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SECTION I

SYNOPSIS UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM

THE NEW JERSEY UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

DEFINITION

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System is based upon the compilation, classification, and analysis of crime data reported by all New Jersey police agencies in accordance with the regulations prescribed by law.

DEVELOPMENT

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Law (N.J.S.A. 52:17 B-5.1 et seq) was enacted on May 16, 1966, and became effective January 1, 1967. Responsibility for the establishment, direction, control, and supervision of the Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the State's Attorney General. The Attorney General authorized the New Jersey State Police to collect and collate the crime data received from law enforcement agencies within the state.

At the request of the Attorney General, the New Jersey State Police researched crime systems in operation throughout the nation in order to establish a firm foundation from which to grow. The most logical approach was the paralleling of the federal crime reporting system. There was a distinct need for a compatibility feature that would enhance both the state and federal systems through the data entry at both levels.

This compatibility has, as its nucleus, the standard classification of offenses established by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Regardless of the label placed on a particular offense in the various states' systems, i.e., felony, misdemeanor, disorderly persons, if the incident meets the federal standard it will be reported as an offense.

The terms "crime" and "offense" are used interchangeably in this publication, and refer to an act committed in violation of a law which is reportable under the guidelines of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

The Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting of the New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association has served the program in an advisory capacity since 1966. The contributions of this committee have proven valuable to the success of the program. This committee works in close harmony with the State Police as a means of improving the quality of reporting through recommended program standards, policies, and procedures.

COLLECTION OF CRIME DATA

As required by statute, all law enforcement agencies in the state submit monthly and annual summary crime reports to the program. During the year 1981, offense and arrest data were received from 483 full-time municipal police departments, twenty-nine (29) part-time municipal police departments, and the New Jersey State Police (acting as the reporting agent for the 55 municipalities without local police services).

In addition to the above agencies, arrest data were received from the state's twenty-one (21) prosecutor's, sheriffs' departments, four (4) county police departments, and five (5) county park police departments. In order to incorporate all New Jersey law enforcement agencies under the system, the eight (8) other state agencies with law enforcement responsibilities, as well as eleven (11) college campus police departments were incorporated within the program. Collectively, a total of 582 law enforcement agencies submit their reports to the New Jersey State Police.


METHOD

The Uniform Crime Reporting Guide, which was revised during 1977, has been distributed to all contributors. It outlines reporting procedures in detail, and is complete to the extent of providing examples and illustrations. Field representatives provide additional instruction and clarification when required.

All reported offenses are related to the municipality in which they occur rather than to the agency which may conduct the investigation. The clearance is credited to the municipality in which the offense occurred. Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own reports. Law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses according to the following categories: Homicide (Murder and Manslaughter), Forcible Rape, Robbery, Assault, Burglary, Larceny-theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson. The "Crime in New Jersey," and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's "Crime in the United States" publications, exclude manslaughters, simple assaults, and arsons from the "Index" offenses. These are

further referred to as "violent" and "nonviolent" crimes as graphically illustrated in Section VII under "State, County, Municipal Offense and Demographic Data," and Section II, "Part I and Index Offense Analysis."

All reported offenses are compiled from a record of all criminal complaints received by police from victims or other sources, or discovered by the police during routine operations. Complaints determined to be unfounded are eliminated from this count. Analytical data pertaining to specific crime categories are also reported, i.e., total adult and juvenile arrests made during the month. Police killed or assaulted, and arson data are also collected monthly. Police personnel information is submitted on an annual basis.



VERIFICATION PROCESSES

The uniformity and accuracy of data gathered from 582 contributors must be safeguarded through various ways. Although guidelines and instructions are provided each contributor, they are not the panacea for the accuracy being sought.

The reports received by the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit are recorded and examined for mathematical accuracy and reasonableness of the interpretation of the offense classifications. Improper classifications, changes in reporting procedures, or actual change are identified in this manner. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by direct telephone contact with the contributors, while all other errors are resolved through a personal visit by a field representative to the reporting agency.

Further verification is accomplished through the analysis of statistical data accrued from the reports submitted. Fluctuations in crime rates noted from previous submissions are verified by the field representatives through their municipal counterpart.

FUNCTION

Police executives make use of this data in administrative, planning, and operational determinations for their respective jurisdictions. The State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit provides assistance to municipal police agencies through the individual analysis of statistics as they relate to specific crime problems within their jurisdiction. Police executives also use this data for identifying manpower and equipment needs. The Uniform Crime Reporting Program requirements not only have increased police efficiency in reporting and recordkeeping areas, but have helped police in their day to day operations.

Although the data collected on the offenses of manslaughter and simple assault are not presented in the annual report, they are required for the federal system. However, this data is processed and available for special research purposes.

PROFILE OF NEW JERSEY

New Jersey is situated between the major industrial markets of New York and Philadelphia and can be classified as the "Crossroads of the East." The geographic location of the state has been a major factor in its growth and development. The many miles of super-expressway facilities within the state connect New Jersey directly with the neighboring states of New York, Pennsylvania, and Delaware. Additionally, New Jersey as a corridor state, accommodates large volumes of traffic from both the eastern and western part of the United States.

The state is politically comprised of 21 counties which contain 567 incorporated municipalities. Nationally, New Jersey, although 46th in size, ranks ninth in population and first as the most densely populated state in the country. In addition to this density of 982.4 persons per square mile, New Jersey still has many miles of rural areas and sparsely settled communities. The areas of density show a heavy concentration around the major urban centers and those areas most accessible for commuting.

STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL PROFILES

The presentation of state, county and municipal profiles in this section is offered for the purpose of projecting, for the consideration of the reader, a group of recognizable factors which may affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from community to community. Selection of the areas of information to be related to individual municipalities was based on the immediacy and completeness of data available.

Population statistics presented here, and throughout this publication, were obtained from the Department of Labor & Industry, Division of Planning and Research, Office of Demographic and Economic Analysis. The adjusted 1980 census counts of population were used in this publication.

Character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications, and square miles, were compiled by the Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning. Following is a list of categories used and a description of each category.

 URBAN CENTER 	Densely populated with extensive development.
URBAN-SUBURBAN	Near an urban center but not as extremely developed and more residential areas.
• URBAN CENTER RURAL	Densely populated core area but surrounded by rural areas.
SUBURBAN	Predominantly single family residential, within a short distance of an urban area.
SUBURBAN RURAL	Rapidly developing area but still large tracts of open land available for development.
RURAL	Scattered small communities and isolated single family dwellings.
RURAL CENTER	High density core area with surrounding municipalities rural.
• RURAL CENTER-RURAL	Small developed core area surrounded by rural areas.

Certain other socio-economic factors present in varying degrees in all communities may have an influence on resulting crime rates. Obvious difficulties in the identification, documentation and measurement of these factors, however, precluded their application in this report.

