

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY,
TRENTON, January 12th, 1897.

House met at 3 P. M.

Message was received from the Governor, by the hands of his Private Secretary, as follows:

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE.

Gentlemen of the Senate and General Assembly:

In compliance with the direction of the Constitution, I submit to you a statement of the condition of the State and my recommendation of such measures as I deem expedient for your action and consideration.

In the annual reports of the various State departments, institutions, and officers will be found full and detailed information concerning their condition and operations. I have not considered it necessary to refer particularly to all of these reports. I commend them to your careful study. I believe the institutions and departments of the State government are well regulated and carefully and honestly conducted.

It is a cause of satisfaction to know that all our State Institutions are free from partisan control and are being conducted upon a non-partisan business basis. Such a condition not only increases their efficiency and usefulness, but also results in greater economy in the expenditure of the public money. It adds immensely, too, to the confidence which the people have in the administration of the government.

The system inaugurated in the year 1895 of providing by an appropriation bill for all different expenditures of the coming year and for-bidding the incurring of expenses not specially provided for by an appropriation, has already resulted in advantage and saving to the State. That system ought never to be departed from. In making up the various items of appropriation in advance, it is impossible that some subjects should not be overlooked. Such oversight can be supplied by an emergency bill, as was done last year.

I recommend that the various boards and departments for which appropriations are needed or asked be requested to furnish in writing to the Legislature, or its proper committees, requisitions in detail for the sums they will need for the coming year; and where increased amounts or special sums for extraordinary uses are asked for, that they

file the reasons for such increase or special expenditures.

FINANCES.

The expenses of the State and its various boards, departments and officers are paid out of the State fund. The receipts of the State, on account of this fund, for the year ending October 31st, 1896, were two million one hundred and thirty eight thousand five hundred and thirty-two dollars and eighty eight cents (\$2,138,532.88). These receipts were derived from the following sources:

The total expenditures out of said fund during the past fiscal year amounted to two million seventy-two thousand six hundred and fifty-one dollars and seventy-eight cents (\$2,072,651.78), showing a balance of receipts over disbursements of sixty-five thousand eight hundred and eighty-one dollars and ten cents (\$65,881.10).

There was a decrease in receipts from the preceding year of thirty-seven thousand three hundred and ninety-eight dollars and ninety-five cents (\$37,398.95). There was also a decrease in disbursements from the preceding year of one hundred and ninety-six thousand three hundred and preceding year of the hundred and ninety-six thousand three hundred and ninety-six three hundred a

dred and eighty-eight dollars and eight cents (\$196,388.08).

The balance of the State Fund in bank at the close of the fiscal year, October 31st, 1896, was \$959,628.98—a condition eminently gratifying and satisfactory. If, however, it is to be inferred that this balance is a surplus in the hands of the State, unappropriated to State uses and not to be needed unless hereafter disposed of by the Legislature, such an impression is erroneous and liable to be harmful. This balance, as shown at the end of the fiscal year, is neither more nor less than the current bank balance of the State at that date, and does not differ in character from a merchant's balance at any particular date in his business. The balance changes from day to day, and, as a matter of fact, is very far below what it was on October 31st, being at the present time only \$225,565.64.

The existence of this balance on the closing day of the fiscal year does not justify any effort to increase appropriations on any assumption that the State has any such amount of money on hand to be expended except on the ordinary lines of necessity, prudence, and economy.

The balance of the State fund in bank fluctuates from day to day, and while at some periods it is very large, at other periods it is so low

that unless a large cash reserve be maintained, the State would be obliged to borrow money for current obligations. A comfortable balance in the treasury is a matter for congratulation, but ought not to be used as an incentive or argument for extraordinary demands upon the treasury. No financial condition, however easy or comfortable, can justify extravagance or misappropriation of money, or excuse application of the strictest rules of retrenchment and economy.

In order that you may have before you a comparative statement of the sources of revenue of the State and the amounts expended for the most prominent objects, I have compiled two tables, which are attached hereto and marked respectively "Schedule A" and "Schedule B." Schedule A shows the receipts of the State, during the past ten years, from the various principal sources of revenue; and you can, at a glance, perceive from what sources the increased revenue of the State has Schedule B contains a statement of the disbursements of the State for the last ten years for the most prominent and expensive objects of State administration. I commend a careful study and comparison of these figures to the people of the State, in order that they may familiarize themselves with the purposes for which the State money is expended, and with the comparative increase and decrease from time to time in the different departments. Schedule B also contains a statement showing extraordinary disbursements included in that schedule, from which you can determine how much has been expended in each year of the last ten years on account of the permanent improvement of the various institutions of the State. Attention is directed to the very large sums expended for uses very largely char-Take, for instance, the year 1896. In that year there was itable. expended:

These figures indicate that the State is doing a very large work for humanity and for education outside of the maintenance of the public schools.

The only direct tax levied upon the people by the State is the State school tax, which, for the past fiscal year, amounted to \$2,196,210; all of which was collected and paid out to the several school districts in accordance with law.

CARE OF THE INSANE.

The particular attention of the Legislature, and the committees of the respective Houses to whom shall be assigned the subject of the care of the insane, is directed to the annual report of the Managers and Officers of the State Hospitals for the year ending October 31st, 1896. Especial attention is called to what the Board of Managers have said in that report with reference to County Asylums. The provision of law which now gives to each county maintaining its own asylum for the insane the sum of two dollars per week per head for the care of persons confined in any County Lunatic Asylum, is justly criticised as being unfair to those counties which do not maintain buildings for the insane, and also as encouraging the erection of inadequate and improperly conducted and located buildings under the name of County Asylums.

The law governing the admission of indigent patients to the State Hospitals for the Insane directs that they shall be supported there at the expense of the county in which they are legally settled, but the price to be paid for such support is limited to the maximum sum of three dollars per week for each patient. It is impossible to see any satisfactory reason for providing in one act that indigent insane patients shall be supported in the State Asylums at the expense of the counties, and then providing in another act that if the counties maintain their own indigent insane, the State shall pay them two dollars per week for each patient. When the act authorizing payment to the counties for patients maintained in County Asylums was first passed, in 1873, the sum was fixed at one dollar per week for each patient, which was the amount paid until 1888, when an amendment was passed doubling the sum and fixing two dollars per week for each patient, to be contributed by the State to the respective counties maintaining asylums for the insane. It is well to consider whether any just ground exists for the continuance of this payment at all; but at any rate, I see no reason why the amount paid should not be reduced to the original sum of one dollar per week. I am credibly informed that in some of the county institutions the whole cost of maintaining the insane amounts to a considerable sum less per week than the counties collect from the State for that service, thus throwing the whole burden of the support of these county patients upon the State, when by another provision of the law they would have been required to pay three dollars per week for their support at the State Institutions. The State paid out during the last year to the different counties having County Asylums, the sum of \$137,335.27 on this account, a very large contribution from the moneys of the State toward the maintenance of persons which the policy of the law seems to direct should be maintained at the expense of the localities in which they are legally settled. The expense to the State of maintaining both the large State Hospitals for the same period was only about \$140,000.00, a sum exceeding by less than \$3,000 00 the amount paid to the different counties for the maintenance of insane patients at County Asylums.

The Board of Managers further call attention to the fact that while the State Hospitals are conducted on a non-partisan basis, the county institutions which are managed by the Boards of Chosen Freeholders are naturally affected, if not tainted, by local influences, political and otherwise. They point out that in only two of the county institutions is there a resident physician or a competent corps of nurses, and that for political reasons, in most of the counties, a far higher rate of wages is paid to attendants than is necessary, and an inferior order of service is obtained. They state, and I concur in their opinion, that the growth of such institutions will in the end work many evils, besides detracting from the efforts of the State in the establishment and maintenance of the two great institutions, which compare favorably with all others of their kind in this country.

To this report is attached the detailed account of visitations made by the Board of Managers to different county asylums, and I respectfully request that particular study and attention be given to the state-

ments contained in these detailed reports.

The subject of the care of insane convicts is also discussed in this report. It is undoubtedly desirable that as soon as possible a place shall be provided where such convicts can be separately detained and treated; but in view of the large extraordinary expenditures that the State has incurred for projected improvements at the State Hospitals, at the State Prison, and in the erection of the State Reformatory, the condition of the treasury would not justify the undertaking of such new work at the present time. It may be worthy of consideration whether or not a part of the Reformatory building to be constructed at Rahway can not be adapted to the special purpose of maintaining the convict insane.

The suggestions in this report as to additional safeguards in the provisions of the law governing the adjudication of insanity and the commitment of insane persons to the asylums, seem to be wise, and I recommend that the Legislature embody those suggestions into a law.

STATE PRISON.

