Virginia Long, Commissioner of Banking, pursuant to authority of N.J.S.A. 17:1-8.1, proposes to adopt a new rule concerning stock subscriptions for capital savings and loan associations.

Full text of the proposal follows:

3:1-2.24 Minimum stock subscription for capital stock associations

(a) Each charter application for a capital stock association shall provide for stated capital of no less than \$2,000,000.

(b) The incorporators of a capital stock association shall subscribe to a minimum of 70 per cent of the number of shares authorized to be issued by the certificate of incorporation.

(c) The balance of the capital stock shall be offered in small blocks to residents, employers and employees in the area to be served by the capital stock association if and when the application is approved and under such terms and conditions as set forth in the commissioner's decision and order.

(d) No individual, group of family members or close business associates shall subscribe for in excess of 10 per cent of the authorized shares of a capital stock association.

3:1-2.2 Notice; publication

(a) When an application is accepted, the Department shall send written notice thereof to the New Jersey Bankers Association, the Savings Banks' Association of New Jersey and the New Jersey Savings League. Each notice shall contain the following:

1. The name of the applicant;
2. A brief statement of the nature of the application;
3. The precise location of the site involved in the particular application; and
4. The date the application was accepted by the Department.

(b) Notice prescribed by subsection (a) of this section shall be published in the weekly applications bulletins of the New Jersey Bankers Association, Savings Banks' Association of New Jersey and New Jersey Savings League in the week following acceptance thereof. The publication of notice shall also include the following statement:

"You are hereby advised that an individual bank, savings bank or savings and loan association may object to any of the aforesaid applications and request that a formal hearing be conducted if in writing and if filed in the Department of Banking in person or by letter post-marked within ten days of the date of this bulletin. Individuals or financial institutions interested in perfecting an objection or hearing request should immediately consult the Department's procedural rules for guidance."

(a) An objection to an application by a bank, savings bank or savings and loan association must be [received] filed in the Department of Banking either in person or by letter postmarked within ten days of the date of publication in the trade association bulletins, as required by N.J.A.C. 3:1-2.2. If an objector desires a hearing to be held on a full branch application, a Section 25 or Section 27 branch office application or a relocation application, or desires to make an appearance at a charter hearing, the objection shall also contain a specific request for a formal hearing or, in the case of charter applications, a request for permission to appear at the formal hearing.

3:1-6.1 Institutions to be assessed

Every bank as defined in N.J.S.A. 17:9A-1(1), every savings bank as defined in N.J.S.A. 17:9A-1(13) and every State association as defined in N.J.S.A. 17:12B-5(1) shall be assessed a yearly fee of [.20] .30 of the one cent per hundred dollars of total assets.

3:1-6.2 Assessed semi-annually

The fee shall be assessed at a rate of [.10] .15 of one cent per hundred dollars of total assets as of December 31 and a rate of [.10] .15 of one cent per hundred dollars of total assets as of June 30 of each calendar year.

3:1-6.4 [Initial assessment] Effective date

The fees assessed pursuant to this regulation will first apply to the [fourth] first [quarter] half of calendar [1974] 1978. [To facilitate the collection thereof, a payment of .05 of one cent per hundred dollars of total assets as of June 30, 1974, shall be submitted no later than September 30, 1974. Thereafter, the provisions of N.J.A.C. 3:1-6.2 and 3 will be followed.]

3:1-6.5 [Fees subject to] Annual review

The fees assessed by this regulation shall be reviewed at least annually and if necessary shall be increased or decreased in accordance with the services performed by the Department of Banking.

1. The proceeds of which, all or in part, are to be used for the purposes of repairing, rehabilitating or remodeling an existing residential dwelling located in a State as stated by the borrower to the lender at the time of the loan transaction; or

2. That is recorded on the books of the depository institution as a home improvement loan; or

3. Which is a secondary mortgage loan or consumer loan, repayable in equal periodic installments, the proceeds of which, all or in part, are to be used for the purpose of repairing, rehabilitating or remodeling an existing residential dwelling.

Subpart 21-2.102 Standard Race/Ethnic Categories

21-2.102a Subject:

This subpart is issued to advise of the government-wide standard race/ethnic categories established by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, by memorandum dated October 13, 1976.

21-2.102b Defined categories

a. White, not of Hispanic Origin—Persons having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa or the Middle East.

b. Black, not of Hispanic Origin—Persons having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa.

c. Hispanic—Persons of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.

d. American Indian or Alaskan Native—Persons having origins in any of the original people of North America, and who maintain cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.

e. Asian or Pacific Islander—Persons having origins in any of the original people of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian Subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes, for example, China, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands and Samoa.

Proposed Amendments On Natural Areas System

Rocco D. Ricci, Commissioner of Environmental Protection, pursuant to authority of N.J.S.A. 13:1B-15.4 et seq. and 13:1B-15.12a et seq., proposes to delete the current text of subchapter 11 in chapter 2 in Title 7 of the New Jersey Administrative Code and adopt new text therein concerning natural areas system. Such amendments are known within the Department of Environmental Protection as Docket No. DEP 065-77-12.

Copies of the 23 pages of the proposed new rules may be obtained from or made available for review by contacting the Department of Environmental Protection at the address listed below.

The proposed rules identify 40 areas totaling approximately 24,500 acres under the jurisdiction of the Department of Environmental Protection which the department intends to declare as initial components of the natural areas system pursuant to the Natural Areas System Act.

Additionally, the rules and regulations establish standards for evaluating lands and waters for inclusion in the system, define three classes of natural areas and prescribe management criteria for each class, and specify the uses which may be permitted in the three classes of areas. The rules also establish the procedures for maintaining a registry of natural areas that includes lands, public and private, which are suitable for inclusion in the natural areas system.

Proposed Amendments on Watercraft Noise Control

Rocco D. Ricci, Commissioner of Environmental Protection, pursuant to the authority of N.J.S.A. 12:7-34.49, proposes to adopt a new rule to be cited as N.J.A.C. 7:6-6.1 et seq. and to repeal N.J.A.C. 7:29-2.1 et seq. concerning watercraft noise control.

Full text of the proposal follows:

SUBCHAPTER 6. WATERCRAFT NOISE CONTROL

7:6-6.1 Scope

The following rules shall govern the emission of noise from vessels and watercraft operating on the waters of New Jersey.

7:6-6.2 Definitions

"Department" means the Department of Environmental Protection.

"Person" means any corporation, company, association, society, firm, partnership and joint stock company, as well as individuals, and shall include the State and all its political subdivisions and any agencies and instrumentalities thereof.

"Vessel" means a boat or watercraft other than a sea-plane on the water, used or capable of being used as a means of transportation on the water, except a boat subject to the provisions of P.L. 1969, c. 264 (N.J.S.A. 12:7C-1 et seq.).

7:6-6.3 Noise limitation provisions

(a) The total noise produced by any vessel or watercraft upon any of the waters of this State, whether or not it be in motion, shall not exceed 86 dba measured at a distance of 50 feet from the vessel. For vessels with engines manufactured on or after January 1, 1979, and before January 1, 1982, the noise level shall not exceed 84 dba measured at a distance of 50 feet from the vessel. For vessels with engines manufactured on or after January 1, 1982, the noise level shall not exceed 82 dba measured at a distance of 50 feet from the vessel.

(b) Measurements shall be made by a sound level meter which satisfies ANSI-S 1.4, type 2, or equivalent, and is

certified by the Department of Environmental Protection, Office of Noise Control, with reference, as applicable, to standards of the New Jersey Office of Weights and Measures or the National Bureau of Standards or both.

(c) Measurements shall be made with the sound level meter at a distance of not less than 50 feet from the closest point of the boat's hull amidships. Any marine policeman or other law enforcement officer certified by the Office of Noise Control with a reason to suspect that a boat is exceeding the noise limitation may require the vessel operator to traverse a noise emission test course as set forth herein.

(d) Any person who fails to comply with the directive to traverse the test course shall be subject to prosecution or, at the discretion of the law enforcement officer, such vessel or engine shall be ordered to immediately return to its mooring and cease operations.

(e) The noise emission test course shall consist of a straight course of approximately 100 yards long through which the vessel shall be operated at full throttle. The sound level meter shall be located at a perpendicular distance of not less than the specified 50 feet from the approximate midpoint of the course. The ambient noise level shall be a factor in positioning the test course.

1. Any person operating any vessel or other watercraft found in violation of the established noise levels may be subject to prosecution by the department.

(f) The noise limitation provisions of this section shall not apply to vessels registered and actually participating in racing events, or tune-up periods for such racing events, when authorized by the department or by any other public authority with the department's approval. Tune-up periods approved pursuant to this section shall be limited as follows.

1. Before any race boat is tested, the driver shall secure a race test permit from the New Jersey Marine Police.

2. Before the permit is issued, the Marine Police shall obtain a statement from the applicant which shall include the following:

i. Name and address of the driver;

ii. Type and description of the boat;

iii. The area of the test;

iv. The name and address of the boat's owner;

v. The date and location of the next race in which the operator will compete, and;

vi. Any other information deemed necessary by the Marine Police station commander.

3. From May 15 through October 1, there shall be no race tests permitted on any Saturday, Sunday, or holiday.

4. All race tests, with the exception of those held on the Navesink and Shrewsbury Rivers in Monmouth County shall be conducted between the hours of 10:00 A.M. and 6:00 P.M., local time. Tests may be conducted on the Navesink and Shrewsbury Rivers between the hours of 10:00 A.M. and 8:00 P.M.

5. All race tests shall be limited to a total test period of 20 minutes on the water.

6. There shall be a maximum of five race tests permitted on any one day.

7. No driver shall be permitted more than five race tests in any seven-day period.

8. No boat shall be tested more than five times in any seven-day period.

9. The provisions of paragraphs 3, 6, 7, and 8 of this subsection shall not apply on a body of water in the three-day period immediately preceding a race on that body of water. Subject to such restrictions as may be imposed by the United States Coast Guard or the New Jersey Marine Police, testing on days of sanctioned

aces may begin two hours before the start of the first race.

10. The station commander, New Jersey Marine Police, is authorized to deny or cancel any permit for the reasons of boat traffic, poor weather, confined area, or other valid reason.

7:6-6.4 Test course

No person shall fail to traverse a noise emission test course when so ordered by a duly authorized law enforcement officer.

Note: N.J.A.C. 7:29-2.1 through 2.4, regulations of the Office of Noise Control pertaining to noise from vessels and watercraft are hereby repealed.

