bill does not provide an appropriation for the purpose of reimbursing an affected landfill operator, it is clear that it intends such responsibility to inhere to the State. Therefore, it is recommended that the obligation of the institution of higher learning to reimburse the landfill operator should arise only after a fair and proper amount has been determined by the Treasurer and concurred with by the Legislature in the form of an appropriation. This amendment would provide the Legislature with the ability to review and approve the Treasurer's determination prior to reimbursement of a landfill operator, thus further insuring the appropriateness of the amount. Also, it should be expressly stated that upon reimbursing a landfill operator, neither an institution of higher learning nor the State shall incur liability for any third party obligations which are or shall become the responsibility of that landfill operator.

Lastly, it is my understanding that this bill is intended to address problems confronted by certain of our urban State Colleges. Accordingly, it is recommended that the bill's operative terms should be amended to reflect that fact.

In sum, it should be stressed that these recommendations are, for the most part, technical in nature. However, review of their impact upon this legislation will reveal that they insure to the extent possible that administrative responsibility is properly allocated

on the basis of expertise and that the State, its State colleges and an affected landfill operator are afforded greater protection by virtue of their adoption.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1425 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Line 5: Delete "institution of higher learning supported in whole or in part by State funds" insert "State college whose charter was filed prior to 1920"

Page 1, Section 1, Line 16: After "existing" omit "approval" add "contract right or regulatory approval to operate a sanitary landfill facility on the property of a State college not otherwise terminated in accordance with law"

Page 1, Section 1, Line 17: Delete "commissioner" insert "State Treasurer, after review of all records and documents in the possession of the current holder of the approved registration statement and engineering design which the treasurer deems necessary for making his determination, and upon the advice and consent of the Department of Environmental Protection and the Board of Public Utilities"

Page 1, Section 1, Line 18: After "act," insert "determine an amount which would fairly and properly"

Page 2, Section 1, Line 29: Add new Section "c." "The amount determined fair and properly payable by the treasurer shall be paid to the current holder of the certificate of approved registration statement and engineering design upon an appropriation in that amount and for that purpose being made by the Legislature to the State college on whose property the sanitary landfill is located. However, by this action the State college and the State shall in no way incur liability for third party obligations which are or shall become the responsibility of the current holder of the certificate of approved registration statement and engineering design."

SENATE BILL No. 1886

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1886 without my signature.

The Commission on Individual Liberty and Personal Privacy was originally established during the prior administration by P. L. 1977, c. 226. On March 30, 1978, Governor Byrne signed P. L. 1978, c. 12, reconstituting the commission and extending its existence to June 30, 1978.

On January 17, 1984, I signed Senate Bill No. 264, P. L. 1983, c. 473, which again reconstituted the commission and appropriated \$25,000.00 for its use. The commission was instructed by that bill to report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the Legislature on or before March 15, 1984, together with any legislation it recommends for adoption by the Legislature. In the ten months which have ensued following enactment of the bill, the commission has yet to meet or take any step toward the preparation of its report.

I commend the sponsor of Senate Bill No. 1886 for his sincere concern about the potential threats to privacy that may exist in the information management and data processing systems used by both private firms and governmental agencies. However, I question the need for reconstituting a commission which has been inactive for several years. During the course of the commission's active life, several of its recommendations were introduced as bills but never released from legislative committee.

Given the commission's history, rather than continuing its existence, I believe it would be preferable to have the Legislature consider specific measures dealing with identifiable problems concerning the protection of individual privacy. This office is prepared to discuss any such proposal with any member of the Legislature.

However, in good conscience, I cannot sanction the reconstitution of a commission which has proven ineffective in generating meaningful legislation. Such a reconstitution would be counterproductive to the sound and efficient management of State Government.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1886 without my signature.

SENATE BILL No. 1583 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1583 (OCR) with my recommendations, for reconsideration.

