To the Honorable William T. Cahill, Governor of the State of New Jersey; the Honorable Raymond H. Bateman, President of the Senate, and Honorable Members thereof; and the Honorable Thomas H. Kean, Speaker of the General Assembly, and Honorable Members thereof:

Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 52:17B-5.5, there is hereby respectfully submitted the fifth annual report on information gathered and collated under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, inaugurated on January 1, 1967, which provides a comprehensive compilation and analysis of crime statistics for New Jersey.

As noted in past years, New Jersey's effort in this area predated the Report of the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and the Administration of Criminal Justice, which urged the creation of such state systems. FBI officials, in discussing this system with members of our State Police, have described it as a model of its kind.

It would, of course, be impossible to compile this Report without the cooperation of New Jersey's municipal, county, state and other law enforcement agencies, 591 of whom contributed to this effort in 1971. It is with appreciation to these dedicated public servants, and in the interests of more effective law enforcement for all the citizens of New Jersey, that this fifth annual Uniform Crime Report is

# THE NEW JERSEY UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

## DEFINED

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System involves the uniform compilation, classification, and analysis of crime statistics reported by all police agencies of the state pursuant to guides and regulations prescribed by law.

The statute which established the Uniform Crime Reporting System (N.J.S.A. 52:17 B-5.1 et seq) empowers the Attorney General to collect, gather, assemble, and collate information which would be of assistance in the proper administration of criminal justice. The Attorney General and the New Jersey State Police (the agency designated by the Attorney General to establish the Uniform Crime Reporting System), in an attempt to achieve uniformity with the FBI reporting system and to establish a broad base for the collection of data involving anti-social behavior, and other relevant information with respect thereto, have defined the word "crime" to include acts which technically within our State are not considered crimes. In this reporting system the word "crime" includes some "disorderly persons offenses." It also includes in a category entitled "all other offenses" violations of municipal ordinances. References to the relevant tables which set forth the Class I and Class II offenses contained in this report clearly indicate what is covered.

## PURPOSE

Effective law enforcement requires the coordination of law enforcement activities within and among political subdivisions. Special attention must often be devoted to a selective and concentrated effort both areawide, as well as in terms of a specific pattern and type of criminal behavior. Selective and coordinated enforcement becomes possible only when the type and volume of crime can be analyzed on the basis of accurate information comprehensively developed and systematically collated.

Information revealing the location, frequency, and nature of crime is essential to this purpose. It is for these reasons that New Jersey's Uniform Crime Reporting System was developed.

## DEVELOPMENT

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Law was enacted on May 16, 1966 and became effective January 1, 1967. Responsibility for the establishment, direction, control and supervision of the Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the Attorney General of the State. After passage of the law, the Attorney General, as provided by the statute, designated the New Jersey State Police as the agency to collect, gather, assemble and collate information from the law enforcement jurisdictions within the state.

Prior to the enactment of the law, and at the request of Attorney General Arthur J. Sills, the New Jersey State Police conducted research and study of crime

reporting systems then operational throughout the country. Study results established that adoption of a reporting program paralleling that of the federal system of Uniform Crime Reporting would be the soundest approach toward development of a state system. The obvious advantage found in the adoption of the federal system included the desirability of having compatible state and federal systems thereby allowing absorption of state crime data into that at the national level.

The Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting of the New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association has served the program in an advisory capacity since 1966. The contributions made by this committee have proven invaluable and, indeed, insured the success of the program. This body continues to work closely with the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit of the New Jersey State Police to improve further the quality of reporting and to recommend additional program standards, policies and procedures.

During the development phase of the program a study of the federal and various state systems of crime reporting revealed the importance of a sound internal police records system, if accurate crime statistics were to be forthcoming. Upon recognition of this factor, the State Police revised completely their method of internal reporting in order to meet the requirements of the Federal System of Uniform Crime Reporting. This step not only hastened program development but also proved invaluable throughout the operational phase.

Education of contributors to the program in the areas of mechanics, methods and concepts must be a constant operational requirement, if continued system adherence and valid statistics are to be expected. This vital need is satisfied by the personal contact between the seven state troopers assigned as field representatives to the program, and the contributors to the system.

The difficult and important task of maintaining close liaison is obvious when it is realized that services now are extended by the New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit, through its field representatives, to the 591 law enforcement agencies of the state. Although each contributor to the program is supplied with the "Uniform Crime Reporting Guide" describing system procedures and mechanics, personnel changes within reporting departments and program refinements make the educational phase a continuing one.

As an adjunct to the program, the New Jersey State Police has offered its revised method of internal reporting to those police departments who wish to adopt it. In all cases of report adoption and record up-dating, assistance is rendered by the field representative who provides the necessary guidance and instruction. The personal contact between the field representative and the contributor not only serves as a rapid means to resolve areas of report error, but also provides the opportunity to discuss other areas of mutual interest, thus providing an additional communication link between municipal, county and state law enforcement agencies.

## PROGRAM EVALUATION

The scope of mandatory crime reporting in New Jersey extends far beyond the stated purpose of the initial program. The compilation and publication of an annual report, which identifies and offers analysis of the extent and nature of crime on a state, regional, county and municipal level, may be considered an end in itself. However, practical application of such data must be made before the program can be judged substantive.

Police executives throughout the state are making increased use of this data in administrative, planning and operational determinations for their respective jurisdictions. During 1971, the State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit rendered operational assistance to municipal police agencies by providing individual analysis of statistics as they related to specific crime problems and for use in identifying necessary police manpower and equipment needs. Program requirements have also increased police efficiency in the areas of reporting and record keeping. Examples of program application, as discussed here, aid police in their day to day operations and contribute toward the constant effort of upgrading the quality of police services in the community.

The State Law Enforcement Planning Agency, which was established in August of 1968 to conform with the provisions of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, has the responsibility of improving law enforcement throughout the state. Since its inception, in all of its determinations as to application of allocated funds, this agency has used analyzed crime data obtained through the Uniform Crime Reporting program. The establishment of crime rates on regional, county and municipal levels with identification of specific crime problems allows the agency to construct priorities, formulate plans and implement these plans to the benefit of the state and all units of local government. This administrative application of such crime data illustrates the far reaching effect the program has on all efforts to combat crime in the state.

The New Jersey National Crime Information Center Terminal (NCIC) maintained by the State Police at West Trenton, links law enforcement of the state with a computerized nationwide index of crime and criminals in Federal Bureau of Investigation Headquarters, Washington, D.C. This service is rendered to the police agencies of the state in the interests of increasing police efficiency in dealing with the mobility factor of crime.

A statewide computerized law enforcement information system for New Jersey is scheduled to be operational July, 1972. This system will interface with the National Crime Information Center in Washington, D.C., thus making state and national layers of data concerning crime and the criminal rapidly available to the police of the state. While such an information system is indeed desirable and necessary, it must be stated that successful interchange of information is based on common crime classifications, definitions and data elements. These vital components have already been formulated through the uniform classifications and definitions found in the Uniform Crime Reporting

Program. The need for comprehensive arrest records and court dispositions has long been recognized in law enforcement. Such information is necessary to identify recidivists, and evaluate the effectiveness of the actions of police, courts and other agencies of criminal justice.

Recognition of this need in New Jersey led to a comprehensive study of existing methods of collecting and analyzing data pertaining to persons entering the criminal justice system by arrest. Study results disclosed that pertinent data pertaining to persons arrested was fragmented and, in many cases, insufficient to serve the needs of police, courts, correction and rehabilitation agencies. The positive identification of a person charged with a criminal offense and his subsequent experience within the criminal justice system is vital to any effort in measuring the effectiveness of those agencies which comprise that system.

A coordinated effort by the Attorney General, Administrative Director of the Courts and a State Police Crime Study Committee established the Court Disposition Reporting Program, whereby all data pertaining to persons charged could be collected, collated, analyzed and rapidly disseminated to the various law enforcement agencies concerned. The State Police was given legislative responsibility for program administration and, in practice, functions in conjunction with the Administrative Director of the Courts.

Program responsibility with respect to police agencies lies in the identification of a defendant through fingerprinting and submission of other pertinent data at the time of arrest. Fingerprints are submitted to the State Bureau of Identification for purposes of positive identification and search for prior record. Other defendant data is returned to the court of jurisdiction for program submission by the court upon disposition of the charge. Disposition data is furnished by the clerk of each court through which the defendant passes.

County prosecutors provide additional data through the submission of indictment and accusation information as it relates to specific defendants. This process makes possible the documentation of final and interim dispositions, allowing for identification of the defendant's status at every level of criminal justice. In this manner, the program supplies meaningful data to all administrative units of the criminal justice system for use in objective evaluation of existing procedures and planning of more efficient methods of operation where the need exists.

The need for field services to provide guidance and direction to contributors becomes apparent when it is realized that almost 1,200 police prosecutive court and correctional units contribute under the program. This need is satisfied by the personal contact provided by the six field representatives assigned to the Court Disposition Reporting Unit of the State Police. Questions regarding program procedures and mechanics are resolved at each level of submission, thus insuring the accuracy of data submitted.

The Court Disposition Reporting System provides offender tracking capabilities necessary for full participation in the soon to be implemented National Crime Information Center Computerized Criminal History

(CCH) File. State Police personnel have had an active role in the design of this file.

Criminal history information collected through Court Disposition Reporting also provides the base data for a system of offender-based transactional statistics currently under development. These statistics will provide meaningful information to administrative units, such as, procedures, offender fall-out and recidivism. Statistical analysis should provide insight to functional "problems".

The increased awareness for proper in-put of identification/disposition information now provides a comprehensive data base for use by all contributors. This, combined with improved methods of dissemination will provide a more efficient and rapid exchange of meaningful information between the police, prosecutors, courts, and correctional agencies of this state.

Crime related programs designed to serve law enforcement and increase the overall efficiency of the criminal justice system in the state require extensive planning and coordination. The State Chiefs' Association has rendered valuable assistance in these areas, thereby contributing toward the development of the National Crime Information Center System and the Court Disposition Reporting Program, in addition to their continuing status in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

Since 1967, many states have studied the New Jersey system for adoption within their respective states. Five of these, presently have ongoing programs based on the New Jersey system and many more of the remaining states are in the process of implementing similar programs.

The element of compatibility of crime statistics between state and federal programs is vital, and evaluation must include consideration of the degree of that compatibility. The Uniform Crime Reporting Unit of the State Police has worked closely with the members of the Federal Bureau of Investigation who administer the National Uniform Crime Reporting Program. Invaluable aid and assistance has been given by the FBI which resulted in the New Jersey program being totally compatible with that of the national program. This compatibility allows absorption of state crime data into the national system without lengthy and costly conversion processes.

On January 1, 1969, the FBI, who have collected National Uniform Crime Reports in the states and counties since 1930, eliminated the direct collection of National Uniform Crime Reports from the police of New Jersey. This procedure change followed a two-year evaluation of the New Jersey program by the FBI and resulted in an agreement wherein uniform crime reports for each municipality of the state are now being submitted to the national program by the State Police. This working relationship, which was coordinated through the Chiefs of Police Association, State Police and the FBI, is a direct result of the interest and cooperation of the law enforcement agencies of the state in the Uniform Crime Reporting program.

## **FACTORS RELATED TO CRIME**

It has long been noted there are numerous factors, environmental and others, which have an important bearing on the scope and intensity of crime. As an adjunct to the statistical compilation and analysis of crime reported herein, special attention is devoted to certain of these factors.

To understand further the nature and scope of crime in various sections of the state, a section entitled "Profiles of Incorporated Municipalities in New Jersey" appears in this publication as it did in the first annual report of 1967. The profile information set forth in the areas of population, density rates, population growth, all relate to the year 1971, as do the urban, suburban, rural characterizations, given land areas and industrial populations.

Factors considered within profiles are those which are out of police control, but which may affect a community's crime rate and which may vary from community to community. The presence of these factors are noted in order that the resulting crime statistics may be reviewed in a more fair and equitable manner. The effect of these factors on a community's crime rate is not easily determined, but they are set forth for the purpose of alerting the reader to their existence in varying degrees in all New Jersey communities.

## **REFINEMENT OF THE SYSTEM**

The collection of meaningful data to supplement that which is normally collected is a vital element of the system. This supplemental information regarding crime and the criminal enters the system by way of special surveys and samplings. Periodic collection of such information enables better identification of specific crime problems and those factors which contribute to them. Analysis of refined information and dissemination to contributors provides additional intelligence upon which more effective police action can be based.

Special statewide surveys taken in previous years have dealt with the important mobility factor of crime and the specific offense of robbery. The results of the mobility study served as an indicator of the effect the criminal mobility can have on the crime experience of the community and the contribution it makes toward police problems in the control of crime. Robbery analysis, based on that special survey, better identified the nature of the crime, its impact on society and the robbery perpetrator.

The collection of refined information relative to crime was continued in 1969 through a one month "Special Auto Theft Survey" conducted in August of that year. The auto theft problem, although not unique to New Jersey, has grown to major proportions and its continuing growth suggests serious consequences for the individual and the community.

A statewide arrest survey on the vital issue of "Drug Abuse and Crime in New Jersey" was conducted during the month of August, 1970. For the first time a meaningful correlation was established between these two major problems. Complete results and analyses are contained in the publication "Drug Abuse and Crime in New Jersey" released June, 1971.

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey, in its sixth year of operation, is now recognized as an effective vehicle to increase the efficiency of police operations in every municipality of the state. The System was originally designed to fulfill the need for accurate crime statistics for use in police administration, planning and operations. In its current status it does answer these needs to a great degree, but has not yet reached full potential as an operational tool.

On July 15, 1970, the New Jersey State Police, Uniform Crime Reporting Unit, through the New Jersey Law Enforcement Planning Agency, was awarded a \$30,000 Discretionary Grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, U.S. Department of Justice. The funds are for the purpose of assisting in the expansion of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

Based on the current Uniform Crime Reports submitted by the police departments throughout the state, a monthly "feedback" report will be disseminated to each contributor to the program. This "feedback" report will present an accurate account of the status of crime in each municipality of the state. The report will contain information as to the type and time of criminal operations and crime targets, as well as the volume and trend of crime within each municipality. In addition to comparing the current month with the same month of last year, further analysis will be done for a current cumulative monthly total compared to the same period of last year. A trend for two prior years within the same crime categories will also be established.

On January 1, 1971, a six month Pilot Program involving sixty-eight municipalities with a population of 25,000 or more, was undertaken. Upon the success of this Pilot Program, the full operation involving all municipalities in New Jersey will commence.

In the interest of satisfying a national, as well as a state need for uniformity, completeness, and accuracy in crime statistics, every report submitted under the system is prepared in triplicate by the contributor. One copy is retained by the contributor and the remaining copies are submitted to the State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit which in turn forwards a copy to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for inclusion in the National Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

Statistical comparisons set forth in this publication relate to that crime data collected in the state during the years 1967 through 1971. These comparisons are shown in an attempt to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of serious crime in New Jersey. The New Jersey system is based on 100 percent reporting coverage and, therefore, not only projects a crime picture for the entire state but, inclusion in the national program, makes a valuable contribution to the measurement of crime in the country as well.

## **OBJECTIVES**

Uniform Crime Reporting in New Jersey, as a program parallel to the National Uniform Crime Reporting System, sets forth objectives similar to those of the federal program. Basically, the System was designed to fulfill the need for accurate crime statistics for use in police administration, planning and operations. Additionally,

the Program provides the public with information regarding general statewide crime conditions as well as the documentation of crime data for students of the criminal process.

The attainment of these objectives is accomplished by the following program procedures:

- (1) An attempt is made to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of serious crime in the state through the use of a Crime Index consisting of seven selected offenses reported to police or coming directly to their attention.
- (2) The total volume of all types of criminal offenses is compiled as they become known by police arrests.
- (3) Since the above are also measures of law enforcement activity, related data are collected to demonstrate the effectiveness of enforcement activities, available police strength, and significant factors involved in crime.

## **COLLECTION OF CRIME DATA**

As required by statute, all law enforcement agencies in the state submit crime reports to the program. During the year 1971, offense and related supplementary information, as well as arrest and disposition data, were received from 449 organized municipal police departments, 81 special part-time municipal police departments and the New Jersey State Police who provided the necessary information for the 38 municipalities without local police services.

In addition to the above agencies, arrest and disposition data were received from the state's 21 county prosecutors' and sheriffs' offices, two county police departments and eight county park police departments. In order to incorporate all New Jersey law enforcement under the system, the following state agencies with law enforcement responsibilities were included: New Jersey Marine Patrol, Division of Fish and Game, Division of Motor Vehicles, Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control, Division of Weights and Measures, Division of Shell Fisheries, Bureau of Parks and Forestry, and Forest Fire Service. This amounts to 591 enforcement agencies reporting.

## **METHOD**

Reported offenses are related to the municipality in which they occur, rather than to the agency which may investigate, arrest or otherwise in some manner, dispose of the case. The clearance, in every case, is attributed to the municipality in which the offense occurred, even though the arresting agency may not be the department originally reporting the offense. Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own reports. The Uniform Crime Reporting Guide, which is supplied to all contributors, outlines reporting procedures in detail and is complete with examples and illustrations. Field Representatives provide additional instruction and clarification when required.

Municipal law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses according to the following cate-

gories:

- (1) Homicide (Murder, Manslaughter and Accidental Death)
- (2) Forcible Rape
- (3) Robbery
- (4) Assault
- (5) Breaking and Entering
- (6) Larceny-Theft
- (7) Auto Theft

This count is determined from a record of all criminal complaints received by the police from victims or other sources or discovered by the police during their operations. Complaints determined by police investigation to be unfounded are eliminated from this count. The number of "offenses known" in each crime category is reported without regard to whether anyone is arrested, stolen property is recovered, local prosecutive policy, or any other consideration. Municipal law enforcement agencies also report the total number of these crimes cleared by arrest. A separate category is made for crimes cleared by the arrest of persons under 18 years of age. Certain other analytical data pertaining to specific crime categories are also reported, including, for example, total adult and juvenile arrests made during the month.

Annual report forms contain data such as the number of persons arrested for all criminal offenses with respect to age, sex and race of the offender, as well as an accounting of persons formally charged, their bail data, and dispositions. Police employee data are also collected annually, including the number of police killed and assaulted.

In summary, the presentation of this report, "Crime in New Jersey," reflects the compilation of the seven serious "offenses known to police," arrests of persons under 18 years of age and 18 years of age and over, and the ultimate disposition of those persons charged. This data is then related to the State of New Jersey as a whole, by population groups, character, designated crime reporting regions of the state, individual counties and, with respect to offense occurrence, to the municipality.

#### VERIFICATION PROCESSES

An obvious concern in the collection of crime statistics from 591 enforcement agencies throughout the state is the uniformity of data received. Program aids such as guides and instructions do not necessarily guarantee the accuracy and correctness of the reports submitted by the contributors. Additional controls are therefore necessary.