Those factors presented were listed to affirm their existence within the county and community and to provide a base for consideration in the evaluation of that community's crime experience.

CRIME FACTORS

Statistics gathered under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program are submitted by the law enforcement agencies of New Jersey and project a statewide view of crime. Awareness of the presence of certain crime factors, which may influence the resulting volume and type of statistics presented, is necessary if fair and equitable conclusions are to be drawn. These crime influencing factors are present, to some degree, in every community and their presence affects, in varying degrees, the crime experience of that community. Attempts at comparison of crime figures between communities should not be made without first considering the individual factors present in each community.

Crime, as an outgrowth of society, remains a social problem of grave concern and the police are limited in their role to its suppression and detection. As stated by the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Criminal Justice in their report *The Challenge of Crime In a Free Society*—(1967-Page 92)—"But the fact that the police deal daily with crime does not mean that they have unlimited power to prevent it, or reduce it, or deter it. The police did not create and cannot resolve the social conditions that stimulate crime. They did not start and cannot stop the convulsive social changes that are taking place in America. They do not enact the laws that they are required to enforce, nor do they dispose of the criminals they arrest. The police are only part of the criminal justice system; the criminal justice system is only one part of the government; and the government is only one part of society. Insofar as crime is a social phenomenon, crime prevention is the responsibility of every part of society. The criminal process is limited to case by case operations, one criminal or one crime at a time." Set forth below are some of the factors which, by type and volume, will affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

- . Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan areas of which it is a part.
- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex, and race.
- Economic status and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population, including commuter, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate.
- Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Effective strength of the police force.
- · Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.
- Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (i.e., prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational)
- Crime reporting practices of the general citizenry.
- · Attitudes of the public toward law enforcement problems.
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.
- Cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police agencies.

Crime rates in this publication are based on the stable population of the municipality. Seasonal population figures are too inaccurate and fluctuating to be used as a measurement for determining crime rates. Municipalities with high seasonal populations may indicate a higher crime rate per one thousand than may be normal for a municipality their size; this would also be indicated in municipalities that experience high population increases due to special events or commuters to places of employment.

THE POLICE POINT OF VIEW

As in the past, the New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit has been surveying police agencies of the state, attempting to ascertain their viewpoint concerning contributing crime factors. Increased abuse of drugs and alcohol, insufficient manpower, lenient courts, seasonal population changes, poor economic stability and high unemployment, are some of the general type responses received from many of the police agencies.

Many of the specific type responses concerning the increase or decrease of a particular crime have been documented in earlier publications of "Crime in New Jersey" but these viewpoints are still valid and appear again below.

ROBBERY

Increases:

- The availability of new roadways in our highly mobile society, provide a swift avenue to and from communities previously difficult to reach; this factor has also shown a relationship with burglaries in suburban and rural areas.
- Seasonal increases of tourists to resort areas of the state has attributed to the increase.

Decreases:

- The addition of highly visible scooter and foot patrols in high density crime areas; selective
 enforcement; stake-out squads are assigned to target areas using analytical information derived by
 studying past robbery occurrences.
- Increased communications technology has led to better communications and increased exchanges
 of information between police departments; this factor also has an effect on other types of crime.

BURGLARY

Increases:

- Husband and wife are both working; leaving homes more frequently unoccupied during the daylight hours.
- High truancy rates at Junior High Schools and High Schools has also been noted as a contributor to daytime burglary increases.
- Unoccupied vacation homes are being entered during the off-season. Many police administrators cite insufficient manpower to properly patrol these areas as a contributing factor.
- · Little or no security measures are initiated by the average citizen to protect his own property.
- Juvenile recidivists receive no detention after they are arrested numerous times for being involved in burglaries.

Decreases:

- Crime prevention programs are being stressed in many communities as a means of decreasing crime. Programs as "Neighborhood Watch" and "Operation I.D." have proven to be successful as a deterrent to burglaries, as well as other crimes.
- An increased tendency by the public to "get involved" and report suspicious circumstances, has been noted.

LARCENY-THEFT

Increases:

- Theft of auto parts, and property contained inside motor vehicles is the most common type of larceny being reported to police in New Jersey; this is attributed to:
 - —Shortage of police manpower to adequately patrol parking lot areas.
 - -A lack of security provided by the various shopping malls in their own parking areas.
 - -Availability and visibility of the articles left in the vehicles.
- Shoplifting is a theft that police have little or no control over. Store security forces are under the
 control of the store administration, and their arrest policies vary from strict enforcement, arrest and
 prosecution, to only a warning. Policy change has been directed toward prosecuting the offenders
 rather than warning them, causing to some extent, an increase in the number of shoplifting
 offenses reported to police.
- · A renewed interest in bicycling has attributed to bicycle thefts.

Decreases:

- Surveillance of shopping mall parking areas, utilizing motor scooters, and plain clothes foot patrols, is a contributing factor.
- Use of additional or improved lighting prevent criminal acts from occurring in parking areas.
- Public awareness programs contribute to the decrease in thefts from parked vehicles; these types
 of programs also help reduce bicycle thefts.
- Thefts of bicycles has decreased as a result of safety and security programs implemented by police in the various schools; this includes the registration and marking of bicycles with special numbers.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

Increases:

 The tremendous replacement cost of auto parts has contributed significantly to the increase in motor vehicle thefts. The vehicle's value has nearly doubled in recent years, due to the high replacement cost of parts and accessories.

Note: Only 60 percent of the stolen motor vehicles were recovered in the UCR Program, probably due in part to "theft for parts," chop-shops, etc.

The popularity of mopeds and mini-bikes has attributed to motor vehicle thefts.


Decreases:

- More police surveillance and better lighting in parking lots has helped decrease motor vehicle thefts.
- Modern ignition systems and anti-theft devices act as a motor vehicle theft deterrent.



The Crime Clock should be viewed with care. Being the most aggregate representation of UCR data, it is designed to convey the annual reported crime experience by showing the relative frequency of occurrence of the index offenses. This mode of display should not be taken to imply a regularity in the commission of these offenses; rather, it represents the annual ratio of crime to fixed time intervals.

STATEWIDE CRIME SUMMARY—1981

CRIME INDEX

- There were 457,405 Index offenses reported in 1981, a 3 percent decrease compared to 1980.
- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$359 million in 1981.
- · Robbery increased 11 percent during the year, to 24,753 offenses.
- Burglary decreased in the state by 7 percent, with 128,278 reported offenses.
- During the five year period 1977-1981, the Crime Index in rural communities increased 30 percent, urban areas increased 28 percent, and suburban crime increased 13 percent.

CRIME RATE

The crime rate of the state is 62.1 victims per Index offense, for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants.



