Available programs offered in addition to traditional academics include Gifted \& Talented, Grade 3 Honors Math, Intervention Services, and a Specials schedule comprised of the following classes: Art, Library, Spanish, Music, Physical Education, and Computers. Students have daily access to various technologies and all third grade classrooms have a set of laptop computers.

Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

Members of a leadership club called Student Voice, meet during recess time in an effort to engage in various school greening, character \& service initiatives. Third grade clubs meet after school hours. They are generated and based on student interest, and currently include: STEAM Team Club, Roots \& Shoots Club, STEM Club, SEL Service Club, and Wellness Club. Offerings can change annually, based on student feedback.