Each report received by the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit is recorded and examined for mathematical accuracy and, possibly more important, for reasonableness as to interpretation of offense classifications. Fluctuations from levels established by previous reports submitted by the contributor become subject of inquiry as to reason for variations. Improper classification, changes in reporting procedures or actual change are identified in this manner. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by direct telephone contact with the contributors, while all other errors are resolved by a personal

visit by a field representative to the reporting agency. These personal contacts are invaluable to the accuracy of the system. Field representatives are engaged in a constant educational effort and, as such, provide a vital link between the program and the reporter.

During 1971, field representatives made 2,558 personal contacts for field corrections, requests for reporting assistance and clarification of "feedback" information. A Uniform Crime Reporting orientation lecture is presented to each class of municipal police officers attending the Municipal Police Academy at Sea Girt.

#### CLASSIFICATION OF OFFENSES

Uniformity in reporting under the New Jersey system is based upon the proper classification of offenses by police. The adoption of the federal system of reporting included the utilization of the offense classifications of that system. Law enforcement in this state has made accurate application of those classifications in the reports submitted to the program.

In view of the need for compatibility with the federal system, "offenses" under the program are not distinguished by designation of "high misdemeanors," violations of the Disorderly Persons Act or municipal ordinances. The explanation of offense classifications may vary slightly with those employed at the federal level because the language used is familiar to law enforcement in this state. However, the major categories of offense classification remain the same as those employed nationally.

#### OFFENSE CLASSIFICATIONS

- (1) Homicide
  - 1a. Murder—The unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought.  
General rule—Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault or commission of a crime.
  - 1b. Manslaughter—The unlawful killing of a human being, by another, without malice aforethought.  
General rule—The killing may result from the commission of an unlawful act or from a lawful act performed with gross negligence. Traffic deaths may be classified as such when due to gross negligence of someone other than the victim.
  - 1c. Accidental Death—Non traffic—The death of a person resulting from his own gross negligence, mishap, or the negligence of another not sufficient in degree to classify the act as manslaughter.  
General rule—Any death *not* resulting from murder, manslaughter, suicide or natural causes is classified as accidental. Deaths resulting from traffic accidents on public thoroughfares are excluded.
- (2) Forcible Rape
  - 2a. Rape by force—The carnal knowledge of a female forcible against her will.

General rule—Forcible rape of a female, but excluding carnal abuse (Statutory Rape) or other sex offenses.

- 2b. Assault to rape—Attempts—All assaults and attempts to rape.
- (3) Robbery—The felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. Includes all attempts.

General rule—Robbery differs from larceny in that it is aggravated by the element of force or the threat of force.

- 3a. Armed Robbery—Any weapon—Any object so employed as to constitute force or the threat of force is to be considered a weapon. This includes firearms, knives, clubs, brass knuckles, blackjacks, broken bottles, acid, explosives, etc. Also cases involving possible pretended weapons or when the weapon is not seen by the victim, but the robber claims to have it with him, constitutes armed robbery due to instilling fear.
- 3b. Strong Armed—No weapon—Includes muggings and similar offenses where no weapon is used, but strong arm tactics are employed to deprive the victim of his property. This is limited to hands, fists, feet, etc. As in armed robbery, all attempts are included.
- (4) Assaults—An assault is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do physical injury to another.
- General rule—All assaults will be classified in the following categories, excluding assaults with intent to rob or rape.
- 4a. Gun—All assaults and attempted assaults involving the use of any type of firearms. (Revolvers, automatic pistols, shotguns, zip guns, rifles, pellet guns, etc.)
- 4b. Knife or cutting instrument—All assaults and attempted assaults involving the use of cutting or stabbing objects. (Knife, razor, hatchet, axe, cleaver, scissors, glass, broken bottle, dagger, ice pick, etc.)
- 4c. Other dangerous weapon—All assaults or attempted assaults when any other object or thing is used as a weapon. (Clubs, bricks, pick handles, bottles, explosives, acid, lye, poison, scalding water and cases of attempted drownings, burnings, etc.)
- 4d. Hands, fists, feet, etc.—Atrocious—Assaults which are of an atrocious nature when hands, fists, feet, etc. are used. To be classified as atrocious assault, the attack must result in serious personal injury.
- (5) Breaking and Entering—Unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny.
- General rule—Any unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any dwelling, house, attached structure, public building, shop, office, factory, storehouse, apartment, house trailer, warehouse, mill, barn, other building, ship or railroad car.

Note: For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, breaking, entering and larceny are classified only as breaking and entering, the larceny is excluded. Breaking and entering of a motor vehicle is classified as larceny.

- 5a. Forcible entry—All offenses where force of any kind is used to enter unlawfully a locked structure, with intent to steal or commit a felony. This includes entry by use of a master key, celluloid or other device that leaves no outward mark but is used to open a lock. Concealment inside a building, followed by the breaking out of the structure is also included.
- 5b. Unlawful entry—No force—Any unlawful entry without any evidence of forcible entry.
- 5c. Attempted forcible entry—When determined that forcible entry has been attempted.
- (6) Larceny Theft (Except auto theft)—The unlawful taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership.
- General rule—All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket-picking, purse snatching, shop lifting, larceny from auto, larcenies of auto parts and accessories, theft of bicycles, larcenies from buildings, and from coin operated machines. Any theft that is not a robbery or the result of breaking and entering is included. Embezzlement, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad check cases are excluded.
- (7) Auto theft—The larceny or attempted larceny of a motor vehicle.
- General rule—Thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes all vehicles which can be registered as a motor vehicle in this state. Excludes where there is a lawful access to the vehicle, such as a family situation or unauthorized use by others with lawful access to the vehicle. (Chauffeur, employees, etc.)
- (8) Other assaults—Not atrocious—Assaults and attempted assaults which are not of an atrocious nature and are simple and minor in nature.
- (9) Arson—Willful or malicious burning with intent to defraud. Include attempts.
- (10) Forgery and counterfeiting—Making, altering, uttering, or possessing or attempts to make, alter, utter or possess with intent to defraud. Anything false which is made to appear true.
- (11) Fraud—Fraudulent conversion of another's money or property by false pretenses. Includes bad checks, except forgery and counterfeiting.
- (12) Embezzlement—Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property in trust to one's care, custody or control.
- (13) Stolen Property—Buying, receiving, possessing—Buying, receiving and possessing stolen property and attempts.
- (14) Malicious Mischief—Willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

- (15) Weapon carrying, possessing and etc.— All violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers and attempts.
- (16) Prostitution and Commercialized vice—Sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts. Such as prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes.
- (17) Sex offenses— Except forcible rape, prostitution and commercialized vice— Statutory rape, offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like. Also include attempts.
- (18) Narcotic Drug Law— Offenses relating to narcotic drugs, such as unlawful possession, sale or use. Does not include: Failing to register as user or federal offenses.
- (19) Gambling— Promoting, permitting, or engaging in gambling.
- (20) Offenses against family and children— Non support, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.
- (21) Driving under the influence— Driving or operating any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.
- (22) Liquor Laws— State or local liquor law violations, except “drunkenness” and “driving under the influence.” Excludes federal violations.
- (23) Drunkenness or intoxication.
- (24) Disorderly conduct— Breach of the peace. (Disorderly persons).
- (25) Failure to give good account— Vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.
- (26) All other offenses— All violations of state and local laws except classes 1-25.
- (27) Suspicion— Arrest for no specific offense and released without formal charges being placed.
- (28) Curfew and loitering laws (Juveniles)— Offenses relating to juveniles of local curfew or loitering ordinances, where such laws exist.
- (29) Runaways (Juveniles)— Limited to juveniles taken into protective custody under provisions of local statutes as runaways.

# CRIME FACTORS

Statistics gathered under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program are submitted by the law enforcement agencies of New Jersey and project a statewide view of crime. Awareness of the presence of certain crime factors, which may influence the resulting volume and type of statistics presented, is necessary if fair and equitable conclusions are to be drawn. These crime influencing factors are present, to some degree, in every community and their presence affects, in varying degrees, the crime experience of that community. Attempts at comparison of crime figures between communities should not be made without first considering the individual factors present in each community.

Crime, as an outgrowth of society, remains a social problem of grave concern and the police are limited in their role to its suppression and detection. As stated by the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Criminal Justice in their report *The Challenge of Crime In A Free Society*—(1967—Page 92)—“But the fact that the police deal daily with crime does not mean that they have unlimited power to prevent it, or reduce it, or deter it. The police did not create and cannot resolve the social conditions that stimulate crime. They did not start and cannot stop the convulsive social changes that are taking place in America. They do not enact the laws that they are required to enforce, nor do they dispose of the criminals they arrest. The police are only one part of the criminal justice system; the criminal

justice system is only one part of the government; and the government is only one part of society. Insofar as crime is a social phenomenon, crime prevention is the responsibility of every part of society. The criminal process is limited to case by case operations, one criminal or one crime at a time.” Set forth below are some of the conditions which will, by type and volume, affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part.
- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex and race.
- Economic status and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population, including commuters, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
- Educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Effective strength of the police force.
- Standards governing appointments to the police force.
- Policies of the prosecuting officials and the courts.
- Attitude of the public toward law enforcement problems.
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.

# STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL PROFILES

The presentation of state, county and municipal profiles in this section is offered for the purpose of projecting, for the consideration of the reader, a group of recognizable factors which may affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from community to community. Selection of the areas of information to be related to individual municipalities was based on the immediacy and completeness of data available.

Population statistics presented here and throughout this publication, with respect to the 1971 population estimates and 1970 Census of Population, were obtained from the Division of Planning and Research, Office of Business Economics. Character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications and square miles, were compiled by the Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning.

The Covered Employment for 1971, as supplied by the

Division of Planning and Research, Office of Statistics Reports and Analysis, represents that employment in the community covered by the New Jersey Unemployment Compensation Law as of June, 1971. Excluded generally are those persons who are self employed, agricultural labor and state, county and municipal employees.

Certain other socio-economic factors, present in varying degrees in all communities, may have an influence on resulting crime rates. Obvious difficulties in the identification, documentation and measurement of these factors, however, precluded their application in this report.

Those factors presented were listed to affirm their existence within the county and community and to provide a base for consideration in the evaluation of that community's crime experience. (Table 1)

# PROFILE OF NEW JERSEY

New Jersey is situated between the major industrial markets of New York and Philadelphia and can be classified as the "Crossroads of the East". The geographic location of the state has been a major factor in its growth and development. The many miles of super-expressway facilities within the state connect New Jersey directly with the neighboring states of New York, Pennsylvania and Delaware. Additionally, New Jersey as a corridor state, accommodates large volumes of traffic from both the eastern and western part of the United States.

The state is politically comprised of 21 counties which contain 567 incorporated municipalities. The 1971 estimated population figure of 7,303,000 represents a 20 percent increase since 1960. Nationally, New Jersey, although 46th in size, ranks eighth in population and first as the most densely populated state in the country. In addition to this density of 972 persons per square mile, New Jersey still has many miles of rural area or sparsely settled communities. The areas of density show a heavy concentration around the major urban centers and those areas most accessible for commuting.

A little more than a decade ago many counties were sparsely populated, but due to many growth factors are now contributing to the 20 percent increase in density, 1971 over 1960. Ocean County, the largest increase at

104 percent since 1960; Sussex County 62 percent; Morris County, 53 percent and Burlington County a 50 percent increase.

Within the counties, more dramatic increases occurred in specific municipalities. The trend of this rapid growth in populations of the suburb and rural areas has resulted in the loss of some city populations. Much of the loss has occurred from urban re-development or renewal programs but to a great degree have been absorbed by the outlying suburbs or rural areas. An interesting note is the fact that the shift of the urban population to suburban or rural areas has caused a large number of these municipalities to be reclassified to an urban status.

The 1970 Census Populations, as listed in Table 1, include all corrections thus far made to the official April 1, 1970 Census of Population. The Census of 1970 has brought about many changes in the square miles, density and character of certain municipalities, when compared to the profile data listed in "Crime in New Jersey—1970".

The unique image New Jersey presents for consideration is not only the result of the many and varied factors within its own boundaries, but also the complex elements of the megalopolis of which it is a part.

# **1971 CRIME STATISTICS FOR NEW JERSEY**

## NEW JERSEY CRIME INDEX — 1971

In this section, tabulations presented in tables and charts indicate the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime for the state as a whole, reporting regions, counties, character groups, population groups and individual municipalities. The Crime Index, consisting of seven serious offenses, is used as a measure. Offenses are counted as they become known to law enforcement agencies. Crime classifications used in the index are: murder, forcible rape, robbery, atrocious assault, breaking and entering, larceny (\$50.00 and over) and auto theft.

Although the total number of criminal acts that occur are unknown, those that are reported to police provide the first means of a count. All crimes do not readily come to the attention of police nor are all crimes of sufficient importance to be significant in an index, and further, not all important crimes occur with enough regularity to be meaningful in an index. With these considerations in mind, the above crimes were selected as a group to furnish some measure of the crime problem in New Jersey.

The volume of crime in a state, region, county or municipality is subject to those crime influencing factors set forth elsewhere in this publication. Crime rates are constructed from estimates of current permanent popu-

lation. The important transient population factor, although present in every community in varying degrees, cannot be measured in all instances and therefore is not included in the establishment of a crime rate. The existence of this factor, however, should be considered when reviewing the tabulations presented in this section.

The establishment of the base year New Jersey Crime Index for 1967 provided a foundation which allows year to year comparison of like data to be made. Specific areas of comparison presented in this publication are in respect to variances of offense volumes, rates, clearances and related information. Fluctuations in arrest volumes, rates and supplementary arrest information are also included in the tabulations shown.

### CRIME AND POPULATION

Crime rates relate the incidence of crime to population. More specifically, a crime rate should be considered as a count of victims. The risk of victimization arises from crime-population computations and provides a numerical result for consideration. Crime influencing factors, which are complex in nature and exist in varying degrees in all areas, are not incorporated in the determination of a crime rate.

# STATE OFFENSE DATA

## VOLUME

A total of 224,709 Crime Index offenses were reported to law enforcement agencies of New Jersey during the Calendar Year 1971, a 14 percent increase in crime volume over 1970. When comparing the five year period, 1967 through 1971, a 61 percent increase evolves.

The Crime Index offenses referred to here represent the most common problem to law enforcement and the municipality. They are serious crimes by their nature, volume or frequency of occurrence. Basically, they can be categorized as violent crimes, such as murder, forcible rape, robbery and atrocious assault, or as crimes of a nonviolent nature, such as breaking and entering, larceny \$50 and over in value and auto theft.

The violent crimes as a group, accounted for almost 12 percent of the total Crime Index reported for 1971, and since 1970, rose 28 percent. Murder increased 4 percent, 1971 over 1970, forcible rape rose 14 percent, robbery up 32 percent and atrocious assault up 25 percent.

The nonviolent or property type group recorded a 13 percent increase since 1970. This group represents 88 percent of the Crime Index total. Each of the nonviolent crimes also recorded an increase, 1971 over 1970, with breaking and entering up 19 percent, larceny \$50 and over in value rose 9 percent and auto theft up 6 percent.

A review of the distribution of offenses within the Index discloses that breaking and entering accounted for 39 percent of the total 1971 Index, and 45 percent of all nonviolent crime. Within the violent crime group, robbery recorded the highest at 61 percent, and also represented 7 percent of the total Crime Index.

## RATE

Crime rates relate the incidence of crime to the resident population. It is a fact that the risk of becoming a victim of crime in New Jersey is increasing and that the growth in the population alone cannot account for these increases. Other factors which may contribute to the volume and type of crime in a given jurisdiction are not incorporated here, but are shown in the profile section of this publication.

In 1971 the crime rate was established at 3,076.9 victims for every 100,000 permanent inhabitants. This represents a 12 percent increase over 1970 and a 56 percent increase since 1967.

The 1971 rate for the violent crime group was established at 362 victims for every 100,000 inhabitants, a 26 percent increase since 1970. Within the violent group, robbery again recorded the greatest involvement of victims, 220 for every 100,000 residents. The nonviolent crime rate rose 10 percent over 1970, and resulted in a property crime rate of 2,714.9 per 100,000 inhabitants. Breaking and entering contributed the most victims to the overall crime rate, 1,213.7 per 100,000.

## CLEARANCES

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a crime is cleared when police have identified the offender, have evidence to charge him and actually take him into custody. Solutions of crimes are also recorded in exceptional instances when some element beyond police control precludes formal charges against the offender, such as the victims refusal to prosecute or local prosecution is declined because the subject is being prosecuted elsewhere for a crime committed in another jurisdiction. The arrest of one person can clear several crimes or several persons may be arrested in the process of solving one crime.

The police of New Jersey cleared by arrest, 13.6 percent of all Index offenses reported to them in 1971. This solution rate remains the same as reported in 1970. The violent crime group recorded a 40 percent solution rate, while the nonviolent or property group revealed a 10 percent solution rate.

Considering individually the 1971 violent crime solution rate, it was determined that police were successful in solving 76 percent of the murders; 57 percent of the rapes; 22 percent of the robberies and 68 percent of the atrocious assaults. The nonviolent crime solution rate was as follows: Breaking and entering 12 percent; larceny \$50 and over, 9 percent and auto theft, 7 percent.

The relatively high clearance rate for violent crimes as compared to nonviolent crimes is in part attributable to the volume difference between the two. Nonviolent crime volume is much greater than that of violent crime and police investigation of violent crime is usually more intense. The element of confrontation between victim and perpetrator, as well as witness identification of the perpetrator, also contributes to this higher rate of solution.

## JUVENILE CLEARANCES

A means of measuring the degree of criminal involvement for those of the young age group is to identify the number of crimes in which they are the offenders. In 1971, almost 33 percent of all Crime Index offenses solved in New Jersey involved persons under 18 years of age, a 10 percent decrease over 1970. This decrease in juvenile involvement with Index offenses has been consistent since 1969.

Violent crime solutions involved juveniles in 17 percent of the cases, no change when compared to 1970. Nonviolent crime solutions involved juveniles in 41 percent of the instances. This rate of juvenile involvement reflects a 9 percent decrease over 1970.

The juvenile involvement in Index offenses, during the Calendar Year 1971, reflected the following solution rates: Murder 5 percent; rape, 14 percent; robbery, 25 percent; atrocious assault, 13 percent; larcenies \$50 and over, 30 percent and auto theft, 58 percent.

## **STOLEN PROPERTY VALUE**

The total value of property stolen in 1971 was reported at \$104 million, a 5 percent increase over 1970 figures. This dollar value represents the proceeds of all robberies, breaking and enterings, larcenies and auto thefts reported by New Jersey police during 1971. Auto

thefts reported during the year accounted for 42 percent of the total value of property stolen in 1971. Police recoveries reduced this loss by 34 percent, but the remaining unrecovered portion represents a loss of \$69 million to the victims.

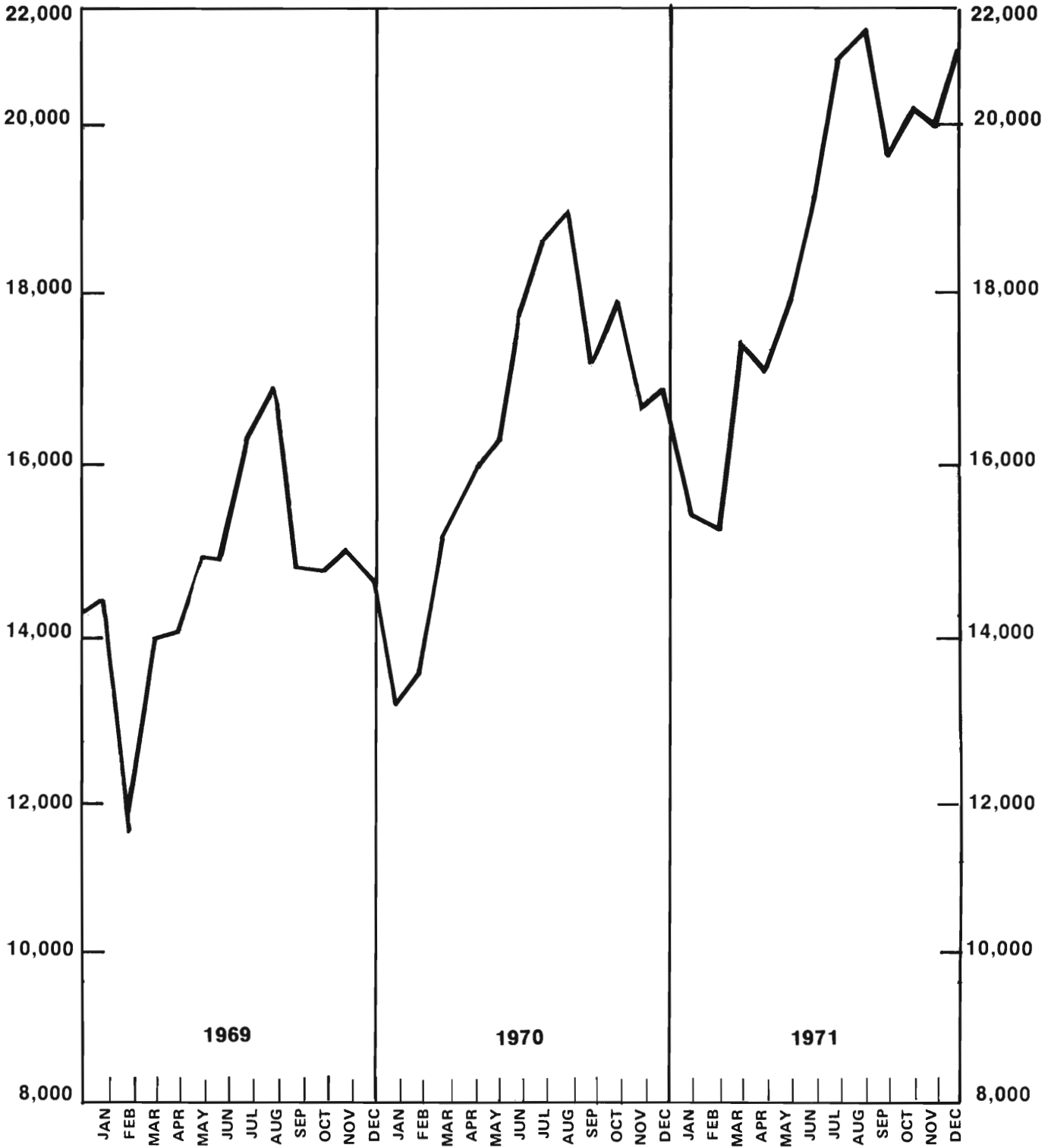

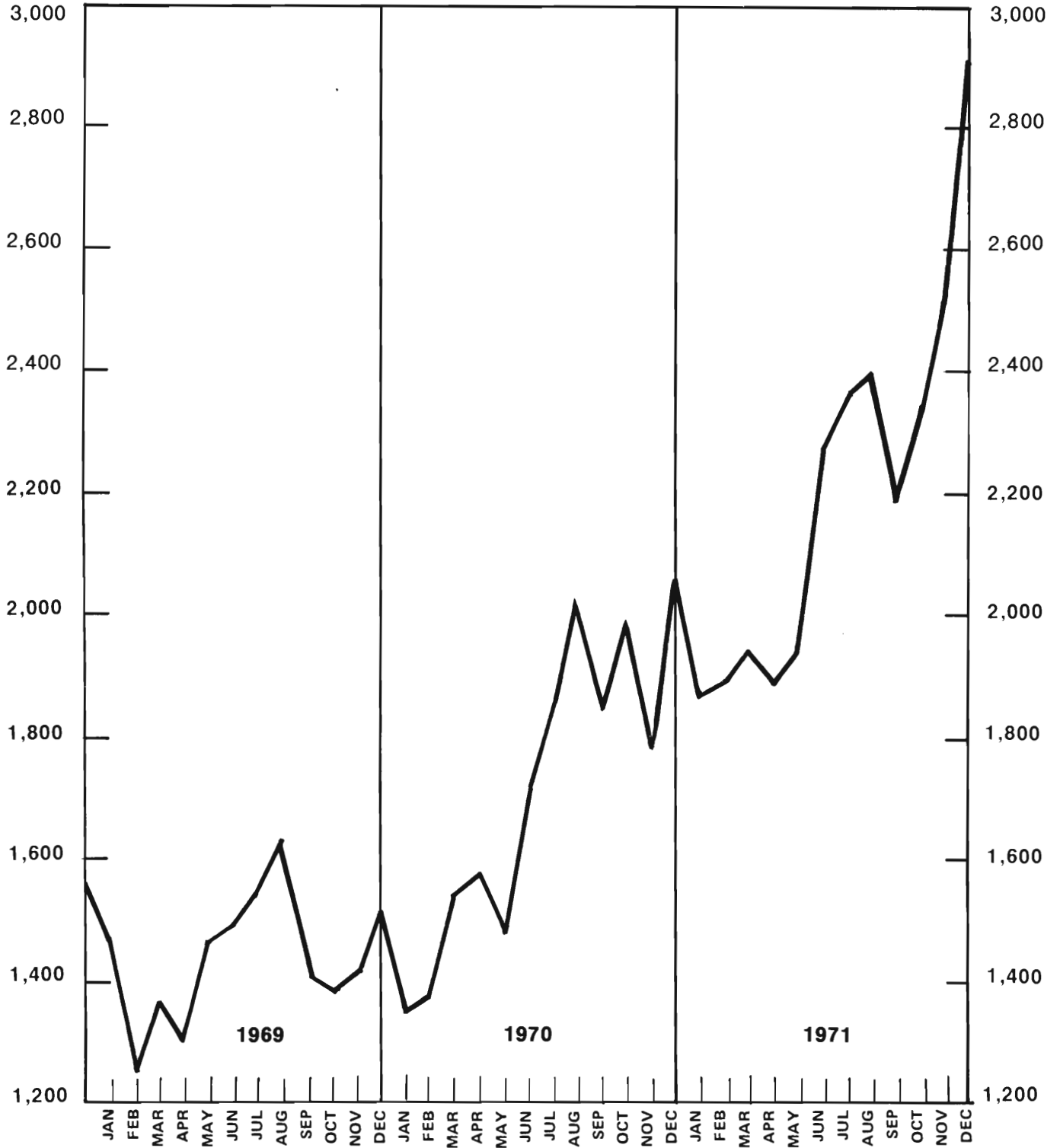

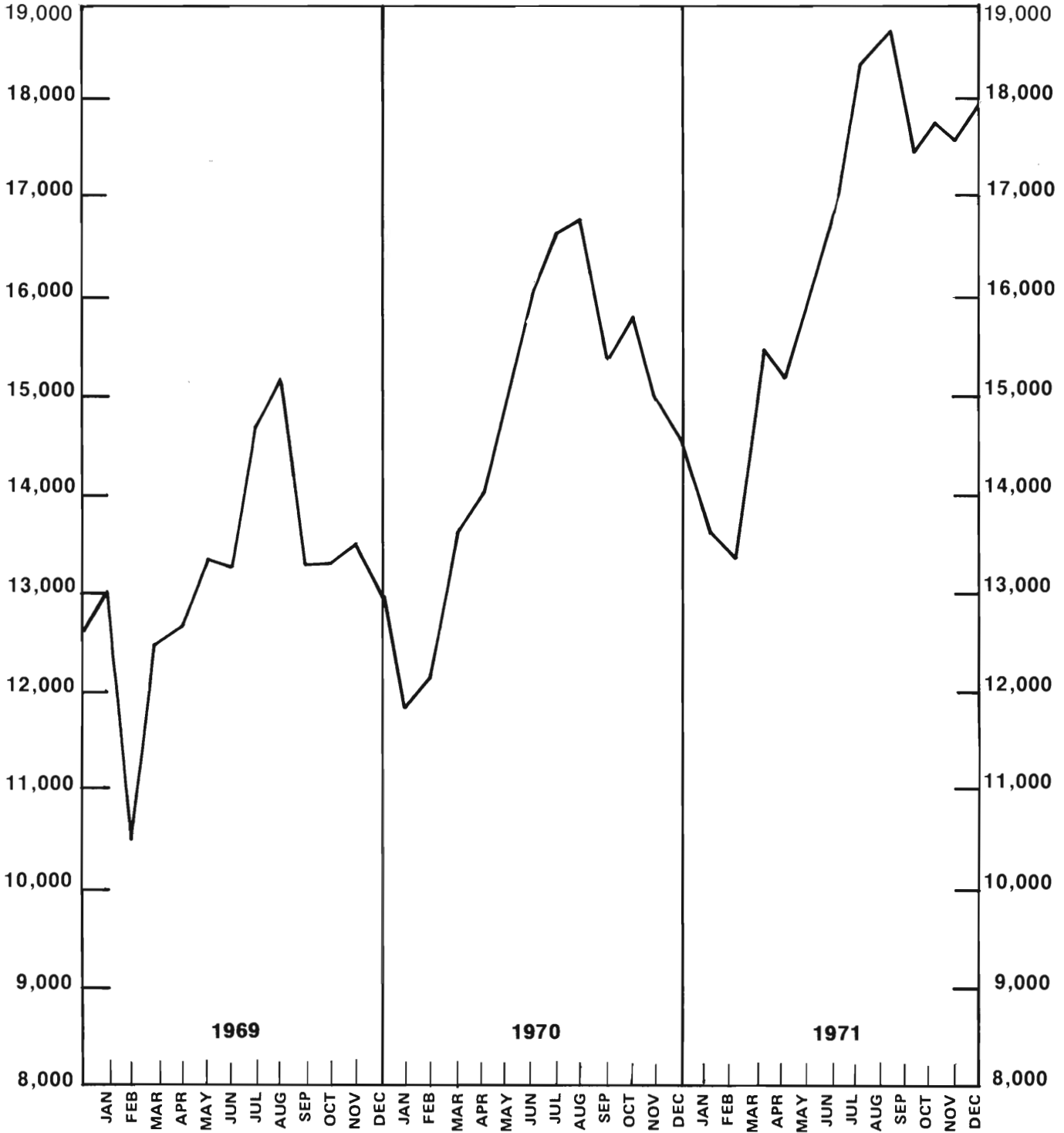

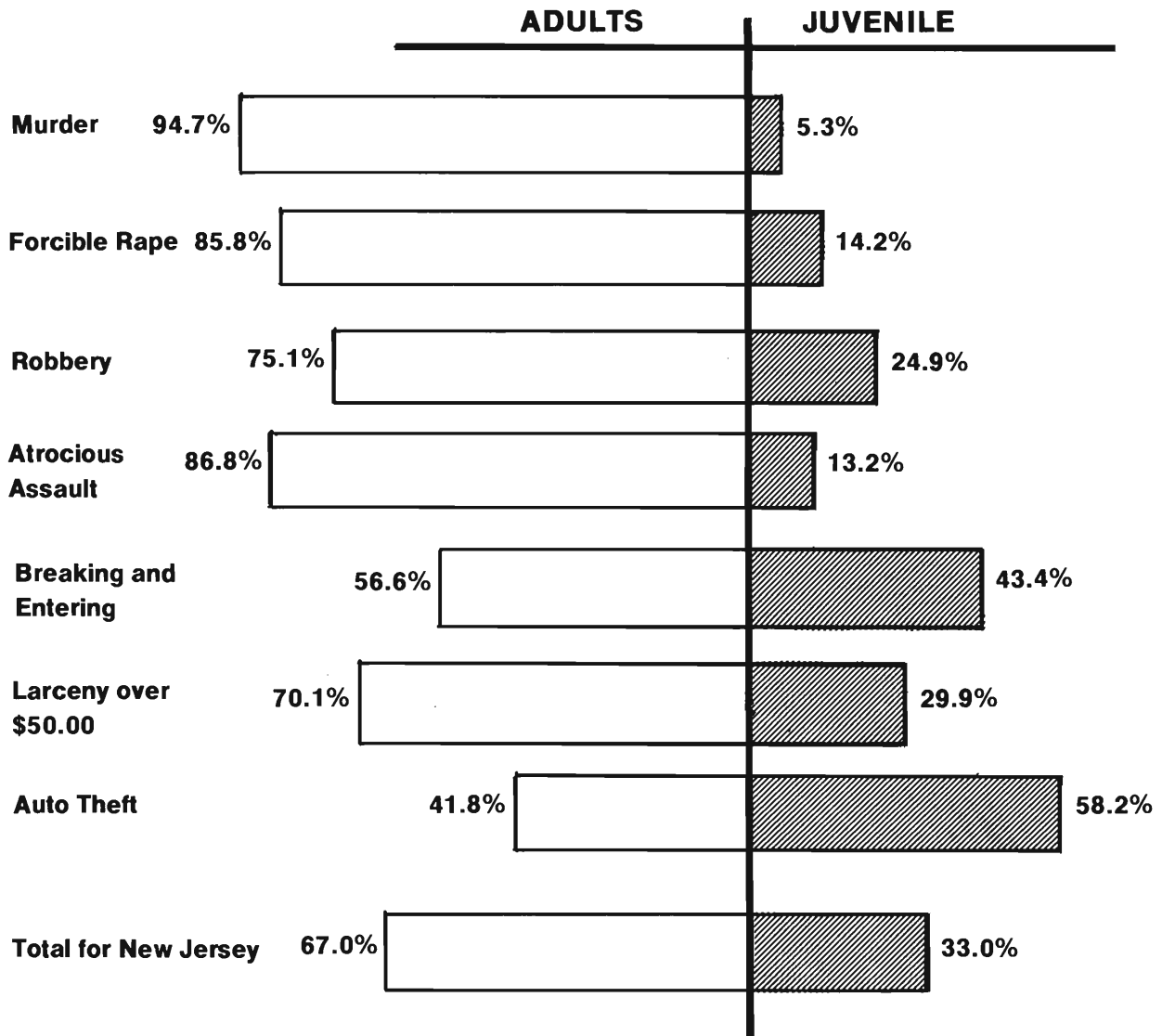
**VIOLENT CRIME

## MURDER

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault or commission of a crime is included. This Index offense is scored by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court or jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Traffic deaths, caused by the negligence of someone other than the victim, are not included here, but are counted under manslaughter. Attempts to kill and assaults to kill are scored as atrocious assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are also excluded.

### VOLUME AND RATE

Murder volumes reached a total of 422 reported cases during 1971, a 4 percent increase over 1970 counts. Murder accounted for two-tenths of one percent of all Index offenses reported in 1971, and has been the same since 1967. In 1971, there were 5.8 victims per 100,000 inhabitants, a 2 percent increase when compared to 1970.

### MURDER ANALYSIS

In all cases of murder reported under the System, a supplementary report is submitted by the reporting law enforcement agency. Pertinent information including age, sex and race of the victim, weapon used to commit the offense, and circumstances or motive which led to the crime, is among the data collected. Place of occurrence, relationship of victim to perpetrator, and day of week are also included.

The supplementary data used in the analysis of reported murders is limited to the "known" facts of the case. It is understandable that unsolved murders, in most cases, prevent complete data availability for murder analysis.

The frequency of murder during 1971 was highest in the month of December when 50 murders occurred. The months of February and July were second with 41 occurrences each. Murder by day of the week disclosed Saturday to be the highest day, at 82 murders, and Sunday next with 80 murders occurring that day. This two day period accounted for 38 percent of all murders reported for 1971.

In 1971, almost 79 percent of the murder victims were male, no change over 1970. Victim analysis by race disclosed that 56 percent were Negro and 44 percent were White. Analysis by age revealed that the 20-29 age group contained 28 percent of the total murder victims.

In the area of "known" perpetrators, the adult male-female ratio of involvement disclosed that adult males were identified as the perpetrators in 81 percent of all the murders solved, and adult females in 15 percent of the murders. The remaining solved murder cases were perpetrated by juvenile males and females, 3 percent and 1 percent respectively.

In 1971, firearms were used in 48 percent of the murders reported in which the weapon was identified. Within the firearm category, handguns were the most predominant weapon used, a 90 percent involvement, and also represented 43 percent of all weapons used in

1971 murders. Cutting or stabbing weapons represented a 30 percent involvement in murders. Personal weapons such as hands, fists and feet were used in 10 percent of the cases, and the remaining 12 percent being attributed to the use of other weapons, including blunt objects, such as clubs and hammers, poison, arson, etc.

Analysis of murder by location disclosed that 42 percent of the murders occurred in private residences. Although this location is the predominant one for murder offenses, it has been decreasing since 1969. In many cases police are powerless to prevent this type of murder, which is made apparent by the type of circumstances or motive involved. Most murders, 74 percent, were committed by relatives or other persons acquainted with the victim. Further analysis revealed that 27 percent of the murders were perpetrated by a member of the immediate family group, and more specifically 16 percent of the murders involved spouse killing spouse.

The circumstances or motives for committing murder were derived from cases where this type of information is "known" and made available for analysis. "Felony" murders are defined under the program as those killings which are perpetrated during the commission of another crime, they are classified as robberies, sex crimes, gangland slayings, arson and other felonious activities. This type of circumstance or motive accounted for 35 percent of the murders where the motive was known. Within this "felony" group, robbery accounted for 59 percent of the murders, and 20 percent of all known murder circumstances. The involvement of robbery as a motive for murder has been steadily increasing since 1967.

Altercations or quarrels between the victim and perpetrator, including lovers quarrels, money quarrels, drinking quarrels, etc., accounted for 58 percent of all known murder circumstances reported in 1971.

### CLEARANCES

The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing or solving 76 percent of the murders committed in 1971. When compared to 1967 this represents a 5 percent increase. This high solution rate, as compared to other Index offenses, becomes evident when the circumstances of this heinous type crime are considered, and this high clearance rate is shared by police universally.

Those murders solved by arrest of persons under 18 years of age amounted to 5 percent of all the cases solved. This degree of juvenile involvement reflects a downward trend when compared to 1970.

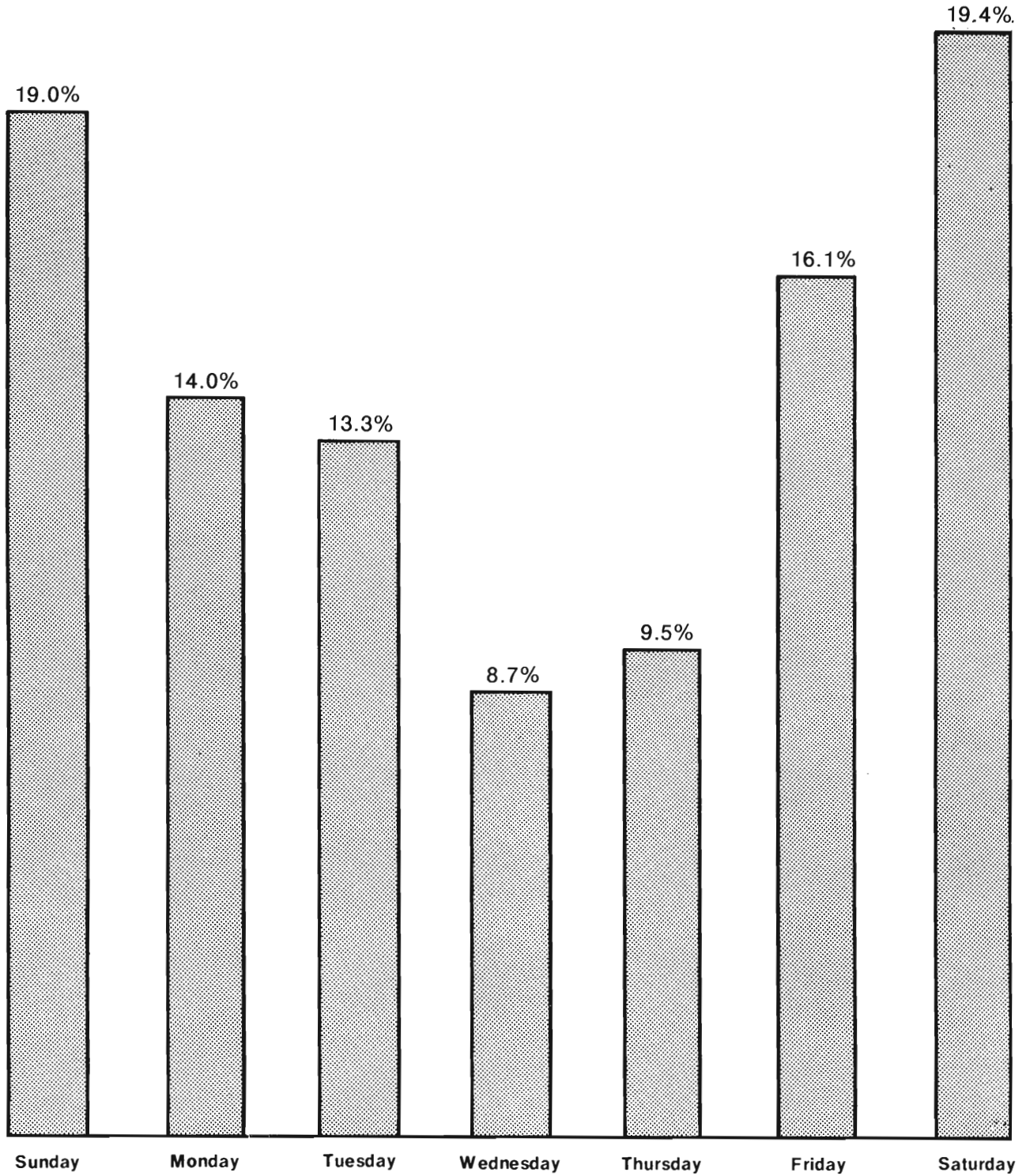
## FORCIBLE RAPE

Forcible Rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted, but carnal abuse, rape without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

### VOLUME AND RATE

The police of New Jersey received reports of 1,054 rapes during 1971, numerically the volume increased by

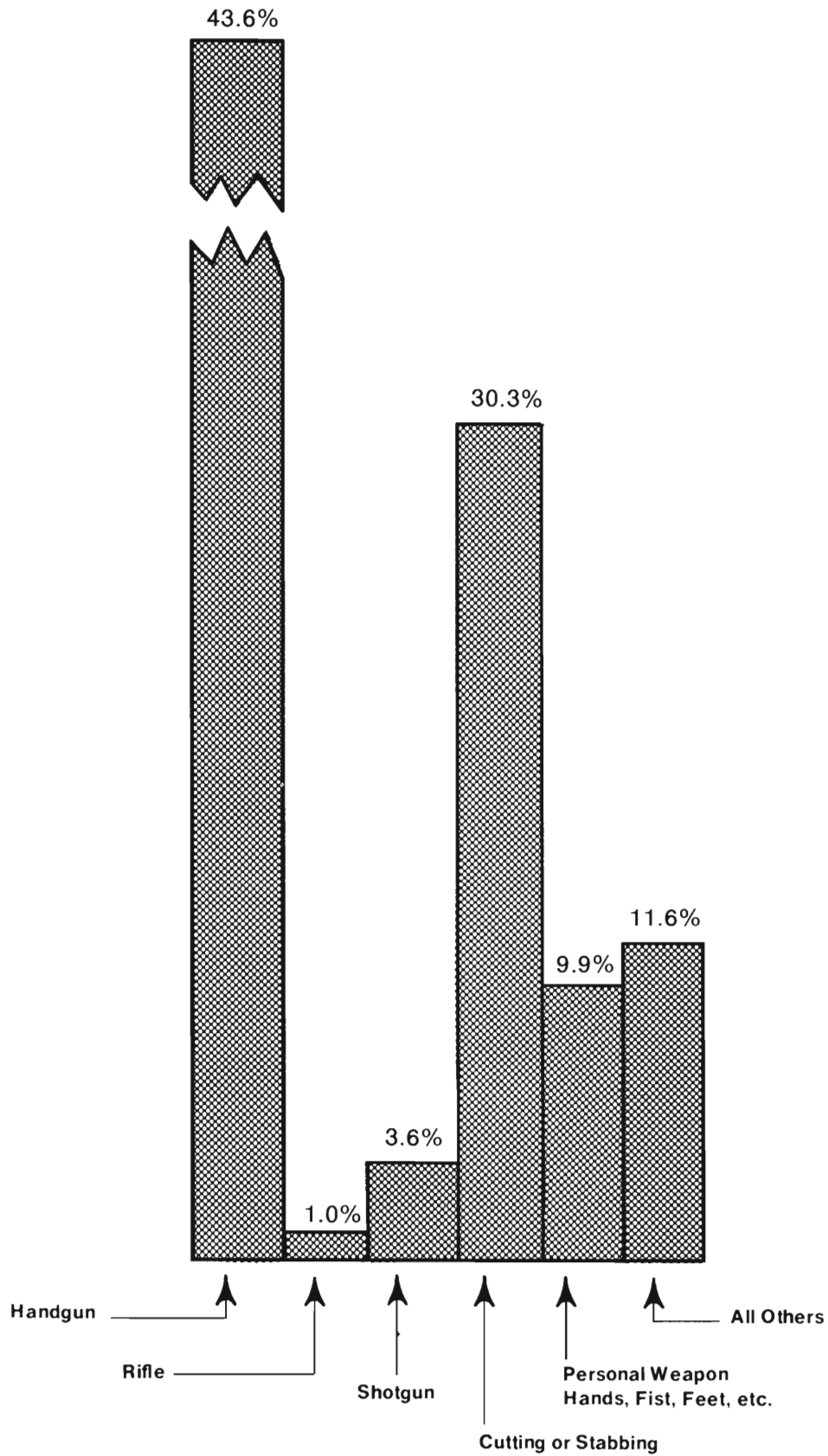
# MURDER BY DAY OF WEEK, 1971

126 over 1970. This volume increase reflects a 14 percent increase when compared to 1970. The trend for reported rapes has been increasing since 1967, reflecting a 53 percent increase since that time. Rape accounted for 4 percent of all violent crime counts and one half of one percent of the total Crime Index. The latter statistic has remained constant since 1967.

A crime rate equates the number of crimes per unit of population, and in its proper perspective, is a victim risk rate. In 1971, 14 out of every 100,000 persons in this state were reported forcible rape victims. The availability of the 1970 census population data allows for the calculation of a forcible rape rate based on female population alone. For every 100,000 females in New Jersey, 28 were victims of this violent crime.

### **ANALYSIS OF RAPE**

The highest incidence of rape during the year was recorded for the month of June, with August recording the second highest monthly volume.

Forcible rapes accounted for 72 percent of the total rape offenses reported, while the remaining 28 percent were attempts or assaults to rape. The victims of this violent crime, in many cases, are hesitant in reporting the offense to police due to the fear and/or embarrassment of the victims when the possibility of a court appearance confronts them, or the effect it may have on their reputation when the facts become known. Additionally, there is difficulty in establishing the act of force when there is the presence of a prior relationship between victim and perpetrator. Due to the usual clandestine nature of this offense, it occurs most often out of reach of police patrols. The offense of forcible rape, because of the above factors, is probably the most under-reported crime within the Crime Index. However, crime counts in this publication must be limited to the actual offenses established by police investigation.

### **CLEARANCES**

During 1971, 57 percent of all forcible rapes reported were solved. A 3 percent decrease was noted when compared to 1970. Persons under 18 years of age accounted for 14 percent of all rape cases solved, a slight increase when compared to 1970.

## **ROBBERY**

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included. Robberies are reported in two general categories — armed, when any object is used as a weapon; and strong arm, which includes muggings and similar offenses where no weapon is used, but where strong arm tactics are employed.

### **VOLUME AND RATE**

During the calendar year 1971, there were a total of

16,069 robberies reported by the police of the state. When compared to the 12,147 offenses reported in 1970, this figure represents an increase of 32 percent, the highest individual offense increase within the Crime Index. These reported robberies for 1971, make up over 7 percent of the total Crime Index for New Jersey and 61 percent of all violent crimes as a group.

The rate of robbery in 1971 increased 30 percent over 1970, with 220 victims for every 100,000 persons in the state.

### **ANALYSIS OF ROBBERY**

Supplementary information, which reveals the nature of robbery, is collected under the Program in order to gain further insight regarding this violent crime. Identification of the most frequent "targets" for robbery is accomplished by classification of the type of location where the crime was perpetrated and whether or not the offender was armed.

The armed robber was responsible for 57 percent of all robberies committed during 1971, with the remaining percentage of offenses attributed to the unarmed confrontation of the victim by the perpetrator where tactics such as mugging were employed.

As in the past 4 years, the quarterly period of October through December reflected the greatest frequency of robbery. The highest individual monthly volume was recorded in December, with the month of October second.

Street robberies accounted for 62 percent of all robbery offenses reported during 1971. Robberies of business establishments (commercial houses) was second, a 13 percent involvement. Since 1967, the largest trend increases have been highway or street robberies, up 210 percent, with residence robberies up 190 percent, and third, chain store robberies up 181 percent.

The total value of property loss resulting from robberies reported during 1971 amounted to \$5.7 million, averaging out to a loss of \$357 per victim. Street or highway robberies reflected the highest category for total property value, a loss of \$2.5 million. Bank robberies, the lowest rate of incidence, reflected the highest average loss, \$8,410.

The impact of this violent crime on the victim cannot be measured in terms of money or property value alone, as it has been pointed out in the murder section of this publication, robbery was the motive for 20 percent of all murders committed in 1971. Numerically, the trend concerned with this increasing involvement reveals the seriousness of the problem when you compare the 7 persons murdered in 1967, to the 70 persons murdered in 1971 as a result of the robbery motive.

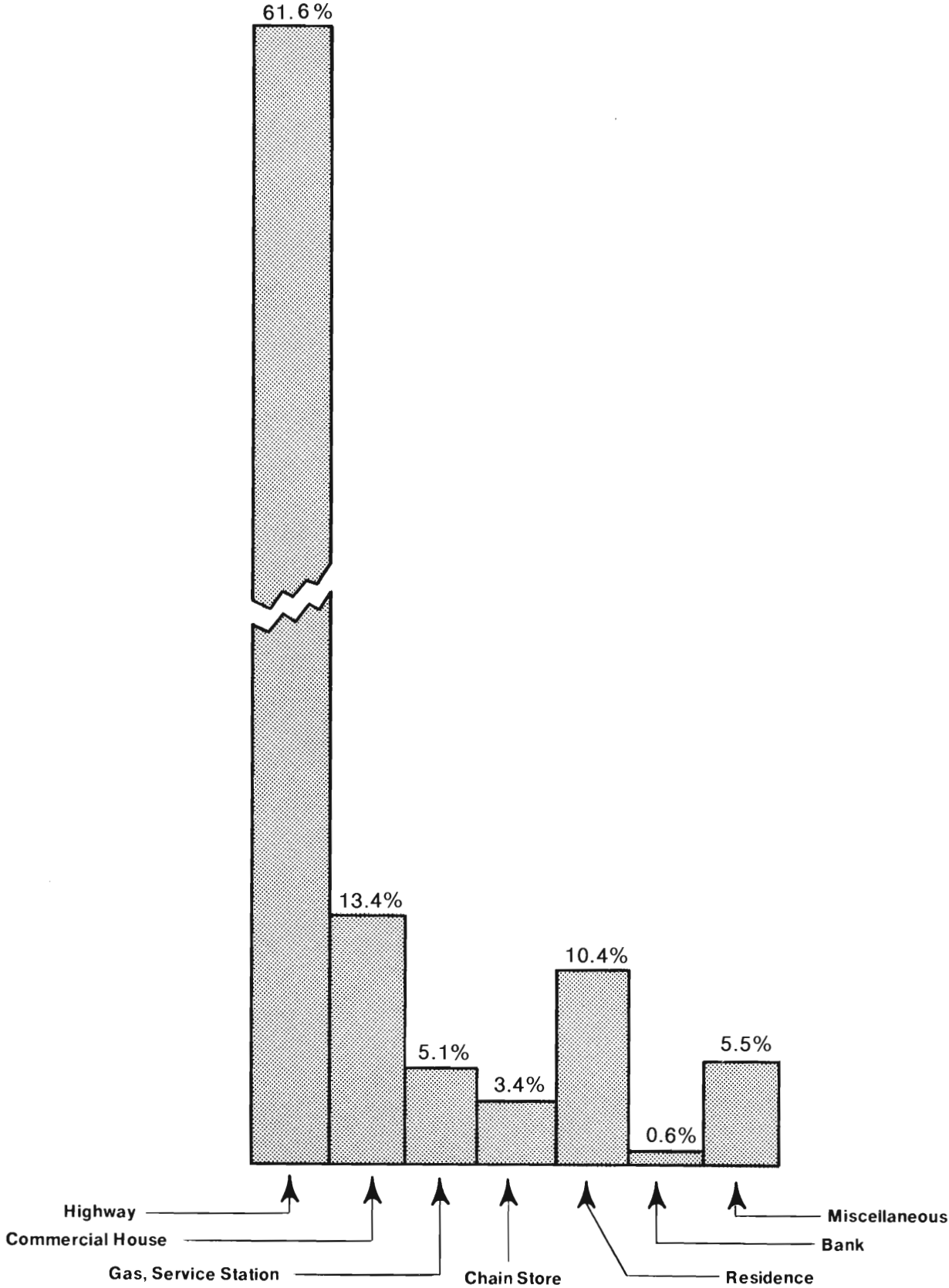
### **CLEARANCES**

The law enforcement agencies of New Jersey were successful in solving 21 percent of all robbery offenses reported to them in 1971, a slight increase over 1970. Persons under 18 years of age accounted for 25 percent of all the solved robbery cases, a decrease in juvenile involvement prevails when compared to 1970.

## ATROCIOUS ASSAULT

Atrocious Assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do serious physical injury to another. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that any injury result when a gun, knife or other weapon is used, which would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.

### VOLUME AND RATE

A total of 8,892 atrocious assaults were reported to the police of the state in 1971, a 25 percent increase when compared to 1970. This crime against the person made up 4 percent of the Crime Index, no change over 1970. The month of June was the high month for reported atrocious assaults, second was the month of December.

In 1971, 122 persons out of every 100,000 in New Jersey were victims of atrocious assaults. This figure represents an increase of 23 percent in the rate of victimization when compared to 1970.

### WEAPON ANALYSIS IN ATROCIOUS ASSAULT

The use or attempted use of a dangerous weapon in an assault, or the serious injury inflicted by hands, fists or feet separates this index offense from those assaults categorized as "simple" and not atrocious in nature. The victim of an actual assault of this type may suffer serious injury or permanent disability and all assaults to kill and attempts to kill are recorded in this area.

Knives or other cutting instruments were determined to be the most frequently used weapons involved in atrocious assaults during 1971. These weapons accounted for 35 percent of the total atrocious assaults reported. Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet accounted for 23 percent of all atrocious assaults, and blunt objects or other dangerous types of weapons, a 23 percent involvement. Firearms were used as a weapon in 19 percent of all atrocious assaults reported in 1971.

### CLEARANCES

Solutions for atrocious assaults were made in 68 percent of all cases reported in 1971, no significant change when compared to 1970. This relatively high clearance rate follows that of other crimes against the person. Offenses solved by the arrest of persons under 18 years of age accounted for 13 percent of the total cases solved, with the remaining 87 percent involving adults over 18 years of age. This increased juvenile involvement in atrocious assaults discloses an 18 percent increase since 1970.

## BREAKING AND ENTERING

Under this program, breaking and entering is defined as an unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny.

Data collection for this offense is further categorized as to forcible entries, unlawful entries (where no force is used) and attempted forcible entries.

### VOLUME AND RATE

A total of 88,638 breaking and enterings were reported by New Jersey law enforcement agencies during 1971. This offense still remains the most voluminous within the Crime Index, as it contributes 39 percent to the overall offense counts for the year. A 17 percent volume increase over 1970 was noted, and marks the largest annual increase since the program began in 1967. As a part of the nonviolent group, this offense contributed 45 percent to that group's total.

The 1971 crime rate for breaking and entering was 1,214 victims for each 100,000 inhabitants of the state. This victim rate increased 17 percent over 1970, and still remains the highest within the Crime Index.

### ANALYSIS OF BREAKING AND ENTERING

The summer period, June through August, reflected the highest period of offense frequency, with June recording the individual monthly high, and December closely behind.

Forcible entry was evident in 82 percent of all breaking and enterings reported during 1971, while 10 percent were cases of unlawful entry where no force was used, and the remaining 8 percent were attempts to forcibly enter.

In 58 out of every 100 offenses, a residence was the target of the perpetrator, the remaining 42 percent being targets of a nonresidential nature. Daytime breaking and enterings accounted for 57 percent of the "resident" crimes reported, where the time of occurrence could be determined. It was also determined that 89 percent of the nonresidential offenses occurred at night when business volume is at a low.

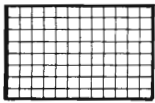
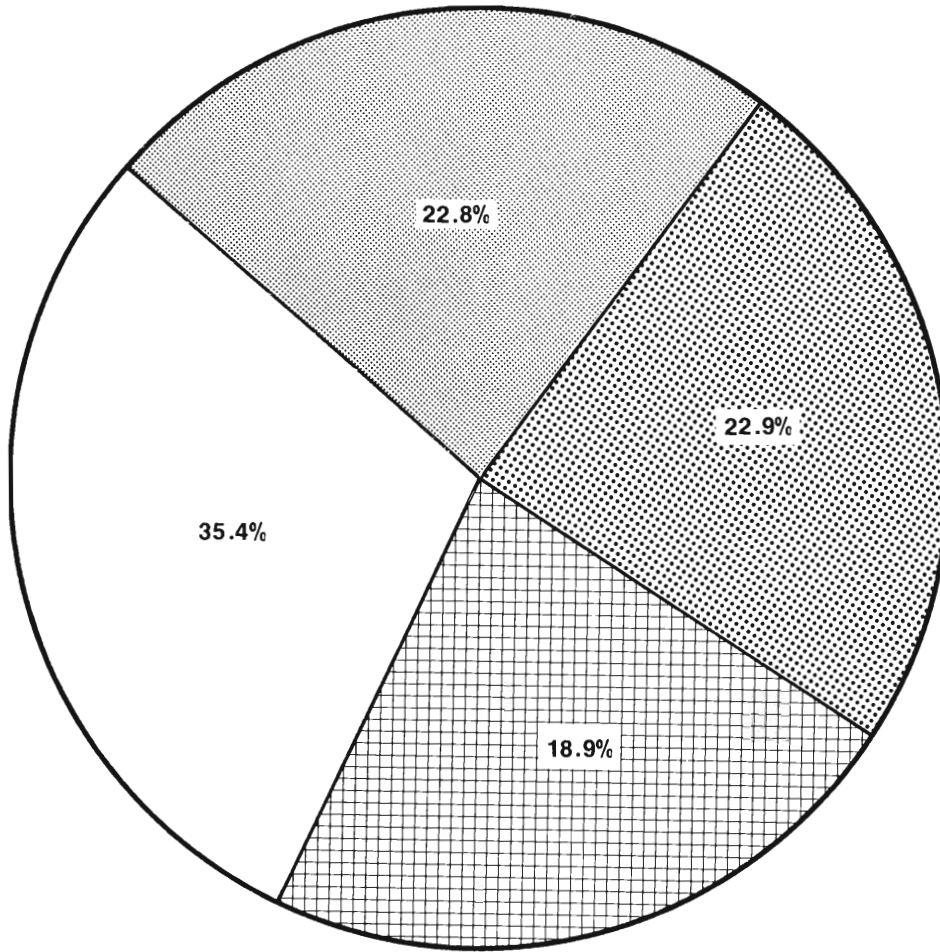
During the year 1971, victims of breaking and enterings suffered an economic loss of almost \$35 million, with an average dollar loss of \$393 per offense. Breaking and enterings of residences accounted for \$21 million, with the remaining \$14 million loss attributed to nonresidences or commercial targets.

### CLEARANCES

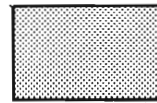
The volume of this offense presents the police with a serious enforcement problem which is made more difficult in some jurisdictions by the lack of sufficient personnel to act as a deterrent, or even to properly investigate and thus provide successful solutions to these crimes.

The police of New Jersey were successful in solving 12 percent of all breaking and entering offenses reported during 1971, a decrease when compared to 1970. Juveniles were involved in 43 percent of all such case solutions, also a decrease over 1970.

1971**



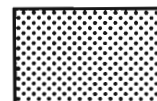
**Gun**

## LARCENY-THEFT

The definition of larceny-theft, as provided under this program, is the taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket-picking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from autos, thefts of auto parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad check cases are not included.

The Crime Index offense of larceny includes only those thefts where the value of the goods stolen is \$50 or more, therefore, the volume and rate considered here does not include larcenies less than \$50.

### VOLUME AND RATE

There were 67,289 larceny \$50 and over offenses reported during the year 1971. This amount represents a 9 percent increase over 1970, and is second only to breaking and entering as the most voluminous offense within the 1971 Crime Index. This offense made up 30 percent of the total Crime Index, a decrease when compared to 1970.

The larceny crime rate for 1971 rose to 921 offenses per 100,000 population, a percentage increase in rate of 7 percent over 1970. Since 1967 there has been an 82 percent increase in the rate of larcenies \$50 and over.

### ANALYSIS OF LARCENY-THEFT

As in the last four years, offense frequencies were highest in the summer months of June, July and August, with August the individual high month.

The following analyses considers all larcenies, regardless as to the value. All types of larcenies identified in this section will differ in volume, depending upon the opportunity for theft offered in a given area.

As previously mentioned, the dollar value placed on property stolen in thefts determines whether or not a larceny becomes a Crime Index offense. The rising cost of living and the increased demand for more expensive commodities does influence the larceny \$50 and over trend. This dollar valuation has been the subject of discussion by the committee on Uniform Crime Records of the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

Fixing a new dollar valuation does not seem to solve the problem, for in a few years the economic conditions may again change.

The identification of larceny by type, without relation to dollar loss, suggests a more realistic approach toward establishing the crime experience in this category. For example: "street larceny", which includes pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from auto, automobile accessories, thefts from coin-operated machines and "all other" larceny, disclosed a 4 percent increase as a group, over 1970. These "street thefts" generally occur within reach of police patrols, and this type of analysis enables the proper deployment of patrols as a deterring factor.

In addition, larcenies from autos and auto parts and accessories, as a group, represented 37 percent of the total larcenies reported in 1971. When auto theft is added to this "auto" group, it is noted that at least 32 percent of all offenses within the Crime Index involved motor vehicles.

When considering individual "types of larceny, thefts of auto parts and accessories represented 19 percent of the larcenies reported in 1971. Theft from autos, which is usually from inside the vehicle, and thefts from buildings recorded identical involvements at 18 percent.

Victims of larcenies suffered a total dollar loss of over \$22 million. The average value of goods and property stolen from these victims was \$171.

Larceny from autos accounted for \$7 million, representing a \$293 average loss to each victim.

### CLEARANCES

Larceny offenses solved by police are affected by the nature of the crime. The lack of witnesses and the volume of these crimes which are sometimes described as "sneak thievery" or "unobserved thefts", add to the difficulties encountered by law enforcement.

In 1971, only 9 percent of the larcenies \$50 and over reported to police were solved, a slight decrease in the solution rate over 1970. Those larceny offenses cleared by the arrest of persons under 18 years of age accounted for 30 percent of the total cases cleared, a significant decrease in juvenile involvement when compared to 1970.

## AUTO THEFT

In Uniform Crime Reporting, auto theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes all vehicles which can be registered as a motor vehicle in this state. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as a family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle.

### VOLUME AND RATE

In 1971, a total of 42,345 motor vehicles were reported stolen to the police of New Jersey, compared to the 39,943 thefts in 1970. The numerical increase of 2,402 offenses represents an annual rise of 6 percent. Auto theft makes up 19 percent of the total Index offenses and 21 percent of the nonviolent group.

The rate for auto theft in 1971 rose substantially from 557 in 1970 to 580 victims per 100,000 population. This rate increase is up 4 percent over 1970.

### ANALYSIS OF AUTO THEFT

The crime of auto theft has been documented primarily as a crime of opportunity. In most cases, it's the youthful offender who finds the automobile easily accessible for his immediate transportation needs and usually the vehicle is ready to drive away or the ignition is easily compromised. A prior study conducted under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, disclosed that in 2,352 auto theft cases studied during the month of August 1969, 46 percent of the vehicles were left unlocked, and 17 percent of all the victims left the keys in the vehicle.

The last quarter of the year, October, November and December accounted for the highest quarterly volume during the year 1971, with December registering the individual monthly high.

In 1971, stolen auto values exceeded \$44 million and represented 42 percent of the value of all property stolen during the year. The average value of a stolen auto was \$1,046 at the time of theft, and although police recovered 65 percent of the value of all stolen autos, the remaining unrecovered portion represents a loss of almost \$16 million to the victims. The unrecovered auto value has been steadily increasing since the \$7 million reported in 1967. This loss figure does not take into account the monetary loss resulting from damage to the

vehicles, property and persons which are a direct result of auto theft crimes.

As previously mentioned, the analysis of auto theft alone does not completely measure the special problem caused by the availability of the auto as a target for larceny of auto parts and accessories and larcenies from autos (from inside the vehicle). New Jersey, although 46th in physical size, is ranked about 8th nationally in total motor vehicle registration, add to this the hundreds of thousands of motor vehicles which annually enter New Jersey from other states, then a true picture of motor vehicle volumes in the state emerges. During 1971, a total of 91,147 offenses involving motor vehicles were reported to police, this represented a loss of almost \$54 million to the victims.

### CLEARANCES

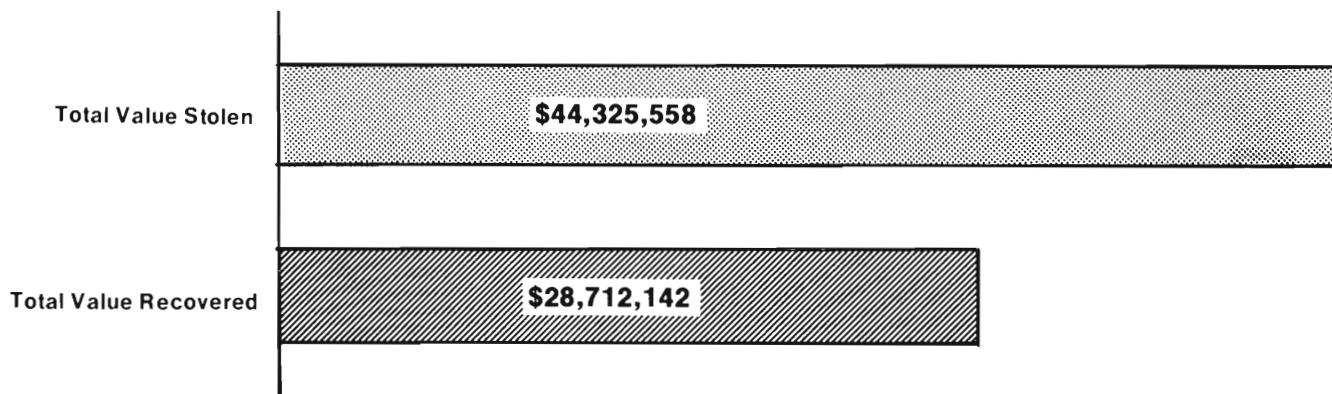
Law enforcement agencies of New Jersey were successful in solving only 7 percent of all auto thefts reported to them during the year. This solution rate, the lowest of all Index offenses, reveals a 7 percent decrease over 1970.

Many factors contribute to this low 7 percent solution or clearance rate. One is the high degree of mobility present in this offense, which is pointed out by the fact that 35 percent of the recovered vehicles were located in other jurisdictions. Another is the carelessness of the vehicle operator, when the perpetrator merely opens the door of a vehicle, with the keys already in the ignition, and drives it away. To a potential witness, this appears to be a normal act, thereby adding to the difficulties encountered in police detection and apprehension.

The involvement of the young age group in police solution of auto theft is greater than for any other Index crime. In 1971, slightly over 58 percent of the auto theft cases cleared involved a person under the age of 18. This degree of juvenile involvement has been consistent since 1967, with the exception of 1970.

The recovery of a vehicle does not clear or solve the offense, but the owner does benefit by the return of his vehicle. In 1971, almost 73 percent of the vehicles stolen were recovered by police. This relatively high rate of recovery can be attributed to the fact that most vehicles are stolen for the purpose of transportation. However, in following the trend over the past five years, it was noted that the percentage of vehicles being recovered has diminished considerably from the 83 percent recovery rate reported in 1967.

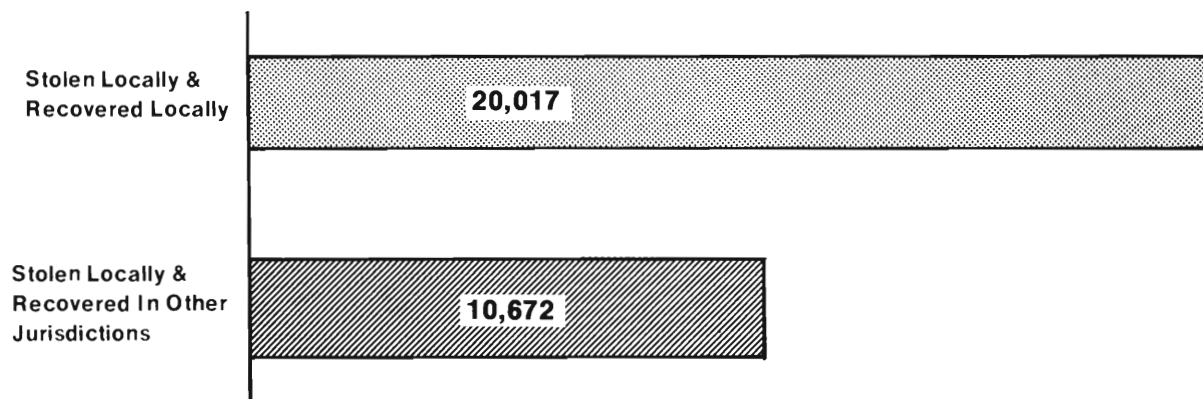
### AUTO THEFT VALUE 1971

# STATE ARREST DATA

## STATE ARREST DATA

Under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, an arrest is counted each time a person is taken into custody, notified or cited. The number of charges placed against a person at the time of the arrest is not considered in the count. The same person may be arrested several times during the year for similar offenses, as in cases of drunkenness or other disorderly conduct charges, and is counted each time he is arrested.

Arrest practices and emphasis do vary from place to place and within a municipality from time to time. For example, the volume of police arrests for certain unlawful conduct such as drunkenness or loitering violations is particularly influenced by this irregularity in arrest practices. On the other hand, murder, robbery and other arrests for serious crimes are more likely the result of standard procedures. In either case, arrests are used as a measure of law enforcement activity, and within certain limitations it can gauge criminality.

When a person under 18 years of age commits an offense and the circumstances are such that if the offender were an adult an arrest would be made, then the arrest is counted. It must be remembered that arrest counts do not reflect the specific number of persons arrested since one person may be arrested several times during the year.

### PERSONS ARRESTED

In the year 1971, law enforcement officers of the state reported a total of 270,362 arrests for all criminal acts. When related to 1971 population estimates for New Jersey, there were 37 arrests for every 1,000 persons, up from the 35 per 1,000 rate of 1970.

Those persons arrested for serious Crime Index offenses during the year, made up 19 percent of the total arrest figure, with the arrest of persons under 18 years of age accounting for 46 percent of the arrests of this type. Juvenile arrest involvement was, as in prior years, greater in the nonviolent crime categories of breaking and entering, larceny and auto theft, where such arrests represented 54 percent of that group's arrest total. As in the past two years, almost 8 of every 10 persons arrested for those offenses in the violent crime category (murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault) were adults.

### ARREST TRENDS

Increases in arrest activity by police, were noted in most of the crime categories during the year. A total rise of 8 percent in arrests for all criminal acts was recorded, 1971 over 1970, while arrests for Index type offenses increased 13 percent during the same period. Within the Index, arrests for violent crime rose 25 percent and nonviolent crime arrests were up over 9 percent.

Arrest increases recorded within individual Index offense categories were led by a 42 percent increase in robbery arrests, a 19 percent increase in murder arrests and atrocious assault up 15 percent. Auto theft arrests declined 4 percent, the only decrease within the Index.

A review of some other relatively high percent increases in individual arrest categories, which are

specific in title, disclosed a 40 percent increase in forgery and counterfeiting arrests, liquor law violations up 37 percent and driving under the influence arrests increased 32 percent.

Arrests for narcotic drug law violations reflected a 13 percent increase over 1970, the smallest annual increase since the program began in 1967. However, since 1967, this type of arrest has increased from 5,045 to 25,953 arrests, an astounding 414 percent increase over that five year period. Further analysis regarding the drug problem and its relationship to crime is disclosed in the Uniform Crime Reporting Survey publication entitled "Drug Abuse and Crime in New Jersey", released on June 1, 1971.

### ARREST ANALYSIS BY AGE

Analysis as to the arrest involvement of adults as compared to juveniles, disclosed that during 1971, adult arrests rose 9 percent while juvenile arrests increased almost 6 percent. For the five year period 1967-1971, arrests for all criminal acts have increased 51 percent. During the same period, adult arrests increased 45 percent, while juvenile arrests were up 64 percent.

Adult arrests for the violent crimes of murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault increased 29 percent since 1970. Juvenile arrests for violent crimes increased by 21 percent. However, when comparing the last five years it was noted that juvenile arrests for these type of crimes were up 125 percent and adult arrests increased almost 74 percent.

The arrest involvement of young age groups for 1971 disclosed that 14 percent of all persons arrested were under the age of 15, a slight decrease over 1970. A little over 35 percent were persons under the age of 18 and 51 percent were under 21 years of age. As a further indication regarding the degree of serious crime involvement of juveniles, it was noted that 3 of every 10 persons arrested for robbery were under 18. Almost 54 percent of all the persons arrested for breaking and entering were juveniles, and over half of those arrested for larceny-theft were persons under 18 years of age. Almost 7 of every 10 persons arrested for auto theft were of this young age group.

Persons under 21 years of age accounted for 48 percent of the total arrests for Narcotic Drug Law violations, a decrease when compared to 1970. A further breakdown disclosed that 32 percent were in the age bracket of 18 through 20 years of age, while 13 percent were 16 years of age or under. Additional analysis of the young persons 17 through 21 years of age, disclosed that these young persons in their last year of high school or out of college age, contributed 51 percent to the total arrests for Narcotic Drug Law violations in 1971.

A matter for serious concern is the criminal arrest involvement of the young age groups, however, the adults still record the highest involvement in the total arrest picture. Arrest of those persons 18 years of age and over represented 65 percent of all arrests reported in 1971. Adult arrests for violent crimes comprised 79 percent of that group's total arrest figure, which includes arrests for murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault.

### **ARREST ANALYSIS BY SEX**

During 1971, analysis by sex revealed that 85 percent of all persons arrested were male. Male arrests rose by 7 percent, while female arrests increased 13 percent.

Although female arrests represent only 15 percent of the total arrest picture since 1967, they have increased 87 percent, while male arrests have increased 46 percent for the same period.

Female arrests within the violent crime category accounted for 11 percent of that total, this includes a 13 percent rate of involvement in atrocious assault arrests and 12 percent for murder. In the nonviolent or property crime category, arrest of females accounted for 15 percent of the total arrests recorded. The primary female involvement was reflected in arrests for larceny, here a 23 percent involvement was determined.

Male arrests for Narcotic Drug Law violations accounted for 86 percent of the 1971 total. Female arrests for the same violations increased 139 percent over 1969, while male arrests were up only 88 percent for the same period.

### **ARREST ANALYSIS BY RACE**

Analysis by race of those persons arrested for all criminal acts during the year, discloses that 67 percent were White, 32 percent were Negro and the remaining 1 percent were of other races. Arrest involvement by race for those serious offenses within the Crime Index, revealed that 54 percent of all those arrested were White, 45 percent were Negro, the remaining 1 percent being of other races.

Persons arrested for crimes of violence within the Index (murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault) reflect that 67 percent were Negro, 31 percent White and the remaining 2 percent distributed among other races. When analyzing murder victims by race, it was also determined that 56 percent of all murder victims in 1971 were Negro.

The arrests for nonviolent crimes of breaking and entering, larceny and auto theft, disclosed that by race, 60 percent were White, 39 percent Negro and the remaining 1 percent being distributed among other races.

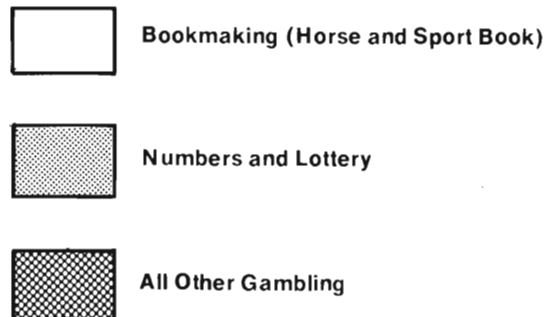
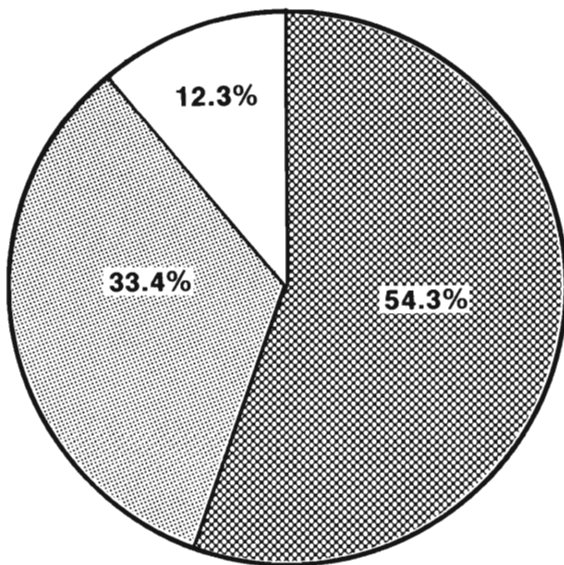

## PERSONS CHARGED

The disposition made of those persons arrested and formally charged in a court of jurisdiction is of great interest to the police administrator. Knowledge as to the quality of the police investigation, case preparation and presentation, may be gained from the subsequent dispositions of those cases which reach the court level.

It must be recognized that not all persons who are arrested are turned over to the courts for prosecution. There are various reasons for this: Failure of the victim to cooperate or appear at time of trial, as victims of rape, is one reason for failure to prosecute effectively those persons arrested. Lack of sufficient evidence to support a charge and evidence obtained which discloses the arrested person did not commit the offense, are additional reasons for an arrested person not being brought to trial. For example: A little over 49 percent of all juveniles arrested were handled by the individual law enforcement agencies, without a formal charge against them or referring them to juvenile authorities. Police methods in handling juveniles differ throughout the state, but in this section all tables concerning juveniles refer to those who were arrested and turned over to juvenile authorities in connection with specific criminal offenses.

In 1971, almost 87 percent of all persons arrested for Crime Index type offenses were turned over to the courts. The adults charged with Crime Index offenses were found guilty by the courts in 72 percent of all cases presented, no significant change over 1970.

When analyzing the Index offenses individually, it was determined that 27 percent of the murder defendants were either acquitted or their cases were dismissed at some prosecutive stage. Forcible rape recorded the highest rate of acquittal or dismissal with a 65 percent rate. Atrocious assault second, with 49 percent of the defendants being acquitted or their cases dismissed.

When reviewing all crime categories, it is noted that convictions were high in the following offense categories: Almost 86 percent of the persons charged for offenses against family and children, which includes desertion and nonsupport, were found guilty. Conviction for prostitution and commercialized vice, an offense involving morality, was computed at 83 percent. Offenses involving alcoholic beverages recorded a high conviction rate, with driving under the influence the highest, at 94 percent, and drunkenness 89 percent.

When considering those persons charged with Crime Index offenses and whose cases reached the court level, 9 percent were found guilty of a lesser crime and 28 percent were acquitted or dismissed. The highest percentage of persons found guilty on the original charge in 1971, as compared to those found guilty of a lesser offense, was in the larceny-theft category where 92 percent of all guilty defendants were convicted as charged. This was followed by murder, where almost 90 percent of the defendants were found guilty of the original charge. Those found guilty of the offense charged in the remaining Index offenses were recorded as follows: Breaking and entering, 86 percent; robbery, 85 percent; auto theft, 82 percent; atrocious assault, 69

percent; and rape, 63 percent.

Disposition data for 1971 disclosed that acquittals or dismissals were greater in the violent crimes of murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault, than in the nonviolent crimes of breaking and entering, larceny and auto theft. Dismissal or acquittal for the violent crimes was reported at 47 percent for 1971. The dismissal or acquittal rate for those crimes of a nonviolent nature was 22 percent for the same period.

The above data discloses the results of cases after police have arrested and formally charged the adult offender. The remaining cases pending court action, or undecided at the year's end, are classified as pending and are carried from year to year until a disposition is furnished by a court of jurisdiction. For the year ending 1971, 62,460 cases remain pending according to information supplied police by the various courts of New Jersey.

A final review of all crime categories discloses that 27 percent of all adults tried by the courts were either acquitted or their cases were dismissed at some prosecutive level. Persons of young age groups who were referred to Juvenile Court represented 21 percent of the total persons formally charged in all crime categories.

## BAIL INFORMATION

As an adjunct to the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, information regarding the bail experience of those persons charged by police is collected annually from the law enforcement agencies of the state. Measurement of this bail experience provides a base for consideration regarding the equity of bail in the administration of criminal justice within the state, as well as information regarding the initial status of those persons charged.

The categories of "Released in Bond or Bail", "Released on Own Recognizance", "Committed in Default of Bail", and "Committed Without Bail" are recorded by police as the information becomes known to them. This bail information, in most cases, must be obtained by police from the court and relates only to the first opportunity an arrested person has to post bail. A person may be committed in default of bail and then later post bail and be released. However, the status would be reported as "Committed in Default".

The law enforcement agencies of the state reported bail information regarding 159,031 persons for the year 1971. This figure represents an 84 percent portion of all those adults formally charged by police, and is the base used in all analyses presented.

Bail information regarding those adults charged with the serious Crime Index offenses discloses that 38 percent were released in bond or bail, 37 percent were committed in default, 18 percent were released on their own recognizance and 7 percent were committed without bail.

The following bail status was experienced by those persons charged with a nonviolent crime: Released in bond or bail, 41 percent; released on own recognizance, 21 percent; committed in default of bail, 35 percent; and committed without bail, 2 percent.

In 1971, the total bail experience of those persons

charged by police is reflected in the 40 percent who were released in bond or bail, 29 percent released on their own recognizance, 28 percent committed in default of bail and the 3 percent who were committed without bail.

Comparisons of 1971 bail information with that of 1967, reflects a consistent trend in two areas. In 1967,

the percentage of persons released in bond or bail was 52 percent, in 1971 the percentage decreased to 40 percent. Also in 1967, the percentage of persons released on their own recognizance was computed at 22 percent, during 1971 the percentage increased to 29 percent.

## **CRIME STATISTICS BY GEOGRAPHIC REGION AND COUNTY**

The presentation of criminal statistics by geographic regions of New Jersey, and by counties within the respective regions, is made for the purpose of further analysis of crime within the state. The type and volume of crime will vary from place to place as do the influencing factors which contribute to a crime rate. Recognition of these variances, through identification, helps provide a more equitable base for consideration.

Geographic groupings by county, as shown in this section, were made using the following criteria: One, location in the state in relation to outside influence, (e.g. large urban centers); two, their general character, (e.g. urban or openness); three, the presence of major urban cores within individual counties. Employing these criteria, the state was divided into four regions.

The Northwest Region contains Sussex, Warren and Hunterdon Counties. The region is primarily a rural area because of its distance from the two major metropolitan centers of New York and Philadelphia, as well as the absence of any major core cities.

The Northeast Region contains the eight counties of Bergen, Morris, Passaic, Essex, Hudson, Union, Somerset and Middlesex. The character of this region is a suburban-urban mix. The most densely populated urban areas of the state and the nation with their complex problems are located within this region. The major urban cores are Newark, Jersey City and Paterson with surrounding suburban areas; but, of course, on the larger scale the region is oriented towards the New York metropolitan center. The industrial complex of the state is centered in this region as is 64 percent of the state's population.

The Southwest Region contains the four counties of Mercer, Burlington, Camden and Gloucester. The character of this area, is also a suburban-urban mix. The urban cores within the region are Trenton and Camden with surrounding suburban development, but the entire region is oriented towards the Philadelphia metropolitan center.

The Southeast Region contains the six counties of Monmouth, Ocean, Atlantic, Cape May, Cumberland and Salem. The general character of this region is rural except for the large resort area stretching along the Atlantic coast. The major center for this region is Atlantic City. The resident population of the resort counties within this region is dramatically supplemented during the summer season resulting in urban-like problems not normally associated with a "rural" classification.

### **NORTHWEST REGION**

A total of 3,583 Crime Index offenses were reported to the police of the Northwest Region during 1971. When compared to 1970, this represents a 26 percent increase.

Almost 5 percent of all offenses reported were of the violent crime group, which includes murder, rape,

robbery and atrocious assault. The remaining 95 percent were of a nonviolent nature, which includes breaking and entering, larceny \$50 and over and auto theft.

Variations in crime counts for the region were particularly noted in the voluminous property crimes of breaking and entering and larceny \$50 and over. The largest increase, 1971 over 1970, was found in breaking and enterings, up 30 percent. Larcenies \$50 and over increased 21 percent for the same period.

The Northwest Region revealed no particular seasonal high during 1971. Individually the high months were October, July and May. The high month was October, and the low month was recorded in February.

In 1971, there were 1,576 victims of Index Crime for every 100,000 inhabitants of the region compared to the 1,286 per 100,000 rate computed for 1970. The crime rate for the region remains the lowest among all four regions of the state, however the 1971 rate represents a 23 percent increase when compared to 1970. The violent crime rate of 76 per 100,000 inhabitants reflected an increase of 27 percent when compared to 1970. The nonviolent crime rate rose to 1,500 victims per 100,000, an increase of 22 percent over 1970.

### **Clearances**

The police of the Northwest Region solved 16 percent of all Crime Index offenses reported to them in 1971, no change over 1970. As with other regions of the state, the percentage of solutions for those crimes of a violent nature far exceeded that for those crimes of the nonviolent or property group.

### **NORTHEAST REGION**

The police of the Northeast Region reported a total of 146,985 Crime Index offenses received by them from the inhabitants of this populous region during 1971. This figure represents an increase of 15 percent when compared to 1970. This high crime volume for a region which houses 64 percent of the state's population, also represents 65 percent of the total Index offenses reported for the entire state.

Within the Index offenses, volumes for those crimes of a violent nature, which includes murder, rape, robbery, and atrocious assault, rose 30 percent during the year. The nonviolent crime group of breaking and entering, larceny \$50 and over and auto theft reflected a 13 percent increase when compared to 1970.

There were outstanding increases in certain crime categories, 1971 over 1970. Robbery was up 34 percent and rape increased 22 percent within the violent crime group. Breaking and entering in the nonviolent group increased 20 percent.

The highest volume of crime, by month, was recorded during December, with the low in January. The seasonal high was recorded during the months of October through December.

The Northeast Region 1971 crime rate of 3,152 victims of Index Crime for every 100,000 inhabitants, reflected a 14 percent increase over 1970. Since 1967, the victim rate has increased 58 percent from the 1,997 victims per 100,000 inhabitants recorded during that period.

## Clearances

In 1971, almost 14 percent of all Crime Index offenses reported to police of this region were solved, no change over 1970. In the violent crime group, police were successful in clearing 73 percent of the murders, 55 percent of the rapes, almost 67 percent of the atrocious assaults and 22 percent of the robberies.

Clearances for those crimes of a nonviolent nature were considerably lower, as expected. Solutions for breaking and entering occurred in 12 percent of all cases reported. Larceny \$50 and over offenses were solved in 9 percent of all instances and auto theft cases recorded a 6 percent clearance rate.

## SOUTHWEST REGION

The police of the Southwest Region reported 38,967 Crime Index offenses during the year 1971. When compared to 1970, this figure represents an increase of 10 percent. The violent crime group of murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault, represented 9 percent of all the Index offenses reported, and also reflected an increase of 27 percent since 1970. Atrocious assault within this violent group, disclosed a 39 percent increase over 1970, and murder recorded a 23 percent decrease within this same group.

The remaining 91 percent of the Index offenses reported were of the nonviolent crime group, an 8 percent volume rise over 1970. A significant volume increase occurred in the category of breaking and entering, which rose 12 percent during the year.

The greatest volume of crime occurred, as in previous years, during the last quarter of 1971, October through December. The individual high month was November.

Region crime volumes, when related to population, result in a rate of victimization of 3,017 persons for every 100,000 inhabitants of the region. This represents a 7 percent increase from the 2,825 victim rate recorded in 1970.

## Clearances

Law enforcement in the Southwest Region solved slightly over 12 percent of all Index offenses reported to them, a small increase when compared to the 1970 clearance rate. This region reported the lowest solution rate of any of the four regions. Clearances for those crimes of the violent group occurred in 36 percent of all such cases reported. Successful solutions were made in

89 percent of the murders, 60 percent of the rapes, 18 percent of the robberies, and 67 percent of all cases of atrocious assault reported.

Nonviolent crime clearances occurred in 10 percent of all the cases reported to police, with 11 percent of the breaking and enterings, 9 percent of the larcenies, and 8 percent of the auto theft cases being solved.

## SOUTHEAST REGION

During the year 1971, a total of 35,174 Crime Index offenses were reported to police of the Southeast Region, over a 15 percent increase from the 30,462 offenses reported for 1970.

Almost 8 percent of the Index offenses reported were of the violent type, with the remaining 92 percent being the nonviolent or property crimes. The violent crimes increased over 17 percent, while nonviolent crime increased 15 percent over 1970.

A substantial increase was noted in the violent crime of robbery, a 24 percent increase. In the nonviolent group, breaking and entering recorded the largest increase, at 21 percent. Auto theft recorded the only decrease within the region, minus 1 percent.

As would be expected in this resort oriented area, crime volumes were highest during the summer season of July, August and September. Individually, August recorded the monthly high, with 3,869 offenses.

The Southeast crime rate of 3,137 victims for every 100,000 persons within the region, reflects an increase of 12 percent, 1971 over 1970.

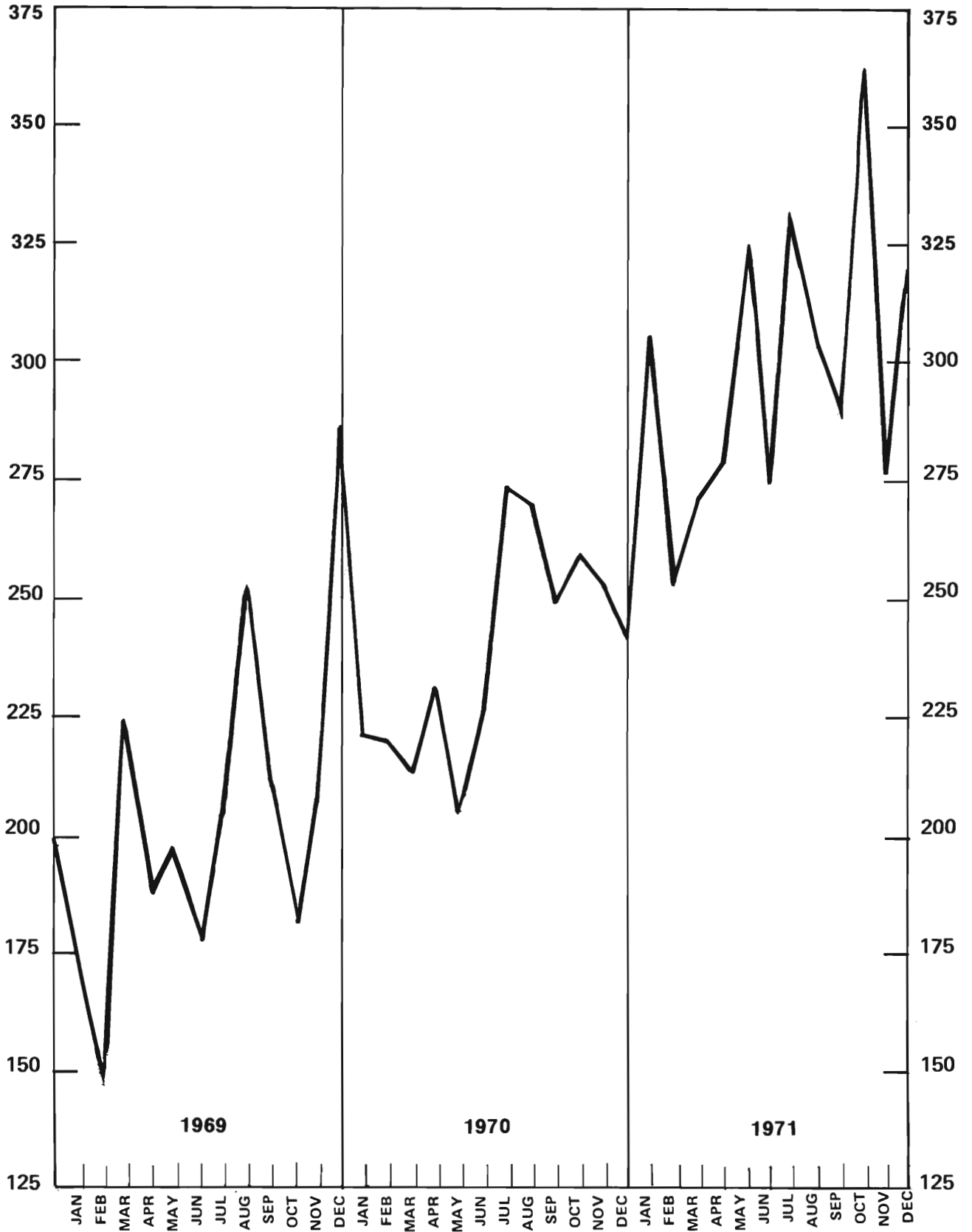
## Clearances

Law enforcement agencies of the Southeast Region solved almost 15 percent of all Crime Index offenses reported to them during the year, a slight decrease from the 1970 solution rate.