This bill directs the New Jersey State Council on the Arts to conduct a public competition for the purpose of selecting a suitable memorial to be located in Liberty State Park honoring New Jersey veterans of the Vietnam War.

I believe that the establishment of a memorial is a timely and fitting acknowledgement of the valor displayed by our servicemen, both living and dead. However, the recent public outcry of the veterans of this State expressing their dissatisfaction with the establishment of a memorial at Liberty State Park, evidences that additional research must be undertaken to locate an appropriate site for the establishment of a memorial where the citizens of this State may pay tribute to the sacrifices that were made by the many veterans of this State.

The bill, as written, directs the New Jersey State Council on the Arts to conduct a public competition for the purpose of selecting a suitable memorial to be located in Liberty State Park. In place of the above competition, I am recommending that a seven member Committee be established to investigate and determine a suitable design and site for the construction of a Vietnam veterans memorial. Membership of the Committee shall consist of the Secretary of State, the Commissioner of the Department of Community Affairs, or their designees, one member of the New Jersey State Council on the Arts, and four members representing Vietnam veterans interest groups.

Because of the important nature of the Committee and the limited scope of the Committee's responsibilities, it is recommended that the Committee report its findings within six months, so as not to delay for any period of time the erection of this important memorial. The Committee shall expire at the end of the six month period.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1583 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Title, Lines 1-2: After "of" omit balance of line; on line 2, omit "State Park honoring New Jersey veterans of the war in Vietnam" and insert "The Vietnam Veterans Memorial Committee."

Page 1, Section 1, Line 7: Delete "at Liberty State Park".

Page 1, Section 2, Lines 1-4: Delete in entirety.

Page 1, Section 3, Lines 1-4: Delete in entirety.

Pages 1-2, Section 4, Lines 1-6: Delete in entirety.

Page 2, Section 5, Lines 1-5: Delete in entirety and insert:

"2. There is established in the Department of State the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Committee. The committee shall consist of seven members as follows: the Secretary of State, the commissioner of the Department of Community Affairs, or their designees, and five members to be appointed by the Governor, one of whom is a member of the New Jersey State Council on the Arts and four members representing Vietnam veterans interest groups. Any vacancy in the membership of the committee shall be filled by appointment in the same manner as the original appointment.

3. The committee is charged with the responsibility of selecting a suitable design and location for the construction of a Vietnam veterans memorial honoring New Jersey veterans of the Vietnam War in addition to determining the proper means for financing the construction of the memorial. Upon the selection of a suitable design and location, and within six months of the effective date of this act, the committee shall issue a report of its findings and recommendations to the Governor and Legislature."

Page 2, Section 6, Line 1: Omit "6." Insert "4." After "immediately." Insert "and shall expire six months following enactment."

SENATE BILL No. 1523 (3rd OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Subsection 1, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1523 (3rd OCR) with my objections, for reconsideration.

The purpose of this bill is to amend the statutes concerning the financing of gubernatorial campaigns. This bill is drastically needed. The current \$50,000 threshold for public financing has proven to be too low. In 1981, the State distributed about \$8.7

million to 16 candidates in either the primary or general elections. Some of these candidates may not have run or may have ended their campaigns sooner if it were not for the relatively easy availability of public funds. While I strongly support public funding to insure that lack of funding does not deny any tenable candidate the opportunity to seek office, I believe in equal measure that public funds should be expended only on those candidates who have demonstrated state wide viability. It is clear that public funding does serve a useful purpose; however, the current law can lead to abuses and as such, needs to be tightened now before we enter the gubernatorial election year of 1985.

I supported much in the original bill proposed by Senator Orechio; however, I feel that some of the amendments made to the bill weakened it. I believe the overall amount that can be expended in primaries and general elections should realistically take into account the complexities inherent in campaigning and disseminating information in a state as populous and as diverse as New Jersey. I recommend therefore, as did Senator Orechio, that a limit of \$2 million be imposed on funds that may be expended in primaries and a limit of \$4 million be imposed on funds that may be spent in a general election.