Notice of Public Hearing on Proposed Designations Of Specified Air Quality Control Regions

Take notice that the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection, pursuant to the provisions of N.J.S.A. 13:1D-1 et seq., will hold a public hearing on proposed designations of specified air quality control regions, or portions thereof, which have been made to comply with the requirements of section 107 of the Federal Clean Air Act, as amended. These designations should provide a general basis for future: (a) transportation control planning, (b) planning purposes with regard to nonattainment of ambient air quality standards and prevention of significant deterioration, and (c) for other purposes.

This proposal is known within the Department as Docket No. DEP-062-77-12.

The 1977 amendments to the Federal Clean Air Act (act) (P.L. 95-95) require each state to report air quality levels in the various air quality control regions, or portions of regions for which the state is responsible. In order to comply with this requirement, an extensive analysis of the latest available ambient air monitoring data was prepared. This process consumed most of the 120 days permitted by the act for the submission of this information. As a result, it was not possible to schedule this hearing prior to that submittal.

Nevertheless, the comments and statements presented as a part of this hearing remain timely in that section 107(d)(5) of the act permits a state to review and resubmit its listing to the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), who must then consider and promulgate the revised list in the same manner as the initial listing was reviewed. Therefore, the department will consider carefully all views which may be presented on this matter and make whatever changes appear necessary in light of any new information which may be received.

This proposal:

1. Lists the entire State as being in attainment of national primary ambient air quality standards for sulfur dioxide;

2. Takes note of contraventions of national primary ambient air quality standards for particulates in the central business district of Camden and close to, and between, two central business districts of Jersey City;

3. Takes note of contravention of the 24-hour secondary national ambient air quality standard for particulates in much of the industrialized portion of northeast New Jersey (New Jersey-New York-Connecticut Interstate Air Quality Control Region);

4. Takes note of contravention of the 24-hour secondary national ambient air quality standard for particulates in a portion of the City of Bridgeton;

5. Indicates contraventions of the primary national ambient air quality standard for photochemical oxidants throughout the entire State;

6. Lists 16 central business districts as being in non-attainment of the 8-hour primary national ambient air quality standard for carbon monoxide;

7. Lists certain central business districts within the New Jersey-New York-Connecticut Interstate Air Quality

Control Region as being unclassifiable with respect to carbon monoxide; and

8. Lists the entire State as being in attainment of the annual national primary ambient air quality standard for nitrogen dioxide.

Eligible professional staff members are entitled to reappointment unless notified of their non-reappointment by the president not later than December 15 of the last academic year of their current contract. Such members entitled to reappointment shall be notified by the president not later than March 15 of the last academic year of their current contract of the duration of their reappointment. Failure to so notify a member entitled to reappointment shall entitle such member to reappointment for a one-year term.

2. An eligible professional staff member who has served longer than five full academic years and whose contract, whether for a one-year term or a multi-year term, is due to expire at the end of an academic year may in accordance with the provisions of this section be reappointed to a one-year term or to a multi-year term of from two to five full academic years, or not reappointed, regardless of the duration of his or her current contract.

3. The length of the term of an eligible professional staff member's reappointment under this section shall be determined solely by the college subsequent to analysis of the quality of the staff member's past performance, and long range administrative and professional staffing needs of the college.

Only if the client is rejected as not feasible for the services furnished by DVRS should the municipal welfare agency consider authorizing payment for such an appliance, and then only after consulting with the Bureau of Medical Affairs.

Proposed Amendments to Medicaid Only Manual On Exclusion of Value of Home as Resource

Ann Klein, Commissioner of Human Services, pursuant to authority of N.J.S.A. 44:7-87, proposes to revise portions of the Medicaid Only Manual concerning the exclusion of the value of a home as a resource.

Full text of the proposal follows (additions indicated in boldface thus; deletions indicated in brackets [thus]):

10:94-4.4(e) Current market value of real property is the tax assessed value of the property multiplied by the reciprocal of the assessment ratio as recorded in the most recently issued State table of equalized valuations.

10:94-4.16(a)1. A house occupied by the individual as his/her place of principal residence, and the land appertaining thereto, [to the extent that the combined value of such does not exceed \$25,000] shall be excluded.

i. The amount by which the value of such a resource exceeds \$25,000 shall be countable toward the appropriate resource maximum. (See also section 420, Liquidation of resources.)

ii. The value of the home shall be the tax assessed value of the property multiplied by the reciprocal of the assessment ratio as recorded in the most recently issued State Table of Equalized Valuations.

(1) Example: The City of Trenton considers a home to be worth \$20,000 for tax purposes. The State Table of Equalized Valuations shows an assessment ratio of 66% per cent for the City of Trenton. The value of the house, for Medicaid Only purposes, would be \$30,000.]

1. Absences: Short temporary absences from home such as trips, visits, and hospitalizations do not affect this exclusion so long as the individual intends, and may reasonably be expected, to return home. An absence of more than six months is assumed to indicate that the home no longer serves as principal residence unless the home is used by a spouse or dependent relative, or unless prior approval is obtained from the Division of Public Welfare to extend the period due to extenuating circumstances.

Proposed Amendments in Incentive Payments To CWAs for CSP Collections

Ann Klein, Commissioner of Human Services, pursuant to authority of N.J.S.A. 44:7-6 and 44:10-3, proposes to amend portions of Appendix D in Chapter 81 of Title 10 in the New Jersey Administrative Code regarding the 15 per cent incentive payments to CWAs for CSP collections.

Appendix D

240. INCENTIVE PAYMENTS TO THE CWA

241. [Twenty-Five] Fifteen Per Cent Incentive

An amount equal to [25] 15 per cent of any required support obligation collected shall be retained by the CWA. [This retention of the 25 per cent incentive shall continue until the support payments collected equal the required support obligation for 12 months. (See also App. D 242 and

243.) Collections qualify for the 25 per cent incentive even if the months of such collections are not consecutive.]

[241.1 Termination of Form PA-10G

In the event of an AFDC termination, if the family receives AFDC at a later date and another PA-10G form is executed, a new 12-month period shall commence.]

[242. Ten Per Cent Incentive

An amount equal to 10 per cent of any amount collected which is attributable to the support obligation owed for any month after the amount identified in App. D 251 above has been collected shall be retained by the CWA.]

[243.] 242. Alimony Payments

Any portion of support payments which is designated by court action as payment of alimony cannot be considered in the computation of incentive payments to CWAs.

[243.1] 242.1 Identification of Alimony

The Probation Department will be responsible for informing the CWA regarding the amount of the court order applicable to child support and the amount applicable to alimony. Also any amendments to the order affecting the amount of support will be reported on a one-time basis. After being informed of the breakdown of the order, the CWA will be responsible for on-going identification in its records. If the court order specifies child support only, the entire collection will be considered child support. However, in those cases where the amount is for the support of the family, a pro rata distribution between child support and alimony for the spouse must be made.

[244.] 243. Deduction of Incentive Payments

The CWA shall be responsible for the calculation of CWA incentive payments. Any such payment retained by the CWA shall be deducted from the Federal share of the amount of support collected. All incentive moneys shall be deposited in the administrative account.

Proposed Amendments on Budgeting Of Cases Involving Stepparents

Ann Klein, Commissioner of Human Services, pursuant to authority of N.J.S.A. 44:7-6 and 44:10-3, proposes to amend portions of the Assistance Standards Handbook concerning budgeting of cases involving stepparents.

Full text of the proposal follows (additions indicated in boldface thus; deletions indicated in brackets [thus]):

10:82-2.9(a)[3. The natural or adoptive parent may, at his/her request, be included in the grant of assistance, even if the stepparent is excluded, when the stepparent has insufficient income to meet the needs of the natural or adoptive parent.]

(b) [All] The options and all consequences thereof, including financial and medical needs, shall be fully discussed with the client before the decision is made. The decision as to whether the stepparent shall be included (assuming the stepparent is so willing) or excluded shall be made by natural or adoptive parent.

(d) When the stepparent is not included in the eligible unit, the natural or adoptive parent is [ordinarily] excluded as well, and the eligible unit includes only the eligible children.

[1. In determining the amount of the grant, only that part of the stepparent's income which is established to be actually available for current use on a regular basis by the eligible unit shall be recognized. When the stepparent pays for the total cost of shelter for the eligible unit, the cost shall be prorated among all family members to determine the amount to be recognized as income to the eligible unit. (Family members shall include the stepparent, all his/her dependents living in the home, and the eligible unit.)]

[2.] 1. The parent of the eligible children shall sign the application for assistance and [shall be required to provide full information about the amount, if any, of the stepparent's actual contribution on a regular basis towards the needs of the eligible unit. Any other income of the stepparent is not to be considered.] fulfill all obligations contained therein.

2. The grant for the eligible unit shall be the appropriate allowance standard on schedule I less any income to the eligible unit such as child support, Social Security benefits, direct cash contributions from the stepparent or net income of the parent.

[(e) In a case where the stepparent is not included in the eligible unit and does not have sufficient income to cover the needs of the natural or adoptive parent as well as his/her own needs, the natural or adoptive parent shall, at his/her option, be included in the eligible unit with the eligible children. In such a situation, the natural or adoptive parent shall sign the application for assistance and shall be required to provide full information about the amount, if any, of the stepparent's income.

1. The determination of whether the natural or adoptive parent may be included in the eligible unit shall be based upon the following computation: If the stepparent's adjusted net income (gross earnings less mandatory payroll deductions in accordance with section 212.1b and, if self-employed, cost of producing income) does not equal the dollar amount established in schedule I as the standard of need for an eligible unit of two, then the natural or adoptive parent shall be eligible for inclusion in the unit.]

[(f)] (e) When the natural or adoptive parent is not included in the eligible unit and has earned and/or unearned income of his/her own, all such income shall be applied to the needs of the eligible child(ren). (See section 4 of this subchapter for deductions allowed in determination of net amount [..] of earned income.)

Proposed Amendments on Motor Vehicle Reinspection Centers Licensed to Certify Repairs in the Engine Emission Category

John A. Waddington, Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles in the Department of Law and Public Safety, pursuant to authority of N.J.S.A. 39:8-2 et seq. proposes to amend N.J.A.C. 13:20-32.3(b) and 13:20-33.22(b) concerning engine emission analyzers used by licensed reinspection centers.

