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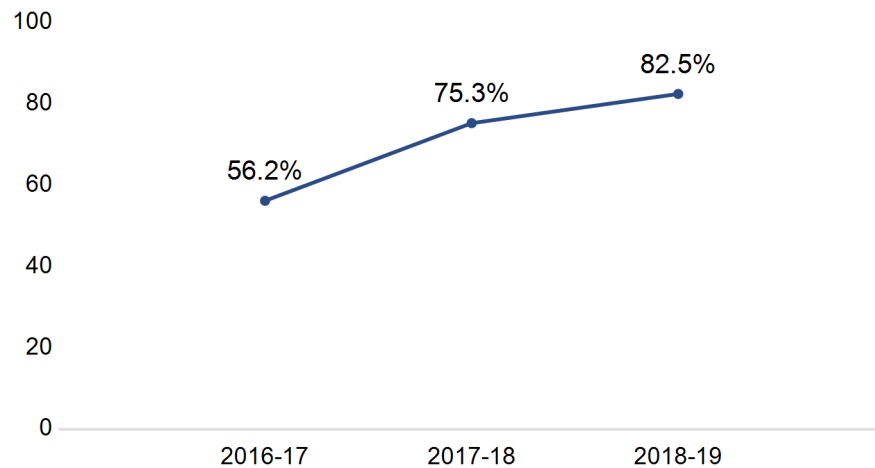
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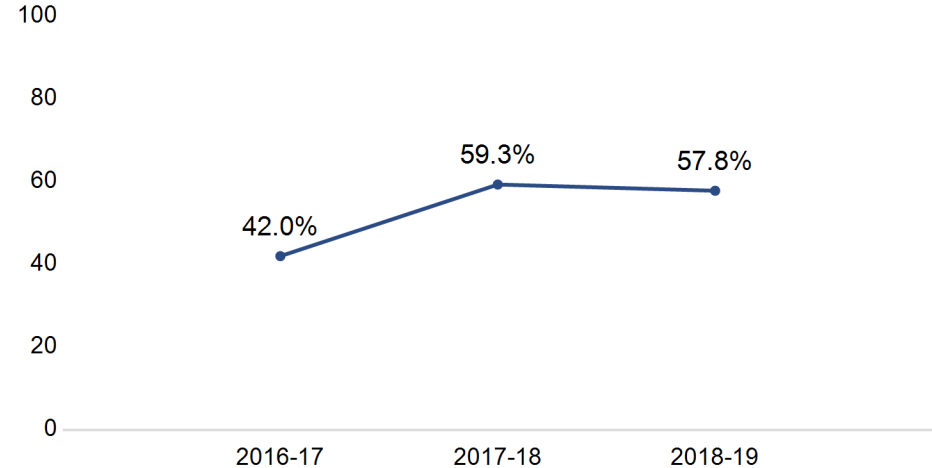
English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the statewide assessment (NJSLA for 2018-19 and PARCC for 2016-17 and 2017-18) and the DLM alternate assessment. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students that met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA/PARCC or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. NJSLA/PARCC results include only students in grades 3 through 10. Students that were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. 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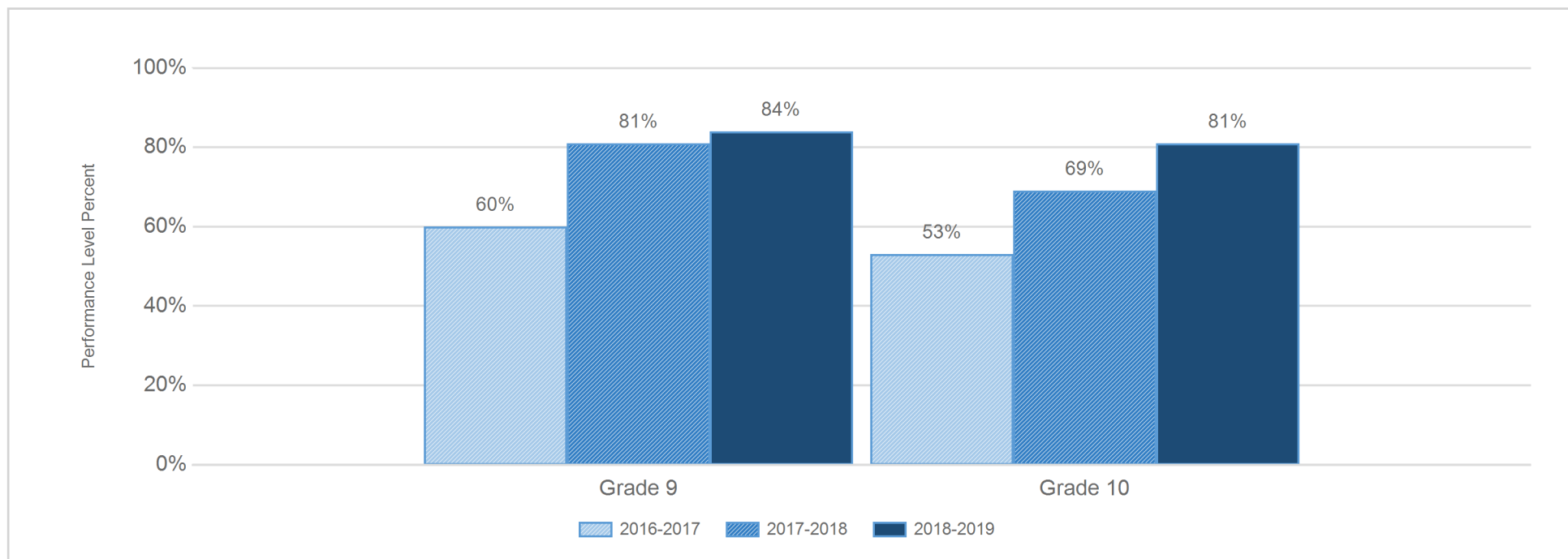

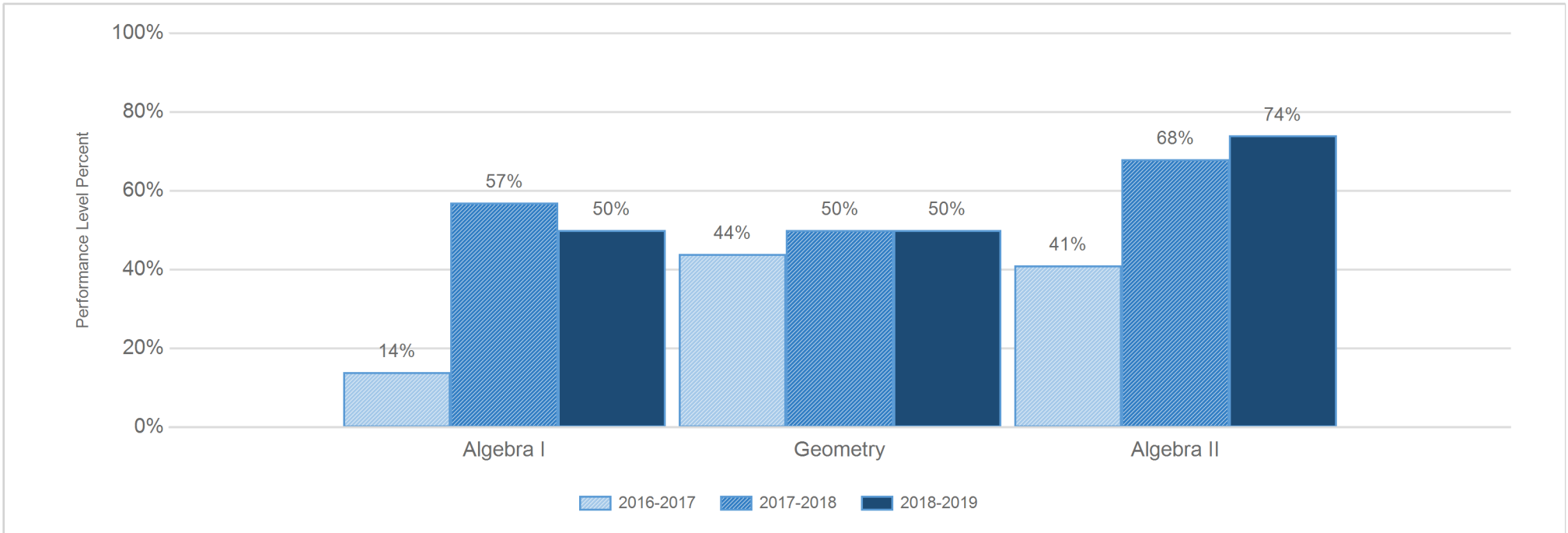

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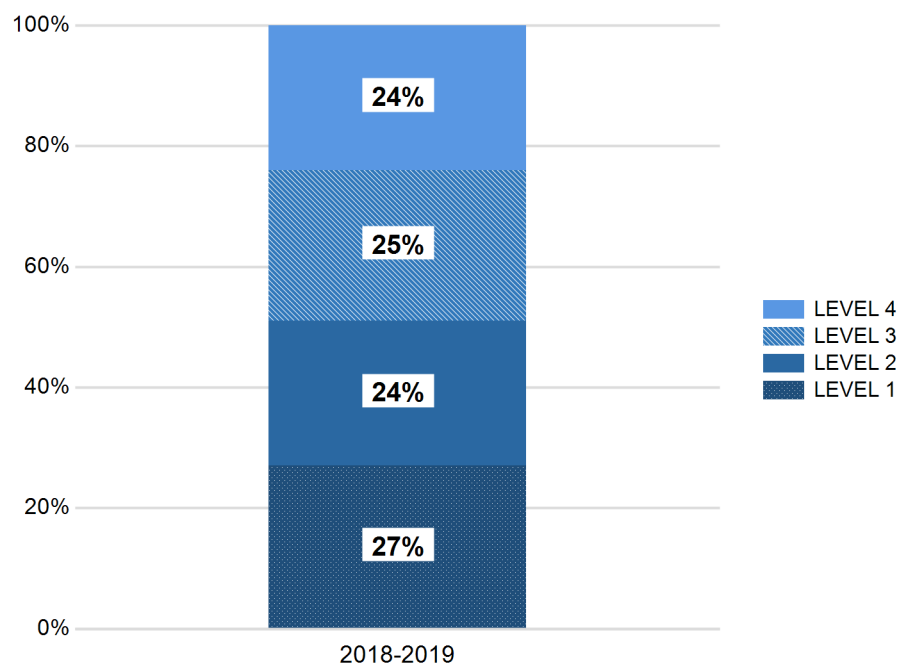

