Whales and Northern Gannets amaze CMLF passengers and crews

CAPE MAY, NJ — During the early spring months, customers and marine employees are often treated to a fascinating show, put on by some creatures, both finned or winged, that inhabit the Delaware Bay.

When the weather cooperates and the seas are calm, customers and employees aboard the Cape May - Lewes Ferry vessels often spot the water spouts of Finback Whales or are thrilled by the torpedo-like dives into the water of the bay by Northern Gannets as both prey on local bait fish, primarily Atlantic herring.

Both species feed on bait fish near the shipping lanes of the lower Delaware Bay. Their dining habits provide a free

glimpse of nature in action from the decks of the CMLF ferries as they crisscross the bay.

According to CMLF Captain George Nason, the Gannets have been showing up by the thousands. He also noted that

he had seen three Finbacks each day on weekend trips in March and early April. He noted that a pair of whales was always seen together, one 60 feet and the other about 40 feet in length.

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Construction begins on Delaware approaches to bridge

NEW CASTLE, DE — Phase III of the Delaware Approach Road Rehabilitation program, focusing on I-295 northbound from I-95 to the U.S. 13 interchange, is under way. The construction work includes earth moving, bridge construction/rehabilitation, signage and drainage efforts.

Motorists should expect delays from time to time, as the safety of the traveling public as well as the contractors and DRBA employees continues to be the Authority's highest priority. The Authority does not anticipate that the approaches to the bridge will need to be closed although some lanes may be temporarily unavailable or shifted during construction.



CONSTRUCTION — Part of the Delaware Approach Road Rehabilitation Program Phase III, the replacement of this railroad overpass, is scheduled to be completed in September. Built in the early '60s, the approach roads and ramps will receive significant improvements which will enhance roadway safety and efficiency.

Commuters and other travelers are urged to stay alert in and around construction zones which are clearly marked. There will be detours and varying speed limits posted during different phases of the work. The Authority urges all travelers to add a few additional minutes to their travel plans particularly during rush hour periods.

In general, the multi-year program includes new lighting, drainage, pavement, signage and rehabilitation or relocation of approach ramps and interchange bridges. Phase III is scheduled for completion in December 2010. ❖

The award was announced in May at the 24th Annual Airport Business Diversity Conference here.

The DRBA was recognized for its 2007 achievements in reaching out to DBEs and in obtaining significant DBE participation.

In addition to the federal program, the Authority has also extended its DBE goal methodology to its local contracting efforts. As a result, more than \$3 million in subcontracts have been awarded by prime contractors to disadvantaged, minority- and women-owned businesses since 2006. ❖

New same day return-trip fare to debut at the CMLF *\$10 return trip vehicle fare valid during '08 -'09 winter season only*

CAPE MAY, NJ — It's good news for customers of the Cape May-Lewes Ferry who use the service during the winter months. In May of this year, the DRBA Commission approved a new, same day return trip fare of \$10 for a standard-sized vehicle and its driver.

The fare, valid for a same day trip only, is valid for a one year trial period.

"The Authority wants to make the ferry service more affordable for customers who travel round trip on the same day, in standard-sized vehicles during the winter months.

"We anticipate that the new fare will encourage more people to use the service and thus generate additional revenues for the operations," said Jim Walls, chief operations officer for the DRBA.

The Authority's management team will evaluate the results of the new fare class on vehicle traffic and then report the findings and resulting recommendations to the Commission at the end of the trial period.

The Authority also hopes to promote business and commerce activity in the communities of Delaware and New Jersey that might result from such a reasonably priced same-day, round-trip package.

The new fare class for same day, return trip travel follows:
