## REPORT.

To the Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

SIR—I have the honor to submit the following report of the principal operations of this Department for the fiscal year ending October 31, 1906, together with such observations and suggestions as seem to be necessary.

### SMALL ARMS.

The Government has perfected the new calibre .30 rifle, designated as the United States Magazine Rifle, model of 1903. In his last annual report, June 30, 1906, the Chief of Ordnance, U. S. A., says:

"The manufacture of these rifles has progressed satisfactorily during the year, and the regular troops in the United States were supplied with the earlier form in order to permit of their use during the target season. The improved rifle, having knife bayonets and rear sights, model of 1905, has since been issued to the troops in the Philippines, and immediately after the maneuvers the improved rifle will be issued to the regular troops in the States and the first issue recalled. The behavior of the new musket has been a source of gratification, as but few faults have developed. The principal source of complaint has been the breakage of cocking pieces. In my report of a year since, mention was made of the necessity for a redesign of the cocking piece to satisfactorily fulfil a new condition imposed by the revised infantry drill regulations. The cocking piece, as redesigned, required an entirely different grade of steel, and during the transition period many of these component parts were made from material on hand and issued to the service. Reports of break-

ages have been received, but no trouble is anticipated from the parts made of the proper material. Other minor defects have also been developed, but corrective measures have been applied, and it is believed that the new musket will go into the service practically perfected."

It is the intention of the War Department to seek the necessary enabling legislation from Congress at its approaching session to rearm the National Guard of the several states and territories with the new rifle, in the manner followed in 1903, when the organized militia was rearmed with the Krag-Jorgensen rifles.

### FIELD ARTILLERY.

Battery A, Field Artillery, has been equipped with four of the new 3-inch guns, manufactured for the Government and issued without cost to the State. The guns received a service test at the Sea Girt Encampment and upon the march thereto. Lieutenant James Prentice of the 2nd Artillery, U. S. A., was detailed during the encampment of Battery A, and gave most valuable assistance to that organization in the way of instruction in the drill; and in the dismounting, dismantling, assembling and maneuvering of the guns.

It is the purpose of the Government also to equip Battery B. Field Artillery, with these guns as soon as the ordnance department is satisfied as to the condition and convenience, for both the storage of and drill with the guns, of the armory used by the battery.

The Chief of Ordnance, U. S. Army, in his last annual report, in speaking of the importance of instruction to militia batteries equipped with these modern guns, says:

"The organization of the Regular Army now provides for thirty batteries of mobile artillery. For anything like a first-class war at least 250 batteries would be required. It is apparent that there is no hope of the maintenance in the time of peace of even a fair proportion of this number in the regular service. The reliance of the country must, therefore, be largely upon organizations of some kind of which the members shall be self-supporting and devoting only a portion of their time to military training.

"The militia batteries are such organizations, and by recent appropriations increasing the amount which the United States is willing to devote to them they are given very considerable material as-

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sistance, but there is no good provision for imparting to them that instruction which, in so technical an employment, can be had only from those who acquire the necessary skill in the knowledge and use of the material in the actual practice thereof as a profession. It is believed that no more profitable use could be made, during a portion of the year, of a considerable number of officers of field artillery than to assign them as instructors to militia batteries, under a proper system to be prescribed. Practical instruction in firing could probably be best given by joining the militia batteries with the regular ones in the summer encampments; but much valuable instruction in the care of the material, and the theoretical explanations of the use thereof in the field, could well be given at the armories and on the drill grounds of which the militia batteries have use."

### SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR CLAIMS.

A further allowance of these claims was made during the year of \$3,490.77, being for amount of State pay of officers and enlisted men of the Fourth Regiment, New Jersey National Guard Volunteer Infantry, from date of arrival at Camp Voorhees, Sea Girt. in July, 1898, until muster into the United States service. The above amount added to the sum of \$33,529.71, the allowance reported last year, makes a total of \$37,020.48 allowed on the Sixth Instalment of Spanish-American War claims, leaving a total of suspensions and disallowances of this claim of \$18,983.33. As this represents almost entirely claims for pay previous to arrival at Sea Girt rendezvous, it can be safely said that but an insignificant part will ever be allowed.

Claims under these settlements were adjusted and paid through this department in accordance with the provisions of circulars of instruction promulgated through the public press and other mediums of information. The Circulars follow herewith.

TRENTON, February 1st, 1906.

1. Members of the First, Second and Third Regiments, National Guard Volunteers, which rendezvoused at Sea Girt, in May, 1898, for muster into the service of the United States for the Spanish-American War, are entitled to pay from the date of their arrival at Sea Girt, May 2d, until date of muster, under the laws governing the National Guard (see section 45 of a supplement approved March

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15th, 1878), which provides that for the performance of actual service in this State for a period of less than thirty days, commissioned officers shall receive the like pay as is received by officers of like rank in the Regular Army of the United States; and non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates shall receive one dollar per day of actual service. MEMBERS OR RECRUITS WHO WERE MUSTERED IN AFTER THE GENERAL MUSTER IN MAY, 1898, ARE NOT ENTITLED TO THIS PAY.