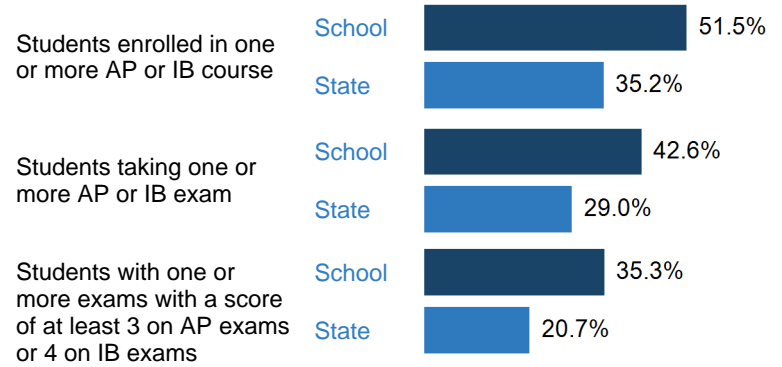

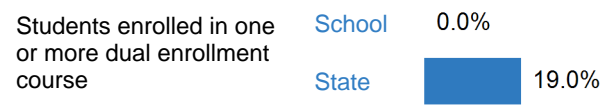
AP/IB Coursework – Participation and Performance

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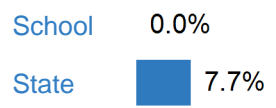

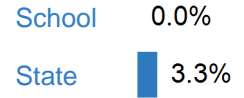

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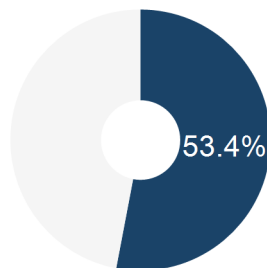

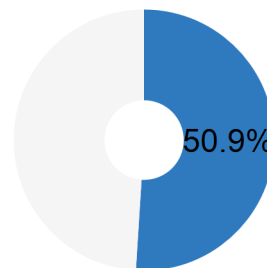

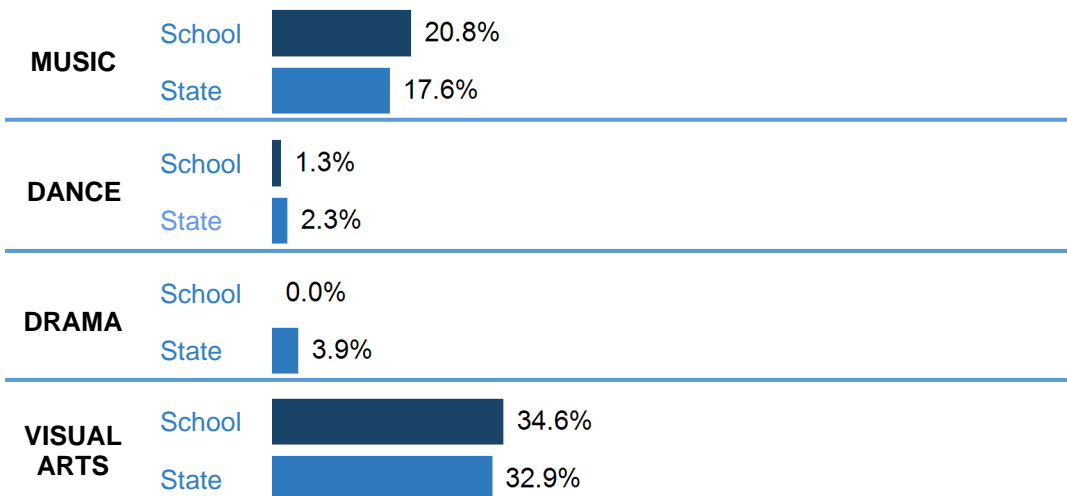

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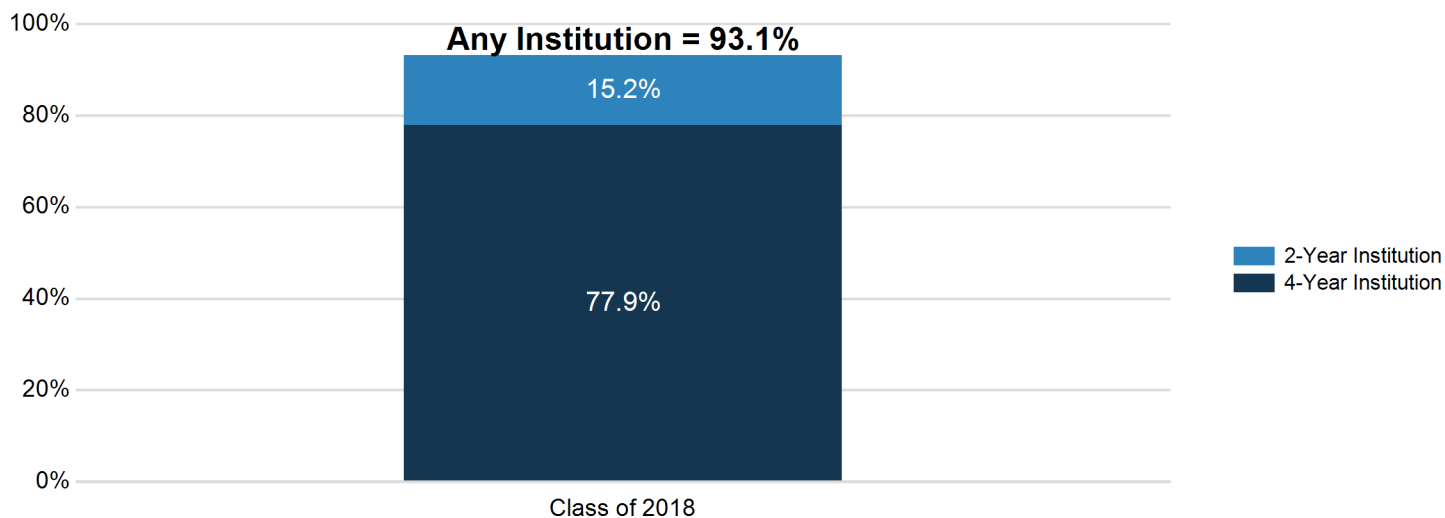

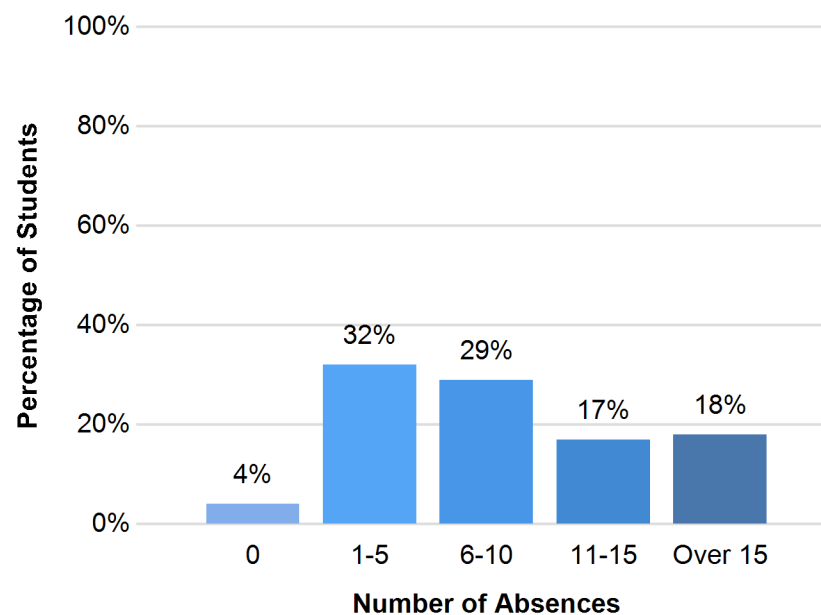

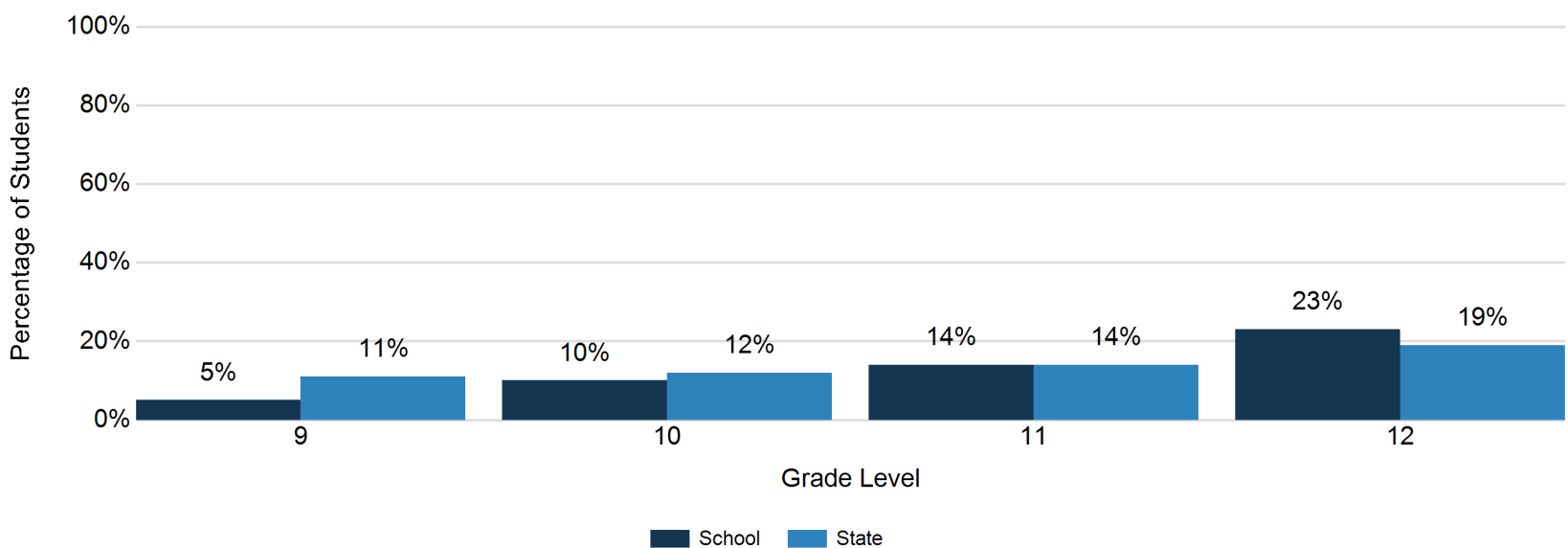
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

