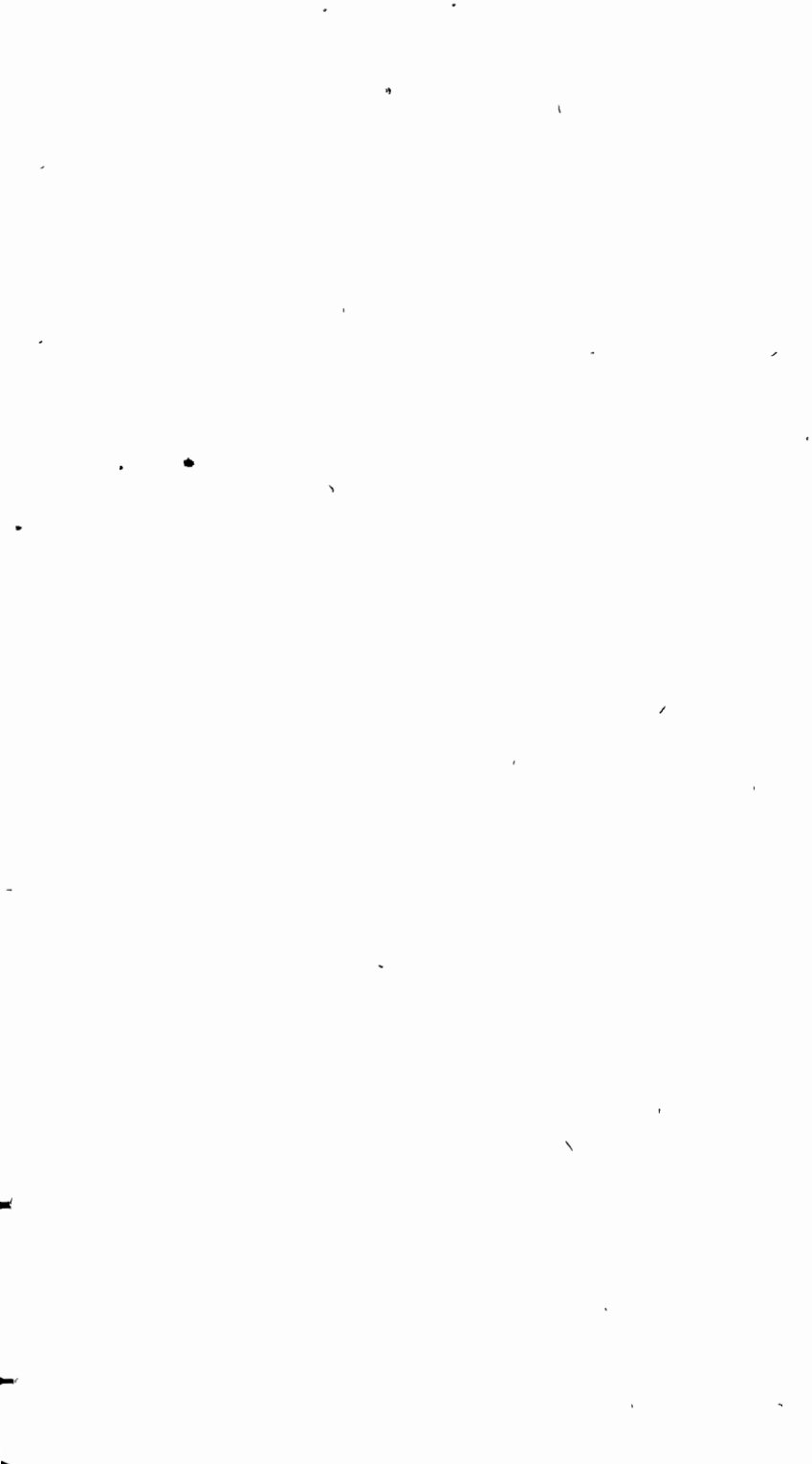

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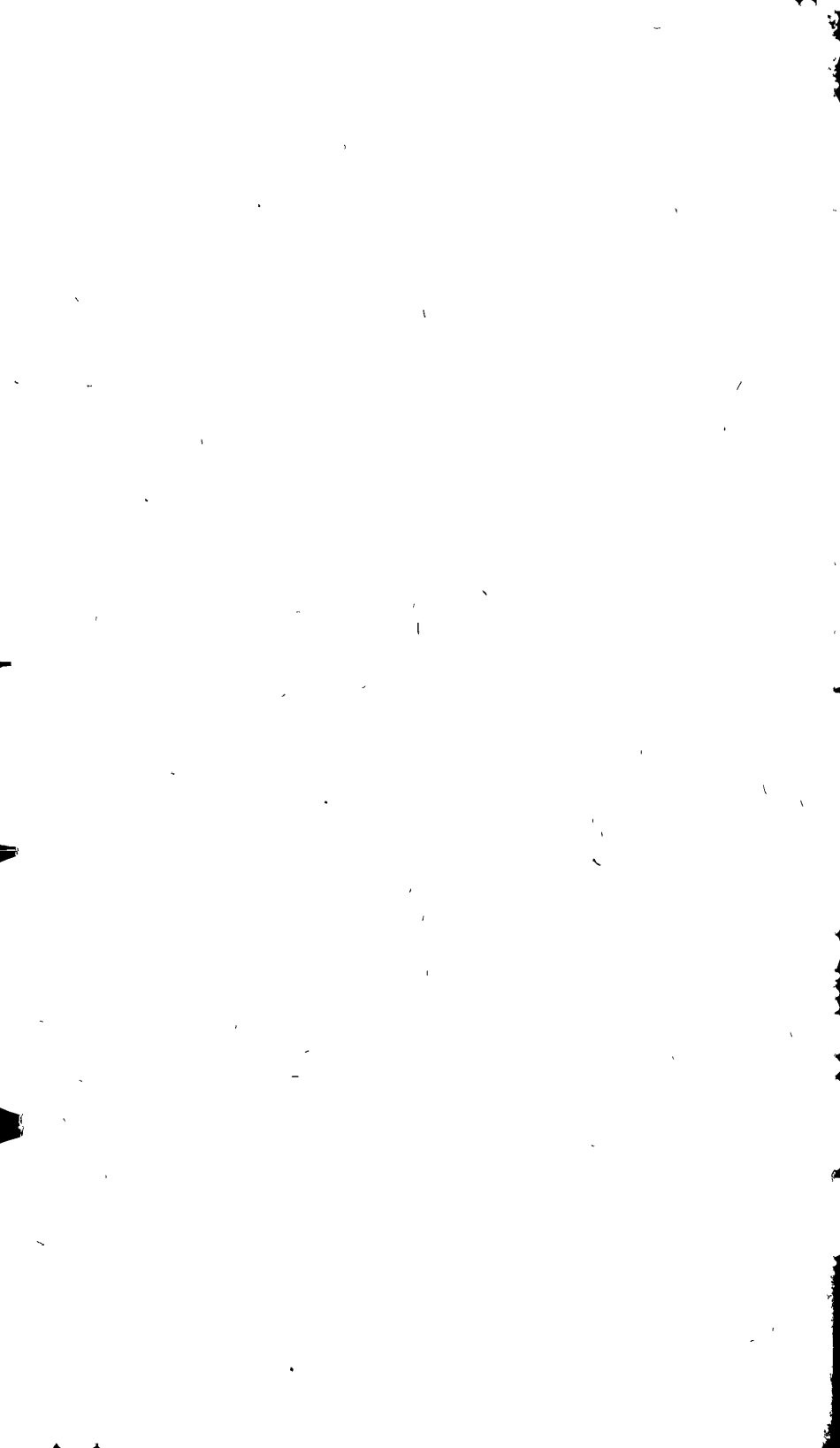

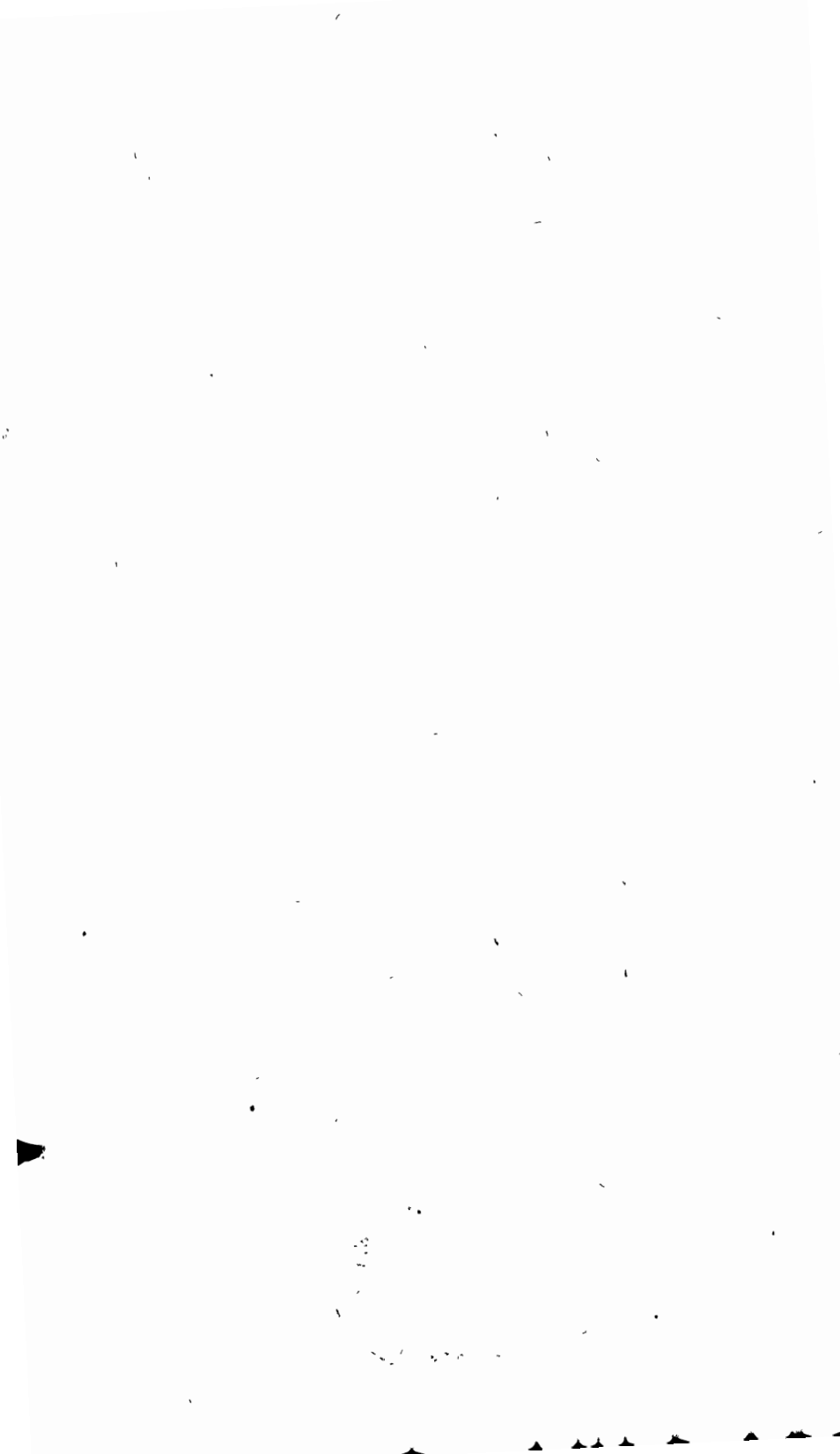

MINUTES OF THE HOUSE.

