

Highlights of CURRENT PROGRAM STATISTICS

TANF

(Tables 1 and 5, Graphs 1 and 4)

[The number of single parent families is reduced by the number of companion cases listed for payment on the source table FF-012, to avoid double counting.]

As of the end of September 1999, 55,866 eligible families in New Jersey were receiving TANF cash assistance:

- 54,563 single head of household families
- 1,303 two-parent families.

The largest number of TANF families receiving cash assistance, by county:

Essex — 18,705, Hudson — 9,346, Camden — 5,666, Passaic — 4,275, Union — 3,384

The number of TANF cash assistance families in the other 16 counties ranged from:

 42 families in Hunterdon County to 2,455 in Mercer County, with nine counties below 1000 families

Ther were over 700 fewer eligible TANF families receiving cash assistance in September 1999 than in August 1999, with a decline of 34,002, or 37.8 percent, compared to the number of families receiving cash assistance two years ago in September 1997.

- Single head families: 31,042 below two years ago in September 1997, a drop of 36.3%.
- Two parent families: declined by 2,960 or 69.4 percent from 4,263 in September 1997.

FOOD STAMP PROGRAM

(Tables 2 and 6, Graphs 2, 5, and 6)

At the end of September 1999, less than 148,000 households participated in the Food Stamp Program.

- TANF: about 43,400 households with 140,300 persons.
- Other low income: approximately 104,500 households with 190,600 persons.
- Total persons: 330,900, including 159,000 adults and 171,900 children
- By County: 58.7 percent of the households were in:
 Essex 37,874

Hudson 21,568

Camden 13,289

Passaic 14,118

Two years ago in September 1997, 182,700 households participated in Food Stamps in New Jersey. Over the next two years the number declined by about 34,700, or 19.0 percent, to 148,000 by September 1999.

- TANF(FS) households steadily declined by more than 43,000 from about 86,000 in September 1997 to 43,000 two years later. There were approximately 97,000 Other Low Income households in September 1997 and about 7,400 more two years later.
- Total FS Recipients: were about 417,700 in September 1997, and declined to 330,900 by September 1999, a drop of 86,800, or 20.8 percent.
- Adult FS Recipients: declined from about 195,800 in September 1997 to 159,000 in September 1999, a drop of 36,000 (18.4 percent).
- Recipient FS Children: declined by 50,000 (22.5 percent), from about 222,000 in September 1997 to 172,000 in September 1999.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE

(Tables 3, 7 and 9, Graphs 3, 7 and 9)

In September 1999 Emergency Assistance (EA) payments were made for 1,765 eligible TANF families and 274 SSI recipients in New Jersey. For TANF families this included payments for:

- Temporary Rental Assistance (TRA) for 267 families
- Motel placements for 210 families and emergency shelter placements for 252 families
- All other TANF-EA for 1,036 families (including back rent, back utilities, security deposits, furnishings, clothing and food allowance, or transitional housing)
- 584 families in Essex County, 187 in Passaic County, 142 in Middlesex County, 129 in Bergen
 County and less than 100 TANF families in each of the other seventeen counties.

In the past two years, the average number of EA payments for TANF families was 3,547 in 1997, 2,437 for 1998, and 1,874 for the first nine months of 1999. Payments were made to 43.8% fewer families in September 1999 as compared to September 1997.

- TRA payments were 15.1% of the number in September 1999.
- Motel payments were up from two years ago.; 202 to 210.

TANF PARTICIPATION RATES

(Table 8, Graph 8)

The TANF participation rate for November 1999 was 32.2% for the State as a whole. This is an increase of about 1.6 percentage points from October 1999.

Participation rates by county:

- Five counties had a participation rate greater than 40 percent, Burlington, Monmouth,
- Salem, Sussex, and Warren.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE

(Table 9, Graph 9)

There were 24,878 GA recipients in September 1999, down from 25,309 in August.

• There were 14,912 Employable GA recipients in September 1999.



During the twelve months of FFY 1999, the total distribution of collections of the Child Support and Paternity Program was more than \$704 million, an increase of over 11 percent over the same period of FFY 1998.



Explanatory Notes

The Department of Human Services Division of Family Development provides basic income and an opportunity to achieve self-sufficiency for individuals and families served by the Division's programs. The Division provides leadership, direction and supervision to those public agencies responsible for administering those programs and plans for and develops policies to promote self-sufficiency.

WORK FIRST NEW JERSEY (WFNJ) - Fully implemented July 1, 1997, this is New Jersey's welfare reform program which responds to the requirements of the Federal Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act (PRWORA) of 1996. PRWORA establishes Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) as the replacement for AFDC cash assistance. WFNJ includes two segments, WFNJ/TANF for families with children, and WFNJ/GA (General Assistance) for single adults and couples without dependent children. The emphasis is on achieving self-sufficiency and limits lifetime receipt of financial assistance to a total of five years.

Employment Directed Activities (EDA) - From Activities Summary Report (OMEGA report # RM064). Unduplicated count of persons participating in Community Work Experience Program (CWEP), All Other Training, or Job Search.

Number of Persons Employed This Month, Still Receiving TANF – Individuals with open "empl" activity on OMEGA. Ad hoc report.

Participants Receiving Child Care Services - From Issuance Disbursement Summary (OMEGA report # RM703). Total number of active participants who show receipt of Child Care.

Number of Persons Closed on FAMIS Due to Employment- From FAMIS report # FM463.

Post TANF and Receiving Child Care - Persons no longer in receipt of TANF but still receiving child care. From Issuance Disbursement Summary (OMEGA report # RM703).

MEDICAID ONLY FAMILIES no longer receive TANF financial assistance but remain eligible for Medicaid under applicable provisions which extend coverage beyond the period of assistance. These are shown separately in these tables because cash assistance and Medicaid have been de-linked.

FOOD STAMP PROGRAM (FS) - Authorized by Congress as a nutritional supplement program to provide low income households with more food of greater variety and better nutrition. Program eligibility is based on household income, resources, and expenses for medical, shelter, and dependent care. CWA staff refer certain recipients to the New Jersey Department of Labor for participation in the Food Stamp Employment and Training Program.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE (EA) - Payments to those eligible for WFNJ/TANF or WFNJ/GA, authorized during the 30 consecutive days immediately following the emergency (defined as a substantial loss of shelter, food, clothing, or household furnishings by fire, flood or other similar disaster) or if the eligible individual or family is in an imminent or actual state of homelessness.