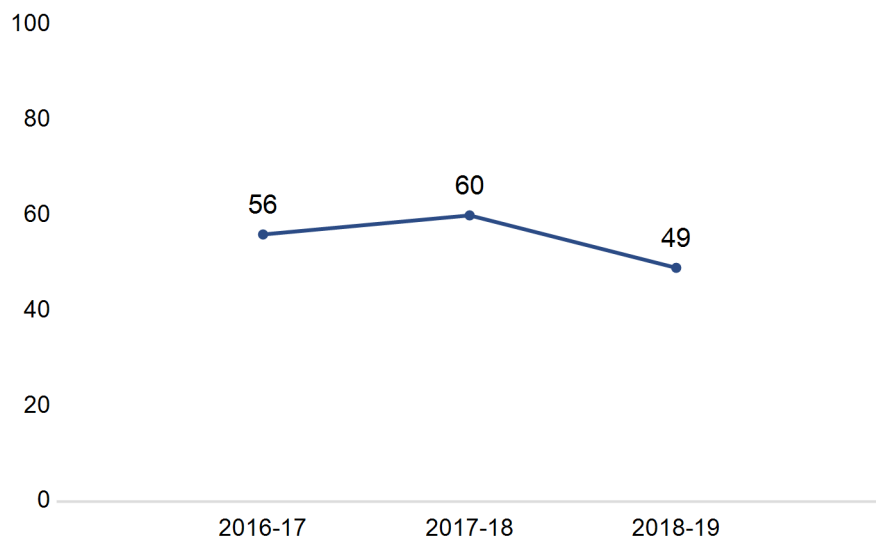
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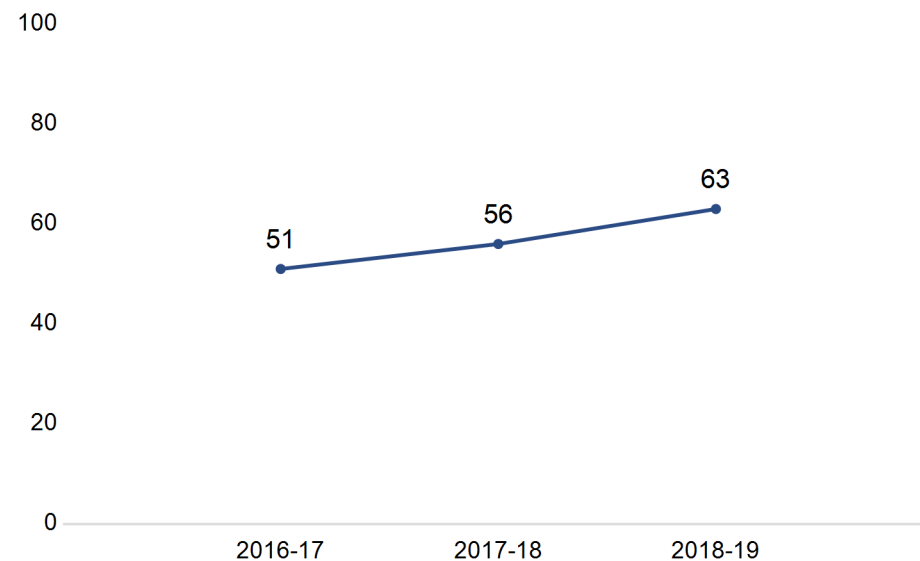

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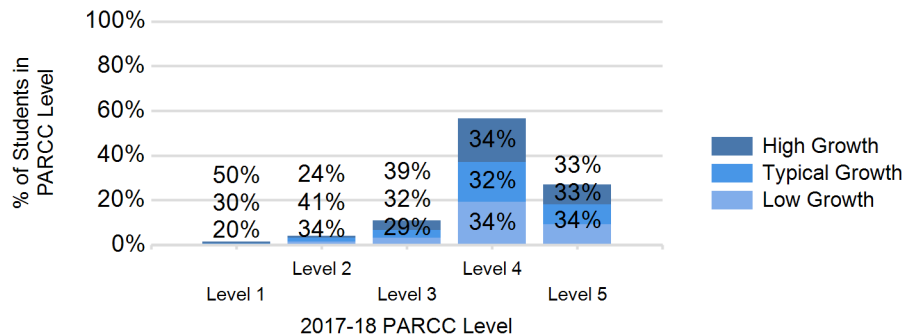
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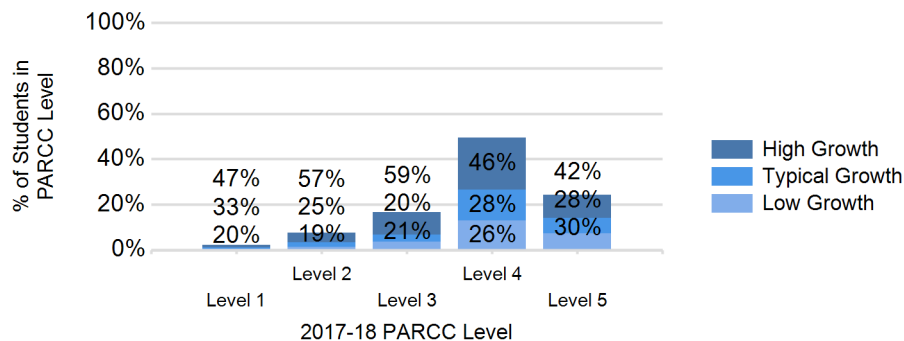
Student Growth by Performance Level

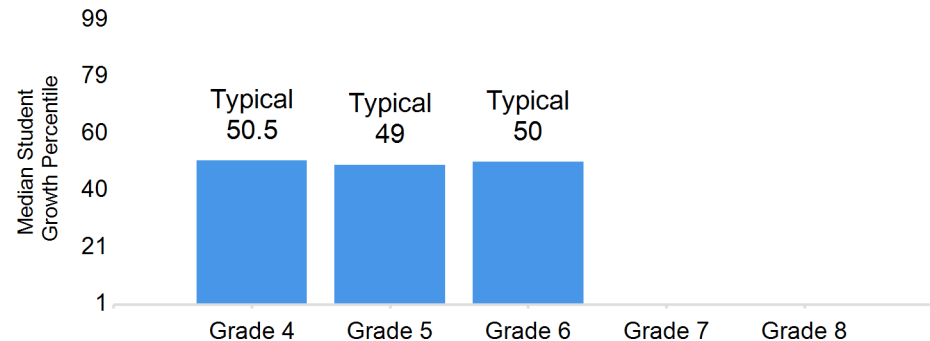

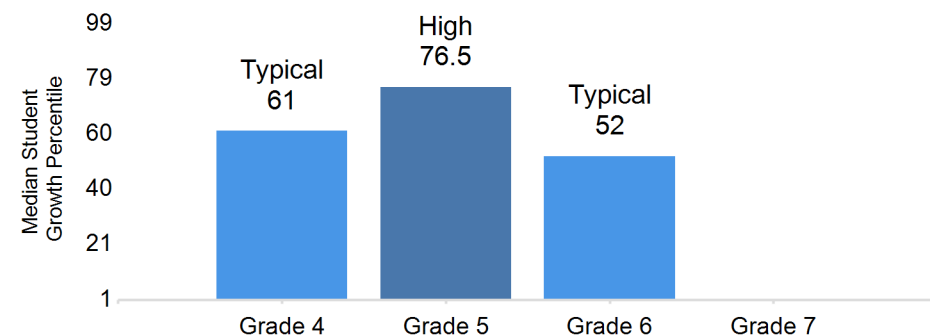
Student Growth by Grade

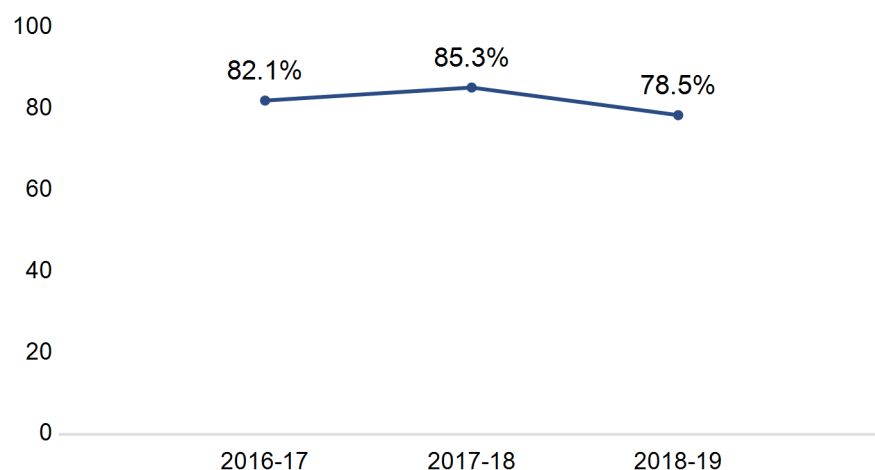
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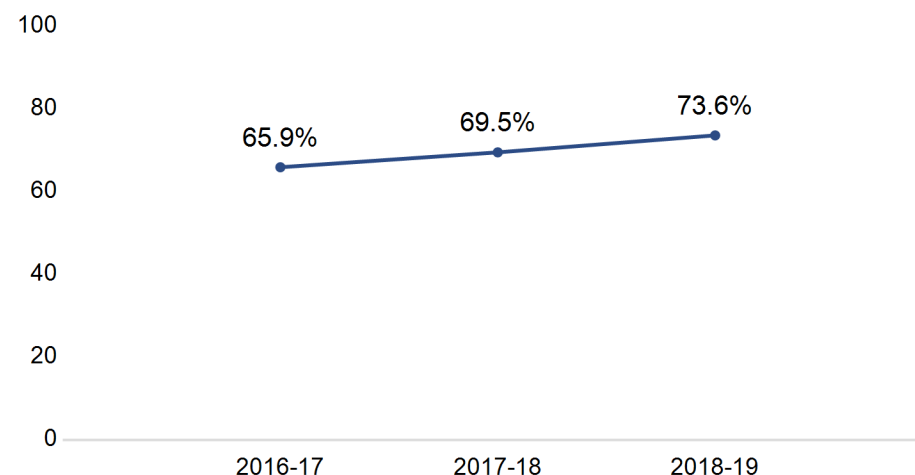

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English Language Arts Assessment - Participation and Performance