Additionally, I agree with Senator Orechio and the Election Law Enforcement Commission that the matching ratio should be changed from two to one to one to one. Instead of using \$2 of public funds for every \$1 of private funds raised, there should only be made available \$1 of public funds for every \$1 of private funds raised. Furthermore, public funds should not be used to match contributions from political committees or continuing political committees. These types of adjustment to the matching formula will reduce the impact of large contributions. I also agree with Senator Orechio and ELEC that the cap on public funds should be \$500,000 per candidate for a primary election and \$1,000,000 for a general election. Had this recommendation been in effect in 1981, nearly \$1 million in public funds would have been conserved.

While I agree with the proposition that the amount of the maximum contribution should be raised from the current \$800.00 maximum, I do not believe a 50 per cent increase to \$1,200.00 is in order. Accordingly, I recommend a 25 per cent increase in the amount of the maximum contribution to \$1,000.00. I have additionally recommended that a limit on contributions to gubernatorial inaugural fund-raising events be set at \$1,000.00.

Senator Orechio's proposal to raise the contribution and expenditure qualification threshold for public funding and to then require a continuing threshold for additional public funds after the original threshold had been met, was a step in the right direction. The amendments which reduced the threshold and then awarded matching public funds for moneys raised which were less than the threshold compromised the bill. I recommend that the contribution and expenditure qualification threshold for public funding be set at

\$200,000. I endorse the provision of the bill providing for a continuing threshold that requires candidates to make additional submissions for public funds only in units of not less than \$25,000 after the first \$200,000.

Senate Bill No. 1523, as amended, is a "fat cat" bill; it creates a powerful incentive for candidates to appeal to a relatively small constituency of large contributors. Under current law, the maximum amount that could be generated by a single contributor is \$2,400 (i.e., the \$800 maximum contribution plus \$1,600 provided by a two-to-one match). Under ELEC's recommendation and under the original version of S-1523, a single contributor could still generate only \$2,400 (i.e., the \$1,200 maximum contribution plus another \$1,200 provided by a one-to-one match). By keeping the \$1,200 limit, but increasing the matching ratio to two-to-one, the Senate amendments now make it possible for a single contributor to generate a total of \$3,600 in private and public funds. This encourages candidates to concentrate on the biggest contributors, since only 355 of them are necessary to meet the threshold to generate the full \$750,000 of public funding allowed in the amended bill. This means that *fewer* contributors are needed to generate *more* public funds than was the case in 1981.

This bill fails to respond adequately to the principal criticism of public campaign funding in the 1981 campaign, namely that too much public money was provided to too many candidates. ELEC tried to rectify this problem by recommending a \$100,000 threshold (with no match of the first \$100,000) and a matching ratio of one-to-one. However, by restoring the two-to-one match and making the match retroactive for all but the first \$50,000, Senate Bill No. 1523, as amended, would continue to bestow large amounts of public funds on marginal candidates.

While the ELEC threshold and matching ratio recommendations would restrict funding for minor contenders, they would *not* encourage candidates to seek out smaller contributors. For this reason, I propose a solution that would accomplish *both* by following the model successfully used in Presidential primary elections. Under Federal law, only the first \$250 of any contribution is matched after the threshold has been met. Moreover, contributions from entities other than individuals (i.e., PACs and businesses) are disregarded for purposes of reaching the threshold and for matching. I note that as originally introduced, Senate Bill No. 1523 included this distinction between individual and other contributions—one I agree with. However, it also imposed a lower contribution limit for individuals than for other contributors — a feature I believe is undesirable. I further believe that such a \$250 match restriction further limits the influence of big contributors and fosters political campaigns being supported by the people. I believe such a restriction should be in place in New Jersey. Therefore, I recommend that only the first \$250 from each individual contributor be eligible to be matched by public funds, and that contributions from PACs

be disregarded for purposes of reaching the threshold and for matching.