TRENTON, January 10, 1865.

This being the time designated by the Constitution for the assembling of the Legislature, the House of Assembly met this afternoon at three o'clock, at the State House.

Mr. Levi Scobey, Clerk of the last House of Assembly, called the members to order.

He has been our State Treasurer for the last fourteen years, and from men of every party has gained universal commendation as a wise, discreet and economical manager of the funds of the State. But, Mr. Speaker, I do not vie to pronounce his eulogy; I leave that melancholy duty to abler hands. I knew him well, and I can bear my humble testimony to his honesty and ability as

a man, and to his courtesy to all in the administration of the grave duties of his responsible position. Mr. Speaker, I offer the following resolutions:

The Commissioners appointed by an Act of the Legislature, entitled "Joint Resolutions in relation to Disabled Soldiers," approved April 12th, 1864, respectfully submit the following report:

In pursuance of the requirements of the above stated resolutions, the commissioners entered at once upon their duties, and opened a correspondence with our ministers in France and England, with a view of obtaining information concerning institutions having similar objects in those countries, and have sought other sources of information, in order to secure all the light which experience could give. While there is great dissimilarity between the people of those countries and our own in their habits and mode of life, and although the same

rules and restrictions there adopted would not, as a rule, be adapted to a people brought up under our free institutions, yet we can learn much from their experience. All nations agree that it is the bounden duty of a State to care for and protect those who, by reason of their devotion to their country, have become unable to maintain themselves; and in most of the countries of Europe, liberal provisions have been made for this honored class.

Information derived from the Pension Bureau of the United States shows that since the commencement of the present war, there have been about 1,342 applications for pensions from discharged New Jersey soldiers, of whom 671, or fifty per cent., were admitted to pensions; 503, or thirty-seven and a half per cent., were rejected, because the disability was not received in the line of duty, or existed anterior to enlistment; and 168, or twelve and a half per cent., were waiting additional evidence.

Died, re-enlisted, and gone to other States where they receive their pensions, fifty-two.

It will be observed by the above table, that the number of pensioners is rapidly multiplying and in a greatly increased ratio: As in 1863, only eighty-five pensioners were added, while in 1864, four hundred and forty-seven were added to the roll. If the same number of pensioners are admitted for the year ending June 30th, 1865, as in the last year, it will give 1,012 patients. But should the increase go on in the same ratio as in the last year, the number would then reach 2,912. Though it is not thought that the number will increase in this proportion, yet it is presumed that there will be an increase the present year, and perhaps the next, over the last,

by additions from the army and *Veteran Reserve Corps*; many of whom, on their discharge, will be entitled to pensions; so that it is estimated that the number of Jersey men who will be entitled to pensions will not vary much from two thousand.

The following shows the nature and degree of disability:

Lost a leg or an arm, - - - - -	75

The commissioners assume two thousand as the number on which their calculations should be based. Of this number, perhaps nine out of every ten have families, parents, or friends, with whom they would prefer to live, and who, by their labor, with the aid of the pensions allowed by the government, would be enabled to secure a comfortable support. It is therefore believed that less than one-tenth of the whole number would need or desire homes in a public institution. To provide more especially for this latter class, those who from the nature and extent of their disability, such as have lost the use of both eyes, both arms, both legs, or who are otherwise wounded or disabled; those who have been broken down in body by disease and privations while in their country's service, and who are unable to care for themselves, is understood to be the object for which this commission was appointed.

The inquiry is, what provision shall be made for these persons? They are not paupers, seeking alms at the hands of the government, but pensioners, entitled to compensation for services rendered. They are not debtors to, but creditors of the public. They have imperiled their lives and shed their blood in the cause of their country, by privations, hardships and wounds; in that cause have been deprived of the power of self-support, and the country is indebted to them to the extent, at least, of a comfortable maintenance during their disability. What is needed is not an alms-house, to impress them with the sense of being the objects of charity, and to crush every feeling and hope of independence, but a Retreat, provided, as far as practicable, with the comforts and influences of a home, where they may realize that the republic is not ungrateful; and where they may enjoy the respect of their fellow-citizens, and receive, in part, the reward due to

their patriotism and valor. There are many reasons why this provision should be made in each State for its own soldiers.

First, it is desirable that the discharged soldier should return to the walks of civil life, to the industrial pursuits, and to domestic influences.

The association of family and the society of friends, have been found greatly to promote the recovery of the sick and to contribute to the comfort of the disabled, and the sense of being in his own State, and within the reach of family and friends, has a similar effect.

Should Retreats be provided by the general government, patients must be moved to other States, and be strangers in, to them, a strange land.

The well founded objections to the entertainment of a large number of men together can be better met by institutions in the several States, where the number must necessarily be limited. Those persons need immediate relief, and that can be more speedily afforded by each State.

If afterwards the general government shall deem proper to assume the expense, or make appropriations toward it, the State will be so far relieved of the charge. But the necessities of the case forbid the delay for the action of the general government.

As the commissioners are directed "particularly to inquire whether a State Retreat or Home should be built," in order to carry out the intentions of the Legislature, they have given special attention to this direction, and recommend, in view of the present and prospective wants of the wounded and invalid soldiers, that a State Retreat or Home be established, and that fifty or more acres of land, suitably located, be purchased; that buildings, adapted to the purpose, be erected thereon; and that it be furnished with all the conveniences necessary for such an institution. It is believed that the sum of fifty thousand dollars will be sufficient to pay for what is proposed, viz. :

Land,	- - - - -	\$5,000
Cost of buildings,	- - - - -	30,000
Furniture,	- - - - -	10,000
Outbuildings, fences, tools, and contingencies,	- - - - -	5,000
Total,	- - - - -	<u>\$50,000</u>

If it is found that a greater number than that contemplated have to be provided for, the cost of enlarging the buildings so as to accommodate them is all the additional expense that

would be incurred, except, perhaps, a small sum for furniture. The ground will be used principally for raising vegetables for the establishment and pasturage of cows.

It is further recommended that a law be passed, appointing commissioners to select and purchase the land, who, so soon as the land is secured, shall contract for and superintend the erection of the buildings, provide the furniture, and make such improvements and purchases as are contemplated in the above named appropriation.

With a view of encouraging those who prefer to live with their own families or friends, but who, by reason of the inadequacy of the pensions received from the government and their inability wholly to provide the necessary support, it is recommended that the institution be authorized to establish a system of *out* patients, to whom certain allowances may, from time to time, be made towards their care and maintenance.

A law for the government of the institution will not be needed until it is ready to go into operation.

WHEREAS, The Legislature of New Jersey, on the 2d of March, 1859, representing the views and opinions of the people of the State, believing the institution of human slavery

to be a great moral and political evil, which, if unfestrained by the general government, is calculated to sap the foundations of our social and political institutions, solemnly declared that "we would peaceably but firmly resist its further extension;"

AND WHEREAS, Slavery did not continue to be restrained by the general government, while its defenders declared it to be the "inexorable logic" of their position, that the Constitution guaranteed slavery in all the Territories; but slavery became national and the guarantees of freedom were all swept away in the year 1854;

AND WHEREAS, We believe this great moral and political evil has tampered with public and private honesty; that the ignorance that disgraces, the vice that demoralizes, the barrenness that lays waste the South, are all the work of slavery; that it has made our country a stumbling-block, a hissing and a by-word to the nations; that it has introduced discord and brawling, insolence, rapacity and murder into our national counsels; that it has despoiled us from national honor and desolated us like a plague;

AND WHEREAS, We believe it to be the law of nations that from the moment the slaveholding States became the theatre of civil war—inaugurated by the slave power in scorn of the Constitution—from that moment Congress acquired the power to interfere against slavery by law and the President by proclamation, even to its extinction;

AND WHEREAS, Four years of war have taught us the solemn lesson that slavery is the mainspring of the rebellion, and that both must die before we can have a permanent peace; therefore

Resolved, by the House of Assembly, (the Senate concurring,) That every member of both Houses of Congress from New Jersey be requested to vote for the Constitutional amendment against slavery, so that hereafter and forever neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or in any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Resolved, That His Excellency the Governor of this State be and he is hereby respectfully requested to transmit certified copies of the foregoing resolutions to each of the Senators and Representatives in Congress of the United States from

this State, with the request that they be laid before the bodies to which they respectively belong.

The resolution in relation to the public printing, offered by Mr. Lathrop on Thursday last, was taken up, and its further consideration postponed until to-morrow.

Mr. Lathrop, from the committee to report rules for the government of the House, reported the following

R U L E S.

OF THE MEETING OF THE HOUSE.

1. Any member or members less than a quorum may meet and adjourn the House, from day to day, when necessary.

2. Every member shall attend in his place precisely at the hour to which the House was last adjourned; and in case of neglect he shall be subject to a reprimand from the Chair, unless excused by the House; nor shall any member absent himself from the House for more than a space of a quarter of an hour, without leave previously obtained.

3. In case a less number of members than a quorum shall be present after the arrival of the hour to which the House stood adjourned, they are hereby authorized to send their Sergeant-at-Arms, or any other person or persons by them authorized, with a warrant duly executed, for any or all absent members, as the majority of such as are present may agree, and at the expense of such absent members, respectively, unless such excuse for non-attendance shall be rendered as the House, when a quorum is convened, shall judge sufficient. Immediately after the appointment of the standing committees, the members shall arrange among themselves their several seats appropriated to their counties; and in case of disagreement, the same shall be decided by lot.

OF THE DUTIES OF THE SPEAKER.

4. He shall take the Chair at the hour to which the House shall have adjourned, and immediately call the members to order; and on the appearance of a quorum, shall cause the journal of the preceding day to be read, which may then be corrected by the House.

5. He shall preserve order and decorum, and in debate shall prevent personal reflections, and confine members to the question under discussion; but he shall not engage in any debate, nor propose his opinion upon any question, without first calling on some member to occupy the Chair. When two or more members rise at the same time, he shall name the one entitled to the floor.

6. He shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the House, when demanded by any four members; on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, unless by leave of the House.