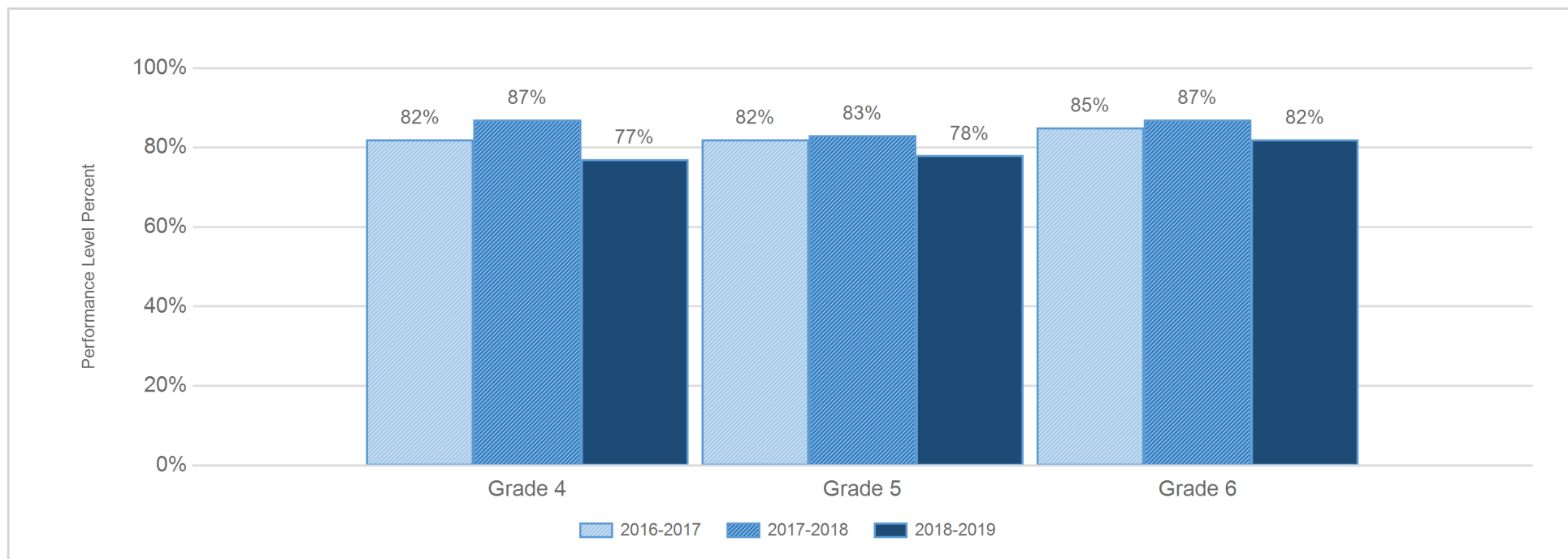

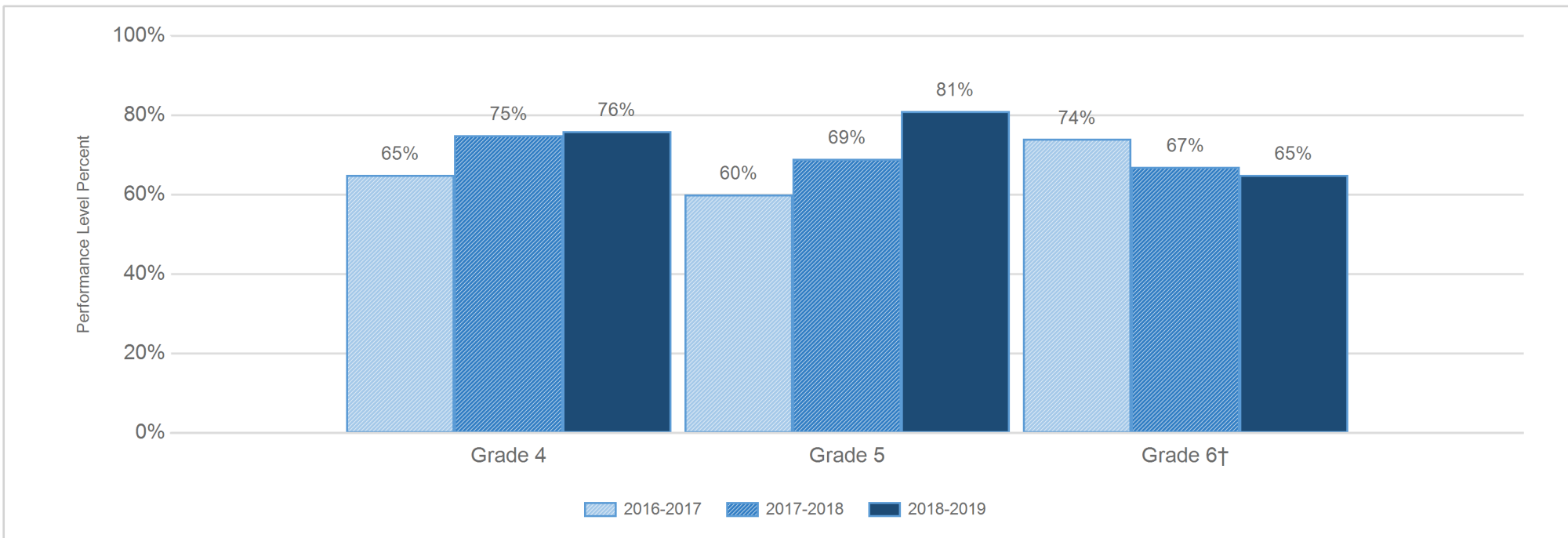

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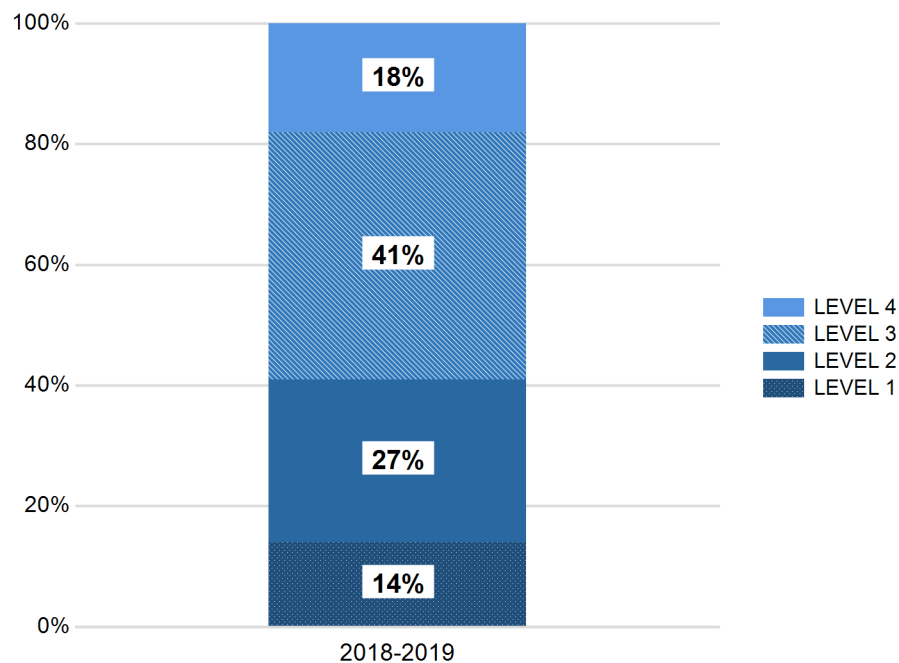

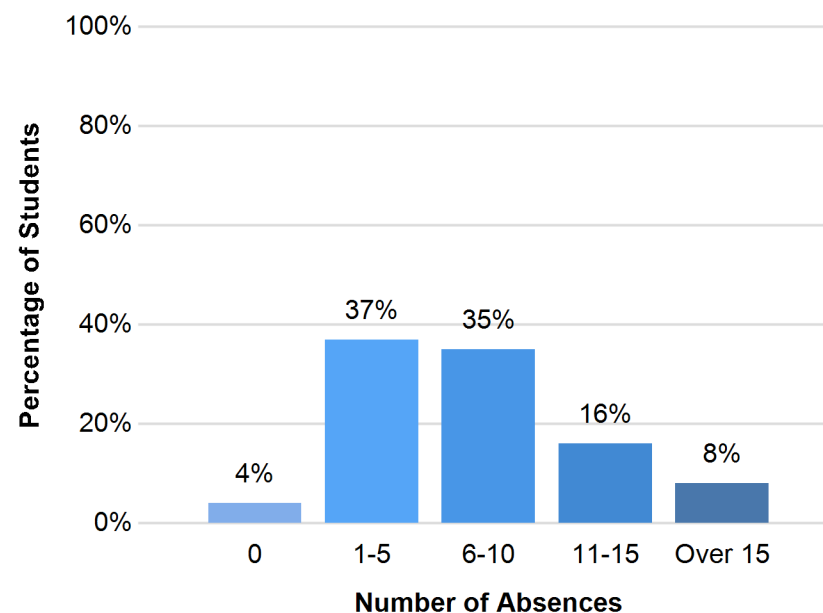

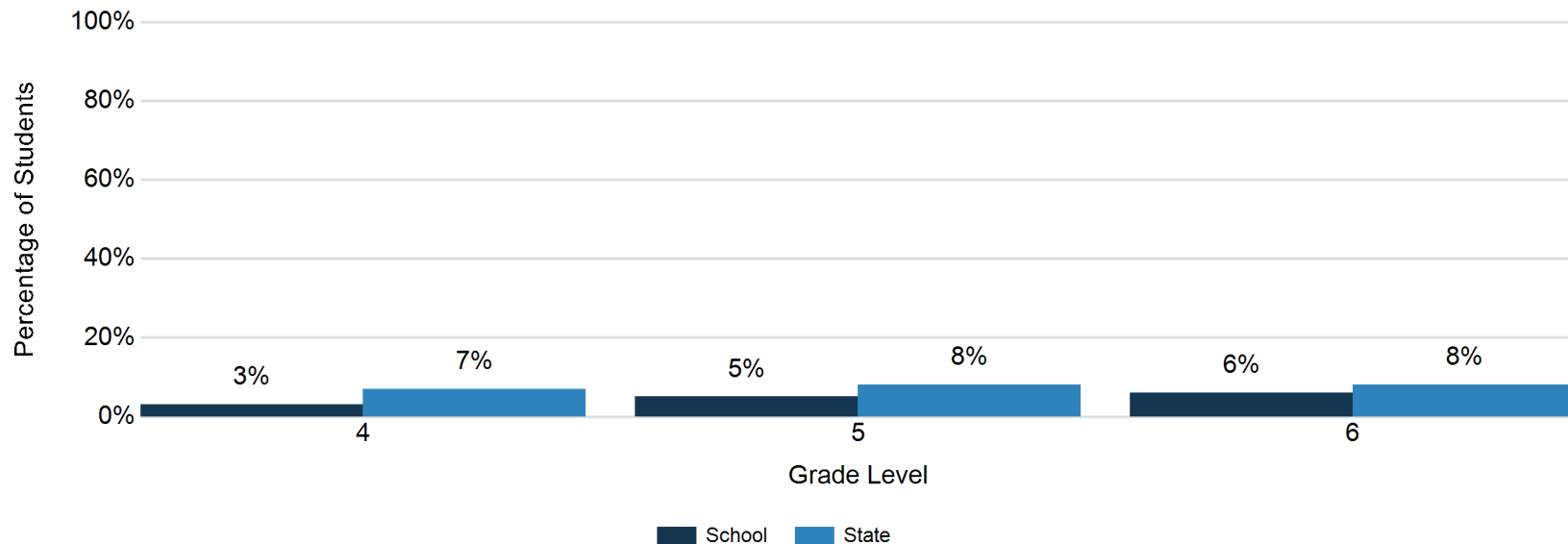
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

