REHABILITATION ENGINEERING

BECOME A REHABILITATION ENGINEER! All it takes is a desire for the practical, a little bit of caring, and perhaps some cutting and pasting. In case you haven't heard, we are developing Rehabilitation Engineering Resource Rooms at the Vineland Developmental Center. We will be constructing a graded developmental series of tailor-made learning materials from items which are generally discarded. These items will be converted into exciting and interesting objects for "play" and developmental growth.

Don't be misled by the word "play". Remember, it is through play that one discovers the material properties of the things around him, and the relationship between objects. One also learns to control his movements and to attain fine manual dexterity through play. Through interaction with others, an individual discovers and experiments with social

conventions and learns about human relationships. Play can be a form of therapy in which our clients act out their anxieties and gain mastery over their environments. In play, clients can practice at their own speed all of the separate skills that can later be generalized to a work setting. Thus, play has a purposeful role in the development and growth of thinking and creativity.

When our clients encounter frustration and failure with some of our more traditional training materials, the results may often be rejection, confusion, and behavior problems. We must understand our clients, and provide materials for them which are consistent with their developmental levels. The key factor to making programs rewarding for clients is motivation. Learning not only can be fun...it has to be fun!

Congratulations to all on the successful outcome of our recent ICF audit! It is through your efforts that we have managed to achieve so much in such a short period of time. You have recognized the dignity and value of our clients as individuals, and have demonstrated your loyalty and commitment by providing our clients with a coordinated and comprehensive network of services.

We at the Vineland Developmental Center must continue to strive for excellence. The clients, as always, shall be our first priority, and you, as staff, are VDC's most valuable resource. We must continue to encourage the human relationship between employees and clients, supervisors and staff. Addressing clients by their first names is an initial step in the humanization process. Each client, as well as each staff member, is valued and can make a valuable contribution to our organization. Innovation should be encouraged. Implementing new ideas will at times result in failure, but it is only through repeated tries that progress and success can be achieved.

Our cottage meetings will continue during the upcoming year. These meetings provide an open forum at which you are encouraged to express your views. Many problem areas have been brought to light and resolved as a direct result of our meetings.

Architects are presently examining the non-ICF cottages on both the East and West Campuses for the purpose of determining whether new construction or renovation of existing buildings will be undertaken. The timeframe for the renovation/construction process cannot be assessed at this time, but upon completion of the process, all clients will reside in air-conditioned cottages with bedrooms which accommodate four clients or fewer.

Plans are well underway for the celebration of our Centennial during 1988. Artifacts and old photographs will be displayed in the Administration Building. A joint Block Party with the American Institute Training School, which will serve as our Spring Open House, is planned for Saturday, May 21, 1988. A two day conference with nationally acclaimed speakers in the field of developmental disabilities will be held on June 23-34, 1988 at Wheaton Village. Should you have any suggestions/ideas regarding the celebration of our Centennial, please contact me or Charlotte O'Neill, Executive Assistant. In the months ahead, we are anticipating expansion of our Rehabilitation Engineering and Special Olympics Programs. Further information regarding these programs will be forthcoming.

In conclusion, we are all participating in a most worthwhile endeavor from which we can derive great satisfaction. Our efforts and successes are beginning to be recognized by others, and with our continued commitment it is only a question of time before we become recognized as one of the best developmental centers not only in the State, but in the nation as well.





STOCKTON SUMMER PROGRAM

For the sixth year, the Vineland Developmental Center has sponsored a summer vacation program for our clients on the campus of Stockton State College. This program is designed to introduce community living experiences, promote socialization, and increase the community awareness of our clients. Last summer the project ran seven days and evenings each week for a six week period. Clients from both the East and West Campuses participated. Over the course of each week two groups of six clients each stayed for two nights, and a third group stayed for three nights. Other VDC clients participated in day trips to Stockton.

Two student apartments were rented on the campus of the college. Each apartment had two bedrooms, a living room, a dining area, and a kitchen. The apartments were airconditioned, and were located side-by-side on the first floor to accommodate clients with disabilities.

Two 15-passenger vans were leased for daily and evening activities which included day trips to: the Lake at Port Republic, the Village at Smithville, Ocean City, Brigantine, Atlantic City, and use of the Cape May-Lewes, Delaware Ferry. Over the past several years, we have been welcomed by the staff of numerous casinos in Atlantic City. Many entertainers have visited with the clients, making a special attempt to entertain them and sign autographs. Our clients also have enjoyed nature walks on the college campus as well as numerous luncheon and dinner barbecues. We are looking forward to next summer with the hope of increasing the length of the program to eight weeks so that more clients will have the opportunity to participate both in day trips and the overnight stays.


PARENTS AND FRIENDS ASSOCIATION

PHARMACY SERVICES THE PARTY OF THE PROPERTY OF

Pharmacy services provided here at VDC are rendered by three major sources: the VDC Hospital Pharmacy, Automated Pharmaceutical Services, and Pharma-Care, Inc.

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Pharma-Care, Inc. just recently joined us, but who is this new entity? What are they doing here? Where are they from? Where do they fit in? Let's see if we can shed some light on these queries.

Pharma-Care, Inc. is a privately owned company from Clark, New Jersey that specialized in pharmaceutical consultation services. They have been awarded this contract by the State of New Jersey to service all or part of the Developmental Disabilities Centers.

As you may recall, our previous consultant pharmacist services had been provided by Automated Health Services until March, 1987. The new contract with Pharma-Care, Inc. commenced on September 14, 1987, and will expire on September 13, 1990. At that time, the New Jersey Division of Purchase and Property will again entertain new bids for these pharmacist consultant services.

The primary functions of Pharma-Care, Inc., involve conducting on-going chart reviews on all cottage clients, surveying nursing stations, providing in-services to both nursing and medical staffs, attending IHP meetings and other various committee meetings, and meeting the established standards set forth by state and federal rules and regulations.

Pharma-Care, Inc. employees are New Jersey registered pharmacists and their number consists of a ratio of one pharmacist to every 300 clients. Some of their faces may even appear familiar to us, for some of the pharmacists were recently employed by Automated Health Services. Pharma-Care's office is located on the second floor in the Administration Annex Building.

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The Unit dose drug distribution is still being provided by Automated Pharmaceutical Services, known to many of us as APS. APS is also a privately owned company contracted by the State of New Jersey and has been providing the VDC with unit dose drugs since 1974. APS's office is still located on both campuses in the Emergency Rooms.

The VDC Hospital Pharmacy, with its unit dose drug distribution and I.V. admixture system, supplies all the needs of our acute care hospital. The Hospital Pharmacy also oversees and is responsible for the total pharmacy operation of the VDC. The Pharmacy is located on the lower level in the Hospital.
