TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

The Sixth Annual Convention of the NEW JERSEY SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION, assembled in the First Congregational Church, Jersey City, Wednesday, Nov. 11th, 1863, at 2 o'clock, P. M.

The President of the Association, Hon. JAMES BISHOP, of New Brunswick, called the Convention to order. Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. J. M. HOLMES, Pastor of the Church in which the Association convened, invoking the presence and blessing of God upon the Convention.

A note was read by the Secretary, from Prof. McIlvaine, of Princeton, explaining his inability to be in attendance as an invited speaker, owing to sickness in his family.

The Convention was then addressed by Rev. Dr. Rodgers, of Bound Brook; Rev. J. S. Smith, of Hackettstown; D. W. Voorhies, of Somerset; and H. H. Seabrook, of Monmouth, responding with earnest congratulations to the cheering facts presented in the report.

The Convention then adjourned to 7½ in the evening.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

A large audience gathered at the hour designated. The chair was occupied by the President, and devotional exercises conducted by Rev. Dr. Rodgers.

The first topic of the evening, assigned by the Business Committee—“How can the Church be made more fully to appreciate the importance of the Sunday School;” was discussed by the Rev. J. Milton Holmes, pastor of the Church in which the Convention was held.

The second topic—“The importance of gathering in *all* the children of the State into the Sabbath School,” was ably discussed by Prof. David Cole, of New Brunswick.

A collection was taken in behalf of the funds of the Association, after which the Convention adjourned with the benediction.

THURSDAY MORNING.

The hour previous to the morning session was set apart by the Business Committee to be spent in devotional exercises. A solemn and delightful meeting, conducted by Rev. Dr. Rodgers, left its influence upon the entire sessions of the Convention.

At 9½ o'clock the chair was taken by the President, when the minutes

of the proceedings of the previous day were read by the Recording Secretary, J. B. Breed, and adopted by the Convention.

The Hon. James Bishop now delivered the customary opening address of the President. He congratulated his fellow-laborers on their assembling together. Politicians held their conventions, science and art, education and religion have their conventions, great bodies of all kinds meet in assembly over their interests—much more should Christians meet over such an interest as the bodies and souls of the children. These conventions had been blessed in the past. That now being enjoyed would also be blessed, if the same spirit prevailed in it, of love to God, to the brethren, and to the dear children. The chairman desired to see much of this loving spirit. He wanted the fire of a deeper enthusiasm in the work, and a higher, holier engagedness in it, to be carried away by every brother to his home, and given to the hearts of Christians there till all should be warmed into a living, acting, working power for Christ. The necessity of reaching *all* the children in the State was urged—of employing colporteurs, agents, voluntary or otherwise—by any means some, to go into every destitute district and carry the Sunday School with them. There should be enough of self-denial, and of the true missionary spirit in our churches to see, positively, that every neglected nook and corner of the State was *reached*, if not renovated, during the coming year. Will the churches do it?

The next business in order was the reading of the State Secretary's report, which will be found at the close of the proceedings.

On motion of Dr. Rodgers, the friends of the cause from other States were invited to sit as corresponding members of the Convention.

The rest of the morning was engaged in discussing the topics presented in the addresses of the speakers on the evening previous.

Rev. Mr. Bush, of Hackettstown, spoke of the destitution under the very shadows of our churches.

James H. Kellogg, Esq., of Troy, a delegate from the N. Y. State Sunday School Association, presented a word of affectionate greeting from his own State.

H. M. Morey, of Princeton; P. H. Brooks, of Mercer; Geo. T. Mulford, of Elizabeth; Rev. L. C. Edmonds, of Cape May; A. J. Dumont, of Camden; Aaron Coe, of Newark; Rev. Alfred Taylor, of Bristol, Pa.; Cornelius Brett, of New Brunswick; Robert Johnston, of Newark; John Hill, of Boonton; Rev. Mr. Everett, of Blackwoodtown; W. J. P. Morrison, of Ohio; and Rev. J. S. Smith, of Warren Co., all participated in the discussion of the topics of the morning.

Rev. J. S. Smith here offered the following resolution which was adopted by the Convention.

Resolved, That monthly concerts are a most efficient means of promoting the success of the work, by awakening a deeper interest among the members of our churches, by impressing a deeper sense of responsibility on the parts of teachers, by conducting powerfully to the conversion of scholars, and by securing a very great increase in the attendance of children upon our Sabbath-schools.

Mr. J. Dumont offered the following :

Resolved, That regular weekly teachers' prayer-meetings should be held in connection with all our Sabbath-schools.

This resolution, after discussion, was laid upon the table, the Rev. J. Brinton Smith urging the impropriety of the Convention's making such a declaration.

After a few words from the Rev. Mr. Bacon and Rev. Mr. Bush, urging to greater practicalness, as an aim, the Convention adjourned.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

At 3 o'clock the Sunday-school children of Jersey City assembled in the First Presbyterian, the Union Baptist, and the Reformed Dutch Churches, where they enjoyed a delightful season, singing and hearing addresses from speakers provided by the Convention. Among the speakers were Rev. Wm. P. Breed, of Philadelphia; Lucius Hart, of New York; J. H. Kellogg, of Troy; Mr. Pelt, of New York; Rev. M. Kempshall, Andrew A. Smith, of Brooklyn; Cornelius Brett, and others. All who attended these meetings spoke of their deep interest. May the children be lastingly profited by them!

THURSDAY EVENING.

At 7½ o'clock a waiting audience had gathered. Rev. Robert Aikman, Vice President, occupied the chair. Rev. Mr. Bush, of Hackettstown, conducted the devotional exercises.

An able and instructive address was then delivered by Rev. Samuel A. Clark, of Elizabeth, on the importance of laboring directly for the *conversion* of the Sunday-school scholar.

The next speaker was Rev. Alfred Taylor, of Bristol, Pa., who proceeded conclusively to answer objections made the Sunday School.

The audience was then addressed by J. T. Shipman, Esq., of Belvidere, on the duties of the Sunday-school teacher.

After a collection the audience was dismissed with the benediction.

FRIDAY MORNING.

At 9½ o'clock the convention re-assembled, after a profitable hour of prayer, conducted by the Rev. Mr. Holmes. After the reading of the minutes, the Rev. Dr. Rodgers offered the following resolution, and strongly seconded it :

Resolved, That the closing of the Sunday-schools during the winter season, as shown by the reports made to this Convention to be so very prevalent, is a greivous evil, for which there is generally no sufficient reason, and that the practice should be discontinued in all possible cases.

