JOURNAL OF THE SENATE

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
SENATE CHAMBER.

TUESDAY, January 13, 1976.

At 12 o'clock noon, this being the time and place appointed by the Constitution for the assembling of the Legislature, the Senate was called to order by Robert E. Gladden, Secretary of the Senate.

The session was opened with prayer by Rabbi Judah Washer.

Upon calling the roll the following Senators answered the call and the President declared a quorum present:

Messrs. Ammond, Bateman, Beadleston, Bedell, Buehler, Cafiero, Davenport, Dodd, Dugan, Dumont, Dunn, Dwyer, Fay, Feldman, Garramone, Greenberg, Hagedorn, Hirkala, Horn, Hughes, Imperiale, Lynch, Maressa, Martindell, McDonough, McGahn, Menza, Merlino, Musto, Orechio, Parker, Russo, Scardino, Skevin Tumulty, Vreeland, Wallwork, Wiley, Zane—39.

On motion of Mr. Feldman the reading of the journal of the previous session was dispensed with.

Secretary of the Senate Robert E. Gladden in Chair.

On motion of Mr. Beadleston, Mr. Cafiero was elected temporary president by voice vote.

On motion of Mr. Maressa, Robert Gladden was elected temporary secretary by voice vote.

On motion of Mr. Merlino that Mr. Lynch be elected President *pro tem.* for the 1976 Senate Session, it was decided as follows:

In the affirmative were—

The oath of office was administered to Mr. Lynch by Mr. Cafiero.

Mr. Merlino then moved for election of a permanent president.

On motion of Mr. Scardino that Mr. Feldman be elected permanent president for the 1976 Senate session, it was decided as follows:

In the affirmative were—

In the negative—None.

President Feldman addressed the Senate as follows:

We begin the Bicentennial Year with expectations that are tempered by the grim reality of a foundering economy: the highest unemployment rate in decades, coupled with a runaway inflation, are inflicting cruel punishment on countless thousands of helpless constituents. It seems that most of the original thirteen states—including, unhappily, our own—are the ones most impacted by the double pressures of joblessness and inflation.

First and foremost on the agenda for this One Hundred Ninety-Seventh Session of the New Jersey Legislature must be attention to the human needs of our constituencies.

Obviously, much of the impetus for meeting the economic problems of our Nation must come from Washington. Nevertheless, there are many initiatives which can be developed right herein Trenton, and this Legislature must take

a leadership role in stimulating programs which will lead to an economic recovery.

For example, we must continue to support and encourage the efforts already in progress to attract new industry and to revive the economy of our major cities.

We recognize the constraints placed upon us by the defeat of the bond issues last November, but we must move ahead! Particularly in the field of new housing for senior citizens and middle-income families.

Fundamental to the human problems confronting this Legislature is the thorny task of meeting the constitutional requirement of a balanced budget at a time when the weakened economy yields State revenues that fall short of State needs. Although our goal must be to achieve a balanced budget, we must resolve that we will not be party to any proposal that achieves that goal at the expense of the poor and the aged.

Full employment and a tax structure that will equitably distribute the responsibility of supporting State Government may well dominate the attention of this Legislature for the next two years, but if we are conscientious, intelligent and diligent in our approach to these needs, then the One Hundred Ninety-Seventh will surely be remembered as a Legislature that did much for New Jersey.

As we seek solutions to our economic problems, we must be careful not to sacrifice the legacy of our founders: the farmlands, the forests, the parks and the great recreational areas that have made New Jersey such a wonderful place to live.

To accomplish our goals, it will be necessary for the Legislature to continue to exercise its new-found role as a coequal branch of State Government! As this sense of independence has been developing, we have experienced the heady delights of saying "no" to the administration on numerous occasions.

Independence, however, carries with it the responsibility for doing more than vetoing proposals.

Let us resolve, therefore, that the One Hundred-Ninety-Seventh will develop alternatives of its own. There is no question in my mind that this Senate comprises men and

women with the maturity and experience that is necessary to exercise a genuine leadership role in New Jersey Government.

To make it possible for us to act on the opportunities presented to us, it is my intention to place a greater emphasis on the role of committees in the legislation-shaping process. Accordingly, we will provide the committees with more time to do their work and with the expert staff required to do it.

At the same time, we will concentrate on providing Senators with more and better information about legislation, so that all of us will be prepared to vote intelligently on the proposals presented to our body.

I am grateful to all of you for the opportunity to serve as your president during these challenging times. I am also awed by the responsibility entailed in this position! I give you my solemn word that I will devote much of my energies during the next two years to proving myself worthy of your confidence.

Thank you.

Mr. Hagedorn and Mr. Wiley escorted newly elected President Matthew M. Feldman to the rostrum.

The oath of office was administered to President Feldman by Chief Justice Richard Hughes.

Mr. Merlino moved the election of permanent Secretary of the Senate for 1976.

On motion of Mr. Maressa that Robert E. Gladden be elected for permanent Secretary of the Senate for 1976, it was decided as follows:

In the affirmative were—

In the negative—None.

The oath of office was administered to Robert E. Gladden, permanent Secretary of the Senate for the 1976 Session by President Feldman.

