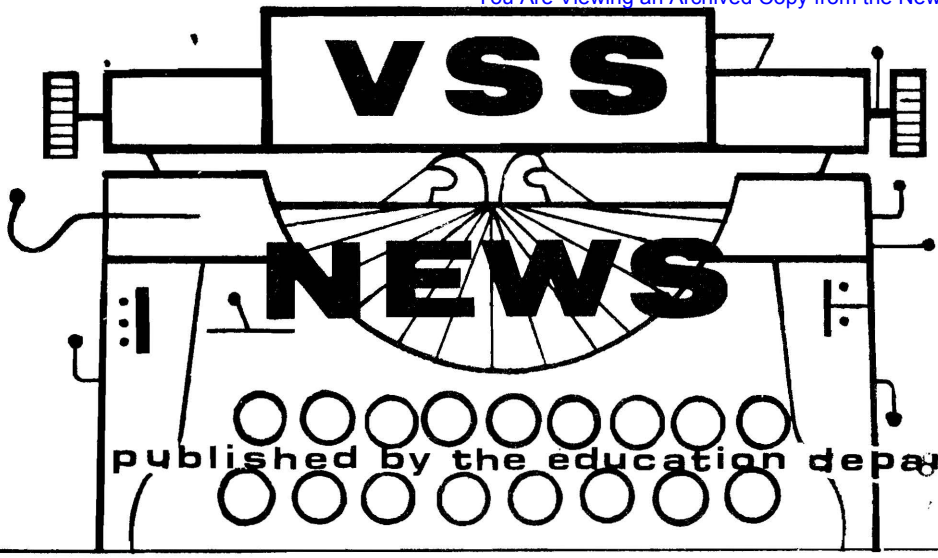
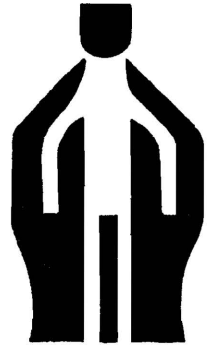

