

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HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

ONE HUNDRED AND FOURTH SESSION.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY, Assembly Chamber, TRENTON, January 13, 1880.

At 3 o'clock P. M. the House met.

This being the day designated by the Constitution for the assembling of the One Hundred and Fourth Legislature of the State of New Jersey, and three o'clock P. M. being the hour appointed for the organization of the House of Assembly, the House was called to order by Cummins O. Cooper, Clerk of the last House.

Prayer was offered by Rev. T. R. Howlett.

Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

I feel grateful for the honor you have conferred upon me in electing me as your presiding officer. It will be my earnest endeavor to preside over your deliberations with firmness and impartiality, relying upon your assistance and friendship in the various responsibilities attending the position.

The session promises to be one of importance. The commissions appointed at the last session of the Legislature upon the subject of convict labor, the equalization of our taxes, and for the government of cities, will make their reports. Besides these there will be other matters, of equal importance, affecting the interests of the people of the State.

I trust when the session closes we may all feel that we have discharged the duties required of us under the Constitution, and that our labors may have been performed in the interest of the State, when we may separate in friendship with the assurance that our work has been well performed.

A message was received from the Governor at the hands of Mr. Edward D. Fox, Clerk in the Executive Department, as follows:

Gentlemen of the Senate and General Assembly:

With the advent of another year, it again becomes my duty to present for your consideration a brief outline of the condition of the Commonwealth.

So far as concerns the people at large, the State Government, and the vast majority of the local subdivisions of the State, that condition is eminently satisfactory.

I shall not enter upon the details of the various funds and expenditures of the State, but will refer you to the very satisfactory and excellent reports of the Comptroller and Treasurer, wherein will be found, in a connected and intelligible form, all the information needed to give you a complete knowledge of the subject.

During the financial year just now terminated, it has not been necessary to contract any temporary loans, as there has always been more than enough money in the treasury to meet the current demands, so that at its close all balances of appropriations then due had been paid, and the only existing indebtedness was the outstanding war debt, which was then two millions ninety-six thousand and three hundred dollars (\$2,096,-30('), and which, at the date of this message, has been reduced to one million nine hundred and ninety-six thousand three hundred dollars (\$1,996,300).

SINKING FUND.

When these bonds were issued it was arranged that about one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) should fall due on the 1st of January in each year, until all be paid, so that it is not within the power of the State to call them in and replace them by new bonds bearing a lower rate of interest.

With the steadily increasing prosperity now prevailing throughout the State, it will naturally be within the power of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to collect hereafter the interest due on mortgages more closely, without undue and hurtful pressure upon debtors. During the disastrous period following the financial crisis of 1873, not only did real estate decline very materially in nominal value, but for a long it was almost impossible to sell it at any price, so that in all cases where debtors to the Sinking F and were really unable to meet their interest obligations, or to pay the principal when falling due, great care, discretion and delicacy of treatment were necessary.

It evidently is not the interest of the State to become the owner of mortgaged property if it can be avoided, because such ownership requires, especially with regard to farming land, a constant and large expenditure to prevent deterioration, with very little probability of deriving income from it. If, during the period in question, the policy had been pursued of rigidly foreclosing and offering at public sale all property upon which the interest was not promptly paid, the result would have been either that a great deal of that property would have been sold for much less than the amount of the mortgage, or that the State would have been forced to bid it in, and thus become possessed of a very large amount of land, entailing a heavy annual expense for maintenance, a large and costly force of inspectors, with little or no immediate return.

It has, therefore, justly, I am confident, been deemed wise and proper to avoid foreclosure in all cases where there was a reasonable probability that, with a little leniency and forbearance, the debtors would be able to meet their obligations.

Under the existing conditions of constantly improving prosperity, there is every reason to feel assured that the State will soon begin to reap the benefit of the considerate policy pursued, and that hereafter the collection of interest due and the sale of such property as has unavoidably come into the possession of the State will be as favorable as can be desired; but it must not be expected that these results will be reached immediately —the depression of all business interests, the losses from depreciation and stagnation, have been so great that some time is necessary for the new and more favorable conditions to produce their full effect.

The laws regulating the disposition of the Sinking Fund appear to be well adapted to the existing condition of affairs, and I do not think that any modification is called for or desirable at present.

STATE FUND.

The condition of the State Fund is eminently satisfactory. Mainly from the diminished rate of taxation, and for other reasons fully explained in the Comptroller's report, the receipts for 1879 were about three hundred and seventy-six thousand dollars (\$376,000) less than during the preceding year; but, in consequence of the payment of all outstanding claims during the year 1878, and of diminished expenditures for 1879, the bank balance to the credit of the State Fund on the 31st October, 1879, was three hundred and sixteen thousand six hundred and eighty-eight dollars and ninety cents (\$316,688.90), as against a balance of one hundred and nineteen thousand seven hundred and ninety-three dollars and sixty-five cents (\$119,-793.65) on October 31st, 1878, an increase of one hundred and ninety-six thousand eight hundred and ninety-five dollars and twenty-five cents (\$196,895.25).

STATE TAX.

It is now abundantly clear that the successive reductions in the rate of the State tax effected by your predecessors in 1878 and 1879 were wise and proper, and I now earnestly recommend to your favorable consideration the proposition to remove the State tax entirely.

You will find in the Comptroller's report a perfectly satisfactory and clear statement of the case, from which it will appear that with the balances now on hand, the receipts of the State Fund, independently of those derived from the State tax, will hereafter suffice to meet the necessary expenses, allowing a large margin for contingencies.

I see no reason to believe that it will ever again be necessary to impose a State tax, with the single condition that the appropriations are confined within reasonable limits, and that the honesty and economy which the people have the right to expect—and which they will certainly demand—are also exercised in the future.

Should any extraordinary and large expenditure become necessary or expedient, the means to meet it must be provided in some special manner.

If the State tax is not entirely removed, either there will result a large, idle and entirely unnecessary accumulation of money in the treasury, or there will follow a lavish expenditure for unprofitable and useless purposes. No government which is supported by taxation has any moral right to draw money unnecessarily from the people; its expenditures, while ample to carry into effect the true objects for which it is created, should never exceed what is required to insure that effectual protection of the lives and well-being of the people, and that encouragement of their interests which are fundamental purposes of all good government.

Instead of retaining large sums unemployed in the treasury, or encouraging unnecessary expenditures, it is far better for us to leave the money in the pockets of the people, for by them will it be best employed in increasing the wealth of the State and in the development of its resources.

The strain upon our people has been so great of late years, and amid their private embarrassments they have met so patiently and cheerfully the demands of public taxation that they are fairly entitled to that diminution of their burdens which it is now practicable and convenient to afford them,

There is another very important consideration in this connection which cannot safely be overlooked, and that is, that the larger the unnecessary revenue accruing to any government. whether of a large or small community, the greater will always be the tendency to extravagance in all directions.

This is a quality of human nature which may be deplored, but is, nevertheless, well established by experience, and cannot be disregarded. It is not necessary to go beyond our own country to find an example of the effect upon men's minds and habits when they become accustomed to consider and to handle very large amounts of money.

It follows from this that the only safe course is to keep down the revenues of the State to the amount required by a liberal although strict estimate of the expenses necessary for the working of the government, and a wise encouragement of the development of private industries, which will increase the wealth and well being of the people, and consequently the taxable resources of the State.

Therefore, I again urge upon you the entire abolition of the State tax, confident that you will agree with me in the conclusions reached.

At this point let me again impress upon you, and upon the taxpayers of the State, those considerations which I laid before the last Legislature in regard to the expenditures of the subdivisions of the State.

When you have accepted the proposition to dispense with the State tax, our taxpayers will be brought face to face with the far more weighty burden under which many of them labor.

It is the duty and interest of the taxpayers to watch with the most careful scrutiny the operations and expenditures of the counties, towns, and municipalities, for it is just there that they must seek and can find relief.

I am glad to believe that during the past year far more than usual attention has been paid to these subjects, and I again urge their importance in the strongest possible terms, all the more so at the present time, because after the State tax is removed, there will be no possibility of diverting attention from the evils near every man's door by an attempt to mingle the State and local taxes, so that the taxpayers cannot tell how much they pay on each account.

I trust that the reviving prosperity of the people will only serve to induce them to give more attention to the affairs of their respective local governments, not only to prevent any attempt at new extravagance, but also that wise measures may be adopted to take advantage of the improved condition of affairs in order to meet and, as far as possible, reduce existing indebtedness.

With entire confidence in the wisdom, good sense and honesty of the people of our State, I leave this matter to you and to them, with the earnest hope that those of mature years will not only perform their own public duties with energy and zeal, but will teach their children by precept, as well as by example, that it is creditable and profitable to fulfil the duties imposed upon every citizen of a Republic, and also that loss and disgrace are the well merited results to those who neglect them.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

There is nothing unusual to notice in regard to the working of the school system, except a decrease in the product of the "two mill school tax" of a little more than sixty-one thousand dollars (\$61,000), as compared with the preceding year. This results from the depreciation in value in the taxable property, and will probably soon rectify itself. Whatever inconveniences may result from this decrease should be met in the school districts by an increase of the district school tax, when necessary, rather than by increasing the two mill tax.

I have seen no reason to change the views expressed in my last annual message in regard to public education.

I regret that obstacles have intervened to prevent the establishment of Technical Schools, but I believe that the way is now essentially clear, and that before the meeting of the next Legislature the system will be in operation. As to the necessity for such a system, the lapse of time and riper reflection only add to the strength of my conviction, that its successful introduction is imperatively demanded by the best interests not only of the working classes but of all connected with the manufacturing and mechanical industries of the State.

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

The arrangement for the care of those who are proper objects of the charity of the State remain unchanged.

Our charitable institutions have been managed to my satisfaction during the past year, while the care awarded to the deaf and dumb, the blind and the feeble-minded in the admirable institutions of our neighboring States has been all that could be desired. I am still decidedly of the opinion it is the interest neither of the State, nor of the recipients of its care, to establish institutions of our own as long as those in New York and Pennsylvania will consent to take charge of these interesting wards of the State.

I would also beg to repeat my conviction that if, in the future, it should prove desirable or necessary to retain these unfortunates within our own borders, it will prove far more desirable to do the work through private corporations, aided by the sums paid by the State for the instruction and care of its wards, than to establish State institutions.

The Reform School, at Jamesburg, has been well managed during the year.

The hospital and an additional family building erected since the last report afford all the accommodation that is now necessary. I think that it should now be laid down as a principle that no increase in the present capacity of this excellent establishment should be permitted for some years to come; that the admiration of the institution should be regulated upon that principle, and that it should be so arranged as to pass the boys through the school in the shortest time consistent with the fulfilment of the purposes of its establishment.

It would appear probable that good results could be reached by endeavoring to place the reformed boys on farms in the far West, so that, remote from the scenes of their early trials and temptations and under new influences, they might more readily carve out for themselves useful and honorable careers.

The report of the Trustees of the State Industrial School for Girls will give you all the information desirable in regard to this well managed institution.

The building formerly used as Home for Soldiers' Children is now in good repair, and the cost of its care and maintenance is very moderate. It is recommended that the State retain possession of this building with the ultimate purpose of converting it into a State arsenal, for which it is well adapted.

There is an old balance of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) in State bonds to the credit of this institution, and I recommend that the requisite authority be given to cancel and withdraw these bonds.

STATE PRISON.

The administration of this institution has been entirely satisfactory, and is explained in the usual reports submitted herewith. For reasons fully set forth therein, the receipts from the labor of convicts have fallen off; on the other hand the expenses have decreased, but not to the same extent.

It seems probable that the present year will yield better financial results.

The necessity for a chapel at the Prison, and an extension of the area of the grounds, yet remains to be satisfied. I have seen no reason to change the views expressed in regard to this general subject in my last annual message.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

The care of the health of our population is a growing public concern, to which the State Board of Health is giving faithful attention. The work of the Bureau of Vital Statistics is now producing satisfactory results in more complete returns, which are now made available as never before, both for legal reference and vital study.

The labors of the board deserve careful consideration and high appreciation.

STATE GEOLOGICAL SURVEY.

The State Geologist has completed a new map of the northeastern portion of the State, covering an area of more than seven hundred square miles, and showing by contour lines the elevations above the sea level; also a map showing the economical geology of the State, its soils, limestones, marls, iron ores, zinc ores, &c.

The appropriation for this work expires with the current year, and it is for the present Legislature to decide as to its continuance. Under the present Board of Managers and State Geologist the labors of the Geological Survey have been prosecuted with the utmost economy, wisdom and success.

Whether it be accidental or not, it is nevertheless true, that the increase in the prosperity of the State has been greater since the inception and steady prosecution of the work of ascertaining and laying before the public its advantages through the medium of the Geological Survey.

Small in area, but rich in natural resources, and remarkably favored in situation, it is pre-eminently the interest of our State and the duty of its government that we should do all in our power to bring its advantages to light.

In view of the economy with which the work has been prosecuted, the magnitude of the results already achieved, and the consideration that much yet remains to be done to complete this most necessary work, I strongly recommend the continuance of the usual appropriation for another five years.

PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.

At the last session of the Legislature an act was passed authorizing and requiring the Governor to take such steps as might prove necessary to prevent the spread of pleuro-pneumonia among the cattle of this State. Accompanying this message will be found the report of the agent to whom I entrusted the execution of the law. He has performed the duty intelligently, thoroughly and economically—to my entire satisfaction.

I commend the report together with the accompanying documents, to your attention.

Although careful inspection showed that the disease was not so widely spread throughout the State as had been feared, yet it was made clear that it had existed to a dangerous extent, and that it was necessary to use the power granted by the law to protect the owners of cattle.

The disease is now well under control, but it is necessary to maintain a close supervision over it for some time to come.

The existence of five hundred and seventy-two cases has been officially reported, of which three hundred and fifteen have been destroyed, leaving two hundred and fifty-seven cases on hand, which will soon be disposed of by natural or other causes.

But the extirpation of the disease where it now exists in the State is a small part of the work to be done; it is necessary to do all that is reasonably practicable to prevent the introduction of new cases from abroad.

The quarantine established on the frontiers of the State accomplishes all that can be expected in this regard.

In consequence of the rigid system adopted in New York, we have no wrouble in that direction, and it is now a comparatively easy matter to afford mutual protection.

On the Pennsylvania side the case is different, for the disease, unfortunately, exists extensively in this State, and as its extirpation does not appear to have been seriously undertaken there, we are obliged to rely upon ourselves for protection.

The number of cattle in this State is so great, and their aggregate value so considerable—two hundred and thirty-six thousand seven hundred cattle, valued at seven millions eight hundred and twenty-eight thousand nine hundred and twenty-two dollars (\$7,828,922)—and the well-being of so many persons depends upon the preservation of this important interest, that I regard it as obligatory to continue the work so well begun.

The work of quarantine on our boders being effectually continued, we will soon, I am confident, be able to expel the disease from the State, and the expense of carrying the law into effect can soon be reduced to a mere trifie in comparison with the interests at stake.

The most expensive period of the work has passed. We have already been able to reduce the current expenses very considerably, and there will continue to be a constant reduction until that minimum is reached which will simply enable us to protect the frontiers and to examine promptly any new cases that may appear within the State.

I have no doubt as to the necessity and propriety of continning the work. It is probable that by the time another Legislature assembles we will be in a condition to carry into effect a simple and cheap system which will afford permanent protection.

I should fail in my duty did I not express my sense of obligation to the various transportation companies of the State, as well as those which merely touch our frontiers, for the manner in which they have aided our officials in carrying out the law.

Our own cattle owners also deserve great credit for the good sense and kind feeling they have almost universally displayed in co operating in the execution of a law which, while intended for their benefit nevertheless not infrequently interfered with their convenience and sometimes with their immediate apparent interest.

LABOR AND INDUSTRIES.

This bureau has pursued its labors unremittingly during the year, and it is apparent that its work is becoming better understood by the people of the State; as a consequence the distrust and apathy which prevailed last year are gradually passing away.

The returns from many of the industries of the State are quite full, and some branches of manufacture show a considerable increase in business over the year previous, but up to the present only a suall advance in the rate paid for labor appears to have taken place.

The rapid growth of the silk industry of the State is a notable instance of what energy, combined with capital and skill, can accomplish.

Attention has been directed, as suggested in my last message, to the unoccupied lands in the southern part of the State, and a chapter in the present report sets forth some of the advantages which that section offers to agriculturists. I am satisfied that the tide of emigration once turned toward that part of the State that will continue to flow steadily.

The question respecting industrial development still prominently engages the attention of the bureau. The importance of the fibrous industry, once established, is fully demonstrated in this report, and its furtherance sought in the form of bounties.

I feel assured that the usefulness of this bureau will increase from year to year.

STATE LIBRARY.

The United States Courts having discontinued the use of accommodations in the State House, the available annual resources for the increase and maintenance of the State Library will hereafter be diminished more than one-half. I recommend to your consideration the propriety of increasing the annual appropriation to at least two thousand dollars (\$2,000).

THE NATIONAL GUARD.

The strength of the National Guard is essentially the same as it was a year ago; no additional organizations have been created, but all proper efforts have been made to increase the efficiency of the force.

The necessary steps have been taken to ensure, as a permanent system, the regular instruction in target practice, both in the armories during the Winter and on the ranges in Summer.

I am gratified to be able to state that the results are already very satisfactory, showing a marked improvement in marksmanship and discipline.

So far as concerns the equipments, camp equipage, ammunition, etc., everything is on hand to enable the division to enter upon active service without delay.

I must be permitted once more to express the conviction that there are few subjects more deserving of the care of the State than its National Guard. In accordance with the views expressed by me in other messages, I have endeavored, and I may assert, successfully, to place the National Guard of this State in such condition as to enable it to preserve the peace within our own borders, without our calling for assistance from the general government or from any of our sister States.

Of course there is more or less to be done in many directions towards increasing the efficiency of the troops, especially in regard to field service, but they are now in condition to render prompt and valuable service in any probable contingency.

I trust that it may continue to be regarded as one of the traditions of the State that its National Guard is to be a permanent institution, whose efficiency and instruction are to be carefully pushed and never neglected.

The proposition which has been mooted, to the effect that the general government should afford larger aid toward the organization and arming of the militia and National Guard has much in its favor, but I would prefer to see even the present annual allowance entirely taken away, rather than accept a very large aid coupled with any conditions which would tend to weaken the present absolute control of the State authorities over the National Guard and militia in time of peace, and which would give the general government the slightest control and supervision, except over that part which may have been called out by the President, in the manner and under the circumstances provided in the Constitution of the United States.

There could be no more dangerous step toward a change in our form of government than such an one as this, and I trust that in this State such a change would be firmly and effectually resisted, should it ever be more seriously proposed, and that we shall always cling to that clause of the Constitution "reserving to the States respectively the appointment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress."

It is not within the limits of probability that the regular army of the United States will ever, in time of peace, be of greater strength than is required to perform its legitimate work under such circumstances, *i. e.*, the control of the savages in our western regions, the protection of our most exposed inland frontier against raids from across the line, and the care of our permanent fortifications. That it should be sufficiently numerous to accomplish these purposes in an economical and efficient manner, and without throwing an undue strain and unjustifiable exposure upon its members, will no doubt be generally acknowledged.

But neither the probable necessities of the situation, nor considerations of economy, nor a due regard for the nature of the institutions under which we live, will justify or permit more than a liberal fulfilment of these conditions.

The maintenance of an efficient and well organized national guard, kept within just limits as to numbers, is not only thoroughly in accordance with the spirit of our institutions, but it is rendered absolutely necessary by their very nature. Such a force weighs lightly upon the finances and resources of the individual States; keeps alive the military spirit, habits and knowledge of the people; furnishes the best possible means of suppressing internal troubles; is capable of performing admi rable service in preventing or resisting foreign aggression, and is one of the best and most indispensable guards of the permanence of our free institutions. I confidently commit the interests of the national guard to the care and wise liberality of yourselves and your successors.

PILOTAGE.

The report of the Commissioners of Pilotage very properly calls attention to the necessity of some legislative action in regard to the preservation of the channels in the navigable waters of the State. During the last session of the Legislature an act (known as Senate Bill, No. 35), was passed for the better protection of the tide waters of the State of New Jersey. It unfortunately proved to be the case, when at the close of the session the act was laid before me for approval, that, although it was in the main an excellent bill, it had been so drawn as to bring it within the scope of constitutional and other objections, so that I was reluctantly obliged to withhold my signature.

SOLDIERS' HOME.

The report of the managers of the Home for Disabled Soldiers asks that an extraordinary appropriation of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) be made for the maintenance of the establishment during the current year.

After a careful examination of the financial statements in the report, it appears clear to me that the balance on hand at the close of the fiscal year, together with the usual annual appropriation, will abundantly suffice for the necessities of the current year, so that I can see no good reason for any appropriation beyond the regular amount of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000).

COMMISSIONERS OF FISHERIES.

The attention of this Board has been directed during the past year, especially to the enforcement of the laws for the protection of the coast fisheries, the protection and improvement of our valuable shad fisheries, and the propagation and distribution of valuable food fishes in our inland waters. The benefit to the people of the State of a continuance of this work is beyond question, and I trust that the Legislature will not fail to encourage the commissioners by proper legislation, as well as by making the necessary appropriations to enable them to carry out the plans indicated in their report, which gives a detailed account of their interesting operations for the year, and presents valuable suggestions for the future.

PRISON LABOR.

The commissioners appointed in accordance with the act of the last Legislature to examine into the subject of prison labor, have concluded their work. They have given to the subject earnest thought and thorough investigation, and after weighing all arguments on both sides of the question involved, have presented a report that should command the earnest attention of the Legislature.

GENERAL LAWS.

In pursuance of a law of the last Legislature, I appointed a commission to draft general laws for the government of municipalities. The commission has been engaged during the recess in the performance of the duties entrusted to them, having visited various parts of the State for the purpose of examining the practical difficulties which they were required to meet. Under the authority given them, they will report directly to the Legislature by bill.

TAX COMMISSION.

The commission created by the last Legislature for the revision of the tax laws, was duly appointed. They have effected an organization and given the subject considerable consideration, the result of which they will no doubt report to the Legislature.

CONCLUSION.

In reviewing the events of the past year we have every reason for interse gratitude to the Ruler of all things.

We have no wide-spread calamity to deplore, no epidemic has ravaged our State, the means of easy communication have been undisturbed, no new burdens have been added to those already borne by the people. If we have no great and general evils to deplore, we have, on the other hand, many positive blessings to enumerate.

Probably without exception every business interest in the State is in much better condition than a year ago, the number of the unemployed is reduced to the smallest limits, suffering and want are again banished from many homes where they have reigned only too long, justice has been promptly and rigorously administered. The attention of the people has been fixed upon the financial affairs of their local governments, so that it may be hoped that extravagance has been checked, and where any community is too deeply in debt, the fact being known, all possible remedies will be applied and the evil kept within the narrowest possible bounds.

It is no less a source of congratulation that all the institutions of the State have worked well in their appointed spheres and that we are now enabled to remove the remainder of the State tax.

Mr. Bonsall, from the Committee on Elections, to whom was referred the testimony in the Williams-Brown contested election case, made the following majority report:

The majority of the Committee on Elections, to whom was referred the testimony in the Williams-Brown contested election case, respectfully report that they have given the subject almost unremitting attention from the opening to the close of the arguments offered and evidence adduced before them. Having repeatedly listened to the representatives of the respective parties, and carefully weighed the testimony taken before the master to whom both the contestant and incumbent confided the preliminary conduct of their cases; having bestowed upon it far more attention than they have given to any other legislative duties, it being, in fact, the principal object of their solicitude, the conclusion is reached, after both parties have voluntarily rested their cases, that William R. Williams is justly entitled to the seat occupied by William H. Brown, for the reason that, at a recount of the ballots before the master, the integrity of which was concurred in by all the parties in interest, the contestant was shown to have a clear and undisputed majority of six votes, which has appeared to the satisfaction of the committee, and is uncontroverted in the testimony transmitted herewith, as part of this report.

In this testimony it is incontestably proved, by the recount in the whole Assembly district, that at the election held in the Fourth Assembly District of Essex county, on the fourth day of November, anno domini eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, William R. Williams received one thousand two hundred and seventy-five (1,275) votes, and William H. Brown, one thousand two hundred and sixty-nine (1,269) votes, Mr. Williams being there and then elected by a majority of six (6) votes.

The committee, therefore, submit the following resolution :

Resolved, That William R. Williams is and is hereby declared to be entitled to a seat in this House as Member of Assembly from the Fourth District of the County of Essex, and that William H. Brown is not entitled to a seat in this House as a member from said district.

Mr. Haines, from the Committee on Elections, to whom was referred the Williams-Brown contested election case, made the following report:

In the contested election case of Williams against Brown, the minority of the committee do report as follows:

That they have heard argument of counsel, and considered the evidence and law in the case as far as they were enabled so to do in short space of time allowed them for that purpose, and as preliminary to their report desire to state that, in their opinion, the testimony was brought before them in an irregular way, and that the incumbent has been unnecessarily confused and hastened in such manner as to prejudice the proper presentation of his side of the case before the committee, and the committee itself has been so hastened in their decision as not to give the evidence and whole subject the careful consideration which its importance demands. The case before them presents a question of the highest importance under the Constitution, and under our system and theory of government, it being one which involves the right of a member of the House of Assembly to seat which he holds by a certificate under the law, and of which seat the House sitting in its judicial capacity on its own rights and privileges, cannot deprive him except after the most careful and deliberate investigation of the law and the attendant facts and circumstances.