Mr. Horn offered the following resolution, which was read and adopted:

WHEREAS, The Honorable Frank J. "Pat" Dodd has been the President of this House since January 8, 1974, during which time he has presided with restraint, ruled with dignity, and set a standard of excellence for his successors in that office; and,

WHEREAS, The numerous practical innovations and legislative reforms instituted by Pat Dodd during his presidency have already served, and will continue to serve the best interests of this State, and will further the purposes of free and open government by creating greater public access to and awareness of the actions of this Senate; and,

WHEREAS, In these last two years of stress and pressure the one consistent factor in our deliberations has been the demeanor of Senate President Dodd, who was himself most temperate when we were most extreme, who was himself most accommodating when we were most adamant, who was himself most encouraging when we were most exhausted, and who was himself most full of faith and confidence in the capacity of this House and of all its members when we were most frustrated by the obstacles we faced; and,

WHEREAS, Notwithstanding the fact that Pat Dodd has always considered himself but one among forty, and has denied the deference to which his position and performance have entitled him, it is altogether fitting and proper that we take the occasion of his descendance from the Senate Presidency to record our unanimous view that his leadership has been a credit to this House, a genuine contribution to the governance of this State, and a true service to the people of New Jersey; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey:

That this House, mindful of the personal dedication and professional performance of Senate President Dodd during the whole of his tenure in that office, extends to him its appreciation for his efforts, its congratulations and its gratitude for his accomplishments, and the personal respect, sincerest hopes and very best wishes of all its members.

Mr. Merlino offered the following resolutions, which were read and adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Senate await upon His Excellency the Governor and inform him that the Senate has organized and elected Honorable Matthew Feldman of the County of Bergen, President and Robert E. Gladden of the County of Camden, Secretary, and is now ready to proceed to business and also to receive any communications that he may forward.

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Senate be directed to inform the General Assembly that the Senate has organized and elected the Honorable Matthew Feldman, of the County of Bergen, President and Robert E. Gladden, of the County of Camden, Secretary and has proceeded to business.

Resolved, That there be employed for each Senator, Legislative Aides to be designated by him at an aggregate salary of \$15,000 payable in the same manner as all other Senate employees, for the legislative year.

Resolved, That unless otherwise ordered, the daily sessions of the Senate shall begin on Mondays at 2 p.m. and on Thursdays at 11 a.m.

Resolved, That the Legislative Manual be distributed to the Senate on the same basis as for the session of 1974-75.

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey (the General Assembly concurring):

1. The Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the General Assembly be designated request officers for the Legislature as required by law.

2. The legislative printer shall print and make distribution of bills, resolutions, installments of the Senate Journal and Minutes of the General Assembly as heretofore and in accordance with the legislative printing contract.

3. The Legislative Index and the New Jersey Legislative News for 1976 be subscribed to for the use of members of the Legislature and for such officers of the Senate and General Assembly and other persons designated by the President of the Senate and Speaker of the General Assembly, respectively, as heretofore, at the following subscription rate: Legislative Index, \$55.00 for each subscription for a

period not to exceed 10 weeks, and \$5.50 per copy furnished thereafter; New Jersey Legislative News, \$45.00 for each subscription.

4. 1,000 copies of each bill, joint resolution and concurrent resolution and each official copy reprint be printed for the use of the Senate.

Resolved, That the Committee on Ways and Means be authorized to procure bill files and the necessary stationery and supplies for the use of members and officers of the Senate and General Assembly.

Resolved, The Rules of the 1975 Senate be adopted temporarily as the Rules for 1976.

Be it Resolved by the Senate (the General Assembly concurring):

The Legislative Code of Ethics as set forth in 1974 Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 96 be adopted temporarily as the Legislative Code of Ethics pending adoption by concurrent resolution of a Legislative Code of Ethics for the 1976-77 Legislature.

In which the concurrence of the General Assembly be requested.

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey (the General Assembly concurring):

That the printer be directed to furnish, as soon as printed and without waiting for the regular distribution, the number and copies of each bill, joint resolution and concurrent resolution introduced in the Senate and General Assembly, each committee substitute therefor, each official copy reprint thereof, and each printed amendment thereof, herein designated, to the following:

The Governor—21.

The Secretary of State—40.

The Attorney General—4.

Legislative Services Agency—15.

State Library Reference Bureau, for use of said Bureau and for exchange with other states—200.

Be It Further Resolved, That the printer likewise furnish to the State Library Legislative Reference Bureau 20 copies of each weekly installment of the Senate Journal and Minutes of the General Assembly.

Resolved, That the Governor's Message be spread in full upon the Journal of the Senate and a sufficient number of copies of same be printed for distribution.

Resolved, That the "Manual for Use in Drafting Legislation for Introduction in the New Jersey Legislature," prepared and published by the Legislative Services Agency be adopted as the official manual of practice and procedure of the Senate governing the form of bills to be introduced in the Senate and governing the conduct of the preliminary examination of bills proposed for introduction in the Senate required by the Rules of the Senate; and

In order to carry out said practice and procedure, William M. Lanning, H. Arthur Smith, Jr., Mary Joan Dickson, Walter Kennedy, George H. Bohlinger, Jr., Gertrude Erman, Albert Porroni, and Joseph A. Marrazzo be designated as counsel to the Judiciary Committee of the Senate and that the duties of such counsel shall be to conduct said preliminary examination of bills proposed for introduction in the Senate under the general supervision of the chairman of said committee and through the Division of Bill Drafting and Legal Services pursuant to law.

Resolved, That the payroll for the officers and employees of the Senate be adopted and that the Secretary be authorized to authenticate the same as approval officer.