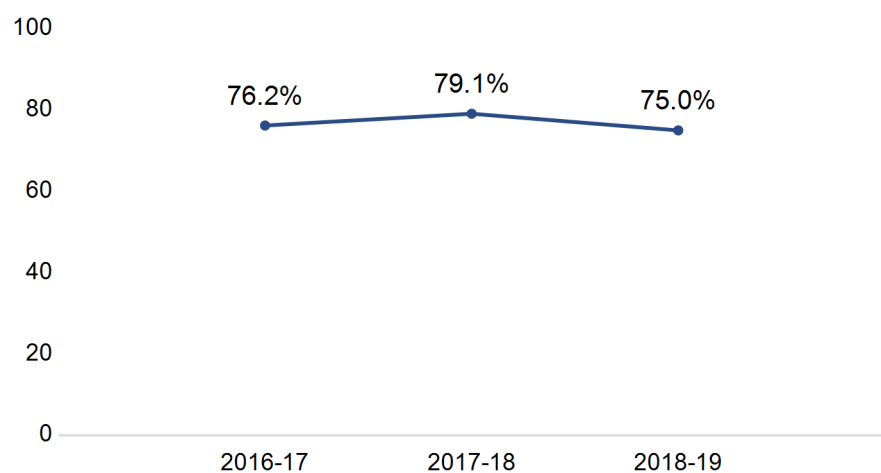
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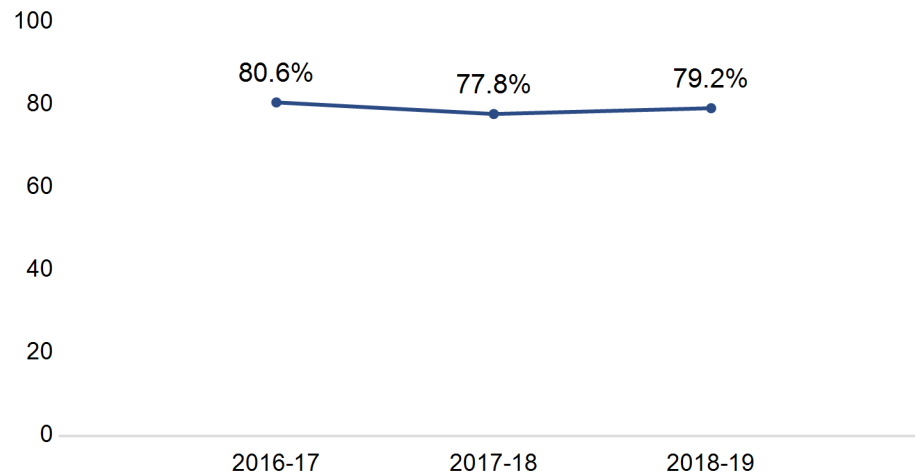

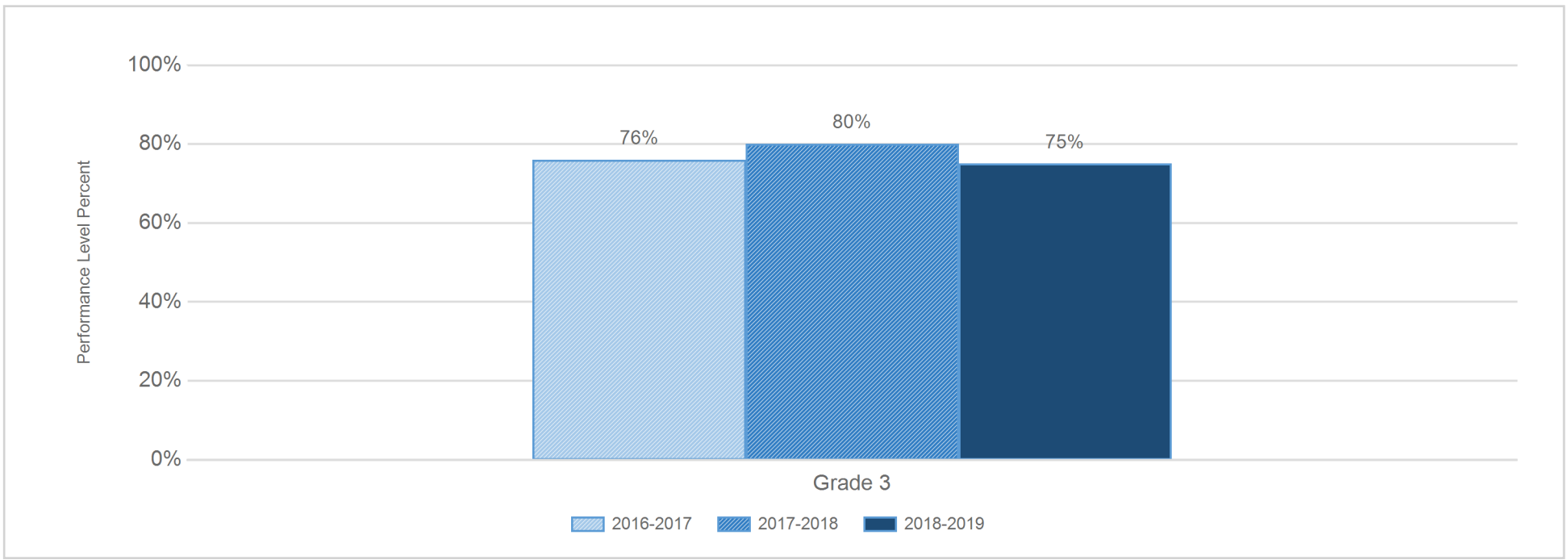

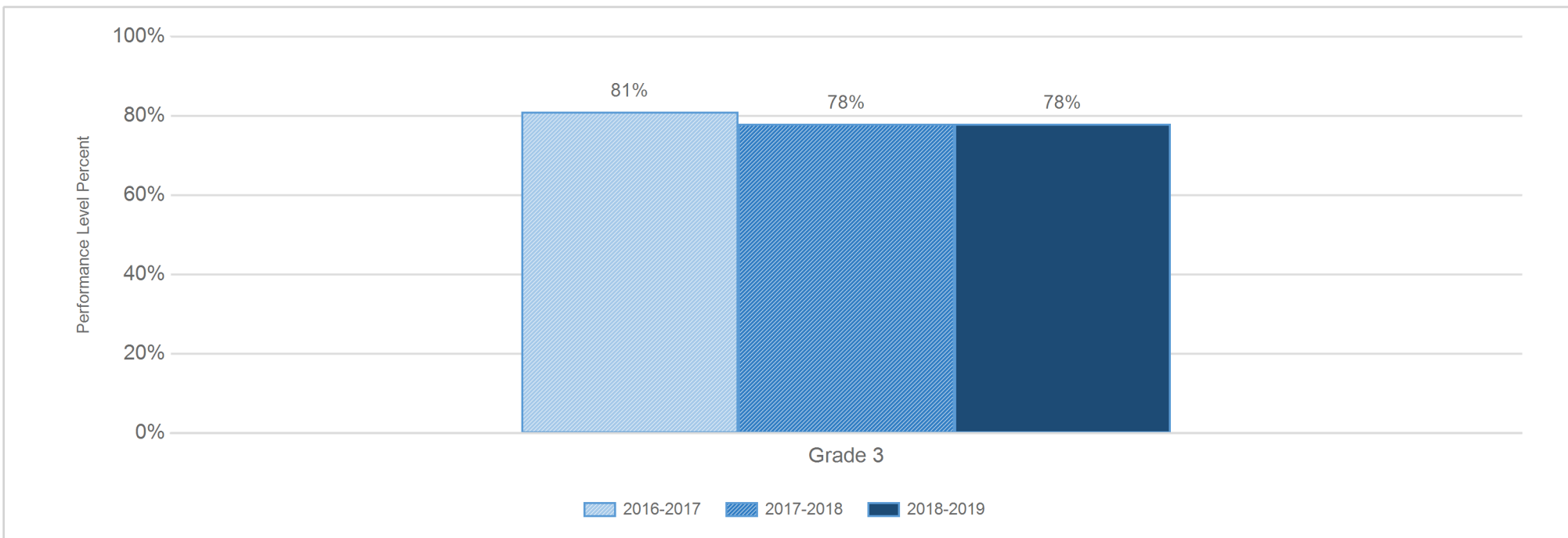

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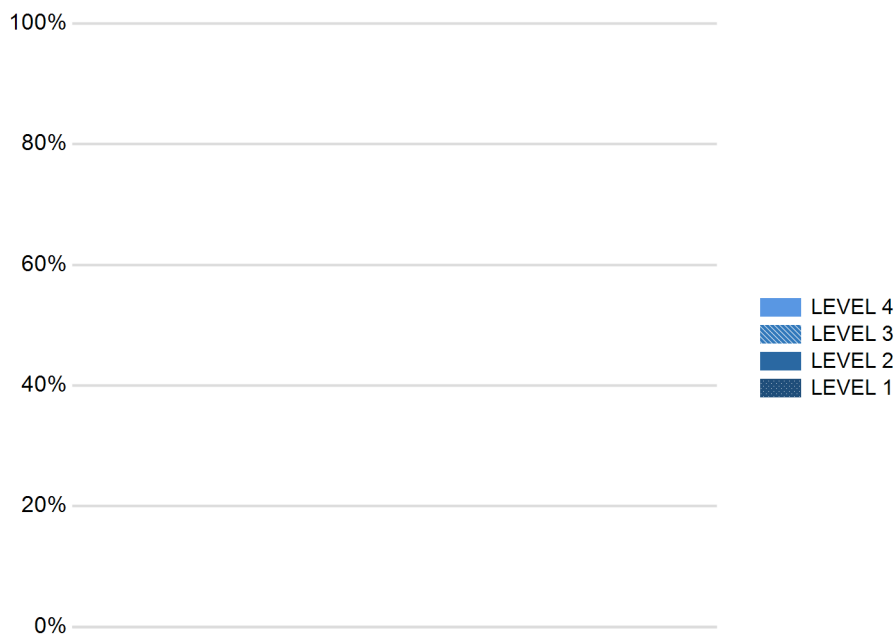

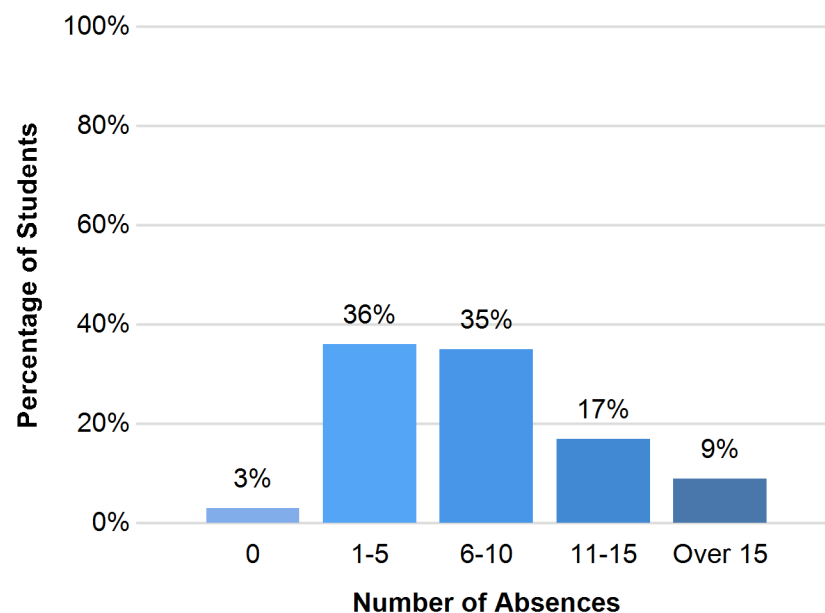

This graph shows the percentage of K-12 students by the number of days they were absent during the school year.





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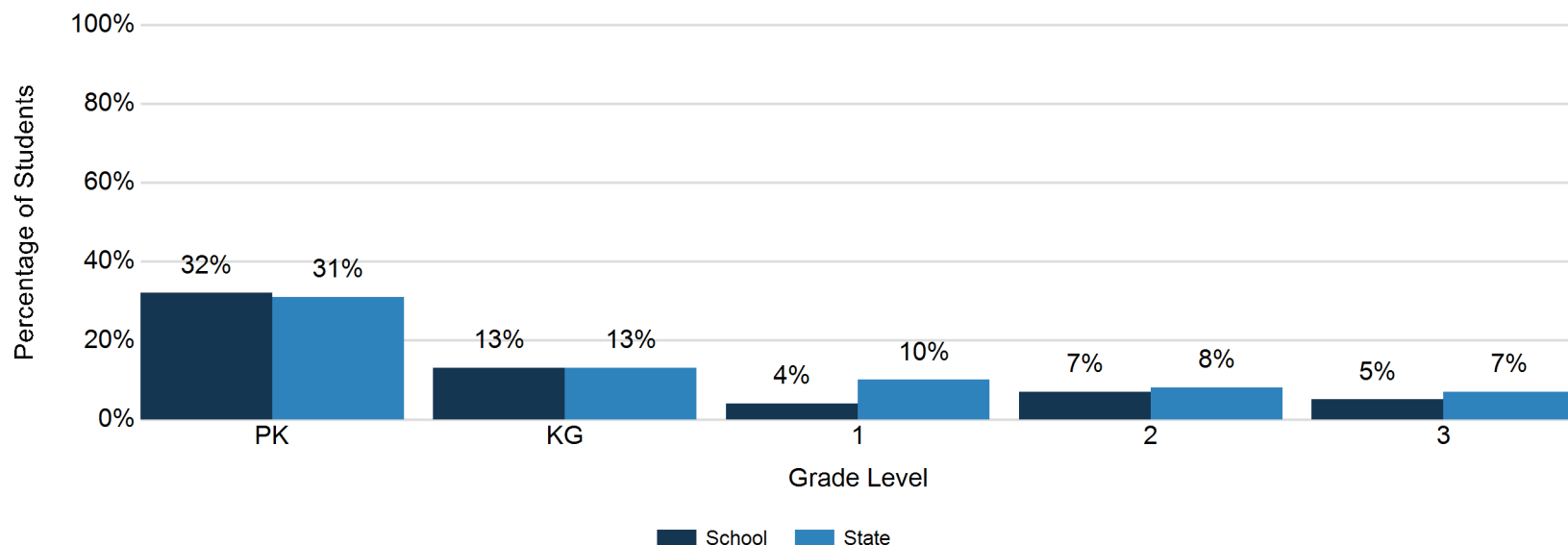
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

- The educational program in Holmdel is designed to enable students to excel in an environment, which acknowledges their needs, develops their strengths, and supports them in reaching their potential.



Mission, Vision, Theme:

The mission of the Holmdel Township Public Schools is to provide a comprehensive and caring educational environment that will develop the potential of every pupil into achievement. In partnership with our community, the school district will support all our pupils' efforts to meet and exceed the New Jersey Student Learning Standards, and to become responsible and resourceful citizens and life-long learners.



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Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

Village students participate in a program of study that includes rigorous instruction in the areas of mathematics, language arts literacy, science, and social studies. Our literacy program is designed to develop and strengthen reading and writing skills through a balanced literacy approach by incorporating all of the key components of language arts including listening, speaking, reading, writing and word study. The math program is designed to help students develop a conceptual understanding of important math concepts through problem based interactive learning, visual learning bridges, and visual learning animations. Formative assessments are interwoven throughout the curriculum at the lesson and topic level. Fine Arts and Health are addressed through art, music, health, and physical education courses. World language is taught in grades one through three. Learning experiences are enhanced and enriched through field trips, assemblies, special programs, and technology.



Clubs and Activities:

There are several after school clubs offered at Village. We host Lego Camp, Chess Club, a Soccer Club, and a Unified Sports Club, which includes different inclusive camps focused on basketball, soccer, and track and field. Our 2nd and 3rd grade students also compete in both the Continental Math League and National Language Arts Olympiad.





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 <p>Before and After School Programs:</p>	<p>We offer a before school and after school program for children in grades K-3 called Primetime. This program is available for our school community to assist working families, as well as to offer children a social environment to engage with friends and work on homework assignments in the afternoon.</p>
 <p>Staff and Professional Learning:</p>	<p>Staff development remains a strong focus. Staff members participated in a variety of in-district courses, out-of-district professional workshops, Professional Learning Teams, and graduate programs. A strong emphasis continued to be placed on technology, differentiated instruction, and social/emotional learning. We have been fortunate to offer many workshop opportunities to our staff through our own staff members. There are also a number of teacher leaders at Village School who share their expertise during grade-level/staff meetings and during staff professional development days.</p>






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 <p>Student Supports and Services:</p>	<p>Our Intervention and Referral Services Committee meets regularly to determine strategies for students who struggle during the day. This may result in actions plans that tie in best practices in teaching, as well as offering our children a basic skills program (Achieve). We offer special services programs based on student needs. Our programs run from our least restrictive environment intervention of a full day in-class support model to self-contained settings for students requiring a more intensive program to meet their needs. We have an ELL teacher who works with students, families, and teachers across our two elementary schools. We also offer a gifted and talented program (Voyagers) that provides these children with enrichment opportunities in and out of their classrooms.</p>
 <p>Student Health and Wellness:</p>	<p>Village students participate in physical education classes for 50 minutes three times a week. Students also have a daily recess period that promotes play, getting our students outside and engaging in physical activity. Our grade 1-3 students also have health as part of their program through the year. This allows our PE teachers the opportunity to promote health & wellness in a more structured way. Students also benefit from a variety of different mindfulness practices incorporated into the day by our teaching staff.</p>
 <p>Parent and Community Involvement:</p>	<p>Parent involvement is a key component to Village School's success. In addition to the annual Back-To-School nights and parent teacher conferences, the Village parents run the school store, host after-school activities, serve as chaperones on field trips, and sponsor cultural arts programs for the students. Fundraising from major events enables the PSA to purchase many items to enhance student learning and add to our wonderful school environment.</p>



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Facilities:

Thanks to the successful passing of our district's referendum, the Holmdel 2020 project has improved the Village School through the renovation of our 2nd and 3rd grade Art Room and Gymnasium floor. In addition, small group instruction rooms were added to the building, along with a state-of-the-art STEAM lab.



School Safety:

The safety of all school community members is critically important. All students and staff comply with safety procedures at all times. Classrooms have established procedures and protocols in place. Safety/Security drills are conducted monthly to ensure the effectiveness of protocols in place in the event of an emergency.

K students have use of computers in their classrooms and in the computer lab. Students in grades 1, 2, and 3 have individual technology devices in their classrooms. In addition, thanks to the passing of our referendum, a state of the art STEAM lab has been constructed for our students.</p>
 <p style="text-align: center;">Early Childhood Education:</p>	<p>Village School offers a half-day Preschool program four days a week. Through the incorporation of the Tools of the Mind Curriculum, academic and social development is promoted through authentic experiences, center-based learning and continuous opportunities for developmentally appropriate play.</p>

Village School offers a comprehensive program to its PK-3 students by providing educational experiences in partnership with the school community. The goal is to ensure our students acquire knowledge, skills, and attitudes necessary to become productive and responsible citizens. 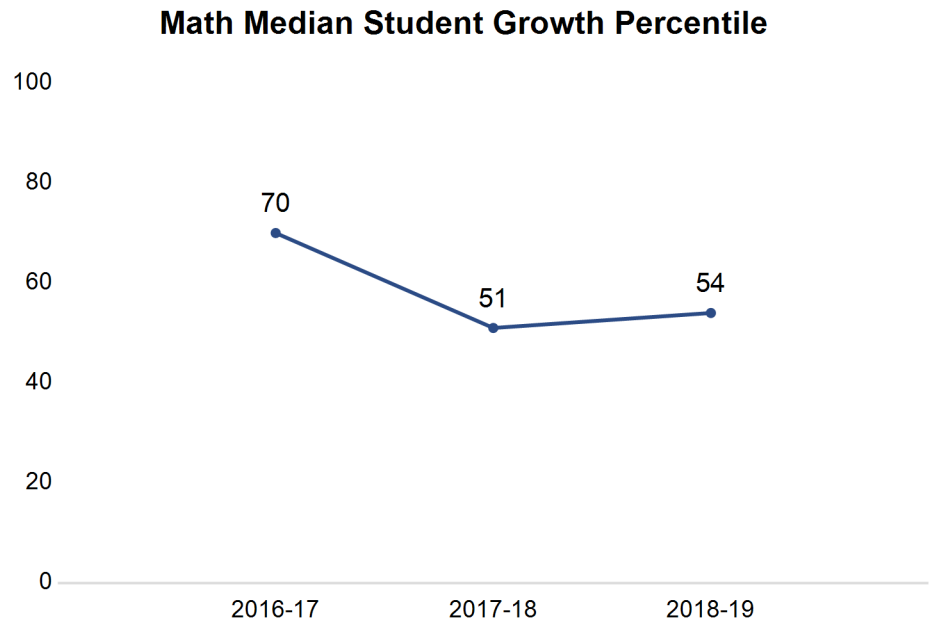