Full text of the proposal follows (additions indicated in boldface thus):

13:20-32.3(b) An engine emissions analyzer, approved by the Department of Environmental Protection, must be available on the premises of all class I "full service" centers, all class II centers, and all class I "limited service" centers licensed to certify repairs in the engine emission category. Any licensee whose analyzer is found to be in need of repair or replacement may use the approved analyzer of another licensed reinspection center during the period when his analyzer is being repaired or until the time he receives a replacement, such period not to exceed 14 days. Such licensee shall transport the vehicles requiring the engine emissions test to the licensed reinspection center and shall certify them when such test has been made. He shall keep a record of each emissions reinspection made with another licensed reinspection center's analyzer showing the date the reinspection was made, the vehicle, the name and license number of the licensed reinspection center whose analyzer he is using. He shall also provide proof upon request that he has contracted for the repair or replacement of the defective analyzer. In no case shall the licensee certify the emissions of any vehicle unless he or his employee has personally made the emissions test. Notwithstanding the fact that the licensee is using the analyzer of another licensed reinspection center, he shall take all necessary precautions and do whatever is reasonable and practicable to determine that the analyzer being used is accurate.

13:20-33.22(b) The Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV), in cooperation with the DEP, will check each center's

analyzers' calibration and review the center's pre-test procedure periodically. If the center's equipment is unable to be calibrated within design specifications, the DMV field investigator shall designate the equipment "out of service" and thus, the center shall not perform emission reinspections until proper notification of correction is provided by the center's calibration and repair representative unless the center complies with the provisions of N.J.A.C. 13:20-32.3.

Proposed Repeal of Rules On Classes of Abandoned Vehicles

SUBCHAPTER 27. [CLASSES OF ABANDONED VEHICLES] (Reserved)

[13:20-27.1 Abandoned vehicles

(a) Whenever a motor vehicle, the model year of which is six years old or older, has been so deteriorated, damaged or stripped of useable parts as to be rendered to scrap and thus no longer a motor vehicle, is found abandoned by a public agency on a highway or other public property, or on any private property without the consent of the owner or other person in charge of the private property, a designated official of the public agency is authorized to certify the same as "motor vehicle scrap".

(b) Thereafter, the "motor vehicle scrap" may be sold or otherwise disposed of and removed to a licensed motor vehicle dealer or to a scrap processing company. Said disposition shall be accomplished without the need for title papers, certificate of ownership, junk title certificate, or any further certification or verification from the Division of Motor Vehicles, or notification to the owner thereof or advertisement of sale.

(c) No such motor vehicle scrap shall be removed from private property without the consent of the owner of the private property or his agent. Upon disposition of the motor vehicle scrap by a public agency, the vehicle identification number thereof and any motor vehicle registration plate attached thereto shall be destroyed or obliterated.

(d) The certification as "motor vehicle scrap" shall include a picture thereof and shall be made on such form and in such detail as prescribed by the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles. Each such certification and the name and address of the party purchasing or otherwise receiving the "motor vehicle scrap", and the terms of transfer thereof, shall be kept by the public agency as a public record for a period of two years.]

Proposed Amendments on Track Veterinarians To be Classified as Assistant State Veterinarians In Thoroughbred and Harness Racing

John J. Reilly, Executive Director of the New Jersey Racing Commission in the Department of Law and Public Safety, pursuant to authority of N.J.S.A. 5:5-22 et seq., proposes to amend N.J.A.C. 13:70-15.1.15.2; 13:70-19.34 through 13:70-19.38 and 13:71-9.1-9.3-9.4. concerning track veterinarians in thoroughbred and harness racing.

Full text of the proposal follows (additions indicated in boldface thus; deletions indicated in brackets [thus]):

13:70-15.1 List of racing officials

(a) The racing officials shall include:

1. Three stewards, one of whom shall be appointed by the Racing Commission and paid by the association;
2. Three placing judges;
3. Clerk of the scales;
4. Three or more patrol judges;
5. Starter;
6. Paddock judge;
7. Racing secretary, who may also be the handicapper;
8. Timer;
9. [Two or more veterinarians] **State veterinarian and two or more assistant State veterinarians;** and
10. A mutuel manager, general manager and all other managers and persons having administrative responsibility.

13:70-15.2 Appointment

One of the stewards, [a veterinarian] **a State veterinarian and assistant State veterinarians,** and a supervisor of mutuels shall be appointed by the Racing Commission. All other racing officials listed in section 1 of this subchapter shall be appointed by the association, subject to the approval of the commission.

13:70-19.34 [Track] State veterinarian and assistant State veterinarian license

The [track veterinarian] **State veterinarian and assistant State veterinarian** shall be [a] graduate [veterinarian] veterinarians in good standing and licensed to practice under the laws of the State of New Jersey.

13:70-19.35 [Track veterinarian's duties] Duties of State and assistant State veterinarians

The State veterinarian shall have full and complete control of the detention barn, and shall supervise all activities therein including the taking of pre-race and post-race blood and urine samples. Further, the State veterinarian shall have assigned to him two or more assistant State veterinarians who shall perform their duties and responsibilities under the supervision of the State veterinarian. The [track veterinarian] **assistant State veterinarian** shall, in general, familiarize himself with the racing condition of all entrants, and if in his opinion, any entrant is not in good condition to race, he shall immediately notify the stewards and the racing secretary [before 12:00 P.M. of the day of the race.].

13:70-19.36 Veterinarian's list

The [track veterinarian] **assistant State veterinarian** shall be present in the paddock before each race, and he shall inspect each entrant pursuant to specific veterinary medical procedures established by the State veterinarian as approved by the Racing Commission. If, in his opinion, any entrant is not in condition to compete in that race, he shall immediately notify the stewards, who shall order the horse scratched out of the race. The horse automatically goes on the veterinarians list, and thereafter shall not be permitted to enter until the veterinarian notifies the racing secretary that the horse is again fit to compete.

13:70-19.37 Veterinarian's presence; reports

The [track veterinarian] **assistant State veterinarian** shall be attendant on the stewards and the racing secretary at scratch time each morning, and shall examine such horses as they request, and make reports to the said racing officials as promptly as possible.

13:70-19.38 Other treatments by veterinarian

[No veterinarian employed by the Racing Commission or by any association] **The State veterinarian and assistant State veterinarians shall not be permitted, during the period of [his employment], their employment, to treat or prescribe for any horse, for compensation or otherwise, except in the case of emergency, in which case a report shall be made to the stewards.**

13:71-9.1 State veterinarian and assistant State veterinarians

(a) The commission shall designate [a] **two or more** duly licensed [veterinarian] veterinarians at each association track [who] **one of whom shall be known as the State veterinarian and the other shall be known as assistant State veterinarians.** [His] Their compensation shall be fixed by the commission and paid by the association.

(b) The State veterinarian and assistant State veterinarian, unless otherwise directed by the commission, shall devote [his] their time to the performance of the duties of [his] their office and shall not render [his] their professional services to any horsemen on the grounds of the association to which [he is] they are assigned during the course of the meeting except in cases of emergency and only as long as the emergency exists.

(c) [The Commission may also designate duly licensed veterinarians as assistant to the State veterinarian and

their compensation shall be fixed and paid by the Commission.]

The State veterinarian shall have full and complete control of the detention barn and shall supervise all activities therein including the taking of pre-race and post-race blood and urine samples. Further, the State veterinarian shall have assigned to him one or more assistant State veterinarian(s) who shall perform his (their) duties and responsibilities under the supervision of the State veterinarian. The assistant State veterinarian shall, in general, familiarize himself with the racing condition of all entrants and if, in his opinion, any entrant is not in good condition to race, he shall notify the presiding judge.

(d) The duties of the State veterinarian shall be to:

1. Supervise the taking of [saliva], blood, urine or such other samples from the horses as may be directed by the [secretary] executive director of the commission or the presiding judge and be responsible for the proper storing and delivery thereof to the laboratory designated by the commission and the maintenance of required records;

2. Directly supervise personnel assigned to the chemical sample collection detail;

3. Examine the credentials of and approve practicing veterinarians wishing to furnish services to owners and trainers on the premises of any track association. Approval will not be granted to any veterinarian possessing a direct or indirect interest in a racing stable;

4. Receive, evaluate and file daily reports, made by the practicing veterinarians of all horses under treatment by them;

5. The State veterinarian shall obtain [saliva] blood and urine from such horses as are designated by the judges [stewards] or the Racing Commission, and make such examination and tests as from time to time may be required by the judges [stewards and] or the Racing Commission: costs of such tests to be borne by the association.

13:71-9.3 [Track] Assistant State veterinarian

(a) [Each track association must employ a track veterinarian. The track veterinarian shall be employed by the racing association with the approval of the Commission.] The duties of the [track veterinarian] assistant State veterinarian shall be as follows:

1. Observe the horses in the paddock and while warming up for the racing program and investigate into and examine such horses as appear to him, or are reported to him, to be ill or infirm, and report thereon to the presiding judge.

2. Examine horses to be scratched from any race and certify that such horse is unfit to compete before it may be scratched. No horse, having been scratched from a race may enter a later race without the certificate of the [track veterinarian] assistant State veterinarian that such horse has become fit to race.

(b) All horses, including ponies, and equine mascots entering the grounds of any race track in New Jersey must be accompanied by a current, valid certificate of veterinary examination.

Proposed New Rules on the State Dental Expense Program

William J. Joseph, Director, Division of Pensions in the Department of the Treasury, pursuant to authority of chapter 70, Public Law 1955, proposes new rules, Foreword, N.J.A.C. 17:1-11.1 through 17:1-11.8, concerning the State Dental Expense Program.

Full text of the proposals follows:

CHAPTER 1
GENERAL ADMINISTRATION
FOREWORD

The State Dental Expense Program was initially made available to certain State employees pursuant to a contract of insurance which became effective on February 1, 1978. The administration is performed by the Division of Pensions. The dental expense program is available to most eligible State employees and dependents who are also eligible to participate in the State Health Benefits Program.

SUBCHAPTER 11. DENTAL EXPENSE PROGRAM

17:1-11.1 State Dental Expense Program; comparable to State Health Benefits Program

(a) Under terms of chapter 12, Public Law 1975, eligibility and effective dates of coverage, the advance premium payments, the opportunity for an annual enrollment period, continuation of coverage during a transfer or leave of absence without pay, and circumstances concerning the change in, or the termination of, coverage on a basis identical to that of the State Health Benefits Program as administered by the State Health Benefits Commission in accordance with the provisions of chapter 49, Public Law 1961, as such applies to active State employees, the administration of the State Dental Expense Program shall in all possible respects be identical to the State Health Benefits Program for such State employees. As the program is voluntary and contributions equal to one half of the premium charge for employees and dependents are prescribed, separate applications will be required for enrollment and for a change in, or a termination of, coverage in the dental expense program. Yet all other matters related to coverage in the State Health Benefits Program shall be considered for a comparable result in the State Dental Expense Program, except for:

1. Lack of rights of conversion;
2. Coverage continued during approved leave of absence without pay of not more than three months (six biweekly pay periods) provided the employee pays the entire premium in advance (employer and employee shares for employees and dependents);
3. Coverage is not continued in the event of death or retirement;
4. A different annual enrollment period; and
5. Employees enrolling at the inception of the plan and new employees enrolling before July 1, 1978, will not be able to voluntarily terminate the coverage until July 1, 1979, while all employees enrolled for coverage to begin in any subsequent year will be required to participate in the plan for a minimum 12-month period. (An employee may change the type of coverage if such results from a change in coverage status or dependency, such as marriage, divorce or separation, death of a spouse or dependent child, return from military leave, when there are no longer any minor children, spouse ceases to be an employee or upon the adoption or appointment of a guardian of dependent children, and the application for such change would have to be made in accordance with the regulations governing such change in status or dependency; similarly, the termination date of coverage of the employee and his qualified dependents shall depend upon the termination of his employment or by reason of his ceasing to be in the classes of employees eligible for coverage. His eligibility shall cease because of his

resignation, temporary layoff, separation through a reduction in force, or for any other reason. The effective date of termination shall be the last day of the coverage period for which premiums have been paid for the employee and his qualified dependents.)