Rev. J. S. Smith heartily seconded the resolution. The children loved to come. If the teachers were on hand they would be sure to be.

S. W. Clark, State Secretary, also urged the matter, and the resolution was carried.

The Rev. Mr. Bush made an earnest talk in favor of employing even the unconverted, or at least non-professors of religion, in some cases, as teachers. They might not feel it their first duty to join the church of Christ, and yet might desire to teach a class. They should be encour-

aged. We should be glad that such are willing to serve us, though all the credit of their labor should be given to the Master.

The Rev. R. Aikman spoke of the conversion of children. Faith and repentance, the cardinal doctrines of salvation, could be exercised by a child as they could by no other. Trusting and loving, the great acts of the renewed soul, were easy to childhood. The speaker illustrated by an incident of a child of intemperate, degraded parents, who died a Christian's death.

A. J. Dumont urged the brethren not to forget, in the discussion, that the primary object of this Association was to carry the Sabbath-school to the thousands of neglected ones in the State.

Mr. Davenport, of Somerset, moved the passage of a resolution adopted at previous Conventions, urging teachers to converse regularly, once each week, with each scholar separately, on the subject of personal religion, and to make them the subjects of constant prayer.

After some discussion on the expediency of instructing thus in the details of the teacher's work, the resolution was laid on the table.

Resolutions of thanks to the President and Secretaries, the pastors and trustees of the churches, the kind hosts of Jersey City, and to the railroads that furnished free return tickets to delegates, were unanimously passed.

The Nominating Committee then made a report presenting candidates for the several officers of the Association. On motion, the names presented were unanimously declared the officers of the Association for the ensuing year. Their names will be found in the appropriate place in the report.

The Committee further reported the place for the next convention to be New Brunswick. The report was adopted.

Delegates were appointed to the next New York Convention, to be held at Buffalo, viz.: Hon. James Bishop, S. W. Clark, and Rev. P. A. Strobel.

The closing hour was devoted to a season of religious conference, which was refreshing to many hearts. Several brethren took part in the devotional exercises and in general remark, viz.: Rev. Mr. Bacon, Mr. Counsellor of Newark, Rev. J. S. Smith, the Chairman, Rev. Dr. Imbrie, Rev. Mr. Parmalee, Rev. J. Brinton Smith of Jersey City, and S. W. Clark.

The closing address was delivered with much feeling by the Rev. Mr. Holmes. He thanked the brethren for coming to this city. He had been delighted with their counsels and suggestions, and he hoped improved. He urged the brethren to go home and work still more earnestly and effectively than ever, and he prayed the blessing of God to descend upon them in their separate fields of labor. "God bless you for coming," was his parting benediction.

The Convention then adjourned, *sine die*.

REPORTS.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Your Secretary, in making his Annual Report to the Sixth Annual Convention of the Association, would return devout thanks to Almighty God for the favors which the Association has found with his people throughout the entire State, and for the encouraging facts which are brought to light in the reports from the several County and Town Secretaries. While the figures in the sums total annexed below are largely increased by the more thorough and complete returns from the several counties, yet all of them show for the schools reported, both last year and this, a gratifying increase in almost every particular, and call for fervent thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father for the honor he is conferring upon this great and important instrumentality in the conversion of the world.

In entering upon the work assigned to him by this Association, your Secretary aimed to secure co-operation from every County in the State, but has been able to find willing coadjutors in but 18 of the counties, In each of these 18 counties a County Secretary has been at work a longer or shorter time, and reports have been received from them during the year, giving hopes of statistical reports from the entire number. As yet but 15 have reported. One (Cape May) reports the county organized, and ready to take its place in the ranks at the next Convention, and from the other two—being counties never before statistically represented in the Convention, we hope to hear before the close of this session.

Work has been done in behalf of the Association in four new counties, Salem, Sussex, Gloucester, and Ocean; and discontinued in one, Bergen, on account of the removal of the Secretary from the county.

Last year full and complete returns were had but from *five* (5) counties, while this year *ten* (10) counties make full returns, and the rest are largely in advance of the last year's report. We are thus enabled, from the statistical tables of this year, to make nearly accurate deductions, where before we could but conjecture; and we confidently expect, from the assurances afforded us, that we shall be enabled to extend this tabular view over the entire State at the next annual Convention.

The returns from the 15 counties reporting give the following results :

These aggregated statistics present to us many sources of congratulation and rejoicing, and many facts showing defects and failures which call for the earnest and prayerful consideration of every lover of the great Sabbath School work.

The first prominent fact which rejoices every Christian heart, is the largely increased number of hopeful conversions.

As the result of the direct efforts of Sabbath School teachers, 1,522 have given their hearts to our dear Redeemer. If angels rejoice over the conversion of *one* sinner from the error of his ways, what joyful songs of praise should go up to heaven from the whole Christian Church at this army of young Christian soldiers, newly enlisted under the Banner of the Cross. And yet the field is white to the harvest.

Another encouraging fact is the large increase in the infant scholars, of whom over 14,000 are now gathered into the Sabbath schools of 15 counties, an increase of more than 80 per cent. on last year. These "little lambs" are justly attracting more and more attention from year to year, and the "Infant-class" is becoming an institution in many schools where it has hitherto been unknown.

An item which should engage the attention of the whole Church of Christ, is the fact, that of 11,497 laborers engaged in teaching the way of salvation to our children, 2,591, or over one quarter, are not connected with the Church, and are ignorant of the way themselves. It seems to us incomprehensible that this can be permitted by the servants of the Most High. That the Church should thus delegate the highest trust Christ has committed to it, the feeding of the lambs, to those who have not been baptized by the Spirit of Christ, seems to us a shame and criminal neglect.

Another cause of great regret is the number of schools discontinued during the winter months. Nearly one-half (282 out of 827 schools) hold their sessions only during the summer months; thus nearly half the children are wholly destitute of combined religious instruction during one-half the year. There are some districts where this state of things is rendered necessary on account of the sparseness of the population, and the impediments offered by the difficulty of travel over mountain roads—but the figures show that the evil is by no means confined to these districts.

The following statement shows the proportion of schools discontinued to those reporting, in the several counties:

14, Atlantic, $\frac{1}{3}$; 9, Camden, 1-6; 21, Cumberland, $\frac{1}{3}$; 12, Essex, 1-10; 1, Hudson, 1-53; 45, Hunterdon, 3-5; 9, Middlesex, $\frac{1}{4}$; 28, Monmouth, $\frac{1}{3}$; 11, Morris, $\frac{1}{3}$; 11, Passaic, $\frac{1}{2}$; 17, Salem, 3-5; 60, Somerset, 5-7; 30 Sussex, 5-6; 54 Warren, 9-10; 4, Union, 1-13.

In a great portion of the districts covered by these reports, the ordinary daily business avocations are carried on through the week, the secular schools are continued through winter, but the Sabbath School is shut up for fair weather and clear skies. It seems to us that there is a culpable apathy in this regard, and that the love for souls should constrain us to larger sacrifices and more earnest effort. The difficulty in sustaining schools in the winter lies not so much in the impossibility to gather the children, as to sustain the corps of teachers—the harvest is still here—but the laborers shrink from gathering it in. We commend the consideration of this subject to the Convention, and to the great army of Sabbath School teachers—whether it be not possible greatly to diminish this evil, and to hold out, with an unflickering light, the lamp of life to the perishing youth of our State.

Another source of regret is the comparatively small number of schools which have any systematic, concerted union for prayer. Only 182 schools, or less than one-fourth, have regular meetings for prayer-

Ought not this social means of grace to be grafted on EVERY Sunday School within our borders? Would not the efficiency of our schools in the great work of winning souls to Christ be immeasurably increased, were teachers to *unite* in petitioning the gift of his Holy Spirit to teachers and scholars. We need more prayer *in* our schools, and more prayer *for* our schools, to make the Sunday School what it ought to be—the “vanguard” in the army of the Lord.

Trusting that the prayerful consideration of these statistical results may eventuate in the quickening of the Church to its whole duty to the youth of our land, and that the coming Sabbath School year may be one resulting in a fruitful harvest, your Secretary presents this brief report.

COUNTY REPORTS.

ATLANTIC COUNTY.

HAMMONTON, N. J., Nov. 9, 1863.

Samuel W. Clark, Esq., Secretary State Association :

Dear Brother :—We are able to report some progress this year in the good work of Sunday Schools. Our Association, which was formed in August, 1862, has held, since its formation, four meetings, at all of which a great deal of interest, we might say enthusiasm, was manifested.

All denominations work together harmoniously in furthering the objects of the Association, and already does the County begin to feel the influence of our meetings. At least one school was started during the past summer as the result of one of our meetings, and many persons have been stimulated to work more earnestly and vigorously in this department of the Lord's vineyard.

It affords us much gratification to be able to send you reports, we believe from all but one of our Sunday Schools; and yet, in looking over these reports, we are filled with sorrow because they reveal to us the alarming fact that not one-half of our children between the ages of five and eighteen are gathered into our Sunday Schools, and that more than one-half are growing up into utter disrespect of the Sabbath and the God of the Sabbath. It must ever be remembered that those families that are diligent in instructing their children at home in the truths of God's Word, are those that are most careful to send their children to Sunday School; and those that allow their children to grow up without the benefit of a home religious education, are the ones that are careless in requiring their children to attend Sunday School. Since such is the case, it follows that those who are not found in the Sunday School, are deprived of the great benefit of a religious education altogether. This is an unpleasant and a lamentable state of things. We are allowing to grow up around us a race of godless beings, with no religious restraints thrown around them, who will soon, humanly speaking, have the destinies of our nation in their hands, and if now the sins of our nation are so great as to bring upon us chastisements from the hand of God, we fear that it will be worse by and by.

It is well for us to know these facts, that we may again buckle on the armor, and enter with greater ardor into the contest, and strive to bring to bear upon the minds of the rising generation, while these minds are tender and easily molded, the beneficent influences of the Gospel of Christ, that they may grow up a seed to serve the Lord, and that this nation may be in the future, a better, a more righteous, a more God-fearing and God-loving nation.

CAMDEN COUNTY.

In our last Annual Report of this County, we offered and recorded the earnest prayer that "God in His infinite mercy and saving grace would visit every school, and awaken a deeper interest on the part of pastors, superintendents, teachers and scholars in the Sunday School cause, revive His own work in our county, and everywhere, that more vigorous and determined efforts might be put forth that the children now in the Sabbath Schools might be more faithfully instructed, and the dear little lambs outside the fold gathered in and perishing souls saved." The prayer was offered in reliance on God's promise to hear and answer the prayers of his people offered in faith, and we now rejoice in being enabled to report a much more hopeful and interesting state of feeling manifest in very many of our schools. The Lord has not left us without witness of his tender mercies and willingness not only to hear the prayers of his children, but to bless the faithful efforts put forth, to reclaim the erring, instruct the ignorant in the knowledge of the truth as it is in Christ Jesus, that they may seek and find *Him* who is able to save from eternal death all who will repent of their sins and believe in his name.

Many of our scholars during the past year have been born into the kingdom of grace. The angels in heaven have rejoiced and songs of redeeming love have been sung by many who a year ago employed the powers and talents which God had given them in acts of disobedience of his righteous law, and the greater sin of rejecting the Saviour. Thanks to God for his unspeakable gift, that of his only begotten and well beloved Son. Thanks to his name for the finished work of salvation; thanks again to his name for the gift of the Holy Spirit to convince of sin and lead sinners to repentance and to the exercise of a saving faith in Jesus.

The number of schools reported is sixty-nine. One township, has not reported, and another township has no Sunday School within its bounds, though one hundred and four children residing in the township attend neighboring schools in adjoining townships. No organized school has been disbanded, but several new schools organized during the year. One, embraced in the statistical report, was organized last Sabbath by and through the efforts of the energetic and faithful laborer in the Sunday School field, Mr. J. F. K. Stites, numbering at its organization forty-two scholars, two officers and seven teachers, with a prospect of a large and speedy increase.

With this will be found the statistical report of the county for the past year.

CUMBERLAND COUNTY.

We number sixty-six Schools in the county; all are in successful operation at this time. The influence of Sabbath School instruction has been felt to quite an extent in our county during the past year.