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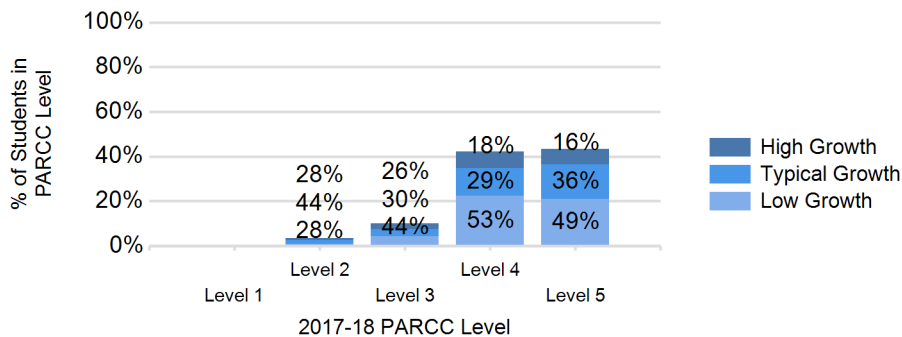

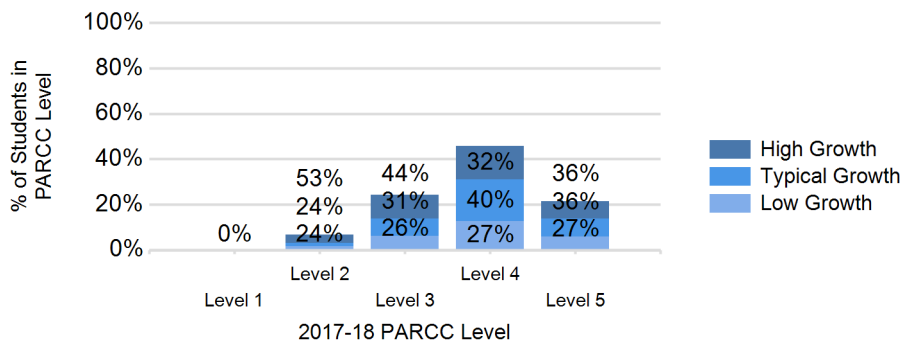
Student Growth by Performance Level

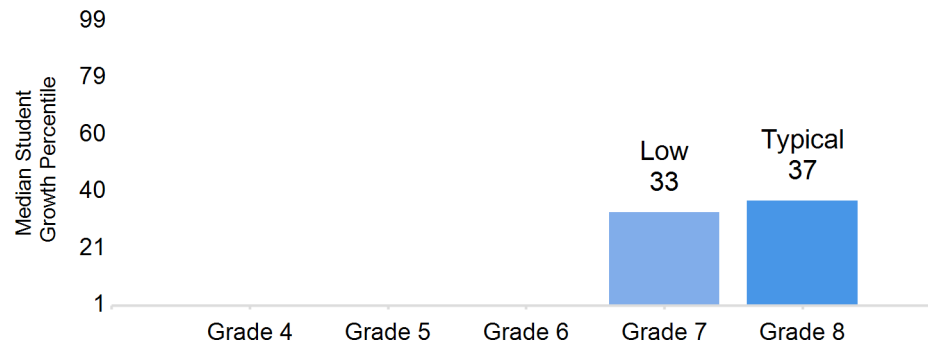

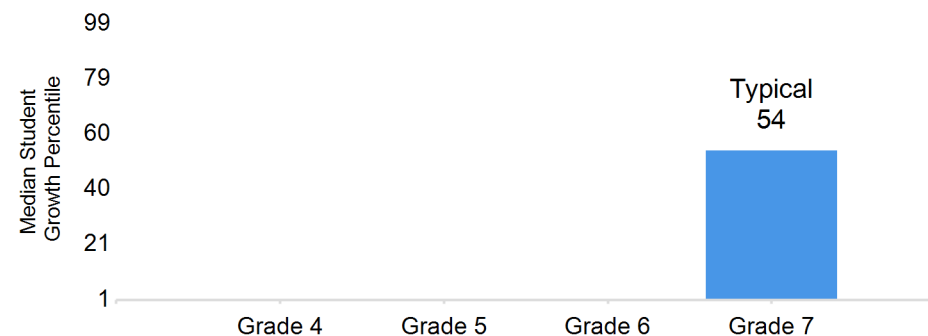
Student Growth by Grade

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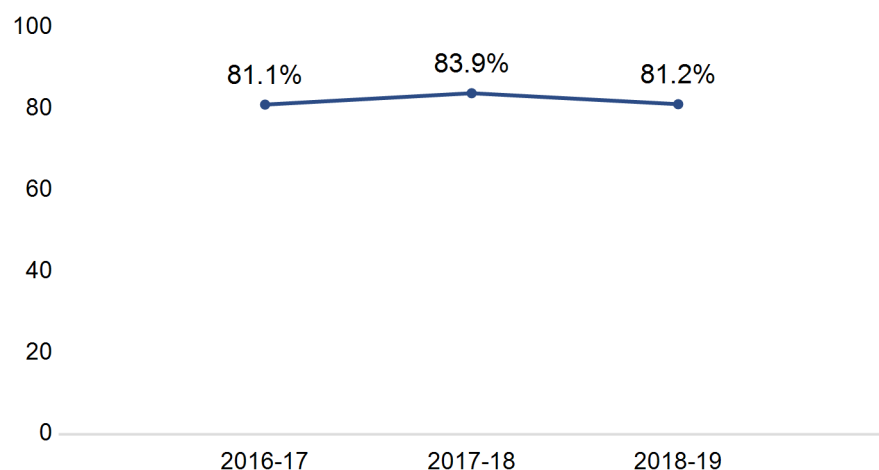
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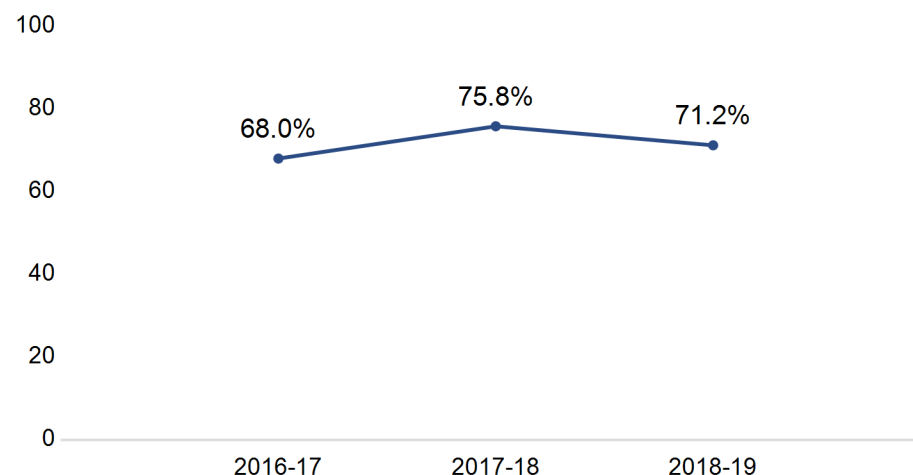