The proceedings in this case are instituted by the contestant, under the Statute on *Elections* (*Revision*), sections 16 to 121 inclusive.

By the testimony it appears that notice of contest was served on December 2, 1879, that the contestant began to take his testimony before a Master in Chancery on December 17th, and closed January 3d, following.

The incumbent then served the notice required by Statute upon the same Master, who designated January 17th, 1880, as the day on which he should proceed to take the testimony of his witnesses, and on that day such examination was commenced.

We are of the opinion that the charge of delay on the part of the incumbent, made before the committee, is unfounded, and that he has proceeded with all the speed that the law and circumstances of the case would permit, and we think that the effort made to force this case upon the House on the *ex parte* testimony which was first submitted to the committee, was calculated to mislead the committee and the House, and was contrary to law and parliamentary practice, and has tended to prejudge this case and cause it to be decided on grounds outside of its legal merits.

We strongly deprecate such a proceeding, and think that the contestant was very unjustified in his action. We are further of the opinion that the request of the incumbent that the committee should issue process for the attendance of certain witnesses to be examined before them was reasonable and right, and that the committee, for its own sake, and in order to arrive at the truth in this case, should have heard such testimony, especially as we are satisfied that these witnesses could not be procured before the master in the brief time allowed to the incumbent to do so, and that their evidence was very material and would throw much light on the case, and we advise that this determination on the part of the committee is contrary to justice, and should not receive the sanction of the House.

The contestant relies for his claim to this seat merely upon the difference in a re-showing or count of the ballots in this district made before a master in chancery and the count made under the forms of law on election day, the one being made more than a month after the election, and the other immediately at the close of the polls, and which was afterward ratified by the board of county canvassers.

His case rests solely upon the testimony of the county clerk, who testifies in his ministerial capacity as custodian of the ballot boxes after their delivery to him.

There is no evidence or charge of fraud or misconduct in the election, or that the count made by the officers charged with that duty was otherwise than correct; but, on the contrary, there is direct evidence on the part of the incumbent that the count was exactly right, and that there was no possibility of mistake.

The contestant, in order to establish his right to this seat, must prove affirmatively that the count made before the master is correct, and that the count made by election boards of the several polling districts is wrong; he must also prove affirmatively that the boxes have not been tampered with or the ballots changed or altered, and that there was no opportunity to tamper with them or change them, and must further show that the forms and requirements of the law were complied with strictly after the voting and count were finished. This has not been done.

The statute is mandatory in all of its requirements, and enacted, as it is, to guard and protect the right of suffrage, the most sacred right of the citizen, it must be followed strictly.

Any violation of it cannot be used to the advantage of one appealing to its provisions, but must have the opposite intendment.

By the evidence it appears that there are five polling or election precincts in this district. In at least two of them the boards of election failed to comply with the law in the disposition of registers, tally lists and poll books. That in one of them voters were registered on the day of election, in direct

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violation of law, and that in another the poll list contains the names of more persons who voted than the box contained ballots. There are abundant precedents for refusing to consider returns from election precincts under these last mentioned circumstances.

In view of all these facts, we are of the opinion that the committee cannot reach a proper conclusion without a further and complete investigation of their effect on the vote in this district.

As to four of these election precincts, there is not a particle of evidence going to show that the statute relating to the sealing, locking, taping and custody of the ballot boxes was complied with in any respet; and in the only precinct in which such evidence was adduced—and singularly the precinct where the change of votes occurs—on which the contestant rests his case, he relies solely on the testimony of the clerk of that election board, who is charged, by implication and circumstance, with tampering with the result, and whose testimony itself shows the grossest disregard of the requirements of the statute as to the custody of the ballot box and its keys.

There is evidence further to show that the count made on the night after election was correct, and also damaging admissions on the part of the clerk before mentioned, who was the one having the charge and custody of the ballot box and all of its keys between the time of the count and the delivery of the box to the county clerk.

We are, therefore, of the opinion that this case presents many serious questions not to be hurriedly decided by this House; that further investigation is demanded at the hands of your committee, and that the case presented by the contestant is entirely insufficient to warrant this House in unseating a member who holds his seat by virtue of a regular certificate issued under the forms and solemnities of law, based upon an election in reference to the official count and subsequent ratification of the same by the board of county canvassers, there is neither contest or question.

Under these circumstances, to unseat the present sitting member would be unjustifiable and would tend to establish a dangerous precedent and to offer a premium to unscrupulous parties to tamper with election returns in every case where the result is at all close or doubtful, and would encourage the contest for seats in this House upon trivial, untenable and, perhaps, fraudulently grounds.

We, therefore, submit the following :

Resolved, That in the contested election case of Williams against Brown, for a seat in this House, from the Fourth Assembly District, Essex County, the contestant has failed to establish a case which justifies this House in unseating the present member, and that William H. Brown is fully entitled to hold the seat from said Fourth Assembly District of Essex county.

Mr. Stephen Martin (by request) presented the following petition:

To the Honorable the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

The undersigned, residents and tax payers in the State of New Jersey, respectfully represent that in the year A. D. 1871, we commenced the manufacturing and ironing of shirts at Jamesburg, in the county of Middlesex, in this State, that we then invested a large sum of money in the business, and that since that time we have much increased and extended our operations so that we now also have factories at Bordentown and Hightstown, and that we have a large capital now invested in the business in this State, and that we employ more than two thousand persons to aid in the labor, all of whom reside in the State of New Jersey. And your petitioners further represent that in the Spring and Summer of A. D. 1875, we suggested to the authorities in control of the Reform School for boys, located near Jamesburg, the employment of the inmates of that institution in ironing, and offered to give them all the work they could do at remunerative prices-to send teachers to instruct the boys in that branch, to furnish implements and take risk of loss, which offer was accepted with the understanding that we were to have the labor in future at a fair price; in fact, to have the preference provided we paid as much for the labor as others should offer. This understanding resulted from the fact that we were the first to cause the introduction of this branch of industry in the school, also because it was an experiment and might fail to our loss, and

because the work done during the first year would probably be of an inferior kind and not saleable in the market at full prices, and also because we had been to much expense in introducing our styles of work on the market, and were unwilling to teach our methods to the Reform School except we were thus protected. With this understanding, which was under the circumstances fair and reasonable, we furnished tables, tools and supplies, and sent several of our skilled workmen to instruct the boys. For the first year the experiment proved a loss to us because of poor workmanship, and 't was not until A. D. 1877 that the work was of some profit to us.

In the year A. D. 1877, it was concluded by the Board of Trustees, after frequent consultations with us as to the practicability of so doing, to introduce also the manufacture of shirts, and at their request we undertook to set the smaller hoys at work with sewing machines. We purchased machinery at nearly two thousand dollars' expense, shipped it to the school, and put it in order, ready to be attached to the power, and the Board of Trustees agreed with us that we should attach our machines to the power and arrange the details for manufacturing with the superintendent, as we had always done with the ironing. The superintendent delayed the matter for a time and then refused to arrange with us.

About this time a New York firm, under the name of Rothschild Bros. & Gutman, appeared upon the scene, and the trustees purchased other machines without our knowledge and gave us no notice of any change of plans, and awarded the manufacturing to said Rothschild Bros. & Gutman, and we were notified to remove our machines, which were of but little use to us elsewhere, and we thereby were injured pecuniarily to the extent of about fifteen hundred dollars. All this time we were furnishing steady work to the ironers at full prices, and were told that we should have all the labor of the school of that branch. But soon the boys commenced ironing for the New York firm and using, without our knowledge or consent, our tables, irons and tools and our supplies on their work, putting our lots of goods aside in an incomplete condition, thus making it impossible for us to fill our orders, and leaving a large quantity of stock unfinished on our hands, and damaging us over ten thousand dollars. We have never been able, after much effort on our part, to obtain an explanation of their un-just action toward us. Notwithstanding such treatment, we

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made an effort in the summer of A. D. 1878 to obtain the labor of the boys for the then coming season, and sent to the trustees samples and list of prices for the various grades of work, both manufacturing and ironing, and although our offer was higher than the Rothschilds, it was rejected.

In A. D. 1879 we made another effort with the same result. We are satisfied that our bids, both in 1878 and 1879, were higher than the bids made by the New York firm, and higher than what the New York firm actually paid, and will prove the same if granted access to the accounts of the institution. When we inquired, after our bid had been rejected, for information which, as an unsuccessful bidder, we had a right to have, and offered to show that the work had been given to those who were to pay the institution less than we offered, we were repulsed and information withheld from us. In 1879 we were notified, after much inquiry, that the contract had been awarded, not on the ground of prices, but from other considerations, the nature of which was withheld. From the facts above stated, it appears that the managers of one of the public institutions of the State have been guilty of favoritism and unjustifiable discrimination in the awarding of the labor to the injury of the State and some of its citizens; and also of withholding and concealing facts which parties have a right to know, in order to cover up such favoritism and discrimination.

We ask for a committee of investigation, and hold ourselves prepared to prove the facts above stated; we will show that we, a responsible firm, have from time to time offered for the work of the institution higher prices than those it has received, and that through some influence, which we hope to unearth, preference has been given to those who pay less than we have offered, and that discrimination is made against citizens of this State.

We will also prove that there has been a studied effort to prevent information reaching those interested who have been wronged and injured through the action of the trustees. We also ask the passage of a law requiring publication of notice yearly, inviting proposals for the work of the boys in the Reform School, and the opening of the same publicly at a time and place of which bidders shall have notice, and that the labor shall be awarded to the highest responsible bidder. And your petitioners will ever pray.

> STATE OF NEW JERSEY, OFFICE OF COMPTROLLER OF THE TREASURY, TRENTON, January 29, 1880.

HON. S. B. OVIATT,

Speaker of the House of Assembly :

SIR—I am in receipt of a certified copy of a resolution adopted by the House of Assembly, this day requiring me to report to the House of Assembly an itemized account of expenditures made in the execution of the bill known as the pleuro-pneumonia bill enacted last winter.

Presuming that the bill referred to is an act entitled "An act to prevent the spread of contagions or infectious pleuropneumonia among cattle in this State," approved March 13, 1879, I have the honor to inform the House of Assembly that this act makes it the duty of the Governor of the State to take measures to promptly suppress the disease among cattle

known as the pleuro-pneumonia, and to prevent it from spreading; and for this purpose he is authorized to issue his proclamation, to order diseased cattle to be placed in quarantine, to call upon the sheriffs of the respective counties to carry out and enforce such regulations and orders as he may establish, and to employ medical and veterinary practitioners, and such other persons as he may from time to time deem necessary to assist him in the performance of the duties imposed upon him by the act. The act further provides that the necessary funds shall be furnished from the treasury, and paid upon the certificate of the Governor, to meet the expenses incurred under his direction or by his authority in carrying out the provisions of Since the passage of the act warrants have been the act. drawn, from time to time, upon the certificate of the Governor, amounting in the aggregate to \$23,461.87, for which the vouchers are on file in this office, but I have no means of procuring a complete list of all the items of expenditure authorized by the Governor under the act, nor of knowing what relation the above sum bears to the amount of expense incurred This information can only be procured under his direction. from the authority entrusted with the execution of the law, and I have therefore forwarded your resolution to the proper source from which to obtain the desired information.

In presenting the minority report of the Committee on Militia, I desire to say to the members of this House through you, sir, that I am alone, but, notwithstanding that, I believe that I am right in my views of the case which are simply these:

All will concede that the statue of the brave and lamented General Kearny is the property of the State of New Jersey, and I believe that the majority of the members of this House will agree with me, that, as the property of the State, it should be kept in the custody of the State, and that the House and Senate concurring should make the necessary appropriation to mount it in a proper and becoming manner. It gave me much pleasure to hear the sentiments expressed by the Hon. Cortlandt Parker, the chairman of the committee from Newark.

They fully accord with my sentiments, and I can safely say, with the sentiments of every member of the First New Jersey Brigade, to which I had the honor to be attached, and which he so ably commanded in the beginning of the war of the rebellion. In relation to the disposition of the statue, I believe that the wishes of the people of the State of New Jersey would be better and more fully complied with in adopting the course contained and expressed in the joint resolution which I have the honor to present as a substitute, for the consideration of the House.

The undersigned respectfully dissents from the views of the majority of the committee; that the Legislature should await the decision of the courts upon a contest under said act. The Legislature is a distinct branch of the government, and should act upon the merits of the bill before the House, without reference to what the courts may or may not decide. As well might the courts await the action of the Legislature before deciding any case involving a question pending in the Legislature, as that the Legislature should suspend action upon any question pending in the courts.

The undersigned respectfully urges that, aside from its unconstitutionality, the act of 1878, ought to be repealed, because it takes the election of municipal officers away from the people and vests their appointment in the Mayor of the City. He therefore, respectfully recommends the passage of

Assembly bill No. 17, entitled

An act relating to public officers in the cities and counties of this State,

Without amendment.

And the undersigned further reports that in his judgment Assembly bill No. 17 ought to be made the law of this State. It is an act of simple justice to elected officers to permit them to take their seats after any usurpation of their offices has been corrected by the Legislature without entailing the expense and annoyance of new elections upon the people.

Whereas, During the late terrible gale and storm on the New Jersey coast on the night of the second and the morning of the third of February, 1880, several vessels were driven on shore with their passengers and crews, between Sandy Hook and Cape May on said coast, and were wrecked; and whereas, during the said gale and storm the captains and crews of the life saving stations in district No. 4, State of New Jersey, by their courage and discretion, at the great peril of their own lives, rescued and delivered from imminent death almost the entire number of persons so imperiled; therefore,

1. Be it resolved by the Senate (House of Assembly concurring) of the State of New Jersey, That the Legislature of this State hereby expresses its sincere gratitude for and earnest admiration of the heroic conduct evinced during the said gale and storm by the captains and crews of the said life saving stations in the said district No. 4.

2. And be it resolved, That the life saving service, under its present efficient management, has been so successful in its humane endeavors to rescue shipwrecked passengers and sailors, that we would respectfully recommend the Congress of the United States to not only increase the facilities of the service, but to also provide an adequate compensation, if the same is not now sufficient, for the services of the men whose heroism in this humane work excites and commands the admiration of the world.

3. And be it resolved, That his excellency the Governor of the State of New Jersey be requested to transmit a copy of these resolutions to the Senators and Representatives of this State in Congress now session.

MR. SPEAKER :

I have the honor to return herewith Assembly bill 231. It purports to be a supplement to a general bill. Its effect is to remove from the operation of the general bill counties whose population is between 54,000 and 60,0 0 inhabitants. As there is no apparent reason why counties with a population within the specified limits should be classified by themselves, and as no such classification exists, it seems to me that the bill does not make a fair classification, but that the classification is illusive, and is "contrived" with a view of escaping the constitutional restriction, and comes within the ruling of the Court in the case of Van Riper vs. Parsons, 11 Vr. 1. There is no reason why it is not practicable to pass a general law applicable to the whole State, containing the provisions which by this supplement is applied only to the political division therein designated.

ARTICLE VI. Strike out section one and insert as a new section the following section :

1. The judicial power shall be vested in a court of appeals in the last resort in all causes; a court for the trial of impeachments, a court of chancery, circuit courts, and such inferior courts as now exist, and as may be hereafter ordained and established by law, which inferior courts the legislature may alter or abolish, as the public good shall require.

Strike out section two and insert a new section as follows :

SECTION II.—1. The court of appeals shall be composed of six judges; in the first appointment of said judges, two shall be appointed for a term of three years, two for a term of six years, and two for a term of nine years; subsequent appointments, except to fill vacancies, shall be for a term of nine years; appointments to fill vacancies shall be for the unexpired term only; a major part of said judges shall be authorized to hold the court and transact all its business.

2. The clerk of said court shall be appointed by the judges of the court, or a major part of them; he shall hold his office for the term of nine years.

3. The president judge of said court shall be selected by the remaining members of the court.

Strike out section four and insert a new section as follows:

SECTION IV., 1. The court of chancery shall consist of a chancellor, to be appointed for a term of nine years.

2. The chancellor shall hear all appeals from the circuit courts in equity and orphans' court cases.

3. The court of chancery shall have no original jurisdiction, and from any sentence, decree or order of said court on appeal, under conditions to be from time to time imposed by the Legislature, shall lie to the court of appeals.

4. The clerk of the court of chancery shall be appointed by the chancellor, and hold his office during the pleasure of the chancellor.