Our county is well organized; we have eight hundred teachers that are laboring in our schools, to impress God's truth upon the minds and hearts of the children. Many of them have been permitted during the past year to see the fruits of their labors made visible in the awakening and conversion of the children. We have over five thousand children in attendance at the various schools, listening to catch the truths of God's Word as they fall from the lips of their faithful teachers. I can safely say the teachers are laboring for success, and looking for success, from their labors in this good work.

I have visited nearly all the schools in the county, and find them well conducted, most of them in a healthy and growing condition. I find the officers and teachers fully determined to go forward in this good work, looking for the blessing of Heaven to rest upon their labors. In conclusion I would say, Oh that God would still awaken a deeper interest in this good work, that he would revive His work in our schools, that more vigorous efforts might be put forth, that the children now in our schools might be more faithfully instructed, that many of them might be gathered into the fold of Christ.

NOTE BY THE STATE SECRETARY.—The statistical table showing the condition of Sabbath Schools in Cumberland County, was very carefully prepared by the County Secretary, at great personal inconvenience and sacrifice, and was by him brought to the Convention and laid upon the Secretary's table. By some unaccountable means it was mislaid, and never came actually into the Secretary's hands. We regret this very much, as owing to the ill health of the County Secretary, who had overtaxed his strength in the cause, the report could not be reproduced. We refer to last year's report as an evidence of the industry and faithfulness of Mr. Ogden, and the healthy state of the cause in Cumberland County.

ESSEX COUNTY.

NEWARK, November 1, 1863.

The Report of Sabbath School statistics for the year now ending, shows a favorable increase on almost every item.

There are reports this year from 120 schools—18 more than last year. The number of teachers is 2,434—an increase of 334. The number of pupils is 17,639—an increase of 2,654. The average of attendance has increased from 10,890 to 11,767. Last year the number of teachers who were church members, was 1759; this year it is 1981, an increase of 222. The number of pupils who are church members, has increased from 801 to 1121; 328 conversions are reported this year, an increase of 131 from the previous report. The number of volumes in Sabbath School libraries is 41,627, and the amount of benevolent contributions, \$4,516 08—an increase in the former of 3,407 volumes, and in the latter of \$626 64. Out of the 120 schools reporting, but 12 are discontinued during the winter.

There are in the county, according to the best estimates which can be made, about 6,000 children not in the Sabbath Schools; of this number about 3,000 are in the city of Newark. While this is a smaller proportion than in most other counties, it is still so large that it ought to arouse all the energies of every Christian heart. I have been aided during the summer in visiting the schools of Newark, by Aaron Coe, Esq., of this city.

Much is here being done by means of Mission Sabbath Schools, in destitute portions of the city. Eighteen such schools, with an *average attendance* of over two thousand per Sabbath, are now sustained by the different evangelical denominations.

The number of these Mission Schools is continually increasing, and, at the present rate of progress, we shall in a short time reach every child in the city who can be brought into a Sabbath School.

With such good reason for thankfulness for the past and encouragement for the future, as is afforded by the above statistics, will not every friend of Sabbath Schools in the county redouble his efforts and his prayers,

HUDSON COUNTY.

The Secretary of the New Jersey State Sunday School Association, for the County of Hudson, in making his first annual report to the County and State Associations, desires first to acknowledge God's goodness and blessing in the favorable organization and commencement of the Association, and to make grateful mention of the hearty welcome with which he has been everywhere received, and that already the State and County Associations are hailed as new and valuable helps in this good work.

Pursuant to public notice very generally given by your Secretary, friends of the Sabbath Schools of the County of Hudson, met at the Reformed Dutch Church on Wayne street, in Jersey City, at 2 o'clock, P. M., April 21st, 1863. Mr. F. B. Betts, of Jersey City, was called temporarily to the chair, and the meeting opened with prayer by Rev. Edward W. French, of South Bergen.

Your Secretary stated fully the objects of the meeting, and after deliberate conference, in which Revs. W. Verrinder, P. D. Vancleef, Edward W. French, R. Vanhorn, T. A. Bungeoth, W. H. Parmalee, and Messrs. J. S. Howell, A. S. Jewell, P. P. Van Arsdale, R. N. Perlee, J. L. Odell, John M. Morse, Daniel Picken, J. P. Kline, Wm. Plumer, A. H. McPherson, S. L. Condict, M.D., R. G. Pardee, J. W. Parker, W. K. Moore, Geo. S. Riker, John Ullner, and others participated, it was resolved that a County Sabbath School Association was desirable, and be organized. Whereupon the following officers were elected and the Constitution adopted:

Henry Lindsley, Esq., of Bergen, President; A. S. Jewell and A. S. Hatch, of Jersey City, Wm. Plumer, John H. Morse, E. L. Bridgeman, of Hoboken, T. H. N. Wilks, of Hudson City, and N. B. Lane, of Bergen Point, Vice Presidents; D. M. Stiger, Jersey City, Secretary and Treasurer; George Noble, Harrison, John T. Seymour, Jr., Hoboken, James T. Kitchell, Hudson City, Justus Slater, South Bergen, H. W. Buxton, Jersey City, Dr. Tolson, West Hoboken, Assistant Secretaries.

There are in our county about 17,450 children and youth, between the ages of 5 and 18 years. Of this number there are about 9,640 in our Sabbath Schools, (about 3,000 in the Roman Catholic Schools of the county,)—leaving 4,856 without Sabbath School instruction. Where are they, and can they not be brought under religious teaching? All the children and youth of the county with ease may attend upon the Schools now organized, (61 in number.)

The Schools in the county are in a flourishing condition—some of them growing rapidly. Our Mission Schools are doing a good work, and are worthy the visits of strangers and friends.

There is room for more Schools. Three might be successfully commenced in Jersey City. In Wehawken, Guttenburg, and Secaucus is room for three good Schools, and is largely mission ground, Christian teachers would find there a welcome. Our purpose is to occupy these fields soon.

Your Secretary would commend most earnestly the practice of some of our Schools in giving short Scripture lessons, and having them thoroughly committed to memory. This is the great object, to have our scholars know the truth, that they may be sanctified thereby. He has noticed, with great pleasure, the quiet and order during prayer and singing, and in most of the Schools during the entire session.

Especial attention in every part of the county in the formation of Bible Classes of young ladies and young men in connection with our Schools, is *most exceedingly desirable*. Our county is peculiarly situated, and contains perhaps a population unlike any other in the State, being

immediately opposite the City of New York, and may be called a county of cities, all of which, as also most of the other portions of the county, are fully alive to the vast importance of the religious training of children and youth. Harrison, our most distant town, is not behind her sisters, and already has three large and growing Schools.

Many of our Schools are giving quite largely to benevolent purposes, and several of them sustaining in whole or in part Schools in the West, or scholars on heathen ground. Increased attention is being given to the special duty of aiding the destitute, both at home and abroad.

There are in our county two Sabbath School Teachers' Associations. One in Jersey City, in which twenty-one Schools are represented, meeting on the second Monday evening of every month, and one in South Bergen, including Hudson City and West Hoboken, in which twelve Schools are represented, meeting on the second Monday evening of alternate months—both are efficient and accomplishing great good—to them we owe much of the growth and vigor of our Schools, and the efficiency and faithfulness of our Teachers and Superintendents.

After personal and pleasant visits to almost every School in the county, I am glad to report that while there is great room for improvement, such a spirit of inquiry, faithfulness and prayer prevails with the pastors, superintendents, teachers and parents, as assures us that the future is full of promise, and our Schools will, with the blessing of our Divine Master, continue to increase in blessings to our county as in the past.

For all the blessings of the past, and for the promising future, we gratefully acknowledge the goodness and favor of God, and say that "hitherto the Lord hath helped us:" in Him will we trust and go forward. All of which is most respectfully submitted.

HUNTERDON COUNTY.

The undersigned, Corresponding Secretary for the county of Hunterdon, would express his profound gratitude to the Great Head of the Church, for the privilege of laboring another year in the cause of Sunday Schools, and especially for the measure of success with which his efforts have been crowned. It is with great satisfaction that he records the steady progress of the Sunday School enterprise in Hunterdon county during the past year. He has the pleasure to present reports from seventy-five (75) organized schools, being an increase of nineteen (19) schools. These schools have seventy-eight (78) officers, eight hundred and seventy (870) teachers, and *five thousand* one hundred and sixty (5,160) scholars. The gain in teachers has been two hundred and thirty-two, and the gain in scholars, 1,517, being an increase of nearly fifty per cent. The average attendance both of teachers and scholars, has been much better than in former years, and on the whole, the friends of Sunday Schools in Hunterdon county have much cause to "thank God and take courage."

The Annual Meeting of our County Association was held at Frenchtown, in the Baptist Church, on 16th September. The attendance of delegates was not as large as was anticipated, yet the interest displayed was very encouraging. The deliberations were conducted with zeal, and at the same time with great harmony, and are believed to have left a very salutary impression.

It was the painful duty of the Corresponding Secretary to communicate officially to the County Association the death of some of our most active and useful members. Amongst these were the Rev. Joseph Rogers, of Frenchtown, Col. A. W. Dunham, of Clinton, the Hon. Peter

I. Clark, and Mr. J. C. Read, of Flemington. The removal of these brethren will leave vacancies which will not be readily filled; as they were all eminently useful in the spheres in which they were called to move, and especially in the Sunday School cause. It is a source of comfort, however, to know that they fell at the post of duty, with their armor on, and that they now walk in company in the changeless day of their eternal home, and are reaping the reward of their devotion to the Master's service. Let us be admonished by these sad providences "to work whilst it is called to-day, for the night cometh in which no man can work."

There is much yet to be accomplished by the friends of Sunday Schools in Hunterdon county, and in fact throughout our State. It is a solemn and alarming fact, that a very large proportion of the children in our county and State are growing up without the instructions of the Gospel, and without those religious influences which are necessary to mould human character and prepare it for the highest measure of usefulness on earth and for the happiness and glory of the heavenly world. Let all the friends of Christ then bestir themselves to give increased efficiency to the Sunday School cause, as one of the very best agencies for attaining these great and glorious ends. MONMOUTH COUNTY.

To the New Jersey Sunday School Association:

In presenting our Fifth Annual Report, we would express our gratitude to God for all that has been accomplished in the Sunday School work in this County; and our regret that for want of time so little has been done of the important work devolving upon your County Secretary.

In the Schools we have been permitted to visit, we have generally found an increased interest in the work, and in some a corresponding numbers, whereby we have derived encouragement.

At the meeting of the County Association in Freehold, on the 27th of August last, the attendance was so small that we were disappointed in gathering our statistical reports, which we expected to do at that time, thinking the gathering would be large, and depending upon that source almost entirely for that purpose, having forwarded circulars extensively throughout the county with the request that they should give in their reports at that time; I may add that there is a corresponding lukewarmness in support of the State Association. If I did not feel the importance of sustaining the State Association, I should abandon it in discouragement for lack of sufficient support in "staying up its hands."

The County Association adjourned to meet with the Reformed Dutch Church in Marlborough, on the fourth Thursday in August, 1864, with a resolution to make an effort for improvement in gathering in reports, and gathering together a larger number, if possibly the interest may be increased.

We report 61 schools; 681 teachers; average attendance, 440; 3,779 scholars; average attendance, 2,807; over eighteen, 213; 522 teachers, church members; 204 scholars, do.; 109 conversions during the year; 16 deaths; 547 infant class; average attendance, 398; 14,033 volumes in library; \$280 21 benevolent contributions.

A detailed account of these sixty-one schools is furnished in the statistical tables. These are not more than three-fourths of the schools, and from the best information we can obtain there are not more than half the children in the county between the ages of 5 and 18 years under Sabbath School influence. Notwithstanding the seeming lack of

earnest coöperation with the Association there seems to be more persons who are waking up to the importance of the Sunday School work, and there is decided improvement in numbers and interest in many of the schools.

Your Secretary would feel gratified if you would select some one better qualified, and one who could devote more time to the work, to fill the (in his opinion) very important office of County Secretary for Monmouth County.

MIDDLESEX COUNTY.