CRIME INDEX ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 87,399 persons were arrested for Index offenses, which represents a 4 percent increase over 1980.
- · Adult Index arrests increased 8 percent and juvenile arrests decreased 2 percent
- · Crime Index arrests accounted for 24 percent of the total arrests in 1981.
- Males accounted for 81 percent of the Crime Index arrests, and females accounted for 19 percent.
- Fifty-eight percent of the Index arrests were white and 42 percent were black.
- Police cleared 18 percent of the Index offenses and juveniles accounted for 30 percent of these clearances.

- August with 43,234 offenses reported, recorded the highest incidence of Crime Index offenses.
- Total value of property stolen amounted to \$359.2 million in 1981, a slight decrease from the previous year.
- Value of property recovered was \$97 million, resulting in a recovery rate of 27 percent.
- Stolen motor vehicles accounted for 40 percent of stolen property value, and 82 percent of the recovered property value.

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VIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, Forcible Rape, Robbery and Aggravated Assault.

VOLUME RATE

- There were 46,656 violent crimes reported in 1981, which reflects a 5 percent increase over 1980.
- Violent crime accounted for 10 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The violent crime rate increased 5 percent to 6.3 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants.

- October recorded the highest number of violent crime, with 4,198 offenses.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of violent crime was \$14.6 million in 1981.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arrests for violent crime offenses increased 5 percent in 1981, to 18,135.
- Violent crime arrests accounted for 21 percent of the Index arrests and 5 percent of the total arrests during the year.
- Adult arrests for violent crime increased 3 percent, and juvenile violent crime arrests increased 11 percent.
- Adults accounted for 73 percent of the violent crime arrests, and juveniles the remaining 27 percent.
- Males were responsible for 91 percent and females 9 percent of the violent crime arrests.
- Whites accounted for 46 percent and blacks 54 percent of the violent crime arrests.
- Thirty-nine percent of all violent crimes were cleared and juveniles accounted for 19 percent of these clearances.

NONVIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, Larceny-theft, and Motor Vehicle Theft.

VOLUME/RATE

- There were 410,749 nonviolent crimes reported in 1981, a 4 percent decrease compared to 1980.
- Nonviolent crime accounted for 90 percent of the total Crime Index.
- Burglary and larceny-theft continue to account for 79 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The nonviolent crime rate decreased to 55.8 victims per 1,000 inhabitants, a 4 percent decrease over 1980.

- · August, with 39,042 offenses recorded the highest number of nonviolent crime during 1981.
- The total value of property stolen in nonviolent crime amounted to \$344.6 million in 1981.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Nonviolent crime arrests increased 3 percent in 1981, as 69,202 persons were arrested.
- Nonviolent crime arrests accounted for 80 percent of the Index arrests and 19 percent of the total arrests reflected during 1981.
- Juveniles were responsible for 43 percent of the nonviolent crime arrests and adults 57 percent.
- Adult nonviolent crime arrests increased 9 percent, while juvenile arrests decreased 4 percent.
- Males represented 79 percent, and females 21 percent of persons arrested for the nonviolent crimes against property.


Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is included. This Index offense is counted by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court, jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Attempts to kill and assaults to kill are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are not counted, nor reflected in the murder classification.

- There were 541 murders reported to law enforcement agencies of the state in 1981, a 7 percent increase compared to 1980.
- · Murders accounted for one-tenth of one percent of the reported Index offenses.




- January and July recorded the highest number of murders, with 64 and 53 respectively; September and October were the lowest reported with 34 each.
- Thursday was the highest day of the week for reported murders, with 101 offenses.
- The age group 20-34 accounted for 41 percent of all murder victims.
- Blacks were victims in 55 percent of the reported murders, the remaining 45 percent were white, and males accounted for 75 percent of the murders.

MURDER—Distribution by Type of Weapon




- Firearms were used in 44 percent of all reported murders. Knife or cutting instruments accounted

 offenses where the weapon was known.

FORCIBLE RAPE

Definition -

Forcible rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted, but carnal abuse, rape without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

VOLUME/RATE

- There were 2,371 reported rapes in 1981, an increase of 5 percent over 1980.
- Forcible rape accounted for one-half of one percent of the total Crime Index and 5 percent of all violent crimes.
- For every 1,000 persons in the state, there were .3 forcible rape victims. When calculated on the estimated 1978 female population, the forcible rape rate increases to .6 per 1,000 females.

ROBBERY

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included. Effective January 1, 1974, the robbery subheadings were changed from armed and strong arm, to robbery by firearm, knife or cutting instruments, other dangerous weapon and strong arm (hands, fist, feet, etc).



Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could result in serious personal injury if the crime was successfully completed.



LARCENY-THEFT

All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket-picking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad checks are not included.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

Definition -

In Uniform Crime Reporting, motor vehicle theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle which is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on rails. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as a family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle. The motor vehicle theft category includes the subheadings of autos, trucks and buses, and other vehicles (motorcycles, mo-peds, etc.)

- There were 50,576 motor vehicle thefts reported in 1981, a 6 percent decrease compared to 1980.





ARSON

- Definition -

Arson is defined by the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

- Other property (crops, timber, etc.) accounted for 14 percent of the reported arsons.
- The total value of property damage due to arson, amounted to over \$35 million for an average dollar value loss of \$6,500.00.
- The average residential loss was \$4,853, while the average loss to industrial/commercial structures was \$36,442.00

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arson arrests numbered 898 in 1981, up 2 percent.
- Adult arrests increased 5 percent, while juvenile arrests remained stable in 1981.
- · Juveniles accounted for 56 percent of the arson arrests.
- Seventy-five percent of the persons arrested for arson were white and 25 percent were black.
- The arson clearance rate was 15 percent, and juveniles accounted for 44 percent of the clearances.

PART II—ARREST SUMMARY

SIMPLE ASSAULT

Definition-

Simple assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an assault or an attempted assault where no weapon is used and which does not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

- There were 30,295 simple assault arrests in 1981, representing a 5 percent decrease when compared to 1980.
- Of the total, 28 percent were juveniles and 72 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 83 percent and females 17 percent of the persons arrested for assault.
- Seventy-one percent of the persons arrested were white, and 29 percent were black.

ARSON

Definition -

Under this program, arson is defined as the willful or malicious burning, or attempts to burn, with or without intent to defraud; a dwelling house, building, ship or vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft, contents of building, personal property of another, etc.

- There were 898 arrests reported for arson offenses; a 2 percent increase over 1980.
- Juveniles accounted for 56 percent and adults 44 percent of persons arrested for arson.
- Ninety percent of the total arson arrests were males, while 10 percent were females.
- Seventy-five percent of the persons arrested were white, and 25 percent were black.

FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING

Definition

The definition of forgery and counterfeiting is the making, altering, uttering or possessing or attempting to make, alter, utter or possess, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true.

