Pursuant to *N.J.S.A. 52:17B-5.5*, I am submitting the twenty-second annual report of crime in New Jersey. This information is based on crime statistics submitted to the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System by every New Jersey law enforcement agency for the year 1988.

Also included in this publication are 1987 and 1988 statistics collected in conformance with the Prevention of Domestic Violence Act and the initial Bias Incident Report.

Gathering the particulars of domestic violence and bias incidents is a necessary step toward combating these serious crimes against society.

Effective law enforcement requires accurate crime statistics in order to identify the extent, type and location of criminal activity. Criminal Justice administrators and planners have long recognized the Uniform Crime Reporting Program as the vehicle to accomplish this objective.

The success of the Uniform Crime Reporting System during 1988 could not have been realized without the cooperation extended by each of the 569 law enforcement agencies of the state, the New Jersey Chiefs of Police Association and the County Prosecutors Association.

It is in the interest of more effective law enforcement to over 7 million residents of New Jersey that the twenty-second annual report is submitted.

# THE NEW JERSEY UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

## DEFINITION

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System is based upon the compilation, classification, and analysis of crime data reported by all New Jersey police agencies in accordance with the regulations prescribed by law.

## DEVELOPMENT

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Law (N.J.S.A. 52:17 B-5.1 et seq) was enacted on May 16, 1966, and became effective January 1, 1967. Responsibility for the establishment, direction, control, and supervision of the Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the State's Attorney General. The Attorney General authorized the New Jersey State Police to collect and collate the crime data received from law enforcement agencies within the state.

At the request of the Attorney General, the New Jersey State Police researched crime systems in operation throughout the nation in order to establish a firm foundation from which to grow. The most logical approach was the paralleling of the federal crime reporting system. There was a distinct need for a compatibility feature that would enhance both the state and federal systems through the data entry at both levels.

This compatibility has, as its nucleus, the standard classification of offenses established by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Regardless of the label placed on a particular offense in the various states' systems, i.e., felony, misdemeanor, disorderly persons, if the incident meets the federal standard it will be reported as an offense.

The terms "crime" and "offense" are used interchangeably in this publication, and refer to an act committed in violation of a law which is reportable under the guidelines of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

The Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting of the New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association has served the program in an advisory capacity since 1966. The contributions of this committee have proven valuable to the success of the program. This committee works in close harmony with the State Police as a means of improving the quality of reporting through recommended program standards, policies, and procedures.

## COLLECTION OF CRIME DATA

As required by statute, all law enforcement agencies in the state submit monthly and annual summary crime reports to the program. During the year 1988, offense and arrest data were received from 487 full-time municipal police departments. Ten (10) part-time municipal police departments, and the New Jersey State Police (acting as the reporting agent for the 62 municipalities without local police services). In addition to the 487 full-time municipal police departments there are eight police departments contracted by other municipalities.

In addition to the above agencies, arrest data were received from the state's twenty-one (21) prosecutors, sheriffs' departments, four (4) county police departments, and three (3) county park police departments. In order to incorporate all New Jersey law enforcement agencies under the system, the nine (9) other state agencies with law enforcement responsibilities, as well as thirteen (13) college campus police departments were incorporated within the program. Collectively, a total of 569 law enforcement agencies submit their reports to the New Jersey State Police.

## METHOD

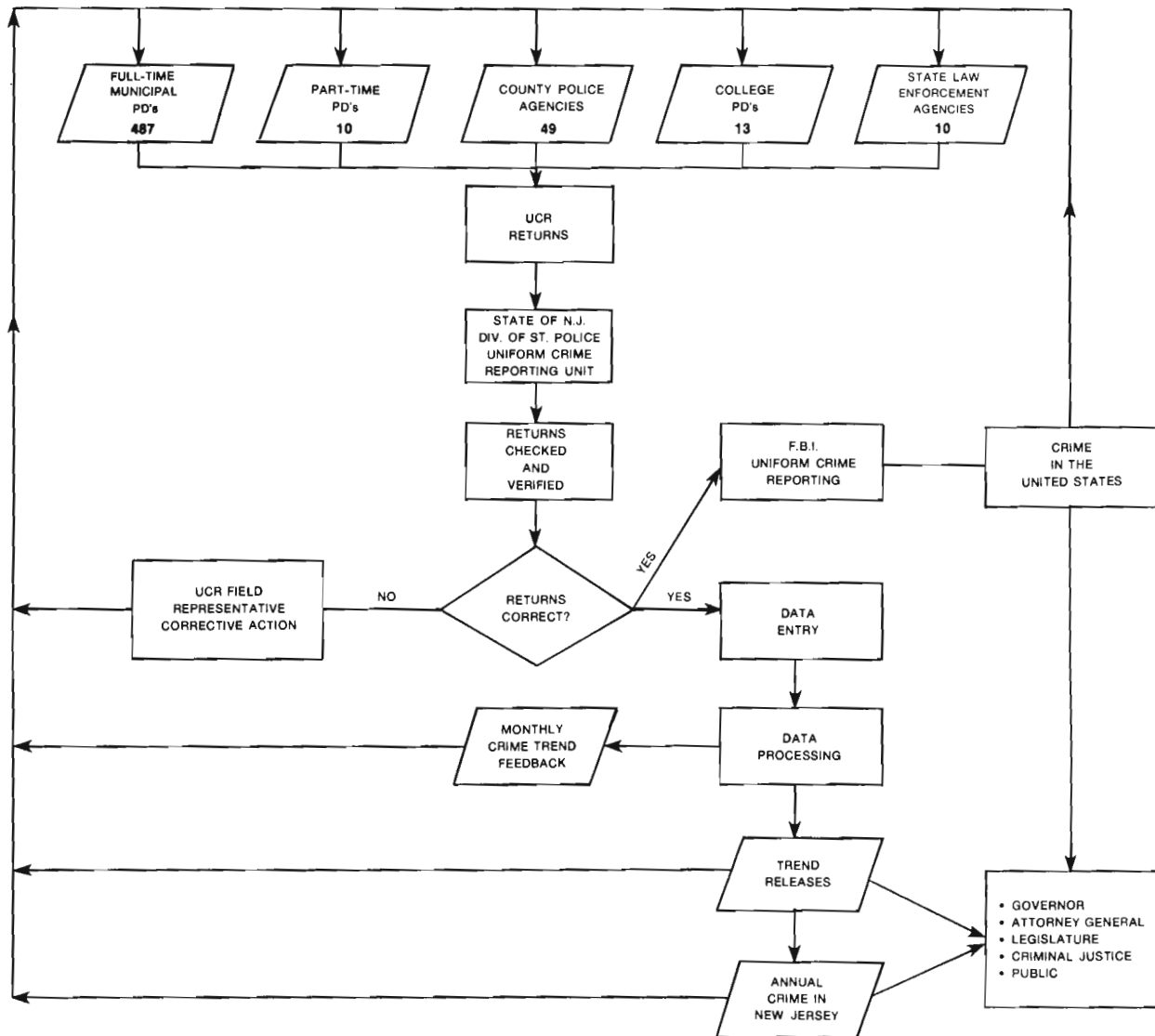
A State of New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Guide, has been distributed to all contributors. It outlines reporting procedures in detail, and is complete to the extent of providing examples and illustrations. Field representatives provide additional instruction and clarification when required.

All reported offenses are related to the municipality in which they occur rather than to the agency which may conduct the investigation. The clearance is credited to the municipality in which the offense occurred. Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own reports. Law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses according to the following categories: Homicide (Murder and Manslaughter), Rape, Robbery, Burglary, Larceny-theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson. The "Crime in New Jersey," and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's "Crime in the United States" publications,

exclude manslaughters, simple assaults, and arsons from the "Index" offenses. These are further referred to as "violent" and "nonviolent" crimes as graphically illustrated in Section VII under "Municipal and County Offense and Demographic Data," and Section II, "State Summary and Offense Analysis."

All reported offenses are compiled from a record of all criminal complaints received by police from victims or other sources, or discovered by the police during routine operations. Complaints determined to be unfounded are eliminated from this count. Analytical data pertaining to specific crime categories are also reported, i.e., total adult and juvenile arrests made during the month. Police killed or assaulted, and arson data are also collected monthly. Police personnel information is submitted on an annual basis.

## **VERIFICATION PROCESSES**

The uniformity and accuracy of data gathered from contributors must be safeguarded through various ways. Although guidelines and instructions are provided each contributor, they are not the panacea for the accuracy being sought.

The reports received by the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit are recorded and examined for mathematical accuracy and reasonableness of the interpretation of the offense classifications. Improper classifications, changes in reporting procedures, or actual change are identified in this manner. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by direct telephone contact with the contributors, while all other errors are resolved through a personal visit by a field representative to the reporting agency.

Further verification is accomplished through the analysis of statistical data accrued from the reports submitted. Fluctuations in crime rates noted from previous submissions are verified by the field representatives through their municipal counterpart.

## **FUNCTION**

Police executives make use of this data in administrative, planning, and operational determinations for their respective jurisdictions. The State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit provides assistance to municipal police agencies through the individual analysis of statistics as they relate to specific crime problems within their jurisdiction. Police executives also use this data for identifying manpower and equipment needs. The Uniform Crime Reporting Program requirements not only have increased police efficiency in reporting and recordkeeping areas, but have helped police in their day to day operations.

Although the data collected on the offenses of manslaughter and simple assault are not presented in the annual report, they are required for the federal system. However, this data is processed and available for special research purposes.

# PROFILE OF NEW JERSEY

New Jersey is situated between the major industrial markets of New York and Philadelphia and can be classified as the "Crossroads of the East." The geographic location of the state has been a major factor in its growth and development. The many miles of super-expressway facilities within the state connect New Jersey directly with the neighboring states of New York, Pennsylvania, and Delaware. Additionally, New Jersey as a corridor state, accommodates large volumes of traffic from both the eastern and western part of the United States.

The state is politically comprised of 21 counties which contain 567 incorporated municipalities. Nationally, New Jersey, although 46th in size, ranks ninth in population and first as the most densely populated state in the country. In addition to this density of 1,023.6 persons per square mile, New Jersey still has many miles of rural areas and sparsely settled communities. The areas of density show a heavy concentration around the major urban centers and those areas most accessible for commuting.

## STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL PROFILES

The presentation of state, county and municipal profiles in this section is offered for the purpose of projecting, for the consideration of the reader, a group of recognizable factors which may affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from community to community. Selection of the areas of information to be related to individual municipalities was based on the immediacy and completeness of data available.

Population statistics presented here, and throughout this publication, were obtained from the Department of Labor, Division of Planning and Research, Office of Demographic and Economic Analysis. The 1987 provisional population count was used in this publication.

Character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications, and square miles, were compiled by the Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning. Following is a list of categories used and a description of each category.

- URBAN CENTER                      Densely populated with extensive development.
- URBAN-SUBURBAN                Near an urban center but not as extremely developed and more residential areas.
- SUBURBAN                        Predominantly single family residential, within a short distance of an urban area.
- RURAL                              Scattered small communities and isolated single family dwellings.
- RURAL CENTER                    High density core area with surrounding municipalities rural.

Certain other socio-economic factors present in varying degrees in all communities may have an influence on resulting crime rates. Obvious difficulties in the identification, documentation and measurement of these factors, however, precluded their application in this report.

Those factors presented were listed to affirm their existence within the county and community and to provide a base for consideration in the evaluation of that community's crime experience.



# CRIME FACTORS

In order to provide a meaningful statistical profile of crime within the State of New Jersey, each law enforcement agency must provide the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit with data that depicts specific crimes that are occurring within their jurisdiction. There is a need for compatibility with the National Uniform Crime Reporting System and, therefore, categories of offense classifications used within the state are identical with those of the National System. This results in equitable conclusions being drawn from the data submitted.

Reported Part I offenses and arrests are recorded in the municipality where they occurred, regardless of the outside investigative agency which may investigate, arrest, or otherwise dispose of the case.

The factors which influence crime rates are dependent upon characteristics of the community. When attempting to interpret the crime statistics presented herein, one should be aware of the social structure and factors that lead to or cause criminal behavior.

Crime rates in this publication are based on the stable population of the municipality. Fluctuating seasonal population figures are too inaccurate to be used as a measurement for determining crime rates. Municipalities with high seasonal populations may indicate a higher crime rate per one thousand than may be normal for a municipality their size. This would also be indicated in municipalities that experience high population increases due to special events or commuters.

Set forth below are some of the factors which, by type and volume, will affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan areas of which it is a part.
- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex, and race.
- Economic status, including job availability, and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population, including commuter, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
- Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.
- Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (i.e., prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational).
- Crime reporting practices of the general citizenry.
- Attitudes of the public toward crime reporting.
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.
- Cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police agencies.

# THE POLICE POINT OF VIEW

The New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit surveyed various police agencies of the state, attempting to ascertain their opinion concerning factors contributing to the increase or decrease of specific crimes in their municipality. One of the goals of the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit is to assist police in reducing crime by first identifying its extent, type and location. The following viewpoints are offered with the expectation of reaching this goal.

## ROBBERY

### Decreases:

- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State Criminal Code.
- Increased communications technology has led to better communication and increased exchanges of information between police departments.
- Highly visible foot patrols being deployed in commercial areas and densely populated residential areas.
- Use of Anti-crime Units in high robbery areas.

### Increases:

- Resort areas have shown an increasing seasonal population.
- Our highly mobile society provides easy access to areas which were previously difficult to reach.

## BURGLARY

### Decreases:

- Better deployment of police manpower, such as highly visible foot patrols in high density crime areas, and increased patrols during probable times and at probable locations of burglaries.
- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State's Criminal Code has been a deterrent.
- Crime Prevention Programs are being stressed in many communities and citizens have been taking a more active part by reporting suspicious persons or circumstances.

### Increases:

- Extreme increases in population in certain areas have led to new housing in suburban and rural areas.
- Husband and wife are both working; leaving homes frequently unoccupied for long periods of time.

## LARCENY

### Decreases:

- Public awareness programs contribute to the decrease in thefts from parked vehicles.
- Improved or additional lighting deter criminal acts from occurring in parking areas.
- "Safe Streets" Programs and Anti-crime Units have been established in many municipalities.

**Increases:**

- Shoplifting is a theft that police have little or no control over. Store security forces are under the control of the store administration, and their policies vary from strict enforcement, arrest and prosecution, to only a warning. Policy change has been directed toward prosecuting the offenders rather than warning them, causing to some extent an increase in the number of shoplifting offenses reported to police.
- Certain types of property such as tape decks, radar detectors and radios are popular and present resale opportunities.
- Youth gang activity on the increase resulting in thefts from motor vehicle.

**MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT****Decreases:**

- Stronger sentencing of career criminals has been effective.
- Modern ignition systems and anti-theft devices act as a deterrent.
- Better lighting in parking lots has helped decrease motor vehicle thefts.

**Increases:**

- The tremendous replacement cost of auto parts has contributed significantly to the increase in motor vehicle thefts for the purpose of auto parts resale.