Resolved, That all statements of expenses of the Senate, or of the Legislature on account of the Senate, be referred to the Ways and Means Committee and, when approved by said committee, as indicated by the signature of the chairman thereof and by the Secretary of the Senate, said bills shall be forwarded to the Legislative Budget and Finance Director for audit, and to the Director of the Division of Budget and Accounting and the State Treasurer for payment.

A resolution to create an investigating committee consisting of six members, to be appointed by the President of the Senate, with power to investigate any public body receiving funds in whole or in part from the State.

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey:

1. There is hereby created a committee to be known as the "Senate Investigating Committee" to be composed of six Senators to be named by the President of the Senate, who shall constitute a committee for the purpose of investigating the finances, affairs and operations of any and all departments, boards, officers and commissions of the State Government, and all other bodies and political subdivisions of the State who shall be receiving State moneys or public funds of any kind. The committee is authorized to examine into the pay and duties of the employees and the conduct of the work and affairs of all such boards and political subdivisions of the State who shall be receiving State moneys, for the purpose of recommending ways and means of reducing costs of administration and promoting efficiency.

2. Such committee shall serve without pay, but is authorized to employ counsel and such accounting, investigating, clerical or other assistants as it may deem necessary.

3. Such committee shall have the power to subpoena and examine witnesses and any accounts, records, or other matter pertaining to the operating of any department or departments of the State Government, of any political subdivisions of the State, or of any other body receiving State moneys or public funds of any kind, or of any bi-state commission which may be acting jointly with another State.

4. The committee may appoint a secretary who need not be a member of the committee. Said committee shall meet from time to time, hold hearings and examinations in a manner and in places which to them may seem best and proper.

5. Any agency, board or department of the State Government, any officer or employee of any political subdivision of the State or of any other body receiving State funds, and the officers and employees of any bi-state commission which may be acting jointly with another state, shall furnish to such committee such information, records, and data as may be required for a comprehensive analysis of the operation and financial affairs of such agency, board or commission, or other public body, including any bi-state commission, as from time to time such committee shall determine.

6. Investigations and examinations may be made privately or publicly, but it shall be unlawful for any person to divulge the results of any investigation or examination to any person or persons other than such committee, unless a public hearing shall have been first held. Whenever any person shall be examined by such committee or by its duly authorized representative or representatives, under the powers contained in this act, at a public hearing, the officer, department, board, bureau, commission or individual under investigation or scrutiny may, through his or its authorized representative or representatives, cross-examine any such person or any phase of the matter concerning which he has been examined or questioned, and such officer, department, board, bureau, commission or individual may introduce other evidence to explain, enlarge upon, or clarify the matter, situation or condition under investigation or scrutiny to the end that the full details of any such matter, situation or condition may be developed and presented at one and the same time.

7. This committee shall remain in effect and force until the opening day of the 1978 Legislature, notwithstanding any sine die adjournment.

President Feldman introduced Rev. Joel Schevers, O. Carm., St. Anasthasia Church, 1095 Teaneck Rd., Teaneck, N.J. who delivered the benediction.

REORGANIZATION PLAN OF THE DIVISION OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT SERVICES

The Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs, together with all its functions, powers and duties is hereby transferred to and constituted the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of the Treasury. The Local Finance Board in the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs, together with all its functions, powers and duties is hereby transferred to the Division of Local Government Services established herein in the Department of the Treasury.

In the Division of Local Government Services, the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance reviews and certifies all municipal budgets, is responsible for post-audit review of municipal and county government, and provides financial guidance to local governments. The Bureau of Local Management Services provides technical assistance for management functions including financial management, debt management, general government organization, and contract administration, and for local planning functions including land-use planning, capital improvement planning, zoning and subdivision regulations. The Division also administers the State aid grants provided under the Urban Aid Act and Safe and Clean Neighborhoods Act. The Local Finance Board approves fiscal transactions of municipalities in, or in danger of falling into, unsound fiscal condition, and has jurisdiction over municipalities which are insolvent.

Placing the Division of Local Government Services and the Local Finance Board in the Department of the Treasury will assure more effective oversight of municipal and county finance. The problems of local finance have changed to such a degree that a new organization of State oversight and advisory functions is necessary. The transfer proposed by the reorganization plan will enable the State to coordinate better its own financings with the borrowing schedules of local governments. In accordance with the provisions of the Executive Reorganization Act of 1969, P. L. 1969, c. 203 (C. 52:14C-2), I find and declare that this transfer and reorganization is necessary:

- (1) to promote the more effective management of the Executive Branch;
- (2) to reduce expenditures and promote economy to the fullest extent practicable;
- (3) to increase the efficiency of the operations of the Executive Branch to the fullest extent practicable;
- (4) to group, coordinate, and consolidate agencies and functions of the Executive Branch, as nearly as practicable, according to major purposes;
- (5) to reduce the number of agencies by consolidating those having similar functions under a single head; and
- (6) to eliminate overlapping and duplication of effort.

All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with any of the provisions of this reorganization plan are superseded to the extent of such inconsistencies. All transfers directed by this reorganization plan shall be effected pursuant to the "State Agency Transfer Act," P. L. 1971, c. 375 (C. 52:14D-1 et seq.).

Any provisions of this plan which conflict with Federal law are null and void.

Resolved, That the Rules of the Senate for the 1974-75 sessions be adopted as the Rules of the 1976 Senate subject to the following amendments:

(Bracketed words to be deleted; italic words to be added.)