- There were 1,335 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for forgery or counterfeiting during the year. This represents a 16 percent increase compared to 1980.
- · Adults accounted for 90 percent and juveniles accounted for 10 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 75 percent of the arrests and females 25 percent.
- Sixty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 37 percent were black and less than ½ of one
 percent were other races.

FRAUD

Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, fraud is the fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. This includes bad checks, confidence games, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

- There were 7,602 arrests reported during the year for fraud, a 5 percent decrease compared to 1980.
- Adult arrests represented 96 percent and juveniles 4 percent of the persons arrested.
- Males accounted for 58 percent and females 42 percent of the persons arrested for fraud.
- · Seventy percent of the persons arrested were white, and 30 percent were black.

EMBEZZLEMENT

Definition -

The definition of embezzlement is the misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

- There were 120 persons arrested for embezzlement; a 31 percent decrease compared to 1980.
- Ninety-six percent of those persons arrested were adults, and 4 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 68 percent and females 32 percent of the persons arrested for embezzlement.
- · Seventy-four percent of the persons arrested were white, and 26 percent were black.

STOLEN PROPERTY (Buying, Receiving, Possessing)

Definition -

Included in this class are all offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

- In 1981, there were 10,612 arrests reported for stolen property—an increase of one percent over 1980.
- Of the total, 65 percent were adults and 35 percent were juveniles.
- Eighty-nine percent were males, and 11 percent were females.
- Fifty-six percent of the persons arrested were white, and 44 percent were black.

MALICIOUS MISCHIEF

Definition-

Malicious mischief is defined as the willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

- There were 14,209 arrests for malicious mischief, a decrease of 7 percent compared to 1980.
- Juveniles accounted for 65 percent, and adults 35 percent of persons arrested for malicious mischief.
- Males accounted for 91 percent and females 9 percent of the arrests.
- Eighty percent of the persons arrested were white, and 20 percent were black.

WEAPONS; CARRYING, POSSESSING, etc.

Definition -

Under the program, this offense includes all the violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers, and attempts.

- There were 8,058 arrests reported for weapons offenses; an 8 percent increase compared to 1980.
- Of the total, 75 percent were adults, and 25 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 94 percent and females 6 percent of those arrested.
- Sixty-two percent of those arrested were white, and 38 percent were black.

PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE

Definition -

Prostitution and commercialized vice are sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts. Included in this category are prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes, etc.

- There were 949 arrests reported for prostitution and commercialized vice during 1981. This
 represents a 25 percent increase over 1980.
- Ninety-four percent of the arrests were adults, with the remaining 6 percent being juveniles.
- Females accounted for 75 percent and males 25 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty-four percent of those arrested were black and 36 percent were white.

SEX OFFENSES

Definition -

Sex offenses, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, does not include forcible rape, prostitution and commercialized vice. Included in this class are offenses against chastity, common deceny, morals, and the like; attempts are also included.

- There were 1,778 sex offense arrests during 1981, representing an increase of one percent when compared to 1980.
- Adults accounted for 70 percent, and juveniles 30 percent of the arrests.
- Ninety-six percent were males, and 4 percent were females.
- Seventy-four percent of the persons arrested were white, and 26 percent were black.


DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS

Definition -


Under the program, drug abuse violations are defined as the unlawful sale/manufacturing, possession/use of the below listed narcotics and drugs:

- a. Opium or Cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine)
- b. Marijuana, hashish, etc.
- c. Synthetic narcotics—manufactured narcotics which can cause true drug addiction—(demerol, methadones)
- d. Other-dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, amphetamines, hallucinogens).
- There were 34,023 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for drug abuse violations; a 6 percent increase compared to 1980.
- Adults accounted for 77 percent and juveniles 23 percent of the arrests.
- Persons under the age of 21 accounted for 47 percent of the drug abuse arrests.
- Males accounted for 86 percent of the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 14
 percent.
- Seventy-one percent of the persons arrested were white, and 29 percent were black.
- Arrests for possession/use of drugs accounted for 84 percent of the arrests, and the remaining 16 percent were for the sale/manufacturing of drugs.
- Arrests for marijuana/hashish represented 77 percent of the possession/use category and 48
 percent of the sale/manufacturing category. Overall, they accounted for 72 percent of the total drug
 abuse violation arrests.
- Arrests for the sale/manufacturing of drugs increased 23 percent in 1981, compared to 1980.


GAMBLING

Definition -

Gambling violations are defined as the promoting, permitting, or engaging in illegal gambling.

- There were 451 gambling arrests reported during 1981, resulting in a 17 percent decrease compared to 1980.
- · Ninety-eight percent of the arrests were adults, and 2 percent were juveniles.
- Males represented 90 percent, and females 10 percent of the gambling arrests.
- Fifty-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, and 42 percent were black.

OFFENSES AGAINST FAMILY AND CHILDREN

Definition -

The definition of offenses against family and children, is the non-support, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.

- There were 3,962 arrests for offenses against family and children during 1981, representing an increase of 11 percent from the previous year.
- · All arrests for this offense were adults.
- Males accounted for 92 percent and females 8 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, and 41 percent were black.

DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE

Definition -

Under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, the offense of driving under the influence is defined as the driving or operating of any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of alcohol or narcotics.

- There were 31,751 arrests reported for driving under the influence in 1981; an increase of 4 percent compared to 1980.
- · Ninety-eight percent of the arrests were adults and only 2 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 90 percent of the arrests, while females accounted for the remaining 10 percent.
- Eighty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white and 11 percent were black.

LIQUOR LAWS

Definition

Included in this category are state or local liquor law violations, with the exception of "driving under the influence."

- There were 10,458 arrests reported for liquor law violations; an increase of 18 percent over the previous year.
- Juveniles were responsible for 56 percent of the arrests, while the remaining 44 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 82 percent of the liquor law arrests, while females accounted for the remaining 18 percent.
- Ninety-three percent of the persons arrested were white, and 7 percent were black.

DISORDERLY CONDUCT

Definition -

In this category are placed all charges of committing a breach of the peace (disorderly person).

- There were 41,086 arrests for disorderly conduct in 1981; a decrease of 2 percent compared to 1980.
- Sixty-five percent of the arrests were adults while the remaining 35 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 84 percent and females 16 percent of the disorderly conduct arrests.
- Seventy-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, and 22 percent were black.

FAILURE TO GIVE GOOD ACCOUNT

Definition

In this category are persons charged with vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

- There were 515 arrests in this category during the year; a 28 percent decrease compared to 1980.
- Juveniles accounted for 62 percent of the arrests while adults accounted for the remaining 38 percent.
- Males represented 85 percent and females 15 percent of the arrests in this category.
- Seventy-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, and 23 percent were black.