2. All members of the above-named regiments, entitled to this pay, will receive the amount of their claim by complying with the following regulations:

- (e) Upon the return of the warrant to this office, a check for the amount of your claim, together with your discharge, will be mailed to you, or to the person designated by you.

TRENTON, N. J., May 19th, 1906.

1. The Auditor for the War Department has made an allowance, in lieu of State pay, to officers and men of the National Guard who enlisted in the Fourth Regiment, New Jersey Volunteers, for the Spanish-American War FROM THE DATE OF THEIR ARRIVAL AT THE RENDEZVOUS AT SEA GIRT UNTIL THEY WERE MUSTERED INTO THE UNITED STATES SERVICE.

Where individuals enrolled subsequent to the date of arrival of their respective companies at Sea Girt, or mustered prior to the date of muster of their companies, they are entitled to pay from the actual date of enrollment or to the actual date of muster.

Where individuals (although enrolled) did not muster in until a date subsequent to the date on which their respective companies mustered, a suspension is made, granting an opportunity for an explanation as to why they did not muster with their companies.

Officers will receive the pay of officers of like rank in the Regular Army of the United States, and all enlisted men will be paid one dollar per day.

Fourth Regiment Infantry and the Signal and Telegraph Corps, July 30th to August 4th.

As the different organizations were permitted to go into camp on the Saturday proceding the date from which pay commenced, the grounds were occupied continuously from July 7th to August 4th.

Before doing away entirely with the old system of cooking and serving rations to the troops seated at tables in mess halls, an attempt was made to serve cooked rations individually by companies. After serving a few meals in this manner with very discouraging results, a consultation was had with Major-General Wanser, and Brigadier-General Gillmore, whose brigade (the Second) was then in camp, and it was decided to abandon finally the system of cooking and serving food in the large mess hall. Company kitchens, fully equipped with field ovens, were erected at the head of each company street, in which the rations were cooked and served therefrom to the men under the immediate supervision of the company commandants, who were held responsible by the Brigade Commander for the proper distribution of the food and the cleanliness of the mess kitchens. This is in close conformity to U. S. regulations and in accordance with the recommendation made by the late Quartermaster-General Donnelly in his report for 1903.

This plan was also approved and adopted by Brigadier-General Campbell for the First Brigade. Although begun under some unavoidable difficulties, the results were highly satisfactory and will be adhered to, with such improvements as may be suggested by expediency at future encampments.

I am glad to express here my obligations to Colonel Gilford Hurry, of the Commissary Department of the National Guard of New York, and Commissary Sergeant Frederick Meister, late of the U.

There was some dissatisfaction expressed because the enlisted men of the 1st Regiment, and 1st Troop Cavalry, received from the State but six days' pay for their services at Mt. Gretna, which going and returning covered a period of nine days, and for which period they were paid by the U. S. Army paymasters.

General Orders No. 5, Headquarters, N. G. N. J., dated May 6, 1906, providing for the encampment of the several commands comprising the Division, National Guard, at Sea Girt, directed that the 1st Regiment and 1st Troop camp from Monday, July 30th to Saturday, August 4, 1906. Paragraph 2 of said Orders reads as follows:

"The several organizations may enter camp on Saturdays, July 7, 14, 21, 28, and August 4, respectively; provided, it is understood that no pay will be allowed for the additional two days."

General Orders No. 7, Headquarters, N. G. N. J., dated June 3. 1906, excused the 1st Regiment and 1st Troop from duty at the Sea Girt Encampment. Paragraphs 2 and 3 of said orders read as follows:

"2. General Orders No. 5, these Headquarters, c. s., as far as it refers to the Fourth Regiment Infantry and Signal and Telegraph Corps, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Fourth Regiment Infantry and Signal and Telegraph Corps. Monday, July 30th to Saturday, August 4th, inclusive.

3. The First Regiment Infantry and First Troop Cavalry are hereby detached to participate in the encampment with the United States Troops at Mt. Gretna, Pennsylvania, August 19th to August 26th inclusive."

General Orders No. 7 was silent as to any change in the question of pay, which in General Orders No. 5 was limited to six days' service and on which period the estimates for the appropriation for pay for the annual encampment were based. Upon the return of the New Jersey troops from Mt. Gretna the enlisted men received the amount appropriated for their pay for six days' service at Sea Girt. I did not feel authorized by the amendment to General Orders No. 5, to make an allowance for their pay greater than the amount they would have received had they encamped at Sea Girt and for which purpose the appropriation was based as above stated.