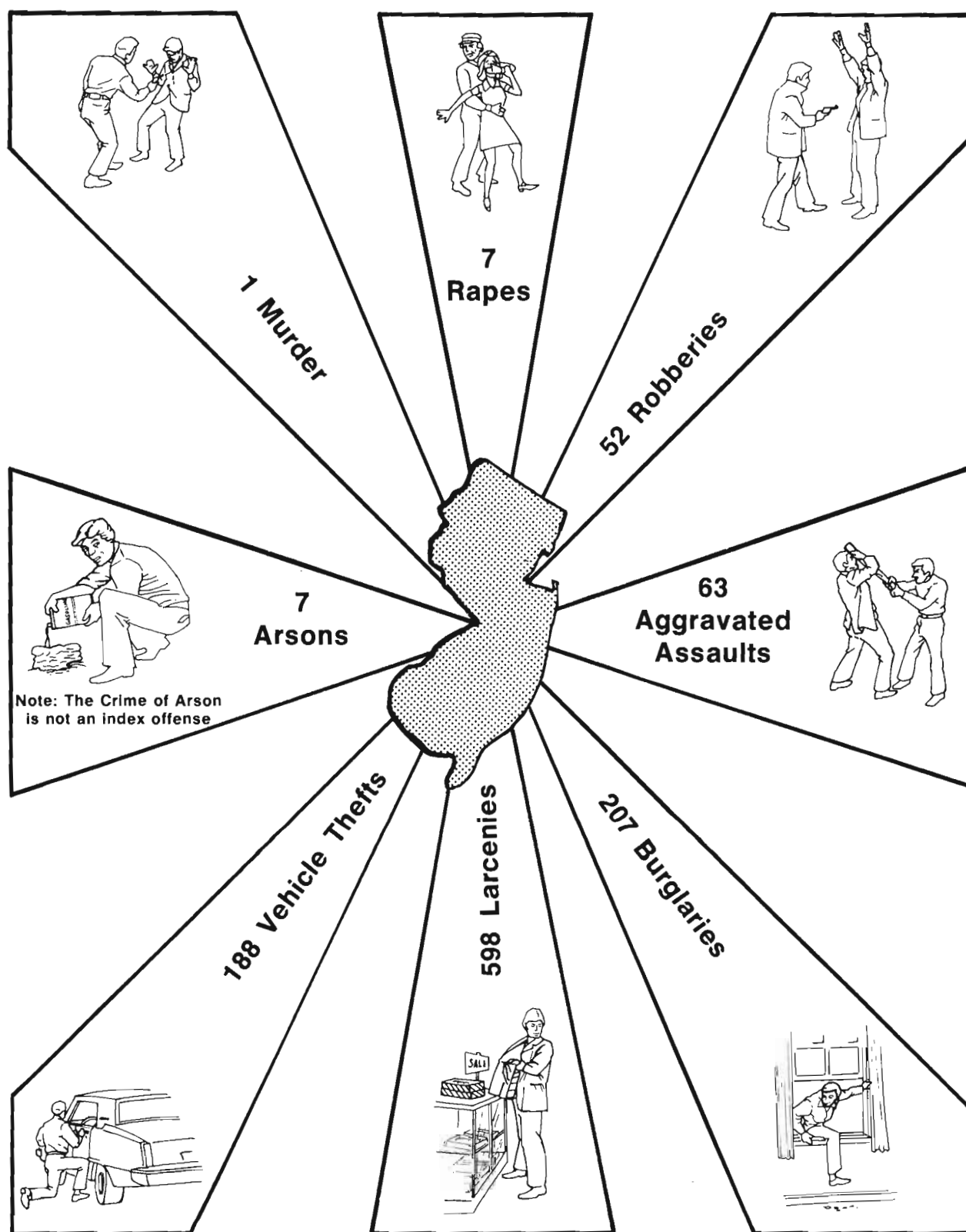

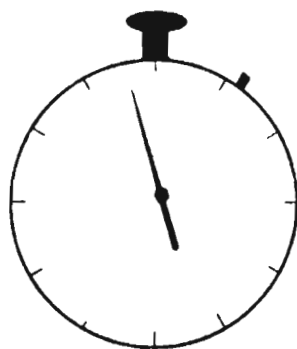

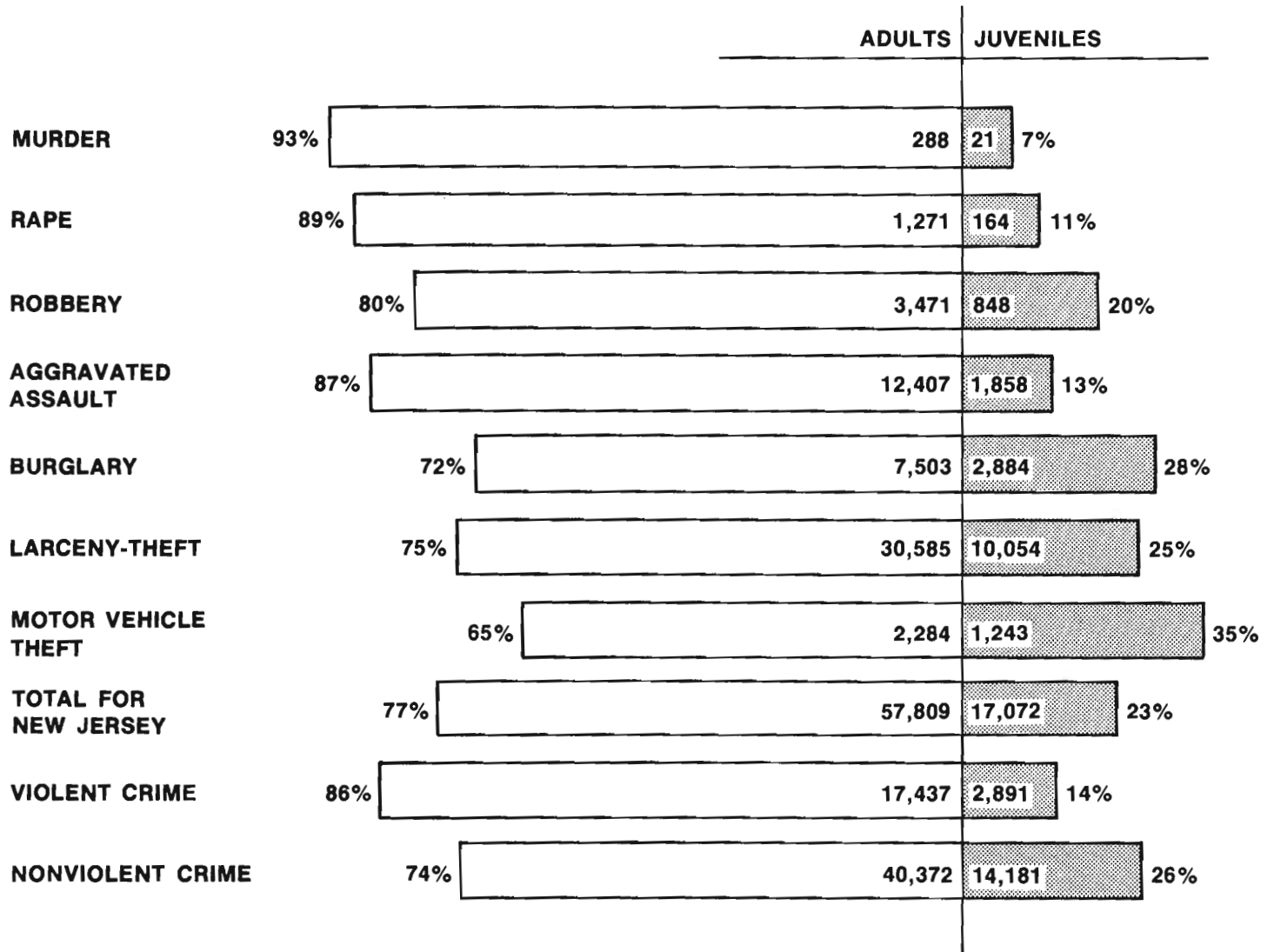

# STATEWIDE CRIME SUMMARY—1988

## CRIME INDEX—VOLUME/RATE

- There were 408,362 Index offenses reported in 1988, a 1 percent increase compared to 1987.
- The crime rate of the state is 53.2 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants, an increase of 1 percent compared to 1987.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- August with 40,429 offenses reported, recorded the highest incidence of Crime Index offenses while January was the lowest with 30,006 offenses.
- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$641.8 million in 1988, a 10 percent increase from 1987.
- Value of property recovered was \$312.5 million, resulting in a recovery rate of 49 percent.
- Stolen motor vehicles accounted for 68 percent of stolen property and 95 percent of the recovered property value.

## CRIME INDEX ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 75,868 persons were arrested for Index offenses, which represents a 2 percent increase compared to 1987.
- Adult Index arrests increased 5 percent and juvenile arrests decreased 6 percent.
- Crime Index arrests accounted for 18 percent of the total arrests in 1988.
- Males accounted for 79 percent of the Crime Index arrests and females accounted for 21 percent.
- Fifty-three percent of the Index arrests were white, 46 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 12 percent of the arrests for Index offenses.
- Police cleared 18 percent of the Index offenses and juveniles accounted for 23 percent of these clearances.

# VIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 44,892 violent crimes reported in 1988, a 9 percent increase compared to the violent crimes reported in 1987.
- Violent crimes accounted for 11 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The violent crime rate increased 9 percent to 5.9 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants.

### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- The highest number of violent crimes were reported in August with 4,388 offenses while the lowest number was reported in January with 3,301.
- The value of property stolen as a result of violent crime was \$17.3 million.

### **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- Arrests for violent crime offenses increased 7 percent to 19,669.
- Violent crime arrests accounted for 26 percent of the Index arrests and 5 percent of the total arrests during the year.
- Adult arrests for violent crime increased 11 percent and juvenile arrests showed a 4 percent decrease.
- Adults accounted for 80 percent of the violent crime arrests while the remaining 20 percent were juveniles.
- Males were responsible for 88 percent and females for 12 percent of the violent crime arrests.
- Forty-two percent of those arrested were white, 58 percent were black and less than one-half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests.
- Forty-five percent of all violent crimes were cleared and juveniles accounted for 14 percent of these clearances.

## **NONVIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY**

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, Larceny-theft, Motor Vehicle Theft.

### **VOLUME/RATE/TREND**

- There were 363,470 nonviolent crimes reported in 1988, a 1 percent increase compared to the 361,517 reported in 1987.
- Nonviolent crime accounted for 89 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The nonviolent crime rate remained at 47.4 victims per 1,000 inhabitants in 1988.

### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- The largest number of nonviolent crimes were reported in August with 36,041 while the lowest number was reported in January with 26,705.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of nonviolent crime amounted to \$624.3 million.

## **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- There were 56,199 nonviolent crime arrests, this represents a decrease of less than one-half of one percent when compared to 1987.
- Nonviolent crime arrests accounted for 74 percent of the Index arrests and 13 percent of the total arrests during 1988.
- Juveniles were responsible for 34 percent of the nonviolent crime arrests and adults 66 percent.
- Adult nonviolent crime arrests increased 3 percent while juvenile arrests decreased 6 percent.
- Males represented 76 percent and females 24 percent of persons arrested for the nonviolent crime.
- Fifty-six percent of all persons arrested for nonviolent crimes were white, 43 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 12 percent of the arrests.
- Fifteen percent of all nonviolent crimes reported were cleared in 1988 and juveniles accounted for 26 percent of these clearances.

## **TOTAL ARREST SUMMARY**

- There were 424,061 persons arrested in 1988 which represents a 10 percent increase compared to 1987.
- The arrest rate for 1988 increased 5 percent to 55.3 persons arrested per every 1,000 inhabitants.
- Adult arrests increased 13 percent to 329,199 and juvenile arrests decreased less than one-half of one percent to 94,862 in 1988.
- Adults accounted for 78 percent and juveniles 22 percent of the total state arrests.
- Persons under 21 years of age accounted for 37 percent of all arrests.
- Males accounted for 83 percent and females 17 percent of the total persons arrested during the year.
- Sixty-three percent of the total persons arrested in 1988 were white, 37 percent were black and less than one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 10 percent of the arrests.

## **POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED SUMMARY**

- There were no police officers feloniously killed in the line of duty during 1988 in New Jersey.
- There were 4,796 police officers assaulted during the performance of duty in 1988 in New Jersey.

## **CRIME IN NEW JERSEY, UNITED STATES AND THE NORTHEAST REGION**

- The Crime Index in New Jersey increased 1 percent, while the United States increased 3 percent and the Northeast Region increased 4 percent.
- Violent crime in New Jersey increased 9 percent, the United States increased 5 percent and the Northeast region increased 8 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in New Jersey increased 1 percent, while the Northeastern states increased 4 percent and the United States increased 2 percent.

# MURDER

## DEFINITION

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is included. This Index offense is counted by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court, jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Attempts to kill, and assaults to kill, are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, negligent manslaughters, and justifiable homicides are not counted, nor reflected in the murder classification.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 408 murders reported to law enforcement agencies of the state in 1988, a 17 percent increase compared to the 350 murders reported in 1987.
- Murders accounted for one-tenth of one percent of the reported Index offenses, and 1 percent of the violent crime.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The age group of 25-29 accounted for 17 percent of all murder victims.
- Firearms were used in 42 percent of the murders, knives or cutting instruments in 26 percent, blunt objects in 10 percent and physical force in 9 percent.
- Forty percent of the offenders were friends or acquaintances of the victim, while 16 percent were relatives, and 16 percent were strangers.
- Felony murders accounted for 16 percent of all murder circumstances. Robbery was the motive in 67 percent of the 66 felony murders.
- Saturday was the highest day of the week for reported murders with 85, while Thursday was the lowest with 42.
- August recorded the highest number of murders, with 45, while September had the lowest with 25.
- Thirty-two percent of the murders occurred on highways or streets, 23 percent in multi-family or apartment dwellings, and 19 percent in single family dwellings.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of murder amounted to \$26,456.

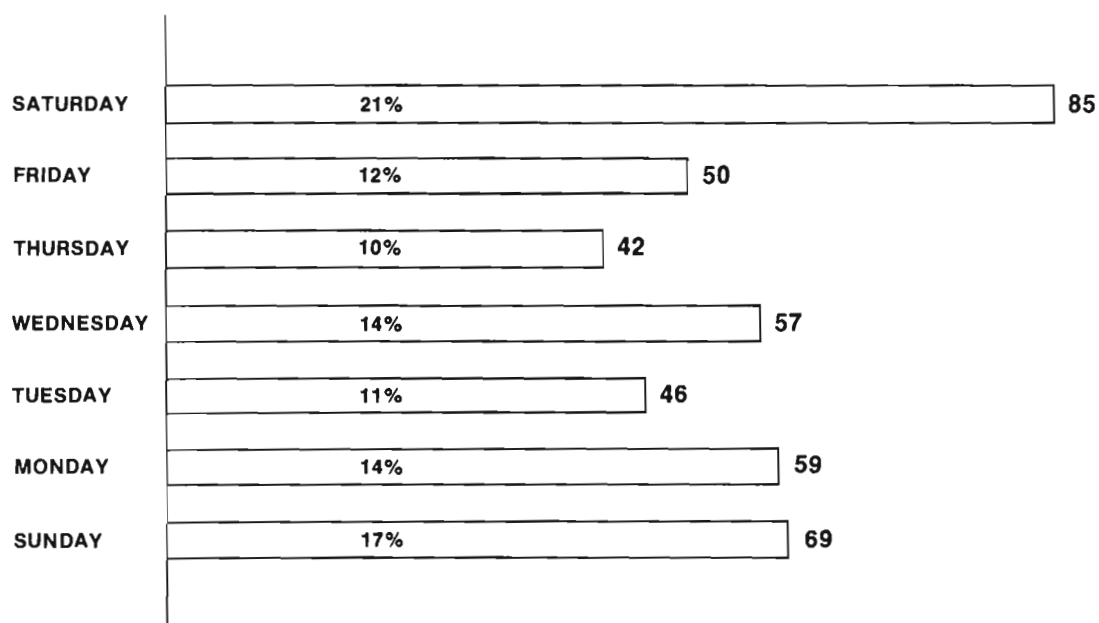
## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 347 persons were arrested for murder in 1988, a 29 percent increase compared to 1987.
- Adult murder arrests increased 32 percent (from 234 to 310) and juvenile arrests increased 6 percent (from 35 to 37).
- Sixty-five percent of persons arrested for murder were black, 35 percent were white and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-six percent of the murders were cleared in 1988 (309 out of 408). Juveniles accounted for 7 percent of those cases cleared.
- Males accounted for 86 percent and females 14 percent of those arrested for murder.

## MURDER BY DAY OF WEEK



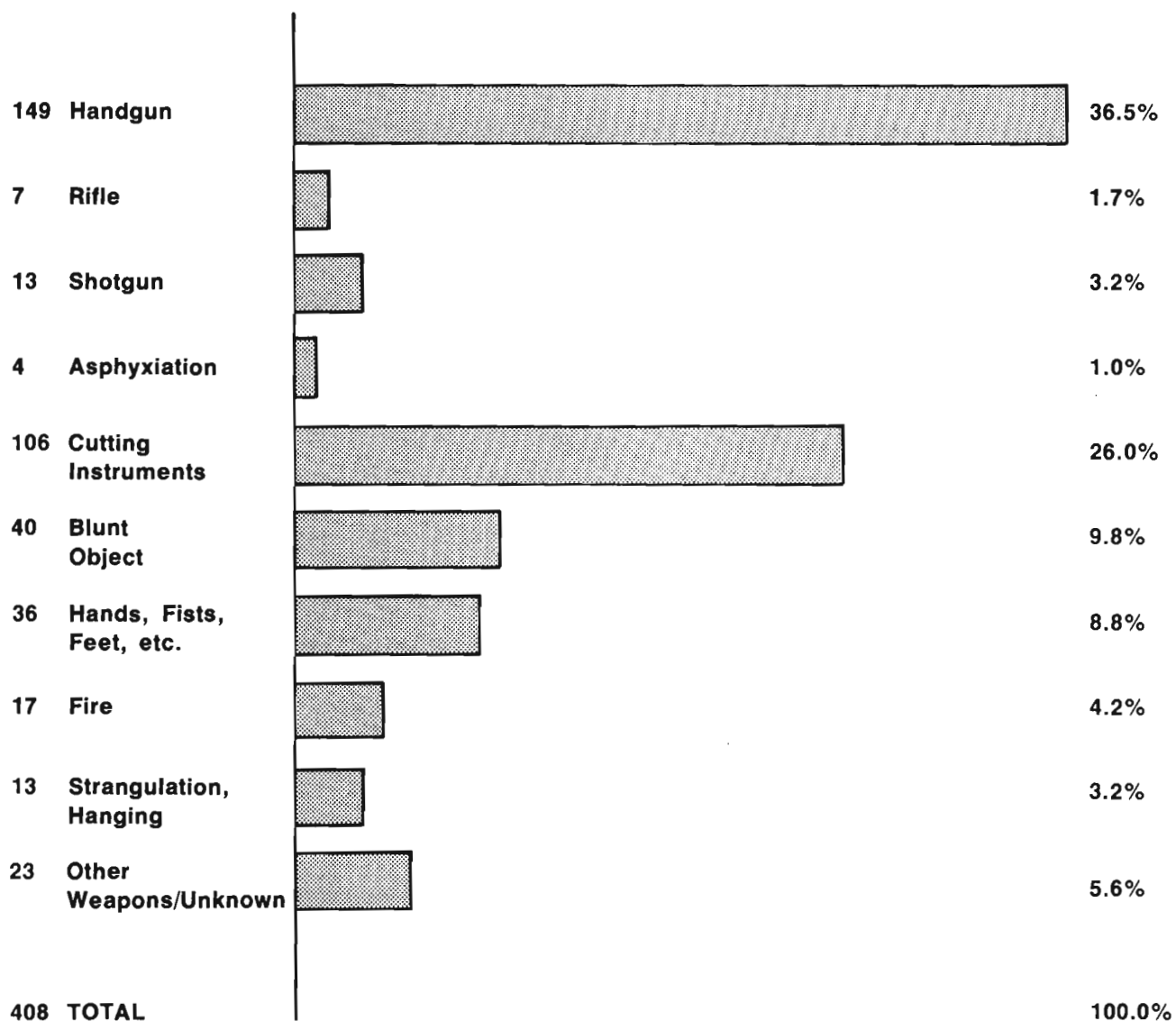

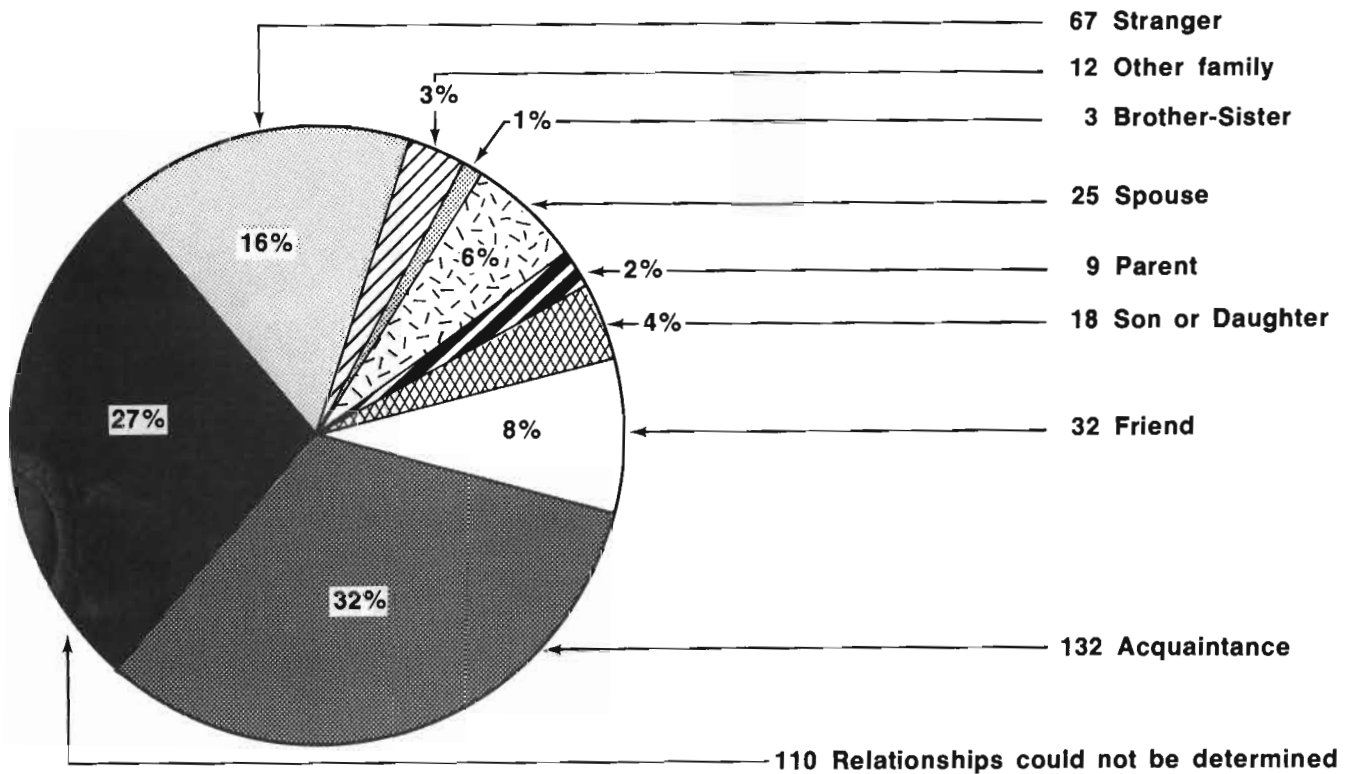

## MURDER—Distribution by Type of Weapon

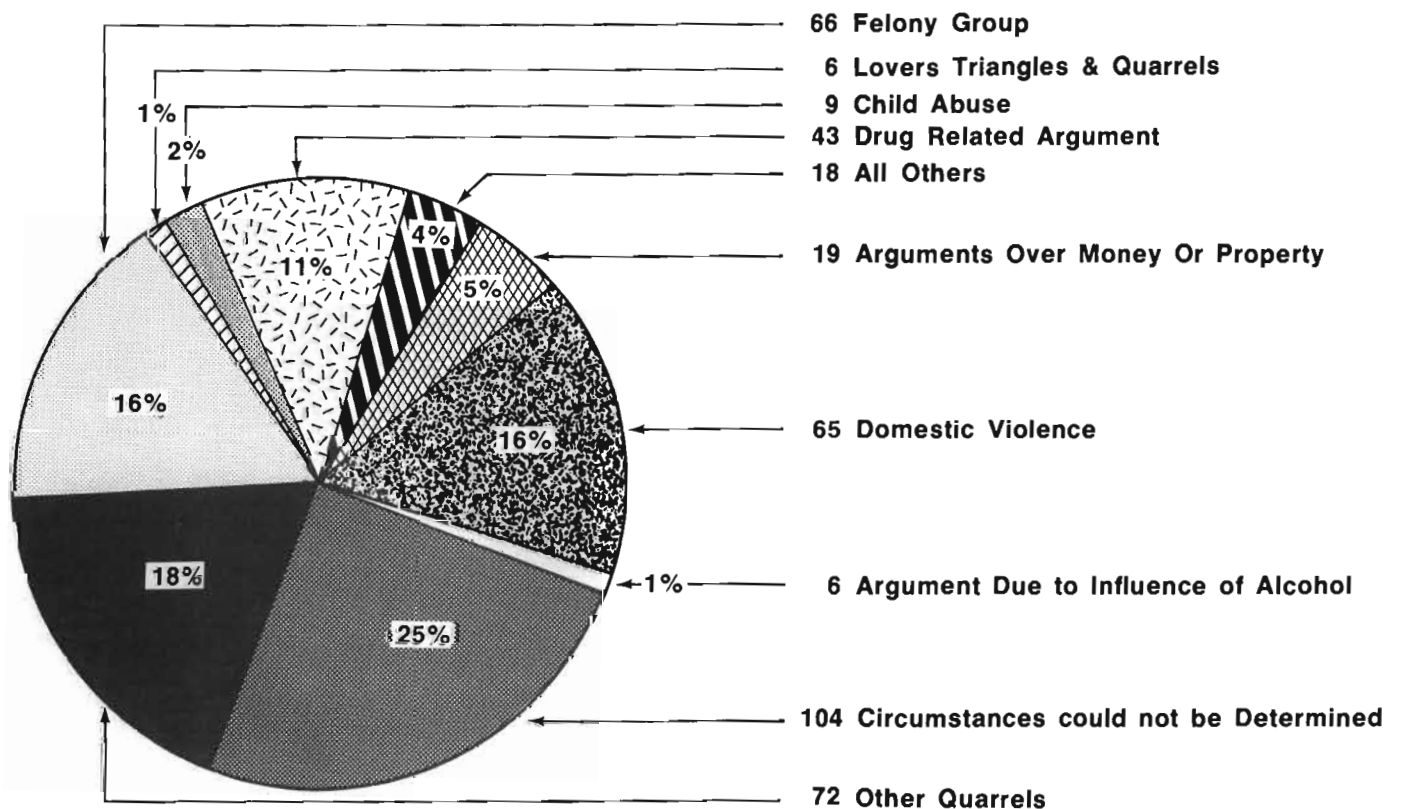

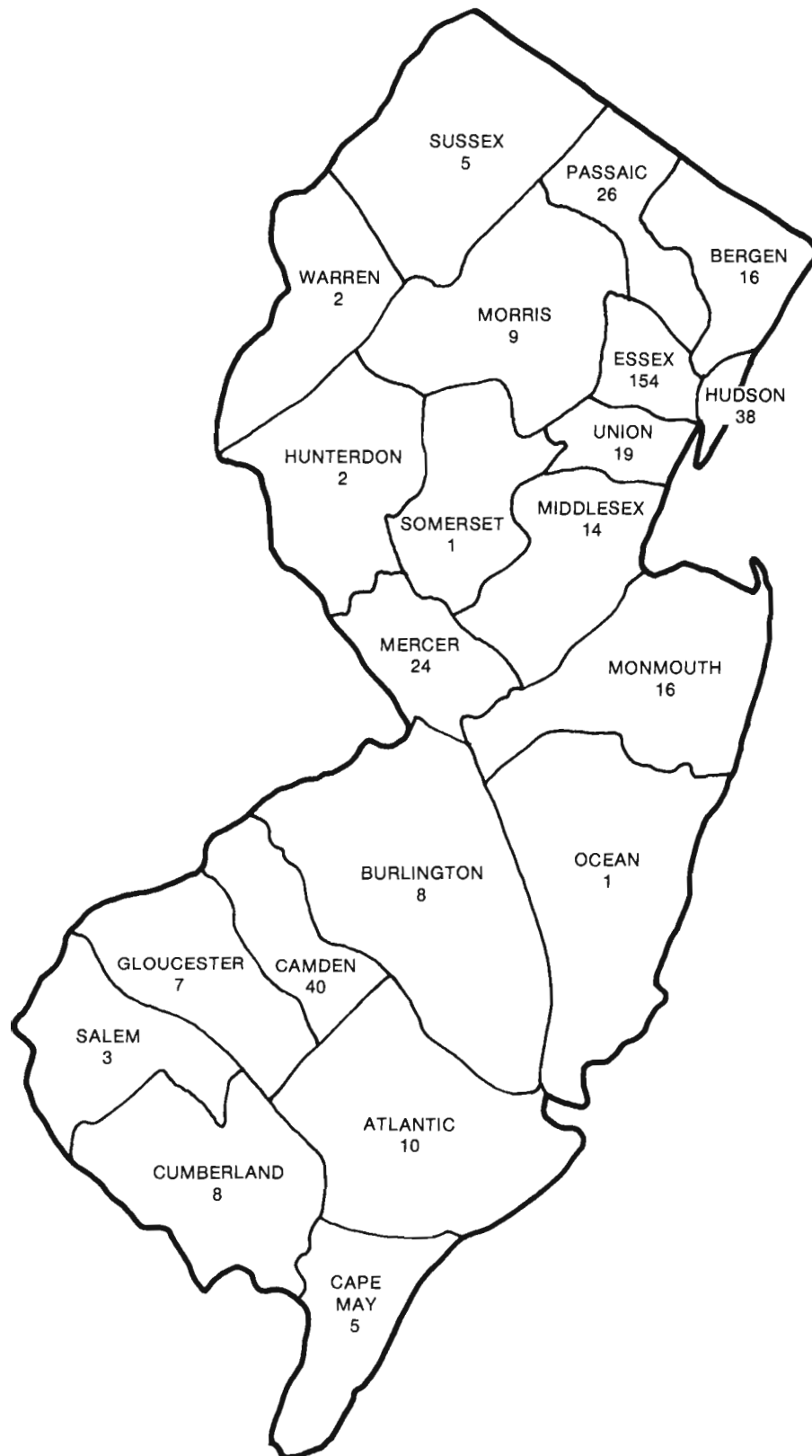

# RAPE

## Definition

Rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted, but carnal abuse, rape without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 2,592 reported rapes in 1988, an increase of 2 percent compared to the 2,548 in 1987.
- Rape accounted for six-tenths of one percent of the total Crime Index and 6 percent of all violent crimes.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Eighty percent of the rapes were forcible, the remaining 20 percent were attempts to rape.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of rape, amounted to \$49,290.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 1,340 persons were arrested during 1988, a 1 percent increase compared to 1987.
- Adult rape arrests increased 2 percent, while juvenile arrests decreased 5 percent.
- Fifty-five percent of the arrested perpetrators were black, 45 percent were white and less than 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of the arrests.
- Forty-six percent of all persons arrested for rape were between 25 and 39.
- Fifty-five percent of all rape cases were solved during 1988. Juveniles accounted for 11 percent of those cases cleared.

# ROBBERY

## Definition

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 18,886 robbery offenses in 1988, a 6 percent increase compared to 1987.
- Robbery accounted for 5 percent of the total Crime Index and 42 percent of all violent crime.
- The robbery rate was 2.5 victims per 1,000 population.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Highway robberies accounted for 74 percent of all reported robberies.
- Bank robberies increased 20 percent and convenience store robberies increased 13 percent.
- Total value of property stolen during robberies amounted to \$17,343,220.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

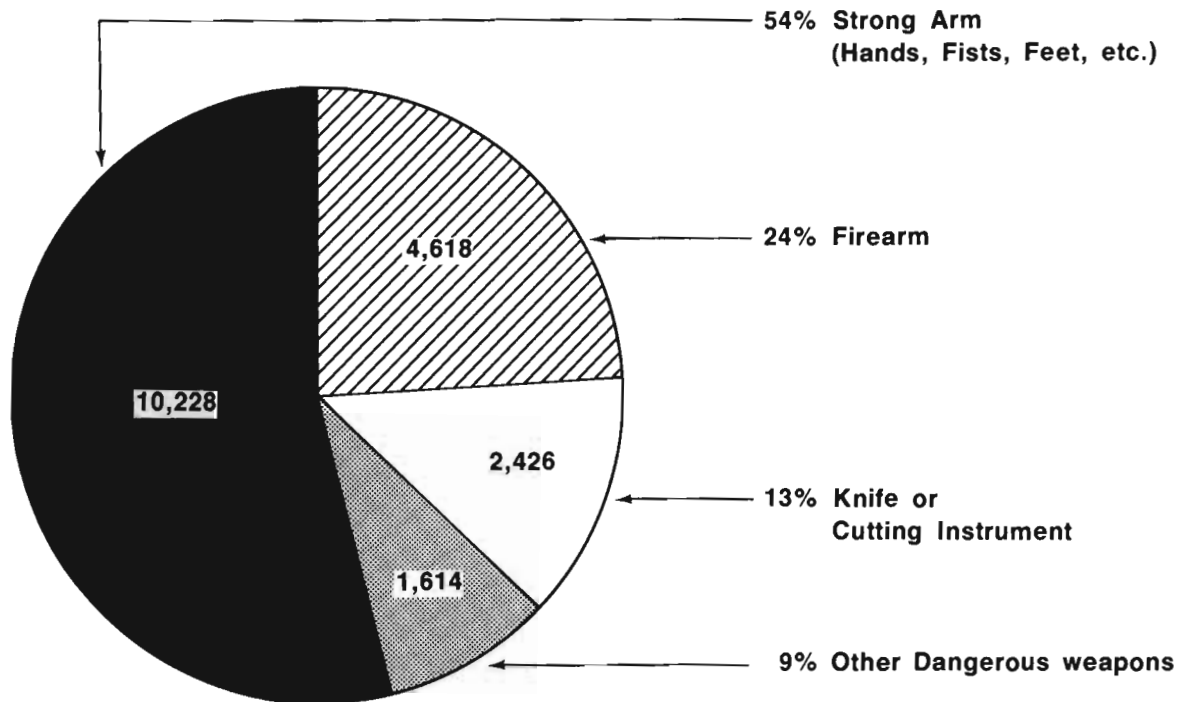
- A total of 4,797 persons were arrested for robbery in 1988, a 1 percent decrease compared to 1987.
- There was a 6 percent increase in adult robbery arrests, and juvenile arrests decreased 16 percent in 1988.
- Males accounted for 91 percent and females 9 percent of the robbery arrests during 1988.
- Seventy-four percent of all persons arrested for robbery were black, 26 percent were white and less than one-half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 12 percent of the robbery arrests.
- Twenty-three percent of the robbery cases were cleared and juveniles accounted for 20 percent of these clearances.

# AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

## Definition

Aggravated assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do serious physical injury to another. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a firearm, knife, or other weapon is used which could result in serious personal injury if the crime was successfully completed.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 23,006 aggravated assaults reported during 1988, an increase of 12 percent when compared to 1987.
- Aggravated assaults accounted for 6 percent of the Crime Index and 51 percent of all violent crimes.
- The rate for aggravated assault increased 11 percent from 2.7 victims per 1,000 population to 3.0.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Physical force (i.e. hands, fists, and feet) was used in 32 percent, and other dangerous weapons (i.e. clubs, bricks, tire irons, etc.) were used in 31 percent of all reported aggravated assaults.
- Firearms were used in 14 percent of all aggravated assaults committed.

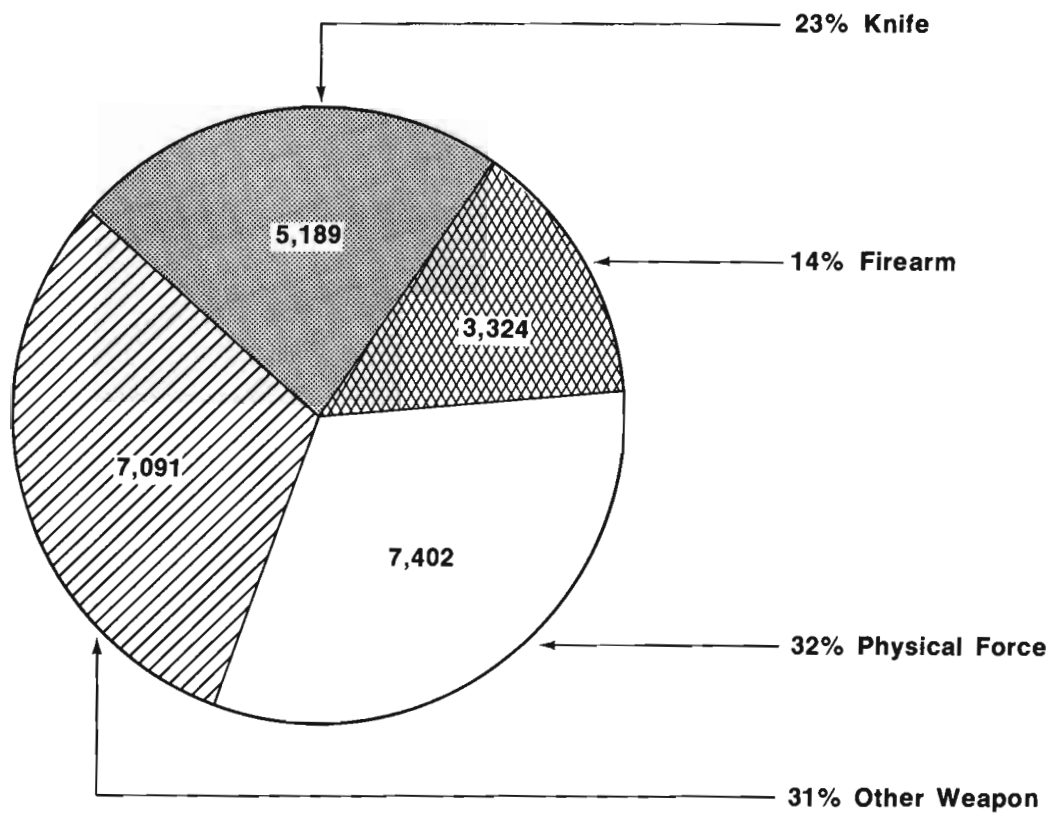
## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 13,185 persons arrested for aggravated assault in 1988, an 11 percent increase compared to 1987.
- Adult arrests increased 13 percent, while juvenile arrests increased 4 percent.
- Males accounted for 86 percent, and females 14 percent, of the aggravated assault arrests.
- Forty-eight percent of the persons arrested for aggravated assault were white, 52 percent were black and less than 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty-two percent of the reported aggravated assaults were cleared; juveniles accounted for 13 percent of these clearances.

# BURGLARY

## Definition

Under this program, burglary is defined as an unlawful entry or attempted entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. Data collection for this offense is further categorized as forcible entry, unlawful entry (where no force is used) and attempted forcible entry.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 75,617 burglary offenses reported in 1988, a decrease of 2 percent.
- Burglary accounted for 19 percent of the total Crime Index and 21 percent of all nonviolent crime.
- The burglary rate per 1,000 population decreased 2 percent to 9.9 in 1988.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- During 1988, 72 percent of all burglaries involved forcible entry, 16 percent were unlawful entry where no force was used and the remaining 12 percent were attempts to forcibly enter.
- Residences were targets in 67 percent of the reported burglaries.
- Sixty-four percent of the nonresidential burglaries occurred between the hours of 6:00 P.M. and 6:00 A.M.
- Stolen property value as a result of burglary statewide, amounted to \$71.1 million, for an average loss of \$940.
- The average loss as a result of a residential burglary was \$929, while nonresidential burglary loss was \$964.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Burglary arrests decreased 1 percent with 11,494 persons arrested.
- Adult arrests increased 4 percent while juvenile arrests decreased 8 percent.
- Males accounted for 94 percent and females 6 percent of the burglary arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 40 percent of all burglary arrests.
- Sixty percent of burglary arrests were white, 40 percent were black and less than one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of the arrests.
- Fourteen percent of the burglaries statewide were cleared and juveniles accounted for 28 percent of these clearances.

# LARCENY-THEFT

## Definition

The definition of larceny-theft, as provided under this program, is the taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocketpicking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad checks are not included.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 218,883 larcenies reported in 1988, a decrease of less than one half of one percent compared to the 219,722 in 1987.
- Larceny accounted for 54 percent of the total Crime Index and 60 percent of all nonviolent crime.
- The larceny victimization rate decreased to 28.5 victims for every 1,000 population in 1988. This represents a 1 percent decrease over the rate of 28.8 in 1987.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories and thefts from motor vehicles, collectively accounted for 40 percent of all larceny-thefts reported.
- Pocket-picking increased 13 percent in 1988 compared to 1987.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Larceny-theft arrests decreased 1 percent in 1988, with 41,173 persons arrested.
- Juvenile arrests decreased 7 percent and adult arrests increased 3 percent.
- Males accounted for 70 percent and females 30 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-six percent of all persons arrested for larceny were white, 43 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of the arrests.
- Nineteen percent of the larcenies were cleared with juveniles accounting for 25 percent of the clearances.

# MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

## Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, motor vehicle theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle which is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on the rails. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle. The motor vehicle theft category includes the subheadings of autos, trucks and buses, and other vehicles (motorcycles, mo-peds, etc.)

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 68,970 motor vehicle thefts reported in 1988, a 7 percent increase compared to the 64,599 reported in 1987.
- Motor vehicle thefts accounted for 17 percent of the total Crime Index and 19 percent of the nonviolent crime.
- The motor vehicle theft rate of 9.0 victims per 1,000 population represents a 6 percent increase compared to 1987.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Motor vehicles represented 68 percent of the total value of property stolen during 1988.
- Total value of stolen motor vehicles amounted to \$436.7 million during the year.
- The average value of a stolen motor vehicle was \$6,332.
- Vehicles valued at \$297.4 million represent 95 percent of the total value of recovered property during 1988.

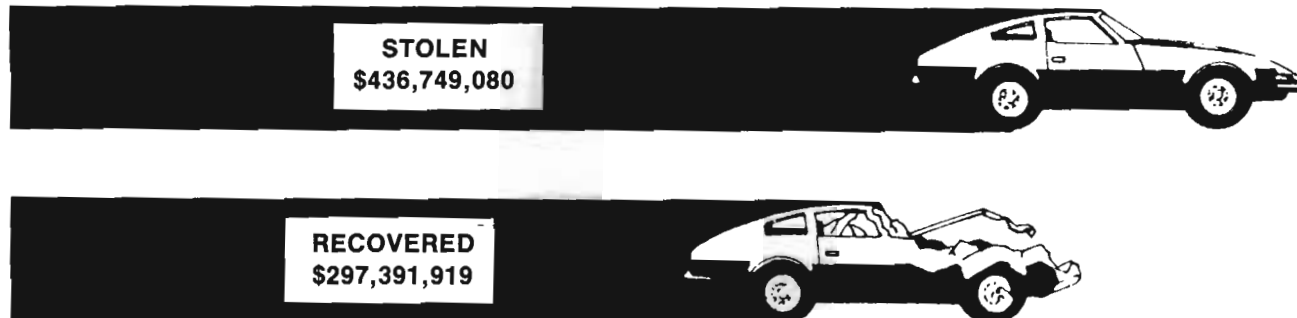
## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 3,532 persons were arrested for motor vehicle theft, this represents a 6 percent increase compared to 1987.
- Juvenile arrests increased 10 percent, while adult arrests increased 1 percent.
- Males accounted for 94 percent, and females 6 percent of the motor vehicle theft arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 57 percent of the motor vehicle theft arrests.
- Forty-nine percent of all persons arrested for motor vehicle theft were white and 51 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 16 percent of the arrests.
- Five percent of the motor vehicle thefts were cleared in 1988, juveniles accounted for 35 percent of these clearances.

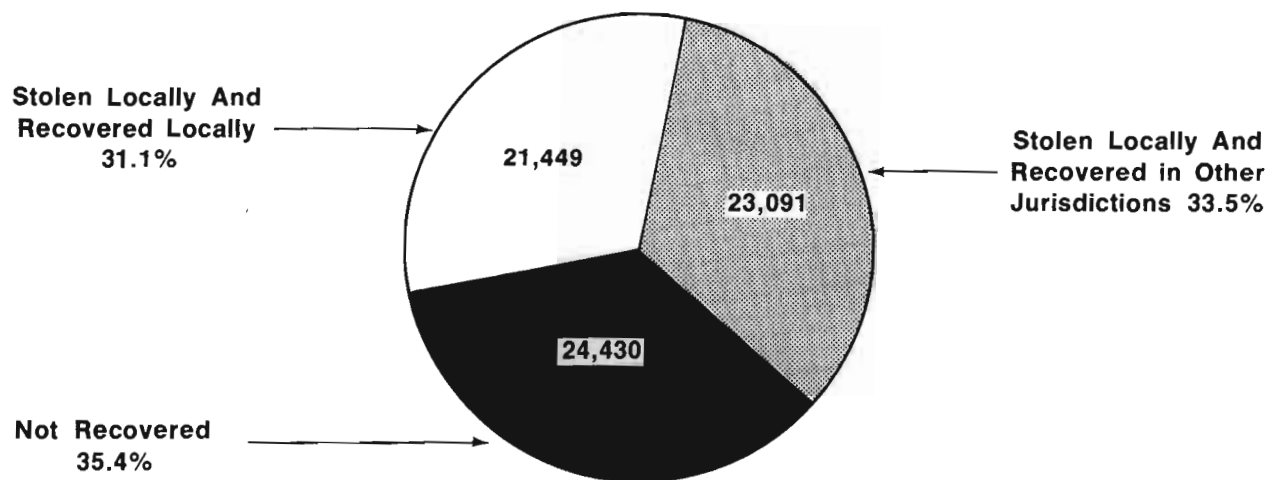

# ARSON

## Definition

Arson is defined by the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 2,631 reportable arsons in 1988, which represents a 2 percent decrease compared to 2,675 in 1987.
- The arson rate decreased to 0.3 victims per 1,000 population.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Fifty-seven percent of the arsons were structures, with residences accounting for 61 percent of that total.
- Mobile property, including motor vehicles, accounted for 33 percent of the arsons in the state.
- Other property (timber, crops, etc.) accounted for 10 percent of the reported arsons.
- The total value of property damage due to arson, amounted to \$37.6 million for an average dollar value loss of \$14,286.
- The average residential loss was \$21,830 while the average loss to industrial/commercial structures was \$40,364.
- The average motor vehicle loss was \$4,654.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arson arrests numbered 671 in 1988, representing a 15 percent increase.
- Adult arrests increased 10 percent, while juvenile arrests increased 23 percent.
- Males accounted for 90 percent and females 10 percent of the arson arrests in 1988.
- Juveniles accounted for 41 percent of the arson arrests.
- Sixty-nine percent of the persons arrested for arson were white, 30 percent were black and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of the arrests.
- The arson clearance rate was 22 percent and juveniles accounted for 34 percent of the clearances.

# ARREST SUMMARY FOR NON-INDEX OFFENSES

## MANSLAUGHTER

### Definition

The unlawful killing of a human being, by another, through gross negligence. Arrests relating to traffic fatalities are included.

- There were 52 arrests reported by law enforcement agencies of the state for manslaughter during the year. This represents a 53 percent increase compared to 1987.
- Adults accounted for 83 percent and juveniles accounted for 17 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 92 percent of the arrests and females 8 percent.
- Sixty-five percent of the persons arrested were white, 35 percent were black.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 12 percent of the arrests and 88 percent were Non-Hispanic.

## SIMPLE ASSAULT

### Definition

Simple assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an assault or an attempted assault where no weapon is used and which does not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

- There were 37,339 simple assault arrests in 1988, representing a 13 percent increase when compared to 1987.
- Of the total, 22 percent were juveniles and 78 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 83 percent and females 17 percent of the persons arrested for simple assault.
- Sixty-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 37 percent were black, and less than 1 percent were other races.
- Ten percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 90 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

## ARSON

### Definition

Under this program, arson is defined as the willful or malicious burning, or attempting to burn, with or without intent to defraud; a dwelling house, building, ship or vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft, contents of building, personal property of another, etc.

- There were 671 arrests reported for arson offenses, a 15 percent increase compared to 1987.
- Juveniles accounted for 41 percent and adults 59 percent of persons arrested for arson.
- Ninety percent of the total arson arrests were males while 10 percent were females.
- Sixty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, 30 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of those arrested and Non-Hispanics accounted for 89 percent.



# FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING

## Definition

The definition of forgery and counterfeiting is the making, altering, uttering or possessing or attempting to make, alter, utter or possess, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true.

- There were 1,411 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for forgery or counterfeiting during the year. This represents a 16 percent increase compared to 1987.
- Adults accounted for 93 percent and juveniles accounted for 7 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 68 percent of the arrests and females 32 percent.
- Sixty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 37 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 9 percent of the arrests and 91 percent were Non-Hispanic.

# FRAUD

## Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, fraud is the fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. This includes bad checks, confidence games, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

- There were 7,515 arrests reported during the year for fraud, a 4 percent increase compared to 1987.
- Adult arrests represented 97 percent and juveniles 3 percent of the persons arrested.
- Males accounted for 59 percent and females 41 percent of the persons arrested for fraud.
- Sixty-five percent of the persons arrested were white, 34 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Six percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 94 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

# EMBEZZLEMENT

## Definition

The definition of embezzlement is the misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

- There were 143 persons arrested for embezzlement, a 25 percent decrease compared to 1987.
- Seventy-nine percent of those persons arrested were adults and 21 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 62 percent and females 38 percent of the persons arrested for embezzlement.
- Sixty-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 37 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of those arrested and Non-Hispanics accounted for 85 percent.

## **STOLEN PROPERTY (Buying, Receiving, Possessing)**

### **Definition**

Included in this class are all offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

- In 1988, there were 13,906 arrests reported for stolen property, an increase of 12 percent compared to 1987.
- Of the total, 59 percent were adults and 41 percent were juveniles.
- Eighty-nine percent were males and 11 percent were females.
- Forty-one percent of the persons arrested were white, 58 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 16 percent of the arrests and 84 percent were Non-Hispanic.

## **CRIMINAL/MALICIOUS MISCHIEF**

### **Definition**

Criminal/malicious mischief is defined as the willful destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

- There were 13,007 arrests for criminal/malicious mischief; an increase of 1 percent compared to 1987.
- Juveniles accounted for 57 percent and adults 43 percent of persons arrested for criminal/malicious mischief.
- Males accounted for 90 percent and females 10 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 27 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Ten percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and Non-Hispanics accounted for 90 percent.

## **WEAPONS: CARRYING, POSSESSING, etc.**

### **Definition**

Under the program, this offense includes all the violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers, and attempts.

- There were 8,797 arrests reported for weapon offenses; a 15 percent increase compared to 1987.
- Of the total, 77 percent were adults and 23 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 93 percent and females 7 percent of those arrested.
- Fifty-six percent of those arrested were white, 44 percent were black, and less than one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 12 percent of those arrested and 88 percent were Non-Hispanic.

# PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE

## Definition

Prostitution and commercialized vice are sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts. Included in this category are prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes, etc.

- There were 1,881 arrests reported for prostitution and commercialized vice during 1988, representing an increase of 6 percent when compared to 1987.
- Ninety-nine percent of the arrests were adults with the remaining 1 percent being juveniles.
- Females accounted for 69 percent and males 31 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-six percent of those arrested were black, 42 percent were white, and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 9 percent of the arrests and 91 percent were not Hispanic.

# SEX OFFENSES

## Definition

Sex offenses, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, do not include rape, prostitution and commercialized vice. Included in this class are offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like; attempts are also included.

- There were 2,510 sex offense arrests during 1988, representing an increase of 15 percent when compared to 1987.
- Adults accounted for 83 percent, and juveniles 17 percent of the arrests.
- Ninety-six percent were males and 4 percent were females.
- Seventy-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 26 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Eleven percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 89 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

# DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS

## Definition

Under the program, drug abuse violations are defined as the unlawful sale/manufacturing, possession/use of the below listed narcotics and drugs:

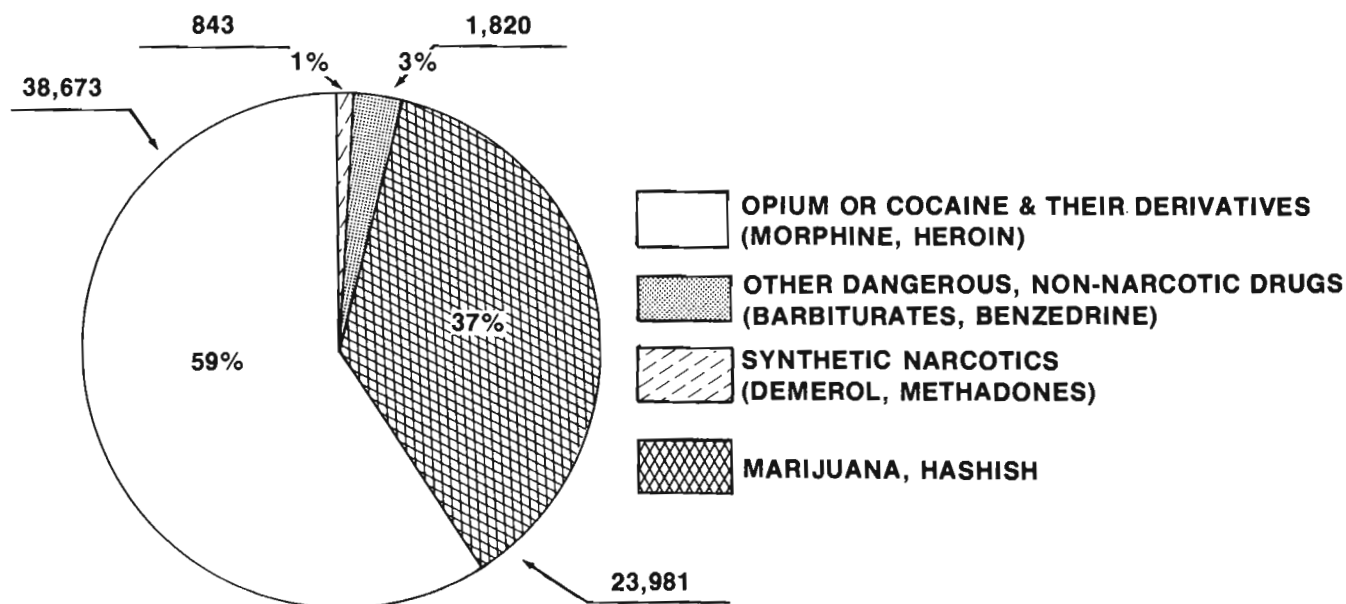
- a. Opium or Cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine).
- b. Marijuana, hashish, etc.
- c. Synthetic narcotics—manufactured narcotics which can cause true drug addiction—(demerol, methadones).
- d. Other—dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, amphetamines, hallucinogens).

- There were 65,317 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for drug abuse violations; a 29 percent increase compared to 1987.
- Adults accounted for 86 percent and juveniles 14 percent of the arrests.

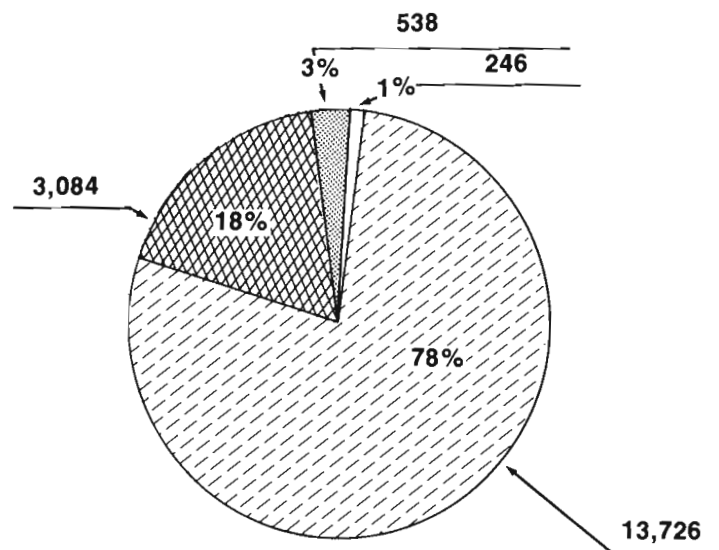
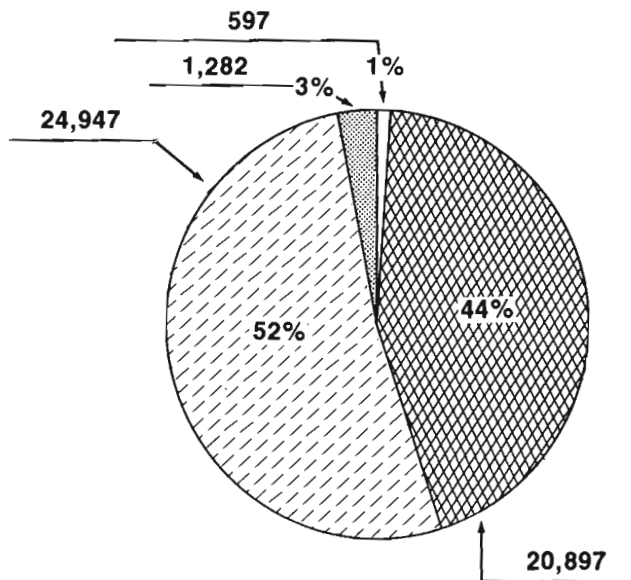
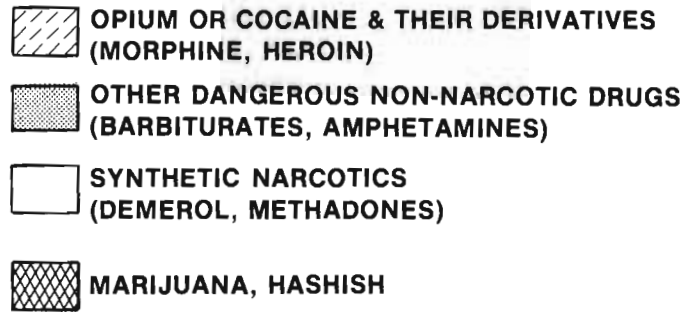
- Thirty-four percent of persons arrested for drug abuse violations were under the age of 21.
- Males accounted for 87 percent of all the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 13 percent.
- Fifty percent of the persons arrested were white, 50 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 12 percent of those arrested and 88 percent were not Hispanic.
- Arrests for possession/use of drugs accounted for 73 percent of the arrests, and the remaining 27 percent were for the sale/manufacturing of drugs.
- Arrests for opium or cocaine and their derivatives represented 52 percent of the possession/use category and 78 percent of the sale/manufacturing category. Overall, they accounted for 59 percent of the total drug abuse violation arrests.

# GAMBLING

## Definition

Gambling violations are defined as the promoting, permitting, or engaging in illegal gambling.

- There were 649 gambling arrests reported during 1988, resulting in an increase of 84 percent compared to 1987.
- Eighty-five percent of the arrests were adults and 15 percent were juveniles.
- Males represented 85 percent and females 15 percent of the gambling arrests.
- Seventy-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, 19 percent were black, and 3 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of the arrests and 85 percent were not Hispanic.

# OFFENSES AGAINST FAMILY AND CHILDREN

## Definition

The definition of offenses against family and children, is the nonsupport, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.

- There were 7,364 arrests for offenses against family and children during 1988, representing an increase of 14 percent from the previous year.
- Less than one half of one percent of the arrests were juveniles, and nearly 100 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 93 percent and females 7 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 46 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 7 percent of the arrests and 93 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

# DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE

## Definition

Under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, the offense of driving under the influence is defined as the driving or operating of any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of alcohol or narcotics.

- There were 42,387 arrests reported for driving under the influence in 1988, an increase of 12 percent compared to 1987.
- Ninety-nine percent of the arrests were adults and only 1 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 89 percent of the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 11 percent.
- Eighty-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, 12 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Eight percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 92 percent were not Hispanic.

## LIQUOR LAWS

### Definition

Included in this category are state or local liquor law violations, with the exception of "driving under the influence."

- There were 16,497 arrests reported for liquor law violations, a decrease of less than one half of one percent when compared to the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 67 percent of the arrests while the remaining 33 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 81 percent of the liquor law arrests while females accounted for the remaining 19 percent.
- Ninety-one percent of the persons arrested were white, 9 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 5 percent of those arrested and 95 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

## DISORDERLY CONDUCT

### Definition

In this category are placed all charges of committing a breach of the peace (disorderly person).

- There were 39,319 arrests for disorderly conduct in 1988, an increase of 3 percent when compared to 1987.
- Seventy-one percent of the arrests were adults while the remaining 29 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 83 percent and females 17 percent of the disorderly conduct arrests.
- Sixty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, 31 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 9 percent of the arrests and 91 percent of those arrested were not Hispanic.

## VAGRANCY

### Definition

In this category are persons charged with vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

- There were 114 arrests in this category during the year, a 7 percent decrease compared to 1987.
- Juveniles accounted for 53 percent of the arrests while adults accounted for the remaining 47 percent.
- Males represented 85 percent and females 15 percent of the arrests in this category.
- Sixty-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, 32 percent were black, and less than one percent were other races.
- Eleven percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 89 percent were Non-Hispanic.

## ALL OTHER OFFENSES

### Definition

Included in this category are all violations of state and local laws, except those offenses that can be categorized into one of the specific crime classifications previously mentioned.

- There were 81,202 arrests reported for all other offenses during 1988, an 11 percent increase compared to 1987.
- Adults accounted for 85 percent and juveniles 15 percent of persons arrested for all other offenses.
- Eighty-four percent of the arrests were males while 16 percent were females.
- Sixty-five percent of the persons arrested were white, 35 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 9 percent of those arrested and 91 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

## CURFEW AND LOITERING LAW VIOLATIONS

### Definition

In this category are juvenile arrests made for violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances.

- There were 1,490 arrests reported for curfew and loitering law violations during 1988; this represents a 7 percent decrease compared to 1987.
- Males represented 82 percent and females 18 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty-four percent of the persons arrested were white, 35 percent were black, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 10 percent of the arrests and non-Hispanics accounted for 90 percent of those arrested.

## RUNAWAYS

### Definition

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, this category is limited to juveniles taken into protective custody, under provisions of local statutes, as runaways.

- There were 6,622 runaway arrests reported in 1988, a 2 percent increase compared to 1987.
- Females accounted for 54 percent and males accounted for 46 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty-one percent of the persons arrested were white, 38 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- Twelve percent of the persons arrested were Hispanic and 88 percent were not of Hispanic origin.

- Larceny increased 9 percent while robbery increased 17 percent.
- A total of \$41.1 million of property was stolen during the commission of Index crimes; of this 55 percent was recovered.

#### **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- A total of 24,290 persons were arrested during the year, a 3 percent increase when compared to 1987.
- Adult arrests increased 4 percent; juvenile arrests increased 2 percent.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 21 percent; juveniles were responsible for 20 percent of those cases cleared.

### **SALEM COUNTY**

#### **VOLUME/RATE**

- During 1988 there were 2,079 Index crimes reported to law enforcement agencies of the county, representing a 12 percent decrease compared to the previous year.
- Violent crime increased 11 percent while nonviolent crime registered a 14 percent decrease.
- There were 31.8 victims of Index offenses for every 1,000 inhabitants of the county, a 12 percent decrease when compared to 1987.
- Larceny-theft decreased 20 percent while aggravated assault increased 28 percent.
- The dollar loss of stolen property amounted to \$1.5 million; the recovery rate was 42 percent.

#### **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- Police arrested 5,595 persons for criminal offenses during the calendar year 1988, a 20 percent increase over 1987.
- Adult arrests increased 23 percent and juvenile arrests increased 5 percent.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 30 percent; juveniles were responsible for 25 percent of those cases cleared.

### **SOMERSET COUNTY**

#### **VOLUME/RATE**

- During 1988 there were 7,062 Index offenses reported in the county, an increase of 9 percent.
- Violent crime registered an increase of 20 percent while nonviolent crime recorded an increase of 9 percent.
- For every 1,000 inhabitants 31.9 persons were victims of Index offenses, an increase of 6 percent compared to 1987.
- Robbery increased 36 percent, and larceny increased 11 percent.
- The total dollar loss of property stolen amounted to \$10.3 million, with 40 percent of this recovered.

#### **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- Police arrested 9,249 persons in 1988; an 11 percent increase when compared to 1987.
- Adult arrests increased 14 percent while juvenile arrests showed an increase of 3 percent.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 20 percent; juveniles were responsible for 27 percent of those cases cleared.



## **SUSSEX COUNTY**

### **VOLUME/RATE**

- Law enforcement agencies of the county reported 2,724 Index crimes during 1988, a decrease of 2 percent compared to the previous year.
- Violent crime increased 25 percent while nonviolent crime recorded a 3 percent decrease for the year.
- For every 1,000 persons 21.9 were victims of Index offenses; a 4 percent decrease compared to 1987.
- Aggravated assault increased 39 percent compared to 1987.
- Stolen property values totaled \$2.0 million; of this amount 26 percent was recovered.

### **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- There were 3,785 arrests made in the county during 1988, a 1 percent decrease compared to the previous year.
- Adult arrests reflected no significant change while juvenile arrests decreased 3 percent when compared to the previous year.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 22 percent; juveniles were responsible for 27 percent of those cases cleared.

## **UNION COUNTY**

### **VOLUME/RATE**

- In 1988, there were 27,839 Index crimes reported by police, representing a 1 percent decrease when compared to the previous year.
- Violent crime increased 4 percent while nonviolent crime registered a 1 percent decrease.
- The county's victimization rate was recorded at 55.4 for every 1,000 inhabitants, which is no significant change when compared to 1987.
- Aggravated assault increased 14 percent and motor vehicle theft increased 8 percent.
- Stolen property value amounted to \$62.2 million, with 58 percent of this being recovered.

### **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- Police of the county arrested 23,625 persons during 1988, an increase of 2 percent compared to 1987.
- Adult arrests registered a 7 percent increase while juvenile arrests decreased 8 percent.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 14 percent; juveniles were responsible for 24 percent of those cases cleared.

## **WARREN COUNTY**

### **VOLUME/RATE**

- During the year police of the county reported 1,987 Index crimes, an increase of 6 percent when compared to the previous year.
- Violent crime registered a 19 percent decrease while nonviolent crime increased 8 percent.
- The Index crime rate was 22.8 victims per 1,000 inhabitants, a 5 percent increase compared to 1987.
- Burglary increased 18 percent, while motor vehicle theft increased 55 percent.
- The dollar loss of stolen property amounted to \$2.3 million, of which 41 percent was recovered.

**ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- There were 4,216 persons arrested during the year, a 7 percent decrease when compared to 1987.
- Adult arrests revealed no significant change, while juvenile arrests decreased 26 percent.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 24 percent; juveniles were responsible for 27 percent of those cases cleared.