ALL OTHER OFFENSES

Definition -

Included in this category are all violations of state and local laws, except those offenses that can be categorized into one of the specific crime classifications previously mentioned.

- There were 65,232 arrests reported for all other offenses during 1981; a 6 percent increase over 1980.
- Adults accounted for 72 percent and juveniles 28 percent of persons arrested for all other offenses.
- Eighty-three percent of the arrests were males, while 17 percent were females.
- Seventy-five percent of the persons arrested were white and 25 percent were black.

CURFEW AND LOITERING LAW VIOLATIONS

Definition

In this category are juvenile arrests made for violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances.

- There were 3,174 arrests reported for curfew and loitering law violations during the year; this represents a 9 percent increase over 1980.
- Males represented 75 percent and females 25 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, and 21 percent were black.

RUNAWAYS

Definition -

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, this category is limited to juveniles taken into protective custody, under provisions of local statutes, as runaways.

- There were 6,509 runaway arrests reported in 1981; a 7 percent decrease compared to 1980.
- · Females accounted for 56 percent and males accounted for 44 percent of the arrests.
- Eighty percent of the persons arrested were white, and 20 percent were black.

SECTION IV

COUNTY OFFENSE AND SUPPLEMENTARY DATA OVERVIEW

ATLANTIC COUNTY

VOLUME/RATE

- A total of 21,943 Crime Index offenses were reported to the police of Atlantic County during 1981, a one percent increase over 1980.
- Violent crimes increased 21 percent while the nonviolent crime category decreased one percent.
- The Crime Rate for Atlantic County was recorded at 113.0 victims for every 1,000 inhabitants, a decrease of 2 percent compared to the previous year.
- Pocket-picking in the county increased 128 percent and highway robbery increased 41 percent compared to 1980.
- Theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories decreased 23 percent compared to 1980, and motor vehicle thefts decreased 17 percent.
- Total value of property stolen in Atlantic County amounted to \$21.4 million, of which 32 percent was recovered.
- The highest frequency of Index Crimes for Atlantic County was during the month of August, while February recorded the lowest.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 16,798 persons arrested during the year, a 15 percent increase when compared to 1980.
- Adult arrests increased 20 percent, and juvenile arrests decreased one percent.
- Eighteen percent of all Index Crimes were solved during 1981 and 26 percent of those cases solved were cleared by the arrest of juveniles.

BERGEN COUNTY

VOLUME/RATE

- There were 38,547 Index offenses reported in Bergen County during 1981, revealing a 9 percent decrease when compared to 1980.
- Violent crime increased 5 percent and nonviolent crime decreased 10 percent.
- The Crime Rate per 1,000 population was 45.6, a decrease of 9 percent.
- Forcible rape increased 71 percent, from 51 offenses in 1980 to 87 offenses in 1981; robbery of commercial houses increased 43 percent and of gas stations increased 63 percent.
- Both residential burglary and non-residential burglary decreased; 27 percent and 22 percent respectively.
- The dollar loss from the commission of Index crimes totaled \$45.6 million, with 23 percent being recovered.
- Index crime frequency was at its highest during the month of July; the lowest month was December.

- Total arrests for 1981 were 31,758 persons, up 10 percent over the previous year.
- Adult arrests increased 13 percent, while juvenile arrests registered a 5 percent decrease.
- A clearance rate for Index offenses was recorded at 16 percent, with juveniles accounting for 28
 percent of the total clearances.

BURLINGTON COUNTY

VOLUME/RATE

- Law enforcement agencies reported 15,823 Index offenses during the year, an increase of one percent.
- Violent crime decreased 4 percent while the nonviolent crime group increased one percent.
- The Crime Rate was recorded at 43.6 per 1,000 population; no appreciable change compared to 1980.
- Reported shoplifting increased 28 percent and burglary of non-residences increased 8 percent.
- Highway robbery decreased 26 percent, purse-snatching decreased 21 percent and motor vehicle theft decreased 10 percent.
- Property stolen as a result of Index crimes, amounted to \$14.7 million, of which 26 percent was recovered.
- August recorded the highest frequency of Index crimes and May the lowest.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 17,091 persons arrested during the year; a 5 percent increase when compared to 1980.
- · Adult arrests increased 3 percent, while juvenile arrests increased 8 percent.
- Clearances were reported in 21 percent of all Index crimes. Juveniles accounted for 37 percent of all cases solved.

CAMDEN COUNTY

VOLUME/RATE

- Law enforcement agencies reported 36,018 Index offenses in 1981, a one percent decrease when compared to 1980.
- Violent crime decreased 9 percent while no significant change occurred in the nonviolent crime group.
- The Crime Rate for Camden County was recorded at 76.4 victims for every 1,000 inhabitants, a decrease of one percent compared to 1980.
- In 1981, purse-snatching increased 28 percent and reported shoplifting increased 25 percent.
- Robbery decreased 13 percent and forcible rape decreased 10 percent compared to 1980.
- Stolen property value was recorded at \$27.2 million, with 30 percent of this property being recovered.
- The month of August recorded the highest monthly number of Index offenses, while February registered the lowest.

- Police arrested 22,565 persons during the year, no change when compared to 1980.
- · Individually, adult arrests increased 2 percent, and juvenile arrests decreased 5 percent.
- Sixteen percent of Index crimes were solved; 32 percent of these solved crimes were cleared by the arrest of juveniles.

CAPE MAY COUNTY

VOLUME/RATE

- During the year 7,137 Crime Index offenses were reported to the police of the county, resulting in a 4 percent increase over 1980.
- · Violent crime increased 11 percent, and nonviolent crime increased 3 percent.
- There were 86.8 victims for every 1,000 inhabitants during 1981, a 4 percent increase compared to 1980.
- Aggravated assault increased 31 percent over 1980, and reported shoplifting increased 28 percent.
- Motor vehicle theft decreased 8 percent and robbery decreased 7 percent.
- The value of property stolen during 1981 was \$3.7 million, with a 29 percent recovery rate.
- August recorded the highest frequency of Index crimes reported, while February registered the lowest.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Total arrests for 1981 were recorded at 10,518 persons, a 19 percent increase when compared to 1980.

- Violent crime increased 11 percent and nonviolent crime was down 3 percent.
- For every 1,000 inhabitants, there were 90.4 persons that were victims of Index crimes, a decrease of one percent.
- Robbery increased 15 percent and reported shoplifting also increased 15 percent in 1981.

- Arrests by law enforcement agencies of Essex County increased 6 percent, to 41,371 persons in 1981
- A 7 percent increase in adult arrests, and a 3 percent increase in juvenile arrests were recorded during the year.
- There was a clearance rate of 17 percent of all Index offenses; 23 percent of those cases solved were cleared by the arrest of juveniles.