In presenting to the Association the report of the Sunday School cause in the county of Middlesex, it is necessary to explain the cause or its imperfection. The present Secretary assumed the duties of this position only on the first of October last, in consequence of the resignation of the regular appointee. The short space of time intervening between this and the meeting of the Association was not sufficient to allow a county organization to be completed as contemplated by the Association. We incline to the belief that the meeting for the county will be most useful to the cause of the Sunday School, if held in the Spring, at the time the county schools (to which class most of the schools in this county belong,) are about to resume their sessions, as it would most probably enliven the feelings and energies which, because of non-employment, have become in some degree dormant. Some steps toward a county organization have however been made in the appointment of good men in some of the townships to act as Town Secretaries. In the remaining townships appointments will be made as early as possible, and by their aid we hope our county will be more completely reported than ever before. We are fully satisfied that no county in this State so much compliments the idea of this Association as Middlesex. The incompleteness of our report, the little information we are able to present of the condition and prospects of the Sunday School cause amongst us, are results flowing exclusively from the fact that we have never yet realized the idea of the Association, neither developed the principle of securing a perfect working body, by a thorough division of labor, as only can be done by a County Convention of the friends of the Sunday School, aided by Town Secretaries and Town Committees. This, and we believe this only, will so arrange the Sunday School forces, so equip our teachers and encourage our pupils as to realize the wish, execute the work and accomplish the design of the New Jersey Sunday School Association.

We have sent circulars to sixty-three schools, and we must think that there are still not a few in the county unknown to your Secretary, because it has been impossible in a month to know or reach them. Of these to whom circulars have been sent, 23 have sent their reports. Four schools send us their first report to the Association. It is proper to remark here that the Presbyterian school at Kingston is composed of teachers and pupils resident in three counties. Those only residing in this county are reported.

We regret being compelled to leave out of the above list some of our most flourishing schools—schools reporting most liberal contributions for benevolence in other objects, and overlooking this enterprise, which is so clearly a domestic missionary association, in that it directs its efforts towards the children not only of our State in general, but of every county, every town, those neglected children all around schools already established. The Association only asks to be supported by these schools in order that it may in turn support these schools. "He that watereth shall himself be watered."

Allow us briefly, yet kindly and decidedly, to suggest to the teachers of our Sunday Schools the absolute necessity of punctuality and regularity in their attendance upon their classes—how fully do they meet the responsibility they have voluntarily assumed. The little ones placed under their care will be just what their teachers make them. If teachers are tardy or irregular, their classes will be like them: they will imitate only too closely. Nor will they be over attentive when present; their interest in the class is impaired; the love of the school is chilled, and little wonder that it is so. Now the natural, and often the quick consequence of this is the entire disorganization of the classes, and, if the fault be general, the entire extinction of the school. We report 530 teachers enrolled, with an average attendance of only 401. *One hundred and twenty-nine* teachers absent from their duty every Sabbath in *thirty-six* schools. Where there is already a deficiency of teachers, this absence is sorely felt.

Still, in view of the circumstances which surround us, in view of those daily occurring events which are calculated to draw the mind away from the interest of the humble Sunday School, we have great reason to thank God that it is as well with us as it is. We would thank God and take courage, and enter upon another year's work with a determination to give ourselves wholly to the work of the Master, and in the humble, yet potent Sunday School, strive to glorify him whose we are.

One fact in the history of one of our Mission Schools, (the Union Mission of New Brunswick,) deserves notice, as it is one of great encouragement to all. During the past year this school had an opportunity offered them to contribute \$10 for a Sunday School library in the State of Illinois. The library was sent to that destitute place, a school was organized in the face of strong opposition, and soon the strongest opponent, by means of his little child who would attend the school, was brought to see his error, and now ranks among the firmest supporters not only of that school, but of all others. And why? Because it is his spiritual birthplace. And so may the feeblest of our schools do.

SOMERSET COUNTY.

Having been permitted to continue my work for another year, I submit to the N. J. S. Sunday School Association my Fourth Annual Report, exhibiting the condition of the Sunday Schools in Somerset County during the year 1863; and in consequence of my removal from the County, I tender to the Association herewith a resignation of my office as its Secretary for Somerset County, and bid my co-laborers in that noble field God-speed in carrying forward the work now so happily begun. I part from them with sincere regret, solacing myself with the thought that their aims and mine will still be one, and that when our work in our different spheres on earth shall be completed, we shall *unite* again in a song of triumph in Heaven.

Somerset County is now in perfect working order. Statistics of Sunday Schools have been collected regularly for four consecutive years, and the plans and objects of the N. J. State S. S. Association are clearly understood. The County Association is well organized, and is really one of the most thoroughly understood and most heartily loved institutions of the County. It holds a regular annual meeting on the second Tuesday in September, beginning at 10 A. M., and continuing in session throughout the morning, afternoon and evening. This meeting is always largely attended, and manifests a growing zeal in the Sunday School cause, which is highly gratifying and gives splendid promise for the future. The last annual meeting was held in the First Ref. Dutch Church, of Somerville, (Rev. Dr. Messler's) Sept. 8, 1863. In point of interest it was equal to any that preceded it. The next meeting is to be held in the Presbyterian Church at Basking Ridge, (Rev. J. C. Rankin's.)

At the late meeting in Somerville, the excellent township Secretaries presented their annual Reports promptly, exhibiting as usual, a fidelity in the discharge of their duty, which is truly remarkable. The County Secretary desires here to return to these faithful men his sincere thanks, as he feels that without their hearty coöperation, the full reports which have always been rendered from Somerset County could never have been prepared. The sum of these reports is presented in the statistical table. It will be seen that the County has this year 85 Schools, all of which are fully reported.

The returns of the past year, when compared with those of previous years, show a remarkable steadiness in the condition of Sunday Schools in the county. Heretofore, the Secretary in his report, commented upon

the items. But these are so similar from year to year, that there would be too much of sameness if this course were again pursued. In 1860 there were 77 schools, from which, with all our efforts, we could obtain the statistics of 72 only. Even these were but partial reports, as in many cases no records had been kept, and in others the record had been very imperfect. In 1861 there were 86 schools, of which 80 furnished reports, better than before, but still incomplete. During the last two years, records have been everywhere kept according to the items of our reports, and the result has been, in each of these years, a perfect report. This indicates that work has been done, and that the officers of our schools have been stimulated to improvement in their work. It will be so in every county where the same steps are taken.

The number of youth over 18 years of age is largely increased since 1860. More teachers and more scholars are church members, and the number of hopeful conversions grows yearly. In 1860 and '61 there were but one or two Infant Classes in the County. There are now 46, many of them in a very flourishing condition. It is believed that very little money was taken up in the schools for benevolent objects, previous to 1862. Now 45 schools take up collections regularly, and many of them with some specific object in view to animate them, as the support of a colporteur or missionary, or the education of a theological student, or a heathen child. All these are signs of progress, and in contemplating them we feel many times repaid for the delightful toil by which, under God, these results have been secured.

