

Mr. Henderson, from the House of Assembly, presented to this House, for their Concurrence, the following transcribed Instructions to the Delegates representing this State in the Congress of the United States:

"To the Honourable Elias Boudinot, John Witherspoon, Abraham Clark, Jonathan Elmer and Silas Condict, Efquires, Delegates repreferting this State in the Congress of the United States.

"GENTLEMEN,

"THE Legislature are informed, since their present Sitting, by a Letter from the Honourable Elias Boudinot, Esq. to His Excellency the Governor, that the important and interesting Subject of the Dispute that has long subsisted between the States of New-York and New-Hampshire, and the People on the New-Hampshire Grants, calling themselves the State of Vermont, is again under the Consideration of Congress, and also requested to give such Instructions on the said Subject as to them shall appear proper.

"The Legislature, on examining the Journals of Congress, find, that the Recognition, as an independent State, of the People on the New-Hampshire Grants, calling themselves the State of Vermont, has been resolved on by an almost unanimous Vote of Congress, therefore must conclude that Congress was convinced of the Propriety of the Measure, and are of Opinion that great Regard ought to be had to every Determination of Congress, for

Reasons too obvious to mention.

"The Legislature will give their Opinion as to some leading Facts, or, on such general Principles, as may point to the final Determination of the Subject in Dispute.

"And first, If Part of a former Colony should, at the Beginning of the Revolution,

have separated from the Rest, and assumed the Power of Government, and were in the actual Exercise of an independent Sovereignty de Facto, if such People should apply to Congress to be received into the Union, as an independent or fourteenth State, we are

of Opinion they ought to be received.

"Second, We are of Opinion that Congress, as sovereign Guardians of the United States, when they conceive the general Safety of the common Cause shall require it, can and ought to receive into the Union, as a separate. State, any Territory and People that have been from the Beginning of the Revolution, in the actual Possession of Sovereignty and Independence de Facto, without examining into the Right and Title of fuch People de Jure.

"Third, That from the Resolutions of Congress, of the 7th and 20th of August 1781, it appears that Congress ought to receive them into the Union, as an independent

State, provided they have complied with the Preliminary therein contained.

"Fourth, That the shedding the Blood of our Citizens, and every Appearance of a Civil War among ourselves at all Times, but especially at so critical a Period, should be strenuously avoided; but should Congress determine to compel Submission (which however we cannot entertain an Idea of at this Time) the Legislature takes this Opportunity, through their Delegates, to assure them, that the Matter must appear very disserent from what it now does before they will consent to imbrue their Hands in the Blood of their Brethren, who have fought and bled in one common Cause with them, or to risk the Lives of the People of their Charge in the Attempt.

"You are therefore instructed to govern yourselves in the Discussion of this Business on the aforesaid Opinions, and to use your utmost Endeavours in Congress to bring the Matter to such an Issue, as will be most likely to conduce to the general Weal of the Union, and at all Events to oppose every Measure that will endanger the involving the

States, or any of them, in a Civil War."

Which Instructions having been read and debated; after some Time spent therein, the further Confideration thereof was postponed.

The House adjourned till To-morrow Morning Nine o'Clock.

Tuesday, October 29, 1782.

The House met.

The House resumed the Consideration of the transcribed Copy of Instructions to the Delegates in Congress, sent from the House of Assembly to this House Yesterday for Concurrence, and, after being debated, the following Amendments were proposed by Mr. Beatty:

To the Honourable Elias Boudinor, John Witherspoon, Abraham Clark, Jona-THAN ELMER and SILAS CONDICT, Esquires, Delegates representing this State in the Congress of the United States:

GENTLEMEN,

PPLICATION having been made to the Legislature for Instructions on the important Subject of Dispute, subsisting between the States of New-York, New-Hampflire, and the People stiling themselves the State of Vermont, which is shortly to be decided on in Congress, they are of Opinion (as far as they have Documents to direct their Enquiry) that as the Competency of Congress was deemed full and complete at the passing of the Resolutions of the 20th of August 1781 (each of those States having made an absolute Reference of the Dispute to their final Arbitrement) that Act must be supposed to be founded in strict Justice and Propriety, nine States agreeing to the Measure, and that great Regard ought to be had to every Determination of Congress where no new Light or Matter is thrown on the Subject to reverse such their Decision, more especially

as it appears that the People of the New-Hampshire Grants have, by an Act of their Legislature, on the 22d February last, in every Instance, complied with the Preliminaries slatted as conditional to such Guarantee. The Legislature cannot conceive, however, that where a People are in the actual Exercise of an independent Sovereignty de Facto, it is sufficient to entitle them to be received into the Union without manifest Reference being had

to their being independent de Jure.

Congress being the Sovereign Guardians of the United States, ought at all Times to prefer the general Safety of the common Cause to the particular and separate Interest of any individual State; but the Urgency of the Case must be extremely great which will warrant a Decision contrary to Justice and Equity. If Jurisdiction only, and not the Right of Soil, is the Object of Contention, the Legislature will never consent to the sending any Part of the Continental Troops into the said Territory to subdue the Inhabitants to the Obedience and Subjection of the State or States that claim their Allegiance only. They disclaim every Idea of imbruing their Hands in the Blood of their Fellow-Citizens, or entering into a Civil War among themselves at so critical a Period as the Present; and would, if the Independence of the People, stiling themselves the State of Vermont, be the Alternative, submit to it rather than authorize such a Measure.

On the Question, Whether the faid Amendments be agreed to, it passed in the Affirmative, as follows:

State or States that claim their Allegiance.

"They disclaim every Idea of imbruing their Hands in the Blood of their Fellow-Citizens, or entering into a Civil War among themselves at all Times, but more especially at so critical a Period as the present, conceiving such a Step to be highly impolitic and dangerous.

"You are therefore instructed to govern yourselves in the Discussion of this Business

by the aforefaid Opinions, as far as they may apply thereto."

"You are therefore instructed to govern yourselves in the Discussion of this Business

by the aforefaid Opinions, as far as they may apply thereto."

Your Memorialist begs Leave further to observe, that as he conceives the postponing Matters to a future Sitting may be injurious to his Reputation as a publick Officer, and that it is much more in his Power at the present to rectify any Errors or Mistakes that may have been fuggested as Reasons for not agreeing to the Report of the Committee, than his Representative may be able to do, should your Memorialist be emoved by Death, or other Accident, between this and the next Sitting; and being now fully prepared and desirous to rectify, in the most full and satisfactory Manner, said Errors, if any, carnestly entreats the Honourable Legislature to grant this his just request, by ordering a further Investigation of fuch Parts of faid Accounts as may appear necessary; and your Memorialist, as in Duty bound, will ever pray.

1st Quere. What Principles have been adopted by the States in the Settlement with their

Answer. The State of New-Fersey having never undertaken to discharge the established Pay of their Line, have at no Time adopted a Principle for Settlement therewith, excepting for making Compensation for the Depreciation of their Pay.

2d Quere. Did the States confider the Army as paid by the Continent in old Money

up to August 1st, 1780?

Answer. The State of New-Jersey did consider the Army as paid by the Continent in old Money up to August the 1st, 1780.

3d Quere. If so, at what Rate of Depreciation did they charge their Line for the old

Money from April 1st to August 1st, 1780?

Answer. The Table of Depreciation, agreeably to which Compensation was made to the Line of this State, for the Depreciation of their established Pay, herewith transmitted to you will fully shew.

4th Quere. Have they made up any Depreciation for Subliftence Money?

Answer. The State of New-Jersey has not, as no Resolution of Congress ever required

5th Quere. If any of the States have fettled with their Lines to a later Time than August 1st, 1780, to what Period have they continued their Settlement?

Answer. The State of New-Jersey has not settled to a later Period than August 1st, 1780, nor till that Period excepting for Compensation as before mentioned.

6th Lyere. What Pay or Articles have been accounted for, supposed to have been re-

ceived from the Continent on Account, alter August 1780?

Answer. There is neither Pay nor any Articles that have been accounted for by the Line of this State advanced thereto on Account of the Continent fince August 1780.

7th Quere. Have the States any Accounts against their Lines which remained to be stopped? What are they? And to whom are they to be charged in the Settlement now

making with the Army?

Answer. The State of New-Jersey has an Account against their Line which remains to be stopped against the Officers for certain Articles of Clothing furnished, and one Month's Pay advanced; against the Privates for one Month's Pay advanced; for more particular Information on the first of these two Articles the State would refer the Paymaster-General to the Accounts of the Clothier of this State, which the Legislature will direct to be

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forwarded with all Dispatch; and on the second to Absalom Martin and John Peck, Paymasters of the Line of this State, who have drawn from the Treasury the Sum of Three Thousand One Hundred and Twenty-seven Pounds Twelve Shillings and Six-pence, who were directed to transmit Copies of their Pay-Rolls so discharged to the Paymaster-General of the Army, that the same might be credited to this State; and to Lieutenant William Pennington, of the fecond Regiment of Artillery, who has drawn from the Treasury the Sum of Four Hundred and Forty-one Dollars and Two-thirds, being the Amount of the Pay Ab-fracts of the Officers and Privates belonging to the fecond Regiment of Artillery and Artillery Artificers, credited to this State as Part of their Quota for the Month of August, 1780, who was directed to transmit a Copy of the said Pay Abstracts so discharged to the Paymaster-General of the Army, that the same might be credited to this State.'

"To the UNITED STATES in CONGRESS affembled.

The Representation and Remonstrance of the Legislative-Council and Ge-NERAL ASSEMBLY of the State of New-Jersey,

Sherveth,

THAT the Legislature of this State is informed that the important Subject of the Western, or what is commonly called the Crown Lands, is soon to be reconsidered, and finally determined by Congress, especially as far as relates to the Cession made by the Legislature of the State of Virginia in January, 1781, of a Part of the western Country or vacant Territory. The Legislature cannot but express their Surprize on hearing that the Confideration of the Subject is refumed by Congress so speedily after its last Discussion, as appears by an Act of Congress of the 18th of April last past, which is contained in the following Words:

"That as a further Mean as well of hastening the Extinguishment of the Debts as of establishing the Harmony of the United States, it be recommended to the States which have passed no Acts towards complying with the Resolutions of Congress of the 6th of September and 10th of October, 1780, relative to the Cession of the territorial Claims, to make the liberal Cessions therein recommended; and to the States which may have passed Acts complying with the faid Resolutions in Part only, to revise and complete such Compliance;"

which faid Act has been officially laid before us during the present Sitting, and appears defigned by Congress to be transmitted to every State in the Union, not only to the Legislatures thereof, but to the People at large: The Legislature of this State much be of Opinion, that the latter Part of the faid Recommendation of Congress was expressly applicable to the Act of the Legislature of the Commonwealth of Virginia, as the Cession thereby made has heretofore been deemed by Congress a partial one, and by this State partial, unjust and illiberal.

The Legislature, to avoid unnecessary Repetition, beg Leave, in the most earnest Manner, to call the Attention of Congress to the Records in their Possession, of the Proceedings of the Legislature of this State with Regard to the present Subject, beginning with their Representation of the 16th of June, 1778, and at different Periods since, in which are fully contained the jult and uncontrovertible Claims of this State to its full Proportion of

all vacant Territory.

It is particularly disagreeably to have Occasion to trouble Congress with so many Applications on this Head; but the Importance of the Subject, the Danger of so much Property being unjustly wrested from us, together with its being our indispensable Duty, in Justification and Defence of the Rights of the People we represent, must be our Apology. We cannot be filent, while viewing one State aggrandizing herself by the unjust Detention of that Property which has been procured by the common Blood and Treasure of the Whole, and which, on every Principle of Reason and Justice, is vested in Congress for the Use and general Benefit of the Union they represent.

They doubt not the Disposition of Congress to redress every Grievance that may be laid before them; and are of Opinion, that there can be no greater Cause for Complaint, nor

more just Reasons for Redress, than in the present Case.

They do therefore express their Distaissaction with the Cession of western Territory made by the State of Virginia in January, 1781, as being far short of assording that Justice which is equally due to the United States at large, and request that Congress will not accept of the faid Cession, but that they will press upon the said State to make a more liberal Surrender of that Territory of which they Claim io boundless a Proportion.

The Legislature place the utmost Considence in the Wisdom and Justice of Congress, and assure themselves, that as far as it lies in the Power of that august Body, the Rights of every State in the Union will be strictly maintained."