GLOUCESTER COUNTY

VOLUME/RATE

- There were 10,917 Index offenses reported during calendar year 1981, a 6 percent decrease compared to the previous year.
- · Violent crime recorded a decrease of 10 percent, while nonviolent crime decreased 5 percent.

 percent was recovered.
- March was the highest month for Index offense frequency and June recorded the lowest.

- Adult arrests increased one percent and juvenile arrests recorded a 4 percent decrease.
- Index crimes were solved at a 19 percent clearance rate and juveniles represented 27 percent of those cleared cases.

HUDSON COUNTY

VOLUME/RATE

- During the year, 38,978 Index offenses were reported to the police of the county, a one percent rise over 1980.
- Violent crime increased 18 percent while nonviolent crime decreased one percent.
- The Crime Rate was recorded at 70.0 victims for every 1,000 persons, a one percent increase when compared to the previous year.
- Purse-snatching increased 56 percent and robbery increased 25 percent compared to 1980.
- Pocket-picking decreased 24 percent and burglary decreased 9 percent.

- There were 1,958 Index crimes reported during 1981, a decrease of 11 percent over 1980.
- Violent crime declined 20 percent and nonviolent crime was down 11 percent over the previous year.
- The county's Crime Rate, 22.4 victims for every 1,000 persons, decreased 12 percent.
- Aggravated assault decreased 21 percent, thefts of motor vehicles decreased 12 percent, and reported shoplifting decreased 44 percent.
- Stolen property amounted to \$2.2 million, with 15 percent of this property being recovered.

- · October recorded the largest number of Index offenses, while April was the low month.

- The total arrests for Mercer County, 17,645 in 1981, reflects an increase of one percent when compared to 1980.
- · Adult arrests increased 4 percent, while juvenile arrests decreased 4 percent.
- Mercer County solution rate for Index crimes was 17 percent; 35 percent of the cleared cases resulted from the arrest of juveniles.

MIDDLESEX COUNTY

VOLUME/RATE

- Middlesex County law enforcement agencies reported 30,886 Index offenses during 1981, a 3 percent decrease over 1980.

- During 1981 there were 8,071 Index offenses reported in the county, a decrease of 9 percent.
- Violent crime registered a decrease of 3 percent, while nonviolent crime recorded a decline of 9 percent.
- For every 1,000 inhabitants, 39.7 persons were victims of Index offenses, a decrease of 9 percent compared to 1980.
- Robbery increased 18 percent in Somerset County.

- Violent and nonviolent crime both decreased 8 percent compared to 1980.
- The county's victimization rate was recorded at 59.6 persons for every 1,000 population, for a decrease of 8 percent.
- Pocket-picking increased 33 percent in 1981, and purse-snatching increased 31 percent.
- Aggravated assault decreased 18 percent in 1981, and burglary decreased 19 percent.
- Stolen property value amounted to \$23.4 million, with 32 percent of this being recovered.
- The highest incidence of Index crime was recorded during the month of August, the lowest month was January.

- Police of the county arrested 20,743 persons during 1981, a decrease of 5 percent compared to 1980.
- · Adult arrests registered a 6 percent decrease, and juvenile arrests declined 3 percent.
- The county's solution rate was 16 percent, 31 percent of those solved cases were cleared by the arrest of juveniles.

WARREN COUNTY

VOLUME/RATE

- During the year, police of the county reported 3,047 Index crimes, a decline of 9 percent when compared to 1980.
- Violent crimes registered an increase of 15 percent, and nonviolent crime declined 10 percent.
- The index crime rate was 36.1 victims per 1,000 inhabitants, a 9 percent decrease compared to 1980.
- In 1981 aggravated assault increased 29 percent, and theft from motor vehicle increased 23 percent compared to 1980.
- Burglary decreased 17 percent and motor vehicle theft decreased 20 percent.
- The dollar loss of stolen property amounted to \$3.2 million, of which 21 percent was recovered.
- July recorded the highest frequency of Index offenses; the month of December had the lowest incidence.

- There were 4,206 persons arrested during the year, a 6 percent decrease when compared to 1980.
- Adult arrests registered a 4 percent decrease while juvenile arrests decreased 10 percent.
- Police of the county cleared 22 percent of all Index offenses, and juveniles accounted for 40 percent of those solved cases.

CRIME INDEX FOR POPULATION GROUPS—1981

The presentation of crime statistics by population groups was made for the purpose of projecting, for consideration, the relative crime experience of communities of varying populations. Although the individual municipalities within the various groups may be geographically separated, their inclusion into a specific group was predicted by the similarity in population with the other municipalities within the group. Municipalities within the same group may differ widely when all factors are considered, but they do share the common bond of population size. The grouping of communities in this manner allows recognition of variances in the crime volumes, rates and clearances between the established groups.

Set forth below are the established municipal groupings as used in this section:

SECTION VI CRIME IN THE CITIES

CRIME IN THE CITIES

This section will deal with serious crimes reported in the large urban cities of the state. These cities represent twenty (20) percent of the population and historically account for one third of the reported Crime Index of the state.

This analysis involves the latest ten year period (1972-1981) and endeavors to further identify crime trends in these urban areas.

The cities included in this analysis have been categorized as urban municipalities, (i.e., densely populated with extensive development) by the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning.

The criteria used in the selection of these cities were (1) to be classified as urban character and (2) have a population of 50,000 or more inhabitants.

For further comparative analysis, the urban cities were subdivided into two distinct groupings.

Group number one consisted of the state's six largest urban centers with populations of 80,000 or over, and categorized as the "Major Urban."

The second group included the "Major Urban" and the additional urban communities with populations of 50,000 or more inhabitants, and referred to as the "Urban Municipalities."

CRIME IN THE CITIES Summary

Distribution

- Six major urban centers—Camden, Newark, Jersey City, Trenton, Paterson and Elizabeth—collectively represent 13 percent of New Jersey's total population. These same urban centers, during the period 1972 through 1981 accounted for 24 percent of the state's total crime.
- The six centers from 1972 through 1981 accounted for 52 percent of all violent crime and 21 percent of the nonviolent crimes in the entire state.
- The 15 urban municipalities represent 20 percent of the state's total population.
- For the period 1972 through 1981, these 15 urban municipalities accounted for 32 percent of New Jersey's total Index, 61 percent of all violent crime, and 30 percent of the state's nonviolent crime.
- Nearly 7 out of every 10 robberies reported occurred in the "Urban 15" cities during this ten year period.

Percent Change

- During the ten year period (1972-1981), the Crime Index in New Jersey has increased 62 percent, while the "Urban 15" cities increased 43 percent and the six major urban cities increased 30 percent.
- Violent crime in the state increased 70 percent, the 15 urban cities increased 57 percent and the six major cities increased 49 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in the state increased 61 percent, and "Urban 15" increased 40 percent and the six major cities increased 26 percent.