The addition recently made to the State Prison will shortly be fully completed and adapted to the use of convicts. This will provide two hundred additional cells, and will relieve the over-crowded condition of the prison and probably furnish cell-room enough for the

requirements of the State for at least five years, by which time the State Reformatory, now in process of construction at Rahway, will have been put into operation. The large penitentiaries in the counties of Hudson and Essex, to which persons convicted in those counties of minor offenses are now most frequently sent, together with the enlargement of jail-room in some of the other large counties of the State, have very much relieved the call upon the State Prison for additional room, and there would seem to be no immediate haste, therefore, in completing—at any rate to the full extent—the proposed building at Rahway. If one or two wings of that projected building can be erected and put into operation, the construction of the other proposed wings might well await the further needs of the State.

The average number of convicts in the State Prison during the last twenty years has not kept pace with the increase of population. In 1877 the average number of convicts was 816. In 1886 the average number was 892, and in the year 1896 the average number was 1,000. From 1875 to 1895 the population of the State increased from 1,019,-

000 to 1,672,000.

PRESERVATION OF THE PALISADES.

With a view of preserving the Palisades along the Hudson river from mutilation and destruction, the Legislature, by act approved February 19th, 1895, directed that the Riparian Commissioners should not thereafter make any lease, grant, or conveyance of any lands lying under the waters of the Hudson river, adjacent to or in front of the Palisades, or adjacent to or in front of the strip of land between the base of the Palisades and the lands under water, except under conditions, restrictions and limitations that would, so far as possible, forever thereafter preserve unbroken the uniformity and continuity of the Palisades, and also as far as possible prevent the lands leased, granted or conveyed, from being in any way used or devoted to injurious or destructive work or operations against the Palisades, or in connection with, or for the encouragement, aid, or promotion of, injurious or destructive work of any kind against the Palisades.

A lease of riparian land on the Hudson river in front of the Palisades having been made after the passage of that act to the firm of Brown & Fleming, a clause was inserted therein declaring that the lease should be forfeited if the lands granted were used in anywise for the encouragement, aid or promotion of injurious or destructive work of any kind against the Palisades. During the past year it was brought to the attention of the Governor and the Riparian Commissioners that Brown & Fleming were carrying on the quarrying of stone upon a large scale from that part of the Palisades lying between

the perpendicular wall and the base of that part of the formation which may be designated as the foothills, causing thereby quite as serious and objectionable defacement of the natural scenery as though the work had been done upon the perpendicular wall of the cliff. Upon the receipt of this information the Board of Riparian Commissioners passed a resolution declaring that no further grants or leases of lands in front of the Palisades would be made until it should have been determined judicially, or by further act of the Legislature, whether the act above referred to was intended to include, and did include, under the term "Palisades," not only the perpendicular wall of rock, but the foothills. Subsequently the board notified Brown & Fleming that they were using the lands so leased to them contrary to the condition contained in their lease, and required them to show cause why the board should not declare the lease forfeited. After a hearing, at which Brown & Fleming were represented by their counsel, the board by resolution declared the lease forfeited and directed the Attorney-General to bring suit in the Court of Chancery to have a judicial declaration that the lease had been forfeited, and have it decreed to be delivered up for cancellation. This suit is now pending in the court, and is shortly to be submitted on argument to the Chancellor. The sole use made of the riparian lands granted to Brown & Fleming was in the shipment of stone quarried from the foothills of the Palisades. It is just this defacement which the Legislature was asked in 1895 to prevent as far as possible. The point, however, is taken against the statute referred to that the "Palisades" does not include anything except the perpendicular wall of rock. It is the intention of the Executive and of the Riparian Commissioners to do all that is legally in their power to carry out the manifest purpose of the Legislature to preserve this picturesque portion of the State from mutilation and destruction; an object in which the Palisade Commissioners of the States of New York and New Jersey, appointed by the concurrent action of the Executives of each State, are contributing by their effort to procure the passage of a bill by the Congress of the United States setting apart a tract of land, including the line of the Palisades, for the purposes of a Military Park. The operations of these Commissioners are detailed in their report, which will be laid before you.

I suggest that the act of 1895 be amended so as to make it perfectly clear and definite that the term "Palisades" shall be construed to include not only the perpendicular wall of rock, but the foothills lying between the crest and the bottom of the level land below. This will obviate, in case of future grants of riparian leases, such a claim

as is now set up by Brown & Fleming.

THE STATUTE LAWS.

The compilation of the general statutes of this State authorized by act of the Legislature, approved April 4th, 1894, has been completed in three volumes, comprising, with the index, 4,098 pages. compilers deserve great credit for the pains, care, and accuracy with which they have sifted and classified the almost innumerable acts that comprise the pamphlet laws of the State since the last general revision in 1877. An examination of these ponderous volumes reveals such a condition of our statute laws as is not creditable to the State. Instead of clear and logical classification, simplicity and condensation, most of the titles reveal large numbers of separate acts, drawn without any special reference to each other, often covering in different ways, and sometimes in inconsistent ways, the same subject, and constituting a mass of legal enactments incomprehensible to the layman, and to the lawyer and the judge often of doubtful meaning and application. The citizen who desires to investigate the laws regulating the assessment and collection of taxes will find in these volumes 240 different statutes, embracing 823 different sections, the whole covering 175 pages of closely-printed matter. The township officer who desires to acquaint himself with the laws governing the political division which he serves will discover that he must study the meaning and application of 140 different statutes, which require 100 pages of the volume for their publication. Besides this, he will be required to examine the statutes printed under the title of "Fire and Police," some of which refer to townships, some to cities, some to boroughs, and some to all kinds of municipal corporations. This latter title covers by itself nearly 100 pages, and comprises 155 separate acts. If he is a member of the Township Committee, he will have jurisdiction over the roads of his township. To familiarize himself with the law governing highways, he will need to look through the title of "Roads," a title which comprises 154 pages, and 135 different acts. At the same time, he is liable to be called upon to act in matters respecting fences and boundary lines, the enforcement of the laws for the preservation of health, the maintenance of paupers, and various other matters, each of which is covered by a different title, and regulated by numerous different acts.

The citizen who desires to familiarize himself with the laws governing the city in which he happens to live will have a still more difficult task. Under the caption "Cities" he will find 408 different statutes, covering 345 pages. But these include only such acts as relate exclusively to cities. Under the heading of "Municipal Corporations" he will find 167 additional acts, covering 136 pages, which he will be required to examine if he desires to be certain that he is

acquainted with all the law that may possibly relate to the city of which he is an inhabitant.

Those who dwell in boroughs and wish to be acquainted with the laws that regulate this class of municipalities will be in even harder case. I called the attention of the last Legislature to this subject in my inaugural address, using this language:

"But a more striking instance of manifold legislation exists in the laws relating to boroughs. These forms of local government did not exist until recently. They were all created under so-called general laws. The spirit and letter of the Constitution required that they should be governed by a uniform system. Yet we find three different general acts now in force regulating the creation and government of boroughs. At each session of the Legislature numerous amendments to each of the three systems are passed, until this one title in the General Statutes now covers 111 pages. So variant, inconsistent and confused are these acts that no legal adviser or judicial interpreter can safely say what the law is on many subjects relating to boroughs. Besides boroughs, we have separate systems respectively for borough commissions, for towns, for villages, for seaside resorts, and for townships, each possessing indiscriminately similar powers, and differing only in name and arrangement."

In confirmation of the views thus expressed the Supreme Court of the State, at the last February term, practically declared that the acts of March 12th, 1890, and April 2d, 1891, regulating the formation of boroughs, and also the act regulating the formation of borough commissions, were unconstitutional. This was in the case of The State, Benson, Prosecutor, vs. The Inhabitants of the Township of Bloomfield. The language of the Court in that case is so pertinent and instructive that I quote a part of the opinion. The Court says:

"By the Borough Act of April 5th, 1878, the inhabitants of any township or part of a township in this State embracing an area not to exceed four square miles, and containing a population not exceeding five thousand, may become a borough in the manner prescribed by the act.

"The act of March 7th, 1882, provides for the incorporation of borough commissions with an area not exceeding two square miles and a population

not exceeding three thousand.
"The act of 1890 provides for the incorporation of boroughs with an area not exceeding two square miles and a population not less than two hundred.

"The act of 1891 provides for the incorporation of boroughs with an area

not exceeding two square miles and a population not less than two hundred.

"These acts contain no repealing clause, and it is manifest that neither one was intended to repeal or in any wise to modify the act of April 5th, 1878. It has been so adjudged by this court in Green vs. Clark, 27 Vr. 62.

"The act of 1878 provides a mode for incorporating boroughs, which may be adopted by those localities which are empowered to incorporate under either of the said three acts passed since that time.

"If the classification of boroughs and borough commissions by the three acts last named is founded upon substantial differences, then local governments organized thereunder constitute classes separate and distinct from boroughs organized under the act of 1878, and supplements to the latter act would not be appropriate to and need not include them.

"But if the classification is illusory, then the acts of 1882, 1890 and 1891, although general in form, are, in fact, special and local and therefore void; supplements to the act of 1878 could not legally extend to unconstitutional acts.

"The act of 1878 is general, and may be applied to the cases for which the subsequent laws were framed. The population described in the three later acts are within the classification adopted in the act of 1878, and there does not appear to be anything distinctive in their character or circumstances to constitute a legal basis for such legislation.

"It is difficult to perceive how four several laws providing different modes of organizing boroughs for the same class of population can each be general.

"Each of these three acts passed since 1878 in its turn creates diversity and destroys the generality which the act of 1878 created. If these acts are valid, there is no limit to the number of like acts which may be passed to add to the bewildering confusion and uncertainty which now exists in this branch of our statute law. A multiplicity of acts have been passed apparently without any correct understanding of previous legislation upon the same subject, so that it is not possible for the Court to assert with great confidence what is their true interpretation and effect."

The condition of the laws relating to boroughs calls for prompt, thorough and careful consideration on the part of the Legislature, and I trust that this session will not be adjourned until a complete and comprehensive revision and consolidation of the laws governing boroughs shall have been made. This revision ought to place them all under the same general form as far as is practicable, so that the provision of the Constitution requiring general legislation may be complied with both in letter and in spirit.

It is obvious, from the illustrations I have given above, that instead of being a source of enlightenment and guidance, our statutes must necessarily be a cause of disorder and confusion in the conduct and management of many of the public affairs of the State. I desire to repeat the recommendation contained in my inaugural address that the Legislature shall pass no act except such as is justified by some general public necessity; that every act shall be carefully scrutinized before its passage, and comparison made with other acts relating to the same subject, in order to see that no conflict is created, and that the constitutional prohibition against special legislation is not violated. The last Legislature deserves much commendation for its efforts in the direction of restricting the volume of public statutes, and I believe that its course in that respect has met with very general approval from the citizens of the State. I hope that during this session a still further advance will be made along this line. If it be possible it . would be of great advantage to the public if those subjects which are now covered by a large number of different acts could be revised and consolidated in the same manner that the laws concerning corporations were revised and consolidated last year. It is evident that if the multiplication of statutes shall go on at the rate that has prevailed during the last ten years, it will be necessary to repeal that legal maxim which declares that "Ignorance of the law excuses no man";

for ignorance of the law is a necessary consequence of the continuance of any such condition as is disclosed by the last edition of the general statutes.

RIVER POLLUTION.

By an act approved February 26th, 1896, the Governor was directed to appoint three citizens of this State to consider the subject of the pollution of the Passaic river and of a general system of sewage disposal for the relief of the valley of the Passaic river. This river, once clear and pure from its sources to its mouth, has undergone the fate of all similar streams that happen to flow through sections attractive to large populations and manufacturing industries. It has become the receptacle of the wash, the refuse, and the general sewage of the great and rapidly growing populations of the valley, until public comfort and health are threatened from the excess of pollution poured into the This condition has been produced gradually, as the industries and population of the section have gradually increased. several cities whose sewers empty into the river, and affects either directly at once, or will in the future affect, every municipal corporation that now exists or may be hereafter created in the Passaic valley from Little Falls to Newark. Any plan for the remedy and prevention of this unfortunate condition will involve both legal and practical difficulties of the most serious nature, as well as great expense. In compliance with the direction of the act mentioned, I appointed Elias J. Marsh, Hermann H. C. Herold and William T. Hunt, commissioners to investigate and report as required by the act. gentlemen have been actively engaged in the investigation of the subject given them in charge ever since they were appointed, but have not been able to complete their work so as to make their report before the opening of the legislative session. They expect to submit it before the session shall have terminated.

The subject is of the utmost importance, not only to the immediate district known as the Passaic Valley, but also to every district in the State lying along a fresh-water stream. It is manifest that the greatest growth of population and manufacturing industry is along the valleys and hills that border such streams as the Passaic, the Hackensack, the Raritan, the Shrewsbury and the Delaware. Whatever plan is found best for the Passaic section will necessarily, in time, be applied to the others. These conditions are the result of growth and prosperity, and the penalty of prosperity must be paid, probably at large expense, in new and improved plans for the preservation of the health and comfort of the inhabitants.

All the suburbs of our State in the neighborhood of New York on the one side and of Philadelphia on the other, are filling up rapidly with population. New neighborhoods are constantly forming, old settlements are growing, and there is a constantly increasing demand for the creation of separate municipal governments—towns, boroughs, cities—wherein more minute careful oversight of all departments of civil control—taxes, schools, health, police regulations—can be had, than under the township laws or the older forms of suburban government.

Two objects of government, the preservation of public health and public safety, have been heretofore usually left to the local governments entirely. It is evident, however, that in cases like river pollution, mere local control is insufficient. The subject requires for proper treatment the operation of one system operating uniformly through

every locality through which the river runs.

It will, in the near future, become a problem how to regulate the sewerage and drainage of two-score different local governments lying in the region directly west of New York Bay and the Palisades, so as to give to each the benefits of a system of sewers and drainage, and, at the same time, preserve each against the injurious systems of the others.

In this connection, also, it may not be out of place to say a word about the preservation of the safety of citizens from accidents at rail-In small cities and rural neighborhoods the dangers way crossings. are not so great but that accidents can be readily avoided. cities grow in size, however, the dangers increase. Our populations are growing very rapidly, so that in the large cities, like Newark and Jersey City, it seems imperative that grade-crossings, at streets where travel is largest, should be soon abolished. As other cities grow, the same need will be apparent in them. The subject is difficult to deal with by specific legislation. It is unreasonable to apply the same requirement to all cities, or even to all parts of the same city. would be a hardship to require all grade-crossings to be abolished at once, but a system of gradual and progressive improvement might be inaugurated. It is doubtful whether the law passed last year is adequate to compel an unwilling corporation to elevate or lower its tracks. It is quite certain that sooner or later we shall need a body similar to the railroad commissions of some of our sister States, in which shall be reposed the power to decide when any particular grade-crossing shall be abolished, and the manner and terms; what part of the work shall in each instance be done by the city, and what by the railroad company; and also the power to regulate the manner in which railroads shall cross the tracks of other railroads, and to supervise the establishment of crossings for new routes of railway. The great aggregation of people that in the next quarter of a century will have crowded our northeastern borders near New York will form a continuous and connecting system of towns and boroughs separated only by imperceptible

boundaries, and forming, in fact, one great urban community. It is well to look ahead to such a condition and to provide, as far as possible, that mistakes in the construction of sewers, railways and other works shall not be made which will have to be afterwards, at great cost, corrected.

TAXATION.

The last Legislature, by concurrent resolution, empowered the Governor to appoint a commission, consisting of five persons, to investigate the subject of assessment and taxation of property in this State and report to the next session of the Legislature the result of such investigation, with a recommendation of such legislation as the commission should deem proper.

I appointed as commissioners, under that resolution, Messrs. John P. Stockton, James F. Rusling, William H. Vredenburgh, A. M. Reynolds and Charles C. Black, and these gentlemen have performed the duties required of them under their appointment and their report

will be laid before you.

It appears that the feature of the present tax laws most complained of is that which gives to the State the largest proportion of taxes levied upon the property of railroad corporations. It also appears that this complaint is practically limited to one locality, viz., Jersey City, in the county of Hudson.

The present system of taxation of railroad property divides it into

three classes:

First—Property not used for railroad purposes is assessed and taxed by the same assessors in the same manner and at the same rate as the taxable property of other owners in the same municipal division or taxing district.

Second—Real estate used for railroad purposes, including the roadbed (other than the main stem), water-ways, reservoirs, tracks, buildings, water-tanks, water-works, riparian rights, docks, wharves and piers.

Third—That property which the statute designates by the term "main stem," which includes the road-bed not exceeding one hundred feet in width, with its rails, sleepers, depot buildings used for passengers; "tangible personal property," under which term is included rolling-stock, cars, locomotives, ferry-boats, machinery, tools, and the franchise of the corporation.

Upon the second and third classes of property above mentioned the companies pay taxes to the State at the rate of one-half of one per cent. upon a valuation fixed by the State Board of Assessors.

Upon the second class above mentioned the companies pay an additional tax of one per cent to the municipalities or local taxing divisions, in addition to the tax of one-half of one per cent paid to the State. This tax for the benefit of the localities is collected by the State and paid over by it to the respective localities. The amount so collected and paid over in the last fiscal year to the various taxing districts was \$410,083.40.