7. All questions before the House shall be stated by the Speaker, and distinctly put in the following form, to wit:—"As many as are in favor of [the question] will say Aye;" and after the affirmative is expressed, "those of the contrary opinion, No." If the Speaker doubts, or a division be called for, the House shall divide; those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and afterwards those in the negative; and in case of an equal division, the Speaker shall decide.

8. All committees shall be appointed by the Speaker, unless otherwise specially directed by the House.

9. All acts, addresses, and joint resolutions, shall be signed by the Speaker; and all writs, warrants and subpoenas, issued by order of the House, shall be under his hand and seal, and attested by the Clerk. If the Speaker be absent, a less number of members than a quorum may appoint a Speaker pro tempore, who may sign any warrants or perform any act requisite to bring in absent members.

10. He shall have a general direction of the Hall, and he may name a member to perform the duties of the Chair; but such substitution shall not extend beyond a second adjournment.

OF THE ORDER OF BUSINESS.

11. After the reading of the journal, the business of the first meeting of each day shall be conducted in the following manner, to wit:

I. Letters, petitions, memorials, remonstrances and accompanying documents may be presented and disposed of.

II. Reports of committees may be read.

III. Original resolutions may be offered and considered; items of unfinished business referred; motions to reconsider and to appoint additional members of committees made; and leave of absence, leave to withdraw documents, and leave to introduce bills asked.

LEAVE FOR BILLS AND TO INTRODUCE BILLS.

IV. Bills and joint resolutions, on a third reading, may be taken up.

V. The House shall then proceed in the order of the day, preference being always given to the unfinished business of the preceding sitting; after which bills and joint resolutions, on a second reading, shall be taken in their order; and the House, in its afternoon session, will proceed to business as though there had been no adjournment of its morning session, excepting that original resolutions, and leave to introduce bills of committees, be the first business in the afternoon sitting; and shall, on demand of the majority, proceed with the order of the day.

12. The Clerk shall make a list of all public bills and joint resolutions. He shall keep a separate calendar of private bills. No bill for granting, continuing, altering, amending, or renewing a charter for any corporation, other than a municipal corporation, shall be placed on the calendar of public bills. All bills, public and private, shall be numbered according to the time of their introduction into the House. They shall be taken up and considered in the order of time in which they were reported or ordered to a third reading as appears by the calendar; and the calendar shall be proceeded in until all the bills thereon are called up, before the commencement of the calendar anew.

13. All messages shall be sent from this House, to the Senate by the Clerk or the Assistant Clerk.

OF DECORUM AND DEBATE.

14. When a member is about to speak in debate, or communicate any matter to the House, he shall rise from his seat, and respectfully address himself to the Speaker, confining himself to the question under debate, and avoiding personality.

15. If any member in debate transgress the rules of the House, the Speaker shall, or any member may call him to order; in which case the member so called to order shall immediately set down, unless permitted to explain. The House shall, if appealed to, decide on the case, but without debate; if there be no appeal, the decision of the Chair shall be submitted to. If the decision be in favor of the member called to order, he shall be at liberty to proceed; if otherwise, he shall not be permitted to proceed without leave of the House; and if the case require it, he shall be liable to the censure of the House.

16. If a member be called to order for words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall repeat the words excepted to, and they shall be taken down in writing at the Clerk's table; and no member shall be held to answer, or be subject to the censure of the House for words spoken in debate, if any other member has spoken, or other business has intervened after the words spoken, and before exception to them shall have been taken.

17. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question, without leave of the House.

18. While the Speaker is putting any question, or addressing the House, none shall walk out of, or across the Hall; nor in such case, or when a member is speaking, shall any one entertain private discourse; nor shall any one, while a member is speaking, pass between him and the Chair.

19. No member shall vote on any question, in the event of which he is particularly interested; nor in any case where he was not within the bar of the House when the question was put.

20. Every member who shall be in the House when the question is put, shall give his vote, unless the House, for

special reasons, shall excuse him. All motions to excuse a member from voting shall be made before the House divides, or before the call of the yeas and nays is commenced; and any member requesting to be excused from voting, may make a brief verbal statement of the reasons for making such request; and the question shall then be taken without further debate.

21. Petitions, memorials, and other papers addressed to the House, shall be presented by the Speaker, or by a member in his place; a brief statement of the contents thereof shall be made by the introducer, and if called upon, he shall declare that it does not, in his opinion, contain any indecent or reproachful language, or any expressions of disrespect to the House, or any committee of the same.

ON MOTIONS.

22. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the Speaker or any member desire it.

23. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the Speaker; or, being in writing, it shall be handed to the Chair and read aloud by the Clerk, when it shall be deemed to be in possession of the House and open to debate; but it may be withdrawn at any time before a decision or amendment.

24. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, but

- 1 To adjourn.
- 2 A call of the House.
- 3 To lay on the table.
- 4 For the previous question.
- 5 To postpone indefinitely.
- 6 To postpone to a day certain.
- 7 To go into a Committee of the Whole on the pending subject immediately.
- 8 To commit to a Committee of the Whole.

- 11 To amend.

which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are stated, and no motion to a day certain, to commit or postpone indefinitely, being decided, shall be again allowed on the same day, and at the same stage of the bill or proposition.

25. A motion to strike out the enacting clause of a bill or joint resolution shall have precedence of a motion to amend, and, if carried, shall be considered equivalent to its rejection.

26. A motion to adjourn shall be always in order, except when the House is voting, or while a member is addressing the House, or immediately after the question to adjourn has been negatived; that, and the motion to lay on the table, shall be decided without debate.

27. Any member may call for the division of a question, which shall be divided if it comprehends questions so distinct that one being taken away the rest may stand entire for the decision of the House; a motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible; but a motion to strike out being lost, shall preclude neither amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert.

28. When any motion shall be made and seconded, the names of the persons moving and seconding the same shall, at the request of any two members, be entered on the journal of the House.

29. When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing party, to move for the reconsideration thereof on the same day, or the next day of actual session of the House thereafter; all motions may be reconsidered by the same majority that carried them; but bills to be reconsidered must have the same majority that would be necessary to pass them.

30. When a blank is to be filled, the question shall first be taken on the largest sum, greatest number and remotest day.

31. The yeas and nays shall be entered on the journal on every question taken in the House, when moved for and seconded by five members; and in taking the yeas and nays, the names of the members, including the Speaker, shall be called alphabetically.

32. The previous question shall be in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present; and its

effect shall be, if decided affirmatively, to put an end to all debate and bring the House to a direct vote upon amendments reported by a committee, if any; then upon pending amendments, and then upon the main question; if decided in the negative to leave the main question and amendments, if any, under debate for the residue of the sitting, unless sooner disposed of by taking the question, or in some other manner. All incidental questions of order arising after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending such motion, shall be decided, whether on appeal or otherwise, without debate.

33. After the Clerk has commenced calling the yeas and nays on any question, no motion shall be received until a decision has been announced by the Chair.

JOINT COMMITTEES.

The following committees, of five members each, shall be also appointed to act conjointly with corresponding committees to be appointed by the Senate:

A Committee on the Treasurer's Accounts.

A Committee on the State Prison.

A Committee on the Public Printing.

A Committee on the Library.

A Committee on the Lunatic Asylum.

A Committee on Public Grounds and Buildings.

A Committee on Commerce and Navigation.

A Committee on Federal Relations.

There shall also be appointed a committee, of two members, to act conjointly with a corresponding committee to be appointed by the Senate, to be called a Committee on Passed Bills.

35. The several standing committees of the House shall have leave to report by bill or otherwise.

36. No committee shall sit during the sitting of the House, without special leave.

37. All committees appointed at the first sitting shall continue to act during every subsequent sitting of the same Legislature, or until they have reported on the business committed to them, or have been discharged.

OF COMMITTEES OF THE WHOLE HOUSE.

38. In forming a committee of the whole House, the Speaker shall leave his Chair, and a Chairman to preside in committee shall be appointed by the Speaker.

39. The rules of proceeding in the House shall be observed, as far as practicable, in Committee of the Whole, except that a member may speak oftener than twice on the same subject, but shall not speak a second time until every member choosing

to speak shall have spoken; nor shall a motion for the previous question be made therein.

40. All amendments made in Committee of the Whole shall be noted by the Clerk, but need not be read by the Speaker, on his resuming the Chair, unless required by the House.

OF BILLS AND JOINT RESOLUTIONS.

41. All bills and joint resolutions shall be introduced by motion for leave, or on the report of a committee, and the member offering the same, shall endorse his name on them, that the committees may confer with him should they so desire.

42. Every bill and joint resolution shall receive three separate readings in the House previous to its passage; but no bill or joint resolution shall be read twice on the same day, without special order of the House.

43. All bills and joint resolutions, after the first reading, shall be printed for the use of the members, unless otherwise ordered by the House.

44. All bills and joint resolutions may be made the order of a particular day, on which day they shall be taken up in preference to others on the calendar; and the calendar of private bills shall not be taken up until the calendar of public bills shall have been gone through with.

45. All bills and joint resolutions previous to their final passage by the House, all petitions, motions and reports, may be committed at the pleasure of the House.

46. All bills and joint resolutions ordered to be engrossed, shall be executed in a fair, round hand; and no amendment by way of rider shall be received to any bill or joint resolution on its third reading.

47. On a motion to strike out any item in the incidental bill, the question to be submitted to the House shall be: "Shall the item be retained in the bill?" and a majority of all the members of the House shall be necessary to adopt the same.

48. After an order for the second reading of any bill on on the private calendar, the applicants for said bill shall, at their own expense, furnish the usual number of copies for

the use of the members, unless the printing thereof be dispensed with by a special order of the House.

49. On the question of the final passage of all bills and joint resolutions, the yeas and nays shall be entered on the journal of the House.

50. Whenever a bill or resolution that has passed the House shall be carried to the Senate, all papers and documents relating thereto, on the files of the House, shall be carried with such bill or resolution to the Senate.

OF RULES.

51. No standing rule or order of the House shall be rescinded or changed without one day's notice being given of the motion therefor; nor shall any rule be suspended, except by a vote of a majority of the whole number of members of the House.

52. Cushing's Manual shall, in all cases, when not in conflict with the rules adopted by the House, be considered and held as standard authority.

Respectfully report that they have examined attentively the report of the Committee on Education of the Senate, annexed, and have unanimously adopted the same as their report upon said bill; they therefore request that the same be read, and earnestly recommend the passage of said bill.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE SENATE.

The Committee on Education, to whom was referred that part of the Governor's annual message relating to the Normal School and Model School buildings, and the land on which they are situate, respectfully report:

The lease from the “New Jersey Normal School Association” of the Normal School building and lot on which the same is erected, on Clinton street, in the City of Trenton, to the State of New Jersey, is dated the 22d day of July, 1862;

the term expires on the 9th day of February, 1865. The lessors covenant that if during the term the State shall elect to purchase the said property and give notice thereof, they will convey the same to the State by warrantee deed on the payment of the par value of the stock of the said association, less the value of one hundred shares of stock, which, by the stipulations of said lease, were to be extinguished during the existence of the lease, and on the payment, in addition, of the increased value of the lot on which said building is erected beyond the original cost thereof.