STREET CRIME

There has never been a clear-cut definition for street crime within the criminal justice system. The nation's clearing house for the collection and dissemination of criminal statistics, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has no criteria in the categorization of specific crimes to be designated or defined as "street crimes." More and more this media term has been confused with the violent crime group of murder, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

Although any particular crime can and does occur on the street, this analysis, because of reporting constraints within the Uniform Crime Reporting System, is limited to defining street crimes as those offenses which occur, or are most likely to occur, on streets, highways, parking lots, etc. These crimes include highway robbery, purse-snatching, larceny from autos, larceny of auto parts and accessories, larceny of bicycles, and motor vehicle thefts. All are crimes against property and only one, highway robbery, falls in the violent crime group.

- During the ten year period 1972-1981, the "Urban 15" cities accounted for 35 percent of the street crimes in the state.
- Nearly 8 out of every 10 highway robberies occurred in the "Urban 15" during the ten year period.
- Over half of all motor vehicle thefts during the survey span, occurred in these 15 urban municipalities.
- · Fifty-four percent of all purse-snatchings were perpetrated in the "Urban 15" cities.
- Street crime increased 35 percent between 1972-1981.

SECTION VIII

NEW JERSEY POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey incorporates the collection of pertinent data relating to the police of the state. Information regarding police employee strength, and distribution are discussed in this section.

Individual listings of full-time state, county, university and college police departments are shown in tables following the narrative portion of this section. Listings of municipal police departments will be found in the section entitled "New Jersey Demographic Section."

The determination of police strength for any given area or municipality should be a subject for serious consideration. Such consideration, however, should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. For example, the increased need for police service in a municipality which has a highly mobile or seasonal population, differs from a municipality which has a relatively stable population. Some other factors, discussed elsewhere in this publication, relate to size, density of population, geographic location, character, and proximity to metropolitan areas. The tables and charts shown in this section should not be interpreted as recommended strength for any given municipality.

TOTAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

Total police employees are defined at the total number of full-time police officers and civilian police employees (clerks, dispatchers, mechanics, etc.) employed by all law enforcement agencies in the state.

- During 1981 there were 33,428 full-time police employees in New Jersey. This represents an insignificant change compared to 1980.
- Seventy-six percent were sworn officers and the remaining 24 percent were civilian employees.

This category consists of the number of police employees, including civilian personnel, employed full-time by municipalities of the state.

- During 1981, there were 19,823 municipal police employees, no change compared to 1980.
- There were 2.7 municipal police employees for every 1,000 inhabitants of the state.

- Essex County reported the largest increase in municipal police employees, an increase of 9 percent (249 employees).
- Atlantic County recorded the highest police employee rate; 4.6 per 1,000 population. (This rate is computed on the static population and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population).
- Hunterdon County recorded the lowest police employee rate of 1.3 per 1,000 population.

MUNICIPAL CIVILIAN POLICE EMPLOYEES

The personnel of each department differ as to the demands and responsibilities placed before them. Many police officers are fully occupied with clerical tasks and are not free to perform active police duties. Employing civilians in police departments to perform clerical duties is in line with the thinking of many police administrators who recommend the use of civilians in this capacity, thus freeing the sworn personnel for actual police related services.

- There were 2,617 civilian police employees in 1981, a 7 percent decrease compared to 1980.
- Thirteen percent of all municipal police employees were civilian.

MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

This includes the number of sworn police officers employed full-time by municipalities of the state. The police employee rate per 1,000 population presented here should not be construed as being recommended ratios. The determination of police strength for any municipality should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. These factors, as crime, vary in type and degree from place to place. Some examples are: seasonal population, geographic location, density and composition of the population.

- There were 17,206 full-time municipal police officers in 1981, an increase of one percent compared to 1980.
- The number of full-time police officers was calculated at 2.3 per 1,000 population; no change since 1974
- · Eighty-seven percent of all municipal police employees were sworn officers.
- The largest numerical increase occurred in Essex County; an increase of 265 police officers or 11 percent.
- · Camden County reported the largest decrease; a decline of 60 police officers.
- Atlantic County, with 3.7 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants, recorded the highest rate of full-time municipal police officers. (This rate is computed on the static population, and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population.)
- The smallest number per 1,000 inhabitants was found in Hunterdon, Sussex, and Warren Counties;
 each with a rate of 1.2.

COUNTY POLICE, SHERIFFS, AND PROSECUTORS

The functions of county law enforcement officers vary widely throughout the state. The operation of one sheriff's department may be limited exclusively to civil areas and the administration of the county jail, or they may be actively involved in criminal matters thoughout the county. County police departments are varied in their activities as well, in that some are responsible for enforcement throughout the county, while others may have as their primary mission the policing of county parklands. The responsibilities of county prosecutors' officers include criminal investigations, trial preparation, court presentation and special probes. Because of the difference in the types of police service rendered, rates for county law enforcement agencies are not presented here.

- The various county law enforcment agencies reported a total of 5,119 full-time police employees for 1981, a decrease of one percent compared to 1980.
- There were 3,774 full-time sworn police officers employed by county agencies, 74 percent of the total county police employees.
- Twenty-six percent, or 1,345 of the county police employees were civilian.

STATE POLICE

The New Jersey State Police is empowered to provide all phases of law enforcement throughout the state. It also renders, upon request, police services to all the law enforcement agencies in the state. No rates are used due to the variations in the nature and extent of the police services performed by the State Police.

- The New Jersey State Police reported 3,451 full-time police employees, an increase of 5 percent to 1980.
- There were 2,171 sworn police officers employed during 1981; this represents 63 percent of the total State Police employees.
- Thirty-seven percent or 1,280 employees were civilian.

OTHER POLICE (State Agencies)

In addition to the State Police, there were seven other state agencies reporting to the System. No rates were computed due to the variations in the types of police service rendered, and their statewide jurisdictions.

- Together, these agencies reported a total of 5,035 full-time police employees, a decrease of 2 percent compared to 1980.
- · Forty-six percent, or 2,303 were sworn personnel, while the remaining 54 percent were civilians.





SECTION IX LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED SUMMARY

POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED

The killing or assault of a police officer has a deleterious effect on society that reaches far beyond the overt act. Such occurrences constitute an immediate threat to the well-being of the community and a serious breach of the internal security of the country. Today a young man who considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the very strong possibility of being killed or assaulted by a member of the very same society he is sworn to protect. This deplorable situation should be a subject of serious public concern, for in truth, an attack on a police officer is an attack on society. The violence directed against law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty is clearly demonstrated by the following information.