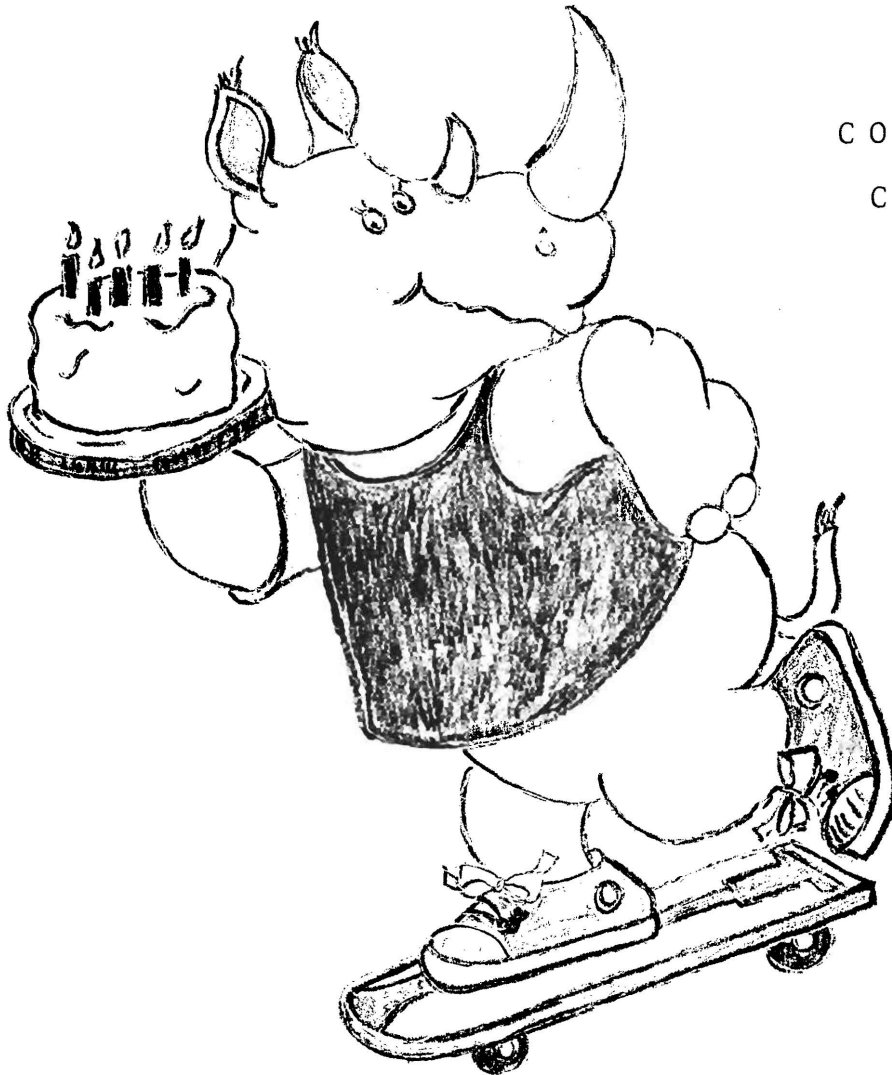

In a large saucepan, boil milk and sugar for four minutes. Remove from heat and stir in the remaining ingredients.

- 1 can (13 ounces) evaporated milk

- 2 packages (8 ounces each) semisweet chocolate
- 1 package (12 ounces) semisweet chocolate pieces
- 2 cups (8 ounces) marshmallow cream
- 1 cup chopped nuts

FOSTER GRANDPARENTS

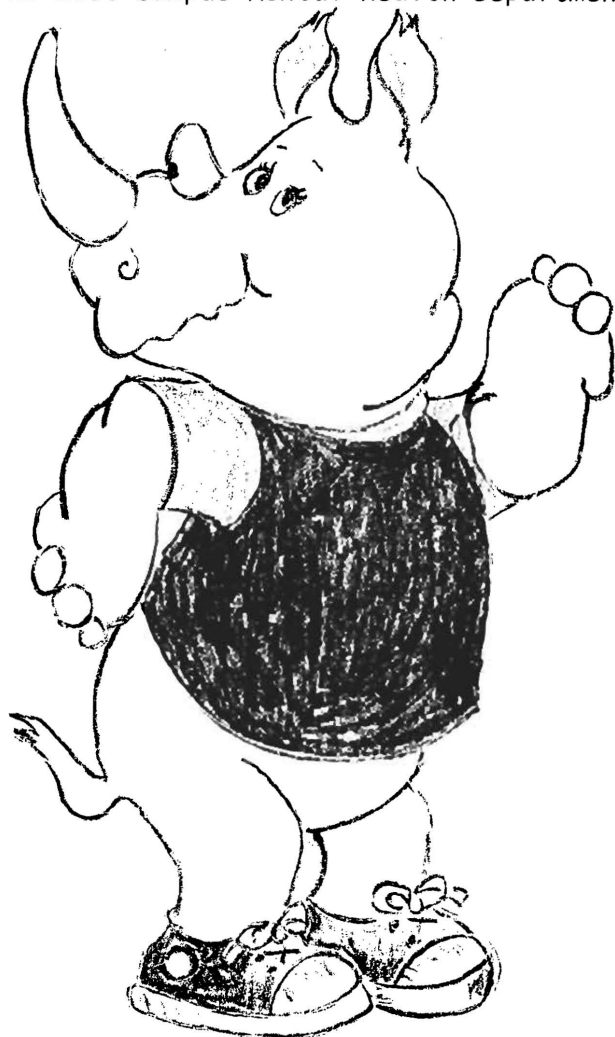
The Millville Police Department presented a crime prevention course to all our Grannies on April 28th. It is hoped that they will be better equipped to protect themselves.

