#### **Academic Achievement**

This school outperforms **58%** of schools statewide as noted by its statewide percentile ranking and **61%** of schools educating students with similar demographic characteristics as noted in its peer school percentile ranking in the performance area of Academic Achievement.



Additionally, this school is meeting **100%** of its performance targets in the area of Academic Achievement.

Academic Achievement measures the content knowledge students have in language arts literacy and math. For high schools, this includes measures of the school's proficiency rate on both the Language Arts Literacy and Math sections of the New Jersey High School Proficiency Assessment (HSPA). A proficiency rate is calculated by summing the count of students who scored either proficient or advanced proficient on the assessment and dividing by the count of valid test scores.

#### **College and Career Readiness**

This school outperforms 52% of schools statewide as noted by its statewide percentile ranking and 47% of schools educating students with similar demographic characteristics as noted in its peer school percentile ranking in the performance area of College and Career Readiness. Additionally, this school is meeting 20% of its performance targets in the area of College and Career Readiness.



College and Career Readiness measures the degree to which students are demonstrating behaviors that are indicative of future attendance and/or success in college and careers. For high schools, this includes measures of participation in college readiness tests such as the SAT or PSAT and in rigorous coursework as defined by participation in AP courses in English, math, social studies and science.

#### **Graduation and Post-Secondary**

This school outperforms 56% of schools statewide as noted by its statewide percentile ranking and 65% of schools educating students with similar demographic characteristics school percentile ranking in the as noted in its peer area performance of Graduation and Post-Secondary. Additionally, this is 100% of school meeting its targets in the of performance Graduation area Post-Secondary.


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## **Enrollment by Grade**

This graph presents the count of students who were 'on roll' by grade in October of each school year.






## **Enrollment by Ethnic/Racial Subgroup**

#### ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT






## **Proficiency Trends - Math**

**COLLEGE AND CAREER READINESS** 

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Students in high schools begin to demonstrate college readiness behaviors long before they actually graduate from high school. Among those behaviors are taking college entrance exams and challenging themselves with rigorous course work. 


## Scholastic Assessment Test (SAT) Results

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
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#### **Graduation Pathway Rates**








## **Enrollment by Ethnic/Racial Subgroup**








### NJASK Proficiency Trends - Language Arts Literacy -Grade Level - 07




