## CLIMATE CHANGE

Climate change is a hot topic these days. Here are a few key online resources from government information services to help you gain perspective on this subject.

There are three primary developments driving the current volume of climate change information:

1. [The United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change](#) (UNFCCC). The world watched as a new draft climate change agreement was negotiated at the UNFCCC session in Copenhagen, December 7-18. The challenge now facing the UNFCCC is whether this agreement will be turned into something legally binding to replace the [Kyoto Protocol](#) which expires in 2012.
2. Two pieces of legislation before the 11<sup>th</sup> Session of the U.S. Congress that contain proposals to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in the U.S. through a [cap-and-trade system](#):
  - [H.R. 2454](#), the American Clean Energy and Security Act of 2009 (aka Waxman-Markey bill). This bill passed the House on June 26, 2009 by a vote of 219 to 212. It is now being debated in the Senate.
  - [S. 1733](#), the Clean Energy Jobs and American Power Act (aka Boxer-Kerry bill). This bill was passed out of the Senate's Environment and Public Works Committee, but has not yet been voted on by the full Senate
3. The U.S. [Environmental Protection Agency \(EPA\)](#) is taking first steps to regulate greenhouse gas emissions from certain industrial facilities.

## SEARCH DATABASES FROM YOUR MOBILE DEVICE



State employees and authorized members of Thomas Edison State College may now use mobile devices to search databases that the State Library has licensed from EBSCOhost. More than 25 databases are available, including: Academic Search Premier, Business Source Premier, CINAHL with full text, MEDLINE, PsycINFO and SocINDEX with full text.

Access by the following popular smartphones has been tested and certified by EBSCO:

- BlackBerry (OS 4.0 or higher)
- Dell Axiom
- iPhone
- Palm 750

Your device must have JavaScript enabled in order to use EBSCOhost Mobile. Please consult your device's user manual for information on enabling JavaScript. Once you have enabled JavaScript, use this [mobile access link](#) to connect to EBSCOhost. You can also find the mobile access link at [www.njstatelib.org/cyberdesk](http://www.njstatelib.org/cyberdesk). Click on *Search EBSCOhost databases* on the right-hand side of the page and follow the directions.

You can bookmark the login page on your mobile device for future use. As usual, you will be prompted to enter your State Library card barcode number if you are accessing a database from outside the library.


