REPORT.

To the Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

I have the honor to submit herewith my report of the operations of this department for the fiscal year ended October 31st, 1905.

My appointment as Quartermaster-General was made March 8th, 1905, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Brigadier General Richard A. Donnelly, which occurred February 27th, 1905. It is fitting for me to add here a tribute to the memory of my distinguished predecessor whose warm friendship I enjoyed for many years. Among the more prominent traits for which General Donnelly will be remembered were a never failing courtesy, a kindly heart and a quiet dignity of deportment which gained for him the cordial esteem of all, both in public and private circles, with whom his busy life brought him in contact. Loyal to his country in the dark days of war and faithful to his duties during his long occupancy of the office of Quartermaster-General, the State has lost by his death the services of an efficient officer.

CHANGES.

An act of the Legislature approved April 5th, 1905, reorganized this department, and it is now constituted as follows: One quartermaster-general with the rank of brigadier general, who is also commissary general, paymaster general, chief medical purveyor, medical storekeeper and chief of ordnance; two assistant quartermasters general with the rank of colonel; one assistant commissary general with the rank of colonel; one deputy quartermaster-general with the rank of lieutenant colonel; one paymaster with the rank of major; one military storekeeper with the rank of captain.

The following changes and appointments were made under this act: Colonel William H. Earley, Deputy Quartermaster-General,

appointed Assistant Commissary General; Captain James V. Oliphant, Quartermaster Second Regiment, appointed Assistant Quartermaster-General; Major D. Stewart Craven, Aide de Camp, Division Staff, appointed Assistant Quartermaster-General; Alexander R. Fordyce, Jr., late of the First Troop Cavalry, appointed Deputy Quartermaster-General; Captain Samuel S. Armstrong, Paymaster, was promoted to the rank of Major.

SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR CLAIMS.

By settlement No. 29,612 dated June 2nd, 1905, the sum of \$33,-529.71 was allowed on the Sixth Installment of Spanish-American War Claims, being for pay of officers and enlisted men of the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Regiments, Infantry, National Guard, New Jersey, from date of arrival at rendezvous at Sea Girt until date of muster into United States Service in 1898. The items of this installment disallowed and suspended amount to \$22,474.10.

As soon as the manner of adjusting the claims covered by this settlement can be determined the money will be paid to officers and men entitled thereto as rapidly as our limited clerical force will permit.

STATE CAMP GROUNDS AND ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT.

The organizations of the First Brigade, Brigadier General Edward A. Campbell, commanding, encamped at Sea Girt in July, in the following order:

First Regiment Infantry and First Troop Cavalry, July 10th to 15th.

Fourth Regiment Infantry and the Signal and Telegraph Corps, July 17th to 22nd.

Fifth Regiment Infantry and Battery A, Field Artillery, July 24th to 29th.

As the several organizations were permitted to go into camp on the Saturday preceeding the date from which pay commenced the grounds were occupied continuously from July 8th to 29th.

The system now practiced by most States at encampments, of issuing subsistence on the basis of a considerable addition to the U. S. Army ration, to be prepared and served by the men is an excellent one, and tends to make the troops better able to care for themselves in actual service and results in a material saving in the cost.

In this connection attention is respectfully called to recommendations on this subject made by the late Brigadier General Richard A. Donnelly, Quartermaster-General, in his report for 1903.

“In order that the organized militia of this State may attain to a higher degree of efficiency, and acquire a more practical knowledge of active service, I strongly recommend that the present system of preparing camps for subsequent occupancy by troops, and issuing and serving cooked rations in mess halls be abandoned, and that the necessary tentage as allowed by U. S. Regulations be delivered on the camp grounds by the Quartermaster-General's Department to be erected by troops upon arrival, and that teams, mess outfits and cooking utensils be furnished, and subsistence issued upon proper returns and requisitions to quartermasters, to be cooked by company cooks appointed by company commandants in conformity to U. S. Army regulations.”

The work on the jetties for protection to rifle pits and sea coast battery from the encroachment of the ocean has been completed. There are five of these jetties built at an aggregate cost of \$13,580.00 paid from appropriations made by the Legislature therefor. The contractor was Benjamin A. Van Brunt of Sea Bright, N. J.

Under an act approved March 29th, 1904, the Legislature provided for the acquisition by the State of land adjoining the lower part of the Camp Grounds at Sea Girt owned by the Sea Girt Land and Improvement Company, for a price not exceeding \$23,500.00. It is recommended that the money be appropriated for the purchase of this ground so that the State may have complete control and ownership of all land between the avenue leading to the ocean on the north of the Camp Grounds and Stockton lake on the south.

There has been a strong protest made against the pollution of the waters of Stockton lake, or Newbury's pond, by dumping of sewage therein by the State during the summer, alleging the destruction thereby of the crabbing and eel fishing by which many people are deprived of their living. Estimates are being made for the cost of running a sewer to the ocean to carry off such refuse and the sum necessary will be included in the budget for the supplemental appropriations to be submitted to the Appropriation Committee for consideration.

RECEIPTS FROM THE UNITED STATES.

Stores to the value of \$25,383.03 have been drawn from the United States under the provisions of the acts for arming and equipping the militia, including rifle and revolver ball cartridges for use in practice at Sea Girt to the value of \$10,338.51. Of this ammunition there is unexpended and now stored in the magazine at Sea Girt for next season's practice, ball cartridges to the value of \$3,229.92. The balance standing to the credit of the State on the books of the War Department is \$28,423.50.

Pursuant to Section 14 of the Act of January 21st, 1903, (Dick Bill), \$36,695.20 in funds, was deposited on requisition of the Governor, in the First National Bank of Trenton to the credit of Major Samuel S. Armstrong, Paymaster and Disbursing Officer, and expended as follows:
