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REPORT.

To the Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

I have the honor to submit herewith my report of the operations of the Quartermaster-General's Department for the year ended October 31, 1904.

SMALL ARMS.

There has been received from the National Government during the year, under the provisions of the act of January 21, 1903, an additional supply of the calibre .30 rifles and carbines of the model 1898 and 1899, respectively, giving the State a total number sufficient for the armament of the National Guard to its maximum strength as fixed by law.

UNIFORMS.

General Orders No. 2, Office of the Adjutant-General, dated March 22, 1904, amending G. O. No. 9, of 1903, prescribing the regulation uniform for officers and enlisted men of the National Guard, added the khaki field coat, trousers, and leggins as a part thereof. A supply of this clothing was drawn from the United Militia under the acts for arming and equipping the organized Militia and issued to the National Guard. They were worn constantly during the service incident to the encampment and rifle practice at Sea Girt, and the maneuvers at Manassas, Va., and added greatly to the comfort of the troops, and imparted to them a neat and soldierly appearance that elicited much favorable comment.

For the blue uniform for winter wear the lined blouse and blue shirt used by the U. S. Army will be worn, with trousers of the

New Jersey regulation shade, with brown leggins. A requisition for 1200 of the blouses has been made upon the Quartermaster-General's Department of the U. S. Army, and a contract made with the Wm. H. Horstmann Company for an equal supply of kersey trousers.

CHANGES.

Pursuant to G. O. No. 14, Office of the Adjutant-General, dated November 20, 1903, Company K, 3d Regiment, stationed at Long Branch, was disbanded, and all military stores, the property of the State, in possession of the company, have been returned to the arsenal and deficiencies accounted for. Pursuant to S. O. No. 8, Office of Adjutant-General, dated February 23, 1904, there was a new company mustered in at Bridgeton, February 26, 1904, attached to the Third Regiment, and designated as Company K. This company has been uniformed, armed and equipped.

SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR CLAIMS.

In my last report an amount was shown of \$64,158.48 of unsettled items for which a money allowance was claimed. Under the acts of Congress of July 8, 1898, and March 3, 1899, for the reimbursement to States and Territories for expenses incurred in raising troops for the U. S. Army in the late war with Spain, no part of these unsettled items could be paid for the reason that the expenses represented thereby were incurred after the muster of the New Jersey troops into the service of the United States. After more than two years persistent efforts on the part of the Hon. H. C. Loudenslager, Congress passed a bill, the vital provisions of which, removing the objections stated above, were drawn by Captain Armstrong, of this Department, in 1902. The bill received the approval of the President, April 27, 1904.

On July 14, 1904, the Auditor for the War Department made a cash allowance on the unsettled items of the first, second, third, fourth and fifth installments of \$61,823.34. The account stands as follows:

These final disallowances may be conceded as not properly chargeable against the United States, as they represent expenses incurred before the declaration of war, and for items of expense not considered by the Auditor as being directly connected with raising volunteers.

Under date of December 27, 1901, there was a claim (6th installment) amounting to \$55,831.31, filed with the Auditor for the War Department for pay of officers and enlisted men from the date of arrival at rendezvous at Sea Girt until date of muster. The claim comes within provisions of the act of March 3, 1899. All documentary evidence obtainable, called for in support of this claim, has been filed with the Auditor, and his final action thereon is expected at an early day.

STATE CAMP GROUNDS AND ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT.

The organizations of the Second Brigade under command of Brigadier General Q. O'M. Gillmore, encamped at Sea Girt from July 9th to 23d, 1904. This brigade comprises the Second and Third Regiments, Second Troop Cavalry, and Battery B, Field Artillery.

The expenses of the encampment amounted to \$23,249.54, as follows:

A contract for building jetties for protection of rifle pits and sea coast battery from the action of the surf has been made with Benjamin A. Van Brunt, of Sea Bright, and the work is now in progress. There should be four of these jetties, but the amount, \$6,000, appropriated by the Legislature is sufficient only for the cost of the two now in course of construction.

