# PANEL DISCUSSION WITH NEW JERSEY AUTHORS

Join this stimulating and thought-provoking panel discussion with authors of TBBC's first recorded books. All of these books are in the final stages of production and will be in TBBC's collection by October.

Buckley, Charles and Richard Muti. (2012). **The Charmer: The True Story of Robert Reldan - Rapist, Murderer, and Millionaire - and the Women who Fell Victim to his Allure.** Green Bay, WI: TitleTown Pub. In this true crime biography, retired prosecutor Charles Buckley and retired Deputy Attorney General Richard Muti describe their hunt to successfully convict Robert Reldan, a violent serial killer who preyed on women in New Jersey. Narrated by Audiovision volunteers Sue Pandak and Linda Lengyl.

Di lonno, Mark. (2012). **The Last Newspaperman: A Novel**. Medford NJ: Plexus Pub. Mark is an award-winning *Star Ledger* reporter. This suspense novel, set in New Jersey in the 1930s during the Lindbergh baby case and the heyday of print newspapers, portrays a journalist's struggle to balance the need for sensational headlines with his desire to accurately educate and inform the public. Narrated by Audiovision volunteer Edith Beckett.

Garrabrant, Roy. (2008). **Sunset: A Macular Journey**. Indianapolis, IN: Authorhouse. In this memoir, Ray chronicles the loss of his vision due to wet macular degeneration. His memoir poignantly describes his journey to understand the emotional, physical, and social consequences of his disease. Narrated by Audiovision volunteer James Degnen.

Hartmann, John W. (2012). Jacket: The Trials of a New Jersey Criminal Defense Attorney. Medford, New Jersey: Plexus Publishing Inc. In this memoir, John shares "war stories" and hilarious anecdotes from his many years as a criminal defense attorney in New Jersey. Narrated by Audiovision volunteer Austin O'Malley.

Ingle, Bob and Sandy McClure. (2008). **The Soprano State: New Jersey's Culture of Corruption**. NY: St. Martin's Press. Award-winning investigative journalists, Bob Ingle and Sandy McClure, give us a sobering look at the behind-the scenes dealings of our Garden State. This book was a *New York Times* Bestseller and was made into a documentary film. Narrated by Audiovision volunteer Bill Larson.

# NEW TAGS HELP TBBC'S SHIPPING DEPARTMENT TRACK BOOKS

TBBC is using a new tagging method to help speed up the circulation process for digital talking books. With this new process, our staff will no longer need to open and inspect each and every audiobook returned to us. We ask that our readers not send any notes or requests as paper inserts with returning audiobooks since our staff may not see these notes to act on them. Please call our library at (800) 792-8322 if you wish to notify us of any changes to make to your reading profile or if you wish to request any particular books or authors.

# AUDIO MAGAZINES NOW ON DIGITAL CARTRIDGE

In the spring of 2013 the National Library Service for the Blind and Handicapped ('NLS') began sending magazines in digital cartridge format. Now all NLS-produced magazines are circulated this way, and we hope you enjoy this new service. As with books on digital cartridge, the magazines need to be returned to help keep costs down and potentially expand the magazine program. The cartridge loan period for weekly publications is one week after you receive them. The cartridge loan period for monthly, bimonthly, and quarterly publications is one month after you receive them. **Please treat magazine cartridges the same as book cartridges; read your publications, return the cartridge to the red container, flip the mailing card on the container, and place it with your outgoing mail.** Timely reading and returning

of magazine cartridges will help NLS continue to provide the high-quality audiomagazine program you have enjoyed.

In some cases you may receive a magazine cartridge that has more than one magazine on it. You will need to use the digital talking-book player bookshelf feature to navigate between your magazine issues. To activate the bookshelf feature, press and hold the green, rectangular Play/Stop button on your player until you hear the player announce "Bookshelf". Using the FF and RW buttons you can move from issue to issue on the cartridge. Complete audio instructions for using the bookshelf feature are included on all cartridges that contain more than one magazine issue.

#### Enjoy your audio magazines, but please remember to return them.

# **CUSTOMIZING YOUR BARD ACCOUNT**

Want to know how to customize your BARD account?

On the BARD main page, select the link for "**Update Account Settings**." From this page there are several options that allow you to adjust your account.

"Change your Password" – Be sure to note the requirements and restrictions for this action

"Change your email address" – Changing your email address changes your BARD login ID.

"Add a Purchased Player" – After reviewing your name and address detail, select the type of player you will use from the drop down box that follows the ZIP code field. Currently, users can only listen to BARD books on a device listed in this category.

**Color Settings** –The default setting for the BARD display is color. If you prefer a black and white screen display, select the drop-down menu and change the setting to black/white.

**Display Results** – Web Braille has been incorporated into BARD. The default setting for all BARD accounts is to retrieve both audio files and Braille files. If you only want to retrieve one type of file, select the drop down menu. You will be able to choose Audio Only or Braille Only.

**Password reset question and answer** – In order to directly reset a lost or forgotten BARD password, users must have a security question and answer on account. If you want to add or change the question or answer on your account, complete the fields given for "Your question" and "Your secret answer."

Be sure to remember to activate the "**Update**" button after making any changes to your account. If you need assistance with any of these account settings, please call TBBC at (800) 792-8322.

#### COMING SOON!

The National Library Service for the Blind and Handicapped ('NLS') intends to release a version of an iOS mobile app for use with the Braille and Audio Reading Download ('BARD') service in the fall of 2013. The app will work on the iPhone 3GS or later, a fourth- or fifth-generation iPod touch, or any iPad. TBBC hopes to have more detail to share with our patrons on this app in time for our next newsletter.