1. Amend Rule 19 to read as follows:

19. He shall have a general direction of *and preserve order and decorum in* the Senate Chamber and the lobby, gallery, *meeting rooms and offices* thereof, together with such rooms, [and] corridors and passages in the State House and *elsewhere* as may be [assigned to the use of] *used by the Senate, its committees, commissions, officers, members and employees in the conduct of official business.*

He shall have full authority to protect the safety of members, officers and employees of the Senate in performance of their official duties, as well as that of the general public in connection therewith, and to preserve and protect property and records under the jurisdiction of the Legislature. In case of disturbance or disorderly conduct in the gallery or in the lobby he may cause the same to be cleared or the offending persons to be arrested and removed.

2. Amend Rule 23 to read as follows:

23. He shall appoint all committees, unless otherwise specially directed by the Senate. *The chairman, vice chairman and other members of each committee shall serve at his pleasure.* He may, during the inability of a committee

member to serve, appoint another member of the Senate to serve during such period.

3. Amend Rule 24 by inserting *a.* before the present text and by adding the following paragraph *b.*:

24. *a.* (No change).

b. The President, insofar as is practicable, shall cause not less than three days' notice of the bills and numbered resolutions calendared for a particular day to be given to the members and the news media and by posting on the legislative bulletin board, but this provision shall not restrict the President or the Senate from proceeding, in accordance with the Rules, to consider other items on a particular day.

4. Rule 30 is repealed and the following new Rule is adopted as Rule 30:

30. Upon the completion of the annual organization of the Senate and periodically thereafter, the President shall cause notice to be given to the members, the news media and the public of the dates and times when the Senate is scheduled to meet during the succeeding two months. Changes in schedule shall likewise be noticed.

5. Amend Rule 73 to read as follows:

73. The Senate shall keep a journal of its proceedings and [from time to time] publish the same *quarterly or more frequently.*

The journal shall be the official record of the action on and status of any measure before the Senate *and of all reports submitted by standing reference committees pursuant to Rule 83A.*

6. Amend Rule 74 to read as follows:

74. The following Standing Reference and Administrative Committees, and Joint Committees shall be appointed by the President, at the commencement of each annual session[, and shall serve for the entire legislative year, unless otherwise ordered that is to say]:

The Revenue, Finance and Appropriations Committee shall consist of ten members, the Judiciary Committee shall consist of eleven members, all other Standing Reference committees shall consist of five members; the [Rules and Order Committee shall consist of five members, the Conference and Coordinating Committee shall consist of all other Standing Reference Committee chairmen, the President, the President pro tem., the majority and minority leaders, and the assistant majority and assistant minority leaders, all other] Standing Administrative Committees shall consist of five members; the membership of the Senate on the [Ethical Standards Committee] *Joint Committees* shall consist of four members. [; the membership of the

Senate on the Liaison Committee shall consist of eight members and all Joint Committees shall consist of five members.】

7. Amend Rule 76 to read as follows:

76. All reference committees shall meet, at the call of their respective chairmen, except when the Legislature has adjourned sine die, for the consideration of measures referred to them, and 【all】 *to review the functions, duties and operations of agencies of the State, and its political subdivisions, relevant to their subject areas.* All committee public hearings shall be announced in open session and advertised by posting a notice thereof in a conspicuous place in the Senate Chamber and also at some prominent point in the main corridor of the State House.

8. Rule 80 is repealed.

9. Renumber Rule 81 as Rule 80 and amend it to read as follows:

【81. Any】 *80. Except as authorized by Rule 119, any motion or resolution which will result in relieving a reference committee of a bill referred to it 【shall be in writing and signed by not less than a majority of all the members of the Senate and】 shall not be entertained unless twenty-four hours' notice shall be given the Senate of the introduction of such motion or resolution. Such a motion or resolution shall not prevail unless it shall receive an affirmative vote of the majority of all the members of the Senate.*

10. The following new Rule 81 is adopted:

81. Each committee may adopt rules for its own operation and the conduct of its business, including rules governing the operation and conduct of any subcommittee thereof, provided such rules are not inconsistent with these rules. The committee may with the approval of the President establish such temporary subcommittees as it may deem appropriate, and the committee chairman shall appoint the members and chairman of each subcommittee to serve at his pleasure.

11. Rule 82 is repealed and the following new Rule is adopted as Rule 82:

82. The chairman shall cause to be communicated to the Division of Legislative Information and Research such

information as may be necessary for the Division to give five days' notice to the President, the majority and minority leaders and the general public of the time, place and agenda for each committee meeting. Emergent meetings shall be noticed as soon as practicable.

No agenda shall list more than 15 bills for committee consideration except by permission of the President. After notice of the agenda has been given, no bill or resolution may be added to it except by special order of the President. No bill or resolution shall be reported from committee unless it was so listed or added. A majority of the members of the committee may direct that a given bill or resolution be included on the agenda for and considered at the next meeting of the committee, subject to the requisite timely notice.

12. Amend Rule 83A to read as follows :

83A. The Chairman of each Standing Reference Committee shall cause to be filed with the Secretary of the Senate a written report of each meeting of the Committee indicating (1) the date of the meeting, (2) the names of the Committee members in attendance, (3) the vote of each member present on a motion to *table* or report a bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution favorably, unfavorably, with amendments, by committee substitute or without recommendation, (4) the number of any bill or resolution on which committee action has been requested by the prime sponsor of a Senate bill or resolution or a Senator acting on behalf of the prime sponsor of an Assembly bill or resolution and the date of receipt by the Committee of the request.