In bringing this report to a close, I cannot refrain from mentioning with high commendation, a school in Bridgewater township, in which the entire number of teachers, scholars in the adult school, and scholars in the infant school was present without exception during the school season. The teachers are 17 in number, the adult scholars 40, and the infant scholars 12. The same thing was true of the teachers in this school last year, then 11 in number. At the county meeting when this report was presented, such regularity was deemed impossible by those present. The officers of the school were called upon for information; the report was verified by a gentleman from the school who was present. This, therefore, is the banner school of Somerset county for 1863, in respect to regularity of attendance. There are also several other schools whose teachers have all been present without exception during the year, as will be seen upon consulting the tables.

SUSSEX COUNTY.

The duties of Corresponding Secretary of this Association having been but recently transferred to my hands, my practical acquaintance with the condition of the Sunday School interest in my field is necessarily very limited. I can therefore do little more than hand over the statistical table as I received it from my predecessor. It is, as will be perceived, incomplete. But nine of thirteen township Secretaries have reported during the past year; and two of these report but one school in their respective townships. This, if not a mistake, argues a sad and most culpable neglect of the spiritual interests of the young, and which, if it indeed exist, I trust will be speedily repaired. A glance at the accompanying statistics will be sufficient to show that the Sabbath School interests are not in as flourishing a condition with us as they

might be, and I trust will be, when the beneficent influence of this Association shall have been brought fully to bear upon them.

Our third Annual Convention, recently held, cannot have failed to exert a power for good, especially upon those friends of the cause who were present at the exercises. They must needs have gone home with the determination to labor more energetically for its advancement, and we hope, to provoke others also to good works.

There is an effort about being made, at least in one congregation, to keep open its Sabbath Schools throughout the winter. This will be a pleasing and encouraging novelty in this region. In some cases perseverance in this course will involve no small amount of self-denial on the part of officers and teachers; but doubtless they will find pleasure in making the necessary sacrifice when they realize that it is made in the Master's cause; and when they witness its blessed effects upon the minds and hearts of the young, as they doubtless will, if they labor in faith and prayer, they will confess they have been repaid a hundred fold. They will thenceforward feel reluctant to share alternately with the world the culture of so interesting a field as the susceptible heart of youth; after sowing good seed therein for one-half the year, they will not consent to leave it the other half entirely to the devil to root up the young and tender plants of grace, and sow his accursed tares in their stead.

We will hope and pray that, if spared to participate in another anniversary, we shall have a more complete, and in every respect a better account to render of Sabbath Schools in Sussex County.

I could not believe our county to be behind others in its interest in the Sunday School cause; one of two things must therefore be the case: either that it did not approve of the State Association, or that it was not acquainted with its objects. The latter I found to be the case. The matter had never been fairly brought before the churches and the schools. I was therefore determined that it should come up, and they have an opportunity to act with it, or decline so doing, and I was happy to find a hearty concurrence in every part of the county. The Town Secretaries acted with commendable zeal, and on the 16th ult. we had an enthusiastic County Convention in this place, when a permanent organization was formed and a constitution drafted and adopted. I send you a report of our doings, which was published. The accompanying tabular view will sufficiently supplement this brief report.

UNION COUNTY.

The County of Union is steadily advancing toward that culminating point, we hope to reach, when every child within its borders shall be found in a Sabbath School, learning of the love of Jesus. God grant it speedily, and to His name be all the praise.

Officers, teachers, patrons and friends of the Sabbath School, we can

report to you this year a larger number of schools, a larger enrollment of scholars, a larger number of conversions, and a deeper religious conviction than we have ever before been able to report.

Fifty-one schools have reported. Two schools only have failed to report. These, though belonging to evangelical churches, have positively refused, wishing no part or lot with us in this great enterprise.

We are prepared therefore to furnish the statistics from every known school in the county save four. The number of scholars enrolled, 5,294, average 3,746. Over eighteen years of age, 429. Scholars, members of the Church of Christ, 344. Number of teachers, 744. Average attendance, 631. Of these, 598 are followers of Jesus. Last year the average attendance of scholars was 3,543. Of teachers, 607. Gain this year, scholars 203, teachers 24. Of this number of scholars, 1,111 are in the infant department. Most of these departments throughout the county are conducted by admirable teachers, with results highly satisfactory. In this city we have one infant class of 100 members, another of 90. The latter of these reflects great credit on its conductors, both in decorum and attention. Amount contributed for missionary work, nearly \$2,000.

In one school, at least, in the county, the teacher of each class has selected one scholar for whom special prayer is offered *daily* for that scholar's conversion. Each teacher has in turn selected one or more Christian friends to offer together their united supplications for the same scholar at the same *time*, without regard to place. Think you, dear friends, *results* will not follow this concentrated effort on a single object? Let eternity disclose. Our province is to "wait." Go on dear teachers, God sees your desires, He will accept the work at your hands.

Fifteen thousand five hundred and seventy volumes are reported in all the libraries. In this connexion we may remark that all the schools feel the necessity of keeping up the library, by adding new books, and culling out volumes of an uninteresting character, which go toward filling up the shelves, without adding to the interest of the readers. This yearly addition of 100 or more books to each library is felt by many to be a necessity, and the sooner all feel and act upon it, the better for scholars and schools. It takes but little to please a child after the affections are once gained, and if a few new books each year will keep *one* child in a class more contented and happy, it is money lent unto the Lord, and cost what trouble it may to procure it, the funds should be procured.

In many of the schools, texts of Scripture to the extent of a whole book have been committed to memory by the scholars, for which they have received a premium. In one mission school of 70 scholars, twelve thousand verses have been learned perfectly by the scholars in three months. There are those engaged in this good object who object to taxing the mental capacities of children in this manner; to such let me remark that the mission school referred to is in a neighborhood composed almost exclusively of Universalists and Infidels, the scholars themselves being children of these very parents, and, without any church, have had two conversions during the year, while at present there is a deep spiritual interest pervading the whole school, and for this school your prayers are this day solicited. The simple reading of God's Word has been accompanied by arrows from His quiver, which we believe will be the means of building up a Church in this wilderness of sin. Superintendents and teachers, never fear that God's Word will injure the mind of any child; plant as much as practicable in the memory of all the scholars, God, in His own time; will send the Sun of Righteousness to shine upon it, and it will bud and blossom, bearing fruit unto eternal life.

