BY THE NUMBERS: ASBURY PARK RECOVERY SINCE SANDY

	FEMA has obligated over \$6.6 million in federal funds through the Public Assistance
\$6,600,000	program to Asbury Park for eligible debris removal, emergency services and rebuilding activities.
\$3,300,000	Asbury Park residents and businesses have received approximately <i>\$3.3 million</i> in payouts from the National Flood Insurance Program.
\$465,920	Asbury Park residents have received approximately <i>\$465,920</i> in FEMA Individual Assistance, which includes repair costs, replacement costs, rental assistance and other needs assistance.
\$350,000	Asbury Park received an Essential Services grant of <i>\$350,000</i> through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program.
\$199,611	EDA Stronger NJ Business Grant has approved 4 grants to Asbury Park businesses worth <i>\$199,611</i> .
\$9,192	Asbury Park City School District, received <i>\$9,192</i> in funding from the U.S. Department of Education's Project School Emergency Response to Violence grant program, which provides services designed to maintain safe learning environments for children. The program was made available to schools that were disrupted by the storm.
