New Jersey's nonfarm wage and salary employment registered 3,264,700 on a seasonally adjusted basis in August, substantially unchanged from July's record high. The initially reported level in July was revised upward by 4,000 based on more complete data.

Since the upturn began in January 1983, 174,600 jobs have been added to the State's nonfarm payrolls, almost all in the private sector. The overwhelming majority of these new jobs were in the service-producing area (126,000) while manufacturing employment rose by 27,100 and construction by 21,400.

From July to August, an increase of 800 jobs in the private sector was offset by a drop of 900 in government employment.

The private service-producing industries once again turned in a healthy over-the-month gain of 3,800 jobs. The largest gain occurred in trade employment, which rose by 2,000, on the strength of increased hiring in department stores and eating and drinking establishments. Other subdivisions recording increases were services, up by 1,000; finance/insurance/real estate, up by 500; and transportation/public utilities, up by 300.

In the goods-producing sector, construction employment rose by 800 to an August total of 128,800, its best level since 1973.

Also, in the goods-producing sector, manufacturing employment declined in August by 3,700 from an atypically high July level, but remained 2,900 higher than the June level. Recent large declines in employment occurred in stone/clay/glass and in electrical equipment due to a combination of permanent and temporary layoffs. Recent increases were reported in transportation equipment, apparel, and nonelectrical machinery.

After seasonal adjustment, the average workweek for production workers in manufacturing declined by 0.4 hours to 41.1 hours in August. Analysts noted that several industries had reductions in overtime hours, which had been used extensively in recent months.

The Department of Labor survey also revealed that the average production worker in New Jersey's manufacturing industries earned \$382.53 during the August survey week, \$1.23 less than in July, but \$9.02 or 2.4% more than for the same period last year.