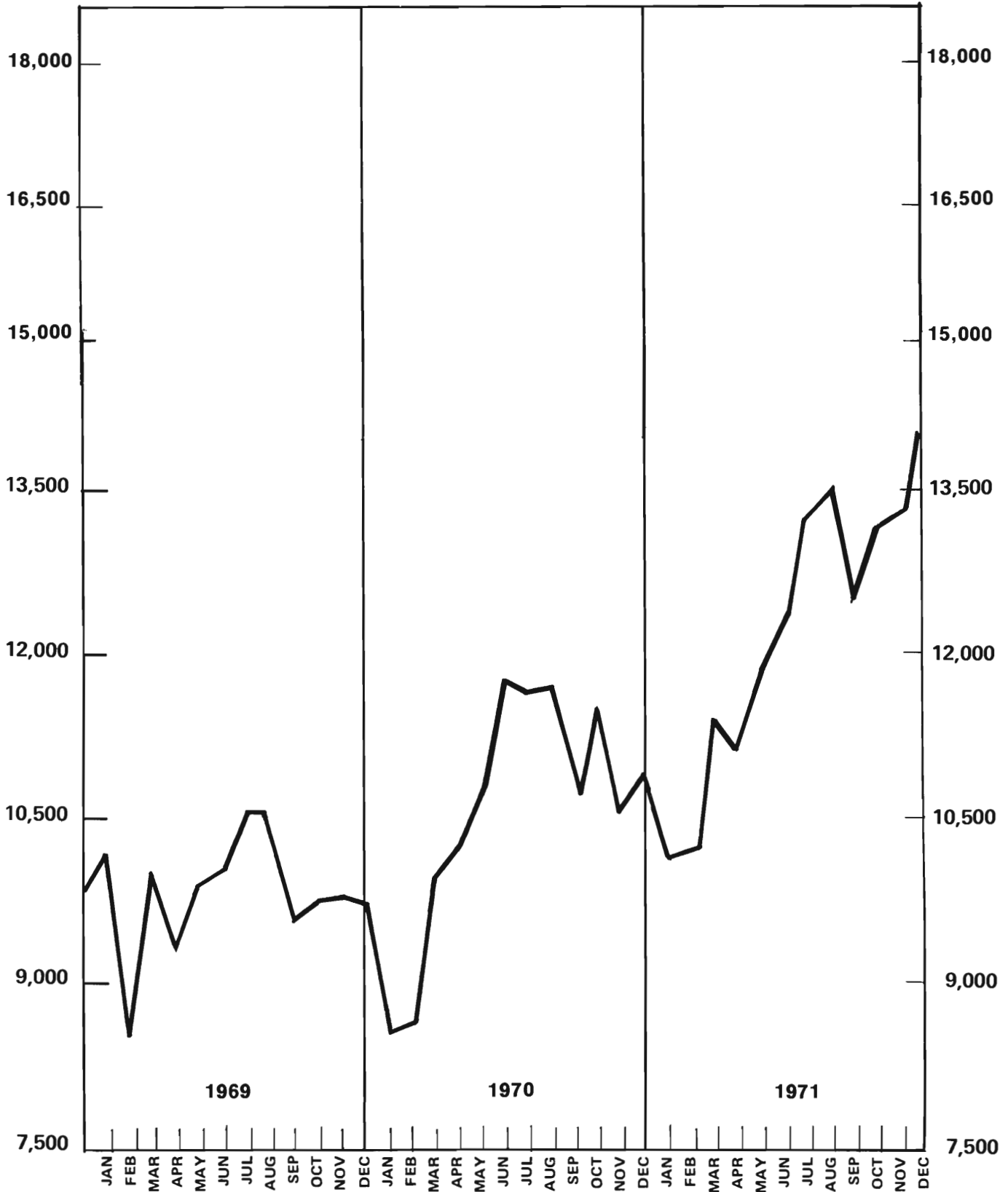
Violent crime solutions were provided in almost 51 percent of all such offenses reported. Case clearances were reported in 84 percent of the murders, 64 percent of the rapes, 28 percent of the robberies and 77 percent of the atrocious assaults.

Solutions for those crimes of a nonviolent nature were made in 12 percent of all cases reported. The solution rate for breaking and entering was computed at 14 percent, larceny \$50 and over was 9 percent and auto theft experienced a 14 percent solution rate during 1971.

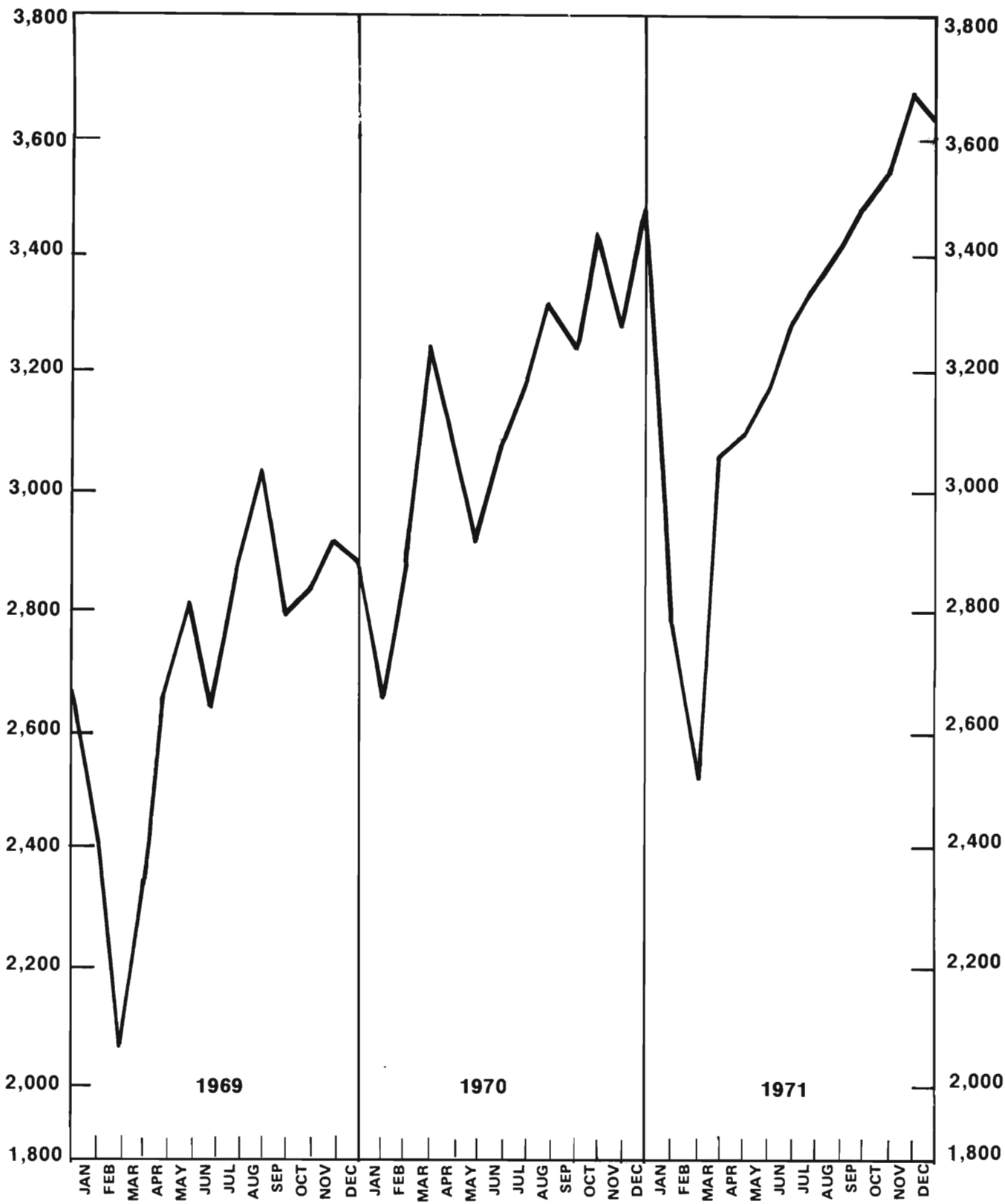
**NORTHWEST REGION

1969 — 1970 — 1971**



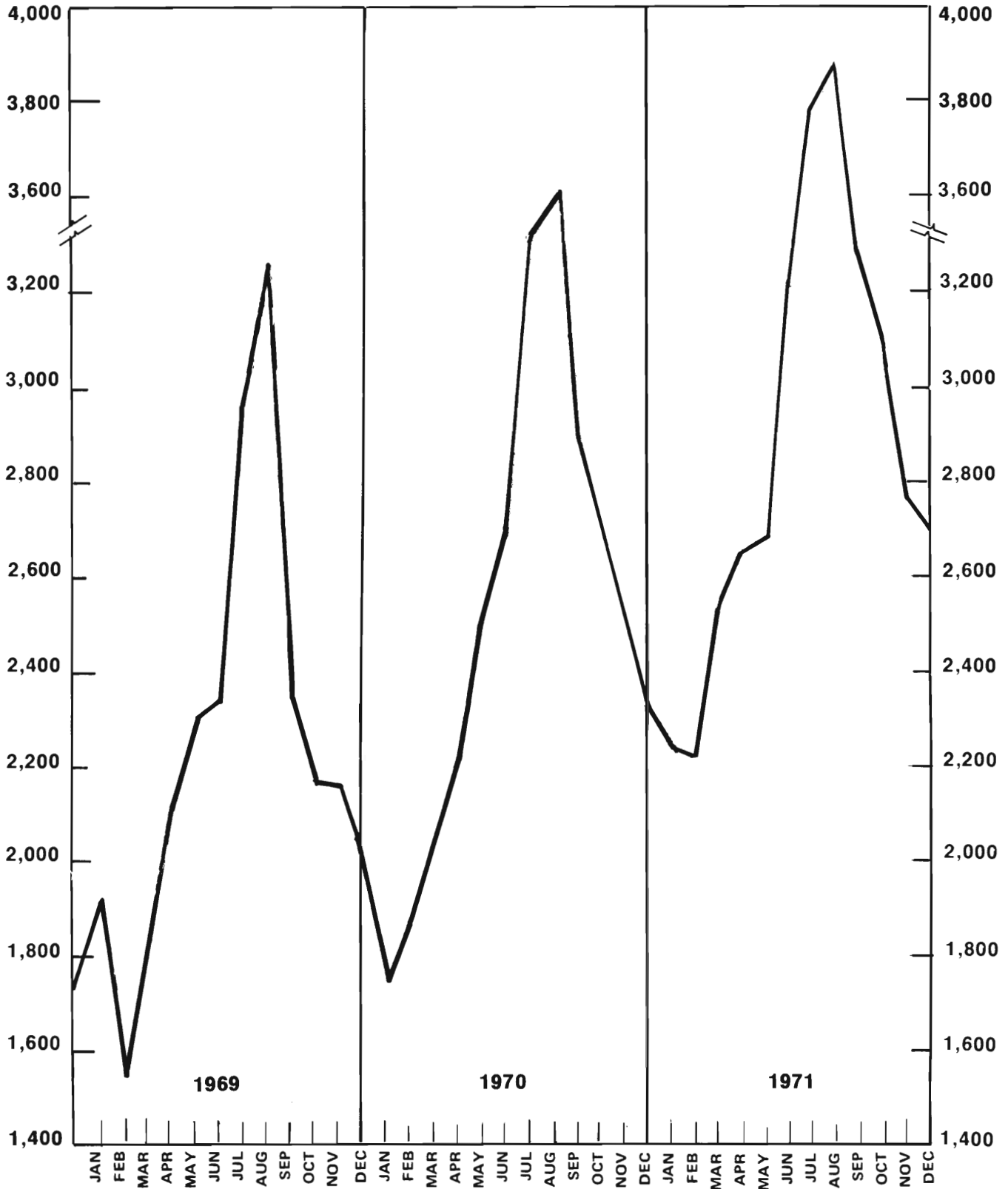
**NORTHEAST REGION

## URBAN SUBURBAN RURAL GROUPS

Crime statistics by urban, suburban and rural classifications are presented for the first time since the Uniform Crime Reporting Program began in 1967. The purpose is to measure crime trends for these specific groups, particularly since New Jersey is the most urbanized state in the country.

An attempt was made to compare the crime change within the three groups for the period 1967 to 1971, but due to the reclassification of many municipalities during that period, particularly as a result of the 1970 census, the analysis that followed would fail to portray a true picture. For example, in 1967 there were 62 municipalities classified as urban, and during 1971 there

were 154 municipalities falling in the same classification. It appears that the population is shifting from the urban cities to the suburban communities, thus causing these suburban communities to be reclassified to an urban status.

The character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications as established here and in the section entitled "State, County and Municipal Profiles", was compiled by the Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning.

## POPULATION GROUPS

The presentation of crime statistics by population groups was made for the purpose of projecting, for consideration, the relative crime experience of communities of varying populations. Although the individual municipalities within the various groups may be geographically separated, their inclusion into a specific group was predicated by the similarity in population with the other municipalities within the

group. Municipalities within the same group may differ widely when all factors are considered, but they do share the common bond of population size. The grouping of communities in this manner allows recognition of variances in the crime volumes, rates and clearances between the established groups.

## MUNICIPAL OFFENSE DATA

The 1971 offense data provided in this section is shown as it relates to the incorporated New Jersey municipality in which the offense occurred and is based on the individual contribution of crime statistics by the respective police jurisdictions of the state.

The isolation of offenses by place of occurrence, as shown in the table, makes possible the projection of a more accurate statistical picture of the individual community's crime experience. Additionally, this approach has provided a sound base for offense computation and analysis by county, region, character,

population group and state. This application has been made, in varying forms, in all of the preceding offense information shown.

The statistical tables which follow offer numerical counts of all offenses reported during 1971, also a "Crime Index Total" column, which is used to compute the crime rate of a municipality, has been included. A Crime Index consists of murder, rape, robbery, atrocious assault, breaking and entering, larceny \$50 and over and auto theft.

# POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey incorporates the collection of pertinent data relating to the police of the state. Information regarding police employee strength, distributions, assaults against law enforcement officers and circumstances surrounding the killings of police officers are discussed in this section.

Individual listings of full-time municipal police departments of the state are shown in tables succeeding the narrative portion of this section.

The determination of police strength for any given area or municipality should be a subject for serious consideration. Such consideration, however, should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. Some of these factors, discussed elsewhere in this publication, relate to size, density of population, geographic location, character, and proximity to metropolitan areas. The tables and charts shown in this section relate to reported police employee strength and should not be interpreted as recommended strength for any given municipality. Such determinations should be made after objectively evaluating the individual need for police services based on the above factors.

## MUNICIPAL POLICE EMPLOYEE TRENDS

In 1971, the number of municipal police employees in New Jersey (including civilian personnel) increased to 16,480 from the 15,637 reported in 1970, an increase of 5 percent.

When 1971 individual county volumes for municipal police employees are compared with those of 1970, an extensive range of variances emerges. Hunterdon County experienced the largest percentage increase, at 30 percent, while Union County, with a 2 percent increase, registered the lowest percentage increase. Volumewise, Camden County reported the largest increase with an additional 104 police employees since 1970.

## MUNICIPAL POLICE EMPLOYEE RATES

The number of municipal police employees (including civilian personnel) for every 1,000 inhabitants of New Jersey increased to 2.3 per 1,000 during the year 1971, up from the 1970 rate of 2.2 per 1,000. This rate increase of almost 5 percent, 1971 over 1970, and the 21 percent increase since 1967, is relatively small when we consider the rise in the criminal and noncriminal demands placed upon the police of New Jersey.

In 1971, the populous Northeast Region recorded the highest rate, at 2.5 police employees per 1,000 inhabitants. Within this region, Essex and Hudson Counties were high and reported identical police employee rates, 3.3 per 1,000 population. The Southeast Region was second with 2.1 police employees per 1,000 inhabitants. The Southwest Region reported 1.8 police employees per 1,000 population for the year 1971. The rural Northwest Region recorded 0.8 employees per 1,000 inhabitants, the lowest of the four regions.

## MUNICIPAL CIVILIAN EMPLOYEES

The personnel of each department differ as to the demands and responsibilities placed before them. Many police officers are fully occupied with clerical tasks and are not free to perform active police duties. This current upward trend in employing civilians in police departments to perform clerical duties, is in line with the thinking of many police administrators who recommend the use of civilians in this capacity, thus freeing the sworn personnel for actual police related services.

In 1971, almost 10 percent of all police employees were civilians, almost an 11 percent increase over 1970. Within regions, the percentage of civilian municipal police employees varied from 16 percent in the Southwest Region to almost 8 percent in the Northwest Region.

## MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

The number of full-time municipal police officers in New Jersey was recorded at 14,897, a 4 percent increase over the 14,287 recorded for 1970.

The number of full-time municipal police officers for each 1,000 persons of the state remained at 2.0 for 1971, no change when compared to 1970. Since 1967, the police officer rate per 1,000 inhabitants has been less than dramatic, with under an 18 percent increase.

Regionally, the number of full-time municipal police officers per 1,000 ranged from 0.7 in the Northwest Region to 2.5 per 1,000 in the Northeast Region. Individual county rates ranged from 0.5 in Hunterdon County to the 3.5 per 1,000 permanent inhabitants for Cape May County.