17:1-11.2 Dental expense cards and booklets

(a) Identification cards will be reissued periodically to assure the validity of coverage. All other cards will be issued by the carrier during the contract year upon the initial enrollment or change of coverage. All cards and booklets will be distributed through the payroll and personnel officers. Upon termination of employment or coverage, payroll and personnel officers shall make every effort to obtain a return of the identification card.

(b) Applications for the replacement of cards will be accepted from those certifying a loss of their card or, in the case of divorce or separation, where coverage may be continued to a qualified dependent.

17:1-11.3 Enrollment charges

Each eligible employee who enrolls for coverage shall be required to authorize the taking of deductions in order to pay one half of the premium charges for himself and his qualified dependents.

17:1-11.4 Enrollment forms

At a time each employee first becomes eligible for coverage he may complete enrollment and authorization forms indicating his election to enroll for coverage on his own behalf and on behalf of his qualified dependents under one of the options to be provided in the master contract. In the absence of any authorization for payroll deductions coverage cannot be extended.

17:1-11.5 Annual enrollment period

Any employee who shall elect not to enroll for coverage for himself or for his qualified dependents at the time such employee or dependent first becomes eligible for coverage shall subsequently be permitted to enroll himself and his dependents only during the annual enrollment period, which is the month of May of each year, with coverage effective for the first coverage period in October, except that there will be no such annual enrollment period in 1978, the first year in which the program is established.

17:1-11.6 Waiting period

There shall be a two-month (four biweekly pay periods) waiting period before coverage can begin on behalf of employees who have applied for themselves and their qualified dependents. In addition to such two-month waiting period, there shall be an additional eight-month waiting period before participants will be eligible for orthodontic benefits. Credit for qualified State service immediately preceding their election to participate at the inception of the plan or during any annual enrollment period can be counted towards establishing the 10 months or more of continuous service required for orthodontics. Otherwise, all other benefits will be available and such participants will become eligible for orthodontics as soon as 10 months of continuous qualified State service has been accumulated.

17:1-11.7 Covered expenses

While the master contract contains the specific provisions for services to be covered and those which are excluded, with the necessary limitations pertaining to different types of services, essentially the State Dental Expense Program will provide for the reimbursement of 80 per cent of the usual, customary, and reasonable

charges for diagnostic, prophylaxis, restorative, palliative, endodontic, oral surgical, and orthodontic procedures performed by licensed dentists (or dental hygienists), allowing for a \$25.00 annual deductible per eligible member with a \$75.00 maximum family deductible (three deductibles). Among other limitations, orthodontics is delimited to the correction of bite problems, caused by the malformation of tooth or bone structure, for covered persons who have not reached their 19th birthdate with a maximum of \$800.00, including charges for diagnosis and active and retention treatment.

17:1-11.8 Premiums and coverage; 10-month employees

State employees hired as of September 1 under a 10-month contract shall have premiums deducted from the wages they receive in September to establish their coverage as of the beginning date of their employment. In the last month (June) of the employees' year of employment, premiums will be deducted to continue their coverage during the months of July and August provided their employment is to resume in September.

Proposed Amendment and New Rule For State Prescription Drug Program

William J. Joseph, Director of the Division of Pensions in the Department of the Treasury, pursuant to authority of N.J.S.A. 52:18A-95 et seq., proposes to amend a rule and adopt a new rule, N.J.A.C. 17:1-10.1 and 17:1-10.3, respectively, concerning the State prescription drug program.

Full text of the proposals follows (additions indicated in boldface thus; deletions indicated in brackets [thus]):

17:1-10.1 State prescription drug program; comparable to State health benefits program

In accordance with the guidelines issued by the State Health Benefits Commission under terms of chapter 12, Public Law 1975, and as those guidelines establish eligibility for coverage, the opportunity for an annual enrollment period, continuation of coverage during a leave of absence without pay, and circumstances concerning the change in, or the termination of, coverage on a basis identical to that of the State Health Benefits Program as administered by the commission in accordance with the provisions of chapter 49, Public Law 1961 as such apply to active State employees, the administration of the State prescription drug program shall in all possible

respects be identical to the State health benefits program for such State employees. Any enrollment, application for a change or a termination of coverage in the State health benefits program shall be considered for a comparable result in the State prescription drug program, except for the lack of rights of conversion and coverage continued during an approved leave of absence without pay for illness of not more than three months (six bi-weekly pay periods). The annual enrollment period, or the effective date [or the termination date] of coverage in the State health benefits program for State employees shall likewise pertain to the State prescription drug program.

17:1-10.3 Termination; effective date

Coverage shall terminate on the last day of the bi-weekly or monthly payroll period in which the employee rendered active full time employment.

Proposed New Rule on New Jobs Credit

18:7-5.11 New jobs credit; salaries deduction

A corporation which is eligible and has taken the new jobs credit on its Federal return pursuant to section 44B of the Internal Revenue Code shall be allowed a deduction of payroll costs which were lost for Federal purposes because of the new jobs credit. The corporation shall attach to its corporation business tax return a copy of the new job credit Federal form 5884.

Proposed Rules on Closing Agreements and Compromises

Sidney Glaser, Director of the Division of Taxation in the Department of the Treasury, pursuant to authority of N.J.S.A. 54:50-1 et seq., proposes to adopt new rules concerning closing agreements and compromises.

Full text of the proposed rules follows:

SUBCHAPTER 1. CLOSING AGREEMENTS

18:33-1.1 General provisions

(a) The Director of the Division of Taxation or any of his delegated representatives may enter into a written agreement with any person relating to the liability of such person (or of the person or estate for whom he acts) in respect to any State tax administered by the Director of the Division of Taxation for any taxable period ending prior or subsequent to the date of such agreement. A closing agreement may be entered into in any case in which there appears to be an advantage in having the case permanently and conclusively closed, or if good and sufficient reasons are shown by the taxpayer for desiring a closing agreement and it is determined by the director that the State of New Jersey will sustain no disadvantage through consummation of such an agreement.

(b) A closing agreement may be executed even though under the agreement the taxpayer is not liable for any tax for the period to which the agreement relates. There may be a series of closing agreements relating to the tax liability for a single period.

18:33-1.2 Taxable periods

(a) Closing agreements with respect to taxable periods ended prior to the date of the agreement may relate to the total tax liability of the taxpayer or to one or more separate items affecting the tax liability of the taxpayer, as, for example, the amount of gross receipts, deduction items, other income items, statutory deductions or exclusions, statutory additions to income, the year in which an item of income is to be included in gross receipts or income, the year in which an item is to be deducted, or the value of property on a specific date.

(b) Closing agreements with respect to taxable periods ending subsequent to the date of the agreement may relate to one or more separate items affecting the tax liability of the taxpayer.

18:33-1.3 Finality; determination of fraud

(a) A closing agreement which is approved within such time as may be stated in such agreement, or later agreed to, shall be final and conclusive, and, except upon a showing of fraud or malfeasance, or misrepresentation of a material fact:

1. The case shall not be reopened as to the matters agreed upon or the agreement modified by any officer, employee, or agent of the State of New Jersey; and

2. In any suit, action, or proceeding, such agreement, or any determination, assessment, collection, payment, abatement, refund, or credit made in accordance therewith, shall not be annulled, modified, set aside, or disregarded. However, a closing agreement with respect to a taxable period ending subsequent to the date of

the agreement is subject to any change in, or modification of, the law enacted subsequent to the date of the agreement and made applicable to such taxable period, and each closing agreement shall so recite.

(b) Execution and approval of closing agreement does not preclude an additional inspection of taxpayer's records to determine whether fraud, malfeasance, or misrepresentation of material fact exists as to execution of agreement.

18:33-1.4 Procedure with respect to closing agreements

(a) A request for a closing agreement which relates to a prior taxable period may be submitted at any time before a case with respect to the tax liability involved is filed in the Division of Tax Appeals. All closing agreements shall be executed on forms prescribed by the Director of the Division of Taxation.

(b) Any tax or deficiency in tax determined pursuant to a closing agreement shall be assessed and collected, and any overpayment determined pursuant thereto shall be credited or refunded, in accordance with the applicable provisions of law.

18:33-1.5 Applicability and coverage; policy

(a) The Director of the Division of Taxation or any Division of Taxation officer or employee authorized in writing by the director, can enter and approve written closing agreements with any person. Such agreement can relate to the liability of such person (or the taxpayer represented by him), for any State tax administered by the Division of Taxation for any taxable period. The agreement can cover either the total liability of taxpayer or one or more of separate items affecting the liability, if it embraces a tax period ending before the date of the agreement; or one or more separate items affecting tax liability. There can be a series of agreements covering a single tax period.

(b) A closing agreement may be entered into when it appears advantageous to have the case permanently closed; or where the taxpayer shows sufficient reason for desiring a closing agreement, and there would be no disadvantage to the State of New Jersey in entering into it. Closing agreements can be entered into, although under the agreement taxpayer is not liable for tax for the period covered.

18:33-1.6 Procedures

(a) A request to enter into a closing agreement is executed on prescribed forms and submitted, processed and approved under prescribed procedure. If the proposed agreement relates to a prior taxable period, it must be submitted before a case with respect to the tax liability is filed in the Division of Tax Appeals or in any Division of the Superior Court of New Jersey or in any Federal court.

(b) Where parties entered into a stipulation, on trial, or any matter regarding taxpayer's liability, and the action is dismissed with prejudice, taxpayer shall not be permitted to repudiate the agreement because a closing agreement was not executed by the Director of the Division of Taxation.

(c) Taxpayer's acceptance of a determination of additional tax under which an assessment of additional tax was made and paid, does not preclude the director from determining an additional deficiency for the year.

(d) The Director of the Division of Taxation is not estopped from issuing a deficiency assessment. Acceptance of a sum submitted with an amended return does not discharge a taxpayer from further liability; a deficiency assessment is not a closing agreement.

SUBCHAPTER 2. COMPROMISES

18:33-2.1 General provisions

(a) The Director of the Division of Taxation may compromise any civil or criminal liability arising under any State tax laws administered by the Director of the Division of Taxation prior to reference of a case involving such liability to the Attorney General for prosecution or defense. Any such liability may be compromised only upon one or both of the following two grounds:

1. Doubt as to liability (including the amount of liability); or
2. Doubt as to collectibility. No such liability will be compromised if the liability has been established by a valid judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction, and there is no doubt as to the ability of the State to collect the amounts owing with respect to such liability.

18:33-2.2 Scope of compromise agreement

A compromise agreement may relate to a civil or criminal liability for taxes, interest, ad valorem penalties, or specific penalties. However, a criminal liability may be compromised only if it involves a violation of a regulatory provision, or a related statute in Title 54 or Title 56 of the Revised Statutes, and then only if such violation was not deliberately committed with intent to defraud.

18:33-2.3 Effect of compromise agreement

(a) A compromise agreement relates to the entire liability of the taxpayer (including taxes, ad valorem penalties, and interest) with respect to which the offer in compromise is submitted and all questions of such liability are conclusively settled thereby. Specific penalties, however, shall be compromised separately and not in connection with taxes, interest, or ad valorem penalties. Neither the taxpayer nor the State shall, upon acceptance of an offer in compromise, be permitted to reopen the case except by reason of the following:

1. Falsification or concealment of assets by the taxpayer; or
2. Mutual mistake of a material fact sufficient to cause a contract to be reformed or set aside.

(b) However, acceptance of an offer in compromise of a civil liability does not remit a criminal liability, nor does acceptance of an offer in compromise of a criminal liability remit a civil liability.

18:33-2.4 Procedure with respect to offers in compromise

(a) Offers in compromise shall be submitted on forms prescribed by the Director of the Division of Taxation which may be obtained from the Division of Taxation and should generally be accompanied by a remittance representing the amount of the compromise offer or a deposit if the offer provides for future installment payments. Remittance shall be in the form of a certified, cashier's, or treasurer's check drawn on any bank or trust company incorporated under the laws of the United States or any state, territory, or possession of the United States, or by a United States postal, bank, express, or telegraph money order. If the final payment on an accepted offer is contingent upon the immediate or simultaneous release of a tax lien in whole or in part, such payment must be in cash, or in the manner as provided above.

(b) The offer shall be accompanied by the taxpayer's income and financial statement for the last two years (or the taxpayer's Federal income tax returns filed for the last two years), net worth statements for the nearest month preceding the offer and also the prior year's an-

nual net worth statement. There shall be attached an affidavit containing a declaration by the taxpayer that there have been no fraudulent transfers within the past two years preceding the date of the offer.

(c) Compromises regarding trust fund statutes such as the Sales and Use Tax, the Emergency Transportation Tax, and the Transportation Benefits Tax, shall have annexed to the offer of compromise personal affidavits and personal income and net worth statements of the officers responsible for the collection of any such taxes for the same period as required from the taxpayer.

18:33-2.5 Stay of collection

The submission of an offer in compromise shall not automatically operate to stay the collection of any tax liability. However, enforcement of collection may be deferred only if the interests of the State shall not be jeopardized thereby.

18:33-2.6 Acceptance

An offer in compromise shall be considered accepted only when the proponent thereof is so notified in writing. As a condition to accepting an offer in compromise, the taxpayer may be required to enter into any collateral agreement or to post any security which is deemed necessary for the protection of the interests of the State.

18:33-2.7 Withdrawal or rejection

An offer in compromise may be withdrawn by the proponent at any time prior to its acceptance. In the event an offer is rejected, the proponent shall be promptly notified in writing. Frivolous offers or offers submitted for the purpose of delaying the collection of tax liabilities shall be immediately rejected. If an offer in compromise is withdrawn or rejected, the amount tendered with the offer, including all installments paid, shall be refunded without interest, unless the taxpayer has stated or agreed that the amount tendered may be applied to the liability with respect to which the offer was submitted.

18:33-2.8 Record

(a) Except as otherwise provided in this section, if an offer in compromise is accepted, there shall be placed on file in the office of the director, the opinion of the Attorney General or his designee with respect to such compromise, with his reasons therefor, and including a statement of the following:

1. The amount of tax assessed;
2. The amount of interest, additional amount, addition to the tax, or assessable penalty, imposed by law on the person against whom the tax is assessed; and
3. The amount actually paid in accordance with the terms of the compromise. However, no such opinion shall be required with respect to the compromise of any civil case in which the unpaid amount of tax assessed (including any interest, additional amount, addition to the tax, or assessable penalty) is less than \$5,000.

18:33-2.9 Requirement with respect to statutes of limitations

No offer in compromise shall be accepted unless the taxpayer waives the running of the statutory period of limitations on both assessment or collection of the tax liability involved for the period during which the offer is pending, or the period during which any installment remains unpaid, and for one year thereafter. A criminal liability may be compromised only if it involves a regulatory provision of any applicable statute or law, and is not a violation deliberately committed with intent to defraud.

18:33-2.10 Allocation of tax, penalty and interest

Allocation to tax, penalty, and interest in case of payments made pursuant to offer accepted in compromise of taxes will be made as specified in the agreement. If no allocation is specified in the offer or agreement, or if no agreement has been accepted and the amount of accepted offer exceeds combined tax and penalties, payments received (whether installment or lump sum) will be applied to tax, penalty, and interest in that order, beginning with earliest year.

18:33-2.11 Appellate hearings board

(a) There shall be appointed by the director an appellate hearings board consisting of three members, one of which will be a chairman, with all three members having the same voting right.

(b) This board shall have the authority to execute compromise and closing agreements. The director shall have 60 days to overrule, modify or affirm the determinations of the appellate hearings board. After the expiration of 60 days from the determination of the appellate hearings board, their decision shall be final unless approved, modified or overruled by the director.

Proposed Amendments on Transfer Inheritance Tax

Sidney Glaser, Director of the Division of Taxation in the Department of the Treasury, pursuant to the authority of the State Tax Uniform Procedure Law, N.J. S.A. 54:50-1, et seq., proposes to adopt amendments concerning the transfer inheritance tax.

Full text of the proposal follows (additions indicated in boldface thus; deletions indicated in brackets [thus]):

18:26-2.5 Rates for Class "A" transferee
(a) In the case of a transfer to a Class "A" transferee where the decedent dies before July 1, 1978, the rates of tax are as follows:

18:26-6.2 Class "A" transfers

[The] (a) In instances where the decedent dies prior to July 1, 1978, the transfer of property having an aggregate clear market value of \$5,000 or less which is transferred to a father, mother, grandparent, husband, wife, child or children, adopted child or children, mutually acknowledged child, stepchild or issue of any child or adopted child of a decedent is exempt from the New Jersey transfer inheritance tax.

(b) In instances where the decedent dies on or after July 1, 1978, the transfer of property having an aggregate clear market value of \$15,000 or less which is transferred to a father, mother, grandparent, husband, wife, child or children, adopted child or children, mutually acknowledged child, stepchild or issue of any child or adopted child of a decedent is exempt from the New Jersey transfer inheritance tax.

18:26-8.22 Estates for life or years

(a) A life estate, annuity, or estate for a term of years is valued in accordance with the American experience table of mortality, with interest at the rate of five per cent per annum for estates of decedents dying before January 1, 1978. This applies as well in cases where a beneficiary survives the decedent by only a short period.

(b) With respect to estates of decedents dying on or after January 1, 1978, the United States Life Tables, after December 31, 1970, Single Life Male Six Per Cent and Single Life Female Six Per Cent, published by the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Public Health Service, with interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, shall be used.

(c) This regulation shall take effect July 1, 1978.

18:26-9.13

(a) Any payment of the New Jersey inheritance tax after the expiration of the corresponding day of the eighth month following the date of death shall bear interest at the rate of 10 per cent per annum on any unpaid portion of the tax, from the expiration of eight months until the date of actual payment, unless payment was tendered by the taxpayer within the eight month period and is evidenced by the postmark on the letter conveying the payment, or by other acceptable

proof, but was not credited through no fault of the taxpayer, in which case no interest shall be charged, or unless by reason of any claims made upon the estate, necessary court litigation, or other unavoidable cause of delay, the decedent's estate or a part thereof, cannot be settled before the expiration of eight months from the date of death in which event, interest at the rate of only six per cent per annum is to be charged from the expiration of eight months until the cause of delay is removed.

Emergency Amendments on Cigarette Distributors' Licenses

Full text of the adoption follows (additions indicated in boldface thus; deletions indicated in brackets [thus]):

18:5-6.5(d) All applications for cigarette distributors' licenses must have attached thereto fingerprints of the owner, if under individual ownership; partnership fingerprints of all partners, if a partnership application; and if a corporation, fingerprints of all corporate officers, directors or stockholders (include entity) with a 20 per cent or more interest. No license will be issued unless fingerprints as required are attached. All fingerprints submitted will be processed through the New Jersey State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigations.

(e) The director shall have the authority to deny the issuance of a distributor's license if the applicant (including entities and all corporate officers, directors or stockholders with a 20 per cent or more interest) has been convicted of a crime.

18:5-6.19 Suspension or revocation of license

(a) The director may suspend or revoke the license, or all licenses issued to any person under the act who:

1. Violates any of the provisions of the act; or
2. Violates any of these regulations; or
3. Ceases to act in the capacity for which the license was issued; or
4. For other good and sufficient causes[.]; or

5. If it is found that:

i. Any applicant has been convicted of a crime (including entities and all corporate officers, directors or stockholders with a 20 per cent or more interest);

ii. Any applicant has made any misrepresentation on the license application.

Emergency Rule on Information Returns To be Supplied for 1977 and Subsequent Returns

On December 6, 1977, Sidney Glaser, Director of the Division of Taxation in the Department of the Treasury, pursuant to authority of N.J.S.A. 54A:8-6(c) and in accordance with applicable provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, adopted a new, emergency rule concerning information returns to be supplied to the Division of Taxation by payers of dividends and interest, and the like, regarding 1977 and subsequent tax returns.