13. The first paragraph of Rule 83B is amended to read as follows :

83B. The Chairman of each Standing Reference Committee, in reporting a bill or resolution shall cause a Statement [in duplicate,] *approved by the Committee* explaining the provisions and purposes of the bill or resolution, including any amendments thereto recommended by the Committee, to be filed *in duplicate* with the Secretary of the Senate, one copy of which shall be delivered to the Supervisor of Bills for printing, if required. *The Secretary shall not accept for second reading a bill or resolution reported*

from committee without a committee statement, except by written order of the President.

14. Paragraph a. of Rule 83E is amended to read as follows:

83E. a. The Chairman of a standing reference committee [other than the Conference and Coordinating Committee,] shall cause at least one week's notice to be given to the Chairman of the Revenue, Finance and Appropriations Committee of his committee's intention to report any bill which would appropriate State funds, or which would require the appropriation of State funds not set forth in dollars therein, or which would otherwise require or appear by its terms to require expenditure of State funds.

15. Rules 83F and 83G are repealed.

16. Paragraph a. of Rule 102 is amended to read as follows:

102. a. Each bill, joint resolution and concurrent resolution shall be proposed for introduction by presenting to the Secretary of the Senate four copies thereof in typewritten, printed or other similar form, in one original and three similarly duplicated copies thereof, each copy thereof endorsed with the names of the member or members sponsoring the same. A "Statement," containing not more than three hundred words, explaining the object and the localities or persons it will affect [may] *shall* be annexed to a bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution and the same shall be printed at the end of the bill or resolution under the caption "Statement."

In lieu of adding and designating a Senator as a co-sponsor of proposed legislation by motion, any Senator may be added and designated as a co-sponsor of a bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution by the filing with the Secretary of a written notice to that effect signed by the prime sponsor of the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution and by the Senator to be added and designated as a co-sponsor thereof.

17. Paragraph f. of Rule 105 is amended to read as follows:

105.

a.

f. In printing bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions which have been amended, with the amendments included, all material intended to be omitted by the amendment shall be printed in the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution in its proper place enclosed in stars or asterisks and bold-faced brackets thus—

[thus]

and all material intended to be added *to a section* by the amendment shall be printed in its proper place in italics enclosed in stars or asterisks—

thus

[notwithstanding that the material to be added is part of the material enclosed in bold-faced brackets in the original bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution or in any amendment thereof previously adopted by the Senate and if] *Where the amendment adds a new supplementary section it shall be printed in italics enclosed in stars or asterisks—*

*4. (New section) . . . *

Where the amendment adds a new section which is an amendment to the existing law the section, including an amendatory clause, shall be enclosed in stars or asterisks with material to be deleted enclosed in bold-faced brackets and new material printed in italics. If the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution is amended a second time, double stars or asterisks shall be used and additional stars or asterisks shall be used in the same manner as successive amendments are adopted.

18. Amend Rule 112 to read as follows:

112. Except when advanced prior to printing by special order or emergency resolution, printed copies of bills and joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions which are given more than one reading shall be used on their second and third readings, and no amendment shall be received to any bill or joint resolution on its third reading.

No motion to advance a bill or joint resolution to third reading in advance of the availability of printed copies thereof shall be considered until duplicated copies of the bill or joint resolution, *together with copies of any committee statement thereon filed with the Secretary of the*

Senate, shall have been made available to the members of the Senate and all available fiscal information has been provided to the members. *In case of emergency the President may by special order waive the requirement for the distribution of the committee statement.*

19. Amend Rule 121 to read as follows:

121. Every bill and joint resolution, and every concurrent resolution proposing an amendment or amendments to the Constitution, shall be read three times in the Senate before final passage but no bill or joint resolution shall have a first and second reading on the same day without special order [concurring in by a majority of all the members of the Senate]. A concurrent resolution, other than one proposing an amendment or amendments to the Constitution, shall be before the Senate and may be acted upon at any time after its introduction, unless it shall have been referred to committee. Any concurrent resolution, other than one proposing an amendment or amendments to the Constitution, which has been referred to committee, shall be before the Senate and may be acted upon at any time after the same shall have been reported by a committee.

20. Amend paragraphs a. and b. of Rule 123 to read as follows:

123a. Any bill, joint resolution, concurrent resolution, or resolution may *on motion of or by consent of its sponsor* be made the order of a particular day, on which day it shall be taken up, whether or not it is upon the Calendar for said day, in preference to any others whether or not they are on the Calendar.

b. At any given meeting, the total number of bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions which may be considered for final passage shall not exceed 30[, excluding any bills or resolutions set forth on the consent calendar].

20A. Amend Rule 155 to read as follows:

155. [Unless otherwise determined by the Chairman of a Standing Reference Committee] *Except as provided by Rule 151*, members of the public shall be permitted to be present at meetings of [such a] *any reference committee* to the extent that space is available in the committee room. All bills, resolutions and other matters shall[, in any event,] be voted upon only at such a public session. *Citizens present*

who wish to be heard on a matter under consideration by the committee shall be afforded an opportunity to speak, subject to such reasonable limitations as may be set by the Chairman.