The lease from the "New Jersey Model School Company," of the Model School building and lot on which the same is erected, adjoining the Normal School property, and of the personal property on the premises, to the State of New Jersey, is dated the 22d of July, 1862; the term expires on the 1st day of March, 1865. The lessors covenant that if during the term the State shall elect to purchase the Normal School and Model School, and give notice thereof, they will convey the Model School property to the State by warrantee deed, upon the payment by the State of \$20,000.

The lease for the lots adjoining the Normal and Model School property, which lots, with those on which the Normal and Model School buildings are erected, embrace the whole square or plot of ground bounded by Clinton street, Perry street, Southard street, and Monmouth street, is dated the 22d day of July, 1862; the term expires on the 1st day of March, 1865. The lessor covenants that if the State during the term shall elect to purchase the lots and gives notice thereof, he will convey the same to the State by warrantee deed, free of incumbrances, upon the payment by the State of \$12,000.

By the provisions of the Normal School lease, 100 shares of the stock of the New Jersey Normal School Association were to be purchased by the trustees of the Normal School and extinguished. When the buildings were originally erected, in order to secure the adoption of the plan deemed most for the interest of the State, \$6,550 were assumed by the Trustees of the Normal School. These payments, with others, were chiefly made by the issue by the Trustees of the Normal School of certificates of tuition in the Model School, which were received by parties to whom they were issued as cash. These were redeemed by tuition in the Model School, and in effect were payments of rent for the use of the buildings and property. By the leases, these payments, in case

the State, before the expiration of the term for which the property was leased, should purchase the premises, were to be deducted from the original cost. They amount to the sum of \$22,900. If the State does not, within the term specified, purchase the property, the lessors are entitled to the advantage of these payments, as compensation for the use of the property since the erection of the buildings.

The stock of the "New Jersey Normal School Association," and the stock of the "New Jersey Model School Company," are held by a gentleman who has purchased and now controls the same, at varying rates, from the stockholders, for \$7,600 less than the par value. The advantage of this purchase is now, without any obligation on the part of the party who made it to make the offer, most generously offered to the State, in case the purchase is made by the State.

The increased value of the lot on which the Normal School building stands, to be ascertained by arbitration, if not agreed upon, was, by the terms of the lease, to be paid for by the State. It is proposed, with like generosity, that the State, in case the property is purchased, be released from this increased valuation, which at this time is equal to \$4,000.

The land adjoining the lots on which the Normal and Model School buildings are erected, was purchased of the several owners, at the urgent solicitation of friends of the Normal School from various parts of the State, in order to secure ample grounds for the use of the Schools, and to control the whole square on which the buildings are located, and prevent the erection of structures which might be a disadvantage to the schools or interfere with the use and depreciate the value of the buildings.

The following is a statement of the cost of the property, and of the amounts, by the terms of the leases and the generous offers referred to, to be deducted therefrom, and of the balance to be paid by the State to secure the ownership of the whole property in fee simple :

Leaving a balance of \$38,000 to be paid by the State.

The present value of the property is over \$80,000. By many it is valued at a much higher amount. The advantage of the excess of the actual present value of the property over the sum for which it can be secured immediately, is of itself sufficient to induce your committee to recommend and urge the purchase of the property by the State. In addition to this, the several weighty and important considerations suggested in that portion of the Governor's message referred to your committee, connected with the beneficial influence and permanence of the institution, as well as the necessity for action before the expiration of the Normal School lease, leave no room to doubt the propriety and wisdom of making the purchase.

Entertaining these views, your committee have prepared a bill authorizing the Governor of the State to purchase the property, upon being satisfied that the present owners have a good and valid title, and when a conveyance by warranty deed is duly made and executed to the State, to give therefor his warrant for thirty-eight thousand dollars, and appropriating that sum to be paid out of the treasury of the State, which bill your committee unanimously recommend should be passed immediately

REPORT OF THE MAJORITY OF THE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE.

The majority of the Committee of the Judiciary, to which was referred

Assembly bill No. 115, entitled

“An Act to ratify the Amendment of the Constitution of the United States.”

1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey: That the amendment to the Constitution of the United States, proposed at the second session of the Thirty-Eighth Congress, by a Resolution of the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, to the several State Legislatures, be and the same is hereby, upon the the part of this Legislature ratified, and made a part of the Constitution of the United States of America—said amendment having been approved on the 1st day of February, A. D. 1865, and is in the following words, to wit:

ARTICLE XIII.

SECTION 1. Neither Slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

SECTION 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this Article by appropriate legislation.

Be it enacted as follows:

The Judiciary Committee report

Assembly bill No. 115,

With the following amendments:

By inserting the following additional sections:

2. And be it enacted, That this act shall be submitted to the people at the next general election to be held in this State. The clerk of each city and township in the different election districts of this State shall provide at each Poll on said election day, a box in the usual form for the reception of the ballots herein provided; and each and every elector of this State may present a ballot, which shall be a paper ticket, on which shall be printed or written, or partly written and partly printed, one of the following forms, “For the Amendment of the Constitution of the United States,” or “Against the Amendment of the Constitution of the United States.” The said ballots shall be so folded as to conceal the contents of the ballot, and shall be endorsed “Act to ratify an amendment of the Constitution of the United States.”

3. And be it enacted, That after finally closing the polls of such election, the Board of Election shall immediately and without adjournment proceed to count and canvass the ballots in relation to the proposed act, in the same manner as they are by law required to canvass the ballots given for Governor, and thereupon shall set down in writing and in words at full length, the whole number of votes given, "For the Amendment of the Constitution of the United States" and the whole number of votes "Against the Amendment of the Constitution of the United States," and certify and subscribe the same, and cause the copies thereof to be made, certified and delivered, as prescribed by law in respect to the canvass of votes given at an election for Governor. And all the provisions of "An Act to regulate elections," approved, April 16, 1846, and the supplements thereto, shall as far as applicable, apply to the submission to the people herein provided for.

4. And be it enacted, That this Act shall not become a law until it is ratified by the people, in pursuance of the Constitution and the provisions thereof.

5. And be it enacted, That this Act shall take effect and become a law immediately after the people have ratified the same in the mode pointed out in this Act.

The undersigned, a minority of the Judiciary Committee of this House, respectfully report :

That, whereas, great legal uncertainty attends the proposition made by the majority of said committee, to submit to a popular vote the Act ratifying the amendment to the Constitution of the United States, as the same was proposed at the second session of the thirty-eighth Congress "to the several State Legislatures ;"

And whereas, Congress has the clear and undoubted right to elect whether such ratification shall be by "the Legislatures of three-fourths of the several States, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof." (See Art. 5 of the Constitution of the United States).

And whereas Congress has *not* proposed that said ratification should be by "Convention," nor by a vote of the people, but *has* proposed and elected that said ratification shall be by "the several State Legislatures;"

Therefore, and in order to remove all doubts touching the absolute and unconditional ratification of the said amendment to the Constitution of the United States, on the part of the State of New Jersey, and in order that the proposition of ratification, as made by Congress, may be acted upon by the body to whom it was remitted by Congress for that purpose—the minority of your Judiciary Committee recommend the passage of Assembly bill No. 115, without amendment.

The said ballots shall be so folded as to conceal the contents of the ballot, and shall be endorsed "Act to ratify an amendment of the Constitution of the United States."

3. And be it enacted, That after finally closing the polls of such election, the Board of Election shall immediately and without adjournment proceed to count and canvass the ballots in relation to the proposed Act, in the same manner as they are by law required to canvass the ballots given for Governor, and thereupon shall set down in writing and in words at full length, the whole number of votes given, "For the Amendment of the Constitution of the United States" and the whole number of votes "Against the Amendment of the Constitution of the United States," and certify and subscribe the same, and cause the copies thereof to be made, certified and delivered, as prescribed by law in respect to the canvass of votes given at an election for Governor. And all the provisions of "An Act to regulate elections," approved April 16, 1846, and the supplements thereto, shall as far as applicable, apply to the submission to the people herein provided for.

4. And be it enacted, That this Act shall not become a law until it is ratified by the people, in pursuance of the Constitution and the provisions thereof.

5. And be it enacted, That this Act shall take effect and become a law immediately after the people have ratified the same in the mode pointed out in this Act.

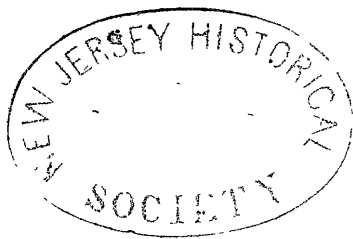

"An Act to incorporate Vincentown Lodge, No. 23, of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows of Vincentown, in the County of Burlington and State of New Jersey."

Which was, on motion, read a first time by its title, and ordered to have a second reading and referred to the Committee on Corporations.

To the General Assembly :

I herewith return to the House of Assembly, where it originated, bill No. 53, entitled, “An Act creating a debt for war purposes,” together with my objections thereto.

These objections are not to the object contemplated by the

bill. Although I regret the necessity that compels so large an increase of indebtedness, I am willing that the credit of the State, should be used, if it be deemed by the Legislature absolutely necessary, to aid the townships, cities, and counties to raise money for the purpose of paying bounties to recruit men for the army and to protect the people from the rigors of conscription.

It is now too late to regret that the present mode of relief from the draft was adopted in the early stages of the war. They who are now liable to conscription have contributed towards relieving others, by paying taxes to fill previous calls, and it would be unjust at this late day, to refuse them assistance. We must stand by each other to the end; and, if the townships, cities and counties are not able to raise the money, the State should come to the rescue. It is not, therefore, to the end sought to be attained by this bill that I object, but because it is not framed so as to accomplish the desired purpose.

The practical effect of the tenth section would be to prevent the filling of the quota on the pending call, and to bring at once upon nearly every sub-district of the State all the rigors and hardships of an imperative conscription. That section forbids cities, townships and counties from hereafter raising any money to pay bounties, not only on future calls, but also on the call of December, 1864, to fill which a draft is now impending. Upon a careful reading of that section, I am of opinion that should the bill become a law, no men could hereafter be recruited or paid except by the State authorities. Those municipalities that have not already taken action, are explicitly forbidden to raise money, and the prohibition, although not in such direct terms, also extends to those now actively at work, where the quota has not been entirely filled. It is true that expenditures heretofore made, and obligations and indebtedness heretofore contracted or incurred by municipalities, would not be affected or invalidated, but no further expenditures could be made or indebtedness incurred for the purpose of paying bounties. It is evident, therefore, that should the bill pass in its present shape, recruiting by townships, cities and counties would immediately cease, and no men could be obtained except by the State, through the bounties to be raised by the sale of the bonds authorized by this bill. Is the State now in a condition to pay these bounties? Plates must be prepared; the bonds must be issued; advertisements for proposals must be published

and a sale effected, before the money can be obtained; and, in the meantime, all recruiting would stop, and the draft now ordered would be executed. To obviate the difficulty, I recommend (if a bill be passed) that authority be given to townships, cities and counties hereafter to raise money for bounties, and proceed as heretofore *in respect to the call of December, A. D. 1864*, and that provision be made for the State to refund a certain sum to the municipal authorities to fill the quota on that call, whether they raise and expend the money before or after the passage of the act. By this means they will be enabled to obtain credit by reason of the promise of the State to refund a portion of the money; there will be no interruption in recruiting men under the pending call; the draft will be averted, and the State authorities will have opportunity to issue and negotiate the bonds.

