

TREASURER'S OFFICE, TRENTON, N. J., December 16th, 1869.

To the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

The Joint Committee of the Legislature to examine the accounts of William P. McMichael, State Treasurer, would respectfully report: That they have carefully examined the same, together with the vouchers for receipts and disbursements, compared them, and found them in every particular correct. The books in which the transactions of the past fiscal year are included, together with the balances remaining from the business of former years, were found in all the financial departments entrusted to the Treasurer to be as expressed in the balance sheet and statements hereto annexed.