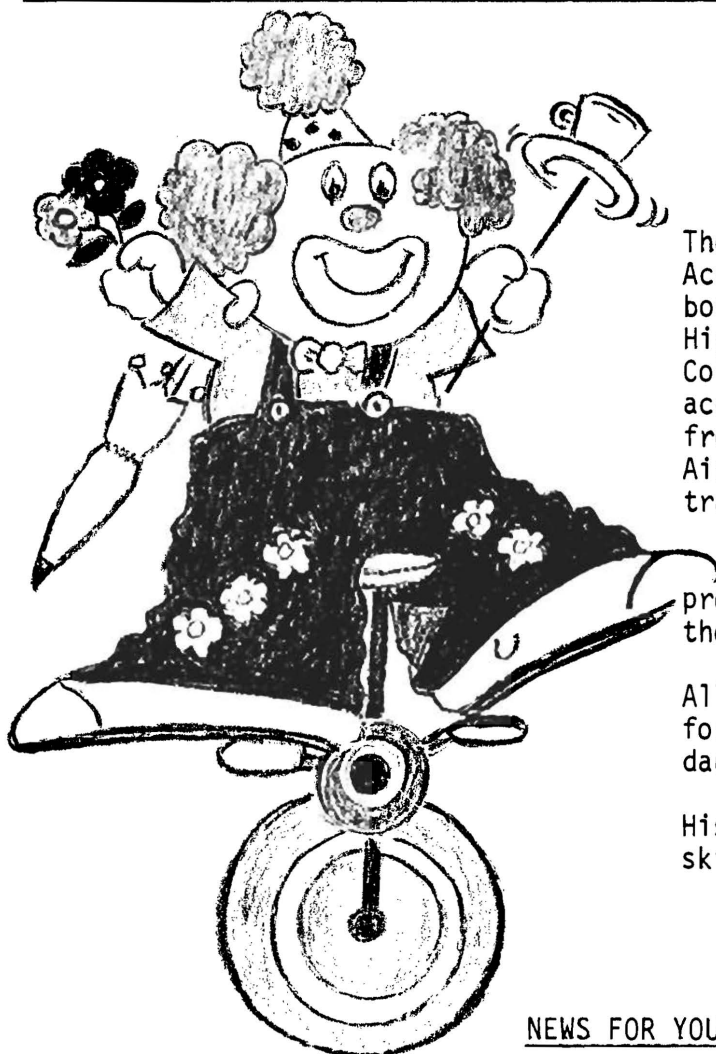

COLEMAN FOUNDATION: DONATION Both campuses of Vineland State School are most grateful to the Coleman Foundation for funding a significant donation received this spring - a new bus. Through this organization's humane efforts, both campuses will be able to make use of this greatly needed vehicle. This bus will lend greatly to the transportation and participation of non-ambulant clients in off-campus trips because it can accommodate twelve wheelchairs and twelve seated passengers.

The Coleman Foundation located in Chicago, Illinois, is primarily funded through the Fanny Mae Candy Corporation. The Foundation's chief function is to support and provide services for special projects and innovative ideas which will benefit those in need. For example, the Coleman Foundation funded a complete wing of a Chicago hospital which was totally dedicated to the research and treatment of renal disorders.

Dr. Miguel Cruz, Hospital Administrator, indicated that he was contacted by Jean D. Thorne, chairperson of the Coleman Foundation. She informed Dr. Cruz that the late Mr. William Hart, a former member of the Foundation and VSS Parents and Friends Association, had stressed to her and the Foundation's membership the need to recognize and assist the special needs of the mentally retarded. In recognition of Mr. Hart and as a recognition of his beneficial ambition, the Coleman Foundation agreed to support a special need of Vineland State School. As a result of staff recommendation, the Foundation agreed to provide the funding for this very special vehicle.