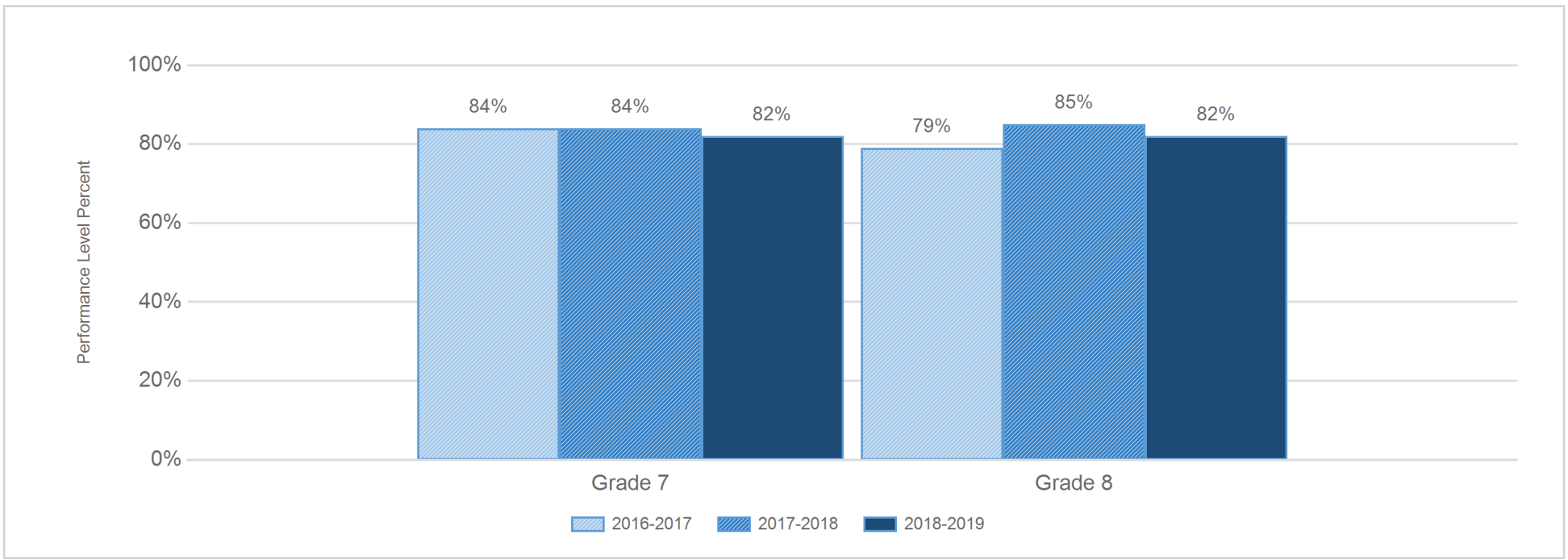

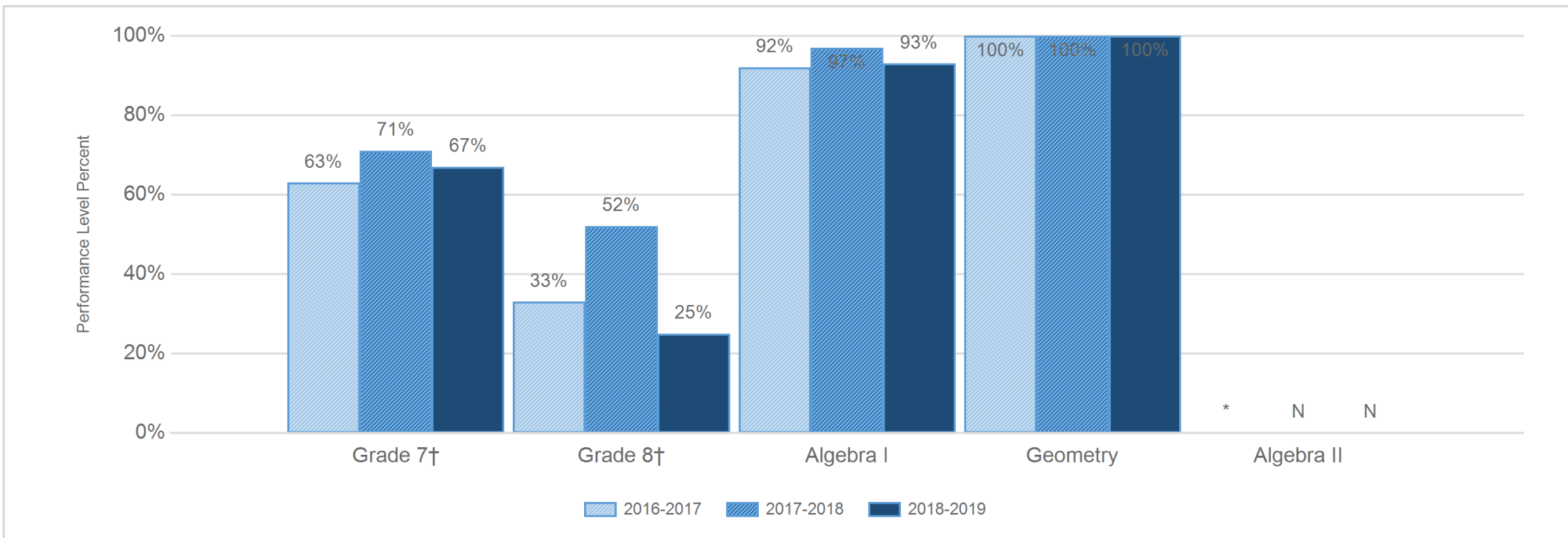

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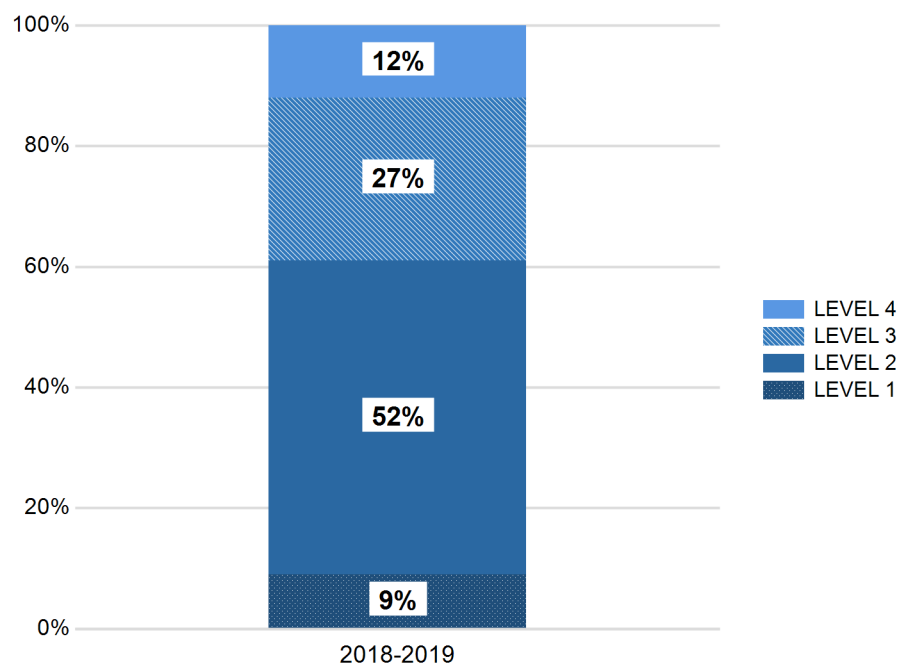

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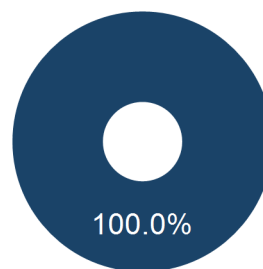

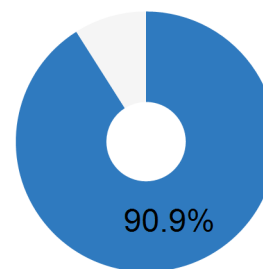

Students enrolled in one or more **visual and performing arts** classes

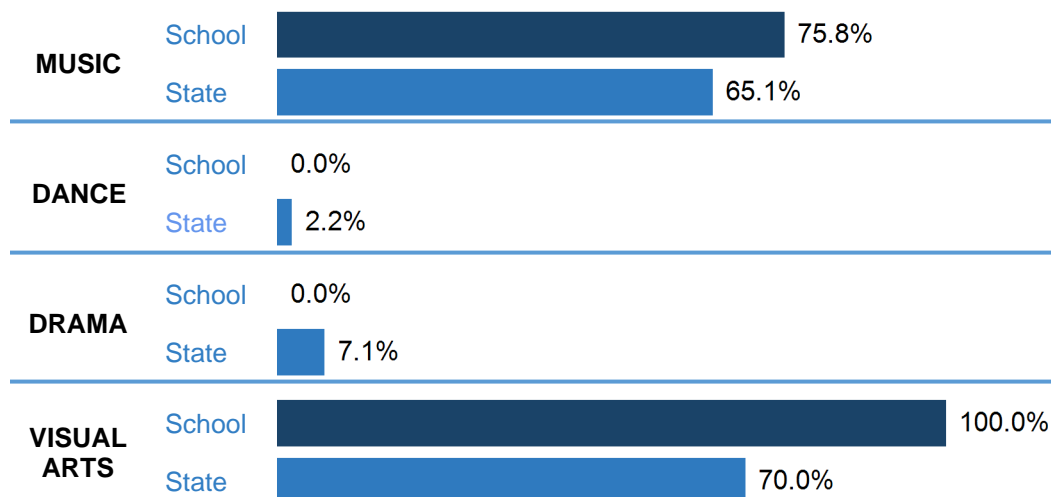

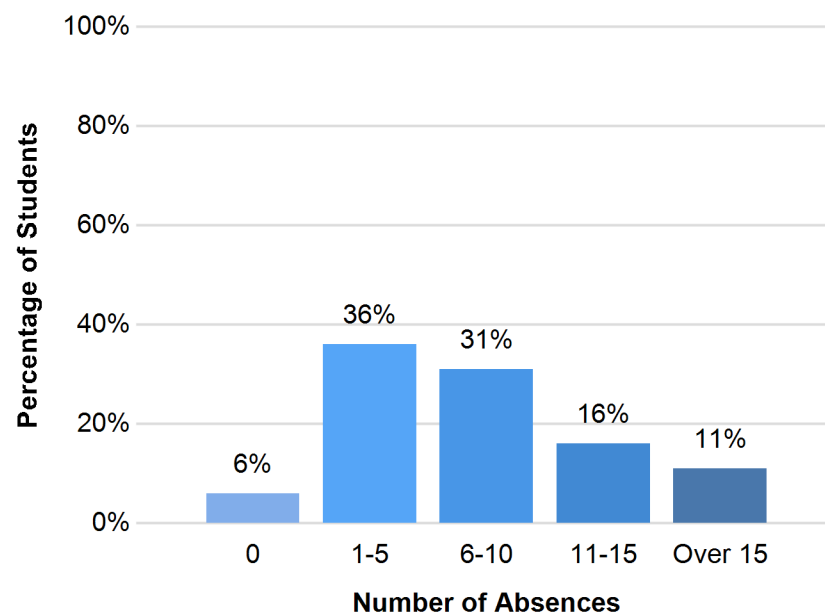

This graph shows the percentage of K-12 students by the number of days they were absent during the school year.





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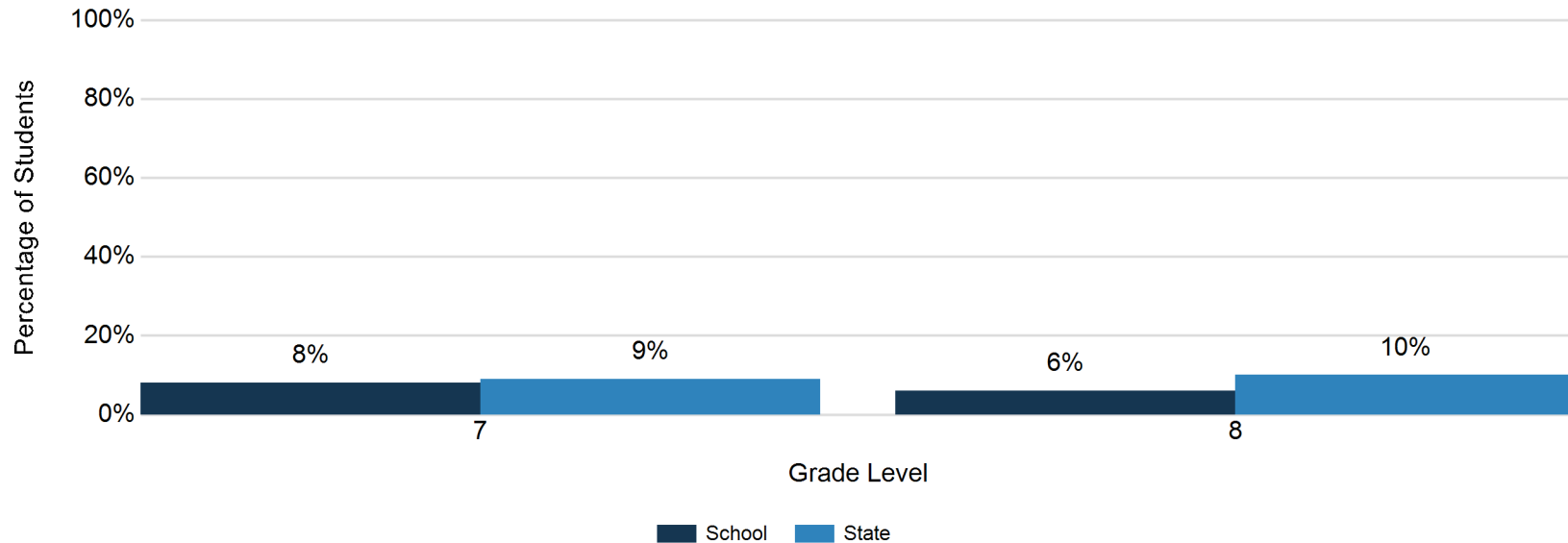
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade
