Helping New Jersey senior citizens and persons with disabilities

In Fiscal Year 2005, the casino industry in Atlantic City provided \$474 million in taxes and fees to the Casino Revenue Fund - money that can only be spent on programs that benefit the state's seniors and people with disabilities. The money comes from several casino-specific taxes and fees administered by the Casino Control Commission, the largest of which is an 8 percent tax on casino gross revenues. Other taxes and fees paid into the Casino Revenue Fund during fiscal year 2005 were derived from a hotel room fee, half of a parking fee, a tax on casino complimentarys, a tax on casino net income, and a tax on multi-progressive slot machine systems.

Every year, the New Jersey Legislature appropriates money from the fund to support various programs that are run by the Department of Human Services, Department of Health and Senior Services, Department of Labor and New Jersey Transit. This report highlights some of the programs and services paid for by the Casino Revenue Fund and provides details on how you can get more information about these programs and services.

Since 1978, the casino industry has provided more than \$6.7 billion in taxes and fees to the Casino Revenue Fund.

☐ PROGRAMS FOR THE AGED Health & Senior Services Administration This funding is used to support DHSS Administration costs associated with CRF programs that serve the aged and disabled.	☐ PAYMENTS FOR MEDICAL CARE ASSISTANCE Personal Care This program provides assistance for Medicaid recipients with the tasks of daily living.
Adult Protective Services This program provides investigative services for adults that live in the community, and who suffer from neglect, abuse, and/or exploitation.	Waiver Initiatives This program provides funding for several federal Medicaid expansion programs such as the Traumatic Brain Injury Waiver.
Senior Citizen House - Safe House & Transportation The purpose of this program is to provide senior citizens with a safe living environment by offering home repair services, safety improvements, and escorted transportation, especially for seniors living in high crime areas.	☐ PURCHASED RESIDENTIAL CARE Private Institutional Care This program provides contracted medical care to disabled individuals in an institutional setting.
Congregate Housing Support Services This program provides supportive services to low-income frail elderly who reside in subsidized housing facilities and need assistance as they age in place.	Skill Development Homes This program provides a home like setting where self-care and housekeeping skills are taught.
Home Delivered Meals This program provides home delivered meals and nutritional services.	☐ PURCHASED RESIDENTIAL CARE Group Homes These homes have on site, 24 hour staffing that provide services for the disabled individual and several roommates.
Demo. Adult Day Care - Alzheimer's Disease This program partially subsidizes the purchase of adult day care services for individuals suffering from Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia.	Family Care This program offers services to families that are caring for a disabled individual (typically children) at home. These support services include in-home and out of home respite care.
Respite Care for the Elderly This program allows personal caregivers to be relieved of their duties temporarily by providing their patients with services so that premature institutionalization can be avoided.	☐ SOCIAL SUPERVISION AND CONSULTATION Home Assistance This program provides in home services in the areas of personal care, activities of daily living, and family support.
☐ FAMILY HEALTH SERVICES Statewide Birth Defects Registry Funding for the maintenance of the database of disabilities present at time of birth.	Purchase of School & Camp This program provides school and camp services to disabled children.
☐ MEDICAL SERVICES FOR THE AGED Community Care Alternatives This is a community-based waiver program, with 3,500 openings, that offers services to the elderly and disabled as an alternative to institutional care.	☐ ADULT ACTIVITIES Provides services to assist disabled individuals with basic vocational skills, such as those needed to develop social skills, manage money, and take care of their homes. Job training, counseling, and job referrals are also provided.
Home Care Expansion This program provides home care services to the aged and disabled who are at risk of institutionalization and who are not eligible for Medicaid or the CCPED program.	☐ SHELTERED WORKSHOP TRANSPORTATION This program reimburses disabled clients for transportation to and from their jobs at sheltered workshops.
Hearing Aid Assistance Aged and Disabled This program reimburses individuals up to \$100 for hearing aids if they meet the eligibility criteria of the PAA/PAAD programs.	☐ STATE PROFESSIONAL BOARDS Home Health Aid Certification Funding for background checks and certification of home health aids.
☐ PHARMACEUTICAL ASSISTANCE TO THE AGED & DISABLED ** This program provides prescription drugs, insulin, insulin supplies to eligible individuals who are 65 years or older and have income levels up to \$20,989 if single and \$25,735 if married	☐ TRANSPORTATION ASSIST. FOR SENIORS AND DISABLED This program is used to provide transportation services to the elderly and disabled through programs such as "Access Link."
☐ PERSONAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM This program provides personal assistance services to disabled individuals who are working, preparing for employment, or volunteering in the community.