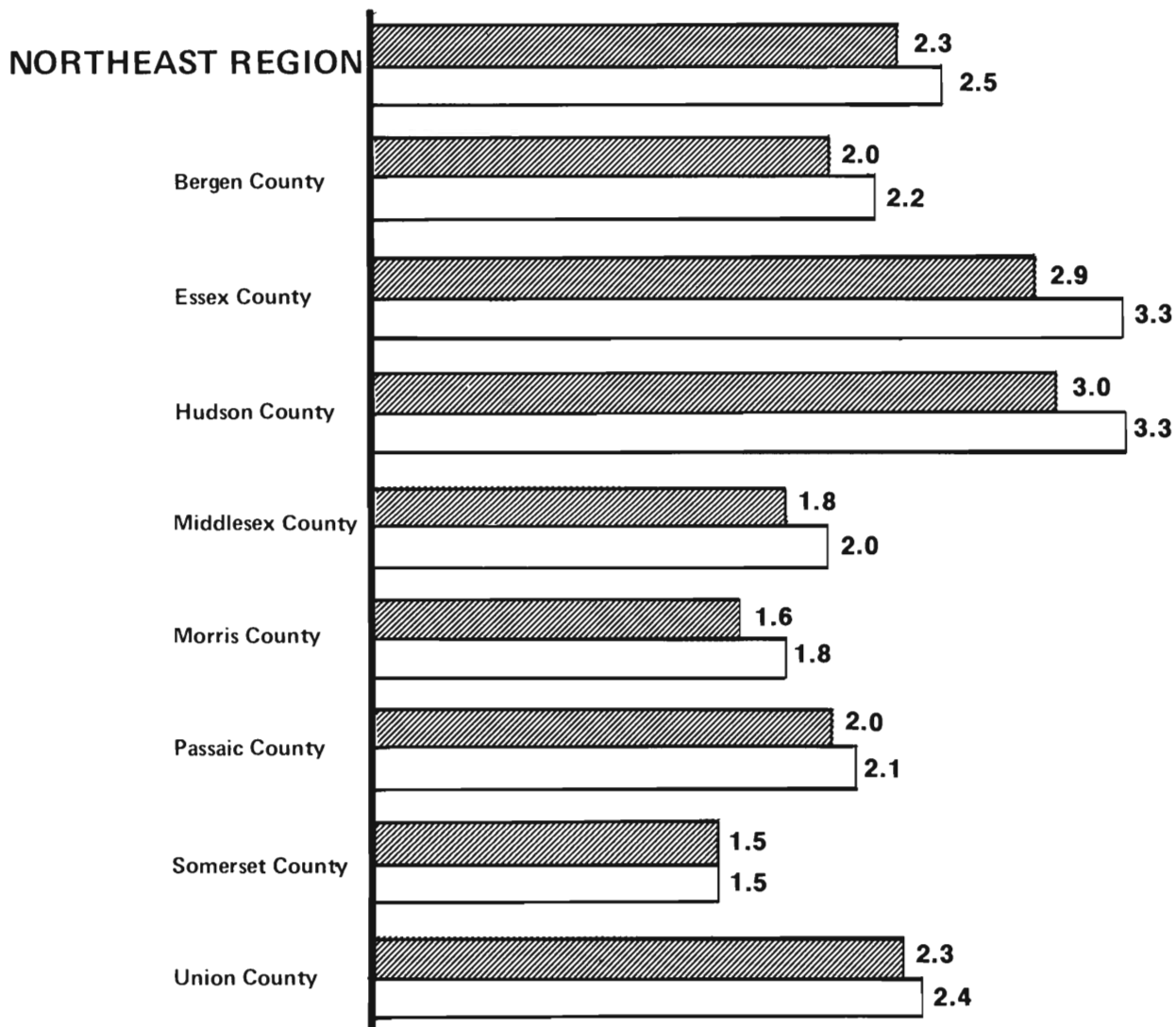
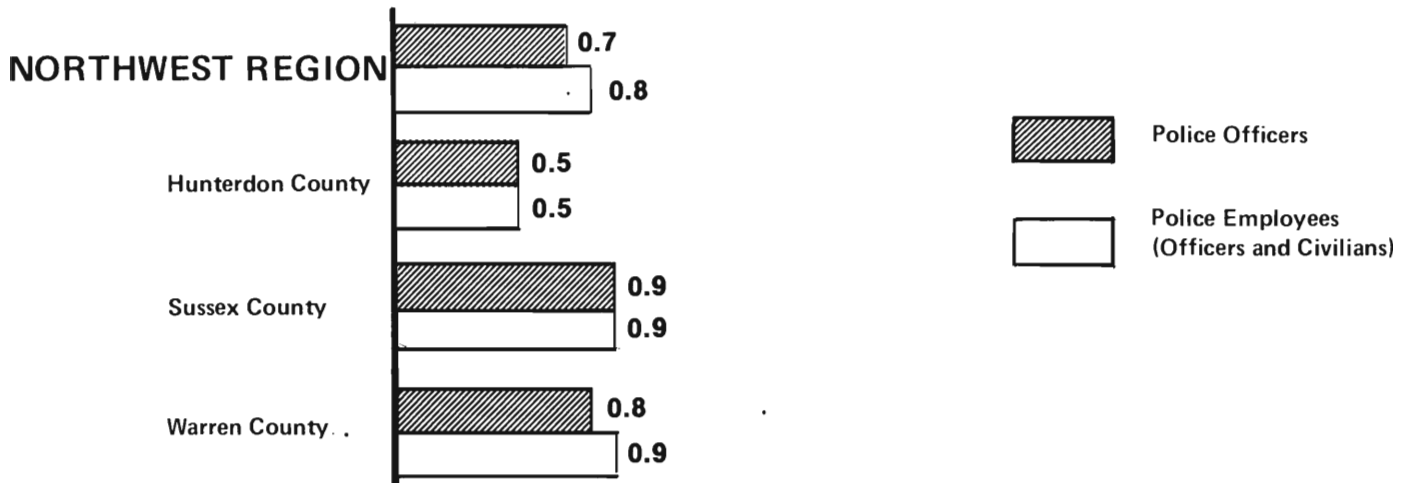
The police employee rates per 1,000 population presented here should not be construed as being recommended ratios. The determination of police strength for any municipality or jurisdiction should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. These factors, as crime, vary in type and degree from place to place. Some examples are seasonal populations, geographic location, density and composition of the population.

## COUNTY POLICE, SHERIFFS AND PROSECUTORS

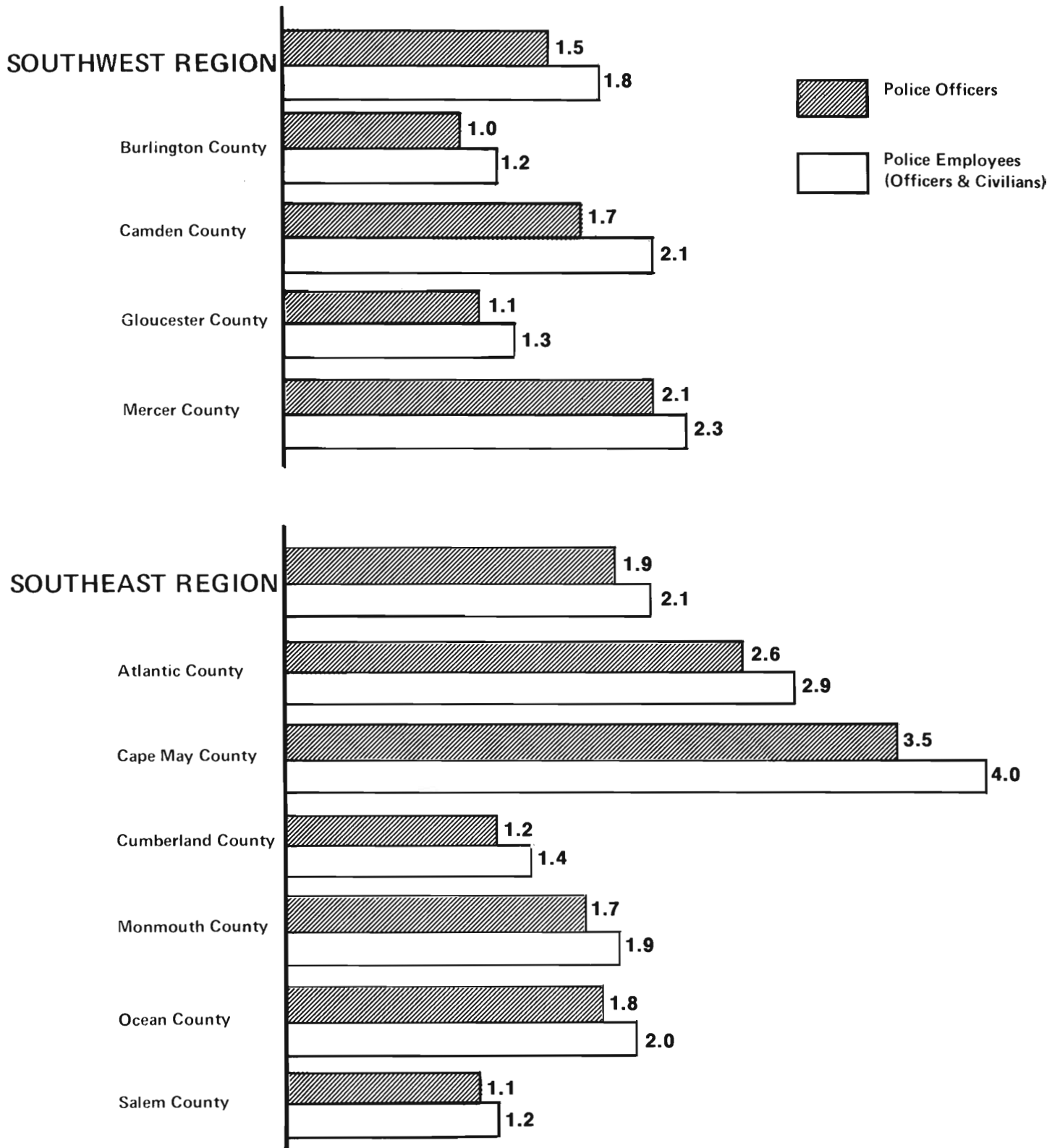
The functions of county law enforcement officers vary widely throughout the state. The operation of one sheriff's department may be limited exclusively to civil areas and the administration of the county jail, or they may be actively involved in criminal matters throughout the county. County police departments are varied in their activities as well, in that some are responsible for enforcement throughout the county while others may have as their primary mission the policing of county parklands. The responsibilities of county prosecutor's officers include criminal investigation, trial preparation, court presentation and special probes. Because of the difference in the types of police service rendered, rates for county law enforcement agencies are not presented here.

The various county law enforcement agencies of the state employed a total of 2,816 full-time police

employees during the year 1971. This figure represents a 13 percent increase over the 2,492 employees reported for the year 1970.

Full-time civilian employees accounted for 21 percent of the total police employees reported by county law enforcement agencies during 1971. The remaining 79 percent or 2,219 employees were sworn personnel. The civilian personnel increased 4 percent, while the officers increased 16 percent, 1971 over 1970.

The table entitled "Full-time County Police Employees", which follows the narrative portion of this section, includes county police, county park police, sheriffs and prosecutors as one, and is listed according to the county jurisdiction.

## STATE POLICE

The New Jersey State Police is empowered to provide all phases of law enforcement throughout the state. It also renders police services, upon request, to all the law enforcement agencies in the state. No rates are used due to the variations in the nature and extent of the police services performed by the State Police.

The Division of State Police employed a total of 2,184 persons during the year 1971. Of these, 25 percent or 545 were civilians, with the remaining 1,639 being sworn personnel. The total number of State Police employees increased 8 percent during the year. Included in this increase was a rise of 17 percent in civilian personnel and a 5 percent increase in the sworn personnel.

## OTHER POLICE (State Agencies)

During 1971, there were seven state agencies (excluding State Police) with law enforcement responsibilities, who reported police employee data to the System. Together these agencies reported a total of 2,767 full-time police employees. Included in this total are 2,241 civilians and 526 sworn personnel.

No rates are computed here, due to the variations in the types of police services rendered and their statewide jurisdiction.

## POLICE KILLED AND ASSAULTED

The killing or assault of a police officer has an effect on society which reaches far beyond the overt act. Such occurrences constitute an immediate threat to the well-being of the community and a serious breach of the internal security of the country. Today, a young man who considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the very strong possibility of being killed or assaulted by a member of the very same society he is sworn to protect. This deplorable situation should be a subject of serious public concern for, in truth, an attack on a police officer is an attack on society. The violence directed against law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty is clearly demonstrated by the following information.

## POLICE KILLED

In 1971, four New Jersey police officers lost their lives as a result of some criminal action directed against them. In addition, one guard employed privately, while

attempting to stop an armed robbery of a warehouse office, was shot and killed.

Analysis of the four police officers killed in the line of duty revealed that one officer was slain during an exchange of gunfire after he responded to a bank alarm. Another officer was killed by a mentally disturbed outpatient from a mental hospital. A third officer was killed while pursuing a robbery suspect on foot. The fourth officer killed while on duty was "set up" and ambushed.

Weapon circumstances surrounding the slaying of the four police officers, identified handguns as the weapon in three killings and the fourth officer killed by the mental patient was stabbed with a knife. Since 1966, all but two of the 14 New Jersey police officers slain in the line of duty were killed by firearms.

## ASSAULTS ON MUNICIPAL POLICE

Municipal police officers of the state were the victims of 2,250 cases of assault during the year 1971, almost a 7 percent increase over such cases reported for the year 1970. Since 1967, assaults on municipal police officers have increased almost 68 percent. This large increase has presented New Jersey law enforcement with a serious problem, which has grown to major proportions.

While every police officer who is assaulted does not suffer personal injury, almost 38 percent of those assaulted during 1971 did sustain physical injury to one degree or another. The assaults resulting in physical injury to the police officer are frequently followed by loss of duty time by the officer.

The 1971 rate of municipal police assaulted in the state was computed at 15.1 assaults for every 100 municipal police officers. Since 1967, the police assault rate has increased almost 40 percent. Assault and injury rates are shown by population group in table form for the purpose of projecting the comparative assault experience of police in communities of varying populations.

## OTHER POLICE OFFICERS ASSAULTED

The following state and county law enforcement agencies are dealt with separately, and are not included when computing municipal assault rates. The services performed, in most cases by these agencies, vary greatly from the functions of municipal police agencies, thus requiring their separation.

County police officers, which includes county police, county park police, sheriff's and prosecutor's offices, reported a total of 83 sworn personnel assaulted during the year 1971. A total of 55 officers received some type of injury as a result of the attack on their person.

The New Jersey State Police reported a total of 43 troopers assaulted during the year 1971, of these, 24 received physical injury.

Other state agencies with police powers, reported a total of 6 sworn personnel being assaulted during the year. Of these, 3 received physical injury.

when assaulted and police assault cases solved. In this section, all cases of police officers assaulted in New Jersey during the year 1971 are utilized.

**WEAPONS USED**

During 1971, personal weapons such as hands, fists and feet were used in 89 percent of all assaults on police officers. Other dangerous weapons, such as clubs, bricks, jack handles, etc., were used in 7 percent of all cases of police assault. Firearms and knives reflected an involvement of 2 percent each. The five year period, 1967-1971, has disclosed very little change in the weapon usage during that period.

**TYPE OF ACTIVITY**

The police services performed by law enforcement agencies vary widely in both criminal and noncriminal activities. The services performed are governed by the nature of the demands for this service. Analysis by the type of service being rendered when the police officer was assaulted, provides an indication as to the degree of jeopardy a police officer is placed when responding to a given situation.

Almost 28 percent of all police assaults were incurred while the officer was responding to disturbance calls, such as family disputes and tavern quarrels. Police officers attempting to effect an arrest accounted for 26 percent of all police assaults in 1971. Assaults by persons

who were detected during the commission of a criminal act or who were fleeing the scene of a crime, accounted for 16 percent of the assaults.

The police officers assaulted who were engaged in transporting prisoners, recorded a 6 percent involvement. Police assaulted while investigating a suspicious person or circumstance, 5 percent and assaults incurred during disorders of a civil nature accounted for 2 percent of the total assaults. The handling of berserk or deranged persons accounted for 3 percent, and the remaining assaults occurred in activities other than those described here.

**CLEARANCES**

The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing by arrest, 93 percent of the assaults directed against them. Assaults against officers attempting to perform their duty would tend to indicate the disrespectful attitude of the perpetrators involved, even though almost immediate apprehension exists.

Although an assault upon a police officer is a high misdemeanor in New Jersey, police charged only 46 percent with this serious crime. The remainder were charged under the less severe misdemeanor or nonindictable section of the law. Since 1967, the percentage of defendants being charged with the indictable offense has increased from 35 to the current 46 percent.

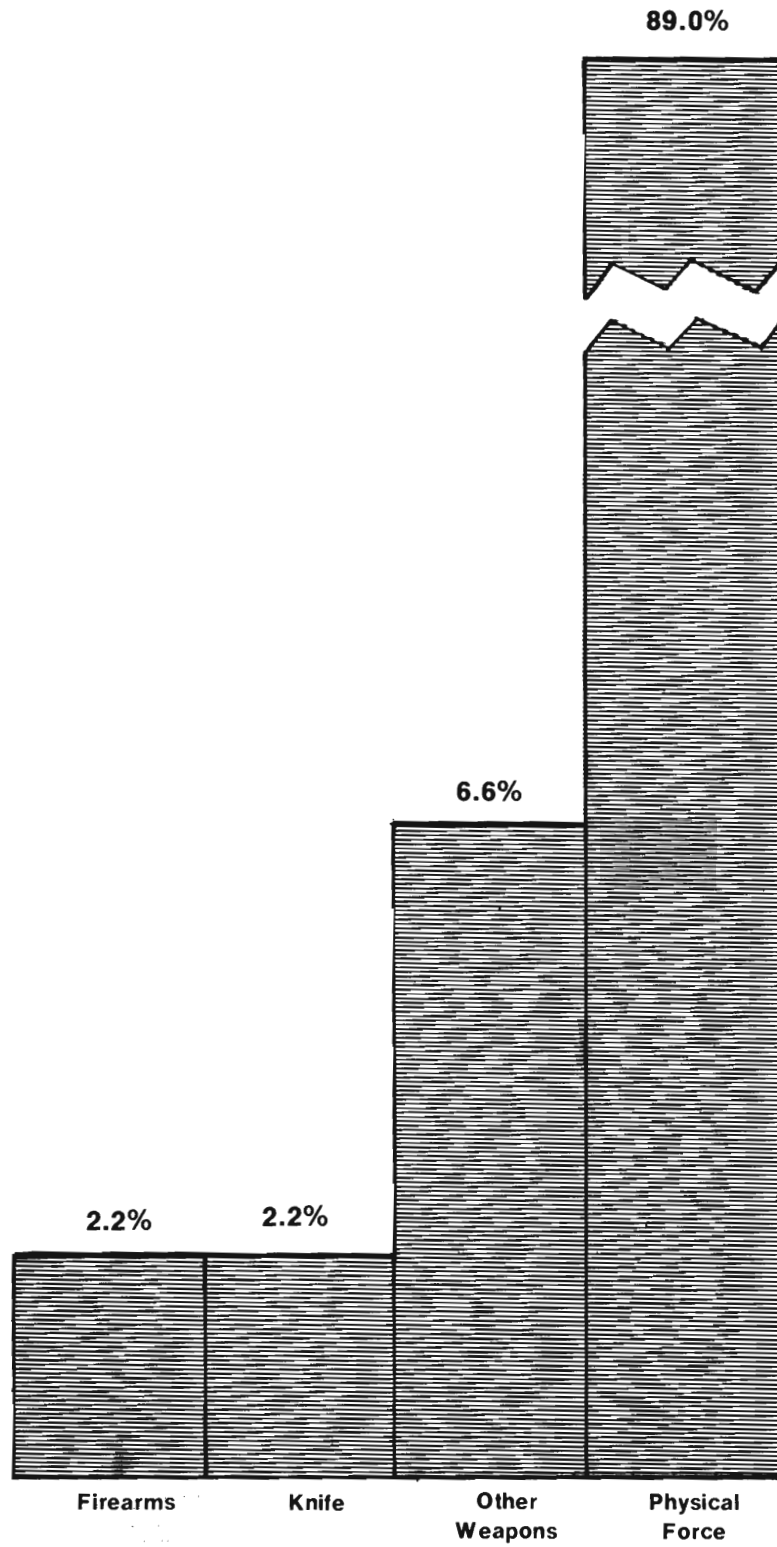