## CRIME INDEX FOR POPULATION GROUPS—1988

The presentation of crime statistics by population groups was made for the purpose of projecting, for consideration, the relative crime experience of communities of varying populations. Although the individual municipalities within the various groups may be geographically separated, their inclusion into a specific group was predicted by the similarity in population with the other municipalities within the group. Municipalities within the same group may differ widely when all factors are considered, but they do share the common bond of population size. The grouping of communities in this manner allows recognition of variances in the crime volumes, rates and clearances between the established groups.

# **SECTION VI**

## **CRIME IN THE CITIES**

## CRIME IN THE CITIES

This section deals with serious crimes reported in the large urban cities of the state. These cities represent 21 percent of the population and historically account for one third of the reported Crime Index of the state.

This analysis involves the latest ten year period 1979-1988 and endeavors to further identify crime trends in these urban areas.

The cities included in this analysis have been categorized as urban municipalities (i.e., densely populated with extensive development) by the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning.

The criteria used in the selection of these cities were (1) to be classified as urban character and (2) have a population of 50,000 or more inhabitants.

For further comparative analysis, the urban cities were subdivided into two distinct groupings.

Group number one consisted of the state's six largest urban centers with populations of 80,000 or over and is categorized as the "Major Urban."

The second group included the "Major Urban" and the additional urban communities with populations of 50,000 or more inhabitants, and is referred to as the "Urban 15."

#### Distribution

- Six major urban centers—Camden, Newark, Jersey City, Trenton, Paterson and Elizabeth—collectively represent 12 percent of New Jersey's total population. These same urban centers, during the period 1979 through 1988 accounted for 24 percent of the state's total crime.
- The six centers from 1979 through 1988 accounted for 50 percent of all violent crime and 21 percent of the nonviolent crimes in the entire state.
- The 15 urban municipalities represent 20 percent of the state's total population.
- For the period 1979 through 1988 these 15 urban municipalities accounted for 34 percent of New Jersey's total Index, 60 percent of all violent crime, and 31 percent of the state's nonviolent crime.
- Nearly 7 out of every 10 robberies reported occurred in the "Urban 15" cities during this ten year period.

#### Percent Change

- During the ten year period 1979-1988, the Crime Index in New Jersey has decreased 4 percent, while the "Urban 15" cities increased 10 percent and the six major urban cities increased 13 percent.
- Violent crime in the state increased 23 percent, the 15 urban cities increased 27 percent and the six major cities increased 23 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in the state decreased 7 percent, the "Urban 15" increased 7 percent, and the six major cities increased 11 percent.



# STREET CRIME

There has never been a clear-cut definition for street crime within the criminal justice system. The nation's clearing house for the collection and dissemination of criminal statistics, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has no criteria in the categorization of specific crimes to be designated or defined as "street crimes." More and more this media term has been confused with the violent crime group of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

Although any particular crime can and does occur on the street, this analysis, because of reporting constraints within the Uniform Crime Reporting System, is limited to defining street crimes as those offenses which occur, or are most likely to occur, on streets, highways, parking lots, etc. These crimes include highway robbery, purse-snatching, theft from autos, theft of auto parts and accessories, theft of bicycles, and motor vehicle thefts. All are crimes against property and only one, highway robbery, falls in the violent crime group.

- During the ten year period 1979-1988, the "Urban 15" cities accounted for 39 percent of the street crimes in the state.
- Three out of every 4 highway robberies occurred in the "Urban 15" during the ten year period.
- More than half of all motor vehicle thefts during the survey span occurred in these 15 urban municipalities.
- Fifty-four percent of all purse-snatchings were perpetrated in the "Urban 15" cities.

The accompanying table reflects percent distribution of street crime for the "Urban 15" cities for the years 1979-1988.

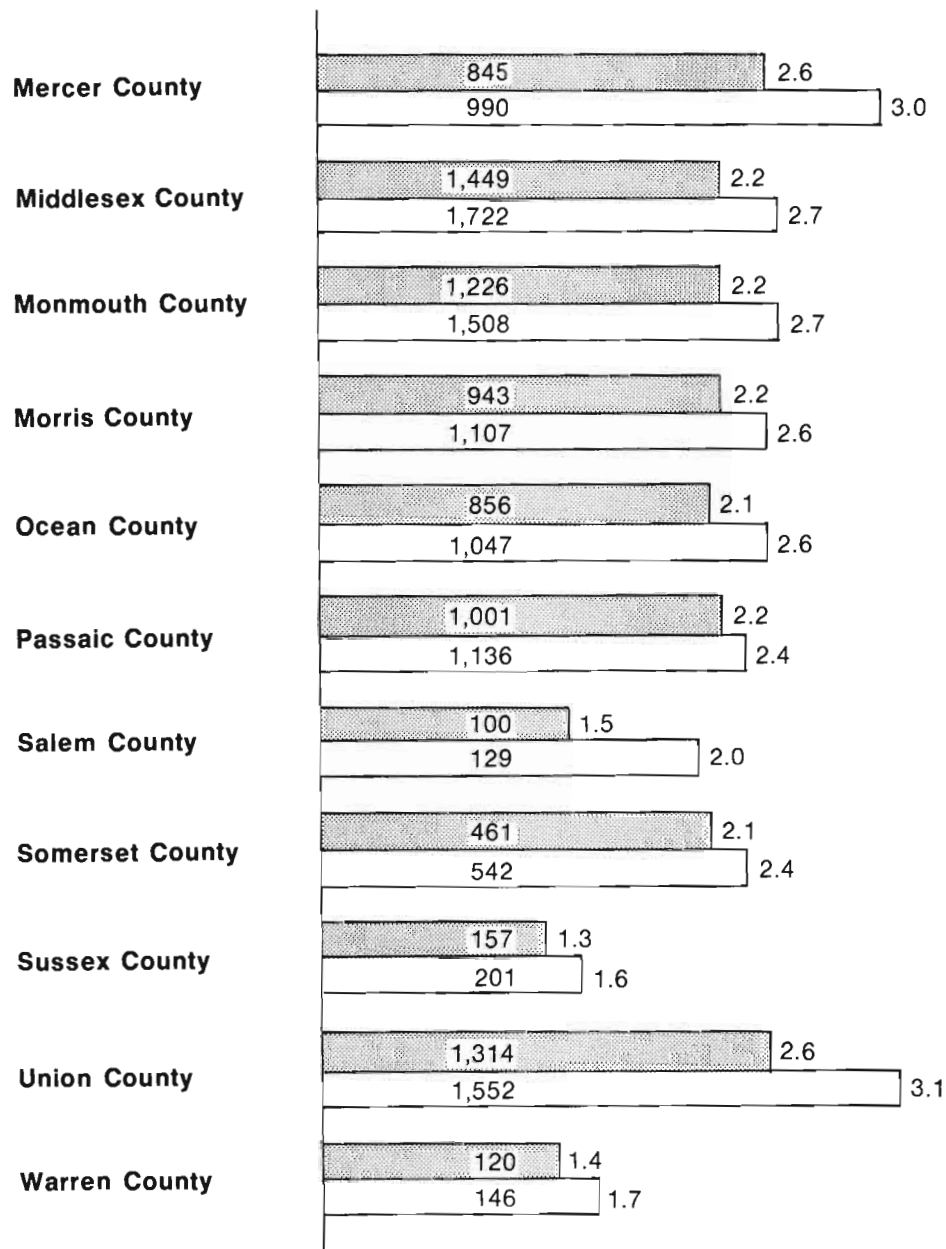
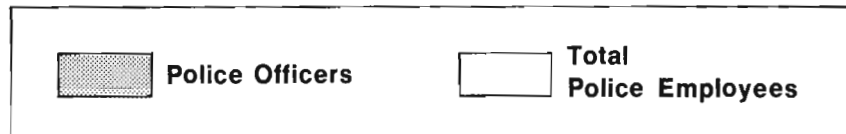

## **POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA**

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey incorporates the collection of pertinent data relating to the police of the state. Information regarding police employee strength, and trends are discussed in this section.

Individual listings of full-time state, county, university and college police departments are shown in tables within this section. Listings of municipal police departments will be found in Section VII.

The determination of police strength for any given area or municipality should be subject for serious consideration. Such consideration, however, should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. For example, the increased need for police service in a municipality which has a highly mobile or seasonal population, differs from a municipality which has a relatively stable population. Some other factors, discussed elsewhere in this publication, relate to size, density of population, geographic location, character, and proximity to metropolitan areas. The tables and charts shown in this section should not be interpreted as recommended strength for any given municipality.

## **TOTAL POLICE EMPLOYEES**

Total police employees are defined as the total number of full-time police officers and civilian police employees (clerks, dispatchers, mechanics, etc.) employed by all law enforcement agencies in the state.

- During 1988, there were 43,189 full time police employees in New Jersey. This represents a 5 percent increase compared to the 41,277 full time police employees in 1987.
- The number of full time police officers increased 4 percent, from 30,650 in 1987 to 31,837 in 1988.
- The number of full time civilian employees increased 7 percent, from 10,627 in 1987 to 11,352 in 1988.
- Seventy-four percent were sworn officers and the remaining 26 percent were civilian employees.

## **MUNICIPAL POLICE EMPLOYEES**

This category consists of the number of police employees, including civilian personnel, employed full time by municipalities of the state.

- During 1988, there were 21,510 municipal police employees, an increase of 2 percent compared to the 20,993 in 1987.
- There were 2.8 municipal police employees for every 1,000 inhabitants of the state.
- Cape May County reported the largest increase in municipal police employees, an increase of 11 percent (41 employees).
- Atlantic County recorded the highest police employee rate; 5.1 per 1,000 population; (this rate is computed on the static population and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population.)
- Hunterdon County recorded the lowest police employee rate of 1.5 per 1,000 population.



## OTHER POLICE (State Agencies)

In addition to the State Police, there were nine other state agencies reporting to the System. These agencies consist of: N.J. Forest Fire Service, Division of Parks & Forestry, Department of Corrections, Department of Human Services, Division of Criminal Justice, Division of Fish and Game, Office of Weights and Measures, Palisades Interstate Park and N.J. Transit Police. No rates were computed due to the variations in the types of police service rendered, and their statewide jurisdictions.

- Together, these agencies reported a total of 9,550 full-time police employees; a 6 percent increase compared to the 8,982 police employees in 1987.
- There were 4,982 sworn police officers in 1988, an increase of 8 percent compared to the 4,632 in 1987.
- These agencies reported 4,568 civilian police employees in 1988, representing a 5 percent increase compared to the 4,350 reported in 1987.
- Fifty-two percent were sworn personnel, while the remaining 48 percent were civilians.

## MUNICIPAL CIVILIAN POLICE EMPLOYEES

The personnel of each department differ as to the demands and responsibilities placed before them. Many police officers are fully occupied with clerical tasks and are not free to perform active police duties. Employing civilians in police departments to perform clerical duties is in line with the thinking of many police administrators who recommended the use of civilians in this capacity, thus freeing the sworn personnel for actual police related services.

- There were 3,195 municipal civilian police employees in 1988, an increase of 7 percent compared to the 2,983 in 1987.
- Fifteen percent of all municipal police employees were civilians.

## MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

This includes the number of sworn police officers employed full-time by municipalities of the state. The police employee rate per 1,000 population presented here should not be construed as being recommended ratios. The determination of police strength for any municipality should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. These factors, as crime, vary in type and degree from place to place. Some examples are: seasonal population, geographic location, density and composition of the population.

- There were 18,315 full-time municipal police officers in 1988; this represents a 2 percent increase compared to the 18,010 full-time municipal police officers in 1987.
- The number of full-time municipal police officers was calculated at 2.4 per 1,000 population; this represents no change when compared to 1987.
- Eighty-five percent of all municipal police employees were sworn officers.
- The largest numerical increase occurred in Middlesex County; an increase of 49 municipal police officers, or 4 percent.
- The largest numerical decrease occurred in Essex County; a decrease of 36 municipal police officers, or 1 percent.
- Atlantic County, with 3.9 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants, recorded the highest rate of full-time municipal police officers. (This rate is computed on the static population, and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population.)
- Hunterdon and Sussex Counties recorded the lowest rate of full-time municipal police officers with 1.3 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

# COUNTY POLICE, SHERIFFS, AND PROSECUTORS

The functions of county law enforcement vary widely throughout the state. The operation of one sheriff's department may be limited exclusively to civil areas and the administration of the county jail, or they may be actively involved in criminal matters throughout the county.

County police departments are varied in their activities as well, in that some are responsible for enforcement throughout the county, while others may have as their primary mission the policing of county parklands. The responsibilities of county prosecutors' officers include criminal investigations, trial preparation, court presentation and special probes. Because of the difference in the types of police service rendered, rates for county law enforcement agencies are not presented here.

- County law enforcement agencies reported a total of 7,214 full-time police employees in 1988; an increase of 8 percent compared to the 6,685 in 1987.
- There were 5,198 full-time sworn police officers employed by county agencies in 1988. This represents an increase of 7 percent compared to the 4,865 in 1987.
- The county police agencies reported 2,016 civilian police employees in 1988; an 11 percent increase compared to the 1,820 in 1987.
- Seventy-two percent were sworn personnel while the remaining 28 percent were civilians.

## STATE POLICE

The State Police total includes personnel from the Marine Police, Alcoholic Beverage Control Enforcement Bureau, and Capitol Police. The breakdown for each bureau is depicted on the State Police Personnel chart.

The New Jersey State Police is empowered to provide all phases of law enforcement throughout the state. It also renders, upon request, police services to all the law enforcement agencies in the state. No rates are used due to the variations in the nature and extent of the police services performed by the State Police.

- The New Jersey State Police reported 4,164 full-time police employees; an increase of 5 percent compared to the 3,952 in 1987.
- There were 2,945 State Police officers in 1988 an increase of 6 percent compared to the 2,781 in 1987.
- The State Police reported 1,219 civilian employees in 1988; an increase of 4 percent compared to the 1,171 in 1987.
- Seventy-one percent of the total State Police employees were sworn personnel, while the remaining 29 percent were civilians.

# POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED

The killing or assault of a police officer has a deleterious effect on society that reaches far beyond the overt act. Such occurrences constitute an immediate threat to the well-being of the community and serious breach of the internal security of the country. Today a young man who considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the very strong possibility of being killed or assaulted by a member of the very same society he is sworn to protect. This deplorable situation should be a subject of serious public concern, for in truth, an attack on a police officer is an attack on society. The violence directed against law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty is clearly demonstrated by the following information.

## POLICE FELONIOUSLY KILLED

### VOLUME/TREND

- In 1988, there were no New Jersey police officers killed as a result of criminal action.
- Since the inception of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program in 1967, forty-seven police officers have been feloniously killed in the line of duty.

## ASSAULTS ON POLICE OFFICERS

Police assault statistics are important to the police administrator who attempts to identify the causative factors of this type of criminal activity. Many factors contribute to police assaults, and circumstances vary from place to place. It is therefore extremely difficult to identify specific reasons for these assaults. The following information illustrates the frequency of these events, and any attempt at analysis of these assaults should include consideration of the unique variables present in each jurisdiction. Due to the broad field of services performed by many state and county police agencies, no assault rates are computed for total police officers.

### VOLUME/TREND

- There were 4,796 police officers assaulted in 1988, a 6 percent increase compared to the 4,533 in 1987.

### ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Twenty-eight percent (1,360) of the officers assaulted sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 86 percent of all police assaults.
- Twenty-nine percent of police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Seventeen percent of the assaults on police officers occurred during the two hour period of 8:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

### CLEARANCES

- The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing 98 percent of the assaults directed at them.



# ASSAULTS ON MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 4,173 municipal police officers assaulted during 1988, a 6 percent increase compared to the 3,948 assaulted in 1987.
- The assault rate, for every 100 municipal officers, was 22.8; a 4 percent increase compared to 1987.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Twenty-six percent of the municipal officers assaulted sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 86 percent of all municipal police assaults.
- Thirty-three percent of municipal police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Attempting Other Arrests accounted for 21 percent of municipal police assaults.

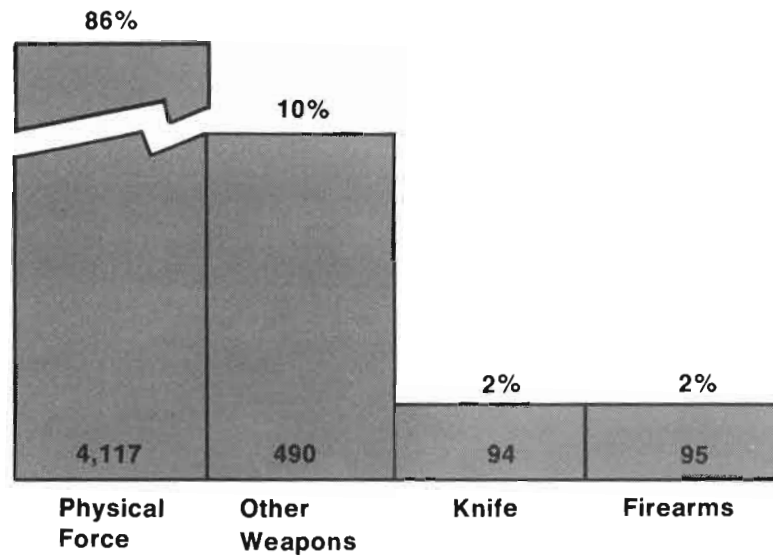
## OTHER POLICE OFFICERS ASSAULTED

The following law enforcement agencies are dealt with separately and, are not included when computing municipal assault rates; the services performed by these agencies vary greatly from the functions of municipal police agencies.