POLICE FELONIOUSLY KILLED

VOLUME

- In 1981, three police officers were killed as a result of criminal action.
- · All three officers were killed by the use of firearms.
- Law enforcement cleared two of these police killings.
- Since 1967, thirty-eight police officers have been feloniously killed in the line of duty.
- On June 9, 1981, a Deputy Chief with the Essex County Sheriff's Department was killed with a 38 calibre handgun. He had just completed his tour of duty and was accosted by subjects who attempted to rob him. He declared that he was a police officer and was subsequently killed.
- On October 14, 1981, a patrolman with the Atlantic City Police Department was killed with a 9 mm handgun. This officer was pursuing an armed robbery suspect and exchanged gunfire, both the officer and the offender were killed.
- On December 21, 1981, a New Jersey State Trooper was killed after stopping a vehicle on an interstate highway. The perpetrators used a 9 mm handgun in the fatal attack on the Trooper.

ASSAULTS ON POLICE OFFICERS

Police assault statistics are important to the police administrator who attempts to identify the causative factors of this type of criminal activity. Many factors contribute to police assaults, and circumstances vary from place to place, it is therefore extremely difficult to identify specific reasons for these assaults. The following information illustrates the frequency of these events, and any attempt at analysis of these assaults should include consideration of the unique variables present in each jurisdiction.

VOLUME

- There were 4,850 police officers assaulted in 1981, this represents a 13 percent increase compared to 1980.
- This increase marks the end of two consecutive yearly decreases in police assaults.

- There were 4,379 municipal police officers assaulted during 1981, an 11 percent increase compared to the prior year.
- Twenty-seven percent (1,205) of the officers sustained physical injury.
- The assault rate for every 100 municipal police officers in 1981 is 25.5, which is a 10 percent increase over 1980.





- The New Jersey State Police reported 67 troopers assaulted, with 22 sustaining injuries.
- Other state agencies with police powers, reported 151 officers assaulted and 145 sustained injury.
- University/college police agencies reported 13 officers assaulted with 4 sustaining injury.

WEAPONS USED IN ASSAULTS ON MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS




- Personal weapons, such as hands, fist and feet were used in 90 percent of all police assaults.
- Thirty-three percent of police assaults occurred when officers were responding to disturbance calls.
- Officers attempting other arrests accounted for 17 percent of the police assaults.
- Traffic stops accounted for 12 percent of the police assaults.
- Suspicious persons and handling or transporting prisoners, each accounted for 10 percent of the reported police assaults in 1981.

- The four hour period of 8:00 p.m. to midnight accounted for over 30 percent of the assaults on police officers.
- Fifty-seven percent of the police assaults occurred during the eight hour period between 8:00 p.m. to 4:00 a.m.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing 98 percent of the assaults directed at them.
- Thirty-seven percent of those arrested for police assaults were charged with an indictable offense and the remainder were charged with the lesser non-indictable offense.
- Juveniles accounted for 9 percent of those arrested for assaults on police officers.

POLICE OFFICER ASSAULTED SCENARIO

A municipal officer is assaulted by an individual using physical force between the hours of 8 p.m. and 4:00 a.m.; the officer is answering a disturbance call and the offender will be arrested in 98 percent of the cases.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

ADULT For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person aged 18 or over.

AMERICAN INDIAN A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America, and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or ALASKAN NATIVE community recognition.

ARREST RATE The number of arrests reported for Part I and Part II offenses for each unit

of population, generally per 1,000.

ASIAN or A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, PACIFIC ISLANDER Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes for example, China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.

BLACK A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa.

CLEARANCE For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the solution to a particular crime,

usually by the arrest of the offender.

CLEARED BY For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared when the ARREST offender has been identified, sufficient evidence has been obtained to formally charge and the offender has been ordered to appear in court.

CRIME INDEX The sum total of seven major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in a geographical area. The following crimes make up the Index: Murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated

are referred to as Index offenses.

CRIME RATE The number of Index offenses reported for each unit of population per

1.000.

CRIMES AGAINST Consists of the following index offenses: Murder, forcible rape, and PERSONS

aggravated assault.

CRIMES AGAINST Consists of the following Index offenses: Robbery, burgiary, larceny-theft, **PROPERTY** and motor vehicle theft.

DAY For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.

EXCEPTIONAL For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared in this **CLEARANCE** manner when an offender has been identified, located and sufficient evidence to charge has been obtained but there is some reason beyond

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NONVIOLENT CRIME Consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.

PART I OFFENSES

The first of two main categories of crime classes composing a universal crime classification system established for crime reporting purposes. Murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larcenytheft, and motor vehicle theft, make up the Part I offenses. These crimes are by their very nature more serious and/or occur more frequently. The monthly tabulation of Part I offenses provides a count of "offenses known."

PART II OFFENSES

The second of two main categories of crime classes composing a universal crime classification system established for crime reporting purposes. Part II offenses are generally less serious in nature.

VIOLENT CRIME

Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

WHITE

A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.

CALCULATIONS OF RATES AND TRENDS

1. Crime Rate per 1,000 Inhabitants—This represents the number of Index offenses per 1,000 inhabitants.

For example: What is the crime rate for a municipality with 513 Index offenses (murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft), with a population of 8.280?

513 (Index offenses) \div 8,280 (population) = .061957 x 1,000 = 62.0 (crime rate per 1,000 inhabitants)

2. **Crime Trend**—A crime trend shows the extent to which crime increased or decreased. This is done by comparing a period of the current year with the same period of a previous year.

For example: A municipality experienced 264 Index offenses in 1980 and 513 Index offenses in 1981. What is the percent of increase?

513 (1981 Index offenses)—264 (1980 Index offenses) = 249 (numerical increase)

249 (numerical increase) ÷ 264 (previous year) = .943 x 100 = +94% (percent increase)

Note: If there were more Index offenses in 1980 than in 1981, we would have a percentage decrease.

Number of Police Personnel Per 1,000 Inhabitants—This is calculated in the same manner as crime
rate.

For example: A municipality with a population of 8,280 and 28 police personnel. How many police officers are there per 1,000 population?

28 (police personnel) \div 8,280 (population) = .00338 x 1,000 = 3.4 (police personnel per 1,000 inhabitants)

Note: This formula can be applied to either total police personnel or just police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

4. Police Assaulted Rate—This is calculated at a rate per 100 police officers.

For example: A municipality with 25 officers had 5 of them assaulted during the month. What is the police assaulted rate?

5 (police officers assaulted) \div 25 (police officers) = .2 x 100 = 20 (police assaulted per 100 police officers).

Clearance Rate—This refers to the percent of Index offenses cleared (solved), over a specified period of time.

For example: A municipality with 513 Index offenses in 1981, cleared 95 of these offenses. What is the clearance rate?

95 (Index offenses cleared) ÷ 513 (Index offenses) x 100 = 18.5 (percent cleared).