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Strike out section five and insert a new section as follows:

SECTION V., 1. Circuit courts shall be held in any county of this State by judges appointed for that purpose, such courts shall have exclusive law and equity jurisdiction within their respective counties, except as to orphans' court matters and matters involving less than two hundred dollars.

2. The Legislature shall from time to time fix the number of judicial circuits in the State; each county having over forty thousand inhabitants shall have one circuit; each county having over one hundred thousand inhabitants may have two circuits; in counties having less than forty thousand inhabitants, two or more counties may be joined in one circuit.

3. Judges of the circuit court shall be appointed for the term of seven years.

4. The clerks of the several counties shall be the clerks of the circuit courts in said counties.

5. Any judgment obtained in any circuit may be docketed in the office of the clerk of the court of appeals, and execution issue therefrom into any county of this State.

6. Orphans' courts for each county within said circuits shall be held by the said circuit judges.

Strike out section six.

Make section seven section six.

ARTICLE VII., SECTION II. Strike out paragraph one and insert a new paragraph as follows :

1. The judges of the court of appeals and of the circuit courts, and the chancellor, shall be nominated by the Governor, and appointed by him with the advice and consent of the Senate.

2. They shall at stated times receive for their services a stated compensation from the State, which shall be in lieu of all fees, and shall not be increased nor diminished during the term of their appointments; and they shall hold no other office under the government of this State or of the United States; an acceptance by any one of them of a nomination by any political party to any other office during his term of office, shall work a forfeiture of his office.

This bill conflicts with the first clause of the second article of the Constitution, which provides that no person convicted of a crime which now excludes him from being a witness, unless pardoned or restored by law to the right of suffrage, shall enjoy the right of an elector. The pardoning power, by the Constitution, is vested exclusively in a court appointed for that purpose, and the right of restoration by law is limited to the Legislature, who are the law-making power, and cannot be constitutionally delegated by them to any other body or persons.

To the Honorable the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

The Committee on the New Jersey State Reform School for Juvenile Offenders respectfully report :

That, in conformity with the resolution offered by Mr. Albertson, on the 21st day of January last, and the direction of the House of Assembly thereon, your committee has made an investigation of the financial and industrial management of said institution. For that purpose they visited Jamesburg, and spent an afternoon and night at the Reform School, and went through the work-rooms, where the boys were engaged in ironing and manufacturing shirts, and also through the family houses, where they live. They also familiarized themselves as thoroughly as they were able in the limited time at their command with the system of book-keeping employed in the institution, and examined under oath the treasurer, assistant treasurer (who is also cashier of the bank where the account of the Reform School is kept), the superintendent and the book-keeper, and their testimony, reduced to writing, is hereunto annexed as a part of this report.

As the result of their investigation, your committee have reached the unanimous conclusion that the financial and industrial management of said institution is intelligent, sound and wise; that the trustees have conducted its affairs with fidelity to the State and to the best interests of the important institution in their charge; and that the treasurer's report, found upon pages 31, 32 and 33 of the fifteenth annual report, as printed and distributed during the present session of the Legislature, is a correct and true statement of the financial condition of the Reform School at the date of such report.

Your committee deem it proper to add, in this connection, that they urgently invited Mr. Albertson to accompany them to Jamesburg and assist in their examination; but, while declining the invitation on the ground of other engagements, he assured your committee that he knew of no defect in the management of said institution, and of no department or feature needing particular scrutiny, and that he offered the resolution under which your committee were acting without solicitation, and solely on account of the discussion which took place upon the Reform School appropriation bill near the close of the session of the one hundred and third Legislature.

Your committee further report that they have carefully considered the memorial of Messrs. Downs & Finch, shirt manufacturers, at Jamesburg and elsewhere, presented to the House of Assembly on the 29th day of January last, and referred to your committee on the same day. Both the memorialists and trustees of the Reform School appeared in person before your committee on several occasions, and were also represented by able counsel, and testimony was taken at great length with the aid of a stenographer, and is hereunto annexed as a part of this report. 0

After duly hearing counsel and weighing the evidence submitted, your committee are unanimously of the opinion that the statements in said memorial which reflect upon the conduct of the trustees are not sustained. It is apparent that the trustees have acted honorably and with a view to promote the welfare of the youth committed to their care. While it is important to every taxpayer that the Reform School, together with all the other charitable, reformatory and punitive institutions of the State, should, so far as possible, become self-sustaining, still, the question of revenue should, in the judgment of your committee, be ever kept subordinate to the great object for which the Reform School was established—"the *reformation* of juvenile offenders."

The counsel for the petitioners submitted to your committee the draft of a bill providing for the disposition of the labor of the institution by annual competitive bidding. Although the proposed bill contains some valuable and well guarded features, your committee feel that it would be unwise to report it to the House. The trustees of such a reformatory must be allowed to exercise a large discretion in awarding the labor of the inmates to contractors, and such discretion should not be controlled or hampered by an inelastic law. The high character of the gentlemen to whom the State has confided the administration of this important trust should be sufficient guaranty that the trust will not be abused, and that every intelligent suggestion concerning the employment of the labor of the institution will be cheerfully and thoroughly considered.

Mr. McDermott, on behalf of the House, addressed the Speaker as follows:

MR. SPEAKER:—To be true to one's self and true to the dictations of conscience is to reach—so far as human comprehension extends—the summit of legitimate greatness; and when man can and does open to the world the page of history upon which his record is truly inscribed, and honestly, fearlessly advocate that record, he has fulfilled all that should be asked by man and all that is required by God.

We have differed, Mr. Speaker, many times, in our conclusions, and while that difference of opinion still exists as to the advisability of certain legislative steps, I believe that your action, as Speaker of this House, will support the assertion that the honor and the glory of our Commonwealth have not been, in a single instance, subservient, in your consideration, to mere partisan interests. The-comparatively speakingshort time that we have associated here, has been pregnant with issues concerning the liberties and the rights of property of the people of this State. Our acts will live, in their effect upon the rights of the people of this State, long after we have departed not only legislative but physical existence. Mr. Speaker, while partisanship may be truly said to disturb the equilibrium of legislation, I believe that we meet to-day, rising above the mere consideration of partisanship; upon a plane where we can witness the dissipation of the clouds that o'erhang the horizon of partizan embitterment. Mr. Speaker,

" A life of honor and of worth, Has no eternity on earth ; "Tis but a name---

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And yet its glory far exceeds That base and sensual life Which leads To want and shame."

Prompted to an adaptation of this verse, I declare that its application is as truthful politically as it is socially, and that you, sir, have acted in accord with this—a righteous political prediction and commandment

Mr. Speaker, those differences which have been engendered in political discussion will be washed away by the first wave of time, but our friendships will remain, engraven upon our hearts. Representative in my expression, I present to you this token of our appreciation of the honesty and fairness with which you have discharged your duties, incumbent upon you as Speaker of the House of Assembly of the One Hundred and Fourth Legislature of this State, and further tender to you, in that same capacity, our heartfelt wishes for your health, your happiness and your future prosperity.

In conclusion Mr. McDermott presented the Speaker with a handsome gold watch, chain and seal, as a token of the esteem entertained toward him by the members and officers of the House.

The Speaker responded in a feeling manner, and said that to those who had known him during the past two sessions it would be unnecessary to say he was deeply grateful for this mark of respect. He felt that he had simply discharged his duty, and had had only one aim in view—the discharge of his duty to the best interest of the State Whatever of success he had achieved as presiding officer of the House was largely due to the efficient assistance of his brother officers. He would always look back to the present session as one of the brightest spots of his life. He had only the kindest of feelings to all, and was glad it was so. To the members of the press he was also under many obligations, and expressed to them the sincerest thanks.

Martin and Hunt, on the part of the House, as members of the Special Committee to examine and consider the reports and bills of the Special Tax Commission and the Commission to draft a system of general laws for the government of municipalities in this State, and to report thereon to the Legislature at its next session.

Mr. Van Duyne, from the Committee on Ways and Means, presented the following report:

To the House of Assembly:

The Committee on Ways and Means, to whom was referred the preamble and resolution of Mr. Blodgett, relative to certain alleged losses sustained by the State through its financial officers, and to report such measures as will prevent a repetition of the same, and any other measures tending to increase its security, would respectfully report:

"That they have inquired into the financial system established by law in this State, and find that the two offices of Comptroller and Treasurer operate as almost a perfect check upon each other. No money can be drawn from the Treasury exceptingion the warrant of the Comptroller; no accounts are audited by any other officer than the Comptroller, and all payments are made by the Treasurer by check, and no check drawn by the Treasurer, whether for money to be disbursed or for the transfer of funds from one bank to another, can be paid until it is countersigned by the Comptroller and registered in his office.

