It is with appreciation to these dedicated public servants, and in the interest of more effective law enforcement for all the citizens of New Jersey, that this sixteenth annual Uniform Crime Report is submitted.

THE NEW JERSEY UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

DEFINITION

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System is based upon the compilation, classification, and analysis of crime data reported by all New Jersey police agencies in accordance with the regulations prescribed by law.

DEVELOPMENT

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Law (N.J.S.A. 52:17 B-5.1 et seq) was enacted on May 16, 1966, and became effective January 1, 1967. Responsibility for the establishment, direction, control, and supervision of the Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the State's Attorney General. The Attorney General authorized the New Jersey State Police to collect and collate the crime data received from law enforcement agencies within the state.

At the request of the Attorney General, the New Jersey State Police researched crime systems in operation throughout the nation in order to establish a firm foundation from which to grow. The most logical approach was the paralleling of the federal crime reporting system. There was a distinct need for a compatibility feature that would enhance both the state and federal systems through the data entry at both levels.

This compatibility has, as its nucleus, the standard classification of offenses established by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Regardless of the label placed on a particular offense in the various states' systems, i.e., felony, misdemeanor, disorderly persons, if the incident meets the federal standard it will be reported as an offense.

The terms "crime" and "offense" are used interchangeably in this publication, and refer to an act committed in violation of a law which is reportable under the guidelines of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

The Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting of the New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association has served the program in an advisory capacity since 1966. The contributions of this committee have proven valuable to the success of the program. This committee works in close harmony with the State Police as a means of improving the quality of reporting through recommended program standards, policies, and procedures.

COLLECTION OF CRIME DATA

As required by statute, all law enforcement agencies in the state submit monthly and annual summary crime reports to the program. During the year 1982, offense and arrest data were received from 482 full-time municipal police departments, twenty-six (26) part-time municipal police departments, and the New Jersey State Police (acting as the reporting agent for the 59 municipalities without local police services).

In addition to the above agencies, arrest data were received from the state's twenty-one (21) prosecutor's, sheriffs' departments, four (4) county police departments, and five (5) county park police departments. In order to incorporate all New Jersey law enforcement agencies under the system, the eight (8) other state agencies with law enforcement responsibilities, as well as eleven (11) college campus police departments were incorporated within the program. Collectively, a total of 578 law enforcement agencies submit their reports to the New Jersey State Police.

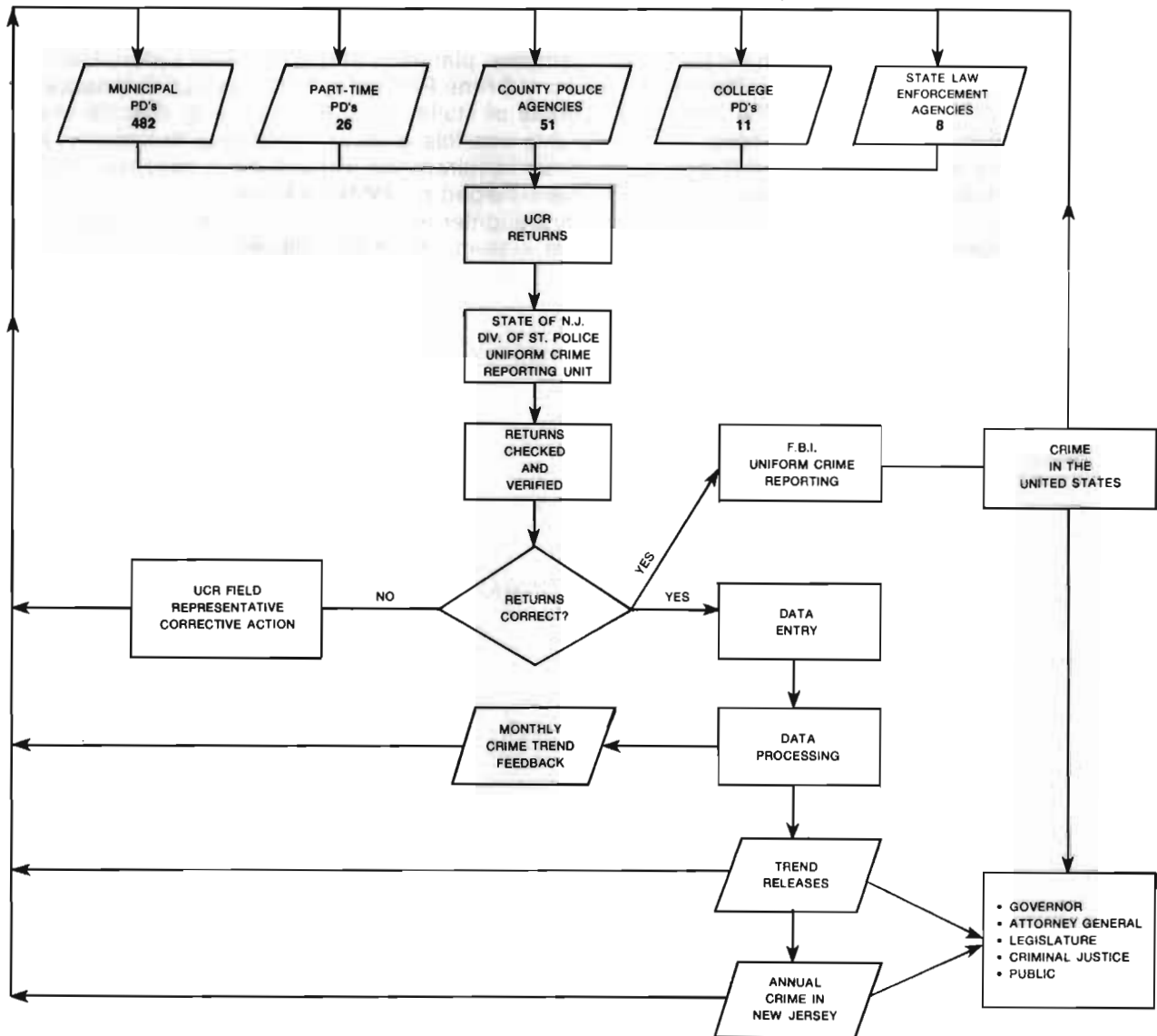
METHOD

The Uniform Crime Reporting Guide, which was revised during 1977, has been distributed to all contributors. It outlines reporting procedures in detail, and is complete to the extent of providing examples and illustrations. Field representatives provide additional instruction and clarification when required.

All reported offenses are related to the municipality in which they occur rather than to the agency which may conduct the investigation. The clearance is credited to the municipality in which the offense occurred. Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own reports. Law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses according to the following categories: Homicide (Murder and Manslaughter), Forcible Rape, Robbery, Assault, Burglary, Larceny-theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson. The "Crime in New Jersey," and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's "Crime in the United States" publications, exclude manslaughter, simple assaults, and arsons from the "Index" offenses. These are

further referred to as “violent” and “nonviolent” crimes as graphically illustrated in Section VII under “Municipal and County Offense and Demographic Data,” and Section II, “State Summary and Offense Analysis.”

All reported offenses are compiled from a record of all criminal complaints received by police from victims or other sources, or discovered by the police during routine operations. Complaints determined to be unfounded are eliminated from this count. Analytical data pertaining to specific crime categories are also reported, i.e., total adult and juvenile arrests made during the month. Police killed or assaulted, and arson data are also collected monthly. Police personnel information is submitted on an annual basis.



VERIFICATION PROCESSES

The uniformity and accuracy of data gathered from 482 contributors must be safeguarded through various ways. Although guidelines and instructions are provided each contributor, they are not the panacea for the accuracy being sought.

The reports received by the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit are recorded and examined for mathematical accuracy and reasonableness of the interpretation of the offense classifications. Improper classifications, changes in reporting procedures, or actual change are identified in this manner. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by direct telephone contact with the contributors, while all other errors are resolved through a personal visit by a field representative to the reporting agency.

Further verification is accomplished through the analysis of statistical data accrued from the reports submitted. Fluctuations in crime rates noted from previous submissions are verified by the field representatives through their municipal counterpart.

FUNCTION

Police executives make use of this data in administrative, planning, and operational determinations for their respective jurisdictions. The State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit provides assistance to municipal police agencies through the individual analysis of statistics as they relate to specific crime problems within their jurisdiction. Police executives also use this data for identifying manpower and equipment needs. The Uniform Crime Reporting Program requirements not only have increased police efficiency in reporting and recordkeeping areas, but have helped police in their day to day operations.

Although the data collected on the offenses of manslaughter and simple assault are not presented in the annual report, they are required for the federal system. However, this data is processed and available for special research purposes.

PROFILE OF NEW JERSEY

New Jersey is situated between the major industrial markets of New York and Philadelphia and can be classified as the "Crossroads of the East." The geographic location of the state has been a major factor in its growth and development. The many miles of super-expressway facilities within the state connect New Jersey directly with the neighboring states of New York, Pennsylvania, and Delaware. Additionally, New Jersey as a corridor state, accommodates large volumes of traffic from both the eastern and western part of the United States.

The state is politically comprised of 21 counties which contain 567 incorporated municipalities. Nationally, New Jersey, although 46th in size, ranks ninth in population and first as the most densely populated state in the country. In addition to this density of 987.8 persons per square mile, New Jersey still has many miles of rural areas and sparsely settled communities. The areas of density show a heavy concentration around the major urban centers and those areas most accessible for commuting.

STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL PROFILES

The presentation of state, county and municipal profiles in this section is offered for the purpose of projecting, for the consideration of the reader, a group of recognizable factors which may affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from community to community. Selection of the areas of information to be related to individual municipalities was based on the immediacy and completeness of data available.

Population statistics presented here, and throughout this publication, were obtained from the Department of Labor & Industry, Division of Planning and Research, Office of Demographic and Economic Analysis. The adjusted 1981 census counts of population were used in this publication.

Character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications, and square miles, were compiled by the Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning. Following is a list of categories used and a description of each category.

- URBAN CENTER Densely populated with extensive development.
- URBAN-SUBURBAN Near an urban center but not as extremely developed and more residential areas.
- URBAN CENTER RURAL Densely populated core area but surrounded by rural areas.
- SUBURBAN Predominantly single family residential, within a short distance of an urban area.
- SUBURBAN RURAL Rapidly developing area but still large tracts of open land available for development.
- RURAL Scattered small communities and isolated single family dwellings.
- RURAL CENTER High density core area with surrounding municipalities rural.
- RURAL CENTER-RURAL Small developed core area surrounded by rural areas.

Certain other socio-economic factors present in varying degrees in all communities may have an influence on resulting crime rates. Obvious difficulties in the identification, documentation and measurement of these factors, however, precluded their application in this report.

Those factors presented were listed to affirm their existence within the county and community and to provide a base for consideration in the evaluation of that community's crime experience.

CRIME FACTORS

In order to provide a meaningful statistical profile of crime within the State of New Jersey, each law enforcement agency must provide the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit with data that depicts specific crimes that are occurring within their jurisdiction. There is a need for compatibility with the National Uniform Crime Reporting System and, therefore, categories of offense classifications used within the state are identical with those of the National System. This results in equitable conclusions being drawn from the data submitted.

Reported Part I offenses and arrests are recorded in the municipality where they occurred, regardless of the outside investigative agency which may investigate, arrest, or otherwise dispose of the case.

The factors which influence crime rates are dependent upon characteristics of the community. When attempting to interpret the crime statistics presented herein, one should be aware of the social structure and factors that lead to or cause criminal behavior.

Crime rates in this publication are based on the stable population of the municipality. Fluctuating seasonal population figures are too inaccurate to be used as a measurement for determining crime rates. Municipalities with high seasonal populations may indicate a higher crime rate per one thousand than may be normal for a municipality their size. This would also be indicated in municipalities that experience high population increases due to special events or commuters.

Set forth below are some of the factors which, by type and volume, will affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan areas of which it is a part.
- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex, and race.
- Economic status, including job availability, and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population, including commuter, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
- Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.
- Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (i.e., prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational.)
- Crime reporting practices of the general citizenry.
- Attitudes of the public toward crime reporting.
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.
- Cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police agencies.

THE POLICE POINT OF VIEW

As in the past, the New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit has been surveying police agencies of the state, attempting to ascertain their viewpoint concerning contributing crime factors. Increased abuse of drugs and alcohol, insufficient manpower, lenient judges, seasonal population changes, poor economic stability and high unemployment, are some of the general type response received from many of the police agencies.

Many of the specific type responses concerning the increase or decrease of a particular crime have been documented in earlier publications of *Crime in New Jersey* but these viewpoints are still valid and appear again below.

