Attached please find *Current Program Statistics* for November 2001. Included are TANF-oriented and Food Stamps data, General Assistance data, and the WFNJ Statistical Summary.

Some items of interest include:

- The TANF caseload continues to decline. Since November of 2000 there has been a decrease of 8.5%.
- Food Stamp households decreased by over 1,400 since November 2000.
- For GA, recipient figures reported are for November 2001, which are 5.6% above November 2000.



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## Highlights of **CURRENT PROGRAM STATISTICS**

### **WFNJ/TANF**

(Tables 1 and 5, Graphs 1 and 4)

As of November 2001, 44,054 eligible families in New Jersey were receiving WFNJ/TANF cash assistance:

- 42,572 single head of household families
- 1482 two-parent families.

The largest number of WFNJ/TANF families receiving cash assistance, by county:

Essex — 13,065, Hudson — 6,546, Camden — 4,593, Passaic — 3,461 Union — 2,792

The number of WFNJ/TANF cash assistance families in the other 16 counties ranged from:

- 37 families in Hunterdon County to 2,352 in Mercer County,  
with eleven counties below 1000 families

There were 12,527 fewer eligible WFNJ/TANF families receiving cash assistance in November 2001 than in November 1999, a decline of 22.1 percent.

- **Single head families:** 12,023 below two years ago in November 1999, a drop of 22.0%.
- **Two parent families:** decreased by 504 or 25.4 percent from November 1999.

### **FOOD STAMP PROGRAM**

(Tables 2 and 6, Graphs 2, 5, and 6)

At the end of November 2001, 135,331 households participated in the Food Stamp Program.

- **TANF:** 32,429 households with 103,209 persons.
- **Other low income:** 102,902 households with 190,010 persons.
- **Total persons:** 293,219, including 143,806 adults and 149,413 children
- **By County:** 55.5 percent of the households were in:
 

Essex	30,119
Hudson	18,982
Passaic	14,336
Camden	11,610

Two years ago in November 1999, 143,405 households participated in Food Stamps in New Jersey. Over the next two years the number declined by 8,074, or 5.6 percent, to 135,331 by November 2001.

- **TANF(FS)** households steadily declined by **9,248** from **41,677** in November 1999 to **32,429** two years later. There were **101,728 Other Low Income** households in November 1999 and **1,174 more** two years later.
- **Total FS Recipients:** were **322,601** in November 1999, and declined to **293,219** by November 2001, a drop of **29,382, or 9.1 percent**.
- **Adult FS Recipients:** declined from **154,392** in November 1999 to **143,806** in November 2001, a drop of **10,586 (6.9 percent)**.
- **Recipient FS Children:** declined by **18,796 (11.2 percent)**, from **168,209** in November 1999 to **149,413** in November 2001.

## **EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE**

(Tables 3, 7 and 9, Graphs 3, 7 and 9)

In November 2001 Emergency Assistance (EA) payments were made for 2,327 eligible TANF families and 465 SSI recipients in New Jersey. For TANF families this included payments for:

- **Temporary Rental Assistance (TRA)** for **268** families
- **Motel** placements for **356** families and **emergency shelter** placements for **479** families
- **All other TANF-EA** for **1,224** families (including back rent, back utilities, security deposits, furnishings, clothing and food allowance, or transitional housing)
- **608** families in **Essex** County, **270** in **Mercer** County, **255** in **Monmouth** County, **228** in **Passaic**.

In the past two years, the number of EA payments for TANF families increased from 1,702 in November 1999 to 2,327 in November 2001.

- TRA payments were **11.5 %** of the total EA Families in November 2001.
- Motel payments were up from two years ago.; **180** to **356**.

## **TANF PARTICIPATION RATES**

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(Table 8, Graph 8)

The TANF participation rate for November 2001 was 29.48% for the State as a whole. This is a decrease of 9.90 percentage points from October 2001.

Participation rates by county:

- One county had a participation rate greater than 40 percent: Warren.

## **GENERAL ASSISTANCE**

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(Table 9, Graph 9)

There were 23,059 GA recipients in November 2001, up from 21,837 in November 2000.

- There were 11,823 Employable GA and 11,236 Unemployable GA recipients in November 2001.

## **CHILD SUPPORT AND PATERNITY**

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(Table 10)


For FFY 2001, the total collections of the Child Support and Paternity Program was \$809,006,362, an increase of over 6 percent over the same period for FFY 2000.



TANF PARTICIPATION RATES



## Explanatory Notes

The Department of Human Services Division of Family Development provides basic income and an opportunity to achieve self-sufficiency for individuals and families served by the Division's programs. The Division provides leadership, direction and supervision to those public agencies responsible for administering those programs and plans for and develops policies to promote self-sufficiency.

**WORK FIRST NEW JERSEY (WFNJ)** - Fully implemented July 1, 1997, this is New Jersey's welfare reform program which responds to the requirements of the Federal Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act (PRWORA) of 1996. PRWORA establishes Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (**TANF**) as the replacement for AFDC cash assistance. WFNJ includes two segments, WFNJ/TANF for families with children, and WFNJ/GA (General Assistance) for single adults and couples without dependent children. The emphasis is on achieving self-sufficiency and limits lifetime receipt of financial assistance to a total of five years.

**Recipients Required to Participate** - Calculation of the number of mandatory individuals

**Employment Directed Activities (EDA)** - From Activities Summary Report (OMEGA report # RM064). Unduplicated count of persons participating in Community Work Experience Program (**CWEP**), **All Other Training, or Job Search**.

**Number of Persons Employed This Month, Still Receiving TANF** - Individuals with open "empl" activity on OMEGA. Ad hoc report.

**Participants Receiving Child Care Services** - From Issuance Disbursement Summary (OMEGA report # RM703). Total number of active participants who show receipt of **Child Care**.

**Number of Persons Closed on FAMIS Due to Employment-** From FAMIS report # FM463.

**Post TANF and Receiving Child Care** - Persons no longer in receipt of TANF but still receiving child care. From Issuance Disbursement Summary (OMEGA report # RM703).

**MEDICAID ONLY FAMILIES** no longer receive TANF financial assistance but remain eligible for Medicaid under applicable provisions which extend coverage beyond the period of assistance. These are shown separately in these tables because cash assistance and Medicaid have been de-linked.

**FOOD STAMP PROGRAM (FS)** - Authorized by Congress as a nutritional supplement program to provide low income households with more food of greater variety and better nutrition. Program eligibility is based on household income, resources, and expenses for medical, shelter, and dependent care. CWA staff refer certain recipients to the New Jersey Department of Labor for participation in the Food Stamp Employment and Training Program.

**EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE (EA)** - Payments to those eligible for WFNJ/TANF or WFNJ/GA, authorized during the 30 consecutive days immediately following the emergency (defined as a substantial loss of shelter, food, clothing, or household furnishings by fire, flood or other similar disaster) or if the eligible individual or family is in an imminent or actual state of homelessness.