The great object of Sabbath School teaching is the conversion of the scholars. We can report 88 hopeful conversions this past year. Is not this fact a subject for profound gratitude to Almighty God? What teacher can see his scholar standing up to take God's vows upon him, and not have his own heart leap within him for joy? How can the interest in this great work "lag," whether for money to successfully carry on the operation, or from want of faithful teachers to lay themselves upon God's altar? Are not such results enough to inspire us with new courage? Are they not enough to compel us to lay aside every weight, and with an ardor hitherto unknown to us, bend every energy in the prosecution of this work?

But yet the cry comes to us from all parts of the country for faithful teachers. God has given every man work enough to do that there may be no room for idleness; we look around us, and the work is not accomplished—the appalling fact is before us to-day that more than 2,000 children in this small district are *out* of the Sabbath School, (and this institution seems the least objectionable to a religious training,) consequently, without any of those better influences that lift man up, till he is but a little lower than the angels. Teachers, friends and patrons, what have we to say for these? When the Judgment is set and the books are opened, can we say we have done what we could? Has the command which was given by the great lawgiver 1800 years ago, "Go work to-day in my vineyard," fallen in our time upon deadened ears? Are we to lie supinely on our backs, and hug the phantom that we have done *our duty*? "DUTY!" There are those among us who try to appease their troubled consciences that they have done their duty, when they, in their devotions have committed these wayward children to the care of God. Listen! while I quote from Jeremy Taylor the following: "He that serves God with the soul, without the body, when both can be conjoined, doth the work of the Lord deceitfully. The body alone can never serve God, without the conjunction and preceding act of the soul; and sometimes the soul without the body is imperfect and vain: for in some actions there is a body and a spirit, a material and a spiritual part, and when the action hath the same constitution that the man hath, without the act of both, it is as imperfect as a dead man." Go then! pilgrims of the cross, upon your bended knees before the Searcher of the secret heart, and in the light of this Gospel-day answer these questions.

Brothers and sisters in Christ, let us ask our ourselves the question, Who is responsible for the religious training of these 2,000 children? Let us ask the question, and let us answer it, before the finger which wrote "Tekel" on the wall of Belshazzar's palace, shall write upon our hearts, *thou art the man.*

"Go work in my vineyard," is as applicable to us as it was to those Jews on the very day in which it was uttered. No excuse can be offered for leaving the work undone. The vineyard is before us: thousands of children around us, who have no religious training or influence surrounding them. Many, for aught we know, may be thirsting for the water of life. Are you willing for the love you bear to Jesus, and the unbounded love He has displayed toward you, to lead these thirsty souls to the same fountain from which you have slaked your thirst? "Freely ye have received, freely give." God has led us by the green pastures, and beside the still waters; for what? That we might wrap our virtues in a napkin, or, that these Christian virtues might be displayed by us toward those upon whom the same light has never shined. "He that watereth shall be watered also himself. These sin-sick souls can be healed. Who shall do it? Soldiers of Christ, arise! put on the whole armor of God. Go forth in His name to do your whole duty. Plant missions wherever

a score of scholars can be collected. God may bless you by allowing you to see some souls brought into his kingdom. "He that winneth souls is wise." *Win souls! win souls!* to the Redeemer. We entreat you, superintendents, you teachers, you friends, to gather in these children. "Gather them in, let the house be full; gather them into the Sunday school; gather them in from the streets and lanes; gather them in, both the halt and lame, gather the children in." Fill all these waste places with joy and gladness, then shall the trees clap their hands, and the little hills rejoice on every side.

WARREN COUNTY.

To the New Jersey Sunday School Association:

In the Annual Report of the condition of the Sunday School cause in Warren County, for the year 1863, there is much that is startling and lamentable, and yet much that is encouraging and cause for grateful acknowledgment to God.

There are in the county, under eighteen years of age, and old enough to attend Sunday School, about ten thousand children, and there are only about four thousand of them in our Evangelical Sunday Schools: leaving about six thousand, or *three-fifths* of the whole number destitute of Sunday School instruction. And yet in this county there are very few foreigners who are opposed to our Sunday Schools, and very few persons connected with churches that are not evangelical. Almost all of these six thousand that are not in our Sunday Schools, could, with suitable effort, be gathered in.

Three-fourths of our Sunday Schools are closed during the winter, and less than one-third of the scholars who attend Sunday School, and only a little more than *one-ninth* of all in the county, who are of suitable age, attend during the whole year. A very general impression prevails that it is necessary to close Sunday Schools in rural districts during the winter. "It is inconvenient to build fires; it costs something for fuel; it makes Sunday a busy day; it makes extra trouble for parents to get children ready, and for teachers to turn out in the cold, the snow, or the mud, and the school will not be as full as in the summer;" and other such inconveniences and excuses are balanced against the worth of the souls of the dear children—the inconveniences and excuse weighs down the scale, and the souls of the children are turned over to the care and culture of Satan at least half of the year, *merely because it is not convenient* for Christ's disciples to care and labor for them!

Another startling fact is, that out of seventy-two schools, only four hold regular teachers' prayer meetings, and only two hold monthly concerts of prayer.

If, then, we compare this fact with the fact that only *fifty-seven* conversions are reported, we have great cause for gratitude to God that *so many have been converted* in answer to *so little prayer*, and at the same time we are encouraged to hope and believe that if all our schools held regular teachers' prayer-meetings and monthly concerts, God would bless our labors proportionately, and a very large increase in the number of conversions would be the result.

What can our labors accomplish without God's blessing? and what right have we to expect God's blessing upon our labors, unless we unitedly and faithfully seek it?

Very few of our schools report any regular benevolent contributions, and thus a very important part of the religious education of children is generally neglected.

While these and other facts seem discouraging to the friends of Sunday Schools in our country, yet it should be borne in mind that the *development* of these facts shows an awakening in the minds of our people which augurs well for our cause in the future. This development is made through an organization which is becoming more efficient and will not rest satisfied with merely revealing our destitutions, but will enlist the labors and prayers of Christians and philanthropists to supply them.

A great work is to be done, but God is stirring up His people to do it, and He will abundantly reward their efforts: and the time is coming when all the children of our country will be brought under the teachings and power of the Word of God.