ROBBERY

Increases:

- The availability of new roadways in our highly mobile society, provide a swift avenue to and from communities previously difficult to reach; this factor has also shown a relationship with burglaries in suburban and rural areas.
- Seasonal increases of tourists to resort areas of the state has attributed to the increase.

Decreases:

- The addition of highly visible scooter and foot patrols in high density crime areas; selective enforcement; stake-out squads are assigned to target areas using analytical information derived by studying past robbery occurrences.
- Increased communications technology has led to better communications and increased exchanges of information between police departments; this factor also has an effect on other types of crime.
- Identifying habitual offenders and expediting their prosecution, i.e., "Career Criminal Programs" have been effective.
- Mandatory sentencing, for crimes committed with a gun, is a deterrent.

BURGLARY

Increases:

- Husband and wife are both working; leaving homes more frequently unoccupied during the daylight hours.
- High truancy rates at junior high schools and high schools has also been noted as a contributor to daytime burglary increases.
- Unoccupied vacation homes are being entered during the off-season. Many police administrators cite insufficient manpower to properly patrol these areas as a contributing factor.
- Little or no security measures are initiated by the average citizen to protect his own property.
- Juvenile recidivists receive no detention after they are arrested numerous times for being involved in burglaries.

Decreases:

- Crime prevention programs are being stressed in many communities as a means of decreasing crime. Programs as *Neighborhood Watch* and *Operation I.D.* have proven to be successful as a deterrent to burglaries, as well as other crimes.
- An increased tendency by the public to "get involved" and report suspicious circumstances, has been noted.
- More stringent sentencing requirements, under the state's criminal code, has been a deterrent.
- The effectiveness of state and federal "sting" operations has helped decrease burglaries.

LARCENY-THEFT

Increases:

- Theft of auto parts, and property contained inside motor vehicles is the most common type of larceny being reported to police in New Jersey, this is attributed to:
 - Shortage of police manpower to adequately patrol parking lot areas.
 - A lack of security provided by the various shopping malls in their own parking areas.
 - Availability and visibility of the articles left in the vehicles.
- Shoplifting is a theft that police have little or no control over. Store security forces are under the control of the store administration, and their arrest policies vary from strict enforcement, arrest and prosecution, to only a warning. Policy change has been directed toward prosecuting the offenders rather than warning them, causing to some extent, an increase in the number of shoplifting offenses reported to police.

Decreases:

- Surveillance of shopping mall parking areas, utilizing motor scooters, and plain clothes foot patrols, is a contributing factor.
- Use of additional or improved lighting prevent criminal acts from occurring in parking areas.
- Public awareness programs contribute to the decrease in thefts from parked vehicles; these types of programs also help reduce bicycle thefts.
- Thefts of bicycles has decreased as a result of safety and security programs implemented by police in the various schools; this includes the registration and marking of bicycles with special numbers.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

Increases:

- The tremendous replacement cost of auto parts has contributed significantly to the increase in motor vehicle thefts. The vehicle's value has nearly doubled in recent years, due to the high replacement cost of parts and accessories.
 - Note: Only 60 percent of the stolen motor vehicles were recovered in the UCR Program, probably due in part to "theft for parts," chop-shops, etc.
- The popularity of mopeds and mini-bikes has attributed to motor vehicle thefts.

Decreases:

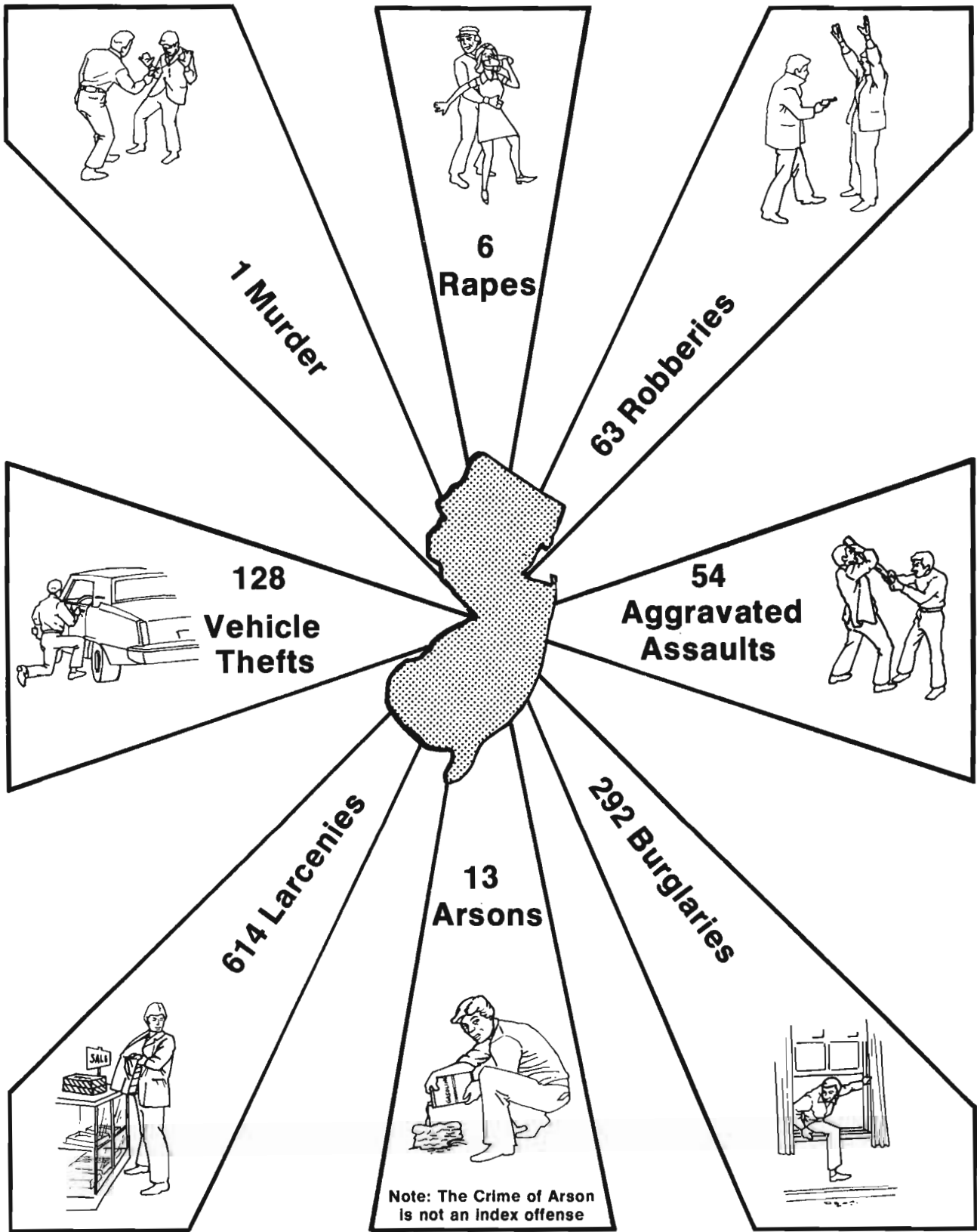
- More police surveillance and better lighting in parking lots has helped decrease motor vehicle thefts.
- Modern ignition systems and anti-theft devices act as a motor vehicle theft deterrent.

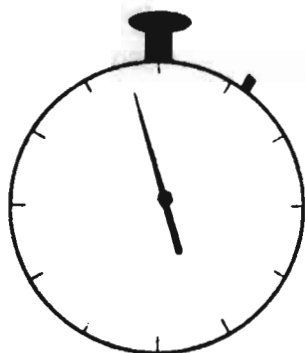

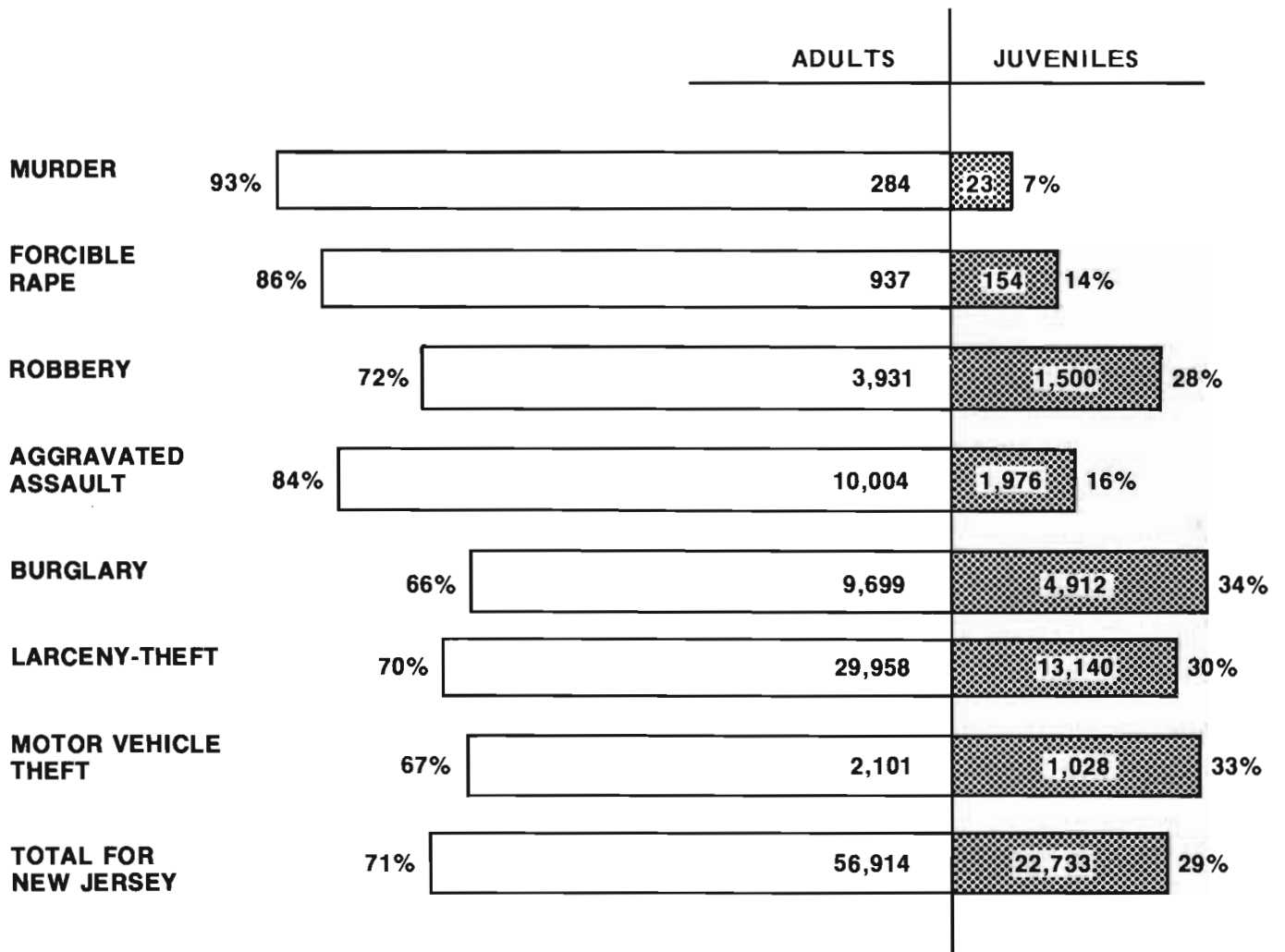

STATEWIDE CRIME SUMMARY—1982

CRIME INDEX—VOLUME/RATE

- There were 422,270 Index offenses reported in 1982, an 8 percent decrease compared to 1981.
- The crime rate of the state is 57.0 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants, a decrease of 8 percent compared to 1981.
- August with 40,986 offenses reported, recorded the highest incidence of Crime Index offenses for the third consecutive year.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$338 million in 1982, a 6 percent decrease from 1981.
- Value of property recovered was \$104 million, resulting in a recovery rate of 31 percent.
- Stolen motor vehicles accounted for 46 percent of stolen property, and 84 percent of the recovered property value.
- Burglary decreased in the state by 17 percent, with 106,447 reported offenses.

CRIME INDEX ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 84,512 persons were arrested for Index offenses, which represents a 3 percent decrease over 1981.
- Adult Index arrests increased less than one-half of one percent, and juvenile arrests decreased 9 percent.
- Crime Index arrests accounted for 23 percent of the total arrests in 1982.
- Males accounted for 81 percent of the Crime Index arrests, and females accounted for 19 percent.
- Fifty-seven percent of the Index arrests were white and 43 percent were black.
- Police cleared 19 percent of the Index offenses and juveniles accounted for 29 percent of these clearances.

VIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, Forcible Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 45,172 violent crimes reported in 1982; a 3 percent decrease compared to the 46,655 violent crimes reported in 1981.
- Violent crime accounted for 11 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The violent crime rate decreased 3 percent to 6.1 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The highest number of violent crimes were reported in July with 4,204 offenses while the lowest number were reported in January (3,448 offenses).
- The value of property stolen as a result of violent crime was \$11 million.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arrests for violent crime offenses increased 5 percent; from 18,135 in 1981 to 19,052 in 1982.
- Violent crime arrests accounted for 23 percent of the Index arrests and 5 percent of the total arrests during the year.
- Adult arrests for violent crime increased 4 percent while juvenile violent crime arrests increased 9 percent compared to 1981.
- Adults accounted for 72 percent of the violent crime arrests, while the remaining 28 percent were juveniles.
- Males were responsible for 90 percent and females for 10 percent of the violent crime arrests.
- Forty-four percent of those arrested were white, and 56 percent were black.
- Forty-two percent of all violent crimes were cleared and juveniles accounted for 19 percent of these clearances.

NONVIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, Larceny-theft, Motor Vehicle Theft.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 377,098 nonviolent crimes reported in 1982, an 8 percent decrease compared to the 410,749 reported in 1981.
- Nonviolent crime accounted for 89 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The nonviolent crime rate decreased 9 percent to 50.9 victims per 1,000 inhabitants in 1982.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The largest number of nonviolent crimes were reported in August with 36,917, while the lowest number were reported in January with 25,525.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of nonviolent crime amounted to \$327.5 million.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Nonviolent crime arrests decreased 5 percent in 1982, as 65,460 persons were arrested.
- Nonviolent crime arrests accounted for 77 percent of the Index arrests and 18 percent of the total arrests during 1982.
- Juveniles were responsible for 40 percent of the nonviolent crime arrests and adults 60 percent.
- Adult nonviolent crime arrests decreased one percent, while juvenile arrests decreased 12 percent.
- Males represented 78 percent, and females 22 percent of persons arrested for the nonviolent crimes.
- Sixty percent of all persons arrested for nonviolent crimes were white, 39 percent were black, less than one-half of one percent were other races.
- Sixteen percent of all nonviolent crimes reported were cleared in 1982 and juveniles accounted for 31 percent of these clearances.

TOTAL ARREST SUMMARY

- There were 373,490 persons arrested in 1982, which represents a 4 percent increase over 1981.
- The arrest rate for 1982 increased 3 percent to 50.4 persons arrested per every 1,000 inhabitants.
- Adult arrests increased 9 percent to 266,170 and juvenile arrests decreased 8 percent to 107,320 in 1982.
- Adults accounted for 71 percent and juveniles 29 percent of the total state arrests.
- Persons under 21 years of age accounted for 45 percent of all arrests.
- Males accounted for 83 percent and females 17 percent of the total persons arrested during the year.
- Seventy-one percent of the total persons arrested in 1982 were white, and 29 percent were black.

POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED SUMMARY

- There were no police officers killed in the line of duty in 1982.
- There were 4,787 police officers assaulted during the performance of duty in 1982.
- One out of every four municipal police officers in New Jersey was assaulted during the year 1982.

CRIME IN NEW JERSEY, UNITED STATES AND THE NORTHEAST REGION

- The Crime Index in New Jersey decreased 8 percent, while the Northeastern States decreased 7 percent and the United States decreased 4 percent.

MURDER

DEFINITION

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is included. This Index offense is counted by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court, jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Attempts to kill and assaults to kill are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, negligent manslaughters, and justifiable homicides are not counted, nor reflected in the murder classification.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 481 murders reported to law enforcement agencies of the state in 1982, an 11 percent decrease compared to the 540 murders reported in 1981.
- Murders accounted for one-tenth of one percent of reported Index offenses.
- The murder rate remained the same at .1 victims per 1,000 inhabitants.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The age group of 20-29 accounted for 32 percent of all murder victims.
- Firearms were used in 41 percent of the murders where the weapon is known. Knife or cutting instruments accounted for 30 percent, while physical force and blunt objects each accounted for 9 percent.
- In murders where the relationship of the victim and offender is known, 54 percent were friends or acquaintances, 25 percent were relatives, and 21 percent were strangers.
- Felony murders accounted for 38 percent of the known murder circumstances. Robbery was the motive in 57 percent of the 113 felony murders.
- Saturday was the highest day of the week for reported murders with 89, while Sunday was the lowest with 55.
- May recorded the highest number of murders, with 56, while November was the lowest with 33.
- Forty-nine percent of the murders occurred in private residences, 28 percent on highways or streets, and 8 percent in commercial houses.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of murder amounted to \$39,251.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 385 persons were arrested for murder in 1982, a 19 percent decrease compared to 1981.
- Adult murder arrests decreased 21 percent (from 418 to 332) and juvenile arrests decreased 10 percent (from 59 to 53).
- The 19-23 age group accounted for 28 percent of persons arrested for murder.
- Sixty percent of persons arrested for murder were black and 40 percent were white.
- Sixty-four percent of the murders were cleared in 1982 (307 out of 481). Juveniles accounted for 7 percent of those cases cleared.
- Males accounted for 86 percent and females 14 percent of those arrested for murder.