Full text of the adopted rule follows:

18:35-1.8 Information furnished at source; 1977 and subsequent returns

(a) Under N.J.S.A. 54A:1-1, et seq., information returns which shall include the amounts paid to or credited to the accounts of all recipients for any calendar year beginning with January 1, 1977, are required to be provided to the Director, Division of Taxation, by:

1. Payers of interest and dividends, including banks, savings and loan associations, building and loan associations and savings banks; and

2. All payers including those who are required to file Federal Internal Revenue Service form 1099 or any of the form 1099 designations, which shall include lessees or mortgagors of real or personal property, fiduciaries, employers and all officers and employees of this State, or of any municipal corporation or political subdivision of this State, having the control, receipt, custody, disposal or payment of interest, rents, salaries, wages, premiums, annuities, compensations, remunerations, emoluments or other fixed or determinable gains, profits or income, except interest coupons payable to bearer.

(b) Such information return must be filed on or before February 15 following the close of each calendar year beginning with February 15, 1978, with the Division of Taxation, P.O. Box 1848, Trenton, New Jersey 08646, where the amount paid or credited is \$1,000 or more.

(c) This requirement may be satisfied by providing the director with any of the following, with preference in the order listed below:

1. A copy of the magnetic tape provided to the Internal Revenue Service (with the same specifications) in lieu of form 1099's for the full calendar year, edited to delete all listings of recipients of less than \$1,000; or

2. A copy of the tape provided to the Internal Revenue Service (as above) without deleting recipients of less than \$1,000; or

3. Copies of all form 1099's submitted to the Internal Revenue Service for the full calendar year, on amounts of \$1,000 or more (either an additional carbon or photocopy of the form 1099); or

4. Copies of all form 1099's submitted to the Internal Revenue Service for the full calendar year.

Amended Rules on State of New Jersey Cash Management Fund

On December 15, 1977, Clifford A. Goldman, State Treasurer, on behalf of the State Investment Council and pursuant to authority of N.J.S.A. 52:18A-89 and in accordance with applicable provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, adopted amendments to N.J.A.C. 17:16-31.1 et seq. by deleting the current text of that subchapter and adopting new text therein concerning the New Jersey Cash Management Fund.

Full text of the adopted rules follows:

SUBCHAPTER 31. STATE OF NEW JERSEY CASH MANAGEMENT FUND

17:16-31.1 Definition

Pursuant to chapter 270, P.L. 1970, as amended and supplemented by chapter 281, P.L. 1977, there is hereby created in the Division of Investment, Department of the Treasury, a common trust fund, to be known as the State of New Jersey Cash Management Fund, in which may be deposited the surplus moneys of the State, its counties, municipalities and school districts and the agencies or authorities created by any of these entities.

17:16-31.2 Participation in the State of New Jersey Cash Management Fund

Participation in the State of New Jersey Cash Management Fund by State funds, representing net capital contributions to the fund together with any income thereon, shall be evidenced by proper entries setting forth owner-

ship units in the records of the Bureau of Accounting, Division of Budget and Accounting, Department of the Treasury. Aggregate participation of other entities shall also be evidenced by proper entries in the records of the Bureau of Accounting, Division of Budget and Accounting, and their individual participations shall be evidenced by proper entries in the records of the Division of Investment and of the custodian bank. Contributions to the common fund by the participating funds will be made in cash.

17:16-31.3 Distribution of income

All income, as calculated under section 9 of this subchapter of the State of New Jersey Cash Management Fund shall be invested in units of participation in accordance with section 11 of this subchapter and such units may be withdrawn in accordance with section 12 of this subchapter.

17:16-31.4 Participating funds

The participation of any fund is subject to the approval of the State Treasurer.

17:16-31.5 Permissible investments

The director may invest the assets of State of New Jersey Cash Management Fund in fixed-income and debt securities which are legal investments for savings banks, or which are permitted under the provisions of N.J.S.A. 52:18A-89, subject to any applicable provisions of the regulations of the State Investment Council, and which mature within one year.

17:16-31.6 Units of participation

Each unit of participation shall represent an equal beneficial interest in the fund and no unit shall have priority or preference over any other. Each unit of participation shall be valued at the net asset value per unit as is set forth in the following section.

17:16-31.7 Valuation

Upon each valuation date, as defined below, there shall be a valuation for every investment in the common fund in the method provided for in these regulations. The valuation shall be for the calculation of net income available for distribution as determined in section 9 of this subchapter. These calculations are designed so that the net asset value per unit of participation shall remain at \$1.00, except only in an instance where net income available for distribution might be negative, in which case the net asset value per unit would be reduced by each participant's proportionate share of such negative amount.

17:16-31.8 Date of valuation

The valuation shall be determined at the opening of business on each business day, and shall be based on market prices as of the close of the most recent business day and accruals and amortization as of the close of the previous day as set forth in section 9 of this subchapter.

17:16-31.9 Calculation of daily income per participating unit

(a) The income due to the participants in the State of New Jersey Cash Management Fund shall be calculated daily. For the purpose of this calculation, net income available for distribution shall equal the sum of daily interest income, daily discount income, realized gain on sales, unrealized market gain and amortized discount, from which sum shall be deducted the sum of realized loss on sales, unrealized market loss, amortized premium and total daily expenses. Such net income available for distribution shall then be divided by the number of outstanding participating units to determine the daily income per participating unit.

(b) In the case of participating funds of counties, municipalities, school districts and agencies or authorities created by either such entities or the State (the "other than State funds"), daily income per participating unit shall be further reduced by both a charge to establish a reserve and a charge for administrative expenses.

(c) The charge to establish a reserve shall be in the sum equal to 1/10 of one per cent per annum of the aggregate value of the units owned by the other than State funds, and the daily income per participating unit owned by such other than State funds shall reflect their pro rata share of such sum. Such charge shall be made only until such time as the value of the fund, (the "reserve fund") aggregates \$1,000,000, at which time the charge will be discontinued. The reserve fund shall be a participating fund in the State of New Jersey Cash Management Fund and shall be credited with and will retain daily income per participating unit in the manner of participating State funds. In the event of a loss occasioned by the bankruptcy of an issuer of a security held by the State of New Jersey Cash Management Fund, such loss will be shared pro rata by all participants in the fund, but the assets of the reserve fund will be applied pro rata in a manner approved by the State Investment Council to that portion of the loss accruing to the "other than State funds". In no event will the application of the assets of the reserve fund exceed the loss accruing to the other than State funds, and no State funds will share in the disposition of the assets of the reserve fund. The charge shall be reinstated at such time as the reserve fund is drawn down below \$1,000,000.

(d) The charge for administrative expenses shall be in the sum equal up to 1/10 of one per cent per annum of the aggregate value of the units owned by the other than State funds, and the daily income per participating unit owned by such other than State funds shall reflect their pro rata share of such sum. The charge for administrative expenses shall be paid into a fund whose assets shall be at the disposal of the Treasurer.

(e) The method of calculation of each of the above terms will be in accordance with an agreement between the Treasurer of the State of New Jersey and the custodian bank.

17:16-31.10 Guidelines for valuation of securities

(a) The Director of the Division of Investment shall use a recognized pricing service approved prior to use by the State Investment Council.

(b) Those securities priced on a yield basis shall be converted to a dollar price.

(c) An investment purchased and awaiting payment against delivery shall be included for valuation purposes as a security and the cost thereof recorded as an accounts payable.

(d) An investment sold but not delivered pending receipt of proceeds shall be valued at the net sales price.

(e) For the purposes of valuation of an investment, with the exception of investments sold but not delivered, it shall not be necessary to deduct from the value ascertained by this regulation, brokers' commission or other expenses which would be incurred on a sale thereof.

17:16-31.11 Reinvestment of daily income per participating unit

The aggregate of daily income per participating unit on total units owned by each participant will be reinvested automatically in additional units at a price of \$1.00 per unit and such new units will be credited to the respective accounts of all of the participants in proportion to their holdings of participating units immediately prior

to the determination of net income available for distribution. In the reinvestment of aggregate daily income as described above, fractional units may be issued representing fractions of a dollar, but no units will be issued representing fractions of one cent, nor will cash dividends be transmitted. Participating funds may obtain cash by redemption of units in accordance with section 12 of this subchapter.

17:16-31.12 Admission and withdrawal of participating units

(a) Admission to or withdrawal from the common fund shall be permitted on any business day. Admissions prior to noon will receive credit for net income available for distribution for such day if such admissions remain in the common fund through the close of such day. Withdrawals from the fund will receive credit for net income available for distribution only as of the close of the day next preceding such withdrawal.

(b) All admissions and withdrawals will be made in cash.

17:16-31.13 Amendments

This regulation may be amended from time to time by regulation of the State Investment Council. Any amendment adopted by such council shall be binding upon all participating funds, trusts and beneficiaries thereof. An amendment shall become effective, unless otherwise provided for therein, on the date it becomes effective under the Administrative Procedure Act.

17:16-31.14 Liquidation

The Director, Division of Investment, subject to the approval of the State Investment Council and the State Treasurer, may, upon two months' notice, liquidate the aforementioned common fund, including the reserve fund. In the event of such liquidation, the owners of the units shall share proportionately, according to units owned, in each investment held by the common fund, and the other than State funds, shall share proportionately in the reserve fund. When such proportionate distribution is impracticable in the judgment of the director, he may instead distribute on liquidation, cash or temporary investments held by the common fund. No liquidation will be effected without the approval by the State Investment Council of a plan of distribution of the assets of the common fund including the assets of the reserve fund.

MORTGAGE FINANCE AGENCY

Amended Rules of the Agency

On November 18, 1977, the Mortgage Finance Agency, pursuant to authority of N.J.S.A. 17:1B-4 et seq. and in accordance with applicable provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, adopted emergency amendments to a portion of its rules.

Full text of the amended rules follows:

19:1-1.3 Definitions

All words and terms which are defined in the New Jersey Mortgage Finance Agency law are used in these rules and regulations as defined in the act. The following words or terms as used in these rules and regulations, shall have the following meanings unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

"Collateral" shall mean with respect to any loan those securities, mortgages or other instruments defined as eligible pursuant to the terms of the assignment of collateral and trust agreement relating to such loan.

"Collateral requirement" shall mean, as of any date of calculation and with respect to any loan, the amount at which collateral securing such loan is required to be maintained pursuant to the terms of the assignment of collateral and trust agreement relating to such loan.

"Home improvement loan" shall mean an eligible loan as defined in the act made for the rehabilitation or improvement of a residence.

"Home improvement loan program commitment" shall mean the aggregate unpaid principal amount of home improvement loans which a mortgage seller offers to deliver and sell to the agency and the agency agrees to purchase, such sale and purchase to be made under a note purchase agreement.

"Loan" or "loans" shall mean any loan or loans made by the agency to a mortgage lender or mortgage lenders pursuant to section 6 of the act.

"Mortgage loan" shall mean any residential mortgage loan which is an eligible loan as defined in the act.

"Mortgage purchase agreement" shall mean an agreement, entered into between a mortgage seller and the agency, under which the mortgage seller agrees to deliver and sell to the agency and the agency agrees to purchase mortgage loans.

"Mortgage servicing agreement" shall mean an agreement, entered into between a mortgage seller or other person acceptable to the agency, under which the mortgage seller or other person agrees to service the mortgage loans purchased by the agency from such mortgage seller under a mortgage purchase agreement.

"Multi-family dwelling" shall mean real estate upon which there is located a structure designed primarily for residential use and consisting of dwelling units for more than one family, but not more than four families, provided that at least one such dwelling unit shall be occupied by the owner or owners thereof, or a member of their immediate family, as a primary residence.

"Neighborhood loan program commitment" shall mean the aggregate unpaid principal amount of mortgage loans which a mortgage seller offers to deliver and sell to the agency and the agency agrees to purchase, such sale and purchase to be made under a mortgage purchase agreement.

"Note purchase agreement" shall mean an agreement, entered into between a mortgage seller and the agency, under which the mortgage seller agrees to deliver and sell to the agency and the agency agrees to purchase home improvement loans.

"Residential use" shall mean use as a primary dwelling and not as a vacation or "second" home. Areas designed or used for non-residential purposes shall not exceed those specified by the Federal Housing Administration minimum property standards for one and two living units as in effect from time to time.

"Single-family dwelling" shall mean real estate upon which there is located a structure designed primarily for

residential use for one family which is occupied by the owner thereof or a member of the immediate family of such owner. A condominium unit shall be considered a single-family dwelling.

19:1-1.4 Examination of books and records

The agency may cause to be made an examination of the books and records of each mortgage lender which has an outstanding loan from the agency, including the collateral therefor and of each mortgage seller which has a mortgage purchase agreement, a mortgage servicing agreement or a note purchase agreement with the agency, so as to determine compliance with the terms of such loan or agreements and the act. The agency may require each mortgage lender or mortgage seller to pay the costs of any such examination.

19:1-1.5 Consent to jurisdiction of Superior Court

The terms of each loan and each mortgage purchase agreement, each mortgage servicing agreement and each note purchase agreement shall require that the mortgage lender and its agent or the mortgage seller consent to the jurisdiction of the Superior Court of the State over any proceeding to enforce compliance with the terms of the act, these rules and regulations and any document relating to any loan, or such agreements.

SUBCHAPTER 2. LOAN TO LENDERS PROGRAM

19:1-2.1 Requests for loans

(a) The agency shall provide a loan application to each mortgage lender located within any particular area of the State for which the agency has determined that there is an inadequate supply of new residential loans. Alternatively, the agency may notify each such mortgage lender of a proposed loan program and provide a loan application only to those mortgage lenders requesting the same. Such application shall be sent to mortgage lenders at least 14 days in advance of the date all such applications must be submitted to the agency. The loan application shall be in the form prescribed by the agency and shall contain, among other things:

1. Provision for the mortgage lender to state the maximum amount of loan requested;
2. The date by which the loan application must be submitted so as to be considered for an allocation of loan funds and the date upon which loans will be awarded by the agency;
3. Provision for the mortgage lender to furnish information regarding the mortgage lender's deposit and mortgage activity during a time period prescribed by the agency.
4. The terms and conditions of the loan including, among others, the maximum interest rate, the term, the percentage of the principal to be paid each year or the manner of determining principal payments, and the prepayment terms and the requirements or conditions of the reinvestment of the loan proceeds including:
 - i. The type of new residential loan;
 - ii. Location of residence to be financed;
 - iii. The number of family units;
 - iv. Maximum sales price or loan amounts;
 - v. Loan to value ratios;
 - vi. Minimum or maximum mortgage term;
 - vii. Minimum or maximum mortgage term; and
 - viii. Maximum income levels for owners or occupants;
5. The schedule of any fees and charges of the agency with respect to loans; and
6. An undertaking by the mortgage lender to take any loan granted by the agency up to the amounts specified

in the application and providing for liquidated damages in the event that the mortgage lender does not take such loan.

SUBCHAPTER 4. HOME IMPROVEMENT LOAN PROGRAM

19:1-4.1 Commitment applications

(a) The agency shall make available to all mortgage sellers who so request a form of home improvement loan program commitment application for each proposed program to purchase home improvement loans at least 14 days in advance of the date all such applications must be submitted to the agency. The home improvement loan program commitment application shall be in the form prescribed by the agency and shall contain, among other things:

1. Provision for the mortgage seller to state the maximum principal amount of home improvement loans which the mortgage seller offers to sell to the agency;
2. The date by which the home improvement loan program commitment application must be submitted to the agency in order to be considered for an allocation of funds and the date by which home improvement loan program commitments will be accepted by the agency;
3. A form of the proposed note purchase agreement to be executed by the mortgage seller;
4. Provision for the mortgage seller to furnish information regarding its residential loan origination activities during a time period to be prescribed by the agency;
5. Provision for liquidated damages to be paid by the mortgage seller in the event that it fails to execute a note purchase agreement for the home improvement loan program commitment accepted by the agency; and
6. Provision for payment by the mortgage seller of a commitment fee in an amount prescribed by the agency as consideration for the agency's acceptance of the home improvement loan program commitment application and agreement to purchase home improvement loans from the mortgage seller.

19:1-4.2 Allocation of commitments

In allocating funds available to meet the home improvement loan program commitments requested by mortgage sellers, the agency shall consider, among other things, the amounts of the home improvement loan program commitments requested by the various mortgage sellers, the adequacy of supply of home improvement loans in the areas in which the mortgage sellers propose to originate home improvement loans, the financial strength and stability of the mortgage sellers, the residential loan originating activity reported in the home improvement loan program commitment application and the ability of the mortgage sellers to originate home improvement loans under the terms and conditions of the note purchase agreement.

19:1-4.3 Execution of note purchase agreement

Upon notice of acceptance by the agency to a mortgage seller of all or a portion of the home improvement loan program commitment requested by it, the agency shall specify the date by which the agency shall execute the note purchase agreement executed by the mortgage seller.

19:1-4.4 Unsecured home improvement loans

Home improvement loans which are not secured by a mortgage on the property being improved or rehabilitated shall be limited to loans for which the aggregate principal amount advanced to the borrower or borrowers under such loan and any other home improvement loan made to such borrower or borrowers does not exceed \$1,500 and the payment of the principal and interest thereon is fully in-

sured under the Federal Housing Administration Title I property improvement loan program.

19:1-4.5 Eligibility requirements

The agency may designate income and other limitations with respect to persons eligible to receive home improvement loans and with respect to the use of proceeds of home improvement loans by such persons, which limitations may vary according to geographical area, in order that the purchase of home improvement loans by the agency shall best effectuate the general purposes of the act and the objectives of expansion of the supply of funds in the State available for home improvement loans, provision of additional housing needed to remedy the shortage of adequate housing in the State and elimination of substandard dwellings. The agency may set limitations on the principal amounts of a home improvement loan to effectuate the aforesaid purposes of the act.

19:1-4.6 Regulation of points charged by mortgage sellers

The agency may regulate, limit, restrict or prohibit the charge or collection of any commitment fee, premium, bonus, points or other fees in connection with the origination of home improvement loans by mortgage sellers to be purchased by the agency.

19:1-4.7 Refinancing pre-existing debt

The agency shall not acquire any home improvement loans made for the purpose of refinancing pre-existing debt.

19:1-4.8 Purchase of agency bonds

No mortgage seller (including any related persons thereof, as defined in section 103(b)(6)(C) of the Internal Revenue Code) shall, pursuant to any arrangement, formal or informal, purchase the bonds of the agency in an amount related to the amount of the home improvement loans to be purchased from such mortgage seller (or related person, as aforesaid) by the agency.

An order adopting these amendments was filed and became effective on November 22, 1977, as R.1977 d.442 (Exempt, Emergency Rule).

Rules on Uniform Procedure for Administration And Enforcement of Uniform Construction Code

S.A. 13:17-1 et seq. and in accordance with applicable provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, adopted new rules, to be cited as N.J.A.C. 19:6-3.1 et seq., concerning the uniform procedure for the administration and enforcement of the Uniform Construction Code, as proposed in the Notice published August 4, 1977, at 9 N.J.R. 393(a).

An order adopting these rules was filed on December 2, 1977, as R.1977 d.457 to become effective on December 12, 1977.

NEW LAW ON CORPORATE NAMES

Effective Jan. 1, 1978, a new law went into effect designed to insure that newly-formed corporations indicate as part of their name that they are a corporation, it was announced by Donald Lan, Secretary of State.

On all such names thereafter filed with the Department of State, the act requires that every domestic corporation shall contain as part of its corporate name one of the following: "a New Jersey corporation", or "incorporated", inc." or "corp."

However, Chapter 59, P.L. 1977 does not require present corporations to change their corporate name.

NEW LAWS ON NAMING JUVENILES AND PROTECTING NEWS SOURCES

Governor Brendan Byrne recently signed into law at a public ceremony in his office three bills considered of more than usual importance.

A-2045, sponsored by the late Assemblyman Patrick Scanlon, (D.-Essex), amends the statute regarding the availability of juvenile records of those 14 years or older.

The bill makes juvenile records available to any law enforcement agency when the records are necessary in connection with the investigation of particular acts of delinquency or crime, or when the records are necessary to assist in the protection, apprehension or location of a particular juvenile.

The bill permits information regarding the identity of the juvenile, the offense charged, the judgment and the sentence to be given to the victim or to the victim's immediate family.

It also allows the information to be given to the general public under certain conditions, specifically: 1. The juvenile must be 14 years of age or older; 2. The juvenile is judged to be delinquent; and 3. The offense involved violence to a person, or, if the offense committed by an adult would constitute a high misdemeanor, murder, manslaughter, destruction or damage to property to an extent of \$500 or more, or the manufacture or distribution of a narcotic drug.

Newsman's Rights

S-322, sponsored by Senators Alexander Menza, (D.-Union), and John Russo, (D.-Ocean), amends the definition of "newspaperman's privilege" in the Evidence Act of 1960 to include any news media.

The new law extends the privilege to radio and television journalists on the condition that the stations maintain a film, tape or transcript of any actual broadcast or telecast for at least one year.

The bill makes it clear that the privilege is extended to free-lance journalists as well as regularly employed journalists, and that it applies to non-disseminated information obtained in the course of professional activities as well as published information.

The bill also states that a reporter's sources are protected whenever he obtains information for the purpose of dissemination, regardless of the setting, unless the

reporter intentionally conceals from the source the fact that he is a reporter or the reporter witnesses or participates in an act of physical violence or property damage.