MILITARY MANEUVERS AT MANASSAS, VA.

Pursuant to S. O. No. 15, Headquarters Division N. G. N. J., dated July 7th, 1904, the Fourth and Fifth Regiments, National Guard, were designated to participate in the military maneuvers at Manassas, Va. The operations of this department were confined to the issue of the stores necessary for the proper equipment of the two regiments for this service. Ponchos, overcoats, blankets, shelter tents, individual mess outfits, with canteens and haversacks for personal equipment, were forwarded to the respective armories of the Fourth and Fifth Regiments, and issued to the different organizations under the supervision of the regimental quartermasters.

All camp equipage and quartermaster's stores were loaded on two baggage cars at the State Arsenal, securely locked and sealed,

and marked for consignment to the Fourth and Fifth Regiments at Thoroughfare and Manassas, Va., respectively. This work was done under the personal supervision of Colonel George P. Olcott, Deputy Quartermaster-General, especially detailed for this service. Colonel Olcott performed this important duty in a manner entirely satisfactory.

As the regiments passed through Trenton these cars were picked up and attached to the troop trains, and thus transported to their destinations.

The Government urged the necessity of an elaborate medical outfit for the field hospitals for each regiment. After some modifications in the list presented by Major Phillips, Surgeon, U. S. Army, the stores were drawn on requisition of the Governor. The medical supplies were forwarded by the Government direct to the stations at Thoroughfare and Manassas, Va., and turned over to the regimental surgeons. They were never used, but brought back intact. The wagons included in the field hospital outfit were not received from the Government until after the maneuvers were ended, and are stored at the State Arsenal as received.

The camp equipage and quartermaster's stores were returned with but few deficiencies, but the returns of individual equipment show a considerable shortage, notably in ponchos, mess outfits, haversacks and canteens. When the cars were received at Trenton they were found to be unlocked, and the stores packed in a very disorderly condition, largely owing, perhaps, to limited time incident to the departure of the various troops for their home stations.

The balances remaining in the hands of the Paymaster General of the appropriations of 1899 and 1903 for additional compensation and reimbursement for clothing, to volunteers raised by the Governor of this State for the U. S. Army during the late war with Spain, have been covered into the State treasury. A few claims coming within the provisions of the Act of 1903 have since been received, and it will be necessary for the Legislature to make a small appropriation to meet them.

An itemized statement of the amounts paid the several organizations of the National Guard for service at the encampment will be found in the Appendix.

RECEIPTS FROM THE UNITED STATES.

Of the money allotment of \$21,241.82 paid over to the Quartermaster General as disbursing officer, pursuant to Section 14 of the Act of January 21, 1903, for expenses of the encampment of 1903, there was expended the sum of \$4,865.50 for transportation and the balance of \$16,376.32 turned over to the U. S. Treasury, to be recredited to New Jersey's allotment. Under the above-mentioned section, there was drawn and deposited to the credit of Colonel William H. Earley, Deputy Quartermaster General, disbursing officer for 1904, the sum of \$26,679.88.

The vouchers for these expenditures made by disbursing officers have been filed with the Military Secretary, U. S. A., for transmission to the respective departments of pay, subsistence and transportation for preliminary examinations and audit. After the vouchers are passed upon by these departments, they are sent to the Auditor for the War Department, an official of the Treasury, for final settlement.

Ordnance and quartermaster's stores and money to the value of \$40,607.47 have been drawn on requisitions of the Governor, and charged to the quota of the State for arming and equipping the militia (Section 1661, Revised Statutes, as amended). The balance to the credit of the State at this date is \$38,353.49.

Under the Act of March 2d, 1903, ordnance, clothing and quartermaster's stores to the value of \$8,496.98 have been drawn on requisitions of the Governor, leaving a balance of \$12,479.76 standing to the credit of the State.

Stores to the value of \$8,335.43 have been drawn for arming and equipping the Naval Militia, leaving a balance available of \$5,610.55.