The duty of the Treasurer is to receive all moneys due the State (in all cases the receipt for the same, to be legal, must be countersigned by the Comptroller), and deposit them in the banks of the State, and to disburse them in such sums as the Comptroller may certify to be due from the State. Thus the two officers are a complete check each on the other—each keeping a full account of the moneys received and disbursed.

The Treasurer is authorized by law to deposit the public funds in such banks of the State as he may select, being under bonds to the amount of three hundred thousand dollars for the security of the same. Still, the committee believe that a law requiring the Treasurer to transmit to the Comptroller a statement of each deposit made by him at that time when made, and the name of the bank in which the deposit is made, would prove an additional check each upon the other.

With reference to the defalcation referred to in the preamble to the resolution, the committee find that it occurred through the appropriation to his own use by a former Treasurer, of money paid to him but not entered upon his books, reported to the Comptroller nor deposited in bank. It does not seem to your committee that a law could be passed which would prevent a possible recurrence of such a loss, but we think it is amply provided against, by the heavy bonds given by the Treasurer.

With reference to loss to the State by means of loans made to or through the late State Comptroller, the committee find that those loans were made by the Commissioners, of the Sinking Fund and the Trustees of the School Fund, partly to the Comptroller in his individual capacity, and partly to other parties on his application. If these have proved unfortunate investments, that fact has no bearing whatever upon the financial system in operation in the Treasury Department of the State, nor any connection with the official acts of the Comptroller and Treasurer.

As to "the probable loss of fifteen thousand dollars by the failure of an insolvent bank," referred to, in, the preamble to the resolution, the committee assume that reference is meant to the deposits made in the State Bank of New Brunswick, some years ago, by the present Treasurer. The affairs of this bank are now being closed up under the direction of the Court of Chancery, and the question of the amount of the loss to the State (if any) is still undetermined, and there are certain collateral questions connected with the subject which will in all probability have to be decided by the courts, and which it is therefore scarcely proper for the committee to express any opinion upon.

The Treasurer is, as has already been stated, the sole judge of what banks the State funds shall be deposited in, and it is believed that the amount of his bond is sufficient to secure the State against loss from the failure of any bank in which deposits may have been made without the exercise of due caution.

With reference to the expense of conducting the two offices of Comptroller and Treasurer, the committee find that the financial business of the State has greatly increased within a few years past, and many new duties have been imposed upon both the Comptroller and Treasurer, which have rendered necessary the employment of greater clerical force than in earlier years. In the opinion of the committee, the two offices could not be conducted at less expense than they now are, with due regard to the interests of the people of the State.

As required by the resolution, the committee report that they have learned, through information furnished by the Treasurer, and by the banks, that the public money now in the treasury is deposited in the following named banks:

To the House of Assembly:

The Committee on Ways and Means, to whom was referred the resolution in respect to the Treasurer and Comptroller, and which was as follows :

WHEREAS, The combined duties of the Treasurer and Comptroller were formerly performed by the Treasurer and Secretary of State at a yearly expense of about four thousand dollars; and whereas, the same service now costs the State upwards of twenty-five thousand dollars annually, and instead of the Treasurer and Comptroller operating as a check upon each other, they have, notwithstanding an expensive clerical force is employed in each, been so conducted that a defalcation of upwards of forty thousand dollars, and a probable loss of fifteen thousand dollars by reason of the failure of an insolvent bank has cocurred in the Treasurer's department, and a loss of probably twenty thousand dollars by loans made out of State funds to and through the late State Comptroller; therefore,

Resolved, That a special committee of three be appointed to inquire into and report, by bill or otherwise, such measures as will prevent a repetition of these losses; and also report where the large sum of money now held by the State is deposited, and whether upon interest or not, and any other measures that will give safety and promote the interest of the State,

Beg leave to make the following minority report:

That, immediately upon the reference, your committee waited upon Treasurer Wright, and requested from him a statement of the monthly balances in the various banks of the State, from the beginning of Mr. Sooy's administration down.

That he promptly replied that he would furnish it within twenty-four hours. Not receiving it, your committee four days afterward again called upon the Treasurer, who then informed them that it was impossible for him to furnish the statement before the time fixed for the adjournment of the Legislature. Thereupon, your committee addressed a circular letter to all the banks with which the State kept a deposit account, from 'a list furnished by the Treasurer, asking the information which they expected to obtain from the books of the Treasury Department.

To these circular letters many of the bank officers have responded, some promptly, others as late as last evening, while quite a number have not reported at all, even in acknowledgment of its receipt. It is very obvious, therefore, that your committee are unable, by reason of these delays and obstacles, to furnish as complete a report as the large interests involved demand. Nevertheless, from the partial returns that have come to their hands, and from other data, they are enabled and justified in stating the following conclusions:

That Treasurer Sooy made large loans at seven per cent. interest, upon an easy money market and the best collateral, when it was unnecessary, and while favored banks had large deposits, drawing no interest, exceeding the amount of the loan.

That Treasurer Sooy did collect and use upwards of forty thousand dollars of the State's money without hindrance from the Comptroller's Department, which money has been collected, after great delay and expense to the State, from his bondsmen.

That during the period these irregularities were occurring Comptroller Runyon was largely indebted to the State and School Funds, and was in default in payment of interest. That these two financial officers of the State should be prevented by legislation from being in any position where their vigilance could be controlled by their interest.

That Treasurer Sooy seems to have obtained his bondsmen by placing large deposits in the banks with which they were connected and keeping them there for long periods untouched, and while the State had outstanding loans.

That some loans made by Treasurer Wright seem to be obnoxious to the same charge of being unnecessary and wasteful.

That his deposits exhibit signs of favoritism that are hardly consistent with the State's interest.

That the loss sustained by the State of some \$32,000, less whatever dividend may be paid by the State Bank of New Brunswick, was unnecessary as this bank was notoriously in bad credit when the deposits were made, and which, too, prompt action upon the part of the Treasurer after he learned of its actual insolvency might have saved.

That the bookkeeping of the Treasury Department should be so changed that necessary information for legislation should be had in a reasonable time.

That the list of loans furnished to the committee by Treasurer Wright does not contain all the loans made by the State, and does not correspond therein with the Treasurer's Reports.

That the State receives no interest upon its deposits.

That from the imperfect data aforesaid it appears that the State has paid upward of thirty-two thousand dollars (\$32,-221.32), in interest during the period aforesaid.

That the balances of the State which are likely to be large in the future (the last report showing upwards of a half million of dollars), ought not to be at the disposal of any one officer, but to a Board constituted, say by the Governor, Secretary of State and Treasurer, who should designate the places of deposit and make the terms, and not subject a Treasurer to the importunity of friends and politicians, and the State to certain loss thereby.

Your committee, in making this report, have stated the reasons that it is not as accurate as it should be, and therefore that no injustice may be done, beg leave to ask a suspension of judgment, so far as it may affect any public officer, until the committee have time and opportunity to give it that certainty of which financial matters are capable and the public welfare demands; therefore,

Resolved, That the Committee on Ways and Means be authorized to sit after the adjournment and report to the Governor within sixty days thereafter, to the end that he may make such suggestions in his next annual message to the Legislature as the interests of the State would seem to require.

Whereas, During the late terrible gale and storm on the New Jersey coast on the night of the second and the morning of the third of Februray, 1880, several vessels were driven on shore with their passengers and crews, between Sandy Hook and Cape May on said coast, and were wrecked; and whereas, during the said gale and storm the captains and crews of the life saving stations in district No. 4, State of New Jersey, by their courage and discretion, at the great peril of their own lives, rescued and delivered from imminent death almost the entire number of persons so imperiled; therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate (House of Assembly concurring) of the State of New Jersey, That the Legislature of this State hereby expresses its sincere gratitude for and earnest admiration of the heroic conduct evinced during the said gale and storm by the captains and crews of the said life saving stations in the said district No. 4.

And be it resolved, That the life saving service, under its present efficient management, has been so successful in its humane endeavors to rescue shipwrecked passengers and sailors, that we would respectfully recommend the Congress of the United States to not only increase the facilities of the service, but to also provide an adequate compensation, if the same is not now sufficient, for the services of the men whose heroism in this humane work excites and commands the admiration of the world. And be it resolved, That his excellency the Governor of the State of New Jersey be requested to transmit a copy of these resolutions to the Senators and Representatives of this State in Congress now in session, 455, 585.