In reference to *future calls*, I think the prohibition to raise money for the purpose of paying bounties should not be extended to counties. It is probable that volunteers cannot be procured for the State bounty provided in this bill, and unless there be power vested somewhere to raise and pay a larger sum, the men cannot be had, and a draft will be inevitable. If it be considered, that in midst of the excitement necessarily attending a hurried town meeting, a larger sum may be ordered than necessary, there can certainly be no objection to submitting the question of amount to the more deliberate judgment of the Boards of Chosen Freeholders of the several counties. These Boards are generally composed of intelligent and careful business men, who are not disposed to make unnecessary and wasteful expenditures of money. In order to produce uniformity in the amount of bounty throughout the State, it would be well for the Legislature to prescribe a limit for the Freeholders. The whole amount of bounty determined upon should be raised by the counties. The Freeholders should superintend the recruiting of the men, and upon due proof to the satisfaction of the Attorney General of the State of the number of men credited and the amount of money paid, the Treasurer should refund to the county collector whatever sum the Legislature shall determine. The certainty that in a short time the State will refund a portion of the money advanced, will give additional credit to the counties, and enable them to borrow the money.

There is another advantage in having the county authorities raise the money and superintend the recruiting of the men. By this bill the Treasurer is to pay each recruit. To do this

he must employ agents, and station them at every place of muster. There is no provision in the law for their employment, nor can bonds be taken for the faithful performance of the trust committed to them. The State should not assume this risk and expense. Let the authorities of each county raise the money and pay the men to fill the quota of the sub-districts within its bounds, and let the Treasurer, instead of paying the State bounty to each individual recruit, settle the account with the county collector, and upon the warrant of the government repay the amount authorized by law, upon vouchers satisfactory to the Attorney General. This is the mode of paying the present State bounty to families of volunteers, and it has been found entirely satisfactory.

Again: who will recruit the men, if all the local authorities are forbidden to raise bounties? They cannot be expected to take much interest in the matter if they have no power to raise money, even to defray the ordinary expenses of recruiting. The bill does not give authority to the Governor to employ recruiting officers, and the result would be that men could not be obtained, except the few who would be procured as substitutes by individuals liable to draft. The plan I propose would set to work prominent and influential citizens in every county to fill the quota. The county authorities would recruit the men and assume the labor and risk of paying the bounties, and the State would refund a portion of the money

But the most serious objection to the bill which I return* for reconsideration remains to be stated. It does not provide the means to pay the debt the creation of which it authorizes. The debt contemplated in this bill is ten millions of dollars. It will not all be expended to provide for the present call, but it is probable that the whole sum will be required before the next session of the Legislature. The annual interest on the debt thus authorized is six hundred thousand dollars. Now what provision is made in the bill for the payment of the principle and interest? A poll tax of five dollars on every male inhabitant is provided for, and this, after deducting what will not be collected, will probably produce four or five hundred thousand dollars. Only the sum of one hundred thousand dollars is to be assessed on property. It will be perceived that the whole tax authorized in this bill will not be more than sufficient to pay the *interest* on ten millions of dollars, and when, at the end of ten or fifteen years, the principal shall fall due, there will not be a dollar provided for its payment. The tax on property should be increased, so as to pay,

in addition to the interest, at least half a million of dollars every year. The poll tax should not be large, and men who have served in the army or navy over a certain period should be exempt. Instead of postponing the payment of the whole principal, it would be better to pay at least the one twentieth part thereof annually. In such case authority should be given to appoint commissioners of a sinking fund to pay this loan at maturity, whose duties should be fully and specially defined in the law. This is essential to the success of the loan, for, before investing, capitalists will critically inquire into the provisions made for payment of the debt created.

I have stated the principal reasons which induce me to re-tur the bill for reconsideration. There are others that relate chiefly to details to which it is not necessary to direct your attention.

Should another bill be passed, I hope the debt of the State will not be made greater than is absolutely necessary. The State credit must be preserved. No human wisdom can foresee the termination of the difficulties attending the present deplorable civil war. After actual hostilities shall have ceased, the problem of reconstruction must be solved and the danger of complications with foreign powers will be imminent. At such a time it will be of vast importance to have the State comparatively free from the incubus of debt.

That if it be true, as represented in the preamble, that the act incorporating the “American Dock and Improvement Company” is “in violation of Article 1st, section 14th, of the Constitution, in that, that without just compensation it takes said rivers and bays from the freeholders and inhabitants of Bergen Township,” yet this would constitute no reason for the repeal of the said bill, as the rights of the freeholders and inhabitants of Bergen Township, as well as the rights and interests of the State, can be fully maintained, and all justly protected by the Courts of the State, in the exercise of their ordinary jurisdiction. That the act of incorporation which this bill proposes to repeal, was passed by the last Legislature after a careful examination of the legal questions involved, and with the opinions of the Attorney General, and other distinguished jurists before them. That considerable property and interests are already invested thereunder. That it would therefore be inequitable, as well as unreasonable now to repeal it. Your committee therefore recommend that Assembly bill No. 68, do not pass.

Senate bill No. 200, entitled

“An Act to confirm certain debts and liabilities incurred by the Township of Greenwich, in the County of Gloucester, in raising money incidental to the war, and to authorize the raising by special and annual tax, such further sums of money as may be necessary for the payment of sufficient bounties to secure the filling of the quota of said township by volunteers and substitutes, under the pending or any future draft.”

And have caused said bill to be re-engrossed, and the amendments made thereto to be embodied therein, and has passed the same.

“An Act to authorize the inhabitants of the road districts in the Township of Piscataway, in the County of Middlesex, to elect their overseers,”

With amendments.

Which was accepted.

Mr. W. J. Iliff, on leave, introduced a bill, entitled

“A Supplement to an act to regulate fees, approved April 15th, 1846.”

Which was, on motion, read a first time by its title, and ordered to have a second reading and referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

Assembly bill No. 300, entitled

“A Supplement to ‘An Act to create, from parts of the Town of Orange, and the Townships of Caldwell and Livingston, in the County of Essex, a new township, to be called the Township of Fairmount,’ approved March 11th, 1862,”

Was taken up and read a second time.

Mr. Kearney presented two remonstrances against the passage of said bill.

Which were read.

Mr. Lighthipe presented a petition in favor of the passage of said bill.

Which was read.

Mr. Kearney moved to postpone the further consideration of said bill indefinitely.

Upon agreeing to which motion, the yeas and nays were ordered and taken, as follows :

Mr. Speaker (Mr. Irick in the chair), moved to recommit Assembly bill No. 256 to the Committee on the Judiciary.

Assembly bill No. 324, entitled

“A Further Supplement to an act entitled ‘An Act to incorporate the City of Hoboken,’ approved March 28th, 1855,”

Was taken up, read a second time, considered by sections, amended, agreed to, and ordered to be engrossed and have a third reading.

Mr. Cleaver moved to reconsider the vote by which Senate bill No. 170 was rejected.

Mr. Lathrop moved to lay said motion on the table.

Which motion was not agreed to.

And the motion of Mr. Cleaver was not agreed to.

On motion, the House adjourned.

AFTERNOON.

At 2½ o'clock the House met.

Upon the call of the roll, the following gentlemen answered to their names :

Mr. Wilson, from the Committee on Engrossed Bills, reported sundry bills correctly engrossed.

Mr. Culver, on leave, introduced a bill, entitled

“An Additional Supplement to an Act to provide for the government of this State, and to fix the salaries of public officers, approved April 4th, 1845,”

Which was, on motion, read a first time by its title, and ordered to have a second reading and referred to the Committee on State Prison.

Mr. Culver presented the report of the majority of the committee appointed by resolution of the House and Senate to investigate the condition of the Bergen Tunnel, and if any legislation concerning the same was deemed necessary, to report by bill or otherwise.

Which was read, and laid on the table.

Mr. Treadwell, the minority of the committee, presented a report, accompanied with a bill.

Which report was read, and both laid on the table.

Mr. L. Abbett moved that the said reports, together with the testimony taken by the committee, be printed.

Which motion was referred to the Committee on Printing.

REPORT OF THE MAJORITY.

The majority of the committee raised by the joint resolution of the Senate and General Assembly of this State, to enquire as to the condition and safety of the Erie Railway Tunnels, respectfully report:

That they have given this subject their earnest and serious consideration, which its importance demands.

They have summoned before them and examined a large number of witnesses, employed at the tunnel by the Morris and Essex Railroad Company, and by the Erie Railway Company.

They have called to their assistance the eminent State Geologist, Professor Cook, and have themselves personally inspected the tunnel.

The attention of the committee was naturally drawn to two points of inquiry :

FIRST.—Was the tunnel as a structure safe? Is there any danger from the falling of rock from the overhanging arch?

SECOND.—Is there any necessity for legislative interference directing the mode or manner in which the tunnel should be used?

On the first of these propositions, we have been aided by the careful and scientific investigation of Professor Cook.

We are informed by his report that, from the nature of the rock, the overhanging arch of the tunnel, in the greater part

of the same, makes as safe a viaduct for the passage of rail-cars, as could be made by masonry, and that in those places, where from the character of the rock, it might be liable to fall, it is now well supported by brick work.

As this point of investigation by the committee involved a subject, which did not depend upon time tables, or on any temporary arrangement, which would necessarily from time to time be changed, the committee felt it their duty to make a careful personal examination of the tunnel.

This was done in the presence of Professor Cook, and so far as their united experience would enable them to come to a conclusion, it has been in concurrence with the views contained in the report of the State Geologist.

From the examination of the witnesses summoned before the committee, and information otherwise obtained, they find that the Erie Railway Company, by daily inspections, by their agents, do all in their power to ascertain whether there is any sign of weakness in the arch of the tunnel, or whether the rock is in any way liable to fall.

Thus far no accident has happened from this cause, and the committee feel warranted in dismissing this part of the case, with a full assurance on their part that they may rely with confidence in the result arrived at by the learned Geologist of the State.