When railroad companies were first chartered in this State, and for a long period afterwards and until the year 1873, no tax whatever was paid to the localities upon property used for railroad purposes. The charters of the different companies provided for a special tax to the State, generally at the rate of one-half of one per cent upon the cost of the railroad, its equipment and appendages. In some instances transit duties were exacted instead of a rate upon the cost of the road.

The theory of the State was that a railroad was of a quasi-public nature, exercising public functions which appertain to the State at large, and subject to control in some respects by the Federal government under the inter-state commerce clause of the Federal Constitution. The right of local taxation was not recognized by law until the passage of the act of 1873 entitled "An act to establish just rules for the taxation of railroad corporations and to induce their acceptance and uniform adoption."

The preamble of said act discloses in an historical sense its purpose, and is worthy of quotation in this place. The preamble is as follows:

"Whereas, for the encouragement of railroad enterprises, laws creating and regulating railways in this State usually provide for the payment by them, in consideration of their chartered privileges, of a fixed rate upon their capital stock or the cost of their works in lieu of all other public impositions whatever; and whereas, it is, nevertheless, contended that the property of such corporations, being largely acquired for, or through the growth and extension of their prosperity, should contribute to the charges and expenses essential for municipal and county purposes; and whereas it is desirable, in order to the avoidance of litigation and future dissatisfaction, that such municipal and county taxation shall be authorized, and that the same shall be permanently fixed and regulated." (Pamphlet Laws 1873, p. 112.)

That act then provided that railroad companies should pay upon their cost, equipment and appendages a State tax after such rate of taxation as had theretofore been fixed by law upon such corporation, or in default thereof, after the rate of one-half of one per centum upon such cost. Upon the real property by them occupied, used, or owned for the purpose of their road or otherwise, excepting their main-stem or road bed and track, not exceeding one hundred feet in width, such companies should pay a county or municipal tax for the benefit of the counties, townships and cities, respectively, where said property is situate, after the rate of one per centum upon a valuation thereof and

of all improvements thereon, excepting that each company might hold a tract of land not exceeding ten acres in one parcel, with the buildings and improvements thereof, at their termini, which should be free from the payment of local taxes.

In 1876, the basis of the State taxation was changed from cost to true value. This was done to comply with the provisions of the amended Constitution directing that property should be assessed for

purposes of taxation at its true value.

The law under which railroad property is now assessed was passed in 1884. This law made a still further concession in favor of local taxation by omitting the exception of ten acres at the termini of the reads, but continued the policy of exacting one-half of one per cent. as a State tax upon the whole visible real and personal property of the corporations used for railroad purposes, and added to that a tax

upon the value of their franchise.

This policy of taxation has, in one form or another, been the policy of the State since railroads were first constructed, and is based upon sound principle and is not liable to valid objection. At the same time it is manifest that there has been a tendency on the part of the Legislature to concede from time to time something more to the localities than was originally granted, and the practical question now raised by the report of the commission is, whether or not it is expedient to make a further concession in the same direction. All the Commissioners agree that the principle of railroad taxation adopted by the act of 1884 should be maintained. That principle has resulted very beneficially to all the people of the State, enabling the State government to be carried on without the imposition of direct taxes upon the people.

The report of the Commissioners recommends that the State relinquish to the localities the tax of one half of one per cent. now collected by it upon railroad property of the second class above described. This would, on the basis of last year's income, add about \$ 05,000 to the amount directly paid to the localities, and would dimish the State

revenue by the same sum.

The reasons for this recommendation are set out in the Commis-

sioners' report and I need not quote them.

Whether or not this additional concession is justified under the circumstances, and whether or not the State can afford to reduce its revenue, are questions for the Legislature to decide. Such a concession would leave the policy of railroad taxation practically unimpaired, but it would be necessary that the Legislature should exercise a corresponding retrenchment in State expenditures in order to offset the reduction in revenue. To what particular objects of State support such retrenchment can be applied is for you to decide. It is a circumstance of great importance that this recommendation is unanimously concurred in by the Commissioners, and it is desirable that a question so

productive of local irritation and agitation should be satisfactorily set-

tled, if possible.

This is the only recommendation which the Commissioners unite in making. They do, however, unite in calling attention to the fact that the local assessors do not succeed in listing all the taxable property in New Jersey, and that this is either from design or from a careless performance of their public duty. They indicate that an act providing for the removal of local assessors who wilfully refuse to obey the law

in this respect might be efficient to correct this evil.

They also recommend that the policy of the State hereafter should be toward a curtailment rather than an enlargement of the list of property exempt from local taxation. It seems to be generally believed that, in most localities, the assessors deliberately violate the law and their oaths of office by assessing property, not at its true value as required by law, but at a fraction of its true value, that fraction being greater or smaller in accordance with the practice and public sentiment in each community. It is undoubtedly true, also, that this practice is not condemned by public sentiment. If it were, it could very soon be corrected without the intervention of the Legislature. Each assessor is required to take an oath that he has diligently inquired respecting the nature and value of the real and personal estate liable to taxation in his taxing district, and has, to the best of his ability, and without favor or partiality, valued all the property liable to taxation in said taxing district at its full and fair value, at such price as, in his judgment, said property would sell for at a fair and bona fide sale by private contract on the day prescribed by law for commencing the If it be true, as reported by the Commissioners, that the violation of this official oath is almost universal, there would be no difficulty in procuring the indictment and punishment of assessors so violating the law, provided public sentiment, as represented in the grand and petit juries of the State, so demanded.

Three members of the Commission have filed separate reports in addition to the report to which they all agree. These supplemental reports contain much interesting and valuable information and suggestion, but the recommendations therein contained are the recommendations only of the Commissioner making such separate report.

I desire to express high appreciation of the fairness, impartiality, diligence and ability with which these gentlemen have prosecuted the laborious duty committed to them. Their report discloses a depth of judicial insight and an extent of investigation which are very enlightening upon this vexed question, and cannot fail to be of great value in assisting you to right legislation.

It will be my pleasure at any time to extend to you, both collectively and individually, any assistance at my command in the discharge of your legislative duties, and I wish for you a pleasant term

of personal intercourse, and for the State much public benefit from the result of your labors. I trust that all that you do will be wise and well considered, so as to meet the just expectations and the approbation of the people of the State.

BOARD OF TRADE,
DALLAS, TEXAS, January 7th, 1897.

To the Speaker of the House of Representatives, Trenton, N. J.:

DEAR SIR—This board of trade has been impressed with the vital importance of the passage of a Bankrupt bill, and has been in actual

communication with like commercial bodies over the country with the view of speeding the passage of some just and equitable bill. We find a general consensus of opinion that such an act is a necessity, and many commercial bodies have memorialized Congress praying its passage, forwarding petitions similar substantially to the one enclosed from the Milwaukee Chamber of Commerce.

The deplorable condition of financial slavery resting upon thousands of our fellow-men, the loss to the State from a paralysis of their energies, the cruelty of forever keeping such men in bondage forcibly suggests to all men having in their hearts charity and kindness for these long suffering men and their families, and that relief should be

granted.

In view of this condition of affairs and of the incomparable beneficence of a Bankrupt bill, we venture to invoke your aid, and that of the body over which you preside, in speeding the passage of such a bill through the Senate of the United States. The bill, as you know, has passed the House, and is now on the Senate's calendar awaiting its action. As there remain only some forty days of the present session we beg to suggest that the passage by your body of a joint resolution invoking immediate action on the part of the United States Senate would be most desirable. Such a resolution will be promptly introduced and passed by our legislature which convenes next Tuesday.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE, MILWAUKEE, December 28th, 1896.

To the Honrable the Senate of the United States:

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted at a meeting of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce of the city of Milwaukee held on this date:

Resolved, That the Chamber of Commerce of the city of Milwaukee, through its board of directors, earnestly appeals to the Senate of the United States to promptly pass the Torry Bankruptcy Bill, which has already passed the House of Representatives, and only awaits the favorable action of the Senate to become a law; thus at once affording a measure of relief and protection of which the nation at the present time stands greatly in need—relief in "releasing from financial servitude thousands of able, energetic and experienced men whose restored energies could again be devoted to the upbuilding of the State," and protection in removing one of the most fruitful causes of financial distrust and panics in the temptation which the absence of

an equitable bankrupt law affords to any creditor, in case of financial embarrassment of his debtor, to seek his own advantage to the detriment of other creditors and the ruin of the debtor. "Neither common sense or justice demands the continued and helpless servitude of such a great number of our fellow-men," nor the continuance of this needless hinderance to the returning prosperity of our country. Failure to pass the bill by the Senate at this session will probably involve indefinite delay in the passage of another bill, and such delay simply means denial of relief for men now past the prime of life who have but few years remaining to recuperate their fortunes.

R solved, That a copy of this action be transmitted to the President of the United States, and that the Senators from Wisconsin be respectfully requested to use their best efforts to secure the passage of that beneficent measure, the Torry Bankruptcy Bill, at the present

session.

