By an act of the Legislature approved April 4th, 1873, authorizing the Governor, Comptroller and Treasurer of the State to dispose of or negotiate any of the securities of the State Fund when expedient or necessary to do so, have by virtue of the act disposed of and negotiated for the following amounts, viz.: On bond of the United Companies for five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000); one hundred and ninety thousand dollars (\$190,000) has been paid, leaving a balance of three hundred and ten thousand dollars (\$310,000) due on said bond; also one thousand five hundred shares of stock of Joint Companies has been negotiated for, and one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000) received on the same, making a decrease of three hundred and forty thousand dollars (\$340,000) in State securities for the year ending October 31st, 1873.

The balance of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) due from State Fund for the year 1871, has been transferred to School Fund. The appropriation of sixty-five thousand dollars (\$65,000) for the year 1872, ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) has been transferred, leaving a balance of fifty-five thousand dollars (\$55,000) with amount of appro-

priation for the year 1873 of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) together, now due from State Fund to School Fund one hundred and five thousand dollars (\$105,000), October 31st, 1873.

The Agricultural College Fund amounting to one hundred and sixteen thousand dollars (\$116,000) is all invested in bonds of this State. The interest, amounting to six thousand nine hundred and sixty dollars, (\$6,960), has been received and disbursed for the maintenance of Rutgers Scientific School.

In my last report for 1872 the securities deposited by the "Anchor Life Insurance Company" amounted to one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) in bonds and mortgages; since then fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) of said securities have been paid off and foreclosed, proceeds from which amounting to eight thousand nine hundred and nine dollars and seventeen cents (\$8,909.17) is deposited in bank, leaving a balance of securities now on deposit belonging to said company of ninety-one thousand and ninety-one dollars and eighty-three cents (\$91,091.83) in trust for all policy holders in the above named company.

I would further report that the "International Life Insurance and Trust Company" has deposited in this office securities amounting to one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) in trust for all the policy holders in said company.