In addition, [with the concurrence] *on his direction or by vote* of a majority of the members of a Standing Reference Committee, the Chairman may schedule a public hearing in connection with any bill or resolution then pending before the Committee on such notice *not less than five days*, as may be determined by the Chairman and at which all interested parties shall have an opportunity to be heard. *All stenographically recorded public hearings shall be conducted in the State House, Trenton, unless the President shall approve another location.*

[Except as hereinabove or elsewhere in these Rules otherwise provided, each Senate Committee may adopt rules for its own operation and the conduct of its business.]

21. Amend Rule 8 of the Joint Rules of the Senate and General Assembly to read as follows:

8. If a bill shall have passed both Houses, it shall be delivered by the Secretary of the Senate or the Clerk of the General Assembly, as the bill may originate in one House or the other, to a Joint Committee on Passed Bills appointed as a standing committee for that purpose and it shall be presented by said committee to the Governor for his action[, there first being endorsed on the jacket containing the bill a certificate, specifying the House in which the same originated, which certificate shall be signed by the Secretary or the Clerk, as the case may be, of the House in which the same originated]. Each such bill shall remain in the custody of the Secretary or Clerk, as the case may be, of the House in which the bill originated, acting for the Joint Committee on Passed Bills but no action shall be taken upon such a bill, by the Joint Committee on Passed Bills, other than to present it to the Governor, except by the order of both Houses.

The President shall place such nomination before the whole Senate in public session at the meeting next following, and may call for the vote of the Senators with respect thereto in the order of his pleasure at that time; provided, however, that if the Senate does not meet within the 60-day period, then the President shall place such nomination before the whole Senate in public session at the third meeting following expiration of the 60-day period.*

L. 1969 (C. 52:14C-1 et seq.), known as the "Executive Reorganization Act of 1969" I submit herewith a reorganization plan for the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance in the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs and the Local Finance Board in the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs.

To the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

On February 9, 1976 I submitted to you a plan of reorganization for the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs. The primary objective of that reorganization plan was to strengthen the ability of the State to meet municipal and county budgeting and financing needs and to improve economic planning for State and local budgeting. Upon further consideration of the issues raised by the reorganization of the Division of Local Government Services, I hereby submit a revised plan of reorganization for the Division of Local Government Services which transfers the responsibility relating to the budgeting and financing functions of local governments. This reorganization plan transfers the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance in the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs, as presently constituted, and the Local Finance Board in the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs to the Department of the Treasury.

The reorganization plan, hereby transmitted, is designed to assure more effective oversight of municipal and county finance. The problems of local finance have changed to such a degree that a new organization of State oversight and advisory functions is necessary. The transfer proposed by

this reorganization plan will enable the State to coordinate better its own financings with the borrowing schedules of local governments. Also a merger of governmental budgeting and financing functions will promote a greater sharing of expertise of the officials in State government concerned with State and local finance. In addition, this proposed transfer enables the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance and the Local Finance Board to work more effectively with the Division of Investment to improve local investment and debt management practices. This proposed transfer of functions to the Department of the Treasury, in which the Division of Budget and Accounting, the Division of Investment, and the Commission on Capital Budgeting and Planning are located, consolidates fiscal expertise for budget and debt management.

This plan will substantially improve the ability of the State to meet the budgeting and financing needs of municipalities and counties.

REORGANIZATION PLAN OF THE DIVISION OF LOCAL
GOVERNMENT SERVICES

The Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance in the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs, together with all its functions, powers and duties, and the Local Finance Board in the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs, together with all its functions, powers and duties, are hereby transferred to the Department of the Treasury.

The Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance, as presently organized, reviews and certifies all municipal budgets, is responsible for post-audit review of municipal and county government, and provides financial guidance to local governments. The Local Finance Board approves fiscal transactions of municipalities in, or in danger of falling into, unsound fiscal condition, and has jurisdiction over municipalities which are insolvent.

Placing these local budgeting and financing functions in the Department of the Treasury will assure more effective oversight of municipal and county finance. The problems of local finance have changed to such a degree that a new organization of State oversight and advisory functions is

necessary. The transfer proposed by the reorganization plan will enable the State to coordinate better its own financings with the borrowing schedules of local governments. Also a merger of governmental budgeting and financing functions will promote a greater sharing of expertise of the officials of State government concerned with State and local finance. In addition, this proposed transfer enables the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance and the Local Finance Board to work more effectively with the Division of Investment to improve local investment and debt management practices.

In accordance with the provisions of the Executive Reorganization Act of 1969, P. L. 1969, c. 203 (C. 52:14C-2), I find and declare that this transfer and reorganization is necessary:

- (1) to promote the more effective management of the Executive Branch;
- (2) to reduce expenditures and promote economy to the fullest extent practicable;
- (3) to increase the efficiency of the operations of the Executive Branch to the fullest extent practicable;
- (4) to group, coordinate, and consolidate agencies and functions of the Executive Branch, as nearly as practicable, according to major purposes;
- (5) to eliminate overlapping and duplication of effort.

All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with any of the provisions of this reorganization plan are superseded to the extent of such inconsistencies. All transfers directed by this reorganization plan shall be effective pursuant to the "State Agency Transfer Act," P. L. 1971, c. 375 (C. 52:14D-1 et seq.).

Any provisions of this plan which conflict with Federal law are null and void.