BOARD OF APPEALS IN CASES OF TAXATION, JERSEY CITY, N. J., January 14th, 1897.

Hon. Wm. George Nelson, Member of Assembly, Trenton, N. J.:

DEAR SIR—The following resolution was adopted by the Commissioners of Appeal in cases of taxation at a meeting held in the City Hall, Jersey City, Wednesday, January 13th, 1897.

Whereas, In the discharge of our duties as Commissioners of Appeal in cases of taxation for the city of Jersey City, our attention has frequently been attracted to the fact that the railroad corporations have for years past been constantly increasing their holdings of realty within the city limits, thereby eliminating from the annual tax levy of the city a very considerable portion of the ratables therein, which is detrimental to the interests of the taxpayers and the public at large, and thereby creating a difficult problem to the city government in the matter of justly apportioning the necessary municipal tax so as not to create undue hardship or the equivalent of confiscation;

AND WHEREAS, The entire area of the city is 10,423 acres, of which the railroads have absorbed and taken out of the ratables some 2,981 acres, nearly 30 per cent., more than one-half of which has been so absorbed with the past twelve years;

AND WHEREAS, The said railroad property embraces almost the entire water-front of the city granted to them by the Legislature for

a comparatively small consideration;

And whereas, The present system, if allowed to continue, must eventually produce greater hardship and injustice to the taxpayers of this city, by reason of the unjust discrimination in the levying of taxes as between private property and that controlled by railroad corporations, and the fact that only a portion of the tax collected by the State on railroad property within the city, although assessed at a reduced rate, is returned to the city authorities for the expenses of municipal government;

AND WHEREAS, Public sentiment on this question has been aroused to such an extent that the taxpayers demand relief from the Legisla-

ture;

AND WHEREAS, The members of this Board desire to second the earnest and energetic efforts of our Mayor, Hon. Peter F. Wanser, who has been a potent factor in the steps already taken to afford the people some relief in this matter;

Therefore, be it resolved, That we petition the members of the Senate and General Assembly, and His Excellency the Governor, to unite in the formulation and execution of legislation on this subject which shall produce the necessary relief to the taxpayers of this city;

And resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the members of the Senate and General Assembly and His Excellency

the Governor.

DEAR SIR—At the regular monthly meeting of The Pennsylvania Fish Protective Association, held 9th inst., the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, The steady increase in size and number of what are known as pound nets along the seacoast of the State of New Jersey has recently been so great as to be truly alarming and, in a marked degree, detrimental to the interests of the people of that State, and, in the most extended sense, injurious to the natural increase of food-

fishes along the almost entire seacoast of that State; and

Whereas, The erection and manufacture of such pound-nets is clearly and unmistakably an infraction of the rights of the people of the State of New Jersey, as well as of the people of adjacent States who have, in all past time, derived their supply of fresh food-fish mainly from the waters in which said destructive devices have been placed, giving the organization or trust which owns and controls them the power to make prices to suit themselves, and which prices, it is conceded, are much higher than they would be if fair competition prevailed; therefore, be it

R solved, By The Pennsylvania Fish Protective Association, that it regards the erection and maintenance of such large and so many pound-nets in the waters named as an indefensible outrage upon popular rights and at the same time the most destructive agencies ever devised for the capture of gravid fish, and the consequent impairment of the natural products of the waters of the sea, which will ultimately lead to the final extinction of the various kinds of fish that

do their spawning in the estuaries;

Resolved, That The Pennsylvania Fish Protective Association heartily approves of energetic and determined efforts of the State Fishery Commissioners of New Jersey to induce the Legislature of that State to enact a law which will compel the removal of said pound-nets and throw the fishing interests of the State open to free competition;

Mr. Wildman presented the following report of commissioners for erection and maintenance of a home for soldiers and sailors and their wives, which report was read and ordered spread in full upon the minutes:

Gentlemen of the Senate and Assembly:

The Commission appointed by the Governor in accordance with Joint Resolution No. 2, approved March 14th, 1895, and who were re appointed under the provisions of Joint Resolution No. 1, approved March 25th, 1896, "to report plans for the erection and maintenance of Homes for Indigent Veterans and their Wives," would most re-

spectfully report as follows:

From careful inquiries, directed to every Overseer of the Poor in the different townships, boroughs, towns and cities of this State, as well as from information received through the different Veteran organizations, the Commission has ascertained that there are now living within the State a large number of veterans of the late war, who, with their wives, are depending for their sole means of support upon a small pension paid them by the United States Government, and without the physical ability to add to this slender income by the earnings from manual or other labor. In many instances these old couples are without any assistance from children or other relatives, and, in a great measure, dependent upon private charity. The Home for Disabled Soldiers and Sailors, maintained by the State at Kearny, is overcrowded, and many applications for admissions by single men are

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pending the action of the Board of Managers, and even were there room, the veterans who are now supporting themselves and their aged wives could not avail themselves of the same without subjecting these

wives to the necessity of going to the poor-houses.

In many of the States, in fact nearly all, a similar condition of affairs has led to the establishment of "Homes for Veterans and their Wives, Widowed Mothers and Widows of Veterans of the Late War," and these are managed on plans very similar to that adopted by the National and State Homes. New York, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Ohio, Iowa, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Kansas, Missouri and other States are now maintaining such Homes to the utter satisfaction of their population. In some of these Homes, the cottage system for veterans and their wives has been adopted, while the one-building-anddormitory plan prevails in others. Your Commission has visited and carefully examined a number of these Homes, and has come to the conclusion that the cottage plan is a failure, because of its increased costs, as well as of the difficulty of keeping pace with the constantlyincreasing demands for admission. In this conclusion your Commission is sustained by the adverse report of General Avery, of the National Soldiers' Homes Commission, against the cottage plan, and his recommendation of the one building-and-dormitory system.

Different rules as to the admissibility of applicants are maintained in the different State Homes, some having an age limitation for wives and widows of veterans, while in others the limitation is based upon the length of time the couple have or had been married, and still in other Homes, like that in Waupaca, Wis, no limitation at all having been made. Your Commission are of the unanimous opinion that the veteran and his wife should have been married either before or during his service in the army or navy, or at least within five years after his honorable discharge therefrom. Such a rule would guard against any overcrowding and would act as a safeguard against extending the State's care and bounty towards undeserving persons.

Your Commission has taken into consideration the costs of maintenance of such a Home, and are able to report that the same will not only be no more per inmate than is at present required for Kearny, but that the main-building system will enable the managers of the projected Home to make quite a saving in the costs of cooking, washing and heating over the expense required for the same items at Kearny, where a number of separate dormitories and ward buildings necessarily increase these expenditures.

Taking into consideration the existing necessity for the erection of such a Home and the fact that the constantly advancing age and thereby growing infirmities of the old veterans of the late war produce each year a larger percentage of these men who are unable to earn a livelihood for themselves and their wives, also considering the fact that such a Home, if established, would be but a passing necessity,

which would cease to exist after a limited period of years, when those for whose benefit it had been maintained will have passed away, and still further, in view of the general approbation by the taxpayers and citizens of all classes and in every section of the State, elicited by the proposal for the erection and maintenance of such a Home, your Commissioners have seen fit to report that in their opinion such a Home has become a necessity, and that they recommend the passage of Assembly bill as prepared by the Commission as part of their work.

Burlington, N. J., Dec. 25th, 1896.

We, the undersigned, sportsmen of the State of New Jersey, do realize the fact that under the game laws now in force the game in our State is fast being exterminated, and unless more stringent laws are made and enforced our field sports will soon become a thing of the past; we therefore think it advisable to shorten the seasons

and to have, as near as possible, one season for all.

The following laws are, we think, most advisable: Wilson or English snipe, from March 15th to May 1st; and from September 1st to December 1st; woodcock, the month of July, and from November 1st, to December 1st; upland plover, the month of August; doves, the month of August, and from November 1st to December 1st; rail and reed birds, from September 1st to December 1st; summer duck, blue-wing teal, from September 1st to December 1st; marsh or mud-hens, from September 1st to December 1st; rabbits and quail, the month of November; ruffed grouse or pheasants, the month of November; gray and black squirrels, the month of November; that it is unlawful to shoot red-wing or marsh black-birds dur-

ing the closed season, as many rail and reed-birds are killed at that time under the pretense of shooting black birds. Deer off until October 25th, 1902.

Mr. King presented the following declaration by the Federation of Trades and Labor Unions of the State of New Jersey, and moved that the same be spread upon the minutes, which was agreed to:

To the Legislature of New Jersey:

Not having been granted an opportunity to be heard by the members of your honorable body, the workingmen of New Jersey, through the Federations of Trades and Labor Unions, respectfully submit this protest against the passage of the constitutional amendment providing for biennial sessions of the legisture.