Public Advocate Made Permanent

Another measure, S-1722, sponsored by Senator Joseph P. Merlino, (D-Mercer), amends the act establishing the Department of Public Advocate. The bill allows the Office of Inmate Advocacy and the Division of Public Interest Advocacy to continue on a permanent basis. Prior to this legislation, the offices would have terminated December 1, 1978.

TWO NEW TOP WOMEN APPOINTEES

Governor Brendan Byrne recently announced two appointments of women to top posts in State departments. Alice Riley of Trenton is assistant Deputy Commissioner in the Department of Banking, and Marie Blackwell of East Brunswick is the new Director of the Division of Disability Determinations in the Department of Labor and Industry.

Byrne, whose October 12 Executive Order on Affirmative Action strengthened his earlier Affirmative Action order, said, "Both appointees exemplify the kind of excellence, sensitivity and administrative skills we have recognized among the women we have appointed".

Mrs. Blackwell, the first black female division director in Labor and Industry, began her state service 23 years ago as a claims clerk in the department. She was a sociology major at Hunter College, New York City and has two daughters and a grandson.

Mrs. Riley, formerly a program coordinator in the Department of Human Services, will administer the consumer-related functions of the Division of Consumer Complaints, Legal and Economic Research. A graduate of Glassboro State College, Mrs. Riley recently received a master's degree in public administration. She and her husband are parents of two children and grandparents of five.

FIRST MEMBERS NAMED TO NEW ADVISORY COUNCIL ON ENERGY

The first seven business members of a special Energy Advisory Council were sworn into office in October at a ceremony in Governor Brendan Byrne's office.

"You represent a good many points of view", the Governor said. "Your imagination and determination will help New Jersey have the best energy policies to respond to our needs and consider alternative solutions to serious energy problems".

The Advisory Council on Energy Planning and Coordination was set up under the new law establishing a State Energy Department.

According to Charles Richman, director of the Energy Department's Division of Planning and Research, the new law calls for a 15-member Council representing home heating oil, natural gas and environmental interests.

The Senate still has to confirm the other eight members, which Richman said "will certainly give us direct access to a group intimately involved in energy planning in the State. We fully intend to utilize these people".

The Council will work with Energy Commissioner Joel Jacobson and with Richman in the formulation of energy programs and policies. Jacobson, demonstrating the value he places in the Commission, said he will assign a full-time Department staff member to the Council.

First members of the new Council sworn in Oct. 18 were: Jerry M. Ferrera, executive director of New Jersey Gasoline Retailers, Inc.; James F. Kernan, national director of engineering for A&P; Edward Lloyd, staff attorney of the New Jersey Public Interest Group; William Ryan, president of South Jersey Gas Co.; Robert I. Smith, chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Public Service Electric and Gas Co.; William Steigleemann, vice president of research and development for Solar Energy Systems of Cherry Hill, and John Wade, president of Farlie and Wilson Co., Allenhurst.

FINAL CASINO CONTROL MEMBER PUTS CITIZENS' INTERESTS FIRST

The fifth and final member of the State's Casino Control Commission who was recently sworn in has promised to be sensitive to the problems minority Atlantic City residents may encounter in the wake of casino development.

Alice B. Corsey, 44, of Westville Grove in Gloucester County, began a two-year, \$18,000-a-year term with a ceremony in Gov. Brendan Byrne's State House office.

"The reason New Jersey voters voted for casino gambling was to broaden the economic base of the State as a whole and Atlantic City in particular", Mrs. Corsey said. "The people of Atlantic City should benefit from, not be hurt by, casino revenues".

Mrs. Corsey, a black woman, has already toured Atlantic City to assess the needs of poor and minority residents, and said she would rely on their input in making decisions as a Commissioner.

Byrne, who had said he wanted a woman or minority group member on the Commission, commended Mrs. Corsey for monitoring the first two Commission meetings and for her visit to Atlantic City.

"Casino gambling was supported by the people of New Jersey to revitalize Atlantic City", Byrne said. "It is significant that one of Mrs. Corsey's initial actions was to investigate the needs of the people".

The new Commissioner said she was "very pleased" that Ann Klein, State Commissioner of Human Services, urged the Commission to focus on the housing and day care shortages that have already arisen as a result of hotel expansion and construction in the city.

Mrs. Corsey, vice president of the Deptford Board of Education and a member of the board of trustees of Gloucester County College, said her appointment to the Commission requires that she resign those positions.

Her swearing in completes the Commission, which includes former Essex County Prosecutor Joseph P. Lordi, who serves as chairman; Albert Merck of Mendham; former Haddonfield Mayor Kenneth MacDonald and Monmouth County lawyer Prospero DeBona.

TURNPIKE STARTS FIRE INSPECTION PROGRAM FOR ALL RESTAURANTS

The New Jersey Turnpike Authority has begun a \$15,000 fire safety inspection program in all buildings and restaurants on the road in an attempt to avert potential tragedies.

The authority voted recently to hire outside consultants after their director of insurance, Charles A. Dupuis Jr., told the Commissioners the inspections would accomplish three things.

"First, a complete inspection will ensure the safety of our patrons and employees, which is our primary concern", Dupuis said. "To a lesser extent, the inspection will reduce

our fire and liability insurance costs, plus making our insurance program more attractive to the underwriters”.

Dupuis said the request for the study was brought on by a number of non-Turnpike fires earlier this year.

“The total destruction of a Garden State Parkway restaurant in Forked River in May and the tragic restaurant fires in Kentucky and New York City, which resulted in the loss of many lives, might have been averted through the use of a professional inspection service”, he said.

MOPED DRIVERS MUST HAVE SPECIAL LICENSES THIS MONTH

Drivers of motorized bicycles called mopeds will be required to obtain special licenses after Jan. 19 under a new law.

The new restrictions signed last year reform several aspects of the 1976 measure approved by the Legislature allowing the wide-spread use of mopeds by those over 15 years of age without the need for a license.

After a series of deaths and injuries resulting from moped accidents, legislators moved to tighten controls in the original bill.

The special license, which will cost \$5, will be required for those over 15 years of age—still the minimum age for moped operators—and others not holding a regular driver's license.

Applicants will be required to pass a test on rules of the road, an eye exam, and a brief road demonstration.

The license requirement will go into effect within 90 days, along with other reforms, including compulsory liability insurance and banishment of mopeds from main highways.

The reform measure, sponsored by Assemblyman Michael Esposito (D-Hudson), prohibits mopeds on public highways divided by a grass or concrete median or on highways with posted speed limits over 50 miles per hour.

The measure also gives the State Motor Vehicle Director the power to ban mopeds from certain roads with speed limits between 40 and 50 miles per hour where they are deemed unsafe.

DeNICHOLAS NOW SERVICES DIRECTOR IN CIVIL SERVICE DEPARTMENT

Robert P. DeNicholas, a 15-year veteran in State service, has been appointed Director of Administrative Services in the Department of Civil Service.

His new duties include management of the Department's data processing, accounting, personnel, system analysis and public information/publications functions. He reports to Ralph P. Shaw, chief examiner and secretary, for whom he had been an executive assistant since March, 1976.

In announcing the promotion, S. Howard Woodson, president of the State Civil Service Commission, said that DeNicholas' "past outstanding service to New Jersey government more than qualifies him for the post".

DeNicholas, 40, joined Civil Service in 1971 as a supervising principal personnel technician after nine years with Labor and Industry. His achievements include co-authoring "A Model Personnel System for New Jersey County and Municipal Governments", which was published and distributed in all 50 states, Canada, Nova Scotia and Australia.

\$667,000 COMES FROM WASHINGTON FOR COUNTY SENIOR CITIZEN CENTERS

Governor Brendan Byrne recently announced that New Jersey has received a \$666,976 grant from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare for multipurpose senior centers throughout the State.

The funds, provided under Title V of the Older Americans Act, will go to public and private non-profit agencies to acquire, alter or renovate facilities serving as senior centers.

Applicants must be operating, or capable of operating, a multipurpose senior center at least five days a week, six hours daily in order to qualify, Governor Byrne said.

The funds, to be administered by the State Division on Aging in the Department of Community Affairs, have been allocated among each of the 21 counties, with a minimum of \$10,000 per county, according to Community Affairs Commissioner Patricia Q. Sheehan.

“Successful applicants may receive up to 75 per cent of their cost”, Sheehan said. Eligible expenses are purchase of a facility, initial equipment, and material, services and labor for renovation. Sheehan stressed that Title V funds may not be used for administrative, staff, maintenance or program expenses.

James J. Pennestri, director of the State Division on Aging, said he expects his staff to review more than 100 applications and to fund about 50 senior centers. Guidelines and preliminary application forms are available from county offices on aging.

DEADLINE FOR ADVERTISING COMMENTS EXTENDED TO FEBRUARY 6

The deadline for commenting on the proposed State regulations governing advertising and marketing practices has been extended to February 6, it was announced by Adam K. Levin, Director of the Division of Consumer Affairs in the Department of Law and Public Safety.

The division proposed the new rules last September with a cutoff date for receiving oral and written comments of December 2. The period has been extended however, because of the widespread interest generated by the regulations, Levin said.

The rules were printed in full in the October 6 Register.

“We are delighted there has been such interest in the proposed regulations and we want to make sure all interested parties have ample opportunity to contribute to the rule-making process,” he added. “We have already received useful comments from major retailers, retail associations and media representatives.”

The proposed regulations would repeal in their entirety the present rules governing advertising and marketing practices in New Jersey. The revised regulations require greater specificity in advertising.

Under the proposed regulations “sale” advertisements must disclose the reference price; that is, the price used as the basis for establishing the reduced “sale” price. The new regulations also would delineate when rainchecks must be issued if the advertised merchandise is not available.

“We are well aware of the potential impact of these regulations on consumer and on business. We want to work closely with all affected parties to produce workable rules that are all-inclusive and not oppressive to business,” Levin said.

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LODI TO GET DOWNTOWN PARK

Governor Brendan Byrne recently announced approval of a \$446,250 Green Acres grant to the Borough of Lodi, Bergen County, for the acquisition of Lodi Memorial Park located along the Saddle River.

"This grant is of special significance because it is part of a total effort to revitalize the park area. Located adjacent to a downtown urban renewal project, the park will surround a new municipal building and civic center to be built by a Federal public works grant", Byrne said.

The combination of projects in the park vicinity totals about \$16 million in Federal and State grants. Lodi Borough will match the 50 per cent Green Acres grant to cover the total \$892,500 cost for acquisition of 10.2 acres of riverbank land which is now the site of dilapidated factory buildings.