Finally, there is a loophole in the current law which I feel needs to be closed. Corporations and unions may communicate to their stockholders or members without such communication being charged against the candidate's spending limits. Communications that are made by corporations and labor organizations that are independent of the candidate and his campaign should not be limited because these communications disseminate information and are an exercise of free expression, which is constitutionally protected. However, if the communication is not made independently of the candidate and his campaign but at the request or suggestion of or with the cooperation or prior consent of the candidate or any person or committee acting on behalf of the candidate, such communications should be considered an expenditure of the campaign and reported accordingly.

SENATE BILL No. 1789 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 1, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1789 (OCR) with my recommendations for reconsideration.

On May 23, 1984 I signed S-811 (P. L. 1984, c. 42), which reduced the State pari-mutuel tax on New Jersey's privately owned racetracks to one half of one percent for a two-year period running January 1, 1984 through December 31, 1985. This bill extends for an additional eight-year period the reduced tax structure for the Freehold Racetrack, which was recently destroyed by fire but is scheduled for rebuilding next year.

I support this legislation because it will aid in the rebuilding of a racing facility that positively impacts on the Monmouth County economy, but I am concerned that it contains a technical deficiency resulting from the unforeseen pending change in ownership of the racetrack. As passed by the Legislature, this bill is limited in application to the present racing permit holder for the Freehold racing facility, and would not apply to any future permitholders. Therefore, I believe that it should be amended to apply to a new permitholder for the Freehold Racetrack, thereby eliminating an unintended exclusion of the new permitholder in the event the pending change in ownership is finalized.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1789 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

STATEMENT TO SENATE NO. 2516 SCA

Dated: December 12, 1984

This bill authorizes the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority to undertake the development of the following projects, either alone or in conjunction with others:

1. Expansion of existing facilities to land contiguous to or across any public road from the Meadowlands complex;
2. A baseball stadium on a site outside the Meadowlands complex;
3. Aquarium projects outside the Meadowlands complex;
4. An exposition center or hotel complex either within the Meadowlands complex or outside the complex but contiguous to or across any public road which borders the complex;
5. Racetrack facilities on a site outside the Meadowlands complex, including lodging facilities;
6. Events, expositions, teams, team franchises, or membership in professional sports leagues; and
7. Facilities that are related to, incidental to, necessary for, or complementary to, the accomplishment or purpose of any authorized project of the authority.

It is the intent of the Committee that the authorization granted in paragraph 7 section 4 of the bill may be exercised only with respect to the projects specifically authorized in paragraphs 1 through 6 (of the bill) and that in no case shall any of the authorized projects include an arts and/or cultural center.

The authority is empowered to establish, develop, construct, operate, acquire, own, manage, promote, maintain, repair, reconstruct, restore, improve and otherwise effectuate the projects authorized.

To accomplish the development of these projects, the authority is empowered to create or form profit or not-for-profit corporations; exercise, as limited by committee amendments, the right of eminent domain; make capital contributions to others for transportation and other facilities, and accommodations for the public's use of any of those projects; lease unoccupied parts of project sites for compatible purposes, including hotels; and sell and dispose of any real or personal property, including unoccupied parts of project sites.

The provisions for the development of a baseball stadium and a racetrack include facilities for other athletic contests and sporting events, trade shows, exhibitions, spectacles, public meetings, entertainment events or other expositions.

1. Prohibit eminent domain powers in connection with race-track facilities outside the Meadowlands complex and in connection with team franchises or unspecified facilities;
2. Change convention center to an exposition center;
3. Provide for the authorization for more than one aquarium;
4. Return revenue use language to its original form; and
5. Provide that the allotment to the authority of a minimum number of racing days at an acquired racetrack shall not be less than the number of days for harness racing or running racing as was last allotted by the Racing Commission.