Representing the views and voicing the wishes of the members of over two hundred trade organizations in the State of New Jersey, and, we believe, of nine-tenths of our citizens, the Feder-

ation asks you to defeat the proposed amendment.

The wage-workers, organized in their trades unions, have not asked for the passage of this amendment to the constitution. The amendment was not framed at their request. No representative body of our fellow-citizens has petitioned the legislature to pass it. There has been no public expression of sentiment in its favor, and several of the leading newspapers of our state,

including the Newark Sunday Call and the Paterson Morning

Call, are pronounced in their opposition to it.

The working people and, we believe, a vast majority of all classes in our state are opposed to this amendment for many reasons, among them the following:

The annual election keeps alive in our state officials a realizing

sense of their responsibility to the people.

Abuses are more rare and corruption in official circles less

under the annual system.

Annual elections and short terms of office bring those in power face to face with their constituents and compel them to be on their good behavior against the day of reckoning.

The nearer the public officer is to the time when he must account to his constituents, the safer the constituents are that he

will obey their will.

All attempts to further remove public officials from the control of the people are un-American and monarchical in their tendency.

In cases of vacancy United States senators would be appointed

by the governor of the state for a period of two years.

Because the people need more power, not less; the object of this amendment seems to be to give the people less power and officials more.

Because it will deprive the voters of New Jersey the right to annually express their will as to who shall make our laws.

Because the masses take an interest in state affairs and object

to having their supervision and control lessened.

Because the masses desire the preservation of the rights and liberties now possessed by them, and consider present terms of office of governor, senators and assemblymen quite long enough.

Because the evils of mixing up national and state politics should

be avoided as much as possible.

Because the nation's safety lies in frequent and well-contested elections.

The organized workingmen of New Jersey are not ignorant of the significance of the proposed change. They have learned lessons from some of the most brilliant men in American history, many of them distinguished Republicans, from Thomas Jefferson to Thomas B. Reed. We respectfully submit a few of the opinions of these eminent men on biennials:

Thomas Jefferson, author of the "Declaration of American Independence," in a letter to Samuel Adams said: "Where

annual elections cease tyranny begins."

Senator Edmunds of Vermont—"I believe the change has not been of and vantage to us. The sessions have become longer, there is more crowding and haste in legislation, there is less time

and opportunity for the investigation of public accounts and expenditures, and for inquiry into and consideration of the public

affairs in the various parts of the state, and like topics."

Senator Hawley of Connecticut—"In the long intervals discussion flags, interest relaxes, and their importance diminishes in popular judgment. Government is constant, and if the people are to be the real rulers they must be constant in their attention."

Senator Hoar—"This proposition is to take the first long step from the constitution of the fathers. It is a proposition seriously to disturb our constitutional balance. It is designed not merely to diminish by one-half the number of elections, the occasions when the people will discuss the interests of the State under the stimulant and responsibility of an immediate decision, but the plan proposed will nearly put an end to such discussions altogether."

Ex-Senator Dawes—"I have never hesitated to express my deep conviction that the biennial arguments were unwise, and that, if adopted, the State would sooner or later regret it."

Ex-Governor Long—"Infrequency of elections produces a lack of interest, not an increase of it. I say that if you have your elections only once in two years you will have less interest, and you will have more power in the hands of the managers and

manipulators of the few men who control them."

J. G. Blaine—"I believe it is a mistake in the republican government to get rid of frequent elections. People must govern themselves or somebody will govern them, and there is no way to keep popular government fresh, strong and effective like frequent and well-contested elections. I venture the prediction that the state of Maine, not perhaps in my own time, but before

a great many years, will return to the old system."

Speaker Reed—"I think we made a great mistake in Maine in changing our constitution in that regard. The project was submitted to the people at a time when a great contest for supremacy in other matters was going on between the two political parties, then very closely matched, and there was no opportunity for full discussion. If you wish the benefits of free government you must take the methods, even if they are onerous. If the people are to govern, they have got to take the trouble to govern. Government by the people will not run itself: all approximations toward despotism will, for a while."

George E. McNeill—"The frequent use of the ballot, like the frequent use of the muscles of the body, is the qualifying process which is necessary for political or physical health. We are to choose between two horns of the dilemma—disfranchisement or the educational opportunities that qualify for enfranchisement.

Liberty requires order for its true development. To talk of expense, when the political education of the people is at stake, is treason."

It is not necessary to occupy your time with further quotations. The quotations we have submitted should be sufficient. If the opinions of men like Thomas Jefferson and James G. Blaine are

of no value, the race must be degenerating.

A few more words and we shall be done. Some of the advocates of the biennial sessions claim that expense will be saved by the change. This is the old cry of economy, which has been too often raised to conceal evil purposes. It has been said with truth that more extravagance has been committed in the name of economy than in any other name. If annual elections are an expense, so is our entire government; so are our public schools; so is the militia. Schools train the young; annual elections train the voters. It would be just as wise and right to abolish one as the other. Another objection raised by the advocates of biennials is that annual elections are a disturbance to business. Why not make the same objection to the Sabbath, and all our national and state holidays?

Gentlemen of the legislature, Massachusetts, although strongly Republican, last fall declared decisively by a most overwhelming vote against the proposition to abolish annual elections. Massachusetts, which raised the first regiment to emancipate the chattel slave and uphold the government of the Union, is surely a safe guide. We ask you to pronounce, as her people have done, against biennial elections and the extension of official terms.

In submitting this statement of views, we are governed only by a sense of right and justice and the love we bear republican institutions. In no spirit of antagonism to any class or person or combination of persons do we submit it. We are simply opposed to any measure which will turn officials into masters and deprive the masses of their cherished right to decide annually what is good for them.

Concurrent resolution requiring the attorney-general to take legal proceedings against Henry C. Kelsey, secretary of state, for the recovery of the state's funds by him withheld and for penalties.

Whereas, The Senate Investigating Committee of 1895 reported (p. 20), that Henry C. Kelsey has since 1891 retained for his own use the fees of the prerogative office amounting to \$3,000 to \$4,000 per year, which are part of the revenues of the State (P. L. 1879, p. 103), and has never paid any of the same into the Treasury except for two quarters, when demanded by the Comptroller, the amount of the State's revenues so unlawfully retained now amounting to approximately \$25,000, said committee reporting that said sums should be returned into the Treasury;

And whereas, said investigating committee also reported (p. 18) that said Henry C. Kelsey collected for the use of the State sums of money aggregating more than \$900,000, and, contrary to law, retained the same in his possession, annually, until the end of each year, rendering no detailed account thereof as required by law, and invested the same in his own personal business enterprises; and said committee did further report that the gains so made by the use of the State's moneys should be ascertained according to law and paid into the State Treasury (Report, p. 20);

And whereas, the laws governing the revenues of this State impose large pecuniary penalties for such offenses (P. L. 1879, p. 103, 338);

And whereas, it appears that no action has been taken to recover said revenues so unlawfully withheld from the treasury and that the same still continue to be withheld, and that said gains have never been ascertained or paid over, and no proceedings taken to enforce said penalties;

And whereas, The term of office of said Henry C. Kelsey is about to expire;

And whereas, Said Henry C. Kelsey has persistently violated the law requiring him to make returns of the fees collected by him, whether for his own use or for the use of the State;

Resolved (the Senate concurring), That the attorney-general be, and he is hereby, directed to commence legal proceedings against said Henry C. Kelsey for the recovery of said revenues and gains and the lawful interest on the moneys retained, and for the enforcement of said penalties, and he may employ such assistants as in his judgment may be necessary for a full and complete investigation and ascertainment of the amount of said revenues, gains, penalties and interest.

Mr. Derousse moved that a select committee be appointed, and that the above resolution be referred to said committee.

Whereupon the Speaker appointed Messrs. Derousse, Codington, Minch, Thorn and Martens as such committee.

The following message was received from the Governor by the hands of his Private Secretary:

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,
TRENTON, March 23d, 1897.

Gentlemen of the Senate and General Assembly:

I deem it my duty, on account of the great importance of the subject, to call your attention to the matter of the report of the commissioners appointed by me in pursuance of the act of the Legislature, approved February 26th, 1896, to consider the subject of the pollution of the Passaic river and of a general system of sewage disposal for the relief of the valley of the Passaic. These commissioners have discharged the work submitted to them with great thoroughness and distinguished ability, and have presented their findings and conclusions in a report commendable for its comprehensiveness and thorough treatment of the difficult subject committed to their hands. The the Passaic river below the Great condition of at Paterson, as found and reported by them, is one calling for prompt and efficient remedy. They report distinctly and unqualifiedly that the river in its present state of pollution has become a nuisance to residents along the banks, by reason of the stench, and has caused depreciation of property and injury to health; that the river has ceased to be desirable for pleasure purposes and no longer possesses the park value which so generous a stream should afford the large population on its banks; that the use of the river for manufacturing purposes is suffering on account of the pollution, and in short that the river appeared to the commissioners to be completely established as a public nuisance and injury to health and an increasing menace to property interests from the Great Falls to below Newark.