6. Whereas, It is difficult for persons having business to transact with the different offices located in the State House to find the particular office, from the fact of there being at present no means to guide them in their search to the same, and they are therefore necessitated to inquire from one department to another, in order to find the office in search of, thereby entailing—especially upon persons coming from a distance—much trouble and loss of time, which can and should be avoided; therefore be it

Resolved by the House of Assembly (Senate concurring), That the State Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized to have constructed and erected near the front entrance of the State House one or more suitable guides or directories designating by number the different offices located on each floor in the State House, similar in construction to those in the Post-office, in the Government building at Trenton, and to have each room in the building properly numbered, to correspond with the numbers on said guide or directory, 458.

7. Whereas, The surviving veterans of the war for the Union once again mustered into the Grand Army of the Republic, are now assembled in annual encampment in the historic city of Trenton; therefore, be it

Resolved, By the House of Assembly (Senate concurring), that the representatives of the ever loyal and patriotic people of New Jersey, welcome with peculiar pride to the Capitol of the State the representatives of the Posts of the Grand Army of the Republic of the Department of New Jersey, and tender to them the usual courtesies accorded to deserving and distinguished visitors, 464.

8. *Resolved* (the House of Assembly concurring), That the privileges of the floor of both Houses be tendered to the delegates of the "Grand Army of the Republic," now attending the annual encampment of the order in this city, 465.

9. Resolved (the Senate concurring), That this Legislature adjourn sine die on Friday, the twelfth day of March, 1880, at twelve o'clock, noon, 484.

10. Resolved, by the House of Assembly (Senate concurring), That the following amendments to the Constitution of this State be agreed to :

ARTICLE VI. Strike out section one and insert as a new section the following section :

The judicial power shall be vested in a court of appeals in the last resort in all causes; a court for the trial of impeachments, a court of chancery, circuit courts, and such inferior courts as now exist, and as may be hereafter ordained and established by law, which inferior courts the Legislature may alter or abolish, as the public good shall require.

Strike out section two and insert a new section as follows:

SECTION II.—1. The court of appeals shall be composed of six judges; in the first appointment of said judges, two shall be appointed for a term of three years, two for a term of six years, and two for a term of nine years; subsequent appointments, except to fill vacancies, shall be for a term of nine years; appointments to fill vacancies shall be for the unexpired term only; a major part of said judges shall be authorized to hold the court and transact all its business.

The clerk of said court shall be appointed by the judges of the court, or a major part of them; he shall hold his office for the term of nine years.

The president judge of said court shall be selected by the remaining members of the court.

Strike out section four and insert a new section as follows :

SECTION IV.—1. The court of chancery shall consist of a chancellor, to be appointed for a term of nine years.

The chancellor shall hear all appeals from the circuit courts in equity and orphans' court cases.

The court of chancery shall have no original jurisdiction, and from any sentence, decree or order of said court on appeal, under conditions to be from time to time imposed by the Legislature, shall lie to the court of appeals.

The clerk of the cours of chancery shall be appointed by the chancellor, and hold his office during the pleasure of the chancellor.

SECTION V., 1. Circuit courts shall be held in any county of this State by judges appointed for that purpose; such courts shall have exclusive law and equity jurisdiction within their respective counties, except as to orphan's court matters and matters involving less than two hundred dollars.

The Legislature shall from time to time fix the number of judicial circuits in the State; each county having over forty thousand inhabitants shall have one circuit; each county having over one hundred thousand inhabitants may have two circuits; in counties having less than forty thousand inhabitants, two or more counties may be joined in one circuit.

Judges of the circuit court shall be appointed for the term of seven years.

The clerks of the several counties shall be the clerks of the circuit courts in said counties.

Any judgment obtained in any circuit may be docketed in the office of the clerk of the court of appeals, and execution issue therefrom into any county of this State.

Orphans' courts for each county within said circuits shall be held by the said circuit judges.

Strike out section six.

Make section seven section six.

ARTICLE VII., SECTION II. Strike out paragraph one and insert a new paragraph as follows :--

The judges of the court of appeals and of the circuit courts, and the chancellor, shall be nominated by the Governor, and appointed by him with the advice and consent of the Senate.

They shall at stated times receive for their services a stated combensation from the State, which shall be in lieu of all fees, and shall not be increased nor diminished during the term of their appointments; and they shall hold no other office under the government of this State or of the United States; an acceptance by any one of them of a nomination by any political party to any other office during his term of office, shall work a forfeiture of his office.

Strike out paragraph two, 631, 632, 633.

11. Whereas, The report of the special tax commission now before the House and that of the commission to draft a system of general laws for the government of municipalities in this State, now before the Senate, were presented so late in the present session as to prevent that due and careful consideration which should be given to the important measures covered by, and the changes in our present system of taxation and of municipal government proposed in said reports; therefore,

Be it resolved, (Senate concurring), That a special committee be appointed to consist of three Senators to be named by the President of the Senate and of five members of the House of Assembly to be designated by the Speaker, whose duty it shall be to carefully examine and consider the reports of said commissions, and the bills accompanying the same and report thereon, with such amendments and alterations as they may deem proper, to the Legislature of this State, on the first day of its next session, and that for the information of the people six thousand copies each of the respective bills reported by said commissioners be printed and furnished to the members of this Legislature for general distribution, 718.

12. Resolved, (the House of Assembly concurring), That the two Houses meet in joint meeting on Wednesday, the 10th day of March, at 12 o'clock, noon, for the purpose of electing a police justice for the city of Jersey City, also a police justice for the city of Newark, and for electing commissioners of deeds where vacancies exist in the several counties of this State, and for such other business as may come before the joint meeting, 755.

13. Whereas, Article IV., section VII., clause 12 of the constitution of this State is as follows:

" "Property shall be 'assessed for taxes under general laws, and by uniform rules, according to its true value;" and

Whereas, No such general laws have been enacted; therefore,

Resolved, That this Legislature remain in session until it has discharged its duty under said clause of the constitution, by enacting such general laws. 762.

14. Resolved (by the Senate, the General Assembly concurring), That the following amendment to the constitution of this State be agreed to :

ARTICLE IV., SECTION VII., PARAGRAPH 11. Strike out the words "regulating the internal affairs of towns and counties," 785.

15. Resolved (by the Senate, the General Assembly concurring), That the following amendments to the constitution of this State be agreed to :

ARTICLE IV., SECTION I., PARAGRAPH 3. Strike out the words "yearly and every year;" after the word "November," insert the words "in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, and every second year thereafter."

'ARTICLE IV., 'SECTION II., PARPGRAPH 1. Strike out the word "three" and insert in lieu thereof the word "four."

ARTICLE IV., SECTION II., PARAGRAPH 2. Strike out the whole paragraph, which is in the following words :

"As soon as the Senate shall meet after the first election to be held in pursuance of this constitution, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three classes; the seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first year; of the second class at the expiration of the second year, and of the third class at the expiration of the third year, so that one class may be elected every year; and if vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, the persons elected to supply such vacancies shall be elected for the unexpired terms only," and insert in lieu thereof the following:

"The Senate meeting in January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, shall be divided as equally as may be into two classes; the seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year, and of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year, so that one class may be elected every second year; if vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, the persons elected to supply such vacancies shall be elected for the unexpired terms only."

ARTICLE IV., SECTION III., PARAGRAPH 1. Strike out the word "annually," and insert in lieu thereof the word "biennially."

ARTICLE IV., SECTION IV, PARAGRAPH 7. Strike out the word "annually," and insert in lieu thereof the word "biennially," 799-816.

16. Resolved (the House of Assembly concurring), That the concurrent resolution proposing amendments to the constitution of the State, providing for biennial sessions of the Legislature, having been agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two Houses, be entered on the respective journals of the two Housess with the ayes and nays taken thereon, and the same be referred to the Legislature next to be chosen in this State, and that publication for three months previous to making such choice shall be made in at least one newspaper of each county; and be it further

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Senate and the Clerk of the House cause said entries to be made in the journals of the respective Houses and cause publication to be made aforesaid according to law and the requirements of the constitution in that regard under article IX.. "amendments," 889.

17. Resolved (Senate concurring), That whenever a reunion shall be held at any place within the State of the members of any one of the regiments of this State, engaged in the late war of the 'rebellion, or reunion of the Grand Army of the Republic, the Quartermaster General is hereby requested to send a capable and trustworthy person connected with his department to attend the same; taking with him to said reunion the colors of said regiment borne by them during the war, said colors to remain in the custody of said person until the close of the reunion, and to be by him safely returned to their depository at the Capitol, 888.

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