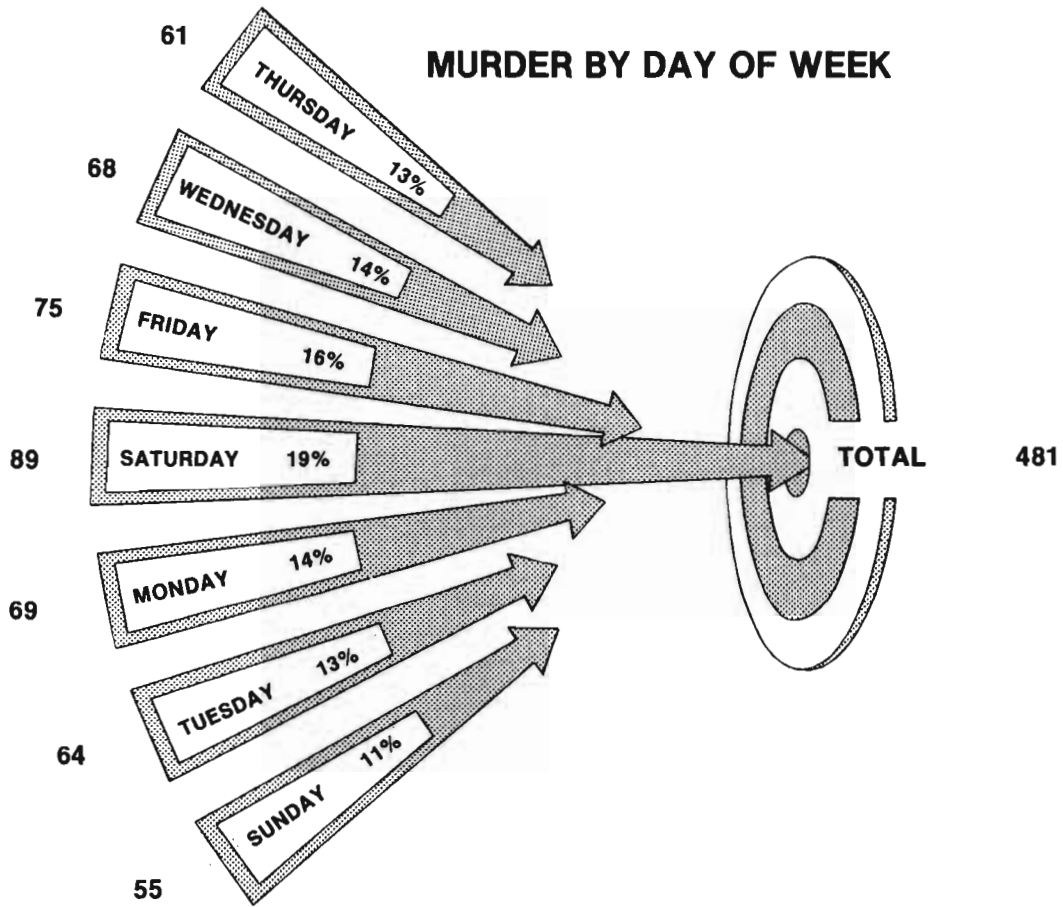

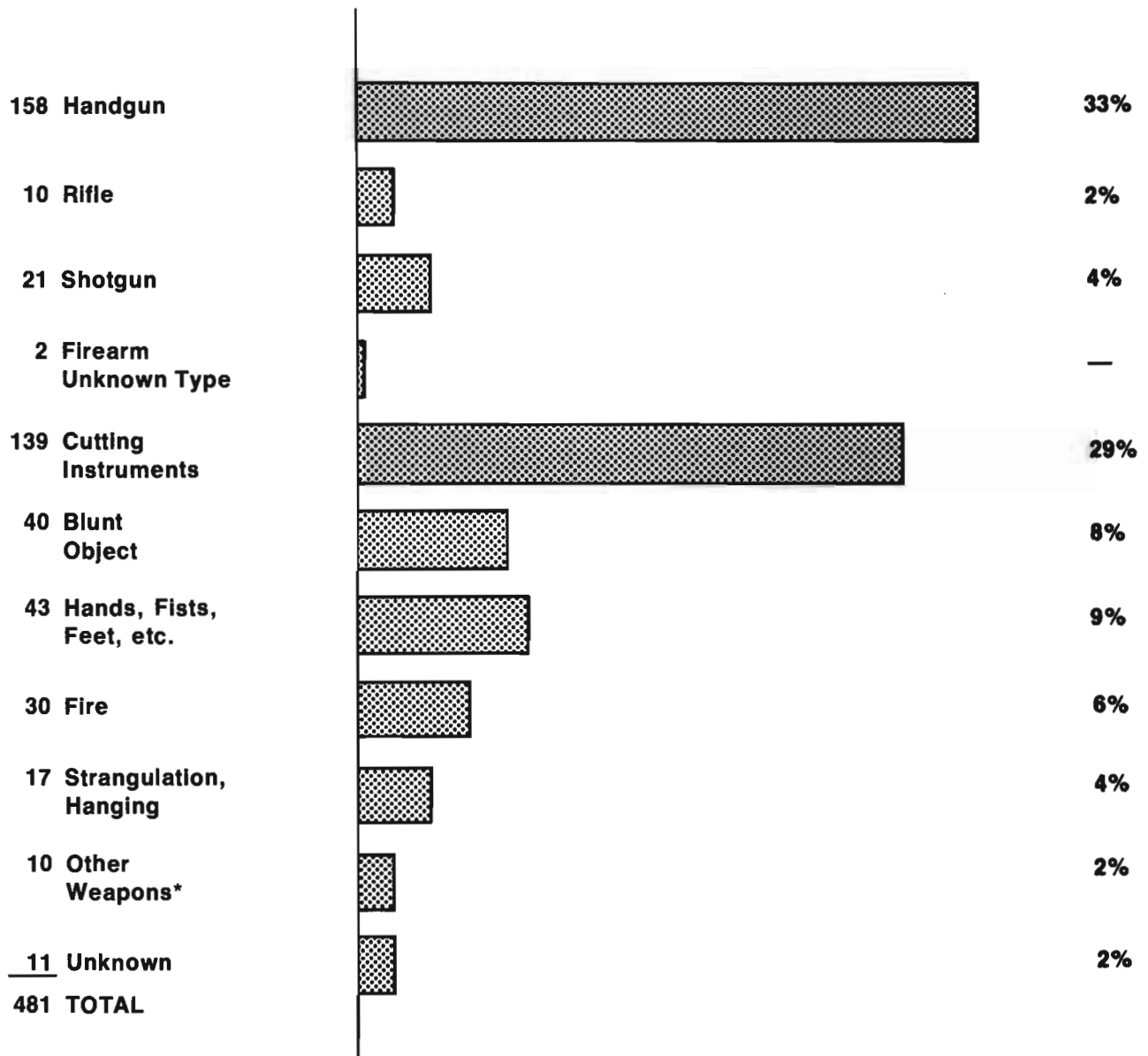

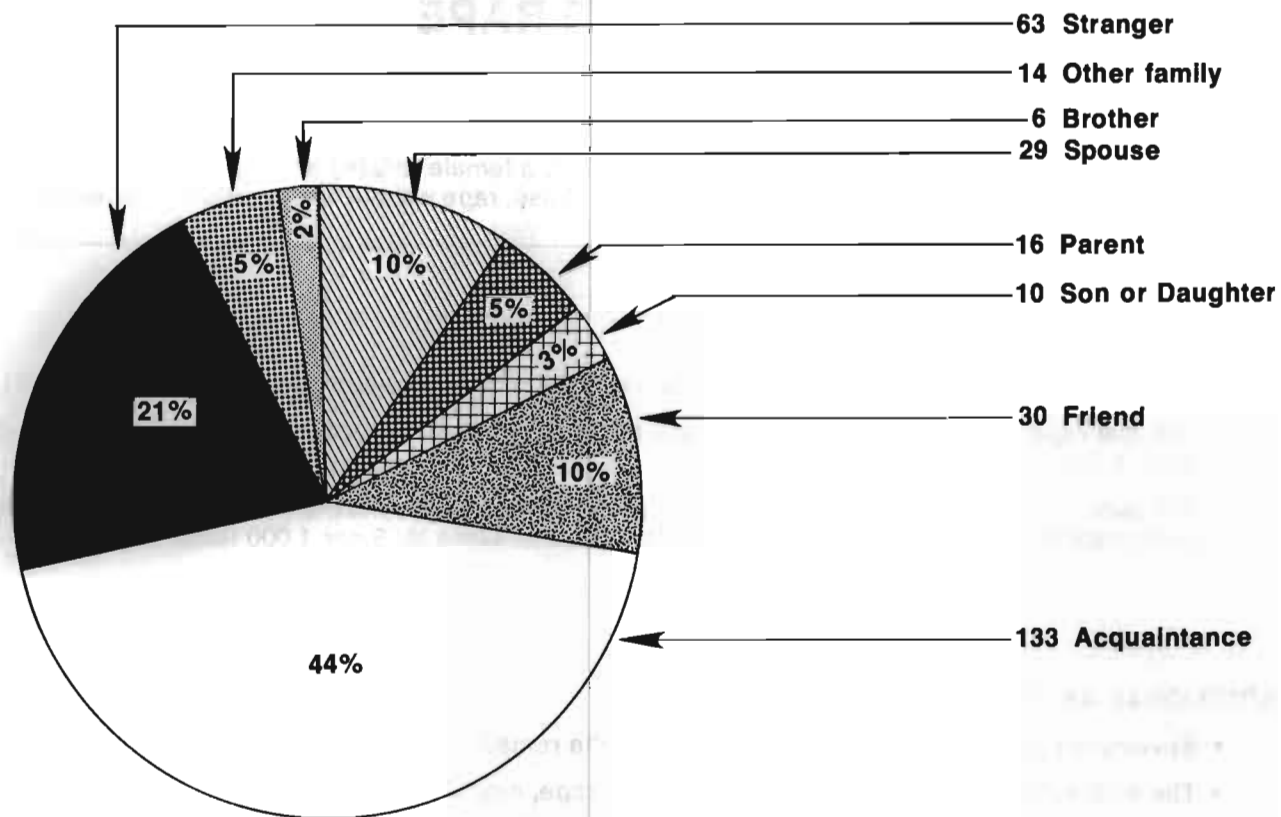
MURDER—Distribution by Type of Weapon

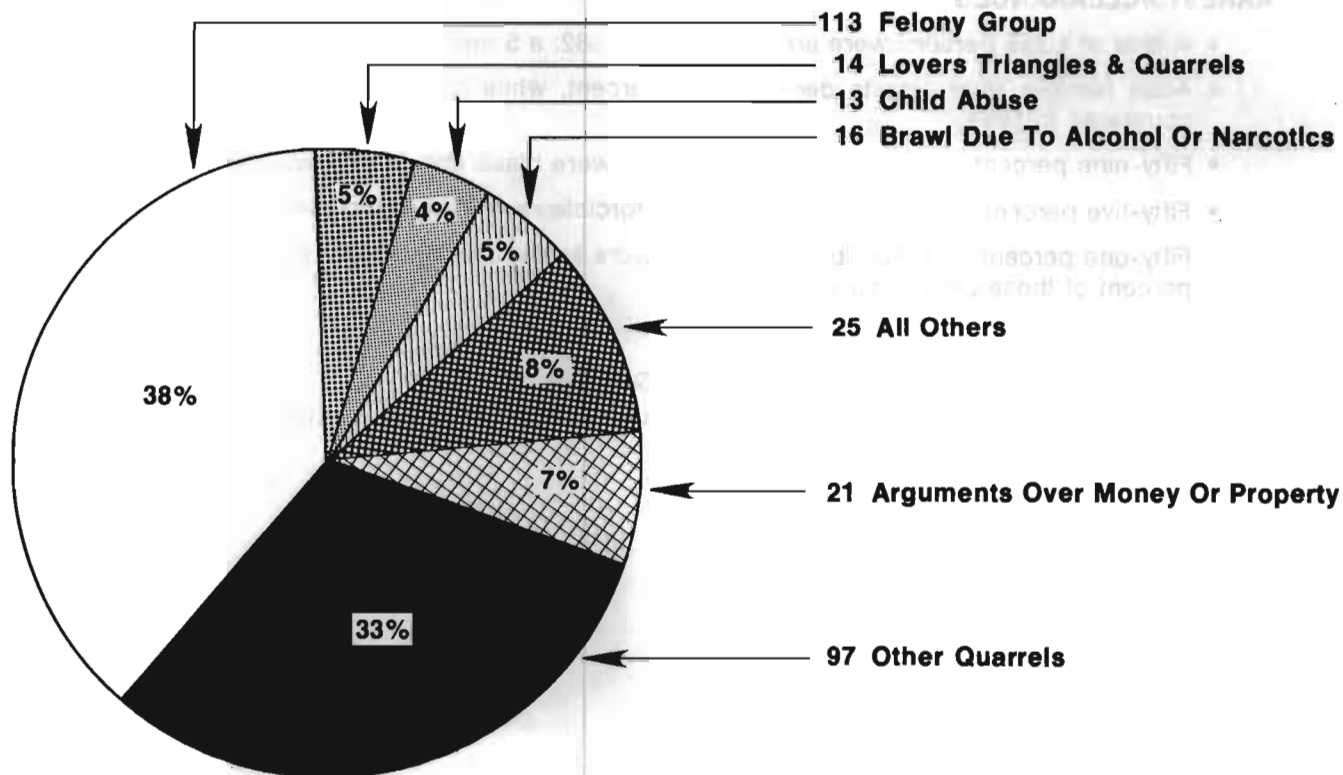

FORCIBLE RAPE

Definition

Forcible rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted, but carnal abuse, rape without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 2,151 reported rapes in 1982, a decrease of 9 percent compared to the 2,371 in 1981.
- Forcible rape accounted for one-half of one percent of the total Crime Index and 5 percent of all violent crimes.
- For every 1,000 persons in the state, there were .3 forcible rape victims. When calculated on the estimated female population, the forcible rape rate increases to .6 per 1,000 females.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Seventy-six percent of the rapes were forcible, the remaining 24 percent were attempts to rape.
- The total value of property stolen, as a result of rape, amounted to \$83,748.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 1,169 persons were arrested during 1982, a 5 percent decrease compared to 1981.
- Adult forcible rape arrests decreased 4 percent, while juvenile arrests decreased 9 percent compared to 1981.
- Fifty-nine percent of the arrested perpetrators were black and 41 percent were white.
- Fifty-five percent of all persons arrested for forcible rape were under the age of 25.
- Fifty-one percent of all forcible rape cases were solved during 1982. Juveniles accounted for 14 percent of those cases cleared.

ROBBERY

Definition

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 22,880 robbery offenses in 1982, an 8 percent decrease compared to 24,753 in 1981.
- Robbery accounted for 5 percent of the total Crime Index and 51 percent of all violent crime.
- The robbery rate was 3.1 victims per 1,000 population.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Highway robberies accounted for 72 percent of all reported robberies and showed a 3 percent decrease over 1981.
- Residence robberies decreased 19 percent in 1982 and accounted for 9 percent of all robberies in the state.
- Total value of property stolen during robberies amounted to \$10,859,368.

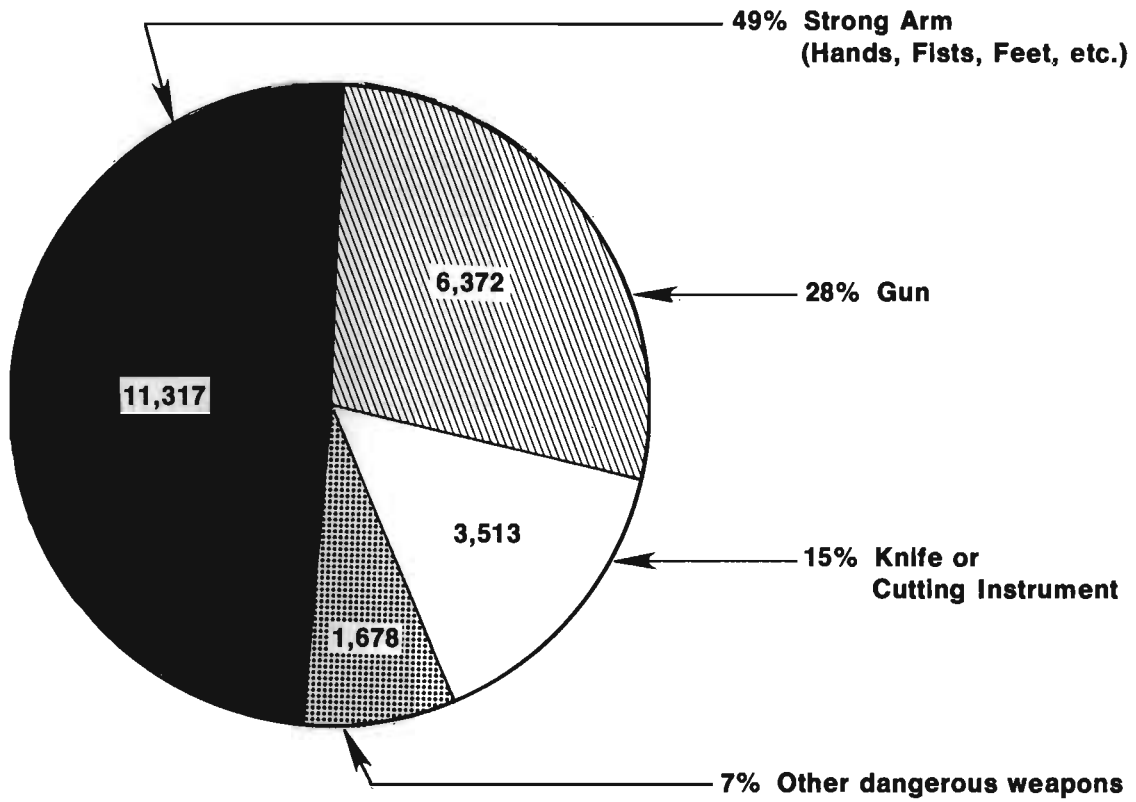

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

Definition

Aggravated assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do serious physical injury to another. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could result in serious personal injury if the crime was successfully completed.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 19,660 aggravated assaults reported during 1982, an increase of 4 percent when compared to 1981.
- Aggravated assaults accounted for 5 percent of the Crime Index and 44 percent of all violent crimes.
- The rate for aggravated assault increased 4 percent to 2.7 victims per 1,000 population.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Physical force (i.e., hands, fists, and feet) was used in 30 percent and other dangerous weapons (i.e. clubs, bricks, tire irons, etc.) were used in 29 percent of all reported aggravated assaults.
- Aggravated assaults committed with a gun decreased 6 percent compared to 1981, while all the other types of weapons categories increased.