Acting under the instruction and advice of competent engineers, chemists and bacteriologists, and legal counsel, they report that the only adequate plan for the abatement of this condition is the construction of a system of trunk-sewers leading from the Falls at Paterson to the Meadows below Newark, a particular

account of which will be found in the engineer's report accompanying the report of the commissioners. The estimated cost of this sewer is six millions five hundred thousand dollars (\$6,500,000). The report is accompanied by the draft of an act which the commissioners recommend the legislature to adopt, providing for the construction of such a trunk-sewer at the expense of the localities to be affected thereby.

On account of the lateness of the session it is now improbable that such an act will be considered this year. So far as I have been able to consider the subject the reports and recommendations of the commissioners seem to be the wisest that could be It is undoubtedly advisable in matters of such serious importance to proceed with prudent deliberation and not with undue or inconsiderate haste, and therefore the postponement of the consideration of the proposed law until next year is not to be regretted. Ithink it very important, however, that it should be clearly understood that the subject will not be allowed to rest quiescent, but will be taken up for serious consideration at the next session of the Legislature. In the meantime the matter in all its bearings ought to be considered very carefully by all parties interested, and especially by those cities, towns, townships and boroughs that will be either immediately or in the future compelled to contribute to the expense of the proposed work. during the interval between the adjournment of this Legislature and the meeting of the next, these different municipalities will officially investigate and consider the subject so as to be prepared to present their views, and their objections if they have them, to the next Legislature, it will greatly facilitate the consideration of the subject by the next Legislature. In order to put the subject into the hands of a body competent to hear suggestions, receive reports from the different localities and to present conclusions to the next Legislature, it would, in my judgment, be wise to have a special committee appointed from the two Houses with power to sit, if necessary, during the recess of the Legislature, with the understanding that the subject shall, during that recess, be committed to their charge, and that the officers of the various municipalities may communicate with them on the subject, and I accordingly recommend that such committee be appointed.

Mr. Speaker—Your committee, to whom was referred the resolution introduced by the member from Burlington, directing the Attorney-General to take legal proceedings against the Hon. Henry C. Kelsey, Secretary of State, for the recovery of certain fees alleged to have been unlawfully detained, and for the enforcement of certain penalties alleged to have been incurred, beg leave to report: We have carefully examined into the circumstances attending and the facts relating to the transactions to which the resolutions refer; we find that the matters referred to were the subject of an exhaustive examination by a select committee of the Senate, appointed by that body on the 13th day of February, 1895, which committee subsequently made report to

the Senate. We find that by a long-established practice and usage, the Secretary of State retained certain fees as a part of the emoluments of his office, the right to withhold which the select committee referred to questioned; and that there was also a question raised as to the time and manner of making reports of moneys received by the Secretary of State and the payment thereof into the State Treasury. Your committee has further ascertained that when this report was made by the committee so appointed, the Secretary of State was advised by lawyers of distinguished ability that his construction of the acts relating to his official duties was correct, and that he had not in this respect violated the provisions of the law. We further find that no official action was taken as the result of the select committee's report, except to make such changes in the existing law as seemed to be required to change the former practice and to make such new provisions in relation thereto as were deemed necessary and advisable for the public good.

Your committee are, therefore, of the opinion that after this lapse of time, at the close of the official term of the Secretary of State, no good purpose would be served by attempting to cast censure upon this official, or by an effort to exact from him penalties for alleged violation of official duties in the respect

referred to.

We further report that the whole subject-matter of the resolutions referred to this committee was clearly within the jurisdiction and still remains within the jurisdiction of the select committee of the Senate, which is still in existence and clothed with all the powers originally conferred upon it, and for this reason alone, action by this body would, in the opinion of your committee, not only be unnecessary, but an intrenchment upon the prerogatives of the Senate and its committee. It is, therefore, the opinion of the committee that the resolution so offered and referred should not be adopted by the House of Assembly.

House met at twelve o'clock noon, this being the day designated by the Governor for the assembling of the extra session of the one hundred and twenty-first Legislature of the State of New Jersey. The House was duly called to order at twelve o'clock noon, by Geo. W. Macpherson, of Mercer county, Speaker of the House.

Prayer was offered by Rev. N. J. Wright, of Trenton.

Upon the calling of the roll, the following gentlemen appeared and answered to their names:

The Clerk was ordered by the Speaker to read the proclamation of the Governor, which was ordered printed in full on the journal.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR.

Whereas, Certain proposed amendments to the Constitution of this State were, at the session of the Legislature held in the year eighteen hundred and ninety-six, agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses thereof, and entered on the journals of each of said houses, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the Legislature then next to be chosen;

AND WHEREAS, The said proposed amendments, having been published as required by the Constitution, were agreed to by the next

succeeding Legislature, being the Legislature which convened on the second Tuesday of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven; and the Constitution of this State requires the Legislature to submit such proposed amendments agreed to as aforesaid to the people, at a special election to be held for that purpose only;

AND WHEREAS The last session of the Legislature passed a bill for the purpose of submitting the said proposed amendments to such election, but by reason of an error in the quotation of one of the amendments so to be submitted, the said bill so passed was inefficient, and I have not approved the same, and there is, therefore, no law to provide for such special election;

Therefore, I, John W. Griggs, Governor of the State of New Jersey, by virtue of the power vested in me by the Constitution, do convene the Legislature of this State, hereby requiring the Senators and members of the General Assembly to meet in their respective chambers at the State House, in the city of Trenton, on Tuesday, the twenty-fifth day of May instant, at twelve o'clock noon.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the State to be affixed, at Trenton, this eleventh day of May, in the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and ninety-seven.

The following message was received from the Governor by the hands of his Private Secretary, which was read and ordered to be placed upon the minutes:

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,
TRENTON, May 25th, 1897.

"Gentlemen of the Senate and General Assembly:

"Among the bills passed at the last session and submitted to me after the adjournment of the Legislature for approval, was one providing for a special election, at which the proposed amendments to the Constitution, agreed to by the Legislature in two consecutive years, should be submitted to a vote of the people, in accordance with the requirements of the Constitution in such cases. I discovered from an examination of this bill that an error had occurred in reciting one of the proposed amendments—the word 'provided' having been used for 'prohibited' in the amendment commonly known as the 'anti-gambling amendment.' The bill directed the Secretary of State to prepare ballots with the proposed amendments in this erroneous form printed on them.

"The right of this officer to disregard the plain mandate of the bill and print the amendment in its correct language was so doubtful, and it was deemed by me to be so important, that no cloud of legal doubt should rest over such a serious act of popular legislation, that I withheld my approval, and have called you to meet in special session in order that a proper act may be passed to provide for submitting the amendments so agreed to the vote of the people.

"I recommend, therefore, that such a bill be passed.

"I am not aware of any other matter of public importance requiring action on your part to which I need call your attention.

Resolved, That the following amendments to the Constitution of this State, which were agreed to by a majority of the members of each house, in the year eighteen hundred and ninety-six, and published for three months previous to the third day of November last in at least one newspaper in each county, and which have been agreed to by a majority of the members of the Senate in the present year, shall be and the same are hereby agreed to:

(1.) Strike out paragraph 10 of section VII of article IV, and change the numbers of the following paragraphs to correspond.

(2.) Change paragraph 10 of article V so as to read as follows:

10. The Governor or the person administering the government, the president judge of the supreme court and the attorney-general, or any two of them, may remit fines and forfeitures, and grant pardons and paroles, after conviction, in all cases except impeachment.

(3.) Change section I of article VI so as to read as follows:

SECTION I.

The judicial power shall be vested in a court for the trial of impeachments, a supreme court, a prerogative court, circuit courts, and such inferior courts as now exist and may be hereafter established by law; the prerogative court, the inferior courts now existing and such as may be hereafter established by law, may be altered or abolished by the legislature as the public good shall require.

(4.) Strike out all of section II of article VI.

(5.) Change the number of section III of article VI, to section II.

(6.) Strike out all of section IV, V and VI of article VI, and insert the following:

SECTION III.

1. The supreme court shall consist of such number of judges as the legislature shall determine, but there shall never be less than fifteen; the justices of the supreme court as heretofore constituted, and the chancellor and vice-chancellors in office when this provision takes effect, shall become judges of the court, and continue as such until the expiration of the respective terms of office for which they shall have been appointed.