The second point, relates to the mode of using the tunnel by the two companies. The committee find by investigation, that the tunnel is the property of the Erie Railway Company, and that the Morris and Essex Railway Company have the right to use the same, and that the mode of its use has been regulated by contract between the two companies.

The committee feel that so far as the property in the tunnel is concerned, and as relates to the contract between the two companies, there are questions of private right, depending upon deeds, and agreements between the respective parties, which is not within their province to adjudge.

Questions relating to the police arrangements for the use of the tunnel, depend upon different principles and fall more appropriately within the scope of legislative investigation.

The committee, from the time they entered upon the investigation of this subject, have felt that there was need of an accurate mode of determining when a train of one of the companies enters the tunnel, and when it went out, that the

conductor of another train might avoid a collision by means of undoubted information.

This information could be given by signals. The committee were informed that a telegraph apparatus had been ordered by the Erie Railway Company long before this investigation, but which had not been completed until recently, on account of the difficulty of procuring this kind of work to be done.

The committee regret that this delay had taken place, as in their judgement it is one of the most essential elements in the proper regulations for the use of the tunnel.

This difficulty is now removed, and a simple telegraphic apparatus has been put in use, which it is believed will greatly contribute to safety. As an approaching train is about to enter one end of the tunnel, a telegraphic communication is immediately made to an agent at the other end, and thus signals can instantly be shown at both ends. The exit, as well as the entrance of a train, can be shown.

A very simple device can be used denoting that the whole of the train has passed, and that no part has been left on the track by reason of the disconnection of the coupling.

A faithful use of the telegraph with signals, under such regulations as experience will point out, must largely contribute to safety, for the reason that no two trains can be in the tunnel, on the same track, at the same time, without disregard of orders.

The committee have seriously considered the point whether they should attempt by legislation to direct the mode of using the tunnel by the two companies. The rights of the respective parties are now fixed by contract. The mode in which those rights should be exercised depend upon conventional arrangement between the two companies.

Does it become the province of the committee to adjust time tables and arrange signals?

If the companies had manifested any disposition to disregard the obligations which they owed to the public, the committee might have been constrained to tread on this somewhat doubtful ground.

Both companies have shown a cheerful disposition and ready willingness to do what was necessary to secure the safety of the travelling public.

The committee would prefer to leave the regulations touching the use of the tunnel to the two companies.

Regulations which at one time would be sufficient, under changed circumstances, might become almost, if not entirely, useless.

If the committee should think proper to propose regulations, and the observance of them should lead to disaster, on whom would the responsibility fall?

These companies are common carriers. In some sense insurers of life and limb.

They are one of the greatest powers science has developed. By carelessness and wilfulness they can injure and destroy; they who use so great a power as steam, should be held to a strict accountability.

The companies should be held responsible for the correctness and propriety of the arrangements concerning the use of the tunnel, and the committee doubt the propriety of doing any thing which would shift the burden from where it belongs.

The committee have been informed that regulations have been adopted, which if faithfully carried out, would lead to safety, but on this point they would prefer to express no opinion, as the experience of a single month or day might develop the necessity for a change.

As to any accidents that have happened in the tunnel, the committee have investigated to some extent as to the facts, not with the view of adjudging who were in the right or who in the wrong, but to ascertain, if possible, what preventive precautions should be taken to avoid similar calamities.

The committee are fully aware that they have neither the power to try the parties nor to award damages. These powers, under our system, can best be exercised by the courts and the juries empaneled under the law.

The committee therefore conclude, that from the best information they can obtain, the tunnel is by them deemed safe, and that no legislation is needed on that point.

That as to the other point, touching the rules and regulations which should be adopted by the two companies, in the use of the tunnel, the committee feel much relieved by the telegraph which has been put in operation, and would prefer not to assume the responsibility of adjusting time tables, and laying

down rules for the government of switchmen and conductors, except so far as is provided by an act entitled "An Act for the appointment of commissioners, the better to secure the safety of passengers on railroads in this State," and now pending in the House of Assembly.

An Act for the appointment of commissioners, the better to secure the safety of passengers on railroads in this State.

1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey,* That there shall be nominated by the Governor, and appointed by him, with the advice and consent of the Senate, three persons to be styled General Railroad Commissioners, who shall have the powers and perform the duties hereinafter specified, and who shall hold office for the term of three years, and until their successors are appointed and qualified; *provided however,* that the first named of the three commissioners first appointed under this act, shall go out of office at the end of one year, and the next named at the end of two years, and the last named at the end of three years, and so on in rotation afterward, each commissioner at the end of three years, but any person going out of office may be reappointed; *and provided further,* that the Governor may fill all vacancies that may occur during the recess of the Legislature, and the commissioner or commissioners appointed by him shall hold office until the next session of the Legislature.

2. *And be it enacted,* That the said commissioners, or any two of them, may, as often as they may deem expedient, and at their discretion, or upon complaint in writing, under oath, of any person, alleging any particular in which the conduct of any railroad corporation or its agents is inconsistent with the public safety, (and shall) upon complaint made by any number not less than five stockholders or creditors of any railroad company, under oath, assigning in good faith,

sufficient reason thereof, shall visit and inspect any railroad in this State, its rails, switches, road crossings, tunnels, buildings, stations, works, bridges, and the engines and cars belonging thereto, and shall investigate the condition of such railroad and examine its by-laws and regulations, and the conduct of its officers and agents, and make any and all other inquiries needful to determine whether the affairs of such corporations are managed conformably to law, and with reference to public safety and convenience; and they shall have the power, annually to call for accurate and full returns and statistics from each railroad corporation, under oath of the President thereof, relative to the rate of speed of all trains, the amount expended for road repairs, laying and relaying tracks, in the construction of bridges, and other statistics touching the safety and security of the road, and they shall have power to summon and examine, under oath, all directors, officers, or agents of said corporations, and such other witnesses as they may think proper in relation to the affairs, transactions and condition of corporations; and said directors, officers, agents, or other persons, who shall refuse, without justifiable cause, to appear and testify when thereto required as aforesaid, or who shall in any way obstruct any commissioner in the discharge of his duty as prescribed in this, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction be subject to a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars, or imprisonment for a term not exceeding one year, or both, at the discretion of the court.

3. *And be it enacted*, That it shall also be the duty of said commissioners to advise and recommend the making of such repairs upon any railroad, railroad bridge, tunnel, or other property belonging to the same, as they shall deem necessary to the public safety, and to the safety of the operatives on said roads; also to recommend the adoption of additional signals, and other precautions to prevent accidents, than those in use, and the employment of other and additional switchmen or signal men, stated examinations of their wheels, axles, brakes, and other appurtenances to the engines or cars, having a due regard to the character and income of the road; also, the number of brakemen that shall be placed and kept upon the trains of any road, and in what proportion to the number of cars connected with its trains; also, if they shall deem it necessary to the public safety, that express and other trains run at high speed, and on dangerous roads, shall have a lookout upon the engine, distinct from the engine man, whose

duty it shall be at the approach of danger to sound the whistle, which shall be affixed to the engine in close proximity to his seat, and which shall be so constructed that the sound cannot be mistaken for that of the engineer's, on the alarm of which every brakeman shall immediately down brakes and stop the train; also, to advise as to the rate of speed of the trains upon any one of the several roads, or upon descending grades at dangerous crossings, or upon other portions of the same, if in their judgement the rate adopted by the directors of any road, or run upon the same, shall be greater than is consistent with the public safety; also, to direct that suitable warning boards are put up at such crossings as are dangerous, and signal men stationed or gates erected at such as are extra hazardous, or if they shall deem proper, that the engineer's whistle be blown continually, from a point eighty rods from any crossing, until the train has passed the same; and also such warning board over the track, at the switches, and near the stations, or in other places, warning people against walking upon the track on penalty of the law, as they may deem necessary and proper; and all directions, advice and recommendations, given and made by said commissioners, pursuant to the powers given in this section, shall be in writing, under the hands of said commissioners, or any two of them, served by copy upon the secretary of the company by some indifferent person, and returned to the commissioners with endorsement of service, attested, sworn to, and the administration of the oath certified thereon, and preserved as hereinafter provided; and it shall be the duty of said commissioners to report any neglect to adopt any recommendation or advice made as aforesaid to the next Legislature.

4. *And be it enacted*, That on every railroad in this State where cars are run with passengers, and where the rail tracks are laid over any draw bridge, the motion of the train shall be entirely stopped, three hundred feet from any draw bridge, to give an opportunity to examine whether the draw is open or closed, and the rate of speed over any draw bridge shall not exceed five miles an hour; and where any rail track shall cross any other rail track where any cars are run with passengers, the locomotive shall be stopped three hundred feet from such crossing, to enable the engineer to see whether any other train is approaching, and any engineer having the charge of a train who shall violate the provisions of this section, shall be liable to the penalty of two hundred dollars, to be recov-

ered by action of debt, with costs, in any court of record in this State, one-half of the sum named to be for the use of the person who shall bring such suit, and the other half for the use of the State; and further, that it shall not be lawful in any tunnel of any railroad, for two trains of cars to be in the same on the same track, at the same time, and for any violation of this provision relative to any tunnel as aforesaid, the engineer of any train so violating the same, shall be liable to a penalty of two hundred dollars, to be recovered by action of debt, with costs, in any court of record in this State, one half of the sum recovered to be for the use of the person who shall bring such suit, and the other half for the use of the State; and in case of injury to any passenger, arising from such cause, such engineer shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and liable, on conviction, to a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars, or to imprisonment not exceeding three years, or to both, in the discretion of the court where such engineer shall be tried; if any engineer, officer, agent, or employee of any railroad company, shall knowingly, willfully and designedly disregard and disobey any rule, regulation, or published order, issued by said company, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by fine, not exceeding one thousand dollars, or imprisonment, at hard labor for any term not exceeding one year, or both, at the discretion of the court.

5. *And it be enacted*, That every railroad corporation shall, within twenty-four hours after the occurrence of any accident attended with serious personal injury, give notice of the same to the said commissioners, in writing, who upon receiving such notice, or upon public rumor of said accident may repair or dispatch one of their board to the scene of said accident, and inquire into the facts and circumstances thereof; and any corporation neglecting or wilfully omitting to give the notice aforesaid, shall be subject to a penalty of one hundred dollars for every day that such neglect or omission shall continue; and it shall be the duty of said commissioners, without charge, to furnish any person injured, or the friends of any person killed, any information they may have acquired in relation to any disaster, and the names of the person from whom the same was obtained, or by whom the same may be proved.