WHEREAS, The convenience of reduced flying time enjoyed by passengers of the SST seems too small a benefit in return for the attendant hazards of such flights; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey:

1. The Governors of the States of New Jersey and New York are respectfully memorialized to require the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey to prohibit the landing of SST aircraft at John F. Kennedy International Airport or elsewhere in the metropolitan region.

2. Local Government Services, I submitted a revised plan of reorganization for the Division of Local Government Services which would have transferred the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance in the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs and the Local Finance Board in the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs to the Department of the Treasury. Upon further consideration and discussion of the issues involved, I hereby submit a revised plan of reorganization for the Division of Local Government Services which transfers the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance in the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs, as presently constituted, to the Department of the Treasury.

The reorganization plan, hereby transmitted, is designed to assure more effective oversight of municipal and county finance. The problems of local finance have changed to such a degree that a new organization of State oversight and advisory functions is necessary. The transfer proposed by this reorganization plan will enable the State to coordinate better its own financings with the borrowing schedules of local governments. Also this merger of governmental budgeting and financing functions will promote a greater sharing of expertise of the officials in State government concerned with State and local finance. In addition, this proposed transfer enables the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance to work more effectively with the Division of Investment to improve local investment and debt management practices. This proposed transfer of functions to the Department of the Treasury, in which the Division of Budget and Accounting, the Division of Investment, and the Commission on Capital Budgeting and Planning are located, consolidates fiscal expertise for budget and debt management.

This plan will substantially improve the ability of the State to meet the budgeting and financing needs of municipalities and counties.

REORGANIZATION PLAN OF THE DIVISION OF
LOCAL GOVERNMENT SERVICES

The Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance in the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs, together with all its functions,

powers and duties, is hereby transferred to the Department of the Treasury. All powers exercised by the Commissioner of Community Affairs and the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in direct supervision of the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance are hereby transferred to the Department of the Treasury and shall be exercised by officials in the Department of the Treasury.

The Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance, as presently organized, reviews and certifies all municipal budgets, is responsible for post-audit review of municipal and county government, and provides financial guidance to local governments.

Placing these local budgeting and financing functions in the Department of the Treasury will assure more effective oversight of municipal and county finance. The problems of local finance have changed to such a degree that a new organization of State oversight and advisory functions is necessary. The transfer proposed by the reorganization plan will enable the State to coordinate better its own financings with the borrowing schedules of local governments. Also a transfer of these governmental budgeting and financing functions to the Department of the Treasury will promote a greater sharing of expertise of the officials of State government concerned with State and local finance. In addition, this proposed transfer enables the Bureau of Financial Regulation and Assistance to work more effectively with the Division of Investment to improve local investment and debt management practices.

In accordance with the provision of the Executive Reorganization Act of 1969, P. L. 1969, c. 203 (C. 52:14C-2), I find and declare that this transfer and reorganization is necessary:

- (1) To promote the more effective management of the Executive Branch;
- (2) To reduce expenditures and promote economy to the fullest extent practicable;
- (3) To increase the efficiency of the operations of the Executive Branch to the fullest extent practicable;
- (4) To group, coordinate, and consolidate agencies and functions of the Executive Branch, as nearly as practicable, according to major purposes;

(5) To eliminate overlapping and duplication of effort.

All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with any of the provision of this reorganization plan are superseded to the extent of such inconsistencies. All transfers directed by this reorganization plan shall be effective pursuant to the "State Agency Transfer Act," P. L. 1971, c. 375 (C. 52:14D-1 et seq.).

This plan shall be effective July 1, 1976.

The Appropriations Bill allocates \$1,722,187 to the Legislative Services Agency for Fiscal Year 1977. This is an increase of \$223,831, or 15%, over the amount available to the agency in the current fiscal year. This amount also represents the amount requested by the agency. In this period of economic restraint every department in State Government has been forced to make sacrifices. Revenues have not increased sufficiently to justify large increases over the current level of spending. Few, if any agencies, have an appropriation which is more than the current year's appropriation. This is particularly true of agencies such as Legislative Services which have the use of unexpended balances, in this case, \$100,000. Accordingly, the appropriation to the Legislative Services Agency is reduced by \$223,831, to the Fiscal Year 1976 level.

The Appropriations Bill allocates \$2,094,800 to The Office of Fiscal Affairs. This represents an increase of \$122,742 over the present level of funding and is the amount requested by the agency. A significant part of this increase is due to a 23% increase over the current year's appropriation level for the Division of Program Analysis. While I recognize the importance of The Office of Fiscal Affairs

and value its contribution to the operation of State government, as with the Legislative Services Agency, I cannot justify such an increased appropriation at the present time. The appropriation is therefore reduced by \$122,742 to the 1976 appropriation level.

The Department of Law and Public Safety annually conducts State Police Recruit Classes. The funds provided in the Appropriations Bill exceed the amount necessary to conduct one class but are insufficient for two classes. Therefore, the amount is reduced to \$150,000. This represents the appropriation necessary to train one recruit class.

Newark Symphony Hall is one of New Jersey's oldest and finest cultural institutions. Its continued existence benefits every citizen of the State. It is therefore appropriate that the State contribute to its operation and maintenance, and I fully support expenditures for this purpose. However, this State is also fortunate to have a State Council on the Arts. The responsibility, and indeed, the obligation to determine priorities for expenditure of the cultural project funds is theirs. The Appropriations Bill is an inappropriate vehicle by which to determine such priorities. Therefore, although I strongly endorse the expenditure of funds by the Council for staffing and operations at Newark Symphony Hall, I delete the language in the bill which would mandate this expenditure.

The amount appropriated for Grants to Soil Conservation districts is reduced by \$15,000. The sum recommended in the bill is higher than the Department of Agriculture's request of \$93,000.

The Appropriations Committee funded the Delaware and Raritan Canal Commission at a level higher than prior years' appropriations.

The amount provided also exceeds the Department of Environmental Protection's determination of an adequate level of financing for Fiscal Year 1977. In accordance with my policy of fiscal restraint, the appropriation for expenses of the commission is therefore reduced by \$20,000.

For several years, New Jersey has purchased veterinary medicine education in out-of-State veterinary institutions. This has permitted many New Jersey residents to obtain an education in veterinary medicine which would otherwise be unavailable because of the absence of an in-State facility.

My budget message increased the allocation of this program. The Appropriations Committee, however, reduced the funds available to purchase these educational services by \$96,000 and directed that this amount be used to hire a dean and to develop and plan a veterinary school of New Jersey. While I support the concept that New Jersey should have a veterinary school, I must delete that part of the Appropriations Bill which would transfer the usage of funds from purchase of services to planning and the hiring of a dean. I cannot justify commencing the development of a new institution of graduate education, with its necessarily significant cost implications for the future—both capital and operating—at a time when our existing institutions of higher education are operating on restricted budgets. We simply cannot now afford the luxury of undertaking a new and substantial financial obligation for another institution for graduate education, albeit one which will benefit the citizens of this State. Fiscal integrity demands that we maintain, for the present, the purchase of service systems within the Central Office of the Department of Higher Education.

The Appropriations Bill, as submitted to me, designates two specific projects to be financed from appropriations to the Department of Transportation. These are the resurfacing of Route 27 in Highland Park and a feasibility study for the activation of the West Shore Railroad. While these projects may well prove to be highly meritorious and deserving of priority, the Appropriations Bill is an inappropriate vehicle through which to direct their initiation. Effective program management within the department dictates that the department, with its particular expertise and overview of the myriad of proposed projects in the State, determine the priority of such projects. I am certain that the merits of these particular projects will speak for themselves in such a departmental review. Accordingly, the language specifying the completion of these projects is deleted. However, the funding for Comprehensive Transportation Planning is not reduced. I support the amount provided by the Appropriations Committee.

There is presently in the Appropriations Bill an amount for Emergency Assistance. This amount exceeds what is expected to be required in Fiscal Year 1977. Accordingly, the funds for payments for Emergency Assistance are reduced by \$203,000. This sum recommended should be more

than adequate to meet the expenses for emergency assistance, even with the recent amendments to the Emergency Assistance regulations which liberalize the availability of payments under extraordinary services.

Provision has been made in the Appropriations Bill for funds for Aid to Depressed Rural Areas, subject to the enactment of enabling legislation. Although a bill has been introduced to implement this program, the Legislature has, to date, failed to enact it. In the absence of authorizing legislation, I cannot approve the inclusion of these funds in the budget. The funds for Aid to Depressed Rural Areas are therefore reduced by \$400,000.

REORGANIZATION PLAN OF
THE OFFICE OF CIVILIAN DEFENSE DIRECTOR

The functions, power and duties of the Office of Civilian Defense Director are hereby transferred from the Department of Defense to the Department of Law and Public Safety.

The Office of Civilian Defense Director is directed by statute to assist the Governor in protecting the public health, safety and welfare during any emergency. To a large extent, these functions and responsibilities are also within the scope of the public safety and law enforcement responsibilities of the Department of Law and Public Safety. In emergency situations, the State Police in the Department of Law and Public Safety provide communication services and personnel to coordinate and perform rescue services throughout the State, and maintain continuing contacts with local police, fire and rescue units utilized during periods of emergency.

The placement of civil defense responsibilities within the Department of Defense has reflected the traditional concept of civil defense as preparation for possible enemy attacks. In recent years, however, civil defense's activities have been primarily confined to responding to natural disasters and

other emergencies. During most emergencies, relief efforts have been undertaken by the State Police with the assistance of county and local relief units. This proposed reorganization is intended to promote coordination of such activities, and to eliminate duplication of effort in emergency relief situations. The reorganization will also improve disaster planning, which is now conducted by the Governor's Advisory Council on Emergency Services, an interdepartmental group of which the Attorney General is presiding officer.

In accordance with the provisions of the Executive Reorganization Act of 1969, P. L. 1969, c. 203 (C. 52:14C-2), I find and declare that this transfer and reorganization is necessary

- (1) to promote the more effective management of the Executive Branch;
- (2) to reduce expenditures and promote economy to the fullest extent practicable;
- (3) to increase the efficiency of the operations of the Executive to the fullest extent practicable;
- (4) to group, co-ordinate, and consolidate agencies and functions of the Executive Branch, as nearly as may be, according to major purposes;
- (5) to reduce the number of agencies by consolidating those having similar functions under a single head; and
- (6) to eliminate overlapping and duplication of effort.

All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with any of the provisions of this reorganization plan are superseded to the extent of such inconsistencies. The civilian defense director shall continue to be appointed by the Governor pursuant to the provisions of N. J. S. A.:9-35. All transfers directed by this reorganization plan shall be in accordance with the provisions of the "State Agency Transfer Act," P. L. 1971, c. 375 (C. 52:14D-1 et seq.).