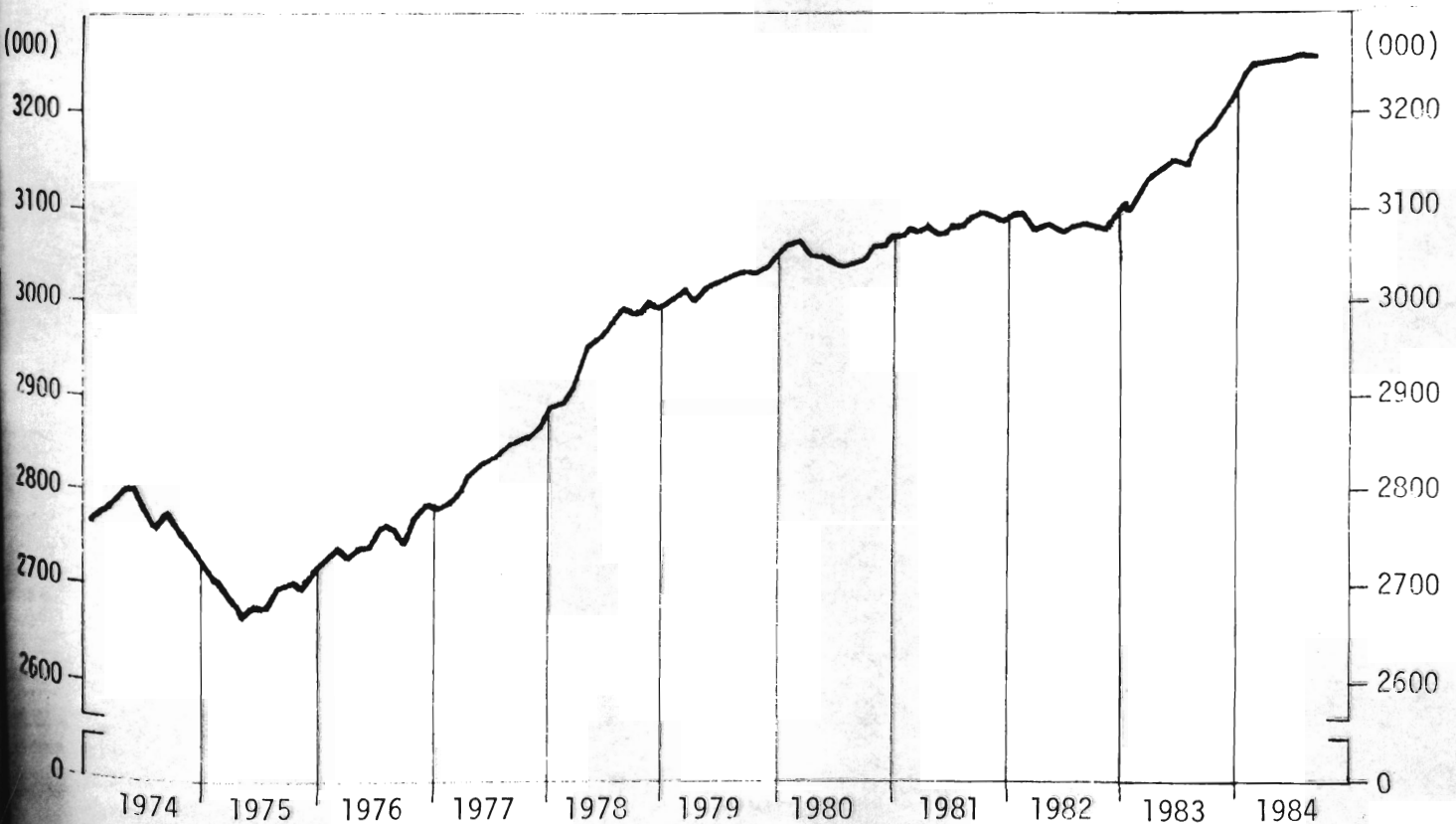

LABOR AREA COMMENTS (Not Seasonally Adjusted)

Total nonagricultural wage and salary employment followed usual seasonal patterns in most of New Jersey's ten major labor areas, with exceptions in the Atlantic City, Vineland-Millville-Bridgeton and Long Branch-Asbury Park Labor Areas. The Atlantic City and Vineland-Millville-Bridgeton areas recorded unexpected employment declines of 500 and 600 respectively. Service, trade, and transportation and public utilities accounted for the decline in the Atlantic City area, primarily due to small drops at several casinos. A drop of 300 in manufacturing due to a temporary layoff in stone/clay/glass along with a decline in construction and government reduced Vineland-Millville-Bridgeton employment. On the other hand, the Long Branch-Asbury Park area broke the seasonal pattern and registered the largest month-to-month increase among all areas by rising 500. Government, construction, and trade were identified as the responsible sectors. The largest month-to-month reduction occurred in the Newark area, down 2000, due to a decrease in government employment following release of adjunct staff by school districts.

TECHNICAL NOTES

Nonfarm Wage and Salary Employment

Employment data refer to persons on establishment payrolls who received pay for any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude proprietors, the self-employed, unpaid family workers, farm workers, and domestic workers in households. Salaried officers of corporations are included. Government employment covers only civilian employees; federal military personnel are excluded.

Persons on an establishment payroll who are on paid sick leave (when pay is received directly from the firm), on paid holiday or paid vacation, or who work during any part of the pay period but are unemployed or on strike during the rest of the period, are counted as employed. Not counted as employed are persons who, during the pay period which includes the 12th, are laid off, on leave without pay or on strike for the entire period, or who are hired but do not work during the period.

Average Hours and Earnings

Hours and earnings data are derived from reports of payroll and man-hours for production and related workers in manufacturing. When the reported pay period exceeds one week, the payroll and man-hour figures are reduced to a weekly basis.

Average hourly earnings for manufacturing are on a "gross" basis, reflecting not only changes in basic hourly rates, but also such variable factors as premium pay for overtime and shift work, and changes in output of workers paid on an incentive plan. Excluded from average earnings are irregular bonuses, retroactive items, payments of various welfare benefits, and payroll taxes paid by employers.