2. The supreme court so constituted shall have all the jurisdiction and powers that are now possessed and exercised by the court of errors and appeals, the present supreme court, the chancellor, the court of chancery and the prerogative court, which jurisdiction and powers shall be exercised in divisions; such divisions shall be:

First. Law division, in which shall be exercised the jurisdiction and powers of the supreme court now existing, except as herein otherwise provided; two or more judges sitting together may have and exercise such jurisdiction and powers.

The clerk of the supreme court as heretofore constituted shall be the clerk of this division.

Second. Chancery division, in which shall be exercised the jurisdiction and powers of the chancellor and the court of chancery now existing, except as herein otherwise provided; one or more judges may have and exercise such jurisdiction and powers.

The clerk of the court of chancery as heretofore cunstituted shall be

the clerk of this division.

. Third. Appellate division, in which shall be exercised the jurisdiction and powers of the court of errors and appeals now existing and the jurisdiction hereby conferred; five judges, of whom four shall be a quorum, may exercise such jurisdiction and powers, and the concurrence of three shall be necessary to a decision.

The judge of the appellate division longest in office shall be presi-

dent of this division and of the court when sitting as a whole.

The secretary of state shall be the clerk of this division and shall

also keep the minutes of the court when sitting as a whole.

The appellate division shall be composed of judges assigned thereto by the Governor to serve therein until the expiration of their respective terms, but no judge shall sit in the appellate division for a longer period than seven years consecutively, nor be eligible to re-assignment thereto until after serving for, at least, three years in the law or chancery division; provided, that during the absence or disability of a judge of this division, any judge of the court may be temporarily assigned to his place by the Governor; a judge assigned to this division shall not, during his term of service therein, sit in any other division or court.

4. The judges of the court not serving in the appellate division shall from time to time be assigned by the court sitting as a whole to service in the law and chancery divisions respectively, and the judge longest in office shall be the president of the division to which he is assigned.

5. On the hearing of a writ of error or appeal, a judge who has given a judicial opinion in the cause in favor of or against the judgment, order or decree under review, shall not sit as a member of the

appellate division or have a voice in the hearing.

6. In all causes in which a writ of error could heretofore issue out of the supreme court, such writ shall issue only out of the appellate

division, and be determined therein.

7. The court shall convene at the call of the president judge, and when sitting as a whole may prescribe rules not inconsistent with statutes, and appoint masters and examiners in chancery.

8. Additional jurisdiction may be conferred on the court or on any

division thereof.

Section IV.

1. One of the judges of the law or chancery division of the supreme court shall be assigned by the court from time to time to be the ordinary or surrogate-general and judge of the prerogative court.

2. The secretary of state shall be clerk to the ordinary or surrogate-

general and register of the prerogative court.

3. From any order or decree of the prerogative court an appeal may be taken to the appellate division of the supreme court; and all appeals that are cognizable in the prerogative court shall hereafter be made directly to the appellate division of the supreme court.

SECTION V.

1. Causes and proceedings may be commenced and prosecuted either in the law or chancery division of the supreme court, according to the facts, and may be transferred from one of said divisions to the other.

2. Circuit courts shall be held in every county of this state by one or more judges assigned to the law division of the supreme court, and shall, in cases within the county, except in those of a criminal nature, have common law jurisdiction concurrent with the law division of the supreme court; and any final judgment in the circuit court may be docketed in the law division of the supreme court, and shall operate as a judgment obtained in the supreme court in such division from the time of such docketing.

3. Orders refusing new trials in the circuit courts may be reviewed

by appeal in the appellate division of the supreme court.

4. The legislature may vest in the circuit court chancery powers, to be exercised subject to appeal to the appellate division of the supreme court.

(7.) Change paragraph 1, of Section II, of Article VII, so as to read as follows:

1. Judges of the supreme court shall be nominated by the governor and appointed by him with the advice and consent of the senate; they shall hold their offices for a term of seven years; they shall, at stated times, receive for their services an equal compensation, which shall not be diminished during the term of their appointments, and they shall hold no other office under the government of this state or of the United States.

(8.) Strike out paragraph 2.

(9.) Change the number of paragraph 3 to 2.

(10.) Change paragraph 4 so as to read as follows:

3. The attorney-general, prosecutors of the pleas, clerk of the law division of the supreme court, clerk of the chancery division of the supreme court, secretary of state and keeper of the state prison, shall be nominated by the Governor and appointed by him with the advice and consent of the Senate; they shall hold their offices for five years.

(11.) Change paragraph 5 so as to read as follows:

4. One or more reporters of judicial decision shall be appointed by the supreme court and shall hold office for five years.

(12.) Change the number of the succeeding paragraphs so as to make each bear the preceding number to that it now bears.

(13.) Article X, strike out paragraph 11.

(14.) Change paragraph 12 so as to read as follows:

11. The legislature shall pass all laws necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this constitution and the amendments hereof.

The following communication was received from the Attorney-General, which the Speaker ordered the Clerk to read:

TRENTON, N. J., May 25, 1897.

Hon. George W. Macpherson, Speaker of the House of Assembly:

SIR—In response to a communication received from the Clerk of the House, I beg to submit the following:

The power to amend the constitution of the State of New Jersey is given in Article 9, which authorizes the senate or general assembly

to propose any specific amendment to the constitution, and "if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be entered on their journals, with the ayes and nays taken thereon, and referred to the legislature then next to be chosen, and shall be published for three months previous to making such choice, and in at least one newspaper of each county, if any be published therein; if in the legislature next chosen as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments, or any of them, shall be agreed to by a majority of all the members elected to each house, then it shall be the duty of the legislature to submit such proposed amendment or amendments, or such of them as may have been agreed to as aforesaid by the two legislatures, to the people, in such manner and at such time, at least four months after the adjournment of the legislature, as the legislature shall prescribe; and if the people, at a special election to be held for that purpose only, shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, or any of them, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the legislature voting thereon, such amendment or amendments so approved and ratified shall become part of the constitution; provided, that if more than one amendment be submitted they shall be submitted in such manner and form that the people may vote for or against each amendment separately and distinctly; but no amendment or amendments shall be submitted to the people by the legislature oftener than once in five years."

Under the authority given to the legislature, amendments were proposed by the legislature to the constitution of the state. They were voted upon in 1896 and adopted. The notice required by the constitution was given by publication, and in 1897 the same amendments, having been so published, were again acted upon by the legislature, with the result that some of them were adopted and others were rejected because of the failure of the house to agree with the senate in the adoption of the judiciary amendment. Under these circumstances I have received, by instruction of the house, the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the resolution now pending, providing for an amendment to the constitution touching the judiciary, be referred to the attorney-general for his opinion respecting the power of the house

to pass it."

The power of the house to act in the matter at all is derived from the 9th article of the constitution above quoted. Under the provisions of this article, the power of the legislature, when once exercised, is exhausted. I do not think that the legislature, having once acted upon a proposed amendment, can again take action upon the same amendment. It has the power under the constitution to propose an amendment, or to agree upon an amendment proposed by a preceding legislature, or to disagree to such amendment, but having proposed it cannot propose again, having agreed it cannot afterwards disagree,

and having disagreed to the adoption of the amendment it cannot

atterward agree.

I think the language of the constitution clearly indicates that legislative action in reference to an amendment proposed is absolutely final. The provision of the constitution as to the entry upon the journals, with the vote taken, indicates that the action in question is final. Besides, the fact, that it is legislative action upon the amendment to the fundamental law which the constitution authorizes, is of itself a conclusive indication that careful, deliberate action in the first instance is assumed to have been taken, and, having been once taken, the power to act is exhausted.

Under the federal constitution, whenever two thirds of both houses deem it necessary they may propose amendments to the constitution of the United States, or on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the states a convention may be called for proposing amendments, and the amendments thus proposed, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the states, or by the conventions in

three fourths, become part of the constitution.

It could scarcely be claimed that under this provision of the federal constitution, when two thirds of both houses of congress had proposed an amendment, that subsequent action could withdraw the amendment thus proposed before action had been had upon it by the legislatures of three-fourths of the states. Nor could the amendment (if acted upon by the legislatures of three-fourths of the states) be defeated by a reconsideration of the vote approving it by the legislatures of any one of the states necessary to constitute the three fourths.

It seems to me manifest that legislative power over the amendments to the fundamental law is necessarily exhausted when once exercised. If legislative action be favorable to the amendment to the constitution, that is final. If it be unfavorable to the proposed amendment, that is I am clearly of the opinion that in the case in hand, equally final. the legislature having acted upon these proposed amendments, having passed a law for the submission of these amendments to the people for their approval, having in consequence of a clerical error in the law providing for that submission been re-assembled for the correction of that error, it is entirely without power to re-open the whole subject, either by the adoption of the amendments heretofore rejected, or by the rejection of the amendments heretofore adopted. Any other conclusion would result in a degree of indefiniteness as to legislative action which would make the amendment of the constitution practically impossible.
