Community Conversations: NJ's COVID-19 Storytelling Project

Participant 575 Written Interview collected March 30, 2021 Translated June 7, 2021

Interview Question (written): How has your life changed since March as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic?

Participant (written): Life has changed completely, not able to go out, not able to work which caused debts.

I: What were the main or most trusted sources you received information about COVID-19 from? How did you act upon the information you received? Have you developed any new sources of information?

P: Received information from news.

I: With many aspects of daily life going virtual, what types of technology, or digital resources, have you relied on?

P: I didn't trust any technology, only television.

I: Please describe any challenges you faced in accessing technology or digital resources during the pandemic.

P: No trouble with technology.

I: Have you experienced any difficulty navigating resources or information related to a language barrier? If so, please explain.

P: Did not want to seek resources due to everything being about the pandemic, made me more nervous.

I: What was the hardest/biggest challenge for you or your family during/amidst COVID-19?

P: Greatest challenge was facing the debts since I had no job and the months passed and passed, and there was nowhere to get money from.

I: In what ways did you address the challenges of COVID-19? What challenges do you expect will remain post-COVID-19?

P: I practically faced sickness, since I had to go out and look (translator note: for a job) and the pandemic was everywhere, but the need was greater.

I: Who were your allies? Who were you able to lean on?

P: Allies were the benefits from NJ that supported me.

I: What were your greatest sources of strength? Where/when did you feel less strong?

P: Greatest source of strength was the health of my daughter. Felt weak when I would go out to look for food and couldn't find any since it was far away from my house, and I couldn't find a job and the rent wasn't waiting for me.

I: What brought you/Where did you find happiness?

P: Found happiness when I found a job.

I: What brought you/Where did you find sadness?

P: Found sadness when I found out my uncle had COVID.

I: What were your greatest disappointments as a result of the pandemic?

P: Greatest disappointments was that there wasn't enough capacity for patients in hospitals and people kept dying and dying.

I: What surprised you about the pandemic?

P: I was surprised by the love, the kindness of some people for their neighbor.

I: What are your greatest fears moving forward?

P: No fears, with God's help I am on my feet, strong, for my daughter.

I: Please describe one act of kindness that was done for you.

P: Act of kindness when ICC helped us with some money.

I: Please describe one act of kindness that you did for someone else.

P: I notified a friend of where to get help and took her there to get some help.

I: Did you have any conversations with healthcare or other service providers about COVID-19? What did this conversation look like? Who said what?

P: No conversations about health/ COVID-19.

I: What COVID-19 resources are you aware of, or have you benefited from?

P: I haven't benefitted, but I have heard there are vaccines.

I: Do you know where you can get tested for COVID-19?

P: Clinics and hospitals for testing.

I: What have you learned, or where have you received information about COVID-19 vaccine development?

P: I've learned about vaccines through the news.

I: When a vaccine for COVID-19 is made available to the public, would you choose to receive it? Why or why not?

P: I would receive vaccine; for protection.

I: Do you think that all communities have been treated equally during COVID? Were there populations who were favored over others?

P: There wasn't an equal treatment, even though the illness went after everyone, the attention was majorly on the people with a legal status.

I: Who do you think was left out of NJ's emergency COVID response? Why were they left out?

P: Undocumented people were left out, since they did not have legal documentation.

I: What do you think NJ could have done better?

P: The state could have ensured equality for all, especially in hospitals, clinics, etc.

I: If there was one thing that you or someone else could have done differently, what would it be?

P: People could have treated/ provided care for everyone with COVID, equally.

I: Is there anything else you would like to share that was not asked?

P: None.