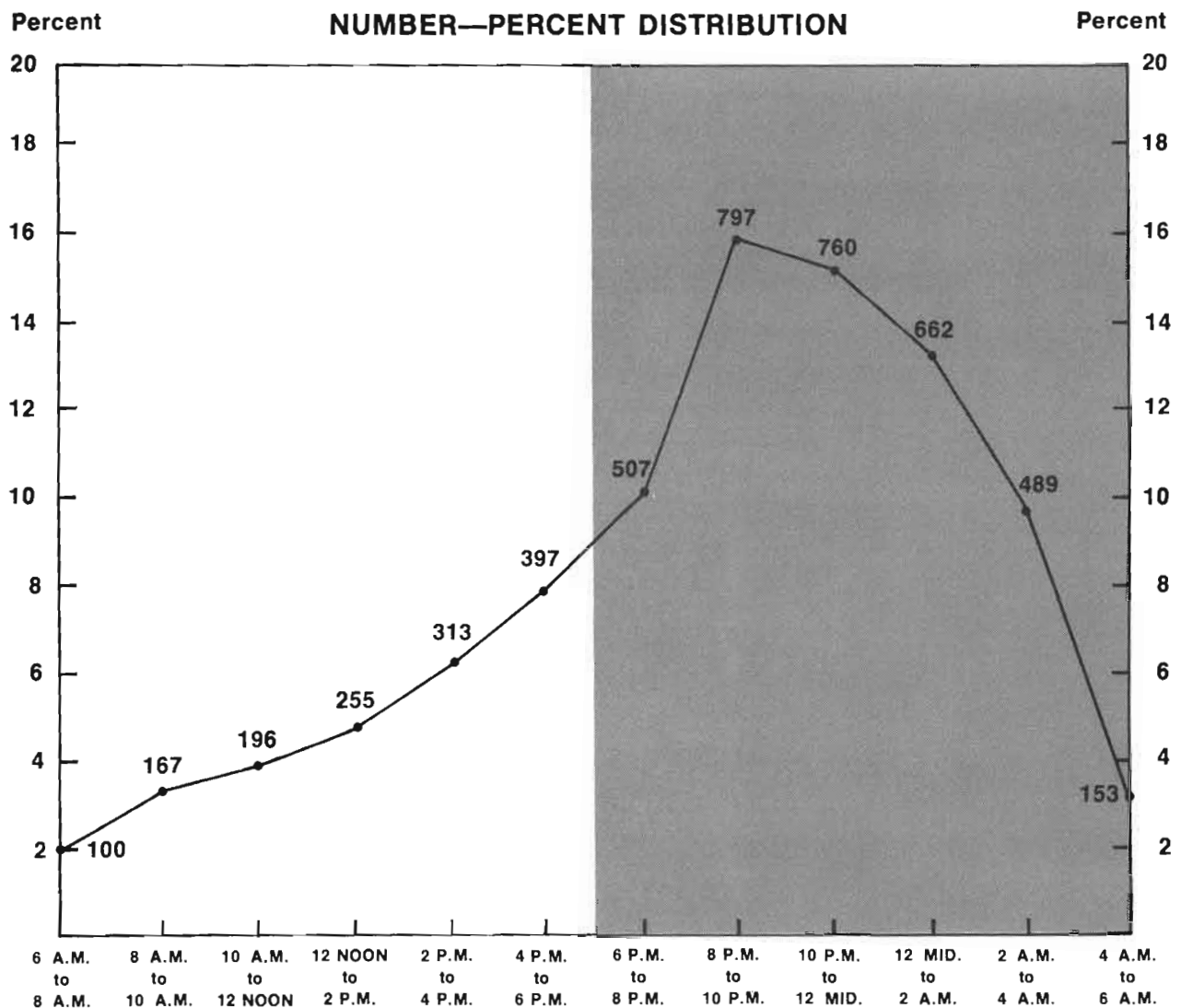
## VOLUME

- County law enforcement agencies reported 228 officers assaulted, with 111 sustaining physical injury.
- The New Jersey State Police reported 171 officers assaulted, with 47 sustaining injury.
- Other state agencies, with police powers, reported 205 officers assaulted and 105 sustaining injury.
- University and college police agencies reported 19 officers assaulted with 7 sustaining injury.

# **SECTION X**

## **DOMESTIC VIOLENCE**



## INTRODUCTION

The violence within the American domicile has been recognized for decades by elements of government and society with little done to correct the problem. Only recently has this phenomenon begun to receive the attention it deserves. In an effort to understand, identify and treat the incidents of abuse occurring within the home, the State of New Jersey, through its legislature, has provided the means to gain a meaningful insight into the issue.

In 1982, the Domestic Violence Act was instituted to protect battered victims and study the complex problems that spark such aggressive behavior. This legislation also provided the opportunity to identify the causes of violence in the home and put forth a more comprehensive effort to combat the crime of Domestic Violence.

Improvements since the implementation of the Domestic Violence Act are continuing; serious concern has been displayed within many municipal and county agencies whereby various committees and working groups have been formed to help battle this important problem. Revised investigation and reporting procedures by the police; improved processing of domestic complaints by the courts; mandatory in-service training for police and court personnel have all enabled the victim to come forward and implement the constitutional rights granted to all Americans.

The following pages of narrative and graphics in this chapter are the result of gathered data displaying the complexities of domestic violence found within the State of New Jersey. As stated in the following pages, reported domestic violence acts increased fourteen percent over 1987. It is through analysis of this data that hopefully, the keys to preventing future violence can be found.

## DOMESTIC VIOLENCE STATISTICAL SUMMARY

Highlights of the 1988 domestic violence statistics are listed below:

- There were 52,209 domestic violence offenses reported by the police in 1988, a 14% increase compared to the 45,962 reported in 1987.
- Murders increased 81% in 1988 (65) when compared to 1987 (36). This represents the highest number of Domestic Violence murders since the inception of the Domestic Violence program.
- Assaults occurred in 64% (33,249) of the reported offenses in 1988.
- The total arrests (16,110) for 1988 increased 48% over 1987.
- Arrests were made in 31% of the offenses reported for 1988.
- The most frequent day of domestic violence occurrences was Sunday (9,742).
- For the sixth consecutive year, the most frequent hours of domestic violence incidents were between 8:00 p.m. and midnight, when 31% of the offenses were reported.
- Children were involved or present during 43% of all domestic violence offenses occurring in 1988. Specifically, 11% were involved and 32% were present.
- Wives were the victims in 40% (21,015), and female friends were the victims in 36% (18,917) of the reported domestic violence offenses in 1988. Overall, females were victims in 85% (44,548) of all domestic violence offenses.
- The number of domestic violence complaints that had prior court orders issued against the offender increased from 7,850 in 1987 to 9,535 in 1988. This is a 21% increase.
- Alcohol and drugs were involved in 44% (23,156) of the reported offenses occurring in 1988. Alcohol involvement alone accounted for 36% (18,895) of the total domestic violence offenses reported.
- Persons age 60 or over, were victims in 3% (1,610) of all reported domestic violence offenses that occurred in 1988.

- Fifty-six percent (29,242) of all domestic violence complaints resulted in injury. This is an 11% increase when compared to the 26,369 that occurred in 1987.
- Of all the domestic violence offenses involving weapons (33,723), hands, fists, feet, etc. (28,865) were used in 86% of these offenses.
- Domestic violence offenses involving a gun increased 34%, from 321 in 1987 to 431 in 1988.
- There were 3,050 serious injuries reported in 1988, a 15% increase when compared to the 2,650 reported in 1987.

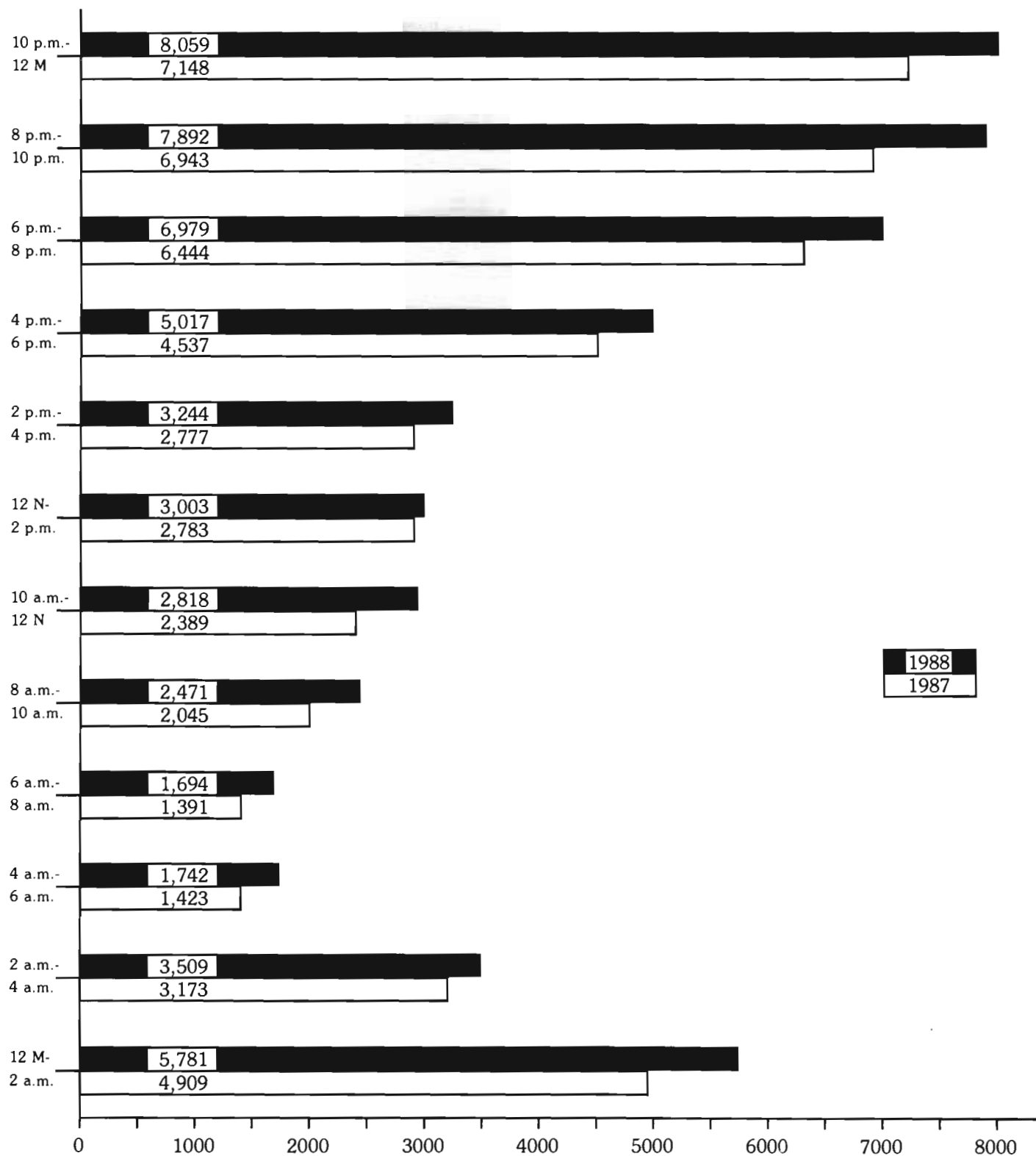

- Wives were the victims in 40% (21,015), and female friends were the victims in 36% (18,917) of the reported domestic violence offenses in 1988. Overall, females were victims in 85% (44,548) of all domestic violence offenses.
- Harassment was the second highest reported domestic violence offense in 1988 (16,064).

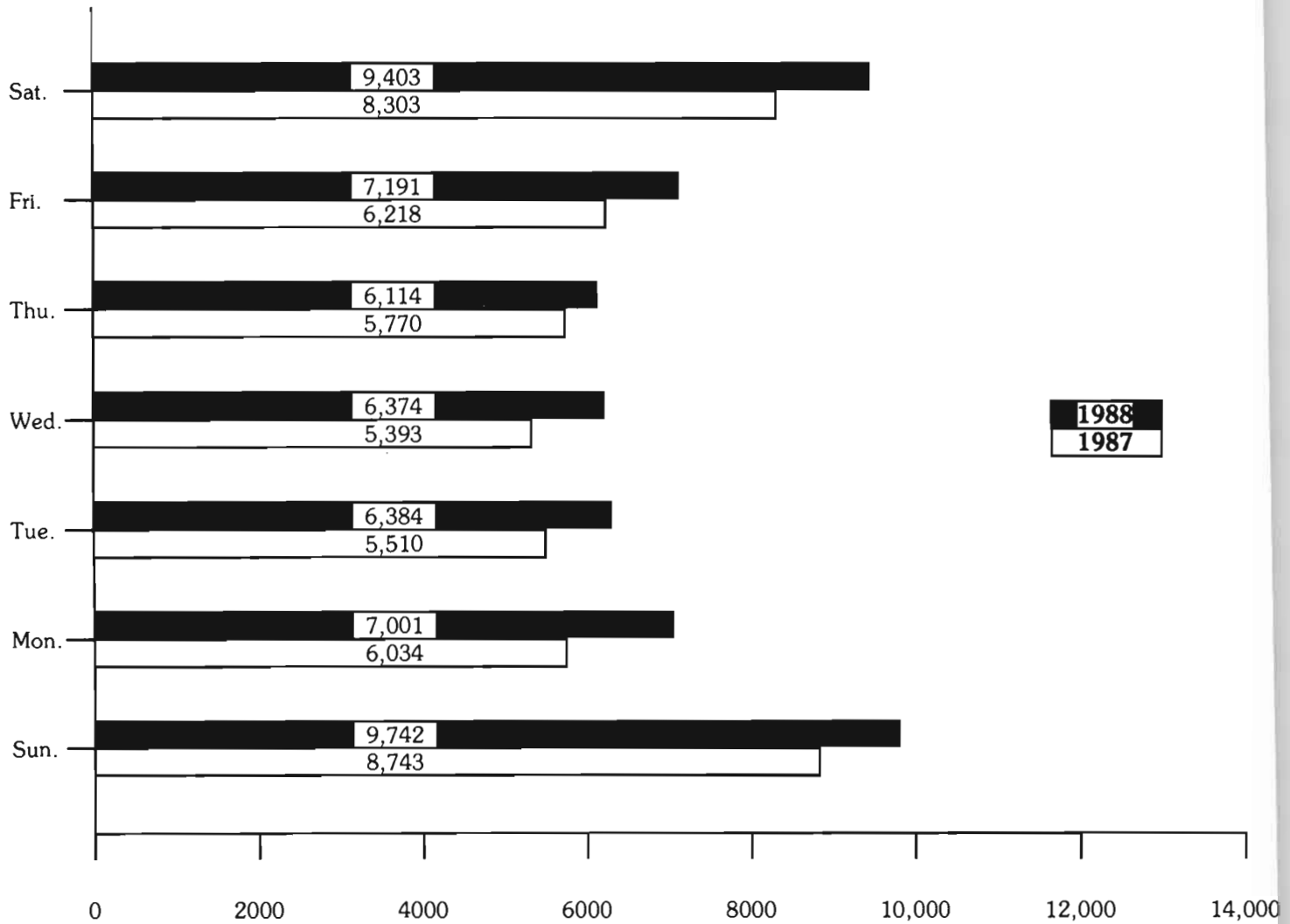
# DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OFFENSES BY TIME OF DAY 1987/1988



- Forty-four percent of the reported Domestic Violence offenses occurred between 6:00 p.m. and 12 Midnight.

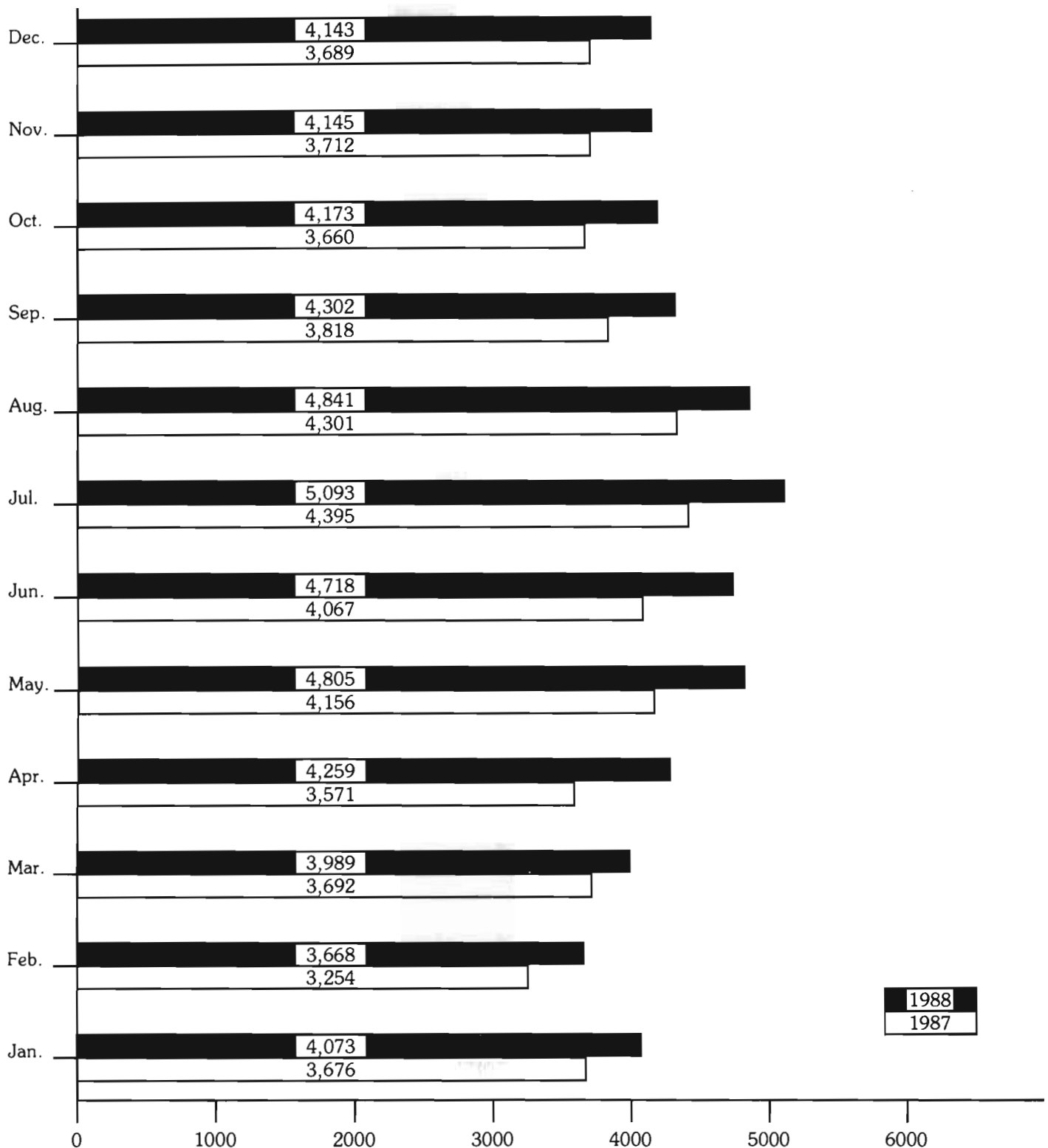


**DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OFFENSES

# **SECTION XI**

## **BIAS INCIDENT SUMMARY**





## INTRODUCTION

Crimes motivated by hate and bias tend to erode the basic fabric of society. Bias incidents having a racial, religious or ethnic component manifest themselves in a wide spectrum of antisocial activities. These bias incidents jeopardize the active and open pursuit of freedom and opportunity. They attack the racial, religious and ethnic heritage of our citizens. Closely linked to such heritage are individual values, beliefs and identities.

Realizing that no agency within the state was collecting complete data on bias incidents, a broad-based Ad Hoc committee was created to develop a comprehensive statewide reporting system. As a result of the committee's recommendations, Attorney General Executive Directive No. 1987-3 was issued mandating all New Jersey law enforcement agencies to begin reporting bias incidents to the Division of State Police, Uniform Crime Reporting Unit on a monthly basis, effective January 1, 1988.

The directive was instituted to capture vital data in an effort to identify the problem. This information will permit proper evaluation of progress in preventing bias crime and assist with necessary planning for the future.

This is the initial publication concerning bias and hate crimes, therefore, comparisons to previous years cannot be made. The published statistics and graphs are the result of data submitted by the police community of New Jersey.

Hopefully the information contained in this publication will be of value to various segments of society and serve its intended purpose.

## BIAS INCIDENT STATISTICAL SUMMARY

Highlights of the 1988 bias incident offense statistics are listed below:

- There were 593 actual bias incident offenses reported by the police in 1988.
- Criminal Mischief accounted for 33% (196) of all bias incidents and Harassment accounted for 23% (136).
- Racial bias accounted for 61% of all bias crimes in 1988.
- Persons were the target in 346 or 58% of all bias incidents reported.
- Thirty percent of all bias incidents were directed at blacks.
- Twenty-nine percent of all bias incidents were directed at Jewish people.
- The most frequent day of occurrence was Monday (117 incidents).
- The most frequent months of occurrence were October (76 incidents) and July (72 incidents).
- The most frequent place of occurrence was a residence where 33% (195) of all bias incidents occurred.
- Thirty percent of all bias incident offenses were cleared, with 18% being cleared by arrest, and 12% being exceptionally cleared.
- There were a total of 138 arrests (79 adult and 59 juveniles) made as a result of bias incidents.
- The involvement of organized hate groups was not substantiated in any of the reported bias incidents.

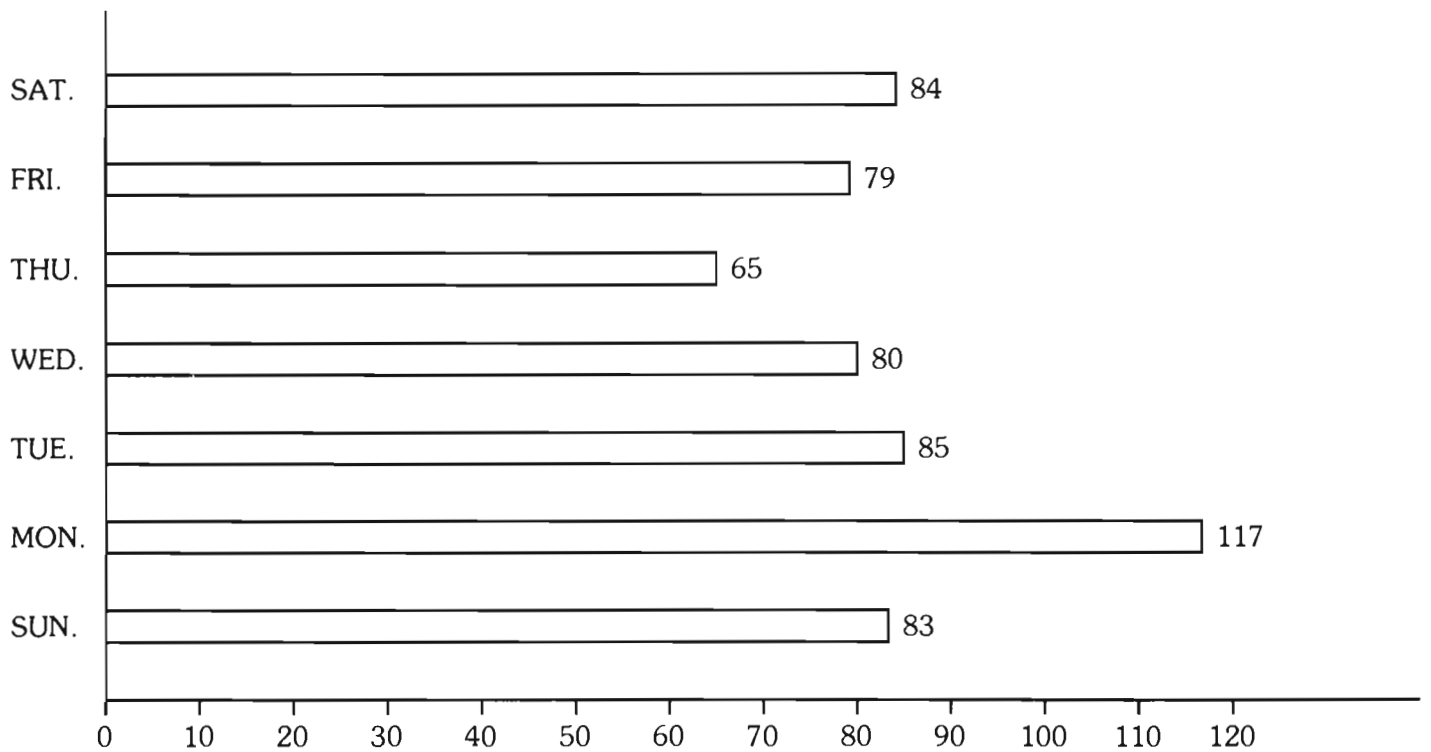

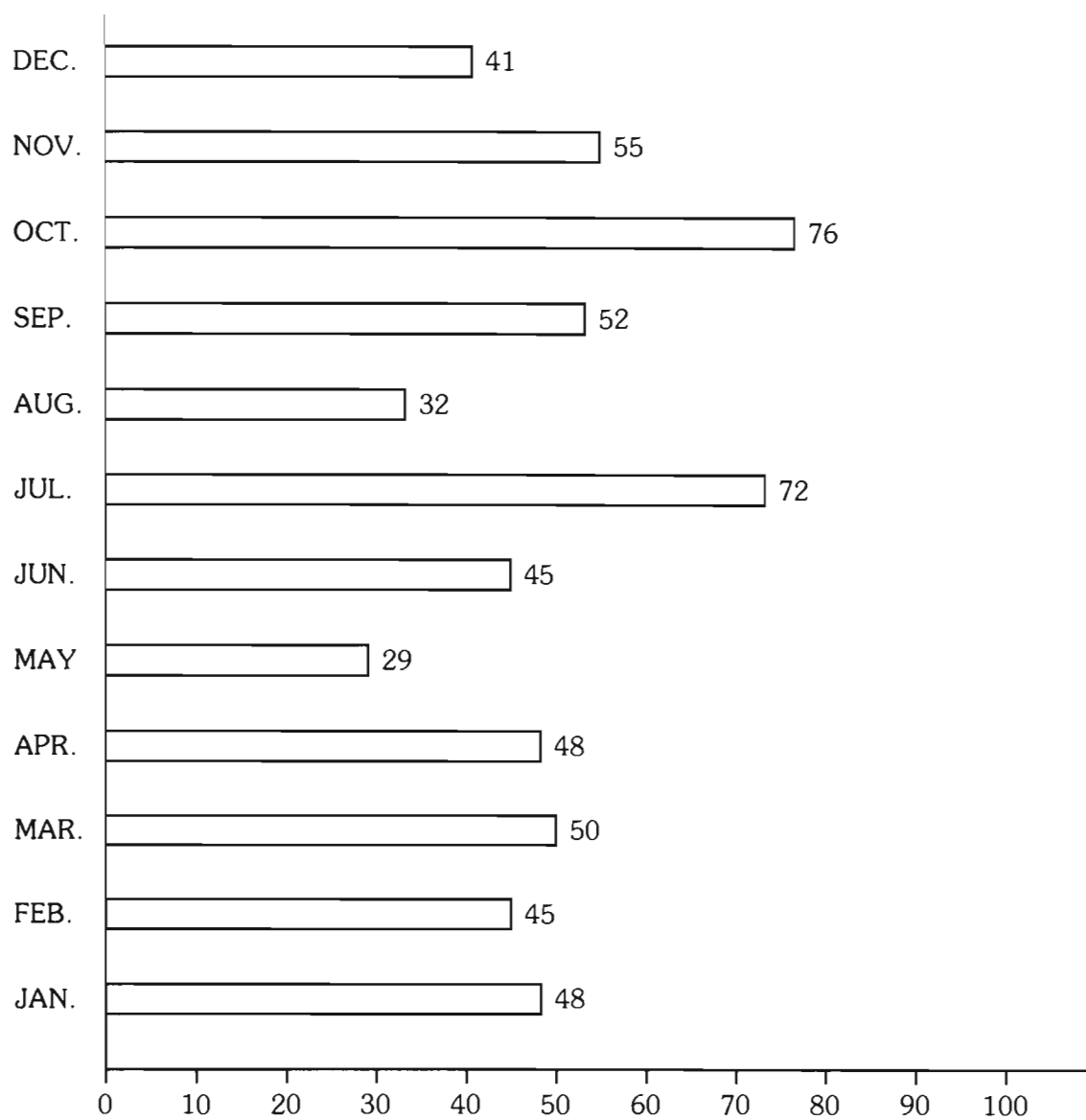

## GLOSSARY OF TERMS

ADULT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person aged 18 or over.
AMERICAN INDIAN or ALASKAN NATIVE	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America, and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
ARREST RATE	The number of arrests reported for Part I and Part II offenses for each unit of population, generally per 1,000.
ASIAN or PACIFIC ISLANDER	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes for example; China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.
BLACK	A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa, characterized by dark skin pigmentation.
CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the solution to a particular crime, usually by the arrest of the offender.
CLEARED BY ARREST	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared when the offender has been identified, sufficient evidence has been obtained to formally charge and the offender has been ordered to appear in court.
CRIME INDEX	The sum total of seven major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in a geographical area. The following crimes make up the index: Murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft; these offenses are referred to as Index offenses.
CRIME RATE	The number of Index offenses reported for each unit of population per 1,000.
CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, and aggravated assault.
CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY	Consists of the following Index offenses: Robbery, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
DAY	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.
ETHNIC ORIGIN	Having or originating from racial, linguistic, or cultural ties with a specific group.
EXCEPTIONAL CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared in this manner when an offender has been identified, located and sufficient evidence to charge has been obtained but there is some reason beyond police control which prohibits the offender from being brought before the court.
HIERARCHY RULE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, each crime or attempted crime is counted in only one offense category. If several offenses are committed, simply glance down the list of Part I offenses and stop at the first offense you recognize from the facts given; this offense is the correct classification for this criminal activity.
HISPANIC	A person of Mexican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.

JUVENILE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person under the age of 18.
JUVENILE CLEARANCE	Those crimes where the offenders are identified as juveniles.
NIGHT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m.
NONVIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
VIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.
WHITE	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.

# CALCULATIONS OF RATES AND TRENDS

1. **Crime Rate per 1,000 Inhabitants**—This represents the number of Index offenses per 1,000 inhabitants.

For example: What is the crime rate for a municipality with 513 Index offenses (murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft), with a population of 8,280?

$513 \text{ (Index offenses)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .061957 \times 1,000 = 62.0 \text{ (crime rate per 1,000 inhabitants)}$

2. **Crime Trend**—A crime trend shows the extent to which crime increased or decreased. This is done by comparing a period of the current year with the same period of a previous year.

For example: A municipality experienced 264 Index offenses in 1980 and 513 Index offenses in 1981. What is the percent of increase?

$513 \text{ (1981 Index offenses)} - 264 \text{ (1980 Index offenses)} = 249 \text{ (numerical increase)}$

$249 \text{ (numerical increase)} \div 264 \text{ (previous year)} = .943 \times 100 = +94\% \text{ (percent increase)}$

Note: If there were more Index offenses in 1980 than in 1981, we would have a percentage decrease.

3. **Number of Police Personnel Per 1,000 Inhabitants**—This is calculated in the same manner as crime rate.

For example: A municipality with a population of 8,280 and 28 police personnel. How many police officers are there per 1,000 population?

$28 \text{ (police personnel)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .00338 \times 1,000 = 3.4 \text{ (police personnel per 1,000 inhabitants)}$

Note: This formula can be applied to either total police personnel or just police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

4. **Police Assaulted Rate**—This is calculated at a rate per 100 police officers.

For example: A municipality with 25 officers had 5 of them assaulted during the month. What is the police assaulted rate?

$5 \text{ (police officers assaulted)} \div 25 \text{ (police officers)} = .2 \times 100 = 20 \text{ (police assaulted per 100 police officers)}$

5. **Clearance Rate**—This refers to the percent of Index offenses cleared (solved), over a specified period of time.

For example: A municipality with 513 Index offenses in 1981, cleared 95 of these offenses. What is the clearance rate?

$95 \text{ (Index offenses cleared)} \div 513 \text{ (Index offenses)} \times 100 = 18.5 \text{ (percent cleared)}$













*To reduce crime, you must first identify its extent, type and location*