KITCHEN KLATCH

Pumpkin Bread

1 32 oz. can of pumpkin or two 16 oz. cans
 4 cups of flour
 3 cups of sugar
 1 1/2 teaspoons of salt
 1 cup of cooking oil
 2/3 cup of cold water
 1 teaspoon each of the following:
 baking powder, cinnamon, nutmeg, and
 allspice
 1/2 teaspoon of ground cloves
 4 eggs

Combine all ingredients in a bowl. Blend well with the beater and add crushed walnuts and raisins (optional). Grease and flour 5 (1b.) coffee cans or a 9"x5"x2 3/4" loaf pan. Pour in coffee cans halfway. Bake 1 hour and 15 minutes at 350° or until done.

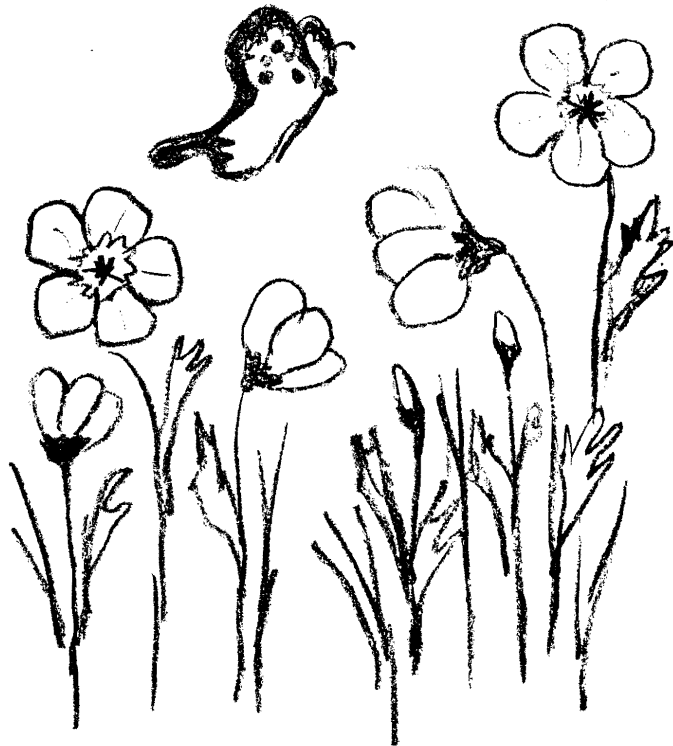

Food Service Department

The primary goal of the Food Service Department at Vineland State School has always been to provide the best possible nutritional care for our clients. Food is a very significant cultural focus in most components of our society and the clients at Vineland State School are no exceptions. Our clients enjoy three attractive, nutritious meals a day as well as between meal snacks, where appropriate. In addition to this, good nutritional care is vital to good health and well-being. Our clients must be monitored on a regular basis to be sure that their diversified nutritional needs are being met.

There are several basic factors involved in realizing the goal of providing quality nutritional care to our clients. First of all, the food must be stored and prepared according to specific sanitation procedures to insure that it will be wholesome and good tasting. Secondly, the food must be delivered to the clients' dining areas. Hot and cold food wagons are used to transport the food so that the hot food will stay hot and the cold food will stay cold. Thirdly, and perhaps most importantly, the food must be served in an attractive manner, increasing the client's enjoyment of the meal and the benefits derived from it. A fourth factor involved in providing quality nutritional care is making sure that each client's diet fits her own specific nutritional needs and development level. This could be done through the use of a diet altered as far as consistency such as soft or puree or through the use of special therapeutic diets such as diabetic or low sodium.

Since the inception of the ICF/MR program some major changes have developed within the Food Service Department. With these changes the Department is better equipped to realize its primary goal of providing the clients with the best possible nutritional care. Within each ICF cottage trained members of the Food Service staff are responsible for serving meals and snacks. This change has greatly improved the quality of food service in these cottages since these employees are specifically trained in proper food handling procedures, sanitation procedures and therapeutic diets.

The other change brought about through the ICF/MR program is an increase in dietitians on staff. These dietitians closely monitor the nutritional status of the clients in ICF/MR cottages to check for accuracy of diets and to make sure that clients' nutritional needs are being met.

In looking to the future we must continue to extend our goal with whatever resources available.
