In October 2009, The Activities Department at the Vineland Veterans Home applied for a National Scholarship to Second Wind Dreams, a non-profit organization whose mission is to change the perception of aging. After a lengthy process and two interviews, it was announced in May 2010, that The Vineland Veterans Home was granted a lifetime scholarship to Second Wind Dreams through the generosity of the Harrah's Foundation.

SecondWind Dreams' mission is to work with eldercare communities to assist elders to fulfill their life's dreams, whether big or small, or whether it is the elders' first dream or their fiftieth. A group of staff from the Harrah's Foundation and the Vineland Veterans Home will be trained to serve as dream weavers, interviewing each resident and helping them to make their dream come true. Dreams fall into six categories; lifelong dreams, need based dreams, relationship based dreams, relive past experiences, dreams for fun, and quality of life dreams. As each dream unfolds the residents will gain a greater appreciation for their stage in life, and the happiness that is the byproduct of the dreams will truly become immeasurable.

On July 22, 2010, residents and staff from the Vineland Memorial Home were presented the lifetime scholarship at the Traymore Ballroom at Bally's Casino in Atlantic City. Staff and residents alike were overwhelmed with excitement when it was revealed that the Home won the prestigious scholarship and that each and every resident would have the ability to have all of their dreams come true. During this celebration, the first Vineland Memorial Home Dreamer was announced. Mr. Edward Hunter, an 84-year-old Navy Veteran, was escorted to the stage where his



lifelong dream was fulfilled. Mr. Hunter always dreamed of serving his community as a Police Officer, but set his dream aside to serve his Country during World War II. So, before an audience of three hundred, Mr. Hunter was sworn in by Atlantic City Mayor Lorenzo Langford as an Honorary Police Officer. He was presented with a framed certificate, badge, and uniform hat, then donned a bullet proof vest and was partnered with the Mayor's Driver, Officer Stacey Johnson. Together, the new partners sped off in a 2010 Dodge Charger with lights and sirens blazing to serve as Atlantic City's newest crime fighting duo. Upon his return, Mr. Hunter exclaimed, "This was the best day of my life!" For all of those in attendance, the day was very memorable as well. Go Green! Save Green!

This year, the U. S. Department of the Treasury is eliminating the purchase of paper savings bonds through payroll sales and is encouraging participants to purchase electronic savings bonds online through www.TreasuryDirect.gov. With TreasuryDirect, Treasury can continue to offer employees the convenience of payroll savings while reducing the cost of the savings bond program. TreasuryDirect offers savings bonds for a minimum purchase of \$25 and other treasury securities including T-Bills, Notes, Bonds and Treasury Inflation Protected Securities (TIPS) in increments of \$100.

As a regular saver through TreasuryDirect Payroll Savings, you can direct your payroll deduction to an individual TreasuryDirect account and make purchases of savings bonds or other Treasury securities when you choose. Or you can have funds deposited into TreasuryDirect from your checking or savings account and then set up recurring purchases. In your TreasuryDirect account, you can set up multiple registrations and convert your paper bonds to electronic bonds through SmartExchange.

Opening a TreasuryDirect account only takes a few minutes and it's free! Go to www.TreasuryDirect.gov and click on "Open an Account." If you want information about TreasuryDirect before deciding to open an account, take the "Guided Tour" or watch the short video, "Opening a TreasuryDirect Account."

Paper savings bonds will remain available for purchase through most financial institutions or with your federal income tax refund using IRS Form 8888.

Retirement workshops

All state employees who are members of the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) or the Teachers' Pension and Annuity Fund (TPAF) and planning to retire before the end of 2011 are invited to take advantage of the retirement workshops scheduled over the next four months.

The workshops are being held at the New Jersey Forensic Science Technology Center in Hamilton Township, Mercer County. During the workshop, representatives will explain topics including retirement benefits, beneficiary options, group life insurance, pension taxes and health benefits during retirement.

Register for the workshop date and time of your choice. Go to www.nj.us/treasury/pensions and click on the link for "Retirement Workshops."

Classes will be held at 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. and are scheduled for Sept. 9, 15, 24, 29; Oct. 4, 21; Nov. 3, 22, 29; and Dec. 10, 17.

When attending, members must bring along a printed version of their Estimate of Retirement Benefits, which they can get using the Member Benefits Online System. To register for MBOS, go to www.state.nj.us/treasury/pensions/mbosregister.shtml and follow instructions.

Many of us baby-boomers have come to a point in our lives where we are caring for our parents. Maybe you are cleaning out their home because they have to move into retirement living and wondering what to do with all the STUFF they have accumulated over the years. Here are suggestions for a few things you may find.

Hearing aids – over the years they may have upgraded or replaced their hearing aids and couldn't bear to toss out the old ones. You can send used hearing aids to HearNow – a national non-profit program who assists those U.S. residents who are deaf or hard of hearing and have no other resources to acquire hearing aids. Visit <http://www.starkeyhearingfoundation.org/hear-now.php> to get more information.

Eyeglasses – as your parents got their new prescription, they may have thrown their old glasses in a drawer, "just in case," and you have five or more sets of glasses that they cannot use. But there are people around the world who can use those glasses. In some African countries, the price of glasses is more than three month's average salary. Your donated glasses can enable people to keep working, allow parents to see their children – or children see their world.

The Lions Club has been recycling used glasses for years. They can do it for as little as eight cents for each pair. So gather up those bifocals, your non-prescription sunglasses, even the pieces of glasses your parents saved so they could fix their glasses when they broke, and drop them in a collection box.

Boxes can be found in most Lenscrafters, Goodwill stores or a Lions Club drop box. Or you can mail them to New Eyes for the Needy, 549 Millburn Ave., PO Box 332, Short Hills NJ 07078.

Videotapes, audiotapes and floppy disks – many of us have graduated from the aforementioned tapes and floppy disks to DVDs, CDs and thumb drives to carry around our movies, music and data. But the old media can be sitting around and Alternative Communities Training in Missouri employs disabled individuals in the recycling-reusing of these items. This allows them the opportunity to earn a competitive paycheck and live independently.

Or, check out your local hospital, library, nursing home or nursery school where there is likely to be a movie library. They just might like your copy of "Peter Pan," "Superman," or "Pearl Harbor."

N.J. Honor Guard program has openings for new members

The New Jersey National Guard Honor Guard Program is looking for new members to serve at funerals of veterans around the state.

Retirees and active National Guard members of the Army and Air Guard can apply for the openings. Retirees with 20 years or more of service from any branch can also apply. The Honor Guard members are men and women, enlisted and officers.

All personnel must meet Army/Air Force height and weight standards of AR 600-9 and their appearance must meet AR 670-1 standards.

Current Guard members are paid one day's active duty pay, but no less than \$50 plus one retirement point for each day's work. Retirees receive \$50 per day.

Many days can find the Honor Guard with more than one mission; but each person registers for the time they are available. Most services take place within a 50 mile radius of their assigned Honor Guard Office; hours are 9 a.m.-4 p.m. Some missions can be done in the evening hours. The Honor Guard provides services seven days a week, depending on the schedule of missions.

The N.J. National Guard Honor Guard Program provides services mostly for Army veterans but has worked at other branch's funerals.



There is an initial training period for all personnel. Everyone will be taught how to perform all assignments and phases of the ceremony. If someone has a special talent such as bugle playing for Taps, it is greatly appreciated.

Anyone interested must contact the program office at 609-530-7090. They will be referred to a local regional team leader to establish an appointment time and location for an interview or in the case of a bugler, an audition.

MVC chief announces extensions for military

New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission Chief Administrator Raymond P. Martinez has announced the issuance of Administrative Order 2010-02, which renews a 2009 order granting all New Jerseyans who are active duty military personnel serving in the war on terrorism, including the National Guard and Military Reserves, automatic extensions of valid driver license, registration and inspection expiration dates.

"This order is a simple, but helpful gesture to demonstrate the state's support for the troops and recognize the tremendous sacrifice that they are making on behalf of all New Jerseyans," said Martinez. "Easing this burden at home for our soldiers and their families is one way to thank them for their dedication and service."

Authorized each year, the extensions are granted to military personnel during active service in the war on terrorism (including Operations Noble Eagle and Enduring Freedom) or Operation Iraqi Freedom. License, registration and inspection documents will remain valid until two weeks after demobilization.

The law enforcement community is aware of the extension however, military personnel should carry a copy of the letter signed by Chief Administrator Martinez, which can be found on www.njmvc.gov, along with their active duty military credentials when operating a motor vehicle.