6. *And be it enacted*, That if, upon examination of any railroad, or its management, or the affairs of any such corporation, a majority of said commissioners shall be of opinion that its rails, bridges, switches, engines, tunnels, or cars, are

in such condition, or that its affairs are so conducted as to endanger the safety of the public, or the said corporation has, in any material respect, violated the law, or refused to obey the directions of said commissioners, made under and pursuant to the powers given in the forgoing sections, or has suffered any person to hold or exercise the duties of any office in said corporation contrary to the provisions of this act, then and in every such case, said commissioners, or a majority of them, may make application to the Chancellor of this State for an injunction to restrain such corporation, in whole or in part, from further proceedings with its business, and to restrain such persons from holding or exercising, or attempting to hold or exercise, the duties of such office, until a hearing can be had in the premises, and the Chancellor may order such injunction to issue, and may at his discretion dissolve or modify said injunction, or make the same perpetual, and make such orders and decrees to suspend, restrain or prohibit the further proceedings of such corporation in its business, or such person in relation to such office as in his judgment the public safety or the law may require, and may enforce such decrees by attachment.

7. *And be it enacted,* That the said commissioners, in the first week of every session of the Legislature, shall make a report of the general conduct and condition of all the railroads within the State, making such suggestions for legislation as the public interest shall seem to them to require; and in case any violation of law, on the part of any railroad corporation, shall come to the knowledge of said commissioners, they shall in like manner make report thereof.

8. *And be it enacted,* That no person, being at the time a director, superintendent, or stockholder of any railroad corporation in this State, shall receive the appointment as commissioner under the act.

9. *And be it enacted,* That the said commissioners shall make and keep a record of all complaints, or other papers addressed to them officially, and of all their official acts and proceedings, and of all facts learned in relation to any casualties, and the names of the persons from whom derived, or by whom they may be proved.

10. *And be it enacted,* That the said commissioners may, on special occasions, employ experts or other agents, whose services they may deem to be temporarily of importance.

11. *And be it enacted*, That the said commissioners shall have the right of passing to and fro, free of charge, in the performance of their duties, on all the railroads in the State, and to take with them any person in their official employment.

12. *And be it enacted*, That before entering on the duties of their offices, the said commissioners shall make oath that they will faithfully and impartially discharge all the duties incumbent upon them in their said office agreeably to the constitution and laws, and according to their best abilities and understanding: a certified copy of which oath they shall, within thirty days thereafter, cause to be filed in the office of the Secretary of State.

13. *And be it enacted*, That said commissioners shall be entitled to charge and receive for their services at the rate of five dollars, per day for the time actually employed, and all reasonable expenses, payable semi-annually from the treasury of the State, and from the funds received from the taxes upon railroad companies; and the commissioners shall make out a bill therefor, specifying the items and the time and place of service, and when the same shall have been audited and approved by the Comptroller and Treasurer, the Comptroller shall draw an order on the Treasurer therefor.

14. *And be it enacted*, That all suits or prosecutions for any violation of the provisions of this act, shall be commenced within six months after the cause of action shall arise.

15. *And be it enacted*, That all acts and parts of acts, inconsistent with the provisions of this act, are hereby repealed, and this act is declared to be a public act, and shall take effect immediately.

REPORT OF THE MINORITY.

The undersigned, a member of the committee appointed under the joint resolution, "for the purpose of investigating the condition of the Bergen Tunnel: the regulations for using it, the preventing of accidents therein and ensuring the safety of passengers and property passing through the same; and if in their judgment any legislation is necessary to secure the safety of life and limb, to report such a bill as shall seem to them proper;" submits his report, as follows:

FIRST.—*As to the condition of the tunnel.*—The importance and necessity of ascertaining the facts in relation to the condition and present and prospective safety of the structure of the tunnel, induced the undersigned at the first meeting of the committee, to offer a resolution that the aid of Professor George H. Cook should be secured; this resolution was adopted, and that practical and accomplished geologist and engineer devoted himself earnestly and thoroughly to a series of examinations, the results of which are minutely described in his report, which is submitted by the committee.

The undersigned was present when the committee passed through and examined the roof and sides of the tunnel, and it is gratifying to him to be able to say that his own apprehensions of danger from falling rock or from the imperfect form of some portions of the roof or arch, were entirely allayed; and he thinks that the result of the examinations of Professor Cook and of the committee should remove all fears as to the safety of the structure of the tunnel.

With regard to ventilating the tunnel, which is *indispensable* before it can be lighted, it appeared from the evidence adduced, that the subject of ventilation had been *talked of*, but no experiments had actually been made, and whilst it is undoubtedly practicable, the undersigned heard nothing to induce the belief that it is likely to be seriously and vigorously attempted.

SECOND.—As to the regulations for using the tunnel and preventing accidents therein, the undersigned would state that he was present at every session of the committee, and in view of the evidence before them, he is compelled to differ entirely from the report of the majority of the committee.

It is true that the officers of both the New York and Erie and the Morris and Essex Railroad Companies, profess with much emphasis, their earnest desire to adopt measures calculated to protect the traveling public. Yet the experience of the past year proves, unmistakably, that they have not realized the dangers to which persons passing through said tunnel are exposed, or provided proper regulations and precautions to avert them; and the additional measures for safety adopted by them have not *preceded*, but *followed*, the accidents which have occurred.

There is not a cordial co-operation on the part of the employees and operatives of the two roads, which, together with the fact that there is quite a difference of opinion between the

superintendents of the two roads now using the tunnel, as to what regulations *are necessary* for the safety of passengers, and also that the day is not far distant when the cars of other companies will probably pass through and use said tunnel, induces the undersigned to believe that some stringent legislative action is necessary for the safety of the traveling public through said tunnel.

The bill entitled "An Act for the appointment of commissioners, the better to secure the safety of passengers on railroads in this State," referred to in the majority report, if it becomes a law, would afford all needed protection for the safety of passengers through the Bergen Tunnel; but, as that is a general act, which under the resolution appointing the committee, there is no power to report, and as by that resolution the committee are directed to report such a bill as they deem necessary, the undersigned considers that he would fail to discharge a most important part of his duty did he neglect to report a bill which he deems necessary. In accordance with these views he submits the foregoing report, and the accompanying bill.

An Act to regulate the use of, and the running of trains in and through the Bergen Tunnel, and to secure greater safety to the traveling community.

WHEREAS, The use of said tunnel by different railroad companies, and the right to use it by others, renders it expedient, and the public safety requires that provision should be made for enforcing such regulations as may be proper and necessary to be adopted in the premises; therefore

1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey,* That the owners of said tunnel, shall as soon as practicable, place in, through, or over the same, the necessary telegraphic wires and other fixtures or machinery to signalize from one end of the tunnel to the other, and shall not permit a train to enter in the tunnel upon the same track until the preceding train shall have passed out of the tunnel and crossed the track and switches of another company at the other end; and that all necessary gates and signals shall be put up by the owners of said tunnel, to prevent the entrance of any train until the train preceding has passed out of the tunnel and crossed the switches or track at the other end, and that proper regulations and signals shall be adopted and observed by the companies that now or hereafter may use said

tunnel, their agents and employees, to prevent the collision of trains when the trains of one road are crossing the switches of the other, at each end of the tunnel, and that the expenses of operating the telegraph and the signals connected therewith, shall be borne by the said companies using the said tunnel in proportion and rateably to the number of trains run through the tunnel by each.

2. *And be it enacted*, That the Governor shall, immediately upon the passing of this act, appoint a suitable and competent person, who shall have power, and whose duty it shall be to inspect, supervise and approve the arrangements adopted for the safety of passengers and trains passing through the said tunnel; and he shall have power to discharge or remove any employee of any railroad company now using, or that may hereafter use the said tunnel, who shall be in charge of the switches, signals, telegraph, track, or other arrangements for the protection of passengers and trains, who shall be guilty of negligence, inattention, violation, of rules, or disobedience of orders in the performance of his duty in that behalf; and the said inspector shall see, and is hereby charged, that the provisions of this law, and all rules and regulations approved by him under it, are fully carried out, and to that end shall have power to stop the trains of any railroad company using the said tunnel, to carry out the same, until a compliance with said regulations, rule, or order shall be secured; *provided however*, that in the adoption of time tables at the tunnel, and running of trains, due regard shall always be had to the rights of New York and Erie Railroad Company, as is secured to them by the charter of the Long Dock Company, the several supplements thereto, and their agreements with other companies using the said tunnel.

3. *And be it enacted*, That in case of the disregard of any railroad company using said Tunnel, to observe the rules and regulations, as approved by said inspector, in reference to the running of such train or trains through the said tunnel, it shall be the duty of the inspector to apply to the Chancellor to enforce such order, and restrain such company from the use of said tunnel; and the said Chancellor may cause the said order to be enforced, and disobedience of such order to be punished by the Court of Chancery, in the same manner and to the same extent, as in cases of injunction issued out of said court.

4. *And be it enacted*, That the said Inspector shall hold his

office during the pleasure of the Governor, and he shall receive a salary of—dollars per annum from the Treasurer of the State, who shall collect the amount quarterly from the different companies using the said tunnel, in proportion to the number of trains which each company shall pass through the same quarterly; and the Treasurer shall pay the same to the Inspector quarterly; for which purpose each of the said companies using the said tunnel, shall, on the first days of January, April, July and October of each and every year, make a report to the Treasurer of this State, of the number of trains passed by said company during the previous quarter, through the said tunnel.

5. *And be it enacted*, That within thirty days after the passage of this act, rules in accordance therewith shall be prepared by the several railroad companies using the said tunnel, which rules when approved by said inspector, shall be issued to the agents, officers and employees of the companies using said tunnel, and which rules such officers, agents, and employees are hereby required to observe, perform, and obey.

6. *And be it enacted*, That if any engineer, officer, agent, or employee of any railroad company now using or that hereafter may use the said tunnel, shall knowingly, willfully and designedly disregard, and disobey any rule, regulation, or published order of any company or companies using said tunnel, approved and adopted by said inspector, he shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and shall on conviction thereof be punished by fine not exceeding one thousand dollars, or imprisonment at hard labor for any term not exceeding one year, or both, at the discretion of the court.

7. *And be it enacted*, That this act shall take effect immediately.

I have this day received official information of the capture of the Cities of Richmond and Petersburg. The Secretary of War sends me the following telegram:

“The President announces the evacuation of Petersburg and probably Richmond, as follows:

CITY POINT, April 3, 1865, 8.30 A. M.

General Grant reports Petersburg evacuated, and he is confident Richmond also is. He is pushing forward to cut off, if possible, the retreating army.

WAR DEPARTMENT, April 3d, 10.45 A. M.

It appears from a dispatch of General Weitzel just received by this department that our forces under his command are in Richmond, having taken it at 8.15 this morning."

I have ordered a national salute to be fired at 12 o'clock noon to-morrow, on the grounds of the State capitol in honor of these important victories.

It is hoped that the fall of the Confederate capital will hasten the return of peace and the restoration of the Union.

I herewith return for re-consideration,

Assembly bill No. 49, entitled

"An Act to confirm the division of real estate in the Township of Warren, in the County of Somerset,"

With my objections.

Article third of the Constitution of New Jersey divides the departments of government into *legislative, executive and judicial*, and forbids any person or persons belonging to, or constituting one of these departments to exercise any of the powers properly belonging to either of the others. The object contemplated by this bill is to establish the title to land by declaring a parol partition valid in law.

The Legislature has no power over the subject; it properly belongs to the judiciary; and if the parties desire to confirm and quiet their title to the premises in question, they must apply to the courts.

The act of the Legislature would be a nullity and would not accomplish the desired object.

Even if the Legislature had the power to establish the title to land, it would be unwise to exercise such power. In the haste of legislation, sufficient opportunity cannot be had to investigate the merits of such an application. The courts have time to hear evidence, weigh proof and examine title papers.

Before a legal tribunal the investigation is not *ex parte*, but in the presence of the parties interested, upon due notice being given to each individual, or his lawful guardian.

The present application is doubtless made in good faith. If the facts, as set forth in the preamble of the bill, should be proved before a Court of Equity, a decree would be made confirming the title of the heirs to the respective tracts as set off in the division heretofore made.

A parol partition by metes and bounds, accompanied by distinct and separate peaceable possession for more than twenty years, would, in my opinion, be valid.

But if the parties desire a decision that will settle that question, they must institute legal proceedings, and not seek an act of the Legislature.

Neither the legislative nor executive power can aid them.

It is said that some of the owners of the premises described in this bill are minors, and this furnishes an additional reason why it should not be approved. The Legislature cannot pass an act affecting the title to lands of minors or other persons, who may at the time be under legal disability to act for themselves, without violating section seven, of the fourth article of the Constitution of the State.

It will be observed that this does not belong to a class of cases where there is a formal omission or defect in the execution or acknowledgement of title papers.

Mr. SPEAKER:—

I herewith return

Assembly bill No. 349, entitled

“An Act to defray incidental expenses,”

With my objections.

The Constitution of the State of New Jersey provides that members of the Legislature shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law, which shall not exceed the sum of three dollars per day, for the period of forty days, and one dollar and fifty cents per day for the remainder of the session.

Those sums were subsequently fixed by law as the per diem compensation for services.

It has been customary for the Legislature, in the annual incidental bill, to provide for the payment out of the treasury of the State, for the necessary stationery, postage, &c., used during the session of the members and officers of the two Houses, in the transaction of the public business.

This is a proper object of expenditure, and the amount to be furnished and the sum to be paid therefor must be determined by the Legislature. As the Legislature have the means of judging how much stationery is necessary for their use, I am not disposed to interfere with the exercise of their discretion. In this bill there are large appropriations for stationery, knives, pencils, postage, &c., but in addition to these items I find the following :

101. State Treasurer, for incidentals furnished to the members of the General Assembly, six thousand dollars.

As every article necessary for the use of the two Houses appears to be provided for in the items before referred to, I cannot conceive what is included in this item for "incidentals;" no particulars are given and no vouchers produced, I therefore conclude that the amount is to be paid in cash.

I consider this an indirect mode of paying the members for their services, more than the amount authorized by the Constitution, and therefore I cannot approve the bill while that item is retained.

I feel grateful, when reflecting on the fact that so much harmony has prevailed among the members during the session. I thank you for the uniform courtesy and kindness extended, and I bid you all an affectionate adieu.

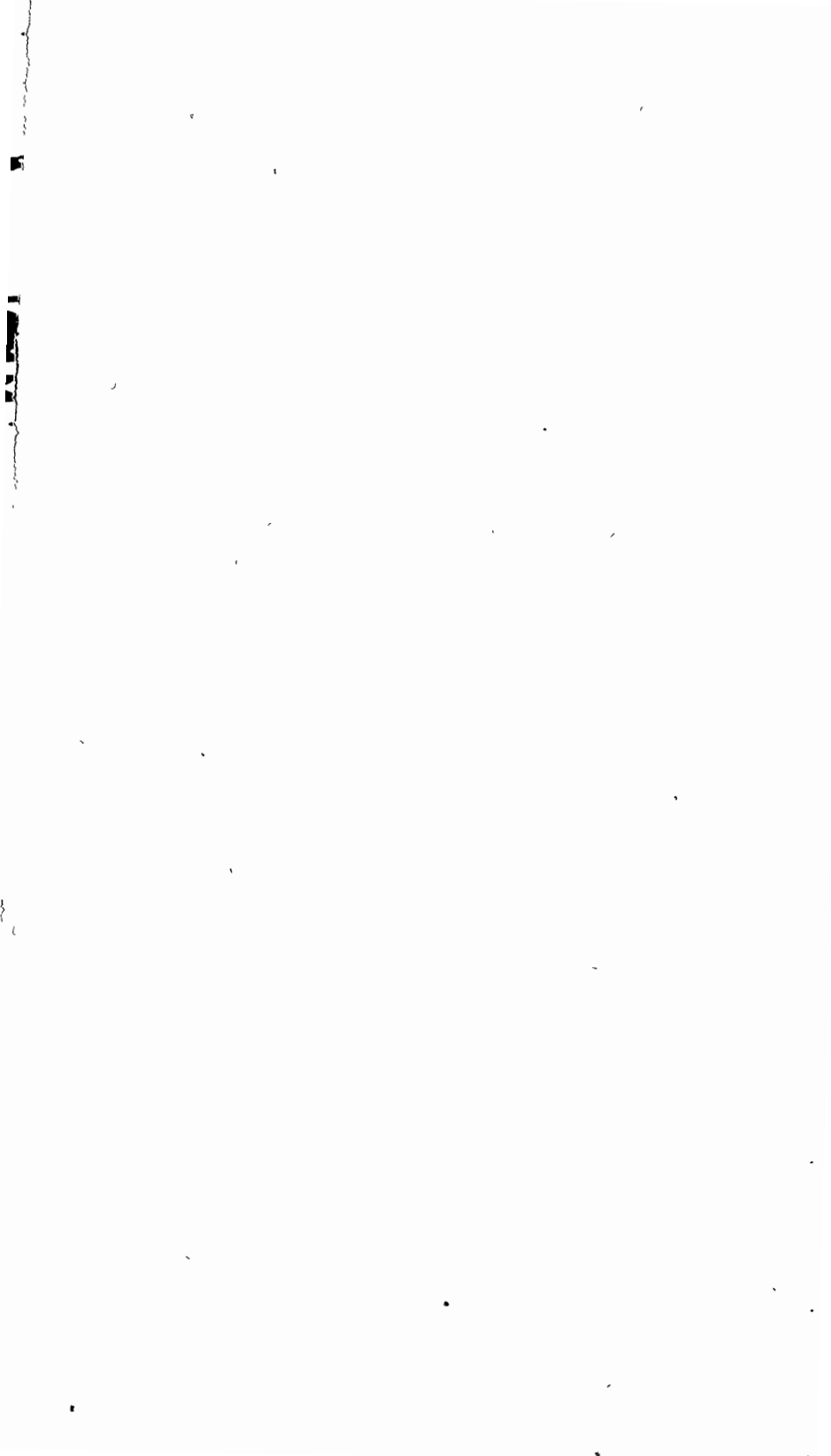

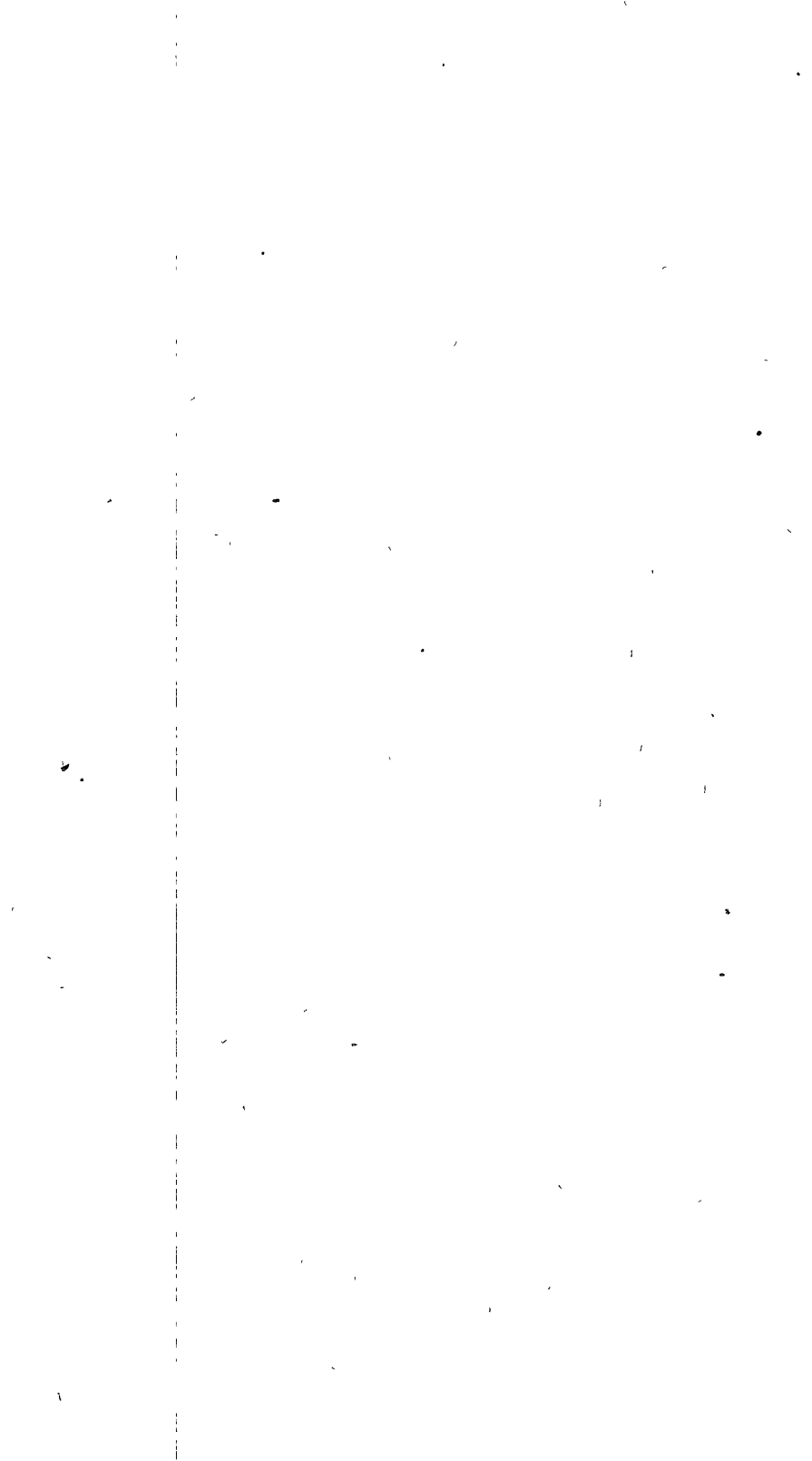