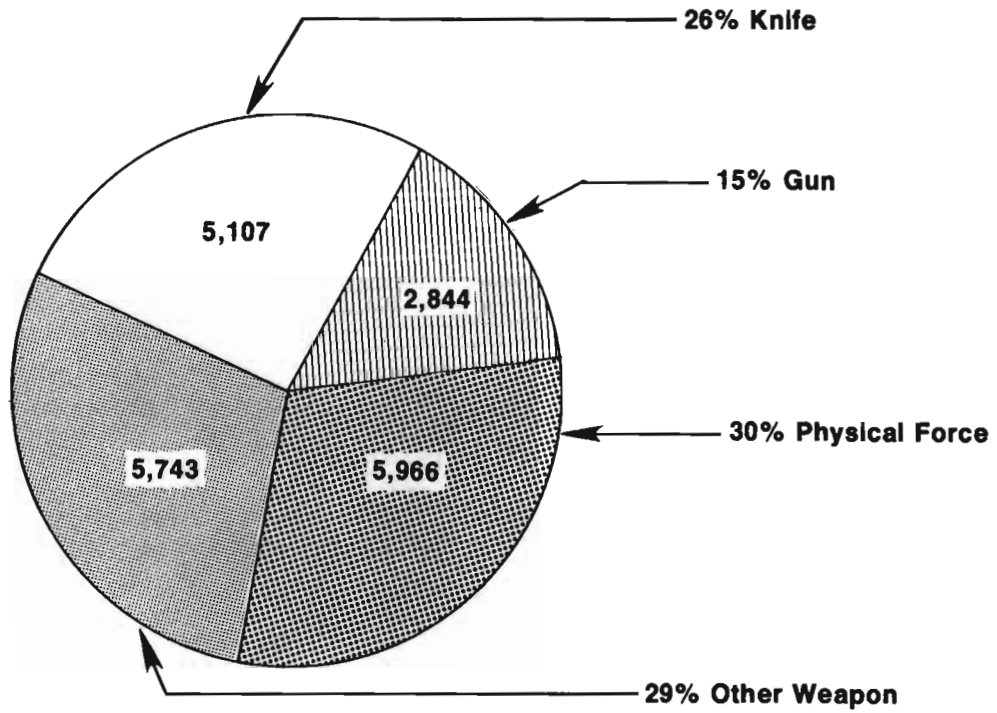

BURGLARY

Definition

Under this program, burglary is defined as an unlawful entry or attempted entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. Data collection for this offense is further categorized as forcible entry, unlawful entry (where no force is used) and attempted forcible entry.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 106,447 burglary offenses reported in 1982, a 17 percent decrease compared to the 128,278 reported in 1981.
- Burglary accounted for 25 percent of the total Crime Index and 28 percent of all nonviolent crime.
- The burglary rate per 1,000 population decreased 17 percent to 14.4 in 1982.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- During 1982, 75 percent of all burglaries involved forcible entry, 13 percent were unlawful entry where no force was used, and the remaining 12 percent were attempts to forcibly enter.
- Residences were targets in 66 percent of the reported burglaries. Fifty-four percent of the residential burglaries occurred during the day.
- Stolen property value as a result of burglary statewide, amounted to \$91 million, for an average loss of \$855.00.
- The average loss as a result of a residential burglary was \$912.00, while nonresidential burglary loss was \$744.00.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Burglary arrests decreased 10 percent in 1982, with 16,475 persons arrested in 1982.
- Adult arrests decreased 6 percent, while juvenile arrests decreased 14 percent.
- Males accounted for 95 percent and females 5 percent of the burglary arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 48 percent of all burglary arrests.
- Sixty-three percent of burglary arrests were white and 37 percent were black.
- Fourteen percent of the burglaries statewide, were cleared and juveniles accounted for 34 percent of these clearances.

LARCENY-THEFT

Definition

The definition of larceny-theft, as provided under this program, is the taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket-picking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad checks are not included.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 224,025 larcenies reported in 1982, a 3 percent decrease compared to the 231,895 in 1981.
- Larceny accounted for 53 percent of the total Crime Index and 59 percent of all nonviolent crime.
- The larceny victimization rate decreased 4 percent to 30.3 victims for every 1,000 population in 1982.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories and thefts from motor vehicles, collectively accounted for 37 percent of all larceny-thefts reported.
- Purse-snatchings decreased 12 percent in 1982 compared to 1981, while pocket-picking increased 7 percent.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Larceny-theft arrests decreased 4 percent in 1982, with 46,209 persons arrested.
- Juvenile arrests decreased 11 percent and adult arrests increased one percent in 1982.
- Males accounted for 71 percent and females 29 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-nine percent of all persons arrested for larceny were white, 40 percent were black, and one percent were other races.
- Nineteen percent of the larcenies were cleared with juveniles accounting for 30 percent of the clearances.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, motor vehicle theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle which is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on rails. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle. The motor vehicle theft category includes the subheadings of autos, trucks and buses, and other vehicles (motorcycles, mo-peds, etc.)

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 46,626 motor vehicle thefts reported in 1982, an 8 percent decrease compared to the 50,576 reported in 1981.
- Motor vehicle thefts accounted for 11 percent of the total Crime Index and 12 percent of the nonviolent crime.
- The motor vehicle theft rate of 6.3 victims per 1,000 population represents a 9 percent decrease compared to 1981.

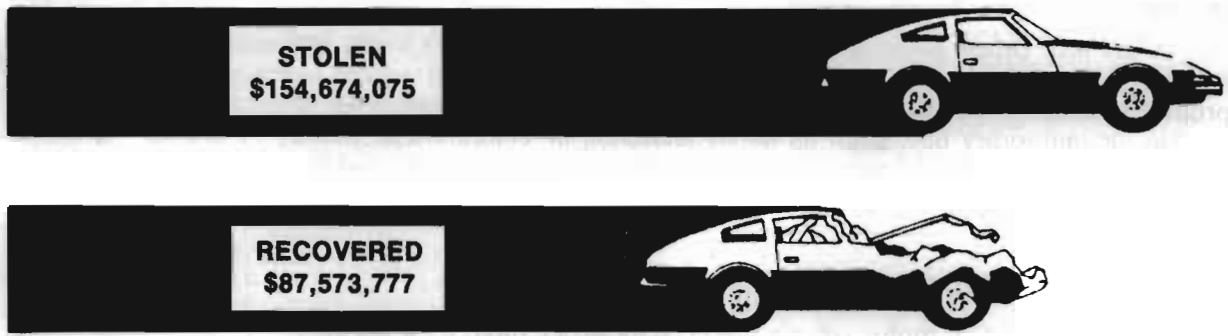

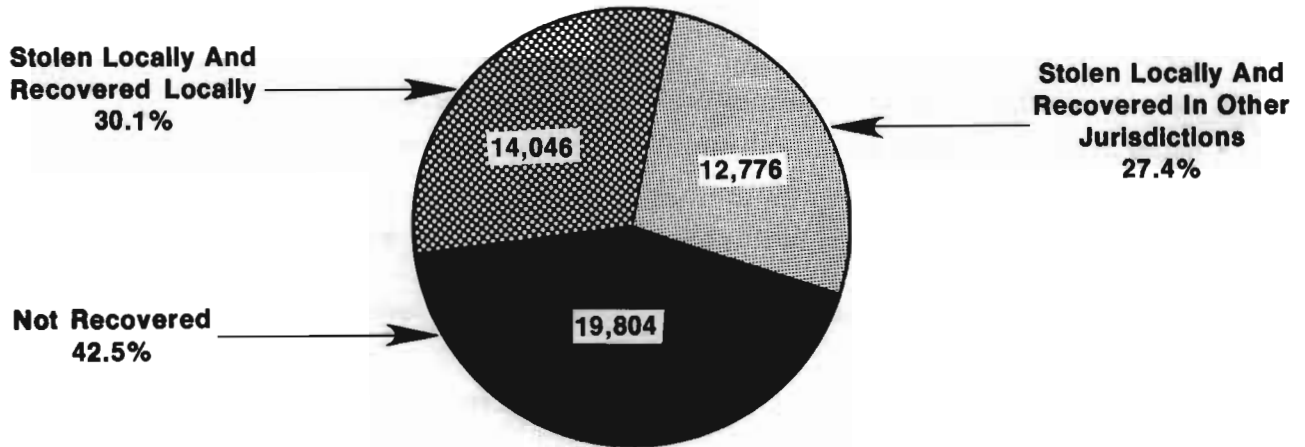

ARSON

Definition

Arson is defined by the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 4,577 reportable arsons in 1982, which represents a 15 percent decrease compared to 5,399 in 1981.
- The arson rate decreased one-tenth of one percent at 0.6 victims per 1,000 population.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Seventy percent of the arsons were structures, with residences accounting for 45 percent and commercial structures accounting for 9 percent.
- Mobile property including motor vehicles, accounted for 21 percent of the arsons in the state.
- Other property (timber, crops, etc.) accounted for 9 percent of the reported arsons.
- The total value of property damage due to arson, amounted to over \$33 million for an average dollar value loss of \$7,343.00
- The average residential loss was \$6,261.00 while the average loss to industrial/commercial structures was \$27,735.00
- The average motor vehicle loss was \$2,289.00

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arson arrests numbered 828 in 1982, representing a decrease of 8 percent when compared to 1981.
- Adult arrests increased 9 percent, while juvenile arrests decreased 21 percent.
- Males accounted for 89 percent and females 11 percent of the arson arrests in 1982.
- Juveniles accounted for 48 percent of the arson arrests, the first time since 1967 that they have been in the minority.
- Seventy-seven percent of the persons arrested for arson were white, and 23 percent were black.
- The arson clearance rate was 16 percent, and juveniles accounted for 39 percent of the clearances.

ARREST SUMMARY FOR NON-INDEX OFFENSES

MANSLAUGHTER

Definition

The unlawful killing of a human being, by another, through gross negligence. Arrests relating to traffic fatalities are included.

- There were 54 arrests reported by law enforcement agencies of the state for manslaughter during the year. This represents a 13 percent decrease compared to 1981.
- Adults accounted for 85 percent and juveniles accounted for 15 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 93 percent of the arrests and females 7 percent.
- Seventy-two percent of the persons arrested were white, 28 percent were black.
- Eighty-seven percent of all manslaughter arrests were for traffic fatalities.

SIMPLE ASSAULT

Definition

Simple assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an assault or an attempted assault where no weapon is used and which does not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

- There were 30,817 simple assault arrests in 1982, representing a 2 percent increase when compared to 1981.
- Of the total, 27 percent were juveniles and 73 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 83 percent and females 17 percent of the persons arrested for simple assault.
- Seventy percent of the persons arrested were white, and 30 percent were black.

ARSON

Definition

Under this program, arson is defined as the willful or malicious burning, or attempting to burn, with or without intent to defraud; a dwelling house, building, ship or vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft, contents of building, personal property of another, etc.

- There were 828 arrests reported for arson offenses; an 8 percent decrease over 1981.
- Juveniles accounted for 48 percent and adults 52 percent of persons arrested for arson.
- Eighty-nine percent of the total arson arrests were males, while 11 percent were females.
- Seventy-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, and 23 percent were black.

FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING

Definition

The definition of forgery and counterfeiting is the making, altering, uttering or possessing or attempting to make, alter, utter or possess, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true.

- There were 1,497 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for forgery or counterfeiting during the year. This represents a 12 percent increase compared to 1981.
- Adults accounted for 91 percent and juveniles accounted for 9 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 73 percent of the arrests and females 27 percent.
- Sixty-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 37 percent were black.

FRAUD

Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, fraud is the fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. This includes bad checks, confidence games, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

- There were 8,144 arrests reported during the year for fraud, a 7 percent increase compared to 1981.
- Adult arrests represented 97 percent and juveniles 3 percent of the persons arrested.
- Males accounted for 56 percent and females 44 percent of the persons arrested for fraud.
- Sixty-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, and 32 percent were black.

EMBEZZLEMENT

Definition

The definition of embezzlement is the misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

- There were 112 persons arrested for embezzlement; a 7 percent decrease compared to 1981.
- Ninety-two percent of those persons arrested were adults, and 8 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 63 percent and females 37 percent of the persons arrested for embezzlement.
- Seventy-six percent of the persons arrested were white, and 24 percent were black.

STOLEN PROPERTY (Buying, Receiving, Possessing)

Definition

Included in this class are all offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

- In 1982 there were 10,468 arrests reported for stolen property—a decrease of one percent over 1981.
- Of the total, 69 percent were adults and 31 percent were juveniles.
- Eighty-eight percent were males, and 12 percent were females.
- Fifty-five percent of the persons arrested were white, and 45 percent were black.

MALICIOUS MISCHIEF

Definition

Malicious mischief is defined as the willful destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

- There were 13,953 arrests for malicious mischief, a decrease of 2 percent compared to 1981.
- Juveniles accounted for 61 percent, and adults 39 percent of persons arrested for malicious mischief.
- Males accounted for 91 percent and females 9 percent of the arrests.
- Eighty percent of the persons arrested were white, and 20 percent were black.

WEAPONS: CARRYING, POSSESSING, etc.

Definition

Under the program, this offense includes all the violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers, and attempts.

- There were 8,360 arrests reported for weapons offenses; a 4 percent increase compared to 1981.
- Of the total, 76 percent were adults, and 24 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 93 percent and females 7 percent of those arrested.
- Sixty-one percent of those arrested were white, and 39 percent were black.

PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE

Definition

Prostitution and commercialized vice are sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts. Included in this category are prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes, etc.

- There were 1,653 arrests reported for prostitution and commercialized vice during 1982. This represents a 74 percent increase over 1981.
- Ninety-six percent of the arrests were adults, with the remaining 4 percent being juveniles.
- Females accounted for 75 percent and males 25 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty-four percent of those arrested were black and 36 percent were white.

SEX OFFENSES

Definition

Sex offenses, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, does not include forcible rape, prostitution and commercialized vice. Included in this class are offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like; attempts are also included.

- There were 2,180 sex offense arrests during 1982, representing an increase of 23 percent when compared to 1981.
- Adults accounted for 75 percent, and juveniles 25 percent of the arrests.
- Ninety-six percent were males, and 4 percent were females.
- Seventy-four percent of the persons arrested were white, and 26 percent were black.

DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS

Definition

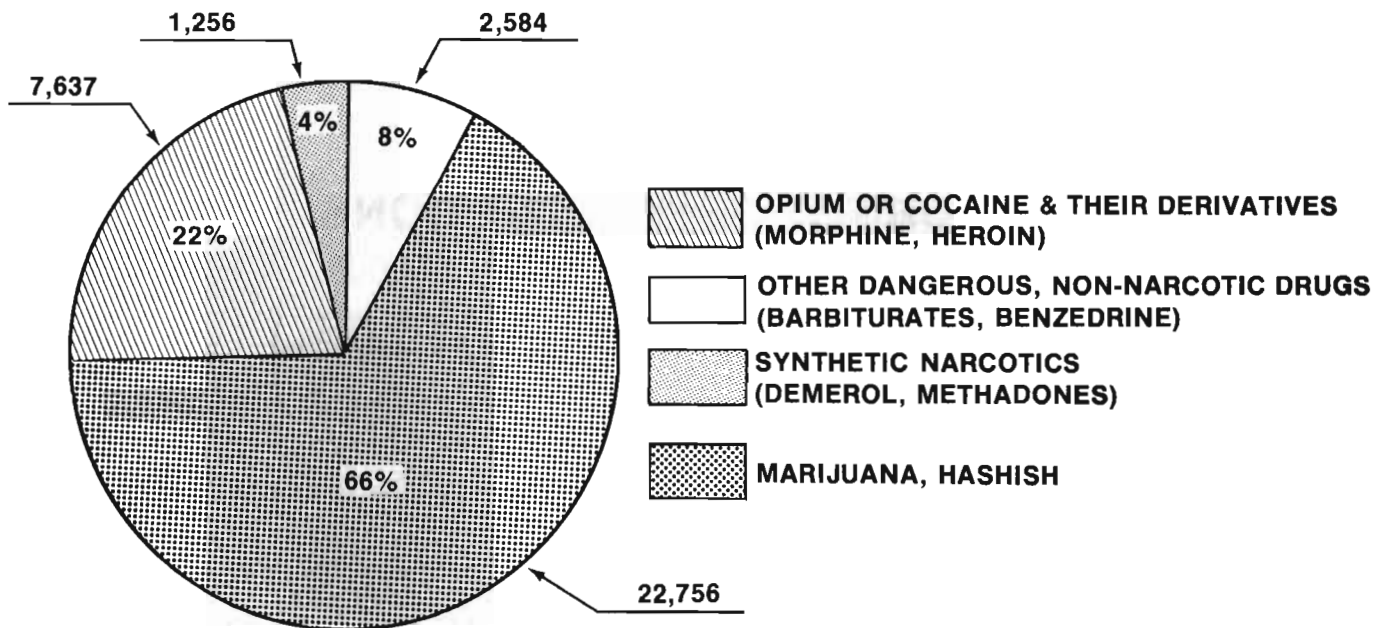
Under the program, drug abuse violations are defined as the unlawful sale/manufacturing, possession/use of the below listed narcotics and drugs:

- a. Opium or Cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine).
- b. Marijuana, hashish, etc.
- c. Synthetic narcotics—manufactured narcotics which can cause true drug addiction—(demerol, methadones).
- d. Other—dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, amphetamines, hallucinogens).





- There were 34,233 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for drug abuse violations; a one percent increase compared to 1981.
- Adults accounted for 83 percent and juveniles 17 percent of the arrests.

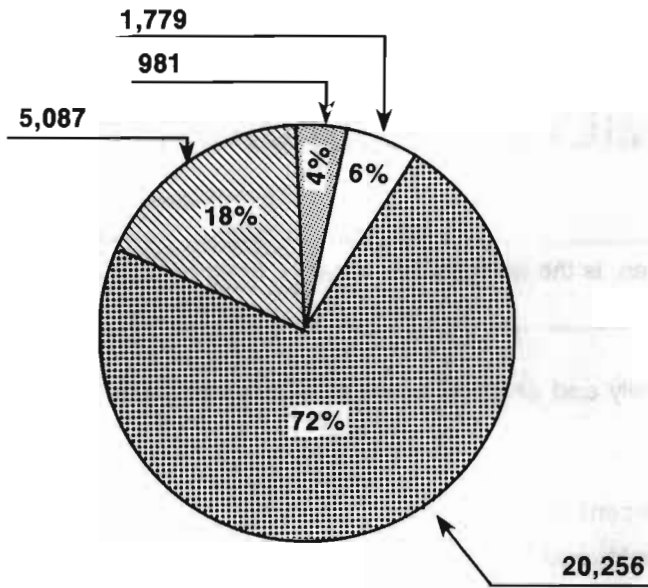
- Sixty percent of persons arrested for drug abuse violations were between the ages of 16 to 24.
- Males accounted for 87 percent of the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 13 percent.
- Sixty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, and 31 percent were black.
- Arrests for possession/use of drugs accounted for 82 percent of the arrests, and the remaining 18 percent were for the sale/manufacturing of drugs.
- Arrests for marijuana/hashish represented 72 percent of the possession/use category and 41 percent of the sale/manufacturing category. Overall, they accounted for 66 percent of the total drug abuse violation arrests.
- Arrests for the sale/manufacturing of drugs increased 9 percent in 1982 compared to 1981.

TOTAL ARRESTS 34,233**

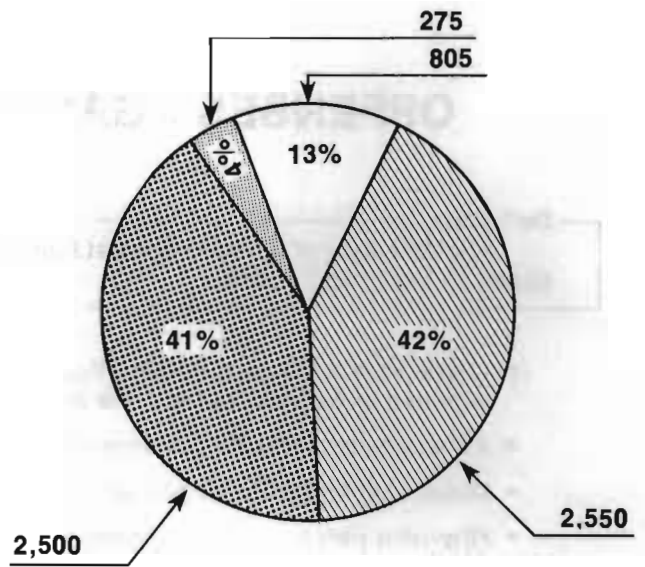

GAMBLING

Definition

Gambling violations are defined as the promoting, permitting, or engaging in illegal gambling.

- There were 498 gambling arrests reported during 1982, resulting in a 10 percent increase compared to 1981.
- Ninety-nine percent of the arrests were adults, and one percent were juveniles.
- Males represented 85 percent, and females 15 percent of the gambling arrests.
- Sixty-six percent of the persons arrested were white, and 34 percent were black.

OFFENSES AGAINST FAMILY AND CHILDREN

Definition

The definition of offenses against family and children, is the nonsupport, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.

- There were 4,468 arrests for offenses against family and children during 1982, representing an increase of 13 percent from the previous year.
- All arrests for this offense were adults.
- Males accounted for 93 percent and females 7 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-nine percent of the persons arrested were white, and 41 percent were black.

DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE

Definition

Under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, the offense of driving under the influence is defined as the driving or operating of any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of alcohol or narcotics.

- There were 41,890 arrests reported for driving under the influence in 1982, an increase of 32 percent compared to 1981.
- Ninety-eight percent of the arrests were adults and only 2 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 89 percent of the arrests, while females accounted for the remaining 11 percent.
- Ninety percent of the persons arrested were white and 10 percent were black.

LIQUOR LAWS

Definition

Included in this category are state or local liquor law violations, with the exception of "driving under the influence."

- There were 12,703 arrests reported for liquor law violations; an increase of 21 percent over the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 52 percent of the arrests, while the remaining 48 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 83 percent of the liquor law arrests, while females accounted for the remaining 17 percent.
- Ninety-three percent of the persons arrested were white, and 7 percent were black.

DISORDERLY CONDUCT

Definition

In this category are placed all charges of committing a breach of the peace (disorderly person).

- There were 41,344 arrests for disorderly conduct in 1982, an increase of 1 percent compared to 1981.
- Sixty-nine percent of the arrests were adults while the remaining 31 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 84 percent and females 16 percent of the disorderly conduct arrests.
- Seventy-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, and 23 percent were black.

FAILURE TO GIVE GOOD ACCOUNT

Definition

In this category are persons charged with vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

- There were 244 arrests in this category during the year, a 53 percent decrease compared to 1981.
- Juveniles accounted for 18 percent of the arrests while adults accounted for the remaining 82 percent.
- Males represented 86 percent and females 14 percent of the arrests in this category.
- Fifty-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, and 42 percent were black.

ALL OTHER OFFENSES

Definition

Included in this category are all violations of state and local laws, except those offenses that can be categorized into one of the specific crime classifications previously mentioned.

- There were 66,356 arrests reported for all other offenses during 1982, a 2 percent increase over 1981.
- Adults accounted for 74 percent and juveniles 26 percent of persons arrested for all other offenses.
- Eighty-three percent of the arrests were males, while 17 percent were females.
- Seventy-three percent of the persons arrested were white and 27 percent were black.

CURFEW AND LOITERING LAW VIOLATIONS

Definition

In this category are juvenile arrests made for violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances.

- There were 3,164 arrests reported for curfew and loitering law violations during the year; this represents no significant change compared to 1981.
- Males represented 74 percent and females 26 percent of the arrests.
- Eighty-three percent of the persons arrested were white, and 17 percent were black.

RUNAWAYS

Definition

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, this category is limited to juveniles taken into protective custody, under provisions of local statutes, as runaways.

- There were 6,012 runaway arrests reported in 1982; an 8 percent decrease compared to 1981.
- Females accounted for 59 percent and males accounted for 41 percent of the arrests.
- Eighty percent of the persons arrested were white, and 20 percent were black.

CRIME INDEX FOR POPULATION GROUPS—1982

The presentation of crime statistics by population groups was made for the purpose of projecting, for consideration, the relative crime experience of communities of varying populations. Although the individual municipalities within the various groups may be geographically separated, their inclusion into a specific group was predicted by the similarity in population with the other municipalities within the group. Municipalities within the same group may differ widely when all factors are considered, but they do share the common bond of population size. The grouping of communities in this manner allows recognition of variances in the crime volumes, rates and clearances between the established groups.

Set forth below are the established municipal groupings as used in this section:

- During the five year period, Urban communities experienced the largest percentage change in Index offenses, an increase of 18 percent.
- Rural communities experienced an increase of 10 percent over the same period, while Suburban communities remained relatively unchanged.
- The largest increase in violent crime occurred in Urban communities, a 50 percent increase.
- Urban communities also experienced the largest increase in the nonviolent crime category, a rise of 14 percent.
- In Urban communities, the most significant change occurred in the robbery category (an increase of 70 percent), while in Suburban and Rural communities the category of aggravated assault was the most significant (increases of 37 and 58 percent, respectively.)

- In 1982 there were 30,725 Index crimes reported in Rural municipalities, a 4 percent decrease compared to 1981.
- Seven percent of the state's Index crime occurred in Rural communities.
- Violent crime increased 2 percent and accounted for 4 percent of the state's total violent crime.
- Nonviolent crime decreased 5 percent and represented 8 percent of the nonviolent crime in the state.

STATE

CRIME IN THE CITIES

This section will deal with serious crimes reported in the large urban cities of the state. These cities represent twenty-one percent of the population and historically account for one third of the reported Crime Index of the state.

This analysis involves the latest ten year period (1973-1982) and endeavors to further identify crime trends in these urban areas.

The cities included in this analysis have been categorized as urban municipalities (i.e., densely populated with extensive development) by the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning.

The criteria used in the selection of these cities were (1) to be classified as urban character and (2) have a population of 50,000 or more inhabitants.

For further comparative analysis, the urban cities were subdivided into two distinct groupings.

Group number one consisted of the state's six largest urban centers with populations of 80,000 or over, and categorized as the "Major Urban."

The second group included the "Major Urban" and the additional urban communities with populations of 50,000 or more inhabitants, and referred to as the "Urban 15."

CRIME IN THE CITIES

Summary

Distribution

- Six major urban centers—Camden, Newark, Jersey City, Trenton, Paterson and Elizabeth—collectively represent 13 percent of New Jersey's total population. These same urban centers, during the period 1973 through 1982 accounted for 23 percent of the state's total crime.
- The six centers from 1973 through 1982 accounted for 51 percent of all violent crime and 21 percent of the nonviolent crimes in the entire state.
- The 15 urban municipalities represent 21 percent of the state's total population.
- For the period 1973 through 1982, these 15 urban municipalities accounted for 32 percent of New Jersey's total Index, 60 percent of all violent crime, and 29 percent of the state's nonviolent crime.
- Nearly 7 out of every 10 robberies reported occurred in the "Urban 15" cities during this ten year period.

- During the ten year period (1973-1982), the Crime Index in New Jersey has increased 41 percent, while the "Urban 15" cities increased 33 percent and the six major urban cities increased 24 percent.
- Violent crime in the state increased 57 percent, the 15 urban cities increased 47 percent and the six major cities increased 39 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in the state increased 39 percent, the "Urban 15" increased 30 percent and the six major cities increased 21 percent.

STREET CRIME

There has never been a clear-cut definition for street crime within the criminal justice system. The nation's clearing house for the collection and dissemination of criminal statistics, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has no criteria in the categorization of specific crimes to be designated or defined as "street crimes." More and more this media term has been confused with the violent crime group of murder, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

Although any particular crime can and does occur on the street, this analysis, because of reporting constraints within the Uniform Crime Reporting System, is limited to defining street crimes as those offenses which occur, or are most likely to occur, on streets, highways, parking lots, etc. These crimes include highway robbery, purse-snatching, theft from autos, theft of auto parts and accessories, theft of bicycles, and motor vehicle thefts. All are crimes against property and only one, highway robbery, falls in the violent crime group.

- During the ten year period 1973-1982 the "Urban 15" cities accounted for 35 percent of the street crimes in the state.
- Three out of every four highway robberies occurred in the "Urban 15" during the ten year period.
- Almost half of all motor vehicle thefts during the survey span, occurred in these 15 urban municipalities.
- Fifty-three percent of all purse-snatchings were perpetrated in the "Urban 15" cities.
- Street crime increased 36 percent since 1973.

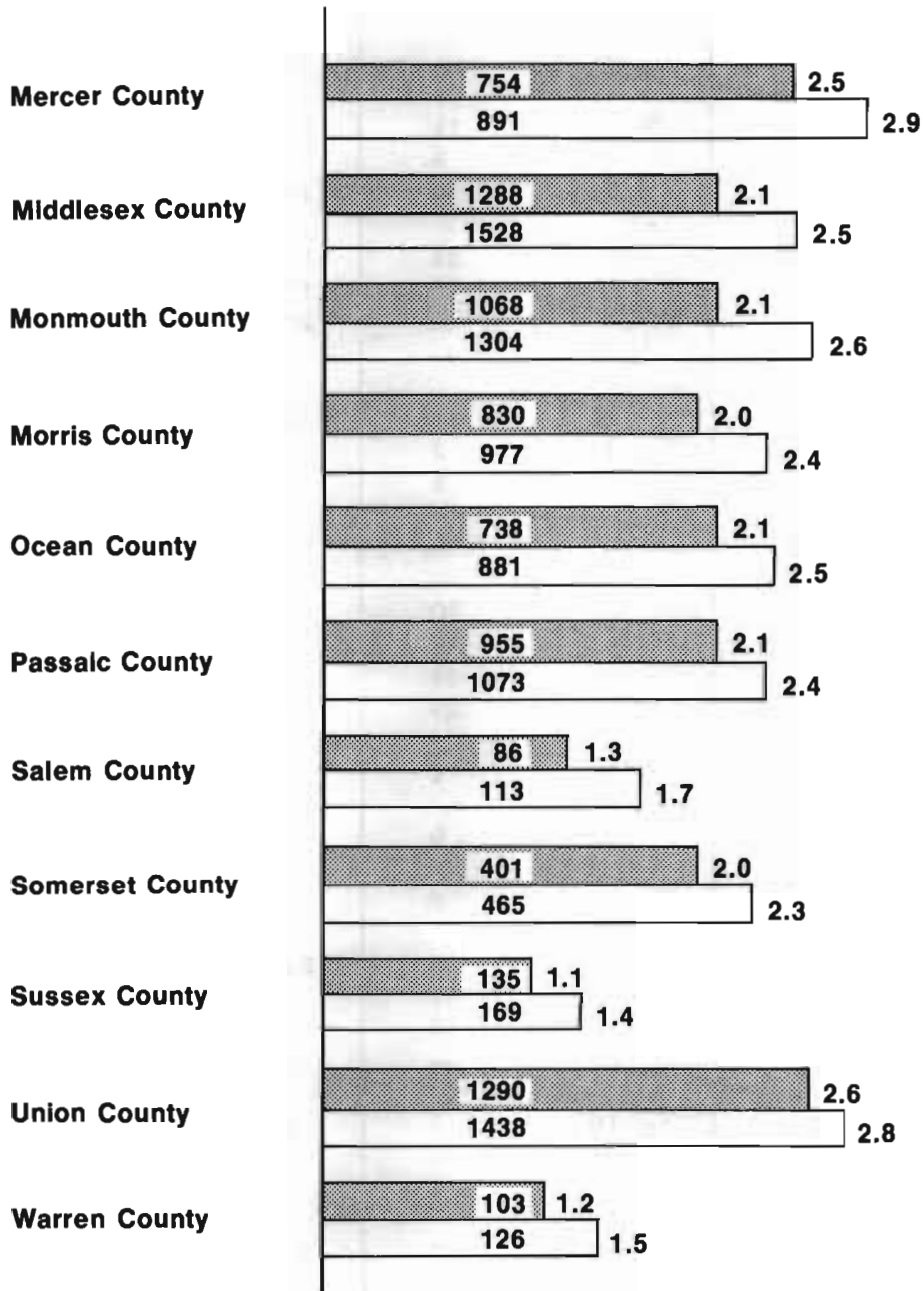
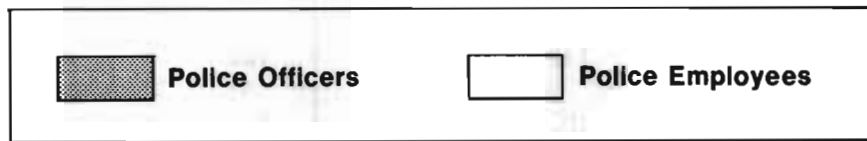

POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey incorporates the collection of pertinent data relating to the police of the state. Information regarding police employee strength, and trends are discussed in this section.

Individual listings of full-time state, county, university and college police departments are shown in tables within this section. Listings of municipal police departments will be found in the section entitled "New Jersey Demographic Section."

The determination of police strength for any given area or municipality should be subject for serious consideration. Such consideration, however, should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. For example, the increased need for police service in a municipality which has a highly mobile or seasonal population, differs from a municipality which has a relatively stable population. Some other factors, discussed elsewhere in this publication, relate to size, density of population, geographic location, character, and proximity to metropolitan areas. The tables and charts shown in this section should not be interpreted as recommended strength for any given municipality.

TOTAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

Total police employees are defined as the total number of full-time police officers and civilian police employees (clerks, dispatchers, mechanics, etc.) employed by all law enforcement agencies in the state.

- During 1982, there were 34,439 full time police employees in New Jersey. This represents a 2 percent increase compared to the 33,829 full time police employees in 1981.
- The number of full time police officers increased 2 percent, from 25,676 in 1981 to 26,158 in 1982.
- The number of full time civilian employees increased 2 percent, from 8,153 in 1981 to 8,281 in 1982.
- Seventy-six percent were sworn officers and the remaining 24 percent were civilian employees.

MUNICIPAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

This category consists of the number of police employees, including civilian personnel, employed full time by municipalities of the state.

- During 1982, there were 19,855 municipal police employees, no significant change compared to the 19,823 in 1981.
- There were 2.7 municipal police employees for every 1,000 inhabitants of the state; no change since 1976.
- Atlantic County reported the largest increase in municipal police employees, an increase of 8 percent (69 employees).
- Atlantic County also recorded the highest police employee rate; 5 per 1,000 population; (this rate is computed on the static population and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population.)
- Hunterdon County recorded the lowest police employee rate of 1.3 per 1,000 population.

OTHER POLICE (State Agencies)

In addition to the State Police, there were seven other state agencies reporting to the System. These agencies consist of: Bureau of Forest Fire Service, Bureau of State Parks, Department of Corrections, Division of Criminal Justice, Division of Fish and Game, Division of Weights and Measures, Palisades Interstate Park. No rates were computed due to the variations in the types of police service rendered, and their statewide jurisdictions.

- Together, these agencies reported a total of 5,521 full-time police employees; a 10 percent increase compared to the 5,035 police employees in 1981.
- There were 2,553 sworn police officers in 1982, an increase of 11 percent compared to the 2,303 in 1981.
- These agencies reported 2,968 civilian police employees in 1982, representing a 9 percent increase compared to the 2,732 reported in 1981.
- Forty-six percent were sworn personnel, while the remaining 54 percent were civilians.

MUNICIPAL CIVILIAN POLICE EMPLOYEES

The personnel of each department differ as to the demands and responsibilities placed before them. Many police officers are fully occupied with clerical tasks and are not free to perform active police duties. Employing civilians in police departments to perform clerical duties is in line with the thinking of many police administrators who recommend the use of civilians in this capacity, thus freeing the sworn personnel for actual police related services.

- There were 2,744 municipal civilian police employees in 1982, a 5 percent increase compared to the 2,617 in 1981.
- Fourteen percent of all municipal police employees were civilian.

MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

This includes the number of sworn police officers employed full-time by municipalities of the state. The police employee rate per 1,000 population presented here should not be construed as being recommended ratios. The determination of police strength for any municipality should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. These factors, as crime, vary in type and degree from place to place. Some examples are: seasonal population, geographic location, density and composition of the population.

- There were 17,111 full-time municipal police officers in 1982; this represents a decrease of one percent, compared to the 17,206 full-time municipal police officers in 1981.
- The number of full-time municipal police officers was calculated at 2.3 per 1,000 population; no change since 1974.
- Eighty-six percent of all municipal police employees were sworn officers.
- The largest numerical increase occurred in Mercer County; an increase of 28 municipal police officers, or 4 percent.
- The largest numerical decrease occurred in Essex County; a decrease of 88 municipal police officers or 3 percent.
- Atlantic County, with 3.7 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants, recorded the highest rate of full-time municipal police officers. (This rate is computed on the static population, and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population.)
- Sussex County recorded the lowest rate of full-time municipal police officers with 1.1 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

COUNTY POLICE, SHERIFFS, AND PROSECUTORS

The functions of county law enforcement officers vary widely throughout the state. The operation of one sheriff's department may be limited exclusively to civil areas and the administration of the county jail, or they may be actively involved in criminal matters throughout the county.

County police departments are varied in their activities as well, in that some are responsible for enforcement throughout the county, while others may have as their primary mission the policing of county parklands. The responsibilities of county prosecutors' officers include criminal investigations, trial preparation, court presentation and special probes. Because of the difference in the types of police service rendered, rates for county law enforcement agencies are not presented here.

- County law enforcement agencies reported a total of 5,454 full-time police employees in 1982; an increase of 7 percent compared to the 5,119 in 1981.
- There were 3,995 full-time sworn police officers employed by county agencies in 1982. This represents an increase of 6 percent compared to the 3,774 in 1981.
- The county police agencies reported 1,459 civilian police employees in 1982; an 8 percent increase compared to the 1,345 in 1981.
- Seventy-three percent were sworn personnel while the remaining 27 percent were civilians.

STATE POLICE

The State Police total includes personnel from the Highway Patrol, Marine Police, Alcoholic Beverage Control Enforcement Bureau, Capital Police, and Fire Marshals. The breakdown for each bureau is depicted on the State Police Personnel chart.

The New Jersey State Police is empowered to provide all phases of law enforcement throughout the state. It also renders, upon request, police services to all the law enforcement agencies in the state. No rates are used due to the variations in the nature and extent of the police services performed by the State Police.

- The New Jersey State Police reported 3,224 full-time police employees; a decrease of 7 percent compared to the 3,451 in 1981.
- There were 2,282 State Police officers in 1982; an increase of 5 percent compared to the 2,171 in 1981.
- The State Police reported 942 civilian employees in 1982; a decrease of 26 percent compared to the 1,280 in 1981.
- Seventy-one percent of the total State Police employees were sworn personnel, while the remaining 29 percent were civilians.

SECTION IX LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED SUMMARY

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POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED

The killing or assault of a police officer has a deleterious effect on society that reaches far beyond the overt act. Such occurrences constitute an immediate threat to the well-being of the community and serious breach of the internal security of the country. Today a young man who considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the very strong possibility of being killed or assaulted by a member of the very same society he is sworn to protect. This deplorable situation should be a subject of serious public concern, for in truth, an attack on a police officer is an attack on society. The violence directed against law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty is clearly demonstrated by the following information.

- In 1982, there were no New Jersey police officers killed as a result of criminal action.
- Since the inception of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program in January 1967, thirty-eight police officers have been feloniously killed in the line of duty.

ASSAULTS ON POLICE OFFICERS

Police assault statistics are important to the police administrator who attempts to identify the causative factors of this type of criminal activity. Many factors contribute to police assaults, and circumstances vary from place to place, it is therefore extremely difficult to identify specific reasons for these assaults. The following information illustrates the frequency of these events, and any attempt at analysis of these assaults should include consideration of the unique variables present in each jurisdiction. Due to the broad field of services performed by many state and county police agencies, no assault rates are computed for total police officers.

VOLUME/TREND

- There were 4,787 police officers assaulted in 1982, a 2 percent decrease compared to the 4,863 officers assaulted in 1981.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Thirty-one percent (1,485) of the officers assaulted, sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 89 percent of all police assaults.
- Thirty-two percent of police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Thirty percent of the assaults on police officers occurred during the four hour period of 10:00 p.m. to 2:00 a.m.

ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing 99 percent of the assaults directed at them.
- Thirty-six percent of those arrested for police assaults were charged with an indictable offense, 54 percent were charged with the lesser non-indictable offense and the remaining 10 percent were juvenile offenders.

ASSAULTS ON MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 4,333 municipal police officers assaulted during 1982, a one percent decrease compared to the 4,379 assaulted in 1981.
- The assault rate, for every 100 municipal police officers, was 25.3; a one percent decrease compared to 1981.

ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Thirty percent of the municipal police officers assaulted, sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists, and feet were used in 90 percent of all police assaults.
- Thirty-five percent of municipal police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Attempting Other Arrests accounted for 18 percent of municipal police assaults.

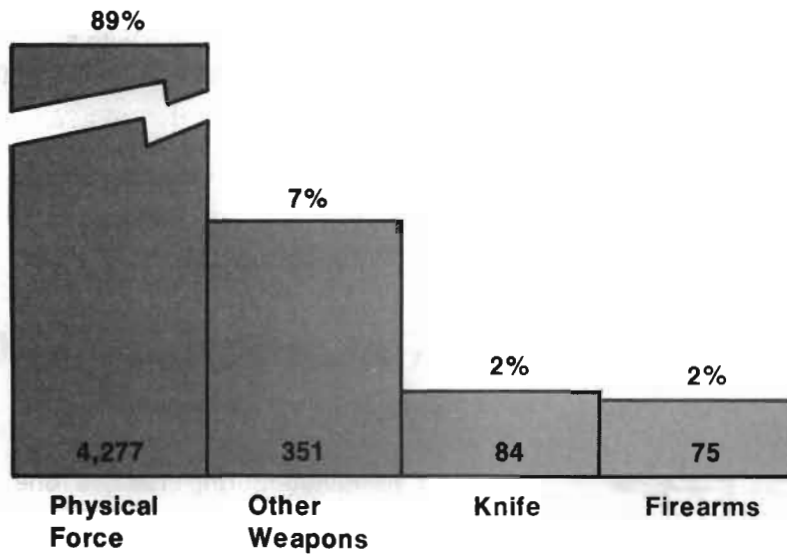
OTHER POLICE OFFICERS ASSAULTED

The following law enforcement agencies are dealt with separately and, are not included when computing municipal assault rates; the services performed by these agencies vary greatly from the functions of municipal police agencies.

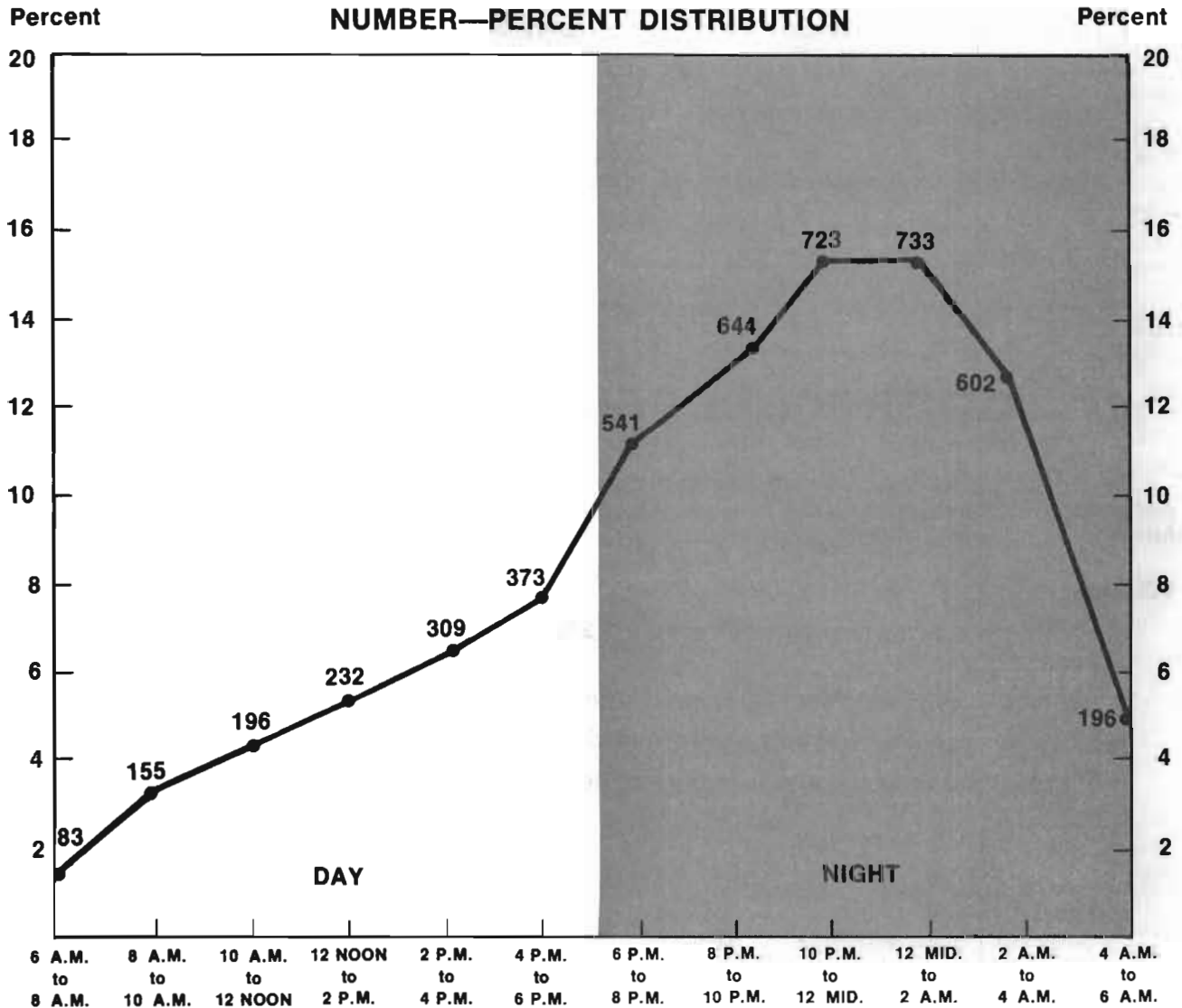
VOLUME

- County law enforcement agencies reported 230 officers assaulted, with 75 sustaining physical injury.
- The New Jersey State Police reported 61 officers assaulted, with 33 sustaining injury.
- Other state agencies, with police powers, reported 138 officers assaulted and 91 sustaining injury.
- University and college police agencies reported 25 officers assaulted with 7 sustaining injury.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

ADULT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person aged 18 or over.
AMERICAN INDIAN or ALASKAN NATIVE	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America, and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
ARREST RATE	The number of arrests reported for Part I and Part II offenses for each unit of population, generally per 1,000.
ASIAN or PACIFIC ISLANDER	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes for example, China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.
BLACK	A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa, characterized by dark skin pigmentation. For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the solution to a particular crime, usually by the arrest of the offender.
CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the solution to a particular crime, usually by the arrest of the offender.
CLEARED BY ARREST	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared when the offender has been identified, sufficient evidence has been obtained to formally charge and the offender has been ordered to appear in court.
CRIME INDEX	The sum total of seven major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in a geographical area. The following crimes make up the Index: Murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft; these offenses are referred to as Index offenses.
CRIME RATE	The number of Index offenses reported for each unit of population per 1,000.
CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS	Consists of the following index offenses: Murder, forcible rape, and aggravated assault.
CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY	Consists of the following Index offenses: Robbery, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
DAY	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.
EXCEPTIONAL CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared in this manner when an offender has been identified, located and sufficient evidence to charge has been obtained but there is some reason beyond police control which prohibits the offender from being brought before the court.
HIERARCHY RULE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, each crime or attempted crime is counted in only one offense category. If several offenses are committed, simply glance down the list of Part I offenses and stop at the first offense you recognize from the facts given; this offense is the correct classification for this criminal activity.
JUVENILE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person under the age of 18.

JUVENILE
CLEARANCE

Those crimes where the offenders are identified as juveniles.

NIGHT

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m.

NONVIOLENT
CRIME

Consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.

VIOLENT CRIME

Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

WHITE

A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.

CALCULATIONS OF RATES AND TRENDS

1. **Crime Rate per 1,000 Inhabitants**—This represents the number of Index offenses per 1,000 inhabitants.

For example: What is the crime rate for a municipality with 513 Index offenses (murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft), with a population of 8,280?

$513 \text{ (Index offenses)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .061957 \times 1,000 = 62.0 \text{ (crime rate per 1,000 inhabitants)}$

2. **Crime Trend**—A crime trend shows the extent to which crime increased or decreased. This is done by comparing a period of the current year with the same period of a previous year.

For example: A municipality experienced 264 Index offenses in 1980 and 513 Index offenses in 1981. What is the percent of increase?

$513 \text{ (1981 Index offenses)} - 264 \text{ (1980 Index offenses)} = 249 \text{ (numerical increase)}$

$249 \text{ (numerical increase)} \div 264 \text{ (previous year)} = .943 \times 100 = +94\% \text{ (percent increase)}$

Note: If there were more Index offenses in 1980 than in 1981, we would have a percentage decrease.

3. **Number of Police Personnel Per 1,000 Inhabitants**—This is calculated in the same manner as crime rate.

For example: A municipality with a population of 8,280 and 28 police personnel. How many police officers are there per 1,000 population?

$28 \text{ (police personnel)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .00338 \times 1,000 = 3.4 \text{ (police personnel per 1,000 inhabitants)}$

Note: This formula can be applied to either total police personnel or just police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

4. **Police Assaulted Rate**—This is calculated at a rate per 100 police officers.

For example: A municipality with 25 officers had 5 of them assaulted during the month. What is the police assaulted rate?

$5 \text{ (police officers assaulted)} \div 25 \text{ (police officers)} = .2 \times 100 = 20 \text{ (police assaulted per 100 police officers)}$

5. **Clearance Rate**—This refers to the percent of Index offenses cleared (solved), over a specified period of time.

For example: A municipality with 513 Index offenses in 1981, cleared 95 of these offenses. What is the clearance rate?

$95 \text{ (Index offenses cleared)} \div 513 \text{ (Index offenses)} \times 100 = 18.5 \text{ (percent cleared)}$



To reduce crime, you must first identify its extent, type and location
